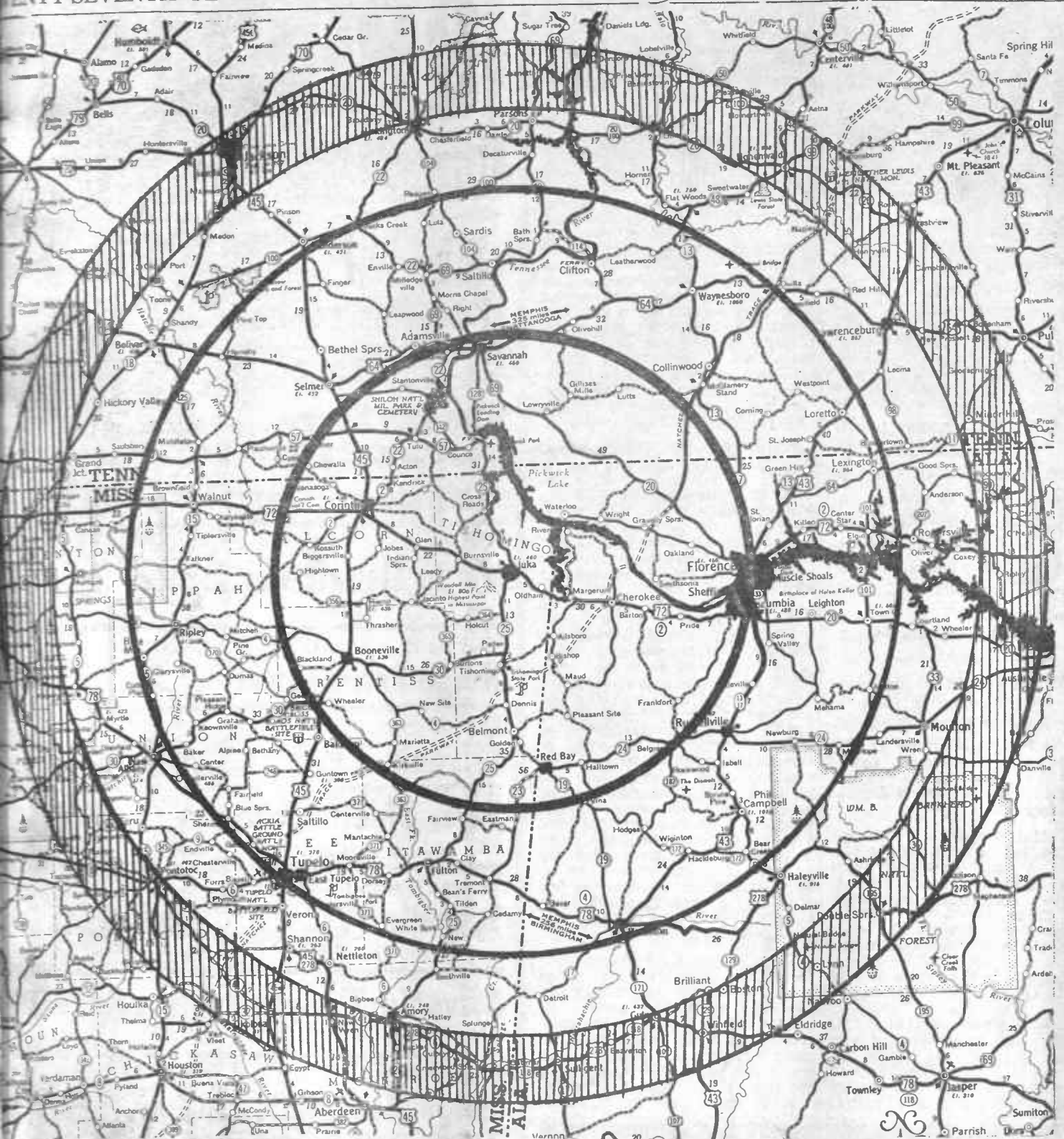

New Radio Station Tower Being Built

Work Begun Wednesday With Installation Of Ground System

Construction work has begun on the erection of the WVOM radio station tower on Pleasant Hill in Iuka. Installation of the ground system was begun Wednesday, and the foundation for the tower is being poured. Other preparatory work being done includes clearing the area and laying out the site.

Work is also continuing on the location in Iuka. The work is being done faster after studio and other equipment, which will be arriving within the next few days, has been received.

Mississippi's new 1000-watt station will serve a three-county area of more than 100,000 people when it goes on the air. It will operate on 1270 kHz and will serve 25 counties in Mississippi, Alabama and Tennessee. (See diagram map on page 2.)

Mississippi, Station WVOM will serve all of Tishomingo County, Tipton, Tishomingo, and Madison counties in Tennessee. It will also reach the entire counties of Lawrence, Marion and Madison counties in Alabama. Coverage will be in Colbert, Lauderdale and Franklin counties and extend to parts of Lawrence, Marion and Madison counties in Alabama.

Local SCD Members Attend Annual Summer Meeting

Several members of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District from this area attended the annual summer meeting of the statewide districts' commissioners Tuesday and Wednesday at Holmes Junior College in Goodman. Dog Thought Rabid Proves To Be Not Infected

A 14-year-old Iuka boy, Edward Whitehurst, was attacked and bitten on the hand by a stray dog, Saturday afternoon at his home on Jacinto Road, off Highway 72-W.

It was feared the dog was rabid because of its peculiar behavior, but laboratory examination at Jackson proved it to be not infected with rabies, Health Dept. officials stated.

The dog, a small mongrel unknown in the neighborhood, came up on the porch of the Whitehurst home and could not be driven off. When Edward attempted to chase the dog from the porch it lunged at him, biting his hand deeply enough to draw blood.

The youth's father, Luther Whitehurst, shot the animal and took its head to the Tishomingo County Health Dept. where Luther Kinard, sanitarian, packed it in ice and shipped it to Jackson for examination.

Mr. Kinard has issued an appeal to parents to warn their children to beware of stray dogs at all times, and their own pets if their behavior becomes unusual in any way. "It may save a lot of expense and grief if you play it safe with animals," he stated.

Central Boy Scout Troop No. 73 captured a number of honors while attending Camp Yocona last week. Although the troop is comparatively new, four of its 16 members attending camp made top ratings.

Road Cases Hearings Continue

Court Of Eminent Domain Presided Over By J. J. Parker

The Special Court of Eminent Domain which opened hearing in Justice of the Peace, J. J. Parker's Court last Monday, will reconvene for further hearings this morning, 9 o'clock at the Courthouse.

The cases being heard grow out of effort of the Mississippi Highway Department to obtain rights of way for the Federal Secondary Roads Project No. 356 north of Burnsville.

Two cases which were to be heard Monday were continued because the defendants' lawyer was ill and couldn't appear. The cases carried over were those of L. S. Honeycutt and Leona Fields. They were reset for hearing August 10.

One case was heard on Tuesday, that of Mrs. Claudia Lambert and daughter, Miss Rhoda Lambert who had rejected the State's offer of \$650 compensation for damages the right-of-way would cause on their property. The case went to the jury which gave the defendants a judgement of \$1350 for damages which the right-of-way would incur. The Lamberts were represented by O. R. Smith and Sammy Smith, attorneys, of Corinth.

The State was represented by Attorney J. D. Finch and Attorney J. O. Clark of Iuka. They may appeal the case to the Circuit Court.

A number of cases are yet to be heard before the road project can get underway. Cases set for hearing today are those of Sam E. and Bertha R. Broughton; Melvin L. Powers; Alfred Whitaker, and Marvin Kennedy.

Lomenick Confirmed Postmaster

Native Iukan Had Been Acting Postmaster For Past 14 Months

Harold T. (Dickie) Lomenick, acting postmaster in Iuka since April 30, 1959, has been confirmed by the U. S. Senate and officially notified by the Post Office Department of his appointment to full postmastership this week.

Mr. Lomenick is a native of Iuka. He is the son of Mrs. Icie Lomenick and the late James C. Lomenick. He is a graduate of Iuka High School, Class of '42; a Past Commander of the local American Legion Post and presently Service Officer of the Legion. He has been a Mason since 1946 and is a 1st Sgt. in the local National Guard unit of which he has been a member since its organization in 1953. Lomenick served nine months in the European Theater of Operations during World War II, receiving his discharge in December, 1945. He was the president of the Iuka P. T. A. last year and is a member of the National Postmasters' Association.

Water Line Work Begins

Tank Repair Job Nears Completion; Water Supply Improved

Work on extending the municipal water lines to the corporate limits of Iuka got underway last weekend. The first sections of pipe were laid along Highway 72-W in front of the County Hospital. Formerly, the waterline extended only to the hospital.

Horton Bros. of Corinth are constructing the extensions. After the line on 72-W is completed, the next section to be installed will be along Highway 25-S, a spokesman said. That area is reported to be urgently in need of the new water service.

New users of the water system are required to make a \$10.00 payment when they hook on to the water line. "This is a standard charge to all users on the municipal system, whether they are on the new extensions, or if they come in on the line at any place in the town," Mayor J. H. Allen, explained.

Mayor Allen also stated that the water shortage which developed last week in wake of the drought has improved. Also the refilling of the Eastport Street water tank, which has been undergoing repairs and painting, has helped the situation. The work on the water tank is almost completed, Mr. Allen said, but some painting yet must be done on the outside structure.

TCEPA Reports Big Increase In Kilowatt Hour Use

Area Electricity Cost Drops Below National Average; Membership Meeting Will Be Held Aug. 4

The annual report of the Tishomingo County Electric Power Association, published in today's paper, shows the total kilowatt-hour sales of electricity in the system's service area increased sharply in the year ending June 30, 1960 as compared to that of the year ending June 30, 1959.

The report is being released at the same time a Newsletter citing the growth of the system is being mailed to all members of the Association and announcing the annual membership meeting which will be held here August 4.

According to the annual report members of the TCEPA set new records in the total use of electricity. During the 12 months ending June 30, a total of more than 35-million kilowatt-hours of electric power was used.

The average use of electricity in the home reached a new high,

also, the reports states, showing that the average Tishomingo County home used an average of 5,656 kwh. This, compared to the national average for home use, which is only about 3,400 kwh, vividly pictures the growth of the economic situation in our area. The advantages of low-cost electricity as supplied by the TCEPA shows up in the increased use of electric appliances and tools for the home and farm.

The report states that, "We estimate, for example, that about seven out of ten of you cook electrically; that four out of ten of you heat water electrically. An increasing number of you are using electricity to heat your home. We estimate that approximately 10 out of every hundred of you are now using electric heat. Many of you, too, now enjoy electric air conditioning."

For this electricity you used in your homes last year, you paid an average of only 1.02 cents per kilowatt-hour. That's less than half the national average of 2.54 cents per kwh.

"On your farms last year you used electricity to do many of the jobs which you once had to do by hand. You used electricity to pump water, grind and mix feeds, operate power tools. You used electricity to brood chicks and pigs, to lift hay and other feeds, to shell corn, to dry grains. Electricity is a valuable and low priced hired hand on most of our area's farms."

The commercial and industrial use of electricity increased last year, also. Commercial establishments used a total of 4 million kwh. Industries used almost 3 1/2 million kwh. Electricity helps business; it improves working conditions; it creates jobs. One of the points considered by an industry in deciding whether or not to locate in an area is the availability of plenty of low cost electricity.

Manager W. J. Brinkley commented, "For several months now, the Association has been in the process of improving and increasing our substations and power lines. Figures just compiled show that members are using more electricity than ever before, and that electricity is costing less per kilowatt-hour than ever."

"Of course, this is a fine state for the Association to be in," Brinkley continued. "It certainly points out that a plentiful supply of electricity, at low cost, will be used for better living and better farming."

(Editor's Note: Mississippi is entering a period of startling and rapid industrial and economic progress. Feeling that Tishomingo Counties should be kept aware of this progress and our stake in it, we are initiating this week a regular column reporting that progress. Watch for it each week.)

State's Chemical Industry Increased By Vicksburg Plant
Southwest Potash, a division of American Metal Chmax, announced July 6 that it will build a \$7 million chemical plant at Vicksburg. The plant will employ a newly-developed process to produce competitively-priced nitrate of potash for chemical fertilizer and chlorine for industrial uses.

Chief market for the nitrate of potash is expected to lie in the Southeastern states where the chemical may be used for tobacco crops, citrus and truck farms.

Spencer Chemical's Vicksburg plant, in operation since 1953, was one of the major factors in location selections of Southwest Potash and will supply nitrogen as vital raw material for new process. Spencer also produces Spensol and argon at Vicksburg.

Thomas W. Childs, President of Southwest Potash, said: "We found that Vicksburg had everything... which drew us to it. We found power and industry and above all we found a people in a society built solidly on a foundation of churches, schools and good government."

\$5 Million Manganese Plant To Be Built At Aberdeen

American Potash and Chemical Corporation announced plans for building a \$5 million manganese metal manufacturing plant at the firm's 1,600 acre site at Aberdeen. The new plant will be adjacent to the company's sodium chlorate plant completed in 1959 and now undergoing a 50% expansion.

The new AP&CC plant will manufacture manganese by an electrolytic process. The metal is used primarily as a toughening ingredient in steel alloys and especially in stainless steel.

Earth Moving Starts At Ripley For American Bilrite Plant

Earth moving operations got underway last week at Ripley as initial construction operations were started for the American Bilrite Company. This plant is the first Southern expansion of the company, one of the world's largest manufacturers of rubber products and bi-products. A BAWI bond issue was passed in January for \$1,200,000 for construction of the building and the company is investing an additional \$450,000 in the site.

Port Activity Up At Pascagoula

At Pascagoula it was announced that an export shipment of 1,000 tons of creosoted poles was scheduled to move out next week to Liberia. Port authorities described the movement as the first big-ship export cargo utilizing the deepened ship channel.

Farker Dunn, vice president of the company, said that the plant was located in Aberdeen because of the central location and proximity to steel producing areas.

largest producers of institutional furniture, said July 7 that it will locate a church furniture plant at Booneville employing 200-300. The plant will occupy 32 acre site and utilize a 15,000 sq. ft. building. Northeast Mississippi Junior College will co-operate with the company in personnel training program starting in September. Operations are expected to get underway early in 1961.

World's Largest Broiler Plant Begins Operations At Forrest

The Southeastern Poultry Company, Forest began operations last week at the world's largest broiler plant. The plant started with a \$7,500 weekly payroll and initial processing of 6,000 chickens an hour with a planned increase to 9,000 hourly in the near future. The plant was made possible by a \$500,000 BAWI bond issue.

\$60 Million Contract Awarded To Ingalls

Ingalls Shipbuilding Corp., Pascagoula, won \$60 million in contracts June 29 when it was announced that the company was low bidder on six cargolines to be built for Farrell Lines, Inc., of New York. Delivery of the first ship is scheduled about June 1962 with the others delivered at two-month intervals afterward. The Farrell crafts will be 572 feet long, carry 12 passengers, and will have dry cargo space of 660,026 feet and 28,000 feet of cold storage space. Ingalls is just completing the last of four similar ships for the Lykes Line and is in the process of building four atomic submarines for the U. S. Navy.

Those Fatal Promises

The Democratic platform written in Los Angeles promises to the American people a different government than they or their forefathers have lived under since the Constitution was adopted. It would set up an all-powerful superstate to fulfill the promises made in the document.

The platform promises more fed-

erally-financed medical care, more federal aid to education, more federal assistance to suburban commuters, federal programs to combat juvenile delinquency, federal help for so-called "depressed" areas, and federal action to raise farm income.

Of all the promises, the most alarming is that section of the platform that says laws will be enacted to establish a Fair Employment Practices Commission that would deny to employers the right to choose their employees. Moreover, the platform also says that private schools no longer will be able to discriminate in the choice of students by race, religion or color. The platform plank states: "The time has come to assure equal access for all Americans to all areas of community life, including voting booths, school rooms, jobs, housing and public facilities." By endorsing the principle of lunchcounter

sit-downs, it would throw the power of government behind the violation of property rights.

What all this amounts to is a promise to disregard the traditional rights of the states and the individual. It means, for example, that the individual's right of association, the very bedrock of our free society, is to be blasted by federal action. Obviously, the other promises made in the platform cannot be carried out without first sweeping aside the authority of state governments.

The only thing this platform lacks as a "liberal" document is a promise to repeal all the amendments to the Constitution that make this nation, in principle, a land where governmental powers are limited; it just ignores them. What is obvious from the platform is that the men who drafted it have no intention of going to the people with a plan for new constitutional amendments asking them to relinquish rights they now possess. Instead, the platform represents the backdoor approach to the denial of basic rights. Under the guise of humanitarian legislation, the superstates intend to abolish state and individual rights as a living reality.

Beyond that, the platform shows understanding that the power to tax is the power to destroy the free enterprise system. All the promises made in the platform require money, vast sums of it. The only place that money can come from is from the pockets of the people, removed therefrom by means of high federal taxation.

By piling new tax burdens on the backs of the American people, especially the already overburdened middle class, the free enterprise system will be pushed close to collapse. When that happens, the "liberals" then will say: "Why, you see free enterprise failed. We always said that nationalization of industry would be necessary in this country." Indeed the only "liberal" demand omitted from the platform is nationalization of industry. Otherwise, the platform is precisely what the socialists have been asking for these many years. Even here, they know that the purpose of nationalization can be accomplished just as surely by taxation as by ownership and operation and with fewer headaches to the government.

Th people have the right to vote themselves into socialist nation if they so desire, even though history tells us such systems have been tried time and time again, and have always failed. But it is sheer hypocrisy for political leaders to induce them to do so under the guise of loyalty to the form of government founded for us, and it

is the height of stupidity for the people to be so deceived. In a few days we shall know whether the Republican platform offers the people a choice.

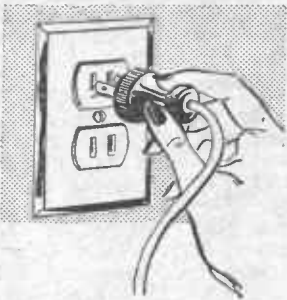

Last Year At A Glance:

- **TOTAL SYSTEM ASSETS:**
Your Electric Power Association's total assets last year reached \$2,086,146.54. Depreciated plant value totaled \$1,761,111.10. Both increased substantially during the year.
- **TOTAL KILOWATT-HOUR USE:**
Power Association members last year used a total of 35,550,177 kilowatt-hours of electricity, 5 million more than during 1959. For the power we bought from TVA, we paid a total of \$186,704.41.
- **RESIDENTIAL SALES:**
In the homes of our area last year, our members used a total of 27,715,486 kilowatt-hours of power. You used this power to heat and cool your home, wash and dry your clothes, furnish entertainment, cook meals and for many other purposes which were almost unheard of 21 years ago.
- **NUMBER OF MEMBERS:**
On June 30 your Power Association served electricity to 5,525 meters. Of those 4,930 are residences. Total membership 11 years ago was 3,258

Yes, last year you members of Tishomingo Electric power Association set new records in your total use of electricity. During the 12 months ending June 30, you used a total of more than 35 million kilowatt-hours of electric power. And you used that power in many ways, used it to build a better way of life for you and your families, to create a better economic situation in our area.

Your average use of electricity in the home reached a new high, too. In your homes last year you used an average of 5,656 kilowatt-hours. The national average home use of electricity is only about 3,400 kwh.

And you used this power in many ways—and in every case it made your home life easier and more comfortable. We estimate, for example, that about seven out of ten of you cook electrically; that four out of ten of you heat water electrically. An increasing number of you are using electricity to heat your home. We estimate that approximately 10 out of every hundred of you are now using electric heat. Many of you, too, now enjoy electric air conditioning.

For this electricity you used in your homes last year, you paid an average of only 1.02 cents per kilowatt-hour. That's less than half the national average of 2.54 cents per kwh. As your use of electricity continues to climb, your average cost per kwh

will continue to drop. Our rates are designed that way to encourage you to use more power.

On your farms last year you used electricity to do many of the jobs which you once had to do by hand. You used electricity to pump water, grind and mix feeds, operate power tools. You used electricity to brood chicks and pigs, to lift hay and other feeds, to shell corn, to dry grains. Electricity is a valuable and low priced hired hand on most of our area's farms.

The commercial and industrial use of electricity increased last year, also. Commercial establishments used a total of 4 million kwh. Industries used almost 3½ million kwh. Electricity helps business; it improves working conditions; it creates jobs. One of the points considered by an industry in deciding whether or not to locate in an area is the availability of plenty of low cost electricity. Fortunately, we have that to offer.

Yes, last year you broke records in your use of electricity. And we expect that next year you'll use even more power.

The management and employees of Tishomingo Electric Power Association are constantly studying the distribution system and the area, planning ahead to be sure that you'll have all the low cost electricity you need, when and where you need it. We know that the electrical future for our area is extremely bright.

Seedling Applications Being Taken

Landowners Urged To Guard Against Timberland Fires

Seedling applications for the 1960-61 planting season are being accepted now. The Mississippi Forestry Commission expects to have the following species of tree seedlings available for distribution this year to Mississippi landowners for reforestation purposes: slash, loblolly, longleaf, shortleaf, and small amounts of spruce and Scotch pines; small amounts of bald cypress, cottonwood, green ash, yellow poplar, black locust, cherrybark, red oak, and sycamore.

Each landownership is eligible to receive 1,000 free seedlings which will be delivered to a central point in the county where the land is located, for a delivery charge of thirty-five cents. Orders above 1,000 will cost \$4.50 per 1,000 plus delivery charges. Area Forester B. K. Killebrew urges landowners who are interested in obtaining seedlings to contact him or county agricultural workers for additional information.

Timberland Fires While forest fires in the Far West are claiming headlines of burning destruction of timber and other properties, Tishomingo Countyans need to be concerned about the higher-than-normal woods fire occurrences in valuable timberland.

"This has been one of the driest summers experienced in Tishomingo County for quite sometime," Killebrew said, "and we are asking that everyone please use care with fire and not allow it to escape into grassy or wooded areas. Last month there were 4 fires in Tishomingo County, while last year only 2 fires occurred during the same month."

Killebrew said that people cause 99.9 percent of the fires in the County and the people of Tishomingo County are the ones who can lower the fire occurrence rate by being very careful and urging friends and neighbors to do likewise.

Home Agent Notes

By Roberta L. Warren, Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent, Mississippi Agriculture Extension Service

We are nearing the end of National Farm Safety Week. How many headlines have you seen recently, or this week even, concerning automobile accidents, drownings, boating accidents, accidents around farm machinery and farm buildings?

We had more accidents in 1958 than in 1957. More accidents in 1959 than in 1958. Everyone of us needs to be more careful ourselves and urge our family and friends and neighbors to be more careful.

We need to work on safety with the children. Particularly during the summer, when accidents in the one to 14 year old group are the heaviest.

Did you know Mississippi ranks third in the nation in number of drownings?

Be Careful With Pesticides

We are using more and more different materials to control bugs, mice and other pests in our garden, fields and around our home. We must use them with judgment and respect.

Always read the label on the container before you use the pesticide; note warnings and cautions. Keep the material in its original container.

Keep the container out of reach of small children.

of children, pets and irresponsible people. Store them in locked cupboards.

Avoid smoking while dusting or spraying. Many of the chemicals are flammable.

If you suddenly feel sick while using a pesticide, or shortly afterward, call your family doctor immediately.

Always dispose of empty containers so they won't be a hazard to people or animals.

Your safety in using a chemical doesn't depend on its toxicity alone: It depends on how carefully you handle it. How often you use it. And how much and how long you expose yourself to it.

Safety Notes For Using Medicines

1. Listen carefully to your doctor's instructions concerning reactions to medicine. Notify him if you think you or your patient is having a reaction.

2. At night when taking medicine, use an alarm clock or correct time. Turn on light. Get up to wake up. Read label to be sure you have the right medicine. Write it down.

3. Keep all medicine out of reach of small children.

4. If you plan to keep certain medicines on hand, check with the pharmacist or your doctor to see if some tend to deteriorate or grow stronger.

5. Throw out all medicines that you can't read the labels on. But don't put them in the bathroom
