Rotary Guest

Speaks On "What
Price Security"

Garner Lester, a banker and industrialist of Jackson, Miss., was guest speaker at the Iuka Rotary club Wednesday meeting. Mr. Garner was the guest of Banker R. A. McRee, the two being lifelong friends.

Mr. Lester spoke on "What Price Security?" To introduce his subject, the speaker told of a young man who came to him and asked for a job. He asked the youngster what he wanted in a job and the reply was: "I want a good clean position that pays a fine salary and when I get old I want to retire on my social security."

"What is security?" the speaker said. "Few of us can give the proper definition; most all have the wrong conception. Most people are looking to Washington for security, few realizing it has to be paid for."

"But we must pay for it," he continued. "We are now taxed exceptionally high to pay for the welfare of the masses of 170,000,000 people in America. On a loaf of bread alone there are 150 different taxes."

The speaker vigorously attacked the give-away system of the United States government and cited the great civilizations of Rome and Athens that fell because of laws passed by those governments in pre-medieval times giving services to their citizens. He said the United States was following in parallel lines examples set by Rome and Athens.

Added emphasis was placed on Mr. Lester's speech when he asked that he receive no applause but that the audience observe 10 seconds of meditation.

Pig Sale
Held Friday
At Booneville

575 Pigs Sold For
\$6,690.50; \$11.63 Each

The large scale organized marketing of high quality feeder pigs for this area began with a tri-county feeder pig sale in Booneville May 29.

The 575 pigs sold brought \$6,690.50, an average of \$11.63 per head. Ranging in weight from 20 to 135 pounds, they were consigned by 32 farmers.

The top lot of nine brought \$23 per head. It was consigned by R. C. McMillan, Jr. of Baldwin.

Fewer buyers than were expected was thought to account for the lower prices than some had hoped to see. However, several producers said that they were well satisfied.

Many of the lots were of as high quality as can be found anywhere, buyers commented. They were purebred and purebred crosses, selected for meat type. All were vaccinated for cholera and the males were castrated.

Farmers of the area need this kind of a sale, particularly on smaller farms. This is because a number of them have grazing for six or eight sows and their pigs, but do not produce enough grain to feed out some 60 or 70 market hogs, county agents explained.

County agents of the Agricultural Extension Service who led in organizing and arranging this sale were W. T. Smith of Booneville, W. C. Hamilton of Iuka and W. L. Adams of Corinth.

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GROUND BREAKING CEREMONIES HELD
FOR \$30,000,000 PULP & PAPER MILL

At Counce, Tenn., Thursday Of
Last Week; Will Employ 400

Construction of a \$30,000,000 pulp and paper mill at Counce, Tenn., officially got underway Thursday morning of last week. Ceremonies commemorating this memorial event were held at eleven o'clock with G. W. E. Nicholson, president of The Tennessee River Pulp & Paper Company, performing the honors by working the lever on a massive bulldozer that moved the first earth for the building.

Site of the huge plant is on the north side of the highway a few miles west of Pickwick dam.

Completion date for the mill is set at January 1, 1961. The plant, when in operation will employ approximately 400 at the mill and officials estimate that 2,000 additional people including farmers will be employed by producers and contractors who will sell wood to the mill. Yearly pulpwood requirements will be 270,000 cords. At first, all pine will be used, but officials state that later fifteen percent hardwood will be consumed. Yearly output capacity will be 170,000 tons of container board.

Annual payroll at the plant will be in excess of \$2,000,000. Over \$5,000,000.00 will be spent yearly for the purchase of pulpwood. This amount, officials say, will be the greatest benefit to residents of the area.

The Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company, owners and operators of the mill, is owned by Bell Fibre Products Co., Central Fibre Products Co., Cornell Paperboard Products Co., and The Ohio Boxboard Co. All these firms operate converting plants in the middle west.

The mill will manufacture kraft pulp and container board which, officials state, is in greater demand today than any other pulp products.

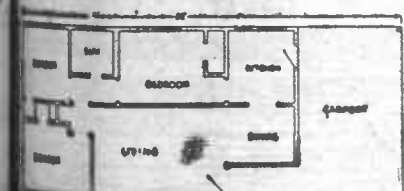

The naming of such a Commission would be the first step toward the creation of a national Freedom Academy that would have the same status as the military and naval academies at West Point and Annapolis.

The purpose of such an Academy would be to train "freedom fighters" of the Free World to "battle" conspiratorial, organizational and operational techniques of Communism.

Bills to establish the Commission and Academy are sponsored by Sens. Karl Mundt (R., S.D.), Paul Douglas (D., Ill.), Clifford Case (D., N. J.), and by Reps. Sydney Herlong (D., Fla.) and Walter Judd (R., Minn.).

A Third Front
The Communists are waging the cold war on three fronts—military, economic and propaganda. The last is the only one on which we are doing an ineffective job of defending democracy.

"While the Free World has developed a powerful defense establishment to prevent a 'hot war'—or fight one if attacked—we have tragically ignored in great measure the political battlefields of the cold war," Sen. Mundt points out.

On the military front, the Communist nations and the Free World are rated by many experts as about even-up. The economic strength of the Free World is undeniably superior.

Russia's superiority in the use of propaganda is also acknowledged. The Kremlin spends billions of dollars to train propaganda agents and to finance their infiltration into the Free World nations. We have taken no effective counter-measures.

Fifth Columnists
For every Kremlin-trained agent in the Free World there probably are hundreds of "fellow travelers" who form an extremely dangerous Communist "fifth column."

Sen. Mundt said in a recent Senate speech that communist agents "have infiltrated our universities, our cultural and religious groups, our labor and farm organizations, our newspapers, radio-TV and movie industries."

Sponsors of the bills say the purpose of the Freedom Academy would be to train students "as to the methods of communists, and learn techniques to effectively counteract use of infiltration, propaganda and espionage." "It is not," Mundt explained, "our intention to emulate the communist conspiratorial techniques in conducting our side of this cold war into which we have been reluctantly but realistically forced."

"Our methods and techniques can and should be developed in full harmony with our democratic principles, our Christian ethics, and our civilized concept of morality."

"With right on our side we should be able to evolve methods and techniques far more effective than those utilized by the communists to exploit those with whom they come in contact."

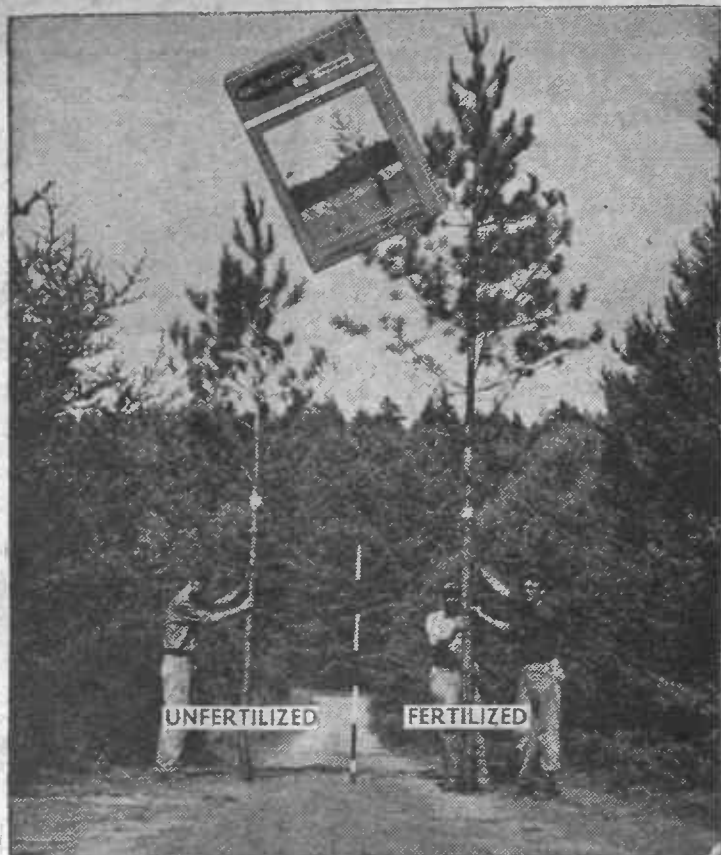

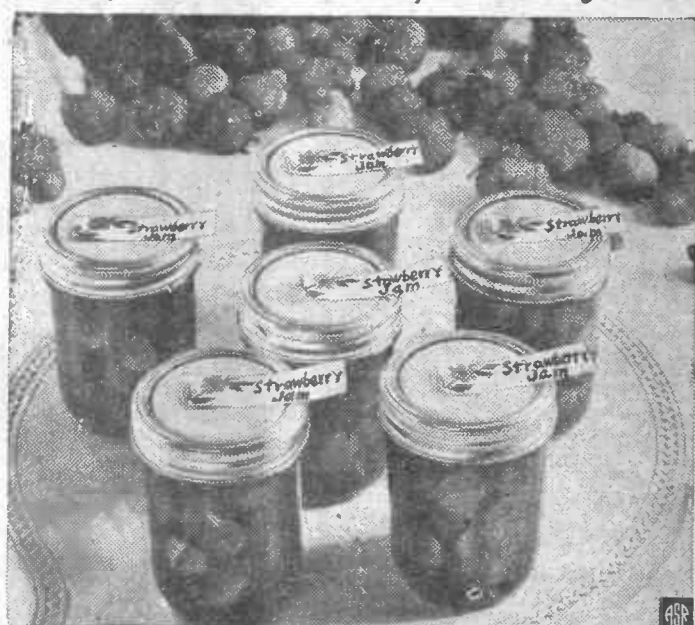

Rosy Strawberries Say "Make Jam"



To every homemaker rosy ripe strawberries say "homemade strawberry jam"! And who wants to resist when delicious jam is so quickly made with powdered fruit pectin. Here's the easy recipe.

STRAWBERRY JAM

Yield: about 11 medium glasses (5 1/2 lbs. jam)
4 1/2 cups prepared fruit (about 7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar
2 qts. ripe strawberries) 1 box (1 1/2 oz.) powdered fruit pectin

First, prepare the fruit. Crush completely, one layer at a time, about 2 quarts fully ripe strawberries. Measure 4 1/2 cups into a very large saucepan.

Then make the jam. Measure sugar and set aside. Add powdered fruit pectin to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once stir in sugar. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover jam at once with 1/2 inch hot paraffin. If jars are used, seal.

Attention All Parents

Student Guidance: How Does It Work?

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second in a series of articles on student guidance. Others will appear in subsequent editions of this newspaper.

Have you ever thought about why you are working in your present occupation? Perhaps it was an accident—or you may have carefully planned it to the last detail.

Accidents may have worked well for some of us. But most parents are not willing to have their children's success or failure be an accidental thing.

In order to increase the probability that vocational success will depend upon some rhyme or reason, student guidance leaders for more than fifty years have been developing ways in which to help students plan and develop careers.

Because it is a difficult task to help students make plans and carry them out, guidance counselors cannot be sure of success in every case. There is no doubt, though, that their work greatly improves the chances for satisfaction and success in life.

The professional guidance counselor is interested in helping your child learn how to plan for himself rather than be dependent upon someone else to make his plans for him. He also recognizes that career planning and development cannot be settled in a short period of time but, for almost everyone, is actually a lifelong process. New experiences change our interests, attitudes, goals, and eventually may affect our vocational plans.

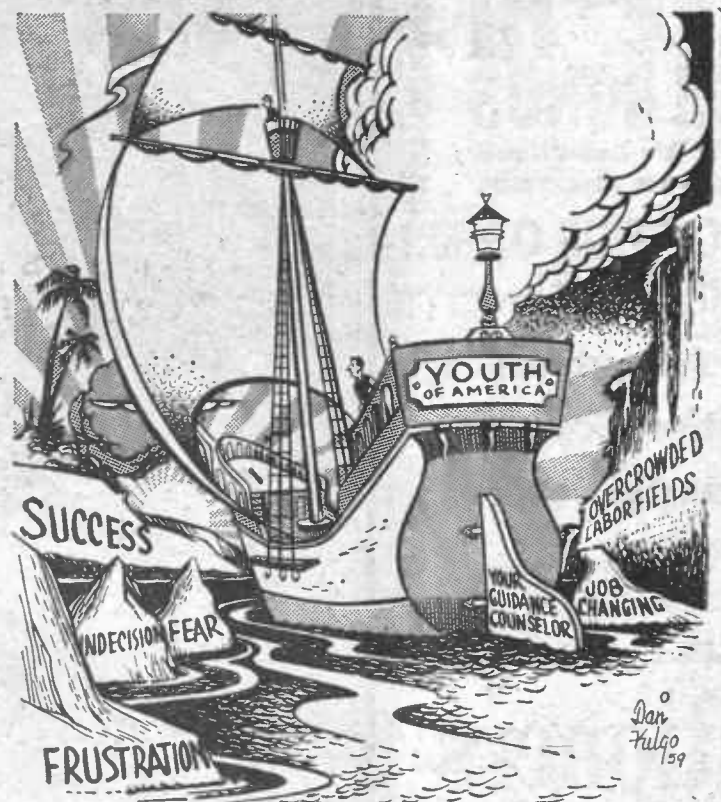
It is important that we fully understand what is meant by the word "career." Research indicates that most of us work in a series of occupations, some related and some unrelated to our final occupation at the time we retire.

Bob White, for example, may have begun as a car washer, then worked in numerous auto service stations as an attendant, before becoming an auto mechanic and eventually the owner of a small auto repair shop. All of these kinds of work represent Bob's career. In his case, his occupations were definitely related to each other.

Roger Smith, on the other hand, did many odd jobs around his neighborhood and worked part-time at all sorts of jobs while getting a medical degree.

Most of the early jobs were not related but depended upon circumstances and accidents. After getting his degree, Roger became a doctor in a small community; but after a serious illness, he became a doctor at a university health service and later director. Not too many years passed before he became director of research for a national drug firm. What will he do next? It is safe to guess that it will have something to do with medicine, but in what capacity?

Whatever he does, Roger's career is the complete array of all his occupations. It is important that parents realize that a pattern of occupa-



tions, or a career, cannot be predicted with certainty. Two children may be alike in most ways but react quite differently to the same "experiences" at school or eventually at work. In the same way, two students, who are very much alike, may find economic conditions affecting their chances for jobs in different ways.

The key to understanding vocational guidance rests upon an understanding of these lifelong careers. The target for vocational guidance becomes a series or pattern of somewhat related occupations rather than a single occupation, a mere speck among the 40,000 or more kinds of employment in the world of work.

Vocational guidance begins with a child's many experiences and decisions while he is still in school. It can eventually influence his entry into the world of work. Vocational guidance can also follow and assist in his progress once he is employed, but it is most important in his student life.

In order to see more clearly just how complex adequate vocational guidance really is, parents might like to look at one example. Be sure to remember that this is just one example—and each child's planning is usually quite different.

An organized program of vocational guidance provides a counselor with special skills who could talk over the student's ideas as well as those of his parents. These discussions occurred many times during the high school year and especially at those points when critical decisions and plans were important. Whether to take college preparatory courses or not? What courses to take? Or what school activities might be beneficial?

Periodically, the student's interests, abilities, aptitudes, and achievements were checked with tests of various kinds. Records of school achievement, as well as other in-school and out-of-school activities were kept from year to year.

An up-to-date collection of materials provided the student with all types of information regarding vocational schools, colleges, occupations, the armed services, school adjustment, etc. He was exposed to many types of educational and occupational information through his regular classes, assemblies, home room, career days, college nights, the school paper, and other group activities.

In finding an appropriate college, he was assisted by receiving information, filling out application blanks, locating a scholarship, and other such activities. If he had decided to find a job or go into the armed services, he would have found an equal amount of assistance provided through the vocational guidance program.

In addition, while still in school and after leaving school, this individual was contacted from time to time in an attempt to offer further assistance in planning, preparing for, and progressing in his career.

Adequate vocational guidance requires special knowledge and skills. Take the above example and multiply him by a few million—you now can sense the size of the task ahead in guidance.

It is only good sense that a school which helps a student prepare for some career should help him explore, plan for, and progress at that career. Perhaps the years ahead will see less and less schools leave vocational guidance to chance.

Is The Time Fertilize Bahia Grass

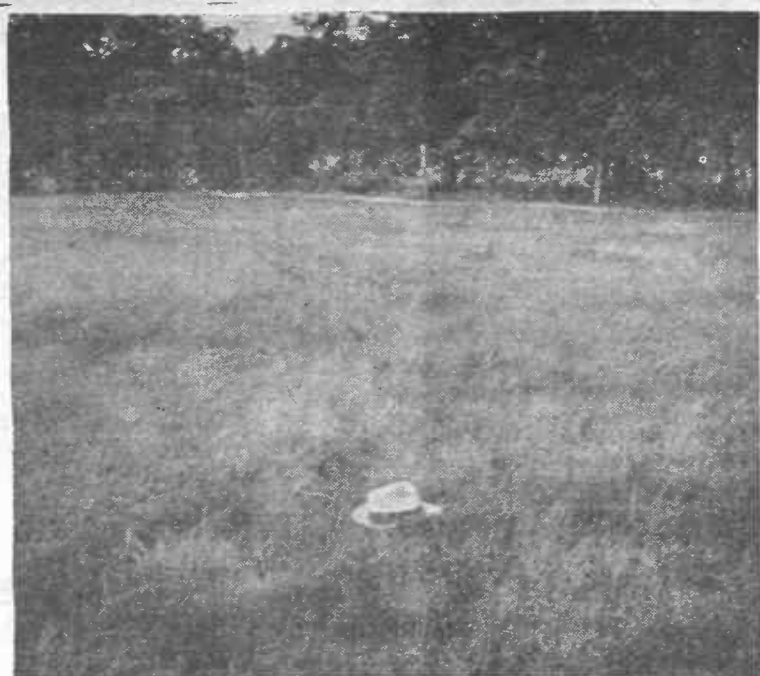
little amount of grass and other vegetation he could find, but certainly he would be a very poor, and stunted animal after starving six months.

So it is with upland pastures in Tishomingo county. Most of these pastures are either Pensacola Bahia grass and Lespedeza. These pastures need feeding. (Fertilizing) if they are to grow and produce the grazing expected of them.

If you have applied phosphate, potash and nitrate on your pasture in March or early April now is the time to apply additional nitrate. If you have not fertilized

your pasture at all, this is the time to apply both minerals and nitrate on it.

It requires moisture (rain) to make fertilizer available and cause the plant root systems to develop. We can expect more rain through June. This will cause the Bahia grass to grow rapidly, it will be tender and nutritious, and it will develop a more vigorous root system to carry it through the dry periods in July, August and September.

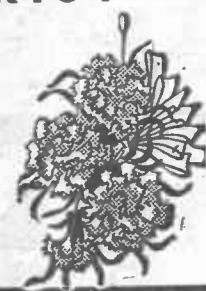

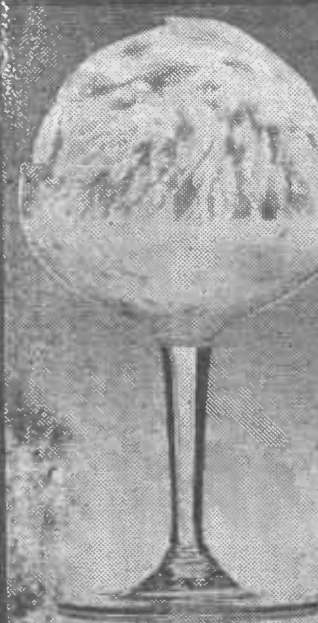

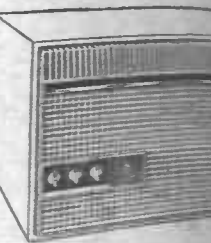
