We have reference to the new free city mail service that will take effect on Saturday, July 11. You are humbly asked by the Iuka Postmaster to give this service a fair trial. If you will use the service for a short while, he believes along with the officials of the U. S. Postal Service, that you will come to like the system much better than what is now in existence.

Your new city mail man will deliver all first class mail, all magazines, newspapers, circulars, etc.

Your new city mail man will pick up any mail that is properly stamped, including packages. In addition to picking up mail at home to be sent to distant places, he will pick up mail at four collection boxes that will be located in residential sections that they will be most convenient to the greatest number of citizens. You may deposit properly stamped mail in these boxes anytime you wish and the pickup times will be plainly and clearly marked on the boxes for your convenience.

Inauguration of the free city delivery mail service in Iuka is designed for the convenience of the citizens of Iuka. It is another step forward in the growth and development of the community and it is being instituted by the U. S. Post Office Department with the hope that citizens of the town will take advantage of it.

We, the citizens of Iuka, should be fair minded enough to give the service a just trial; we should be willing to cooperate with those in the post office whose duty it is to get our mail to us in the best order that they can, and we should be willing to further promote and use the service for the betterment and improvement of our community. Success of this new service will depend almost entirely upon the patrons: the use they make of it. Will you please cooperate and use it?

CROWDS HEAR CANDIDATE
MARTIN SPEAK IN COUNTY SATURDAY

SPoke AT IUKA, TIS-OMINGO AND BELMONT
IN DAY-LONG TOUR; WAS ROYALLY RECEIVED

Memorial Candidate Carroll Gartin made his first appearance in Tishomingo county Saturday in his bid for the Governor's chair in the forthcoming primary elections.

Gartin, in speeches at Iuka, Tishomingo and Belmont, emphasized his campaign platform of old-age pensions, special allowances for the aged, and in working for greater gains in the state, and complete determination to Mississippi public schools and segregated.

Gartin is proud to point to my recent reminder you that in Mississippi we have not had a public school closed, not a law suit in any federal or state court, and if I am elected I intend to follow the same course that set this record—a course of sane and sensible tackling of our problems in a "troubled time," the speaker said.

Mr. Gartin spoke at Iuka at 10:30 in the morning, at Tishomingo at 1:30 and Belmont at 3 in the afternoon. He stated that he would continue to work for the park he helped to establish last year on the shores of Pickwick lake, and for further development of Tishomingo State park.

In speaking of the lack of experience in governmental affairs of one of his major opponents, Mr. Gartin said: "Every man you have elected for governor in this 20th century started at the bottom and worked his way up. Not one has had the gall to go before the people and ask for the job of governor without any previous experience. Carroll Gartin," he said, "has been serving you for the past eight long years in the state government and has had first-hand experience in practically every phase of our state government. I am familiar with your problems."

COUNTY SCHOOLS WILL
START MONDAY, JULY 13

9 Months Term Will Be Split Sessions;
8 Attendance Centers Will Enroll 2500

The Tishomingo county school system will begin the 1959-60 term on Monday, July 13 with eight attendance centers scheduled to enroll approximately 2,500 students. The term will be for nine months and will observe a vacation in the fall for cotton picking. The summer term is expected to last two months before vacation. The eight schools include Carter's Branch colored school.

Two of the centers will start business in brand new buildings. Sam Kimberley, contractor, has completed the Burnsville high school at a cost of \$165,580.00. This new center is one of the largest and most modern in the county. Also, Tishomingo elementary students will start this term in a brand new building that cost approximately \$98,000.00. D. F. Lambert, Jr., contractor, will have the new building completed in time for the first assembly. Also at Tishomingo, a new gymnasium has been built at a cost of \$39,305.00. This too, will be ready for use by the time school starts. The new buildings will include new cafeterias at both Tishomingo and Burnsville.

\$90,000 has been allotted for the Carter's Branch (colored) school which will be built within the near future.

SENSING THE NEWS

SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL STEEL AND U. S. SECURITY

The threat of a strike in the steel industry is nothing less than a threat against the productive strength of the United States. Steel is the essential ingredient in the industrial diet of a nation. Without abundant supplies of steel available at realistic prices, a modern nation cannot grow. It is vital to military defense and to the peacetime economy.

Because steel is basic to an industrial society, it also is the regulator of prices in the economy. If the price of steel is forced up, the price of virtually every manufactured article will jump. For that reason, it is imperative that steel remain at a reasonable price. Further increases in steel prices would have an inflationary effect upon the entire nation. And inflation already poses grave danger to this country.

If steel prices are forced up it will be because American steel-makers have been pressured into a new round of wage increases, which directly produce a hike in the manufacturing cost of steel.

For many weeks now officials of steel companies and the United Steel Workers, AFL-CIO, have been discussing a wage contract to replace the one that expires June 30. Little progress has been reported. In the face of the reality of inflation, which deprives the working man of any advantage gained in a wage increase, the chiefs of the United Steel Workers Union have called for a shorter work week and higher wages.

This unrealistic demand is indicative of the tragedy of the labor union movement. Many working men who are union members realize that the biggest gain they could obtain is a check on inflation. An agreement that helped hold back inflation would be worth more to a working man than any direct increase in wages. But labor leaders dare not admit this reality. Politics being what it is within labor unions, the leaders fear to accept an inflation-fighting agreement based on the status quo. They fear that a competitor in the union will distort such realism and seize

Baseball Tryouts To Be Held In Fulton On July 6 And 7

Fulton, will be the hub of intensive baseball activity on July 6 and 7 when Cardinal scout W. H. "Buddy" Lewis will stage a baseball tryout camp at Itawamba Jr. College Field, it was announced today by Farm Director Walter Shannon.

"Changing times have made us more selective in our scouting endeavors, and we are holding these camps only in certain key places chosen by our scouts," Shannon remarked. "Certainly there are a lot of players living in areas that are not scouted as frequently as others who deserve a chance to find out whether or not they're ready for professional baseball. Tryout camps give them that break. Besides, it is physically impossible for our scouts to see all of the players in their territories, and camps make it possible for them to look at a group of players at one time."

Workouts will get underway promptly at 10 a.m. To be eligible a player must be in the 17 to 23 year age bracket. No equipment is

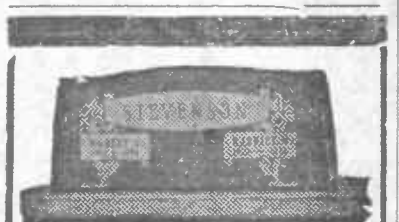
power in the union. Such is the situation in the steel union this summer.

Though the union leaders cannot afford to recognize reality, the American public can and must. The public knows that the country cannot afford another round of inflation caused by an absurd hike in wages. It knows further, more that there are real limits on production costs. If manufacturing and sales costs are increased, the result will be a big drop in sales. A wage increase would provide even greater opportunity for British, German and Japanese steelmakers to invade the American domestic market and to capture the overseas customers of American steel companies than they now enjoy. The losers in this event would be the members of the United Steel Workers Union. It would mean less work for them.

The United States cannot afford to have its steel industry suffer losses. The Soviet Union and its satellites are frantically increasing their steel capacity. They have announced their intention to overtake the U. S. in this area and to give the communist world clear superiority in industrial strength. For the Soviets to forge ahead in steel production while the U. S. lags would be as much a victory for this country's enemies as would be an armed conflict on a battlefield.

Nikita Khrushchev has warned that the Soviets intend "to bury" the United States. One way of doing that is by reducing the U. S. to a second-class power in industrial terms. And such would be the long-range result of a steel industry in which manufacturing costs were no longer related to reality but to the political demands of union bosses.

If Americans understand the real stake in the steel industry, they will speak out against inflationary wage increases that threaten this country by playing into the hands of its enemies.

Need For Trees Emphasized By Area Forester

To again emphasize our need for trees, James D. Spencer, the Mississippi Forestry Commission's Area Forester for Tishomingo County quotes the following article.

"Joyce Kilmer didn't have the last word on trees after all, although he allowed as how they wuz right purty. Now a scientist reminds us of what we tend to forget: those green things beside the road help keep us from gassing each other to death with our auto exhausts.

It's a matter of air chemistry, Dr. Chauncey D. Leake, president-elect of the American Association

for the Advancement of Science, says. Autos, trucks, and airplanes burn fuel with oxygen and make carbon dioxide. Plants convert carbon dioxide into sugar and oxygen, use the sugar for growth and renew our atmosphere with the oxygen.

So, while we make more autos and airplanes for more people, and cut down more trees to make room for more highways and airports, the air gets fouler and fouler.

Dr. Leake points out the balance between carbon dioxide and oxygen is important to weather stability, the amount of heat we get from the sun, and who gets the rain. And, he says, we're unbalancing the balance.

His solution? Plant 10 trees for every automobile, 100 for every truck, and several hundred for each airplane—especially jets.

Think about it a while. Go out and sniff the air."

11 Persons May Die In Miss. Traffic Accidents On 4th

Eleven persons will probably die in Mississippi traffic accidents this Fourth of July.

At least, this is the prediction of the Mississippi Highway Patrol and Public Safety Commissioner Tom Scarborough.

The July 4 holiday in point of

lives lost accidentally is consistently a major killer, second perhaps only to Christmas in Highway slaughter.

This year will probably be no exception.

The official holiday period starts at 6 p.m. Thursday, July 2, and extends through midnight July 5. Traffic flow will more than likely reach its summer peak Saturday, July 4, with driving hazards multiplied accordingly.

One careless mistake in such heavy traffic can be fatal.

Chief of Patrol, Bill Hood says Independence Day should be celebrated by living, not by dying. "It has been predicted that 11 people will die.

This conceivably could be much higher, as proven by the disastrous Fourth of July weekend in 1957 when 20 human beings were slaughtered on our highways."

Pleading for a safe and sane Fourth, he added: "We try to be accurate and efficient in our business, but when fewer fatalities occur than predicted, we never cry when our prediction is proven wrong."

According to Commissioner Scarborough, the simplest and best advice to the holiday driver is: obey all traffic laws, avoid rushing, and practice courtesy. Don't become a holiday statistic.

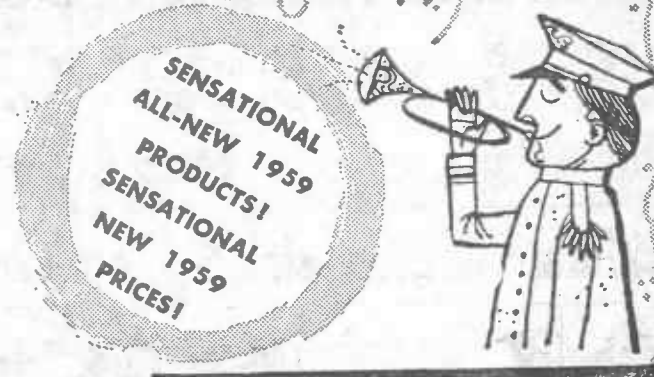

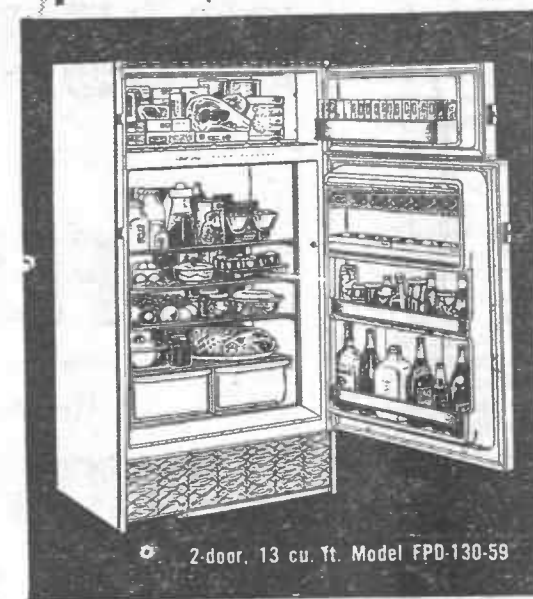

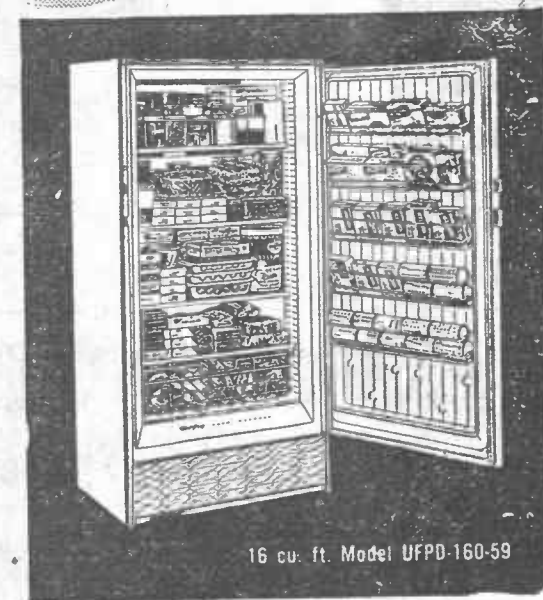

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It will leave the problem of an out-worn, costly and ineffective farm program almost untouched. It will have appropriated almost \$7 billion to continue a program almost no one thinks is working or workable.

Taxpayers are grumbling and

farmers are not happy. Food prices have been rising for some time while, at the same time, farmers' prices and income have been going down. No one is getting his "money's worth" out of the tax dollars being spent.

What happened, and why? In

the first place farm production has been increasing for several years more rapidly than demand for those products. Result: Almost \$10 billion worth of excess supplies, mostly owned by the government.

Who's to Blame?

The failure to make a substantial revision in farm laws this year leaves both taxpayers and farmers "holding the bag." No one benefits from the failure to act.

President Eisenhower sent Congress a message in January outlining, in general, the kind of farm legislation he would accept and what he would veto. The essence of the message was: Get the government out of price supports and production controls.

Congress refused even to consider such a course. To do so, it insisted, would bankrupt farmers and plunge the country into a farm-led and farm-fed depression. Congress blames Agriculture Secretary Ezra Benson on two counts. First, his insistence that it accept the President's suggestions or face a veto. Second, his unwillingness to cooperate in working out compromise legislation.

Benson, on the other hand, charges that Congress is derelict in its duty in not sending a "workable program" to the White House. Probably, there is some justification for both the opposing views.

What Next?
No one here expects any improvement in the farm situation during the next 12 months. Rather, the expectation is that surpluses will increase, farm prices will continue to go down, and farm program costs will go higher.

From 1933 to 1952 Agriculture Department expenditures totaled \$25.2 billion. From 1953 to date Congress has appropriated \$35 billion for USDA operations. Even that failed to prevent a one-third decline in farm income.

The inevitable result of inaction will be a continued drift toward lower farm income and higher government costs. Millions of people in both small towns where farmers trade and in big city factories that sell to farmers will feel the pinch of reduced farm buying power.

Action must be taken soon to meet the crisis on the farm if we are to avoid a continuation of the present deplorable situation. The need is for more farm statesmanship, both in Congress and the Administration.

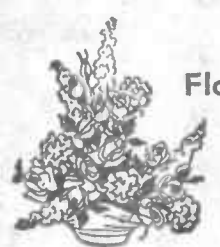

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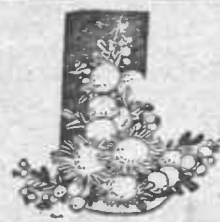

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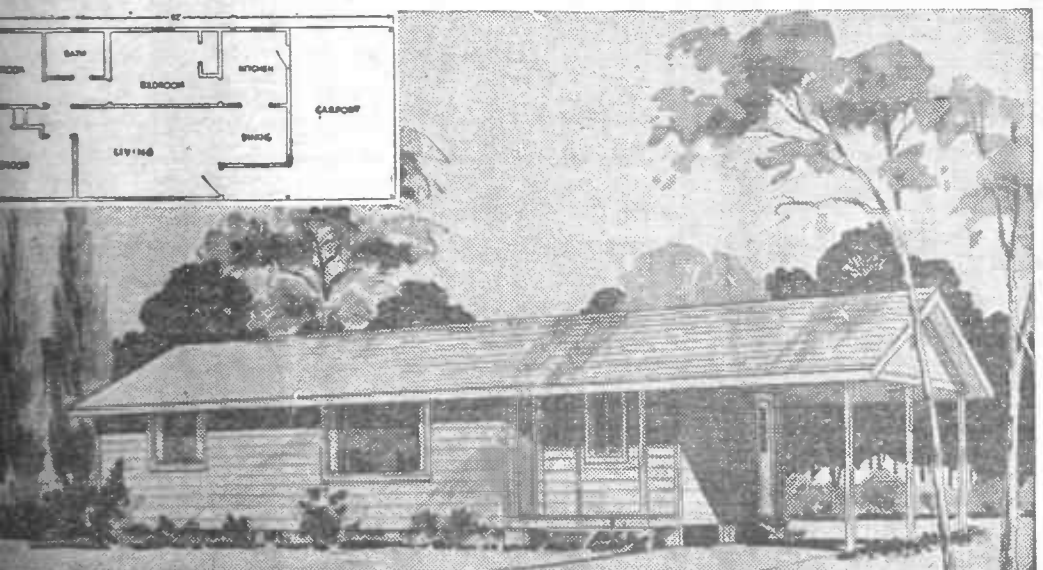

State Forester C. B. Marlin observed that, "The training and instructions these men have received during the past week should be invaluable to them when they leave here and go out into the field to serve the public as a member of the Mississippi Forestry Commission."

Marlin spoke to the group during the Wednesday session.

Fire Control Director Jarmon F. Smith, whose department arranged for the school and prepared the training schedule, toward the end of the week stated that, "The interest and initiative shown by this fine group of new employees has been very heartening and we are expecting their accomplishments in the field to add very much to the work and efficiency of the Forestry Commission in the future."

The Commission employee of 20 years ago would hardly recognize the organization as presented during this week of instruction. The presentation of the modern equipment, new techniques and the volume of activities is a far cry from the hand tool era of years ago particularly in fire fighting. These men were introduced to some of the most modern equipment now in use for fighting forest fires in the South.

Out at Raymond Tower they drove, many of them for the first time, powerful and efficient tractors used in pulling fire-fighting plows. In a simulated large fire operation under extremely hazardous fire conditions, they saw and heard the Commission's very effective 2-way radio system in operation. They saw an airplane scout the mock fire situation and after Pilot Bob Church's report that the fire had exceeded 100 acres in size, an experienced fire boss landed at the scene by helicopter to direct fire fighting activities.

The trainees heard policies and procedures on the management of the timber which they will be protecting. This timber will be mostly privately owned but there will also be some on 16th section lands and on state lands.

They learned some techniques in presenting forestry news and information to the public through the use of radio, television and newspaper. They were given pointers on the Commission's fire prevention program which in itself is a key which could open the door to a new horizon in the achievement of the goal toward more and

better timber. Law enforcement was also included in the subjects covered.

Instructors from the Forestry Commission who qualified through years of experience were: Deputy State Forester Joseph E. Weatherly, Jr.; H. O. Stewart and Eugene Earp of the Commission's Fire Control Department; Leon Estes, Director, along with Billy Gaddis, Freddie Jordan and W. D. McNeel of the Forest Management Department; Louis Rowland, Director, and Charlie Shotts of the Information-Education Department; Clyde Butler, Chief, Radio Department and H. E. Player, Business Director, all of Jackson. Coming in from their various sections of the State to instruct were Oscar Tissue, District Forester, Philadelphia; Gordon McBeth, Assistant District Forester, Brookhaven; Eddie Thompson, Assistant District Forester, Grenada; Charlie Lowe, District Forester, Tupelo and Morris Bloodworth, District Forester, Brookhaven.

HOME AGENT NOTES

As you prepare the food for the family Fourth of July picnic, think about the eggs for stuffing a minute. Do you like them hard cooked or hard-boiled? There's a difference.

Hard-cooked eggs are simmered and come out with a tender, firm white. Hard-boiled eggs are boiled and the white is tougher.

If after considering your answer, you decided on hard-cooked eggs, this is the way to cook them:

Wash eggs. Put them in a pan and cover completely with cold water. Bring water to simmering temperature—just below boiling. Let them simmer 20 to 25 minutes, depending on the size of the eggs.

After they're cooked, put the eggs at once into cold water, preferably cold running water. The chill stops the cooking and helps keep the dark color from forming on the outside of the yolk. Shelling under running water will speed the job since the water helps carry off bits of shell.

New Look Stuffed Eggs

Usually we cut eggs in half either lengthwise or crosswise to stuff them. Why not try serving them whole this time. Cut off about 1/2 inch from one end of cooked egg and carefully remove yolk. Mash yolks and add your favorite seasonings. Refill whites.

Press the cut-off part back into original position. Or cut it in half and perch like butterfly wings on top the deviled yolks.

July Plentiful

Eggs are on the plentiful foods list for July. But they are in second place to the top runners of peaches and turkeys, both of which fit into a Fourth of July picnic menu or any other summer meal.

Along with them go ice cream, plums, limes, lemons, summer vegetables, peanut butter and vegetable fats and oils.

Fall Landscaping

It isn't early to be thinking of the shrubs you want to put out this fall. While the plants are growing well in summer is a good time to choose the ones you'll want in your yard.

Foundation shrubs are about the most important ones you use in your yard. They are the shrubs that "tie" your house to the ground. They should be green the year-round and the very best plants you see in your yard.

Farm News

Cotton Insects

Boll Weevils, Boll Worms, Fleahoppers and Plant Bugs are numerous in all cotton fields checked this week. In older cotton where squares are forming, punctures range as high as 27 per cent. Boll worms and Bollworm eggs are present in great numbers. Now is the time to control the worms while they are small. Use Endrin,

Toxaphene, DDT or Sevin for worm control, with application rates of 10 pounds dust or 2 nozzles per row when spraying.

Aromatic Tobacco

The three test plots of Aromatic Tobacco being tried this year in the county looks good. Priming (picking of leaves) is underway in one plot. The three plots are located on the Roy Boothe farm, South of Burnsville, Stacy Cox farm in Midway Community and Paul Allen farm in Bay Springs Community.

Tick Control

Wood ticks are a real problem this year. They are infesting cattle, hogs and dogs in larger numbers than in any previous year recently. To control these pests spray your cattle with Lindane—Toxaphene. Use Lindane on hogs and BHC for dogs. These materials give excellent results.

Forestry Tips

This time of year is good to do timber stand improvement; to cut pulpwood and clean up pasture areas.

Remember, when cleaning up pulp out of pastures, cut your stumps low enough so that you can run a pasture clipper over them. To prevent stumps from sprouting use either ammate or 2, 4, 5-T on the stump immediately after cutting.

Hornfly Control

You cannot afford to lose 15 to 25 percent in milk production or up to a half of beef gain a day to hornflies. Hornflies may also spread anaplasmosis in your herd.

If you have not already tried a home-made back rubber, check with your county agent on how to make and treat one to control them. Make sure that you keep your back rubbers charged with insecticide.

A back rubber kept well charged through the summer and fall will tend to help prevent build ups of cattle lice when the weather turns cooler.
