Correspondence Enrollments Curtailed By School

H. L. Shook, superintendent of the separate school district, announced a change in school policy which will sharply restrict enrollment in correspondence courses for credit toward graduation from high school.

Although the State Accrediting Commission permits schools to accept a maximum of two units of work by correspondence, faculty members are convinced that the privilege of earning credit by correspondence, originally extended by the Iuka school to high school pupils to aid in extreme difficulty of scheduling needed courses, has gradually been permitted to reach the status of abuse, rather than justified use. For this reason, after discussing the problem with various members of the faculty, the school administration has deemed it advisable to impose certain limitations in this respect.

Although this new policy will not become fully effective until next September, interested and affected high school pupils should call Mr. Shook and make appointments now to discuss their individual problems. In general, pupils will be permitted to take correspondence courses for review only, though certain exceptions may be allowed. Pupils will not have the privilege of enrolling in a regularly scheduled course, dropping it before the end of the session, and substituting a correspondence course; nor may they take by correspondence a course being currently offered in the daily schedule, though justified and approved exceptions might be made in some cases for seniors. Permitted correspondence work is strongly recommended for the summer months, but seniors who can secure permission to engage in correspondence of study during the regular session will face strict deadlines as to the time of enrollment and completion of the courses.

FARM PROGRAM DEFENSE

Addressing a group of college students recently, President Eisenhower said that "the future of our country depends upon enlightened leadership, upon the truly educated—understanding citizen."

All sensible Americans are in agreement with their Chief Executive. But not all Americans are in agreement on the kind of education needed or on the definition of a truly educated citizen.

Among conservatives, however, there should be little disagreement or failure of common understanding. The world around us—indeed the plight of our own country—is full of reminders of the kind of

education Americans need to be great. We need education that gives us the understanding to be ourselves, to be individuals within the American tradition of personal freedom. We need education that will enable the rising generation of Americans to appreciate the value of individual enterprise and to reject the false doctrines of socialism and communism, of state supremacy and authority in deciding what kind of cities, states and nation in which we shall live. We need education that will enable the rising generation to put America first over the arrogant ambitions of tyrants and those who insult us at the time they demand our money.

We must recognize that there has been a failure in American education in recent decades. Though public expenditures on education have been colossal, and though private donations have been vast, the actual process of education in terms of American values has broken down.

Let's be specific:

An entire generation of what might aptly be called "spendniks" has come to power in America. Education failed this generation, for it forgot to teach them what happens to people who are irresponsible with money.

The United States has spent and is still spending billions on foreign nations that have no gratitude for American generosity. Nor have practical advantages come to the United States by its policy of paying foreign "friends." Education has failed to instruct Americans in one of the great lessons of history, namely, that no nation was ever saved by bribery or by mercenaries.

Millions of Americans have been willing to surrender control over their livelihood, savings, housing and health to a class of feder-

In The News

The most unusual political play ever may be turning up in Washington. And, it is good politics, the kind taxpayers appreciate. Let us first take a look at the background.

The nation has been treated to glamorous claims of fiscal responsibility throughout the life of the Eisenhower Administration. On the contrary, peacetime spending over the past six and one-half years has never been so high. This is not to intimate that previous administrations were very frugal because they were not. Neither was the Congress, whether it was Democratic or Republican.

When our President assumed office the national debt stood at \$266-billion. At the close of this fiscal year it will be around \$284-billion even though the nation has been enjoying its highest income and the government in turn has collected record high sums in taxes. Instead of reducing the national debt which ordinarily comes in a time of prosperity, it has gone up, up and for the sixth time President Eisenhower has requested a higher debt limit ceiling.

It is also recalled that the President himself, established all-time high records in peacetime budget recommendations. In 1957 he strongly defended his monumental spending recommendation after it

was criticized by one of his own cabinet officers who said we were headed "for a depression that will curl your hair." This budget recommendation created the strangest flow of "economy" mail ever to reach Capitol Hill, contributing to the \$5-billion reduction effected by the Congress.

It was most significant that the President really did not hit federal spending and hit it hard until the political campaigns just preceding last November's election. He was charged with playing politics in trying to shift spending to the Democrats in the face of his own high budgets. If it was politics, and might well have been, then it has turned out to be good politics and good for the country, too.

A few weeks ago we pointed out that the President's campaign for lower appropriations and a balanced budget had been a material contribution to the then brightening prospects of this Congress turning out to be much better spendingwise than was predicted for it. After all the leadership of a country is always claimed by and vested in its Chief Executive. This is true whether he be a President, a King or a Dictator. True, our foreign aid and some other items although he has been hitting hard for less spending on many programs.

There is whispering that the Democratic controlled Congress feels that Ike has come up with a good political issue and that the Democratic Congress must now out-politic the President by appropriating less money than has been requested by a Republican President, thus making the Republican President the real spender. If this is the case, and there is strong evidence of it, then it too is good politics and proves quite clearly that all politics isn't bad after all. More of this sort stands to receive nationwide approval.

The House of Representatives has already undercut by hundreds of millions appropriations requested by the President. It has just chopped about \$400-million off the President's request for foreign aid. It has junked its previously passed multi-million dollar airport subsidy bill. Capitol Hill talk has it that proposals for a huge housing bill seriously considered following suit. The Senate stands pat. The House cuts already made and others which are bound to follow, this Congress could come through with a well balanced budget plus a billion dollars to spare, maybe more.

Carried to its ultimate end, a feud between our Republican President and Democratic Congress over who is going to be labeled the "spender" could bring into play a final move by the President. The Congress can appropriate, but only the Executive branch can obligate and spend the money. Instances have arisen where the Chief Executive has refused to spend appropriations made by the Congress. So, if we are experiencing a political play over who will be credited as being the most economical, the Republican President or a Democratic Congress, the Executive branch could have the last final shot at it. The President could decide not to spend some of the money. Concededly this is a bold approach but it is possible and has been used.

What would be better for the overburdened taxpayer than a real dog fight between the Executive and Legislative branches of our big government over the honors that go with a balanced budget? With less spending? And, eventually with a reduction in taxes? What a dream! It hasn't happened yet, but it may.

Farm News

By County Agent W. C. Hamilton

Grain Sorghum Weed Control
You can get good control of weeds in grain sorghum with 2, 4-D just as you can in corn.

But grain sorghum is somewhat less tolerant to over dosage or use of higher rates of 2, 4-D than is corn.

At lay by time on grain sorghum, use 1/3 pound of 2, 4-D per acre in 10 to 20 gallons of water.

This material seems to do a good job of weed control in sorghum that is 12 to 14 inches tall. But at this stage of growth, the chemical is recommended as an emergency treatment when weeds cannot be controlled by cultivation.

When sorghum is in bloom, do not use 2, 4-D.

Weed Control
Every pasture that has not been sprayed should be clipped this month. You can still spray pastures and get good results from the use of chemicals. Where cotton is not near, 2, 4-D can be used to kill bitter weeds, goat weeds and cypress weeds. Twice as much 2, 4-D will have to be used for cypress weeds as for bitter weeds or goat weeds. One pound of 2, 4-D (one quart) to 20 gallons of water usually gives good control.

Cotton Insects
Watch out for boll weevils and boll worms. Other bugs now infesting cotton fields include spider mites, flea hoppers and tarnished plant bugs.

If your field is infested with boll worms apply controls before it is too late. While the worms are small and still in the bud of the plant, use at least 2/4 of a standard dose.

Boll worm control is as follows: One pound DDT, or 2 (Two-tenths) pound endrin, or 2-1/2 pound toxaphene per acre. Make at least two applications.

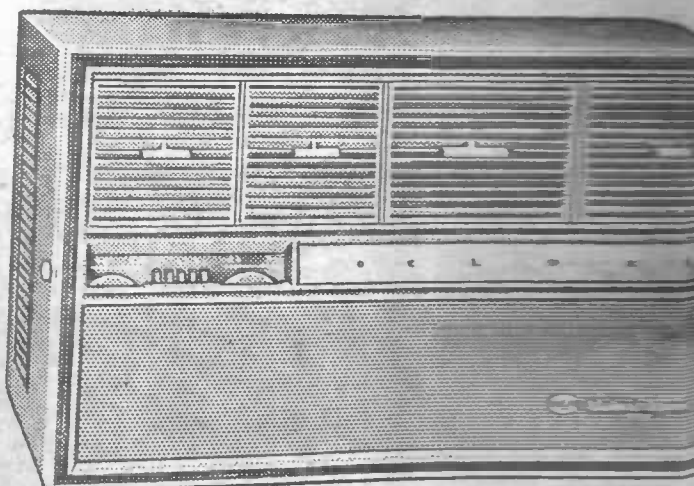

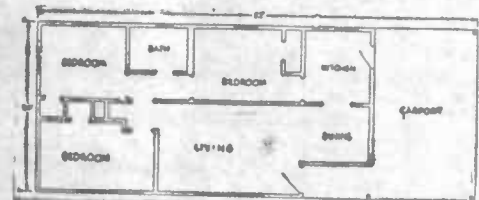

Effect Of Industry Land Use

By Hiram Jones
Fifty-five years ago the people of Tishomingo County lived from the land. The chief sources of income were cotton and timber. There was very little industry in the county. What little industry there was consisted chiefly of clearing steep hillsides to plant cotton or corn. As the hillsides were cleared, the farmer was able to clear more and more land. In most cases the cleared land was too steep for cultivation.

No longer is it necessary for our farmers to clear and to cultivate land too steep for continuous cultivation. Now they can plant their steep land to pines and to permanent sod crops, and cultivate their gently sloping and now level land.

Industry, in and near Tishomingo County, has given employment to our people. Industry has raised the standard of living in our county.

Today more and more landowners are practicing scientific farming methods. Because of this, per acre yields of all field crops have increased enormously. Many of our Tishomingo county farmers are now producing twice as much cotton, corn, hay, and pasture on one-half the acres they once cultivated. They are now producing four times as much as they once did with half the work.

In Tishomingo county conservation farming is becoming the rule. Farmers can and are now using their land according to its capability. More and more Tishomingo county farmers are applying to their land Soil Conservation practices planned by USDA Soil Conser-

vation Service technicians. Industry has contributed greatly to a more efficient use of the land in this county.

Eat a Good Breakfast!
It can be the difference in your driving your car safely or not. Or in Dad operating the tractor safely. Or Junior riding his bicycle safely.

A person who is tired, nervous, upset or lacking in his food supply, even though he doesn't realize it, isn't likely to be a safe efficient driver. Lack of breakfast may lead to a headache, weakness and make a person react less quickly as he drives.

Be sure that every member of the family eats a good breakfast as you start on an all day trip or your summer vacation trip. As a rule it's well to eat a generous breakfast, a lighter noon meal and a more substantial evening meal on such a trip.

You're likely to overeat at noon if you don't eat breakfast. This will make you sleepy and less alert as you drive.

Just remember, whether you drive an hour or all day, the food you eat has a lot to do with your safety on the highway. And good nutrition each day begins with a good breakfast.

Lining Materials
In that dress or suit or whatever you're making of wash and wear fabric, check on the materials you select for interlinings and linings. They should be wash and wear, too.

Resin treated cottons make good interfacings for medium weight wash and wear fabrics. For lighter weight fabrics, use self fabrics, use self fabric, nylon taffeta or marquisette. Shoulder pads should be either of self fabric, stuffed with nylon or dacron batting, or they should be removed.

If you can't find nylon and dacron tapes, use a strip of the selvage of your fabric as a waist strip. **Wash And Wear**
From a washability standpoint, "wash and wear" describes a garment that you can wash either by hand or machine, drip dry and wear again with little or no touch-up ironing.

Sometimes you find a label that says "automatic wash and wear". This means, if it is truly "automatic," you can machine wash it and tumble dry it at 140 to 160 degrees. It will come out unwrinkled, ready to wear in only an hour or so, needing little or no touch up ironing.

Before you give any of your clothes this treatment, be sure they're definitely "automatic" wash and wear. The ones that the generally have a large percentage of man-made fibers as nylon, orlon or dacron. The garment must have buttons, thread, zippers and other finishes that can stand up to the treatments as well as the fabric.

Better not put off storing your winter clothes any longer. Moths will be nibbling on anything that has been a small percentage of wool.

Before you store your clothing,

blankets and other out-of-season articles, be sure they are thoroughly clean. Then store them in airtight containers with chemical aids, if needed. Examine any articles not in need of cleaning, air, brush and remove any spots you can by home methods.

Store knitted wear in airtight containers or even "can" them in jars. Sang fabric garments in closet bags or wrap in heavy paper that you can make airtight by sealing with gummed tape.

Sprinkle anything with wool in it liberally with moth crystals or use a good spray. Pay particular attention to pockets, cuffs, pleats and other crannies.

Cooking Meat
Here's another use for your meat thermometer. Use it when roasting or broiling meat. A meat thermometer is your best assurance of well cooked but not overcooked meat. Your pork is well done when the thermometer shows 185 degrees for the inside of the meat.

When you're cooking bacon for a number of people—cooking a half pound or more—here's a time saver. Oven bake it. The bacon browns on both sides without turning it. Separate the slices by heating in the oven, then bake at 400 degrees F.

Keep Nylon Slips White
Do you sometimes have the problem of your white nylon tricot slips becoming yellowed, even after only a few washings? This is a problem with lots of folks. There is nothing in nylon that caused it to turn yellow. It usually doesn't if you care for it properly.

To prevent yellowing, thorough washing is a must. Machine washing is preferred if the way your slip is made will permit this. Use a heavy duty soap or synthetic detergent in the washer. Sometimes we overdo "easy washing" on our white nylons. It's important to remember that the "dunk and rinse" that is allright for our stockings is not enough for slips.

Thorough rinsing is as important as thorough washing. Be sure you rinse to remove every trace of suds or soap. If you leave them in, this may be the cause of the fabric discoloring. If you have hard water, use a water softener to help lick the problem of soap residue.

Wash white only with other whites. Nylon will attract color, even from pastels, and it will show up as gray or yellow. Sometimes you can use bleaches effectively for yellowing from this cause.

Vacationers Urged To Take Precautions In Highway Driving

As vacationists hit the road swelling normal traffic flow, driving hazards are multiplied. This word of caution comes from Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarbrough who warns that many vacations started this year with joyous anticipation will end in tragedy.

Most vacation trips will be less than 200 miles, but even a 200 mile jaunt in congested traffic can be exasperating, especially if the vacationist gets in a rush. According to Commissioner Scarbrough, the best advice which can be given a vacationist whether his destination be far or near is: "Don't overdo it!"

"Pay strict attention to traffic laws, the frequent rest stops, and avoid hurrying. Drive relaxed and alertly," he explained.

"Enjoy your vacation. There should be no need to rush if your vacation trip has been well planned. Good planning includes pre-vacation inspection of your car for mechanical defects.

"If traffic congestions bog you down, slow down and adjust your speed accordingly. Don't pour on the gas, weaving in and out of the traffic ahead. This invites our most frequent vacation-type accident."

Another frequent cause of vacation accidents is fatigue. The Mississippi Public Safety head warned that a day's driving should be limited to 300 - 400 miles, with periodic rest stops. Never drive when drowsy.

Journey Down The Natchez Trace

The glory of the Old South, combined with its present beauty and the economic strides being taken toward the South of tomorrow, are presented in words and illustrations in the July issue of Home and Highway, Allstate Insurance Companies 4,000,000 circulation policyholder publication.

Entitled "Journey Down The Natchez Trace" and illustrated by one of America's leading painters, Lawrence Beall Smith, the article describes a 1,350 mile trip from Nashville, Tenn., to New Orleans. It will reach an estimated audience of 15,000,000 throughout the United States and Canada. It will focus much attention on the area.

The writer, Richard Dunlop, says, "The Natchez Trace has witches, ghosts, and historic sites where the past all but whispers in your ear. Remnants of the road still exist, just as they did hundreds of years ago after buffalos first tramped its route in prehistoric times." It was along this route that settlers from the Alleghenies moved to their new homes in the South.

Dunlop and his family began their trek in Nashville and headed southwest across Mississippi to Natchez, where they turned south to New Orleans. Unlike the journeys of past times, Dunlop and his family drove on the 450-mile Federal Natchez Trace Parkway, a new super road connecting Nashville and Natchez, and closely following the Natchez route.

Traveling this route, the visitors were able to see locations where outlaws like Big and Little Harpe attacked their victims, where Andrew Jackson marched his troops to defend New Orleans during the War of 1812, and Grindler's Inn, where Meriwether Clark of the famous Lewis and Clark exploratory team, met his still unsolved mysterious death.

Other sites of interest included the White Rooster Cafe, a picturesque example of one of the social clubs which helped inspire the great jazz music we know today, and the beautiful Pearl River near Jackson, Miss.

In Centennial Park the Dunlops had their first view of the actual Natchez Trace, where the trail can be seen running among the trees. Even though the roadbed is now

overgrown, the old trail is discernible.

At Natchez the travelers visited an open pit iron mine, abandoned since the Civil War, then moved into the thick cypress forests formerly inhabited by outlaws.

Interspersed with the past is the future. Near the Alabama state line the Dunlops visited Wilson Dam, which supplies hydroelectric power for TVA projects along the Tennessee River. Also along this river the Dunlops saw construction on a series of locks that will enable merchant ships to sail the river into the heart of Tennessee.

From the South of the future back to the South of the past, the Dunlops traveled to the battlefield at Vicksburg and inspected both Confederate and Union cannon still aligned in battle formation. At Vicksburg they also visited Big Mama, the ship that once was queen of the Mississippi. This is the ship used in the movie version of Showboat.

The Dunlops reached Natchez during the March Pilgrimage, when it is possible to tour the many pre-Civil War mansions remaining in the city. Among these is Longwood, which was planned to be the most magnificent home in the area had the war not stopped its construction. When hostilities erupted, its builders answered the call to arms, and the five-story 40-room structure never was completed.

Before leaving Natchez, the Dunlops also saw the place where Jim Bowie first tried out his famous knife. "The Blue Cat Club on the waterfront was at one time considered the seat of sin in the U.S. Today it looks out at fishermen industriously scraping rust from their boats beside the old ferry slip," Dunlop said.

Moving through a mixture of old and new, the Dunlops arrived in New Orleans and visited the Vieux Carre, or old French Quarter, famous for its antique shops and restaurants.

Dunlop said that through his trip he found the South has something other parts of the country might well take a look at. Education For Freedom

Davidson makes a brave man to stand up against and defend farmers

and farm programs in the face of the national flood of adverse criticism being heaped on the heads of farmers.

Any congressman who speaks out for farmers risks his political career. That is one reason why a recent speech by Sen. George Aiken deserves wider attention than it got at the time.

Sen. Aiken has served as a member of the Senate Agriculture Committee for almost twenty years, both as chairman and ranking minority member, and has had a major role in writing most of the farm legislation now in effect.

The Vermont Republican noted that "some government officials, newspapers, magazines, business organizations and individuals are attacking the farm programs" and creating public resentment against farmers.

"The furor over farm programs," he told the Senate, has become so intense, so biased and so unreasoning as to cast confusion and suspicion into the public mind."

Abolish Farm Programs?

There are some who advocate that all farm programs be abolished. They believe lower farm and food prices would benefit consumers. Sen. Aiken contends that farm programs benefit consumers as much or more than farmers.

"It is not the farmer so much as it is the public that would pay dearly if farm programs were abolished," Sen. Aiken said. "Only the fact that some surpluses are produced holds retail food prices as low as they are today."

"Even a slight shortage would result in skyrocketing consumer prices. A major portion of the costs charged to farmers actually goes to benefit consumers."

"Do the millions of mothers in our cities realize that the lunches which their children receive at school are charged in part to the farm program?"

"Do our internationally minded citizens know that billions of dollars worth of foreign aid and military assistance programs are paid for with farm commodities, the cost of which is charged to farm programs?"

Long-Range Benefits

"Does the housewife realize that much of the research work that goes into the preparation and handling of food for her benefit is charged against farm programs?"

How many people realize that we are planting over a billion forest trees a year on croded and tired land, and that farmers who plant those live to harvest a single one of them?

"How many urban dwellers know that the millions spent to conserve water supplies help prevent floods and provide water for city and industrial uses that make jobs for them?"

"Nearly 40 per cent of our gainfully employed people are engaged in making farm supplies, producing crops, and in processing, transporting and handling agricultural commodities."

"There is plenty to eat and wear today, indeed, more than enough, but two short crops in succession could throw our economy into a panic. Speculation and inflation would follow. Food costs would rise. Unemployment and depression would follow."

"I hope the seriousness of the situation will come home to all those who talk solely in terms of costly handouts to farmers and oppressive burdens on taxpayers. I hope they will take the time to read the credit side of the farm program ledger."

How To Decorate The Nursery

An anticipated labor of love for every young mother, and father, too, for that matter, is decorating the new nursery, whether it's baby's own room or just a corner of a bedroom. Sometimes, though, it takes a bit of imagination and ingenuity to keep the cost of nursery furnishings from running away with the pocketbook.

There are some interesting and inexpensive devices such as babyland characters made of easy-to-apply vinyl that can be used to decorate a nursery wall, baby's crib, playpen or high chair. Or dress up a plain lampshade with these picture-book cut-outs that include a whimsical cow, rabbit, bear, goose and kitten. They'll be familiar to baby as they are the same as those that appear on cereal boxes.

Another way to avoid cutting too wide a swathe in the budget is to scout attics or second-hand shops for a crib and a chest of drawers for baby, and a comfortable chair or rocker for mother. Thoroughly scrubbed and given a coat of fresh, non-lead type of paint will make them look brand new and turn them into a pleasing nursery ensemble.

Still another useful but easy-in-the-pocketbook idea is to



enamel an ordinary wicker tray or basket with handles to hold all the assorted necessities for baby's bath. It can be lined with a turkish towel and separated into compartments by using the side panels of a sturdy cardboard box.

These ideas, plus a few inexpensive additional touches, like a whimsical night light and such will make a charming nursery for baby and his visiting admirers. And the money you didn't spend on expensive furnishings can go into his bank account for future use.

Information About S. S.

Dependent mothers and dependent fathers of a deceased son or daughter may receive monthly social security payments even though the deceased was survived by a widow, widower, or children. The Social Security Administration states that many parents who could receive these payments have not applied for them. Hugh Tigrett, District Manager of the Tupelo District Office, stated today that several of these parents who have not filed live in Tishomingo County.

A dependent mother can become entitled to these monthly benefits at age 62 and a dependent father at age 65. In addition to filing a claim, it is necessary that they file proof that they were dependent upon the deceased son or daughter.

Mr. Tigrett stated that the Social Security Representative who visits the Court House in Iuka each Monday afternoon will be glad to

discuss this or any other provision of the law, as well as answer any questions anyone may have regarding their social security.
