Canner Accident Critically Injures Iuka Resident

Mrs. O. E. Morton, Iuka Rt. 2,
was hospitalized Tuesday night suf-
fering from severe burns sustained
when a pressure canner exploded
at her home.

the face and neck by the steam
from the exploding canner. One
eye is said to have been badly
damaged and the sight may be
lost in it, a relative stated.
Mrs. Morton was given emer-
gency treatment at Cosby Clinic in
Iuka and then transferred to a
hospital in Memphis. Her con-
dition is considered serious.

Courthouse Renovation Work Completed

Bids Asked For County Road Project

**Burnsville-Cross Roads
Job Will Include
Bridge Construction**

The State Highway Commission
has advertised for bids on a double
contract road job in Tishomingo
County. The contracts will be let
on construction of road and bridges
in the Burnsville area.
Contract No. 1 calls for construc-
tion of grading, drainage, culverts,
box bridges and road bed topping
on 6.716 miles of Mississippi High-
way 356 between Burnsville and
Cross Roads. This is the highway
construction that has been the sub-
ject of the Court of Eminent Dom-
ain hearings currently underway
at the courthouse in Iuka. The
contract time calls for 200 work-
ing days after issuance of the
work order to the completion date.
Contract No. 2 will be for con-
struction of a bridge on 0.089 miles
of the above Highway 356, known
as Federal Aid Project No. F-062-1.
Contract time for construction of
the bridge is set at 175 working
days after issuance of the work
order.
Detailed information on the bids
may be secured from the office
Engineer at the State Highway
Commission office in Jackson.

County Will Require Vaccinations For Children Entering School

County School Superintendent
Julian R. Long has released the
following information on the re-
quirements for vaccination of
school children in the Tishomingo
county schools.
In regular session, Monday July
25, 1960, the Tishomingo County
Board of Education agreed to fol-
low the requirements of the Bill,
making vaccinations a policy,
strongly urging that these require-
ments be met, but not compulsory,
allowing for all exceptions provid-
ed for in the Bill.
Senate Bill No. 1560, of the Leg-
islative Laws of 1960 reads as fol-
lows: "The Boards of Trustees of
school districts shall have the fol-
lowing powers, authority, and
duties in addition to all other im-
posed or granted by law, to-wit:
To require upon the recommenda-
tion of the State Board of Health,
and the County Health officer in
whose health jurisdiction the
school rests, the vaccination of
school children against smallpox,
typhoid fever, poliomyelitis or
other contagious or infectious
diseases and to require chest x-
rays as soon as practicable, and
to exclude from the schools chil-
dren who have not been so vac-
cinated, as soon as practicable;
however, the provisions hereof
shall not apply to children whose
parents or guardians are certified
by an officer of their church to
be bona fide members of a recog-
nized denomination whose reli-
gious teachings require reliance on
prayer or spiritual means for heal-
ing. It is further provided that no
child shall be required to submit

Four Road Cases Settled Without Going To Jury

Four cases set for hearing in the
Special Court of Eminent Domain
in Justice of the Peace, J. J. Park-

Paving Work Underway On Eastport Rd.

**Completion Date Around
Aug. 30; Main St. Bridge
To Be Replaced**

Construction of the double bitu-
minous surface on Eastport Road
has begun with the compaction of
the roadbed and laying of the
prime surface already well under-
way.
The State and Federal-Aid road
project will be paved from East-
port to the corporation limits of
Iuka, some 6.06 miles. That por-
tion of the road which lies within
the Town of Iuka will be paved by
the town.
It is expected that the road-
paving job will be completed
around the end of August. The
Memphis Stone and Gravel Com-
pany has the contract for the coun-
ty section of the road and was also
awarded the contract for the town
section, having submitted the low
bid of \$3073.85. That portion of
the road will be finished along
with the county section making
one complete job.
Work on replacing the wooden
bridge on South Main in Iuka is
expected to begin shortly. The two
large culverts which will be in-
stalled and paved over have been
delivered to the site. Choctaw Inc.,
of Memphis has been engaged to
replace the bridge section.

Two County Schools Hit By Burglars Over Week-End

**Professional-Type Safe Crackers Rob
Burnsville And Carter of Small Sums**

Two Tishomingo county schools
were burglarized over the past
week-end by what is described as
"professional-type" safe-crackers.
Burnsville School was broken in-
to Friday night and the safe ripped
open. About \$50.00 was taken.
Glenn Williams, principal of

Burnsville school reported that he
had just made a deposit of a con-
siderable sum, Friday morning at
the bank, otherwise it would have
been in the safe and netted a rich-
er haul for the burglars.

Carter colored school at Tishom-
ing was entered Friday night or
sometime over the week-end.
The burglary was not discovered
until Monday. The strong box in
the office was broken open and
\$8.00 taken. No other damage was
done in the office.

In both cases, Sheriff Clarence
Pace reported, the burglars jim-
mied open windows to gain en-
trance to the buildings. Mr. Pace
stated that both break-ins bore
 earmarks of professionals and both
jobs are thought to have been done
by the same persons. "The tool
marks at both places look the
same," Mr. Pace stated, "and it
looks like the work of the same
outfit."

School opening time seems to
be an invitation to burglars to
start their own particular kind
of "back-to-school" program. "One
or two schools in Alcorn county
were also broken into this past
week-end," Sheriff Pace said, "but
I don't know the amount of money
taken or damage done."
Investigation of the burglaries is
underway by Tishomingo county
officers and investigators from
Jackson.

Iuka School Opening Indefinite

**Renovation Work May
Delay Registration
A Few Days**

A definite opening date for the
Iuka school has not been made,
Supt. H. L. Shook, announced to-
day. In response to a number of
inquiries concerning the school
opening, Mr. Shook said, "We are
unable to say exactly when school
will open, due to the renovation
work in progress. It will probably
be around the last of August or
first of September, before we can
register any pupils, possibly Aug.
26 or Sept. 2."

Workmen are engaged in reno-
vation of the elementary school
classrooms at present. "It was
thought best to get the classrooms
completed first," Mr. Shook stated,
"and then do the work on the
auditorium after school opens, if
that becomes necessary."

New School Buses
Mr. Shook also revealed that the
Separate Municipal School District
will have five new school busses
in operation at the beginning of
the fall term. The busses, 54-pas-
senger capacity, will be delivered
within the next two or three weeks.
They will compose the first trans-
piration fleet ever owned by the
school district, and replace all
but two privately owned busses
operating for the district.
Of the five busses, "cash will
be paid for two of them, and the
other three will be paid for by a
negotiated loan," Mr. Shook said.

June Business Highest Ever In This District

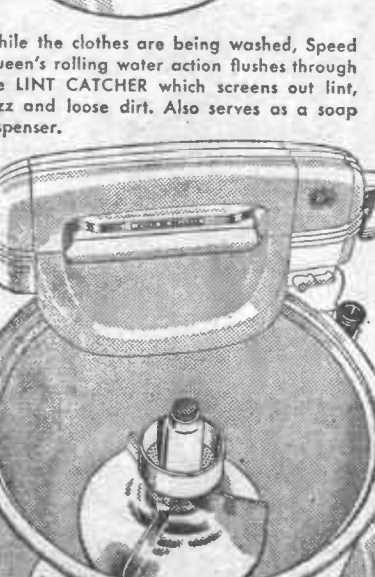

County Agent's Notes

LIVESTOCK NOTES

pastures now and the prospect of severe feed shortages next year pose problems for cattle and sheep producers.

livestock like cull cows or steers that you plan to sell in

the fall should certainly be sent to market before they start to lose weight. Prices now may be better than they will be in the fall when heavy runs of similar cattle from range areas hit the market.

Calves that have sufficient weight and finish should go to market. This will give thin cows an opportunity to build up before winter.

If they have plenty of protein, cows can use rather poor quality roughage. Cows with light late calves at side might use one or two pounds of protein supplement now if a supply of poor quality coarse roughage is on the ground. Creep feeding calves that you are going to sell this fall might be advantageous.

Make use of all roughage that has feed value. Graze out all fields following harvest. This year espe-

cially you might want to make use of fall planted grazing crops. This is one of the best methods of handling weanling calves that will be carried over.

LIVESTOCK INSECT CONTROL

With the shortage of feed and pasture, your livestock are already having a hard time. If they are also having to feed the hornflies and other pests, the available feed won't go nearly so far.

Keep down the pests. Either spray your animals, dip them, use a backrubber or find some other method of getting rid of the insects. Hornflies alone will take up to 25 percent of the grain off beef cattle and as much as one-fourth of the milk from dairy cows.

FALL GARDENS

Many of our gardens have been cut short by the early dry weather that we have had in parts of the county. Now is the time to start your fall garden. The following is a list of vegetables that you may plant during the month of August: Plant August 1-15: Tomato Plants or Suckers, pole snap and pole lima beans, rutabago, Chinese cabbage, August 15-31: Mustard, Kale, bush snap and bush lima beans, onions, tendergreens, turnips, lettuce, parsley and cabbage. Carrots, beets, collards, and chard can be planted throughout the month.

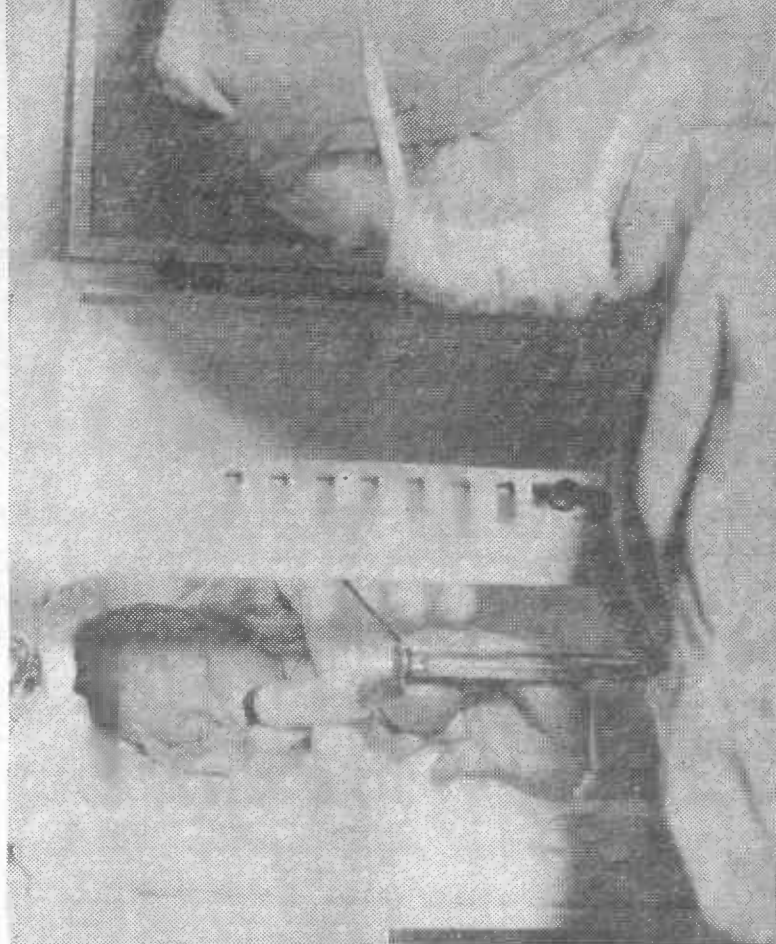
Soak beet and chard seed overnight before planting.

When droughty period is on, wet drill thoroughly, sow seed on wet soil and cover with dry soil. You'll see a "stand" within days. Dry peas and beans further in the shade for a few days after harvesting and before shelling and storing.

If okra has run up to a bare stem, cut off 36 inches above the ground, fertilize and water and see the results before frost.

SPIDER MITES

We saw several cotton fields the past few days that had spots of red spiders in the fields. Red spiders can cause heavy damage if not controlled before you get a heavy infestation. Insecticides that will control spiders are: Ethion, Triton, Dementor, Parathion and methyl parathion. You should keep a close check on your fields during the next few weeks for cotton insects.

Home Agent Notes

Don't put it off... replace that missing button... a safety pin doesn't look nice and it may cause a tear in the garment.

Mend that ripped seam... before it stretches and tears.

Making repairs the first time they are needed prolongs the life of a garment of articles. Giving good care to the articles you buy can mean more money in the Bank, maybe you aren't guilty, but lots of folks spend money needlessly each year to replace articles that they did not give proper care.

Directions, for care come with most articles. If you are in doubt as to how to clean a dress or upholstery and the label does not tell you, it may pay to let the article stay in the store.

Follow directions for care carefully. If you do not, and the damage is done, you lose a lot of money. Store articles properly when you are not using them. And don't forget prompt repairs.

Ripening Tomatoes

Keep your tomatoes that are

not fully ripe at room temperature or a little below—between 60 to 70 degrees—and keep them away from direct sunlight. When they are fully ripe, store them in the refrigerator.

August Plentiful Foods

The August plentiful foods list reads: Peaches and turkeys, followed by watermelons, broiler-fryers, summer vegetables, scallops and peanut butter.

The turkeys, peanut butter and other features will provide fillings for picnic and hot weather meals or sandwiches—during August is Sandwich Month.

You may even want to try leftover turkey meat in turkeyburgers. Chop or grind cooked turkey meat. Add enough mayonnaise to hold the meat together. Season with salt and pepper and add some chopped almonds. Spread generously on buttered bun halves and sprinkle with grated cheese. Brown about 4 minutes and serve.

Buying Bedspreads

If you are buying bedspreads during August sales, be sure to look for quality along with appearance and design and texture. Look for good fabrics, well made seams, generous size and substantial edge finishes. You will find these in good quality merchandise but not often in poor grades.

Consider the upkeep. How much time, energy or money will be involved in washing or cleaning the fabric. The label gives information on care and cleaning. Follow these directions carefully. The lintless, pre-shrunk, wrinkle resistant, colorfast reversible bedspread requires the least care. You will have to wash dark spreads separately.

in order to clarify what has been done and what can be done.

On February 7, 1960, I wrote Mr. W. R. Burris, Supervisor of Special Education, Jackson, Mississippi, concerning the possibility of such a class in the County, and I quote from his reply. "Failure to secure the sufficient number of educable children for the class last fall was probably due to a lack of understanding on the part of those referring the children as to the purposes and requirements of such a class. Unfortunately, we were never able to get a meeting with the County teachers to discuss the matter."

I further quote from Mr. Burris' letter. "As we have only one class in the state for trainable children, and this on a pilot basis, we are not sure of the advisability of a class of this kind. It is quite difficult at this time to even express an opinion as to the number of new classes that might be started next fall. The Legislature will have to make an appropriation of funds and unless more increase is given than that recommended by the Budget Commission we will not be able to add any new classes except where old ones are discontinued."

In a memorandum from Mr. Burris, dated May 23, 1960, I quote, "Unfortunately, the Legislature did not add to the minimum education fund more for exceptional children than that recommended by the Budget Commission which was not designed to allow any expansion of special education classes. This greatly limits the addition of new units. As much as we would like to see every school system in Mississippi have one or more of these classes we regret that we cannot encourage you to organize one for the 1960-61 school year."

I wrote Mr. Burris May 24, 1960, stating that we desire to initiate a class as soon as funds are available from the State level.

As a matter of clarification, non-educable children may fall into the classification referred to above as trainable. We are interested in either type of class, or both if permitted. To qualify for the educable class, children must pass the screening test as administered by the Department of Education, under the direction of the University of Mississippi.

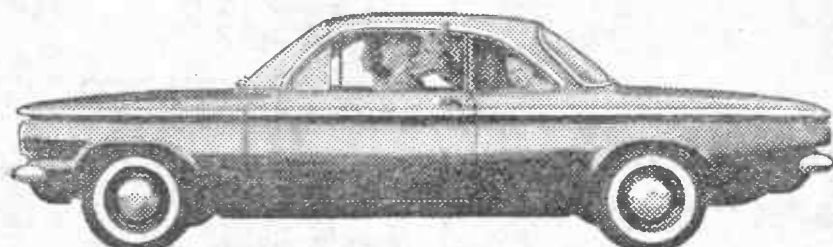

How low is your cost for electricity? Use the information below to find the operating cost for the work-saving electric appliances on your "want-list." The first table tells approximately how much electricity an appliance will use in one month.

Here's how to figure your cost:



To figure the monthly cost of using any electric appliance you must know three things:

1. The number of kilowatt-hours that the appliance will use.
2. How much electricity costs.
3. The number of kilowatt-hours that you now use in one month.

From the table above, you found the number of kilowatt-hours that an appliance will use in one month. The chart on the right shows how much you pay for electricity.

You can get the number of kilowatt-hours that you now use from an old bill. (This can also be estimated from the chart on the right.)

How to use this information...

Let's say you now use around 150 kwh a month. Your bill runs around \$3.50 a month. And you'd like to know how much it will cost to operate an electric range.

From the figures at the top of the page, you see that an electric range uses about 150 kwh a month. Add this to the number of kwh you now use. The new total is 300 kwh. From the chart on the right, you find that you'd pay \$5.50 for 300 kwh. That

means your bill would go up about \$2.00 a month—less than 7¢ a day when you add an electric range. (If you now use more than 150 kwh a month, it would be even less!) Notice that although the amount of electricity used exactly doubled, the size of the bill went up only \$2.00—from \$3.50 to \$5.50. That's the nice thing about our "stair-step" rates... as your use goes up... your average cost goes down!

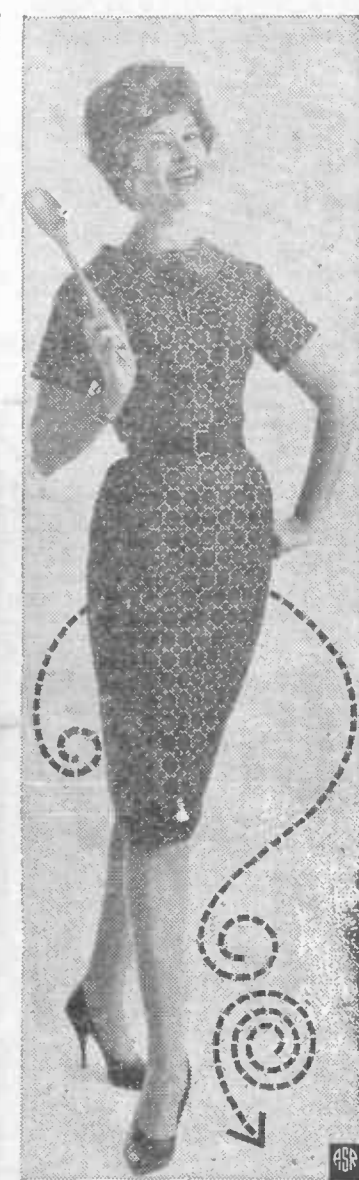


Twenty years of growth is the record claimed for the national 4-H clothing award program which today involves nearly three-quarters of a million girls between 10 and 21 years of age.

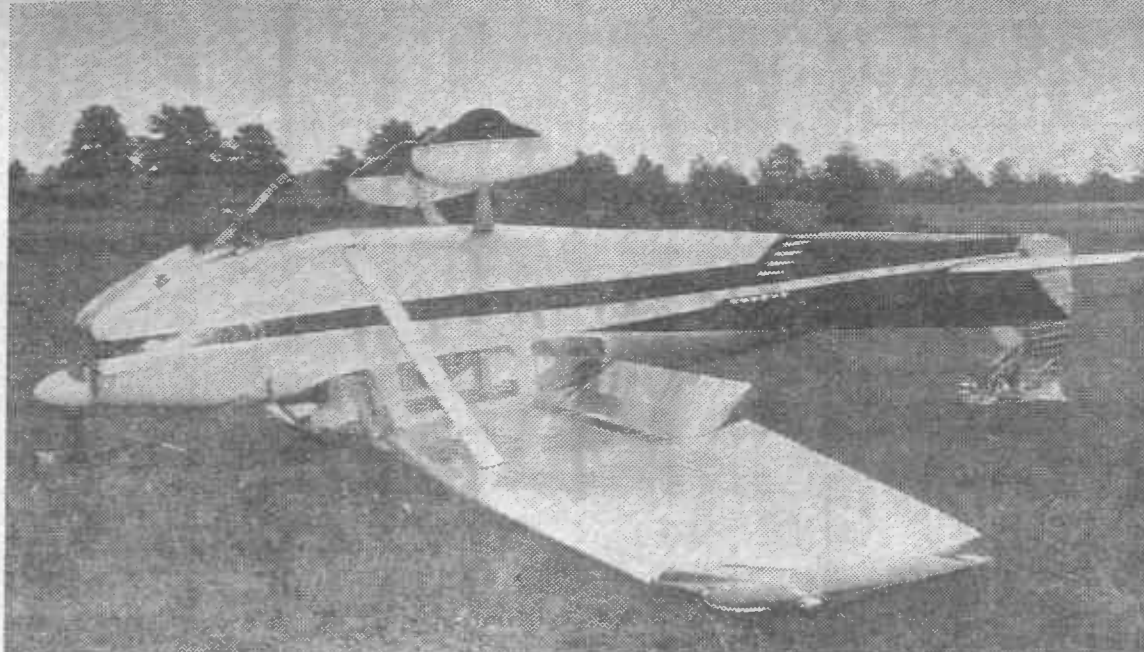

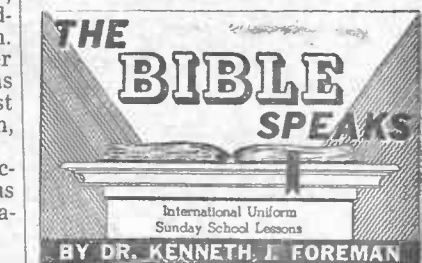

Bible Material: Hosea 11.
Devotional Reading: Hosea 1:1-7.

God's Children Lesson for August 7, 1960

MANY ECHOES of the tragedy through which the prophet Hosea passed, are to be read in his pages. He uses figures of speech which suggest sad chapters in his life-history. When his wife Gomer left him and all three children behind her, he had to be a father and mother to the little ones. This may be a memory underlying the opening words of the 11th chapter. The "I" in verses 1 through 9 refer to God. He is presented as a loving father, taking his child (Ephraim, one of the names for the nation of Israel) in his arms and teaching him to walk. It is a heart-stirring picture, the mighty God picking up baby Ephraim and holding him in His "everlasting arms" and teaching him to walk.

"Sharper Than A Serpent's Tooth"

Perhaps Hosea had had trouble with his motherless children. Surely God had untold trouble with Israel. God and Israel are elsewhere called husband and wife; here they are father and son. But the picture is not of harmony and happiness; it is a picture of a broken home, broken because the son will not stay at his father's house, he disrespects his father's orders and wishes. Yet God's love continues. Even when Israel acts more like brutes than men, Hosea says God feeds them, and makes their yokes and bridles as easy as possible. Yet Israel has never appreciated what God has done. Israel has never appreciated what God would do if they would let him. They worship little gods, "Baals," instead of the true God. They owe their whole existence as a nation to his mighty help in bringing them out of a hopeless slavery in Egypt to a land of hope and freedom.

"How sharper than a serpent's tooth it is
To have a thankless child,"
Shakespeare said. Must not God feel the sting of ingratitude even more than we would in a similar case?

Even At Their Worst

Israel was a bad nation, made up of mostly bad people. The citizens of their rival country, Judah, thought God had no use for Israel at all. Its history was stained with bloodshed, its great men were mostly skilled in the arts of destruction, especially war, its worship was cheap and unworthy of the great God. Hosea says they went away from God, they sacrificed to idols, they are bent on turning away from God, they have refused to return to God. And yet, in spite of Israel, in spite of what they were at their worst, God cries out, "How can I give you up?"

No book in the Bible makes it plainer that the love of God is indestructible. God loves men even at their worst, he loves those who run away from him. Many persons are bothered by the suggestion that God is the father of all men. Does that mean that all men are alike in God's sight? Does it mean he loves wicked men quite as dearly as good men? If we follow the hints we have here in Hosea, we can venture these answers to those questions: Men are not alike in God's sight; the Bible clearly marks off good men from bad. God does love all men; but some run away from his love.

Why Be A Beast?

At several points Hosea speaks of Israel not as a wife, not as a son, but as an animal, most likely an ox, a beast of burden. Now it is the glory and the privilege of God's children to honor and serve him. But there is a great deal of difference between serving God gladly, out of love for him and eagerness to please him, and serving God only because he puts a bridle around your mouth and drives you as a farmer drives a mule. We do not upset God's plan for the universe by being balky. We grieve God, but we do not defeat him, by our mulishness. No man really runs a successful rebellion against God. God is all-powerful and all-wise as well as all-patient and all-loving. He desires the free devotion of free sons; but if this is refused, the failure and the tragedy comes down on man's head, not on God's.
