Forest Industries In Yellow Creek
Area To Be Surveyed By TVA Forester

L. P. Allen, Jr., of Belmont, Chairman of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority, announced today that a survey of forest in- dustries in the Yellow Creek water- shed area will be started this week. This survey is associated with the forest resource inventory of Yellow Creek, a field work on which has recently been com- pleted. These surveys are made by TVA at the request of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority Board of Directors under a cooperative agreement with that agency. Other members of the Yellow Creek Watershed Authority Board are James Walker of Rienzi and Wil- liam J. Pyle of Iuka.
Mr. Allen stated that the forest industry survey will be made by Ben Cobb, a TVA forester. Mr. Cobb will contact sawmill operat- ors and other wood-using indus- tries to collect data concerning pro- duction, consumption and rela- tive importance of the survey in- formation. Results of this survey will be used to determine the ex- tent and kinds of use being made of the forest resources in the Yellow Creek watershed area. Mr. Allen indicated that the coopera- tion of forest products indus- try owners and operators in provid- ing information to Mr. Cobb will be appreciated.

Iuka Gets
1000th
Telephone

314 Installed In
Last 3 1/2 Years;
Indicates Growth

A sure sign of growth and progress is the steady increase in the number of telephones in use in a community.
The 1000th telephone was in- stalled in a residence in Iuka on Monday of this week. Purchaser of this 1000th telephone was the Cecil Dexters who live on Old Highway 25 north. The phone in- stalled was an extension to the Dexter's previous phone.
Almost a continuous growth in the number of telephones has been evident since Southern Bell pur- chased the local system on Octob- er 24, 1899. At that time there were 37 patrons. By 1900 the num- ber had increased to 53; in 1905 there was an even 100 subscribers. However, by 1910, the number had decreased to 93. 1915 saw a jump up to 115. In 1920 there were 145; 1925, 154; 1930, 177; and 1935, 267.
From 1935 to 1940 the number dropped down 81 patrons to 196. Since 1940 there has been a steady increase in the number of phones in use. 1945 saw 247, and by the end of 1950 the number had jumped to 477—an increase of 230 phones. By the end of 1955 there were 686 phones in use—another big increase of 209 phones.
But the biggest increase has been in the past three and one-half years. Since the end of 1955 and through June 15, this year, a total of 314 new phones have been installed in Iuka.
Local installer-repairman is H. D. Howell who reports that the number won't stand at 1000 very long as orders are rapidly coming in for new phones.

90,000
License
To Expire

Renew Now For
One Or Two Years

The Mississippi Highway Patrol says check those driver licenses. Some 90,000 expire June 30.
State driver licenses may be renewed for a one or two year period. The fee for one year is two dollars (\$2.00) for two years, four dollars (\$4.00).
The commercial operator license fee is \$3.50 for one year and \$7.00 for two years.
According to Public Safety Com- missioner Tom Scarbrough, expir- ing licenses may be renewed at any sheriff's office or city clerk renewal agent, or in person at Highway Patrol headquarters, Jackson.
A Mississippi Highway Patrol- man can not renew a license, nor can a driver license examiner. The examiner tests and issues the original receipt for the license, but can not renew the expiring driver permit.
The practice of ending the re- newal fee and old license number by mail to Patrol headquarters for renewal is discouraged. A delay of several weeks in processing the license renewal sometime occurs, and the operator during this time has no valid driving permit in his possession.
"Check those licenses. Yours may be expired," the Patrol warns.
