SENSING THE NEWS

REDS IN THIS HEMISPHERE

International communism is planning an attack on the soft underbelly of the United States. This is the significance of the political upheavals on this country's Caribbean Sea frontier. And while the eyes of the nation may be on Berlin, the really decisive Soviet threat may be in the sunny lands where U. S. business trades and U. S. tourists sun themselves and soak up history.

The revolutions that have marked Latin America during the last

year have special meaning for the Southern states. In the years since the end of World War II, Southern ports have made giant strides. Free of the labor violence that disrupts the water-front in the port of New York and other Northern shipping centers, Southern ports have moved more and more freight across their docks each year.

Southern ports look forward to increased trade opportunities with Latin America. Wilmington, Charleston, Savannah, Jacksonville, Miami, Mobile, New Orleans and Houston—all are communities that stand to gain from trade with Caribbean lands. Puerto Rico, for instance, is one of the biggest buyers of South Carolina textiles. New Orleans is a hub of sea traffic connecting ports in the hemisphere. Healthy shipping conditions and overseas trade opportunities are essential to the improvement of the entire Southern economy in the years ahead. Companies far from the sea have a stake in peace along the shores of the Caribbean. Trade cannot prosper in a climate of anti-Americanism and leftist unrest.

Certainly, the answer to the radical agitation in Latin America is not enormous foreign aid programs for the lands to the South, through one can expect "liberals" to advance such a phony solution. Dollars given away by the United States undoubtedly would go for the underwriting of radical schemes as they have in Europe.

The kind of American policy needed in Latin America to keep the Caribbean from becoming a Red lake is a kind of policy that has been tried only at rare intervals in the postwar world. Such an American policy would throw the

weight of our strength toward those countries and groups within countries who are the friends of America.

A wise policy for our country would be one in which all the diplomatic resources of our country are actively engaged on the side of anti-communist groups and leaders. Under no circumstances should the U. S. lend money to regimes that are planning to seize U. S. properties and penalize anti-communists. Castro's Cuba is planning to do both, and yet the official U. S. policy is one of friendliness toward this dictator. We should be encouraging the anti-communists in Cuba to launch a new movement to break the power of the Reds and Red sympathizers.

Such encouragement by the United States would not be a "big stick" policy simply for the protection of the United States but also for the protection of Latin Americans threatened by international communism. If the Monroe doctrine means anything today—and certainly it should—it requires us to act when communism attempts to establish satellites in Latin lands.

The United States absolutely cannot afford to have Red satellites in this hemisphere. Cuba, for example, is less than one hour's flying time from Florida. Under Red control it would represent an ever-present direct menace to the security of this Republic. We must not—we cannot permit that. We cannot expect that everything we do in Latin America will be liked by all Latin Americans. No individual or nation that acts energetically is always appreciated by less audacious neighbors. But the Red infiltration of the Caribbean lands is so serious that we cannot be overly concerned with the question of whether every Latin nation approves. Unless the United States acts with resolution, the Soviet union will have bases of operation right on our doorstep.

Farm News

By County Agent W. C. Hamilton

Cotton Insects

The cotton insect situation remains about the same as last week. The average county percent of infestation is 20 per cent. The second hatch out of weevils occurred the first part of the week, and poisoning should certainly be continued.

Here is a good way for you to check on when a hatch-out of weevils will occur. Pull and pick

up about 25 punctured squares and put them in a sack or container. When you note weevils emerging from the squares, it is time to make 3 applications of poison three to five days apart.

Farm Safety

Sunday is the beginning of National Farm Safety Week and a good time to take stock of where we stand safety-wise.

Certainly safety is a year-round job, but this time of year gives us a chance to see how we rate as "accidents are looking for places to happen." Check closets and out-buildings for only rags, removal if found; see that machinery has all safety devices in place; see to it that the fire extinguisher is in working order and stored in a handy, specific place.

Managing Hog Pastures

Arrange your hog pastures so they are fenced into small enough areas that the hogs can graze the entire area quickly. Hogs like the fast growing, tender grass and

clovers. They will pass up the tough, mature plants.

Fertilize all hog pastures regularly each year. Fertilize clover and fall-planted cereal in the fall, ryegrass in early spring and permanent pasture by early March. Just remember it takes more fertilizer for smaller, good quality pastures than you generally apply to big areas of pastures.

It is important that your hogs graze off the growth in each pasture as quickly as they can; then move them to a fresh area. Come back to the first area when it grows up again to the right stage.

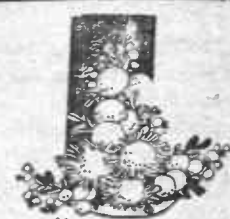

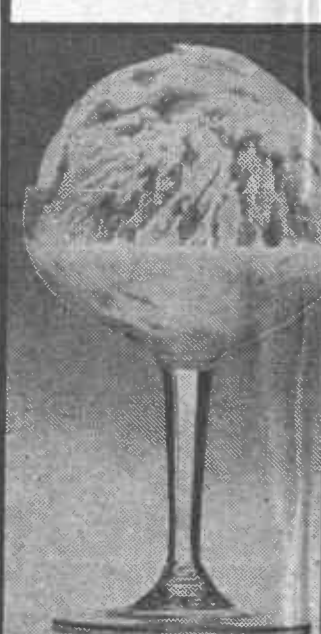

Make Your Farm Pond Safe

By
Hiram A. Jones, Work Unit

Your Farm Pond can be a source of joy as well as profit. BUY ONLY IF IT IS SAFE.

If you have a farm pond you should, if you have not already done so, erect a sign, SWIM AT YOUR OWN RISK. It might be well to place signs showing deep areas, or where there are stumps or sudden jump offs.

Do not swim in a pond where sewage from the house or water from the barnyard flows into it.

Mark out a swimming area which is free of stumps, or other objects, with a rope. Mark the depth showing shallow and deep areas.

When in a boat small children should use life preservers, so should any person who can't swim.

I know of two ponds where young boys have been drowned. This can happen in your pond and the victim could be your own child. So place a life saving device, a ring buoy with rope on a rock at the swimming area. It could save a life.

Just use precautions and common sense. Make your pond safe for you and your farm ponds.

Most of the farm ponds constructed in Tishomingo county were constructed with the help of the Soil Conservation District, with local soil conservation service personnel giving the technical assistance.

We are anxious for you to enjoy your pond, but please make them safe. July and August are danger months.

Be sure and blanch the vegetables you put in your freezer. They will have a better flavor, texture and color.

If you don't blanch your vegetables will develop a hay-like flavor, an off color and a very disagreeable odor within 2 months.

Ask at your home agent's office for a copy of Freezing Foods. It tells how to select and prepare fruits, vegetables, meats and cooked foods for freezing.

Tasty Corn

The shorter the time from field to table, the tastier your corn-on-the-cob will be.

The natural sugars begin to change to less flavorful starches soon after picking.

The corn flavors keep best at low temperature. The grower does his part by picking the corn in the early morning. The grocer displays the corn in a refrigerated counter.

Now you must do your part by hurrying it home to the refrigerator, and not delaying use too long.

Family Activity Schedule

While the children are at home this summer is a good time to try out a family activities schedule.

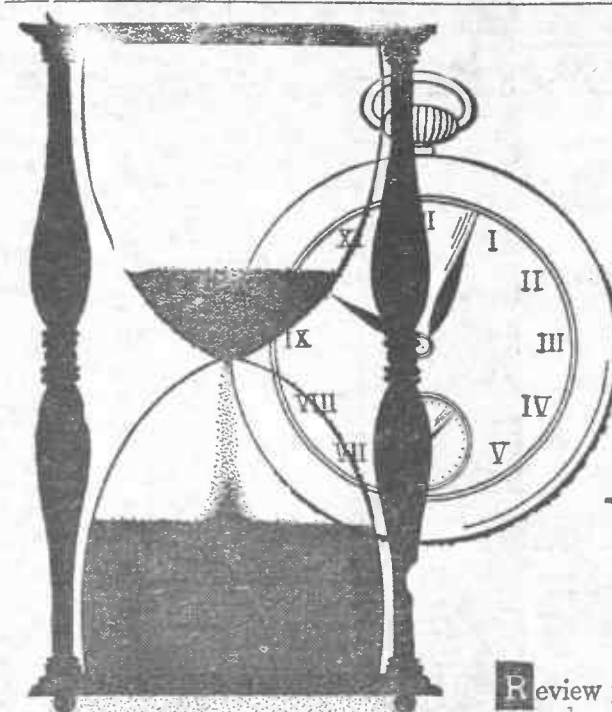
