Free Enterprise And The Intellectuals

A Southern scholar has pinpointed the greatest weakness of capitalism today. It is a weakness that must be corrected if the United States is to enjoy a free economy and a free society in the years ahead.

Dr. Calvin B. Hoover of Duke

University in his study, "The Economy, Liberty and the State," puts it this way:

"The greatest weakness of modern capitalism is its lack of support among a large part of the intelligentsia. Their failure to support it renders the system vulnerable to replacement by a substitute system through parliamentary or revolutionary means, or to continuous expansion of the role of the state to the point where drastic change might be required in order to keep the economy functioning."

Discussing some modern intellectuals, Dr. Hoover says that the professors and writers think of the interest of the public and of the capitalist as being fundamentally in conflict. "Intellectuals," he says, "generally do not accept the proposition that the alternative to capitalistic organization and direction of production through the market is administration of the economy by a hierarchical bureaucracy." In other words, socialism.

Many people do not see the connection between the success of the free enterprise system and their own livelihood. Take college professors, for instance. Do they, generally, realize that their very salaries depend upon profits from private enterprise—if in state institutions largely from taxes (paid from profits); if in private institutions, largely from endowment (provided by profits)?

Many of this country's intellectuals genuinely believe they are working on behalf of the public

when they urge a bigger role for government. This is a tragic mistake, and one that American businessmen must take care to correct. Those intellectuals who knowingly seek to undermine a free society deserve a rebuke. But those who are simply unaware of the alternative to free enterprise—totalitarian socialism—should be helped to a better understanding. They need to learn that no other economy is so basically just as a free enterprise economy.

An old complaint regarding academic life is that intellectuals live in an ivory tower remote from the real problems of people and the world. No doubt there is considerable truth in this charge. But it is likely that American businessmen could do more to lessen the isolation of the intellectuals—the isolation that prevents them from learning the food that is in American free enterprise.

I submit that American intellectuals ought to be provided with better opportunities to learn how free enterprise works and how free enterprise leaders plan. The average American business of today is a democratically managed operation. Abundant opportunities exist for promotion on merit. Company training plans allow for the recruitment of management on the basis of brains, character, and willingness to work. In a word, they are just. Most companies today provide well for their employees and for their future. The real welfare in American life is within corporations which have an interest in their employees.

What I'm saying is that most American business organizations today are models of the good society. Perhaps more intellectuals—more professors and scholars—should be brought into business firms for seminars and lengthy tours and studies so that they can see the great job that capitalism is doing today. They might lose some of the ridiculous, basically Marxist notions that are in "liberal" textbooks. Seeing, as the old saying goes, is believing. The intellectuals, I am confident, have only to get a better look at free more enthused about its qualities.

There shouldn't be any conflict between American intellectuals and American businessmen. The kind of free enterprise that exists in modern America promotes the finest kind of living that any nation knows. Free enterprise provides justice, opportunity and individual liberty.

County Insect Report

Thrips are in seedling cotton. You can expect them to be heavier in late planted cotton. Dust or spray to get the cotton off to a good start.

Garden bugs are causing a lot of damage to home gardens. Use Methoxychlor Spray for good results on most all of the garden

Hornflies are heavy on cattle this year. They can be controlled by using Lindane and Toxaphene Spray.

Dairying

Do you support your cows, or do they support you? Many cows on Mississippi farms could be classed as dependents, even though you can't take an income tax exemption for them.

They are dependents because they don't produce enough to pay for the feed they eat, the housing they require, nor the hours of labor spent in taking care of them. The only reliable way to find out which cows are low producers is to keep some kind of records. Several different types of dairy records are available. Most are good. Come by this office and we will help you select record types that fit your operation.

Now is a good time to cull your herd while beef prices are good, so get rid of those low producers while you can make a profit from them.

Soil Sampling

Don't wait until the last minute to send in soil samples for crops to be planted next fall. It would be a good idea to take the samples in June or July for these crops. By sending in the samples early you allow time for them to be analyzed and the recommendations returned to you in plenty of time to buy your fertilizer, get it in the soil and plant the crop on time. Remember, soil testing takes

the guesswork out of fertilizing your crops. It helps you to use the right amount and not too much or too little.

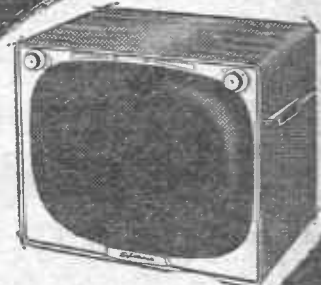

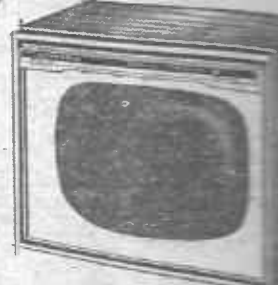

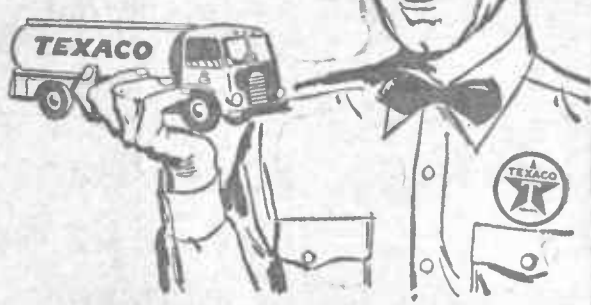

It will take several months after the questions have been asked before the answers can be compiled into a complete report that will give the most accurate picture obtainable of what actually is going on down on the farm.

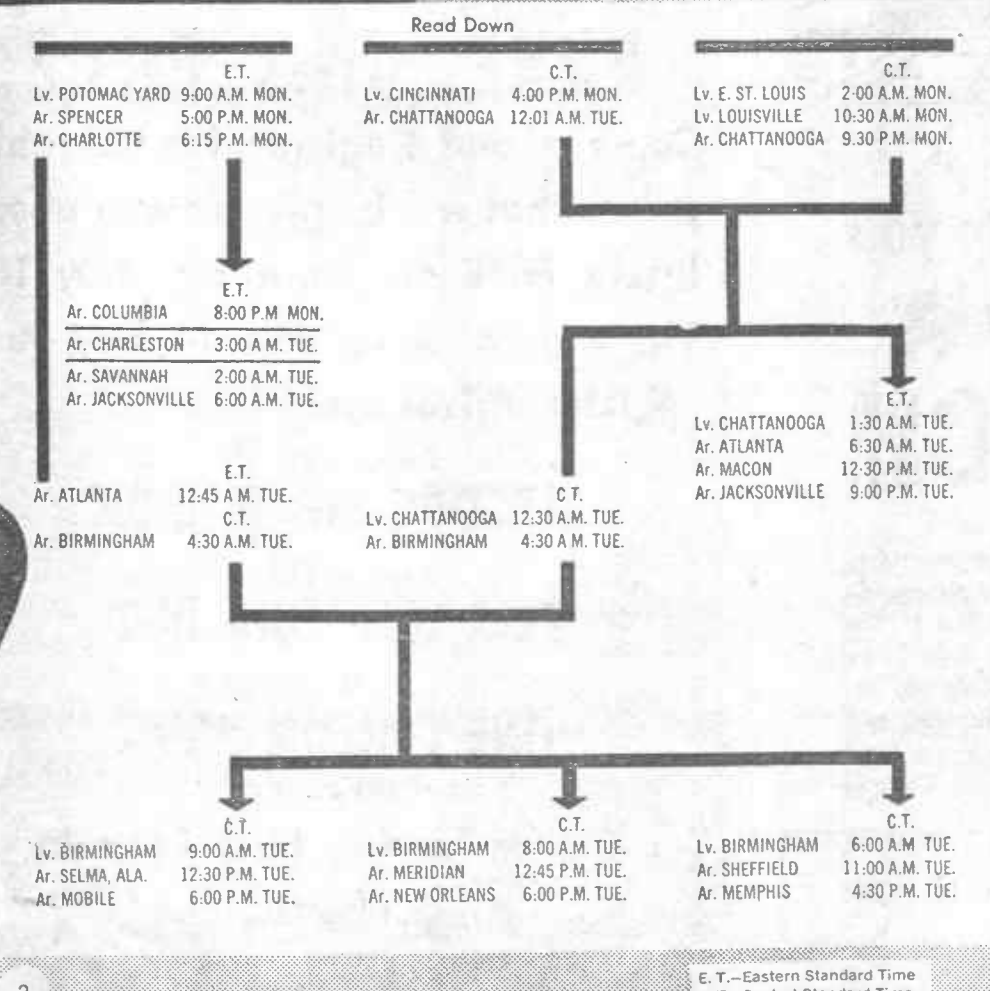

blish coastal Bermuda but once a farmer has it he soon learns that it is worth the cost and effort required to establish it.

Coastal Bermuda is suited to fertile, moderately well to well drained bottom land. But this is the kind of land that is scarce in Tishomingo county and if a farmer has this kind of land he usually puts it in row crops. This leaves eroded drowthy, rather poor upland for pastures.

Common Bermuda grass and lespedeza, or Pensacola Bahia grass and lespedeza are the plants that seem best suited for this kind of land. It should be remembered that some land formerly used for row crops in Tishomingo county is unsuited for pasture and should be set to trees. Very steep, or very badly eroded land on steep slopes, should be set to pines, not used for pasture.

The more gently sloping land having some topsoil may be used for pasture. Pensacola Bahia grass and Kobe lespedeza will grow on this kind of land, or common bermuda, if properly planted on a well prepared seedbed will grow.

If you need a new pasture now is the time to plant it. There is a pasture program whereby you may be able to receive some financial help in establishing a new pasture. If you are interested ask Mr. E. N. Allen about the ACP pasture payments.

It is important to prepare a good seedbed and plant plenty of seed

Soil Stewardship An Important Phase of Economic Development

Soil stewardship is important to the people of Mississippi. Like all other Americans, we depend on soil and water for much of our food, clothing and raw materials necessary to maintain a strong nation. In our state economy, soil and water conservation is an all-important part of the agricultural system upon which prosperity and progress depend to such an enormous extent. Soil erosion is one of the most costly and damaging forms of water misuse. Lack of cover on the soil and poor control of water can take a heavy toll. Thanks to teamwork and scientific management, Mississippi's soil erosion problem is not as serious as it was a decade ago.

Time To Prune Shrubs That Flower In Spring

Now is the time to clean up the spring pruning. Early-flowering

shrubs should have been pruned weeks ago, and now is the time to prune those that flower late in spring. The general rule for pruning shrubs that flower in the spring is to do the job just as soon as the flowers have faded. May is an excellent time for making new lawns in the South. Thorough preparation and enrichment of the soil will go a long way toward getting the new planting off to a quick start.

Two Sportswear Plants Announced

Two big new manufacturing plants specializing in sportswear have been added to the Mississippi industrial scene in recent months, both of them making big contributions to the number employed in industry. At Durant, a new sportswear plant will within a few years employ between 400 and 500 in the manufacture of outerwear for men and boys. The new firm will be housed at first in an existing building with tentative plans for construction later of an expansion or an entire new building. At Aberdeen, a new sportswear plant has begun production and employment has reached 150, with hopes of growing eventually to 325.

While DeSoto and his conquistadores found no gold, they discovered instead the mighty Mississippi River in 1541. They were the first white men to enter Mississippi, but the French under Iberville made the first permanent settlement in the lower Mississippi Valley at Old Biloxi, in 1699. Successively contending for control of the Mississippi River, which they saw as the master key to control of the North American continent, were France, England and Spain.

Oil-Industry Marks 20th Year In 1959

Mississippi late this summer will light 20 candles on a "birthday cake" in recognition of the oil and gas industry's tremendous contribution to the economic development of the state. VA NEWS

The Veterans Administration can pay for ambulance service or other transportation of patients to its hospitals only when prior authorization has been given, the VA said today.

In medical emergencies, the private physician who telephones a VA hospital to request emergency admission of a veteran may secure the travel authorization from the hospital by telephone at the same time.

The physician requesting the emergency admission should tell the hospital whether it is for an illness or injury that has been rated service-connected, and if it is not, whether the veteran can afford to pay for travel to the hospital.

Veterans admitted to VA hospitals for treatment of service-connected conditions are entitled to hospital at Government expense, hospital at Government expense, provided prior travel authorization is obtained from the hospital.

Veterans admitted to VA hospitals for treatment of nonservice-connected conditions are entitled to this travel at Government expense only if they affirm under oath that they cannot afford to pay the cost of the travel and if prior travel authorization from the hospital has been obtained.

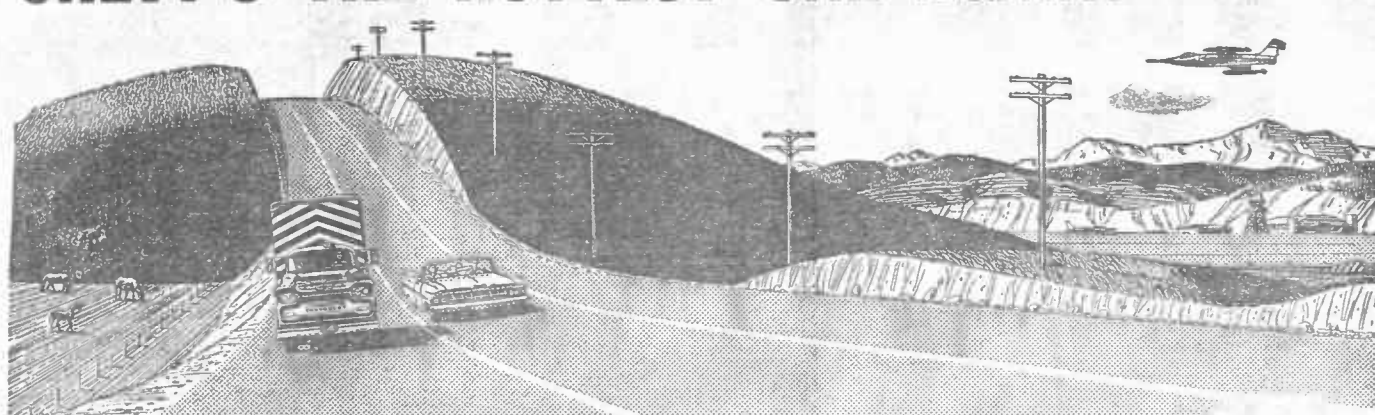
