SOUTHERN STATES INDUSTRIAL COUNCIL MORALS IN THE WELFARE STATE

In 1931, my good friend, Sir Ernest Bann, of London, England, who at the time headed up the Society for Individual Freedom, wrote a pamphlet on the morals of the people in the welfare state. The socialist Labor Government of Great Britain was then, of course, at the height of its power.

Sir Ernest pointed out that in 1910 when the capitalist society, with all the supposed evils ascribed to it by the socialists, held full sway, only one in 3,000 of the population was convicted for a breach of the law; that with the advent of the welfare state the traditional respect of the British for law and order suffered a serious and obvious deterioration, with one of

every 96 of the population being convicted in 1948.

In 1928, Sir Ernest said, there were 6,250 divorces in England and Wales; by 1947, there were 10,190 divorces. He also pointed out that illegitimacy had increased with similar rapidity "until today one in every ten of the newborn is bereft of the advantages of regular parentage."

"It is difficult, perhaps impossible, to establish by argument any direct connection between the serious change of mind towards moral laxity and the silver spooning of a Welfare State, but few will fail to feel that the two things have a definite relationship one to the other."

Certainly, after experiencing a quarter-century or more of welfare-statism, no one in this country will fail to see the definite relationship.

We have had a tremendous increase in economic immorality since the Marxian system of progressive taxation which our Government adopted has taken full hold. The example of economic immorality was set by our Government when in 1933 it violated sanctity of contract and took from the people their gold, which they had earned and which was theirs, and gave them pieces of irredeemable paper in exchange. The example was set by piling up a mountainous national debt, by multiplying many times over the national budget, by bureaucratic waste and extravagance, by throwing away bil-

PVT. Wm. W. McKEE TAKING BASIC TRAINING AT FT. JACKSON

Private William W. McKee, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. C. McKee of Route 1, Iuka, has been assigned to Company C, 19th Battalion, 5th Training Regiment at Fort Jackson, S. C., for eight weeks of basic combat training.

Upon arrival at Fort Jackson, he was issued clothing and given a complete physical examination and a comprehensive battery of aptitude tests.

As part of his basic training he will be taught rifle marksmanship under the Army's new Trairfire program. In Trairfire, he will learn to use an M-1 rifle by firing at pop-up targets on terrain which dupli-

cates combat areas. He will also be taught drill, tactics, camouflage, military courtesy, first aid and other basic subjects. He will learn how to throw a grenade, fire in pitch darkness, crawl under barbed wire with machine gun fire overhead, and defend himself in simulated chemical, biological and radiological warfare situations.

During his seventh week of training, he will march 13 miles with full field pack to a bivouac area to spend a week living in the field and learning to integrate the skills he has been taught.

After completing basic training, he normally will receive a two-

week leave before reporting for his next assignment.

101 Million Seedlings To Be Given By Comm.

Area Forester James D. Spencer, with the Mississippi Forestry commission recommends that landowners order seedlings now.

The Commission expects to have a total of 101 million seedlings this year in its three forest tree nurseries located at Winona, Mount Olive and Waynesboro. The bulk of these seedlings will be loblolly pine (50 million) and slash pine (50 million) with smaller quantities of longleaf pine (300 thousand) and shortleaf pine (100 thousand). A few thousand of each of bald cypress, green ash, cottonwood, sweet gum and red cedar are also being grown.

Seedling order blanks may be obtained from Area Forester Spencer, or from the offices of other agricultural agencies.

Even though prices in general continue to advance, the Commission is offering seedlings at last year's prices with no reduction in free seedlings.

Each landowner is entitled to 1,000 free seedlings. Seedlings are sold to landowners ordering more than 1,000 at \$4.50 per thousand for all species except red cedar, which is \$6.00 per thousand. A transportation charge of \$.35 per thousand will be made on all orders delivered.

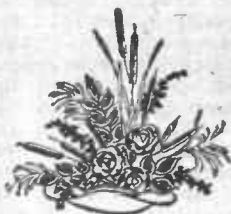

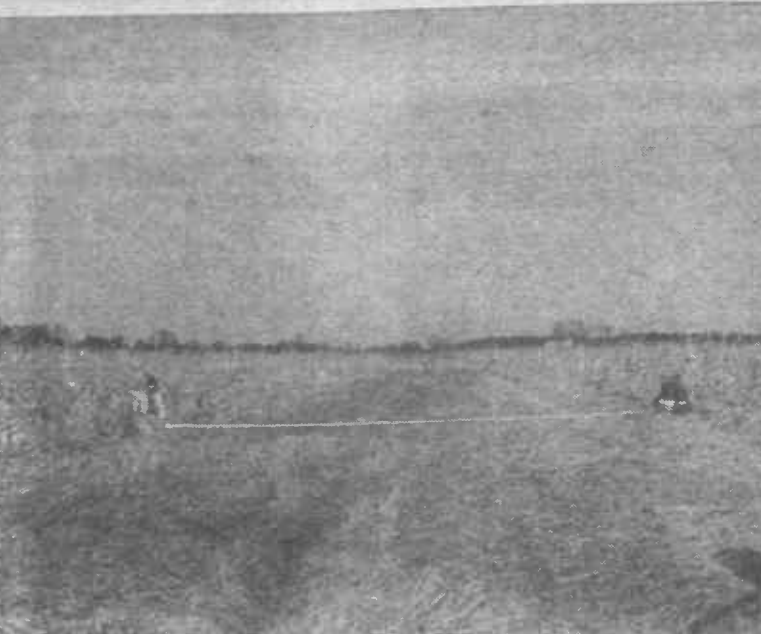

Vegetated Waterways For Erosion Control And Hay

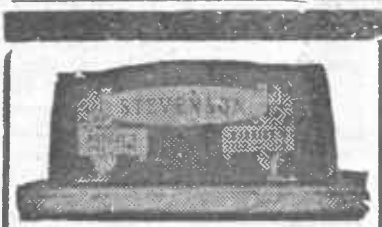

ways from terraces and rows flows slowly off the land. The slower water flows off the land the less it washes away, or erodes, the soil.

Hay cut from these vegetated waterways is usually of high quality. There is always some leaching of commercial fertilizer which has been applied to the row crops. These plant nutrients fertilize the plants in the waterway which in turn makes these plants more nutritious. The more nutritious plants

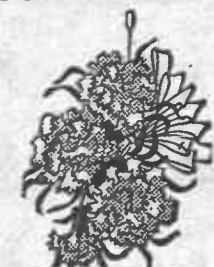

The Mississippi Easter Seal Society will stress the meeting of community needs throughout the state on an area basis, in close co-operation with other voluntary health agencies providing direct services to the handicapped, county organizations, committees, societies, and with civic and service clubs interested in helping the crippled, Bori continued. "Active close co-operation with other interested groups will characterize the program," Bori summarized.

The 1959 Easter Seal Campaign has raised approximately \$22,000 to date, Bori announced. "The average contribution, per return, has been 23 per cent above the national average," Bori continued, "which is a significant indication of the deep concern of Mississippians for the handicapped persons of the state."
