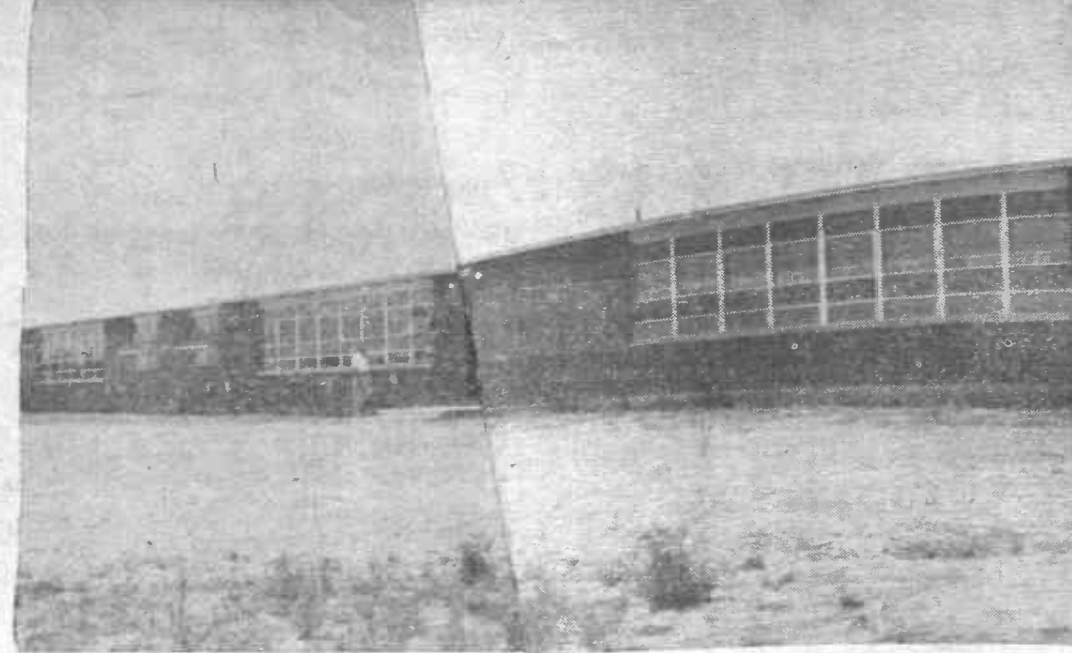

## Home Agent Notes

Careful there! Don't use gasoline, paint thinner or any other highly combustible fluid to kindle that charcoal.



**NEW CARTER COLORED SCHOOL**—The new school building in the county school system opened its doors Monday morning for Tishomingo Colored pupils. The building is of fireproof construction, brick-faced concrete block with steel supporting the tectum deck roof. The school has eight well-lighted classrooms, cafeteria, and an assembly room with stage. It will have grades 1 through 9. Approximately 157 pupils will be enrolled this year. J. Y. Trice, principal, is shown at the school entrance in the picture above.

Even if you are using charcoal lighting fluid be sure to use it according to directions and be sure there is no liquid fuel that has not soaked in before you start the fire.

You don't want to spoil your cook-out with a bad burn for the cook.

For your safety as cook-out chef you will find heavy fireproofed gloves handy for building the fire and during the cooking. Use long-handled forks, tongs, barbecue brushes, skewers, skillet and other equipment. Keep a sprinkling can of water handy to douse the fire in any emergency.

## Time Saver

A good time saver for any homemaker is a bulletin board or note pad in a handy place. When you see that supplies are getting low, make a note of them on the board or pad.

Then when you get ready to shop, make a list of your needs. Making this list in the order that will route you from one store or market to another without backtracking can save time and travel expense, too. Arranging your list so you won't have to back-track in a supermarket saves time, too.

## Peach Ice Cream Pie

Spread softened vanilla or a nutty ice cream into a thin layer over a graham cracker pie shell. Add a layer of fresh peach slices, being careful not to overlay any slices. Then add another thin layer of ice cream. Another layer of peach slices and another thin layer of ice cream. Top off the pie with just enough peach slices to form a wreath around the edge of the pie. Chill for an hour before serving.

To make the graham cracker pie shell, mix 2 cups of fine graham cracker crumbs, 1/3 cup of melted butter, 1/3 cup of sugar and 1/4 teaspoon each of cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg. Turn into a 9-inch piepan, pat into a firm smooth shell and chill until firm.

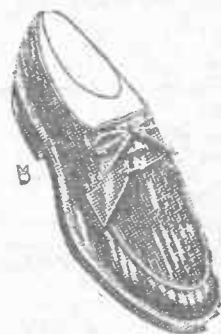

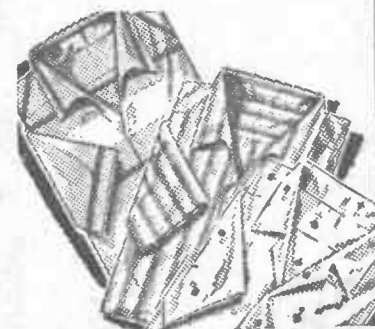

**SAVE WHAT YOU HAVE**  
By Hiram A. Jones  
Work Unit Conservationist  
USDA-SCS

Soil Conservation District Cooperators in Tishomingo County are making progress.

These good farmers follow a common-sense procedure. First, they save by the conservation practices they have established on their land, and second, they apply other needed soil and water conservation practices year by year, as they are able to do so.

Progress seemed slow for awhile, but by saving what they had and adding to it as they could, many SCD Cooperators are now reaping

the reward of the labors.

The things these landowners have done are as follows:  
1. Kept drainage ditches open by keeping them clear of grass, weeds and other vegetation. (Many use weed-killing spray for this job.)  
2. Vegetated waterways have been kept fertilized and clipped.  
3. Terraces and row emptying into these vegetated waterways are kept open so the water flows gently into them.  
4. Terraces are maintained by properly plowing them each year.  
5. Pastures are not overgrazed.  
6. Woodland is protected from fire.

7. More and more good bottom-land is being drained and planted to row crops. More and more eroded hill-land is being taken out of row crops and put in sod or planted to pine trees.

8. Loblolly pine seedlings are set under low-grade hardwood and the hardwood is removed or deadened the same or following year. These woods are protected from fire.

9. Farm ponds for stock water are maintained, and where these have been stocked with fish, many of them are being fertilized annually.

10. Field roads have been moved to better locations and maintained. This has all taken place gradually and without fanfare but it is solid progress which is paying off now.

**Steadfast Love**  
Lesson for July 24, 1960

AND AGO there lived a man by the name of Hosea. God had said to him for a prophet, but Hosea did not know this until he was married. For he went with a girl named Gomer, and a sort that cannot simply be passed into memory's trash-bin and forgotten. Hosea's experience was one that left scars on his soul.

**Woman In His Life**  
Hosea's story, told in the first of the book which bears his name, is a puzzling one as it is, and it remains a puzzle when it is reconstructed. It follows now is a very widely accepted interpretation of that story, though no interpretation is perfect. There was a man in Hosea's life; her name was Gomer, and she was a prostitute. It is not that he loved her, and Dr. Foreman she bore him children. The story of the children, however, is that all was not well in the household. The oldest child named Jezreel, the name of a known fortress city of those days. There was nothing odd about naming children. When the second child was born, she (still not yet a prophet) had a curious name. It sounds strange in English; it was much more so in Hebrew, the language Hosea spoke. Lo-Ruhamah, "Mercy" was the little girl's name.

**Bitterest Cup**  
Hosea give that innocent that gruesome name because he discovered that his Gomer was a woman without mercy? If he did, the third baby bore a name that was even sadder. It was a little girl, and Hosea named her "Not my people" or "Not of Mine." He had lost all belief that his wife was any longer his; in fact he publicly ended her by giving the child a name. Gomer did what you might expect: she left him with the child, and he had the three of them to bring up by himself, trying to be father and mother both.

**Woman In The Slave Market**  
Long afterwards, Hosea found a woman in the slave market and bought her and brought her to his home. The interpretation of the story which we are following takes a woman (not named in the story) to be no other than the lost Gomer. It is very likely she was. It would be a delicate story not to give her name, for she had indeed sunk very low, as the story shows. If it was Gomer, enough, then Hosea had discovered something besides his lost bride. He had discovered in her heart a love which bridged the rifts and chasms that a wayward woman's merciless selfishness had cut across the fair face of her happiness. He discovered a love which was stronger and more enduring than anything.

**of God**  
The writers in the Old Testament speak to us of the love of God, but the word they used has been mistranslated, or played down in the translating. The word now is (in the Revised Standard Version) given its true meaning: Steadfast Love. Translators worked hard to find a word that would say what Hebrew word says, but they did not find one. So "steadfast" it is. Hosea's experience was that of two things. One was the depth of his own love, as we have just said. The other was the depth and endurance of God's love for Hosea, who became known as a prophet, but never fully recovered from the shattering experiences of his early life, always spoke of God as Israel's husband and just as Gomer had been unfaithful to him, so the nation of Israel had been unfaithful to God. Just as Hosea's love was so great that he could take back a care for a horribly damaged woman, so God's love is steadfast in the face of Israel's sins. Yet—we suppose that Hosea, once he was at home again, did not hate the girl; and we must believe that God, though he loves the sinner, hates the sin.

**Fall and Winter Dairy Feeding**  
Probably the most pressing need on our dairy farms is to balance numbers of cows with the feed supply. Pasture feed for dairy cows will come from such temporary crops like millet or sudan; then from oats or other winter grasses or small grains. Some grazing will be

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had from permanent pastures, but this does not do much to stimulate milk production or hold up high production. The hay crop is short. Make the most of it. Cut it while young and tender. Cure it properly. Make up in quality what you lack in quantity. Silage should be used along with hay. Feeding plenty of hay and silage along with good grazing will make up the bulk of the feeding ration. Then feed the higher priced grain or concentrate according to individual protection of the cows. **Protect Hens From Heat** Give those birds plenty of fresh cool water. This is the first requirement toward beating the heat in the poultry house. Turn lights on poultry house so birds can eat during cool part of the day. Disturb the birds as little as possible. In periods of extreme heat, you may have to use mist sprayers, fans, cracked ice or wet litter to help bring down the temperature. **Cotton Insect Control** Protect that cotton from boll weevils and boll worms. Check your fields. Poison when needed. But don't waste insecticide. Put down the amount of material recommended no more or no less. Put the poison where it will do the job. Hit or miss spraying or dusting costs you money and it does not give control of the "bugs." Check with your local county agent for detailed information on what to use, when and how to use it. Always follow directions on the label of all insecticides. Don't get careless with insecticides. They are dangerous. Treat insecticides with respect and make them do the job for which they are intended. The Fair Officials are in the process of trying to improve our fair grounds. 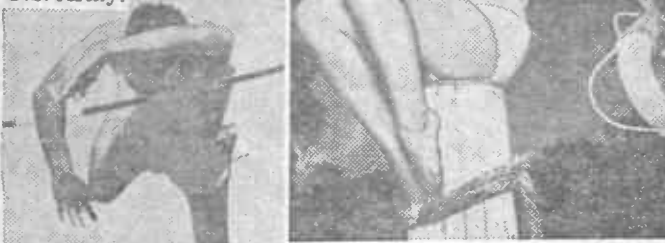
