WHEN WILL INFLATION END?

Many people—not enough, perhaps, but many—are greatly disturbed about inflation in this country and the disastrous effects it portends upon the economic safety and future welfare of the nation. These people know that the process of inflation must be brought to an end or the value of our money completely dissipated. The natural question, therefore, is, "When will

inflation end?" The blunt truth is that inflation will never end—until we return to a redeemable currency, until control of the nation's purse strings is placed once more in the hands of the people where it belongs. This is a fact that many people do not realize or understand—and this includes economists, financiers, business and professional men,

and others.

Many people would say that inflation will end when wage increases once more have a direct connection with productivity. Others will say that inflation will end when the nation once more operates under a consistently balanced budget in time of peace. Both statements—certainly taken together—would be true, but those who make them do not seem to realize, either that these things will not happen until we return to a redeemable currency.

Now, a redeemable currency, in and of itself, exerts no magic with relation to inflation—but it provides the conditions which make it possible to stop inflation. As long as the government can create money without any tangible backing—and it seems to make no difference which political party is in power—just so long will the government refuse to take the necessary step to stop inflation, because inflation appeals to the majority of the politicians in that it gives them the power to spend without limit and thus remain in office under the pretense of having done much for the 'welfare' of the people.

A redeemable currency means that whenever the people become dissatisfied with the possibility of future sustained value of their paper money, they can demand gold in exchange and thus take control of the money out of the hands of the government. As it is now, the people can demand nothing for their paper money but more paper

money—and so long as printing presses operate, the politicians have no trouble supplying that. There might be another backing to paper money just "as good as gold"—but if so, it has never been found. As Mr. Bernard Baruch, who perhaps knows money as well as anyone who might be selected—or better, once commented:

"I have studied paper dollars, silver dollars, commodity dollars, managed dollars. They have not worked, and I do not think they will work. But gold has worked from Alexander's time down. When something holds good for 2,000 years, I do not believe it can be because of prejudice or a mistake in theory."

In a speech before the Associated Press convention in New York City in recent weeks, Secretary of the Treasury, Anderson made one of the strongest appeals we have heard for a return to fiscal sanity in this nation—but he did not take the final and necessary step of recommending return to a redeemable currency. The Republican party platform of '52 advocated a return, but for some reason it was dropped from the 1956 platform. The Democratic party, under whose control we went off the gold standard in 1933, has not advocated return since.

The Institute of Life Insurance has finally come around to carrying on an extensive advertising campaign against inflation—something it should have done long ago, because it is simply not being fair to sell protection that turns out to have only half the value or less of what the buyer bought. But they do not mention return to a redeemable currency. Bankers, who certainly owe it to their depositors to protect the value of their savings, except in isolated individual cases, have taken no position. Just because they take in dollars and pay out in dollars, and can therefore ride long with inflation without serious difficulty, does not absolve them from responsibility.

Bills have been introduced in Congress to return us to a redeemable currency. Everyone concerned about inflation should demand of his Senators and Representative that one of these bills be passed.

BOOZE IN THE SKY

I flew between New York and Miami at 15,000 feet and watched a man who had had too much to drink toss a lighted match into a container for discarded drinking cups.

No sober person would have taken such a terrible risk. If the plane had caught fire and been destroyed no one would have known the cause.

The liquor on which the man became intoxicated was served him by the airline stewardess. He made himself so objectionable to the stewardess that she had left

her post near the drinking fountain to get away from him.

House Speaker Sam Rayburn, who makes frequent airplane trips has become so concerned that he has asked for action on bills before the House Interstate Commerce Committee to ban the serving of liquor on airplanes.

"I am apprehensive," Mr. Rayburn said, "that the serving of liquor in excessive amounts to airplane passengers could cause a serious disaster."

Rep. Oren Harris of Arkansas, Chairman of the Interstate Commerce Committee, expects to hold public hearings late this month or early next on seven bills before the Committee to ban the serving of liquor in the air.

The bills pending are by Reps. John Bell Williams of Mississippi, Roy Weir of Minnesota, Thomas Lane of Massachusetts, Ken Hechler of West Virginia, Robert Hemphill of South Carolina, Carl Elliott of Alabama and Water Judd of Minnesota.

A spokesman for the Civil Aeronautics Board, which investigates all air accidents, told us the CAB

has no evidence that any crash has been caused by a drunken passenger. But, he conceded, there have been many accidents for which no cause was ever determined.

The associations representing both the airline pilots and the stewardesses have urged legislation to ban the serving of drinks to passengers. The Federal Aviation Agency, which administers safety regulations, told us "the serving of drinks aloft is strictly a concern of the airlines" so long as there is no law against it.

Time for Action

The time for action is now, before a drunken passenger causes an accident. Besides the safety factor, the annoyance of other passengers by someone made noisy and boisterous by drink is reason for action.

It may be that some of the unexplained causes of airplane accidents are due to liquor being served, but whether that is so or not, it is certain that accidents will be due to the serving of liquor if it continues.

CHECK YOUR VEGETATED WATERWAYS; KEEP THEM MAINTAINED

ground and plant more seed. Pensacola Bahia is a good grass to plant.

If the center of the waterway is eroding and gullying out, take sacks of dirt and place them along in the gully to make check dams, plow or shovel, in loose soil above these sacks of dirt and seed Pensacola Bahia. This will stop the gully and soon the entire area will heal over.

Remember that the rows and terraces are to drain into these vegetated waterways. The land should be plowed in such a manner as NOT TO BUILD A BANK along the edge.

If the water flows down the rows to the waterway and can't flow into it a gully will be formed along the outside between the vegetation and the field. This condition can develop rapidly and cause great damage. A little care in plowing the land can prevent this from occurring.

A properly maintained vegetated waterway will do much toward checking soil erosion. They serve as a meadow from which hay can be cut, and they make tractor farming easier and safer. Driving tractor near a deep open ditch can be dangerous.

A great many Soil Conservation District cooperators have done a fine job in establishing vegetated waterways. These landowners are to be commended for this, but there is still a job to do in maintaining these waterways and keeping them in good condition. Now is the time to do this.

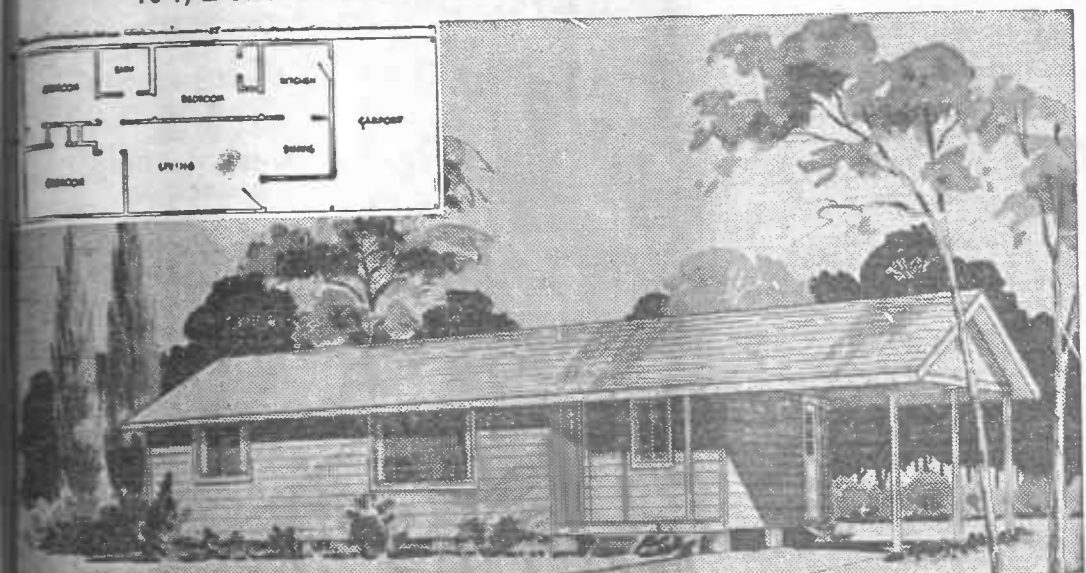

Jerry W. Franks In Basic Training At Ft. Jackson

Jerry W. Franks, son of Mr. and Mrs. Brodis L. Franks, 116 B. Oakgrove Cts., Iuka, has been assigned to Company A, 10th Battalion, 2nd Training Regiment at Fort Jackson, S.C., for eight weeks of basic combat training.

Upon arrival at Fort Jackson, he was issued clothing and given a complete physical examination and a comprehensive battery of aptitude tests.

As part of his basic training he will be taught rifle marksmanship under the Army's new Trainfire program. In Trainfire, he will learn to use an M-1 rifle by firing at pop-up targets on terrain which duplicates combat areas.

He will also be taught drill, tactics, camouflage, military courtesy, first aid and other basic subjects. He will learn how to throw a grenade, fire in pitch darkness, crawl under barbed wire with machine gun fire overhead, and defend himself in simulated chemical, biological and radiological warfare situations.

During his seventh week of training, he will march 13 miles with full field pack to a bivouac area to spend a week living in the field and learning to integrate the skills he has been taught.

After completing basic training, he normally will receive a two-week leave before reporting for his first assignment.

Traffic Accidents During May

Thirty-Two persons died in Mississippi traffic accidents during May.

Although this is a slight drop from the May '58 toll, Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough reports that this year's toll still remains 13 ahead of last year's corresponding count.

For two consecutive months, Mississippi's highway death rate has dropped, particularly in rural open highway accidents. An upsurge in urban city fatalities continues, however, offsetting the sharp drop in open highway fatal accidents.

Urban or city accidents have increased more than 40 per cent this year.

Commissioner Scarbrough warns that the number one traffic killer, whether on the open highway or inside a municipality, is still carelessness: carelessness coupled with a traffic violation. It might be a combination of carelessness and speed, carelessness at an intersection, or carelessness in passing. But driver carelessness remains the number one killer.

HOME AGENT NOTES
By Roberta L. Warren
Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent Mississippi Agricultural Extension Service
Last week you read in this column about washing and drying your blankets. As a follow up, I am including this week some notes on reconditioning blankets. Maybe you tried some other method of washing your blankets and they came out badly shrunken. You can recondition them to come out 4 to 6 inches longer by following this washing method.
Reconditioning Blankets
Wash blanket, using the new relaxation or soak method described in last week's column. After the final rinse, stretch the blanket vigorously.
If you have space, put papers on the floor or across a large table and thumb tack the blanket in place.
Brush hard with a steel bristled brush. As the blanket stretches during the brushing, remove the thumb tacks, turn blanket over, stretch and tack down again. Brush until nap is raised and the felt-ing is relieved. If possible, let the blanket dry in this position.
If you can't let it stay on the floor or table to dry, hang it across a line or better parallel lines. When dry, brush until it is soft and nap is raised.
If you don't have space to stretch the blanket and thumb tack it to floor or table, after the final rinse, get someone to help you stretch the blanket vigorously. As it dries on the lines, stretch it vigorously from time to time.
Cold Milk Drinks
Try these cold milk drinks on your family during June Dairy Month and all during the hot summer.
Peppermint Milk Shake. Add crushed peppermint stick candy to chilled milk. Place in refrigerator until candy is completely dissolved. Add more milk if desired. Pour into serving glass and top with scoop of ice cream and shaved sweet chocolate.
Hawaiian Make-Believes. Combine chopped fresh mint with crushed pineapple. Add to ice cream-thickened chilled milk. Pour into serving glass. Top with whipped cream, cherries and a mint leaf.
Use your steam iron to raise the nap of a carpet that has been matted down by furniture legs. Hold the iron down near the nap, but do not touch it.

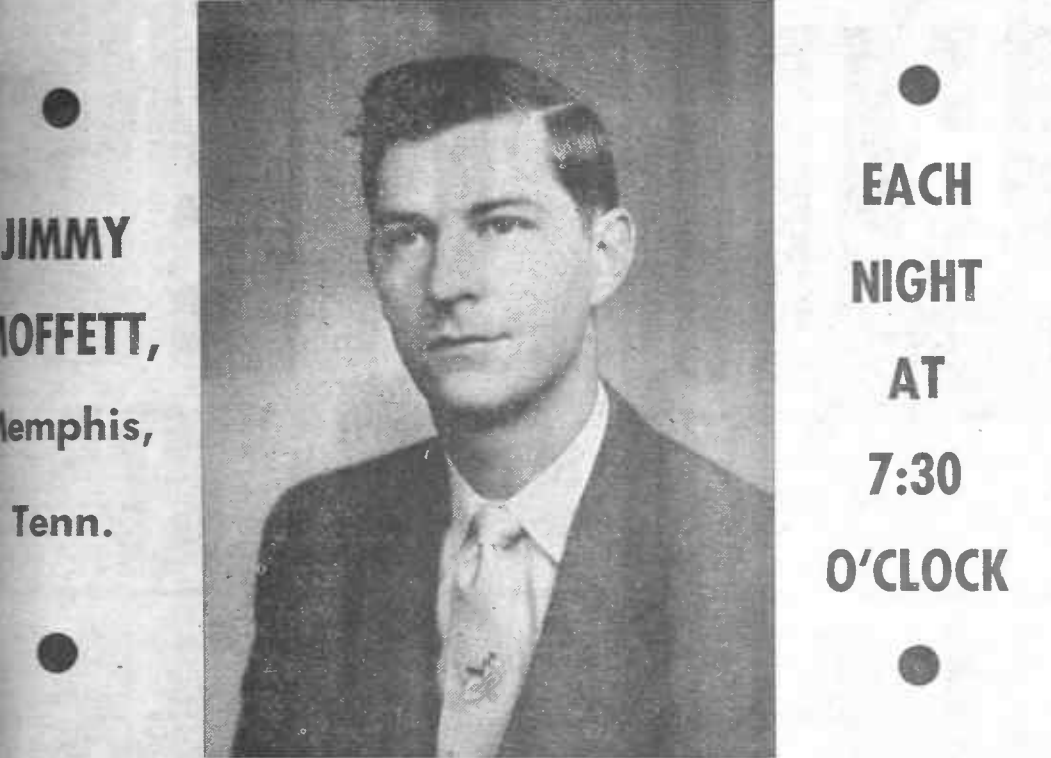

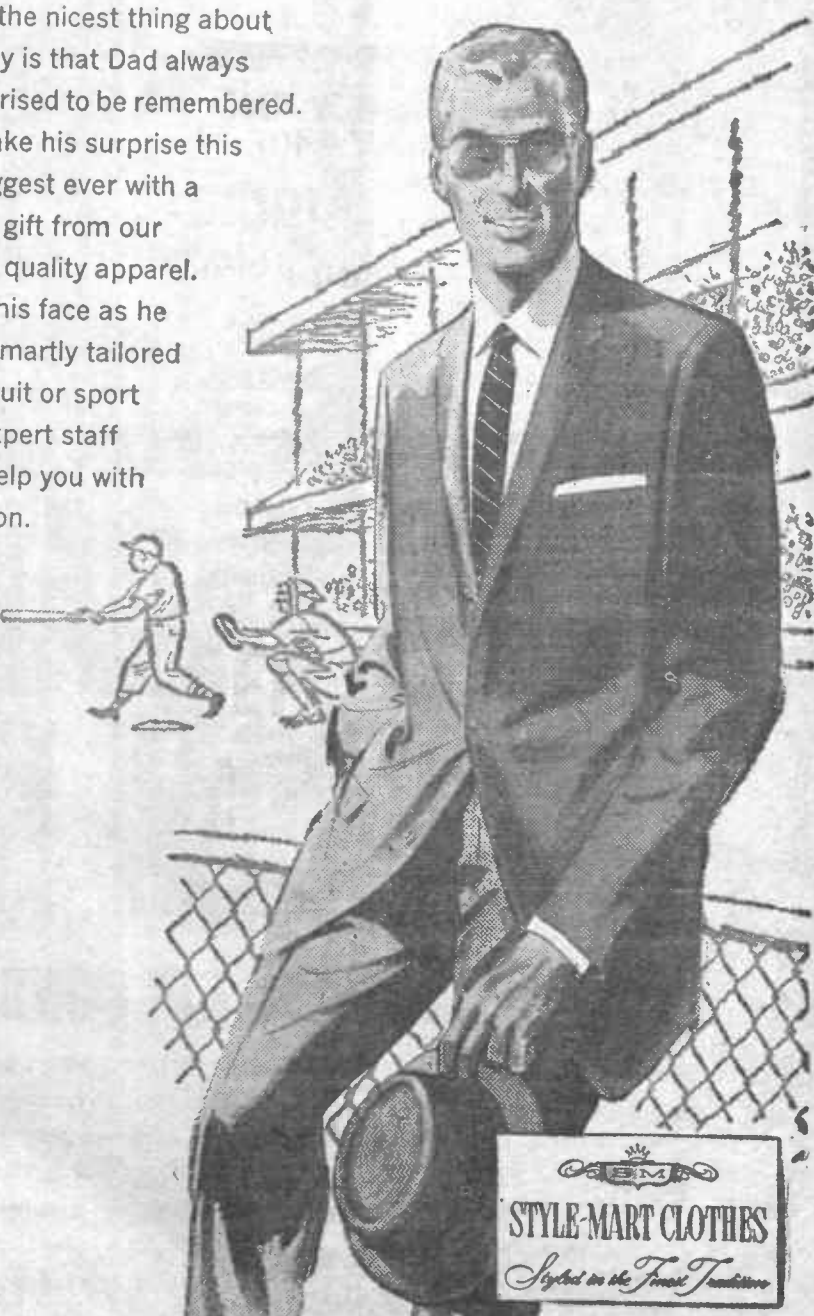
