Four Tishomingo County 4-H members have been named delegates to the statewide 4-H Junior Leadership Training Conference to be held June 2-5 at State University. They are Martha Lane Dean, Martha Finch, Larry Bonds and Terry Stephens.

The Tishomingo County delegates will be accompanied to State College by Mrs. Roberta L. Warren, Home Demonstration Agent, and Roy D. Doss, Asst. County Agent.

Two boys and two girls from each Mississippi county are eligible to attend the annual conference. The delegates are winners in a statewide competition conducted by personnel of the Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service as part of the 4-H Junior Leadership Training Program and are selected on the basis of their records in 4-H Club work. The highest scoring 4-H Junior Leaders in each county are selected as winners of the three-day trip.

The 4-H Junior Leadership Training Program is administered by the Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service and is sponsored by United Gas. All travel and other expenses of the junior leaders while attending the conference are paid by the sponsor.

The State University conference will be under the direction of State 4-H Club Leader C. I. Smith and his staff but the delegates are given most of the responsibility for carrying out the conference program as part of their leadership training.

Steps In Hole While
Playing In Water

Gary White Weaver 12, of Cherokee, Route 1, one of four children playing in the water at Spring Valley Boat Dock was pulled from the water about 7:15 Thursday evening. Dr. Harry Cosby, Jr., of Iuka pronounced him dead.

The children, none of whom could swim, were accompanied by the victim's sister, Mrs. Archie Jeffreys and her husband. The child was believed to have stepped into a hole of deep water where a stump had been removed during the low water season.

The boat dock is located about 10 miles below Cherokee on the Riverton Road near the Mississippi line.

Mrs. Jeffreys said the group was making preparations to leave when Gary was missed. They found him about ten feet from the bank in water eight or ten feet deep.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Weaver, who moved to the Cherokee community about six years ago from Lauderdale county.

SENSING THE NEWS

A TIME FOR AGGRESSIVENESS

Private enterprise must fight for the mind of the nation. Forthright new campaigns—and a new campaigning spirit—are needed to bring home to Americans the dangers of a socialist victory. Each session of Congress is a reminder that privately owned business in America is being undermined bit by bit.

Only recently the Senate overrode a Presidential veto of a rural electrification bill. Fortunately, the veto was upheld by the House. The purpose of the bill was to ease the making of Rural Electrification Administration loans by denying the Secretary of Agriculture power to disapprove such loans. This bill was simply another raid on the Treasury. After all, the REA borrows money from the government—the taxpayers—at 2 per cent. The taxpayers must pay 4 per cent interest on the money they borrow.

The success with which public power advocates operate in Con-

gress calls for more aggressive action by investor-owned utilities. The country hasn't come to understand what is at stake in the fight against public power. Many people have the tragically mistaken notion that electricity is cheap because of special efforts by the federal government.

No American business has so great a story to tell as America's investor-owned utility companies which sell electricity and gas. America's homes, farms, factories and offices are mechanized and cheerful places because of the billions of dollars which private investors have risked to bring light and power to the nation. Few industries in America have been so public-minded in seeing that its executives work in community campaigns and promote better living for the entire population.

Despite all this, utility companies are kicked around. They are insulted by welfare statists and denied opportunities for growth. Their

efforts to advertise what they do for the country are taxed by federal authorities.

It would seem the time has come for investor-owned producers of electricity to become more aggressive if they are not to be knocked off one by one. The coming threat to private enterprise is government control of atomic power. In few areas have the public power advocates the political steam necessary to immediately destroy private power companies. But they see a great opportunity in federal control of nuclear power development. They are pushing hard for government power plants of this nature wherever possible.

If private enterprise is lacking in aggressiveness, the socialists are not. They work unceasingly to cripple capitalism. They consistently attempt to picture profitmaking as some sort of objectionable activity. They twist the facts so that some persons believe federal activities are synonymous with the public interest. "Liberals" on the Supreme Court hand down rulings that ordain how big business shall be. Dealers in the federal bureaucracy try to take the decision-making power in private business away from investors and managers.

To resist the welfare statists and protect legitimate private interests from the assaults of public power advocates, a far-reaching program of action is needed. Nor is this a problem for private enterprise power companies alone; it should be a matter of concern to all business—for if the utility business can be socialized, so can any other business. Business today can't concern itself simply with financial and engineering details. Politics and public relations are equally important. The millions of Americans who own shares in private companies have to go to bat for their rights—for the freedom to engage in enterprise. The public advocates are already using the funds of the taxpayers to defeat private enterprise. If private enterprise—and this means all those who believe in private enterprise—lacks the aggressiveness to protect freedom, the socialists will capture the country.

Traffic Death Rate Dropped Sharply During April

Mississippi's traffic death rate, since the first of the year, dropped sharply during April.

According to Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough, only 27 traffic deaths were reported during April. This is a 46 per cent reduction from the April 1958 death figure of 50 killed.

Deviled Egg Fillings

To fill 6 hard-cooked eggs, try one of these as a mix with the yolks:

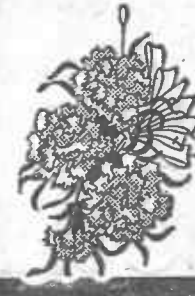

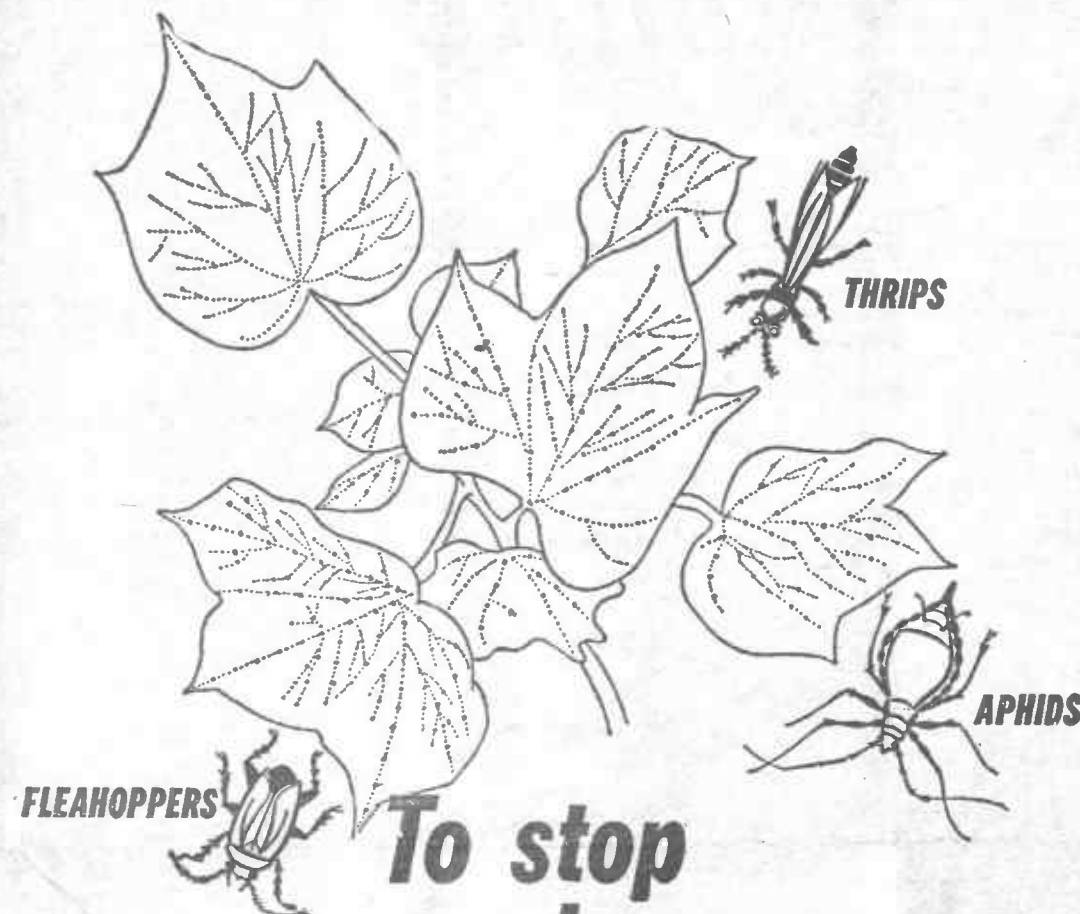

County Agent news

Swine Diseases And Management.
Sick hogs have been prevalent this year, especially pigs. Veterinarians have been able to diagnose some of the cases but the cause of some of the illnesses has not been determined. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure; sanitation and vaccination, along with proper feed, are some measures of prevention.

Sanitation must be practiced if healthy pigs are expected. In some cases this means changing the hog lots and farrowing pens. It is a good idea to change hog lots at least every four years. Old hog lots should be freshly seeded on a prepared seed bed. This helps eliminate worms as well as enteritis germs that harbor in the ground. Hogs will be as clean as the owner will let them, so give them a chance on clean premises. Vaccination is the best swine insurance obtainable. Vaccinate for both Cholera and Erysipelas when pigs are eight weeks old.

Keep minerals available for all hogs at all times. A cheap good mineral mixture is as follows: 2 parts Basic Slag, 1 part salt, 1 part steam bone meal.

These things will not answer all disease problems, but I believe it will be a long step in the right direction.

Poultry Pointers

Don't let your layers get too hot this summer.

If they get too hot, you can lose money. Overheating can result in heavy death loss due to heat prostration in laying hens. If losses are not quite this severe, you stand to lose on egg production.

Here are a few things you can do to help prevent hot weather losses in the poultry house:

Increase the number of waterers

—birds need twice as much water in summer as in winter. Allow plenty of floor space—don't crowd the birds.

Open the house up all the way. Use shallow litter on floors. Litter two to three inches thick makes the house four to seven degrees cooler at the floor level than eight inch thick litter.

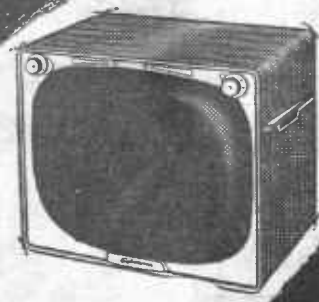

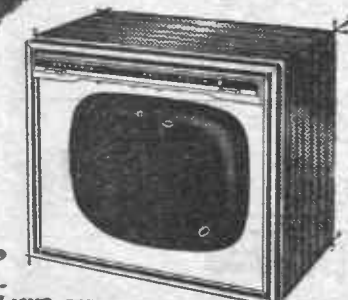

Mr. Moser was told that black- jacks can be girdled anytime dur- ing the year, but first there must be a stand of young pines (350 or more per acre) before he could receive ACP assistance in killing the undesirable hardwood. If the young pines were not naturally on the land they would have to be planted before the blackjack was girdled if he expected to re- ceive payment.

A study of the entire wooded area revealed that with very little planting a 25 acre block would qualify for ACP assistance. It was no trouble to get the pine seed- lings and set them where needed, but it became quite a problem to find someone who knew how and would do a good job of girdling his hardwood at a reasonable price. Through the help of Mr. E. N. Allen and his program a commer- cial vendor, who does this kind of work, was located, and in a very few days the job of girdling the 25 acres of blackjacks, and other undesirable hardwood, was done.

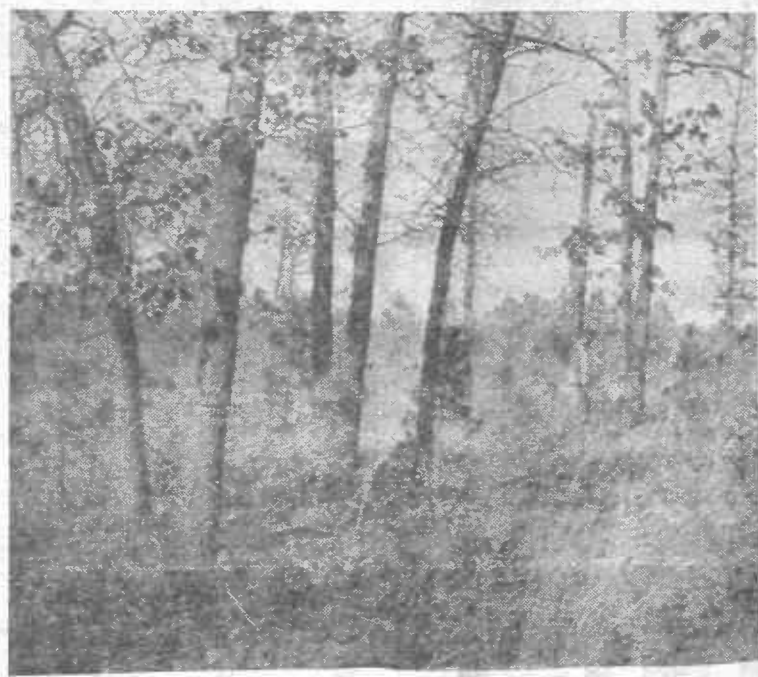
The accompanying photo was made on Mr. Moser's property and shows the young pines among the girdled blackjacks. This work can be done anytime during the year. The landowner can use an ax and do the work himself, by cutting

through the outer bark and well into the tree to stop the flow of sap, or he may be able to find someone who has equipment that he can hire to do the work for him.

The main point to remember is that young pines must have sun- light to grow. Mr. Moser knew this and has done something about it. Perhaps you have a similar prob- lem. If you do have such a prob- lem and want our help come by the local SCS office in Iuka, and we will help you if we can.

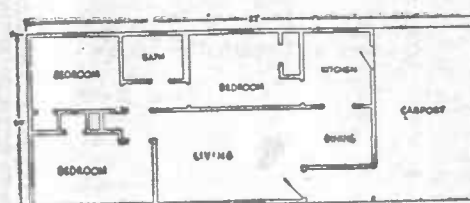

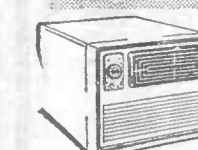
