Heart Disease Leads Death Causes In County

According to information releas-
ed by Dr. J. C. Totten, director of
the County Health Department,
heart disease was the leading
cause of deaths in the county dur-
ing the first quarter of 1960.

Following is a report of deaths
of residents of Tishomingo County
for January, February and March,
1960. These statistics were com-
piled by the Bureau of Public
Health Statistics, Mississippi State
Board of Health. There were 25
deaths occurring—24 white and 1
colored.

The following causes and totals
are: Heart Disease, 10; Cancer, 3;
Accidents, 2; Strokes, 2; Pneumonia,
2; Arteriosclerosis, 2; Unknown,
3.

N. S. Sweat Miss. Legion Judge Advocate

The newly elected Mississippi
Department Commander of the
American Legion, Cleveland Davis,

in Mississippi for the coming year.
The new Judge Advocate is the
author of the Mississippi Anti-
Communist Law, known as the Sub-
versive Activities Act, which was
sponsored by the American Leg-
ion, and which he handled and
steered to passage while a member
of the legislature in 1950. The Mis-
sissippi Law has been pointed out
as a model State Law.

Monroe, Pontotoc, Itawamba, Prentiss,
Tishomingo, and Alcorn.

One Killed, Two Injured In Wreck

**Belmont Man On
Leave From Army Dies
In Smash-Up Near Glen**

C. M. Harris, 21, of Belmont, on
leave from the U. S. Army at Fort
Campbell, Ky., died instantly Sat-
urday morning, when the car he
was driving careened off Hiway 72
and smashed into a tree near the
Glen community.

Two other men in the auto
were injured, one seriously. He
is Elton Williams, 23, also of Bel-
mont, who received serious head
injuries. George E. Lafabry, a ser-
viceman from Fort Campbell who
was visiting the fatally injured
Harris, escaped with less serious
injuries.

The cause of the accident was
not immediately determined. High-
way Patrolmen Duncan and Tay-
lor of Corinth, investigated the
accident.

Funeral services for Harris were
held at the Belmont First Metho-
dist Church, Monday, August 8. Rev.
Sam Hull and Rev. Bob Posey of-
ficated. An Honor Guard from Fort
Campbell arrived for the funeral.
Burial, with full military honors,
was in Belmont Cemetery; Deaton's
of Belmont was in charge of ar-
rangements.

Harris is survived by his wife,
Dorothy Davis Harris; his parents,
Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Harris, Sr.;
two sisters, Mrs. Nancy Mesrop, Los
Angeles, Calif., Mrs. Edna South-
ward, Lake Charles, La.; three
brothers, Joe James of Haleyville,
Ala., Lt. B. M. James, U. S. Navy,
and Gene E. James of Fayetteville,
N. C. He is also survived by his
grandfather, M. L. Harris of Bel-
mont.

Belmont Will Decide On City Tax

**Special Election Set
For Tuesday, Aug. 30;
First Such Local Levy**

The town of Belmont will decide
in a special election set for Tues-
day, August 30, whether or not
a municipal retail sales tax of 1/2
or 1% shall be levied, according
to certain sections of Chapter 119,
Laws of Mississippi of 1934.

The election has been called
following the announcement ear-
lier in the summer that the tax
would be imposed by ordinance
unless more than 20% of the qual-
ified electors of the town filed
a request for an election to decide
the issue. Such a request has been
filed with the town clerk of Bel-
mont.

The 1960 Mississippi Legislature
amended the municipal retail sales
tax law to allow municipalities to
raise the 1/2-cent tax to 1-cent
upon authorization by a majority
of qualified electors of the munici-
pality.

The municipal retail sales tax
is in addition to the 3% retail
sales tax imposed by the state.
Several Mississippi municipalities
are taking advantage of the 1/2
cent increase authorized by the
legislature, to bolster income for
the benefit of the several munici-
palities. In Belmont, with voter
approval, the 1/2-cent levy will
be the first such local tax to be
imposed.

Two other Tishomingo County
municipalities have adopted the
1/2-cent city sales tax levy, Iuka
and Tishomingo.

According to figures just releas-
ed by the State Tax Commission,
the June collections in Iuka a-
mounted to \$1,824.15. In Tishom-
ingo the amount was \$220.95. Of
this amount the state retains 5%
for collecting the tax. The remain-
der is returned to the municipali-
ties.

A spot check of other North Mis-
sissippi towns show collections as
follows: Corinth, \$8,373.88; Boone-
ville, \$2,881.57; Baldwin, \$1,265.64;
Smithville, \$225.06; Fulton, \$1-
400.56, and Ripley, \$2,415.37. The
amount of city sales tax collected
is a fair barometer of business
activity in the given areas.

County Fair Opens Here Sept. 13

**8th Annual Event Will
Feature Carnival
And Livestock Show**

As time draws near for opening
of the Eighth Annual Tishomingo
County Fair, Sept. 13, Fair officials
urge exhibitors over the county
to get their entries ready for dis-
play. The Fair will continue for
five days at the Fair Grounds in
Iuka.

Those who intend to exhibit live-
stock should begin grooming their
animals and making preparations
for showing them to their best
advantage during the Fair days.

Community arts and crafts ex-
hibits, homemaking exhibits, and
farm crops exhibits should be well
along in the planning stage by this
time.

Catalogs listing classifications
and rules for exhibition are being
printed now and will soon be a-
vailable for distribution over the
county. Anyone desiring informa-
tion about the Fair may contact
the County Agent's office in Iuka.

Fair officials are making every
effort to assure this will be the
largest and best Fair to date. Leon-
ard Phillips of Dennis, president
of the Fair Association, stated that
"two tents, 16x32 feet, have been
purchased for use at the Fair
grounds. These are in addition to
those already in service. Commu-
nities that are planning to put
in a Community Booth should notify
the County Agent's office by
Sept. 1. Some space will also be
available for commercial exhibits."

Mr. Phillips emphasized the im-
portance of making the livestock
exhibits as large and complete as
possible in order to qualify for
greater reimbursement from the
state and enable the Fair to grow
in scope and importance each year.
"The Fair Association receives
reimbursement from the state on
the number of animals exhibited
each year," Mr. Phillips continued.
"If the number of animals exhibit-
ed each year increases, our State
Aid will increase," he said.

Mr. Phillips also stated that san-
itary facilities are needed at the
Fair grounds. "We are in need of
some outdoor toilets to be placed
on the grounds," he said. "If you
have an abandoned WPA toilet
and wish to donate it to the Fair
Grounds, we will be glad to move
it," he concluded.

Other than the community and
livestock exhibits, the Fair will
feature a Carnival and Side Shows
and other entertainment features.

SOMETHING OF VALUE

Along about this time every year, almost all of us are involved or affected in one way or another by "school opening." The county schools have been in session about four weeks now, and the Iuka Special Municipal Separate School District is making ready to open its doors to "eager" pupils.

The opening of school in the fall and the closing of school in the spring are the two times in the year when the community is more aware of the subject than perhaps at any other time.

It is usually in the spring when commendations are made, appreciations are expressed, and the accomplishments of our children under the guidance and tutelage of school administrators and teachers, are an indication of the value of schools to the community.

However, the "opening of school" is just as good as a time as any, perhaps better, to consider for a moment the worth of our schools, not alone in what they mean to the students, but what they represent as treasure belonging to the people of the county.

Whether you have a child or grandchild or none at all in the school system, either of the county or of the Separate School district, as a citizen and taxpayer of this county you have treasure, real money treasure, tied up in the several school plants and equipment.

An official estimate of the money-value of all school properties, including transportation, in Tishomingo county, sets a figure of "around 2-million dollars." It could possibly run more, if a break-down on individual schools were made.

As "owners" of these schools, we should look upon them with the pride of proprietorship and take every care to see that they are managed, kept up, and preserved as something of great value.

As our children go back to school, some of them in brand new buildings, all of them in good buildings, we have a duty to instruct them, not only to study hard and mind the teachers, but to TAKE CARE OF THE SCHOOL PROPERTY we have provided for them. It is as important for the pupil to learn to respect public property as it is for him to learn to add two-and-two. In fact, by the time he can put two-and-two together, he ought to already know his responsibilities in respect to the school where he learned to add.

The examples we set our children have far greater effect than we sometimes realize. If we instill in them respect for public property, they in turn will teach their children that same respect. We need to teach our children that the schools where they spend their days are "our property," and in time, will be "their property." When the time comes for them to pay the taxes that renovate, rebuild or replace the schools where their children must go, the obligations will be great or small according to the care the property had received in the years past.

We have indeed, something of value in the school properties in Tishomingo County. They are not only a material treasure, but a trust to be held for future generations. We should teach our children to regard them as such.

TCEPA Joins In Gold Medallion Homes Program For This Area

The Tishomingo County Electric Power Association has received authorization from the Medallion Home Committee of the National Electrical Manufacturers Association to operate the Gold Medallion Home Program in this area.

Cecil H. Brown of the TCEPA explained that, "the key element in this new program is a three-inch gold medallion which is permanently placed on homes that meet or exceed the requirements set up for wiring, lighting and appliances. The Medallion Home Committee set up the standards under which the program will operate throughout the Tennessee Valley area.

To meet requirements for a Gold Medallion home, appliances shall be all electrical and must include the following: Electric heat (resistance or heat pump, properly engineered for the complete home); water heater; range; refrigerator;

one other major appliance. Lighting must meet "Light for Living Standards." Wiring must meet requirements of National Electrical Code, local codes and the Residential Wiring Handbook of the National Wiring Bureau.

"When one of our consumers builds or buys a home which can display a gold medallion," Mr. Brown said, "he can be sure he's getting a good home, regardless of the price he pays."

Stating The Case For Sec. Benson

With the political campaigning occupying the center of national attention, the loneliest man in Washington could be Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson.

He could be compared to the captain of a ship tossed by a storm of controversy, and from which many of the crew have mutinied and deserted. Many of his some four million farm passengers are discontented.

The Republican party which placed him in command of agriculture did not invite him to give

advice in developing a farm program for the 1960 campaign platform. He volunteered no advice. Almost eight years ago Benson set out bravely to chart a new course for American farmers, with his destination a "free" independent and self-reliant agriculture. He has never wavered from that course.

He has sailed in troubled waters. Against a trend of rising national prosperity, farm income has gone steadily and alarmingly downward. Non-farm income, in terms of what wages and salaries will buy, has increased since 1952 by almost 20%, but farmers' purchasing power has declined by one-third.

No Compromise

Benson, whatever his legion of critics may say of him, has never been accused of compromising his convictions, or of losing faith in the rightness of his policies. When you are right, he has said, you shouldn't compromise with wrong. It is wrong, he insists, for the government to tell farmers how many acres they can plant, or how many bushels they can market, and to fine or imprison those who do not obey.

It is wrong, he contends, for the government to guarantee farmers prices that encourage excess production that builds surplus stocks higher and higher. It is wrong to take money from the Treasury to pay farmers not to produce, or to over-produce, he believes.

Since 1953 Benson, as head of the Department of Agriculture, has spent more than \$40 billion. That is more than the Department spent in the 90 years that elapsed from the date of its establishment to Benson's appointment.

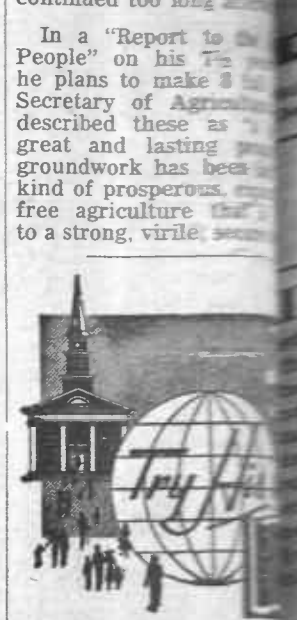
From Bad To Worse

Despite an Agriculture Department

ment budget that has declined from \$11 billion a year, net farm income last year was less than half the 1959 level. More than two million farms each year better paying city taxes.

While many of them have become disillusioned, Benson has never wavered. He contends that the solution is the result of action enacted before continued too long.

In a "Report to the People" on his 72nd birthday, Benson described these as great and lasting grounds for pride in the kind of prosperous free agriculture that to a strong, virile, secure



Moeller Manufacturing To Move To Greenville
Moeller Manufacturing Company, Inc., Racine, Wisconsin, will move its entire operation to Greenville around the end of the year, according to an announcement by Moeller executive vice president Richard Peterson.

The industry, which manufactures stoppers for thermos and other bottles, is expected to employ initially 20 to 30 people in its 20,000 square foot Greenville plant. The building will be financed by the company and located on five acres of land in the Greenville industrial park.

"Changes in the company's products and markets were the main consideration in the move," Peterson said. "Furthermore, favorable location and tax considerations influenced the company's move."

New Poultry Plant Opens At Hattiesburg
Formal opening and dedication ceremonies were held at Hattiesburg July 2 for the Forrest Farms poultry plant, a division of the Merchants Company.

Approximately 3,200 birds are processed by the plant every hour. Approximately 135 employees are needed to operate the plant at maximum production. Other operations of the processing plant include a hatchery, hen production, broiler production and feed service.

Union Election Fails In West Point Plant

Employees of Bryan Brothers Packing Company, West Point, have voted 232 to 155 against unionizing the plant. The National Labor Relations Board announced the results of the election which involved the AFL-CIO Amalgamated Meatcutters and Butcher Workers Union. The election marked the third of West Point's three major industries to turn down efforts to organize employees.

Tupelo's Newest Plant To Manufacture Poison

Tupelo's newest industry, Cowley's Rat and Mouse poison manufacturing plant, will begin operations this month, according to company head, Jack Cowley. A liquid poison will be manufactured at the Tupelo plant, and Cowley said that he hoped operations would be expanded by the end of the year. The product is nationally distributed through retail outlets.

Kosciusko Featured In Company Publication

Kosciusko was the subject of a feature story in the latest issue of "The Magocene," house organ of the Magnet Cove Barium Corporation of Houston, Texas. The company maintains a plant at Kosciusko which manufactures "Magobar"—trade name for bentonite clay. The clay is mined from Attala County soil, powdered, dried and packaged for shipment to found-

ries for use as molds.

New Lexington Plant Plans Expansion

Lexington's Black Creek Charcoal Company, which made its first shipment of Charcoal Briquets on May 27, is in the process of expansion, according to an announcement by Herbert Hyman, owner of the plant.

Hyman said that construction had begun on a warehouse which will contain over a half million

cubic feet of storage space. A railroad spur will also be built to the new ware house.

Six kilns with 60-cord capacity have been built at the processing plant, and kilns have also been built at various locations throughout the state to furnish the processing plant with raw charcoal. In production at present are six kilns at Kosciusko, with others being built at Bruce, Shuqualak, Sattaria, Crystal Springs and Port Gibson.

Vision and Call

Lesson for August 14, 1960

THE ROMAN CATHOLIC name for it is "vocation;" the Protestant name for it is "calling." They mean just the same thing. It is a call of God to a man or woman to a special service. Protestants and Catholics as well are now beginning to expand the meaning of the word. It is being used by many, though others are slow to see it. God may call a man to be a pastor or a farmer, just as well as to be a minister of the Gospel. No Christian, surely, any business permanently in a job. God does not want him to. The more you believe in the God of God, the better you can see that it is really not good at all to go your own way without asking what God's will is. The wiser believe God is, the more eager will be to learn what he has to do.

When Half-Gods Go

When half-gods go, the gods arrive," a poet said. Let us say that again: When half-gods go, then the gods arrive. How did God arrive to us? That man was perhaps the most famous, certainly one of the most distinguished of the Hebrew prophets. How the call of God came to him, he tells us in chapter 6 of the book of his prophecies. In the ways the story is hard to understand; but in other ways we put it into a modern dress, so speak, and get a good deal from it. He put it shortly, Isaiah's call came when he saw the Lord. But how did he see the Lord? He says it so that all his readers can identify it. "In the year that King Uzziah died I saw the Lord," he writes. That was like 1865 or so, when two great presidents, King Uzziah had not been a great king, but he had been a great man. People had leaned on him as they always lean on a "strong image," whether a Lincoln or a DeGaulle or any other. Isaiah (being out of the drawers in his country, a friend of the royal family) had leaned on the good king Uzziah. When he died, Isaiah was ready for vision God had not sent him. God became real to him, in the time of disaster and loss, as he not seemed real before.

Isaiah was not carried away by a vision when he saw God. The vision of the Divine Majesty (as the saints have learned can be a terrible experience. The first thing Isaiah feels is shame for his sins which God deals with not washing them away but by taking them away. To put this in common language, perhaps too common: Isaiah has to begin by being right with God. God was taking him to be a prophet, or as we say, a preacher. An important part of a preacher's business is to condemn men's sins. But no preacher can lead others to the forgiveness of God who has not that forgiveness himself. No preacher has the right to condemn men's sins if he spares his

Sense of Human Need

A Christian leader, being asked for a "call of God" is, replied: "It consists in realizing a need, realizing one's own ability to meet that need." So it was with Isaiah. He hears the voice of God saying "Who will go . . . ?" and he answers, "Here am I; send me." All God's messengers and servants have heard literal sounds that could have taken off on a tape recording machine. But the point is the same: Men are seldom ever aware of the needs of the world until God has touched them. What is it to be a minister of the Gospel? Without that strong call of God, a minister is only a career man who makes a living by preaching rather than by the hogs or selling lightning-bolts. Without the vision of God, a man asks the same questions about the ministry that he asks about any old job: What does it pay, how about promotions, what's my chance to be rich and famous? But once God has touched a man, the ministry is seen as a challenging opportunity to be a man, and to help others to be men, regardless of salary or other things. All the questions vanish when I'm

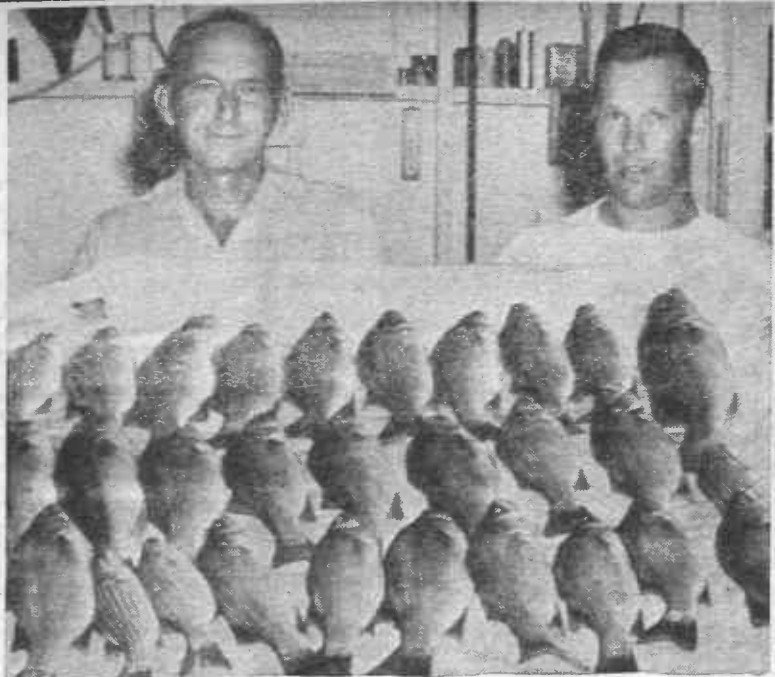
J. C. F. Curtis In Navy Maneuvers

SS Pays \$547,284 In County

Over 100% Increase In Beneficiaries Noted In Past Three Years

Old-Age survivors and disability insurance benefits amounting to \$547,284 a year were being paid to 1073 beneficiaries in Tishomingo County at the end of 1959, according to Hugh D. Tigrett, Manager of the Tupelo Social Security District Office. The number of beneficiaries increased by 94 since February 1959, the last previous date for which Tishomingo county figures are available, he said.

For the entire state of Mississippi, old-age, survivors, and disability insurance payments at the end of December 1959 were being paid to 143,507 beneficiaries at the rate of \$6,399,687 per month. During the last 3 years the number of people drawing social security benefits in Mississippi has increased over 100%. This is the largest increase of any State in the Nation during the same period.

Nationally, about 13-3/4 million persons were receiving old-age, survivors, and disability insurance monthly benefits at the end of 1959 at an annual rate of more than \$10 billion. Almost half a million disabled-worker beneficiaries and their dependents receiving benefits at a yearly rate of over \$400 million are included in the figures for 1959.

Although there is a continuing increase in the number of people drawing, and the amount of benefits being paid, there are still people living in Tishomingo County who are entitled to social security benefits but have not applied for them. Mr. Tigrett urged anyone who may have questions about the Social Security Law to contact the representative who visits the Court House in Iuka every Monday afternoon.

AN OPEN LETTER TO THE PUBLIC FROM THE NORTHEAST MISSISSIPPI JUNIOR COLLEGE . . .

1. Extending and broadening its offering in industrial and trade education. To train adults of all age levels in skills for employment in one of the industries already located or coming into Northeast Mississippi.
2. In cooperation with local businesses and industries, offer short courses for their employees. Courses designed to increase the efficiency, knowledge, and skills of employees in their own field of work.
3. In cooperation with the Mississippi State Department of Education, provide for adults a program of accelerated high school courses by which they may complete their high school education and receive the Certificate of Equivalency of high school graduation.
4. Offering a program of lectures, seminars, discussion groups, musical activities, and other educational activities to respond to the needs and interest of adults in Northeast Mississippi.

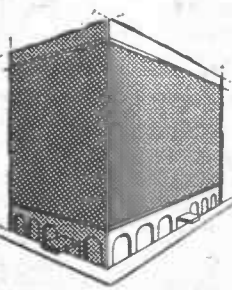

Resolution providing for the assessment and collection of municipal valorem taxes on motor vehicles by the County Tax Collector.

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Mississippi, by its act of August 1958 and at its regular session by Senate Bill No. 10, made certain changes in the provisions for the assessment and collection of ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles by which municipalities of the State, among other things, may make use of an assessment schedule of motor vehicles to be annually prepared and provided to the taxing authorities by the State Tax Commission, as provided by Section 10 of House Bill No. 3, or may prepare and make up their own assessment schedule for such motor vehicles; and providing that municipalities may collect to have the county tax col-

lectors in the respective counties collect the ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles accruing to such municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the said House Bill No. 3 of the Regular 1958 Session of the Legislature and Senate Bill No. 1874 of the Regular 1960 Session of the Legislature have been considered by the Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, and it appearing to be to the best interest of said Village that the Mayor and Board of Aldermen proceed to take advantage of the provisions of said Bill permitting the County Tax Collector to make collection of the ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles for said municipality so as to permit the County Tax Collector to make collection within said Village, and the Mayor and Board of Aldermen being fully advised:

IT IS, THEREFORE, HEREBY RESOLVED AND ORDERED, As follows, to-wit:

SECTION 1. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, elects to make use of the assessment schedule for motor vehicles to be prepared and provided by the State Tax Commission, as provided by Section 10 of House Bill No. 3 of the Regular 1958 Session of the Mississippi Legislature, and as amended as the basis for the assessment and collection of ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles located within its jurisdiction.

SECTION 2. Said assessment schedule for the year 1960 has not yet been prepared, adopted and disseminated by the State Tax Commission and acting under Section 24 of the aforesaid House Bill No. 3, the State Tax Commission has passed an order postponing the preparation of said schedule to a date fixed therein and extending the time fixed by Section 11 of said Act wherein the municipalities shall examine and consider said schedule and take action directed by said Section of said Act. All action relative to

said schedule, as directed by said Act, is, therefore, hereby deferred until said schedule shall have been prepared and provided to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi.

SECTION 3. All proceedings heretofore taken by the officials, officers and agents of the Village of Paden, Mississippi to assess or in the assessment of motor vehicles for ad valorem taxes for the year 1960 are hereby rescinded and cancelled.

SECTION 4. It is the desire of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, to have the County Tax Collector of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, collect the motor vehicle ad valorem taxes of the Village of Paden, Mississippi at the same time and in the same manner that said County Tax Collector collects the county and state ad valorem taxes on such motor vehicles, as provided in Section 15 of said House Bill No. 3, of the Regular Session of the Legislature of 1958 as may be amended by Senate Bill No. 1874 Miss. Legislature 1960 and that he receive fees for his services in making such collection as set out in the aforesaid Section.

SECTION 5. Certified copies of this Resolution shall be prepared by the Clerk of this Board and furnished to the Tax Collector of Tishomingo County, Mississippi; to the State Tax Commission and to the Motor Vehicle Comptroller of the State of Mississippi.

Alderman R. C. Barrett seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and, the question being put to a roll call vote, the result was as follows:

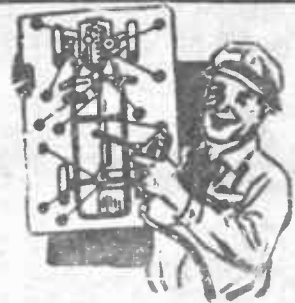

August In The
Garden

August, our first big fall garden
planting month, is here. Gardeners
could get a "stand" of many
plants in September, October and
November, but frost dates are our
guides for planting the fall crops.

Gardens in general were pretty
good this spring, even though a
bit late with harvesting continu-
ing into the summer. However, high
temperatures, hot and dry winds
took their toll of a lot of vege-
tables.

Home gardens have been in the
process of doing some "cleaning-

out" for the past 30 days and mak-
ing ready for some fall planting
this month. September, too, will
be a big planting month for some
of the shorter maturing vegetables.

One good fall crop which most
gardeners overlook is Irish pota-
toes. Spring harvested potatoes
may be used for seed, if regular
seed cannot be located. Frost is
a most definitely limiting factor
in the production of this crop.
Plant August 1-10 in North Mis-
sissippi, August 10-20 in Central
Mississippi and August 15-25 in
deep South Mississippi. Seed can
and should be sprouted two to
three weeks before planting.

August 1-15 planting will con-
sist of tomato plants, snap
and pole lima beans, Chinese cabbage
and rutabagas. August 15-31 addi-
tional crops can be added to the
list. These will include turnips,
mustard, bush snap and lima beans,
onions, tendergreens, cauliflower
plants, lettuce, parsley and cab-
bage. Carrots, beets and chard can
be planted throughout August.

Last summer and early fall usu-
ally bring a desire for some good,
fresh mustard and turnips. The
old-fashioned turnip and mustard
bed should be well prepared, three
or four pounds of nitrate broad-
cast per 1,000 square feet and
worked into the soil, seed sown
and covered very lightly. A good
watering for the bed may be nec-
essary if a drouth period is on.

Here are other August jobs for
the active gardener:

1. Cut okra back to about three
feet in height if the stalks are
bare and foliage and blooms
are only in the top.
2. Save a supply of dry peas,
beans and hot pepper for win-
ter use.
3. Keep up the insect control
program.
4. Water and mulch when and
where needed.
5. Fertilize and cultivate lightly.
6. Prepare a few more rows for
September planting.

A little extra care of the sum-
mer carry-over vegetables such as
eggplant, sweet and hot pepper,
okra, tomatoes and pole lima beans
will help fill the fall garden. These,
with a generous selection planted

this month and next, should give
you a green garden for Thanks-
giving and Christmas.

Don't use old habits on new
equipment. When a recipe for pre-
paration of string beans in a pres-
sure sauce pan states to cook 5
minutes, cooking 20 to 30 minutes
as one usually does when using a
boiler, results in less palatable
and nutritious beans.

An adequate diet provides suf-
ficient vitamins for most people.
If you think you or your family
need more vitamins, consult a
doctor; do not prescribe vitamins
for yourself or your family.

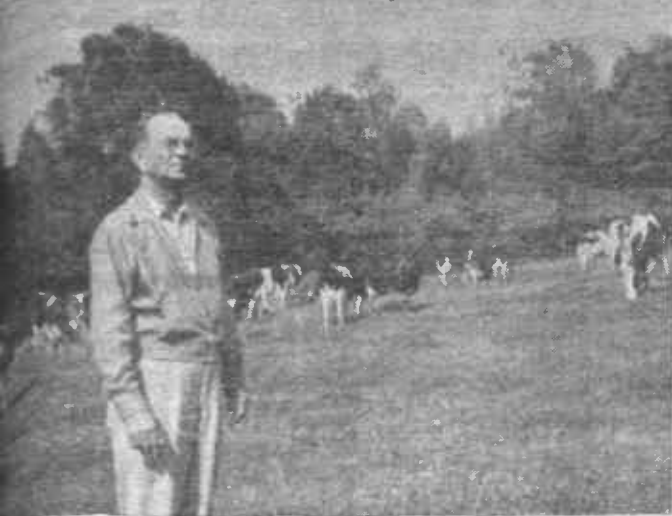

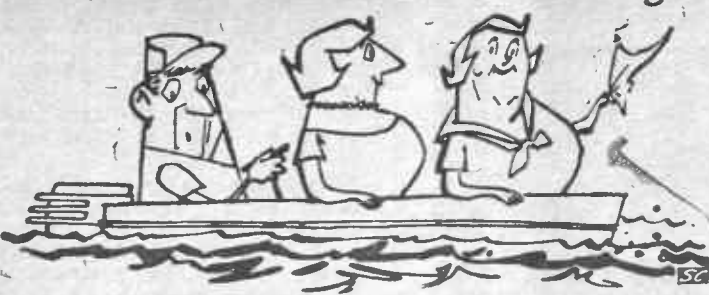

THIS WEEK —In Washington

With
Clinton Davidson



The next three or four weeks in Washington will separate the politicians from the statesmen.

Congressmen will be put to the acid test of their stature during the extra session that started Monday for Senators and the following Monday for Members of the House of Representatives.

The temptation to make campaign speeches on the floor of the Senate and House during consideration of important legislation will be too much for all but the most stout-hearted. Many will yield to that temptation.

Washington weather in August, at best, is not conducive to calm deliberation and unhurried action. Congressmen, already weary and worn from six months of sessions and one of political conventions, will be impatient to get back home for the campaigning.

The legislation to be considered, and the issue to be debated, will be supercharged with temptations for damagocracy. Some are sure to succumb. Others, by their words and votes, will rise above political

considerations.

Votes in "Them Thar Bills"

Of the half dozen or so important legislative measures to be considered, all are loaded with potential votes for those who are tempted to place political advantages above the national interest. Democrats in charge of both houses hope to give their presidential candidate a boost, and also to enhance their re-election prospects, by passing at least four major pieces of legislation.

Medical care for the aged is No. 1 on the list of bills which the Democratic leadership wants as a "show piece" for the election campaigning. This would be financed through an increase in Social Security taxes.

The expectation is that President Eisenhower will veto such a bill, but to do so would put many Republican candidates in the position of seeming to be unsympathetic with the problems of the aged and ill.

A vast program of Federal aid for increased housing has tremendous vote-appeal and congressional leaders hope to cash in whether, as expected, it is vetoed, or not.

More Inflation

Adding to a 7 1/2% wage increase for Federal workers voted during the regular session, the Democratic leadership plans to push through a higher minimum wage for some 40 million factory workers. They want the minimum raised from \$1 to \$1.25 an hour.

but may settle for \$1.15.

The result is likely to be another over-all increase of around 5% in the cost of manufactured goods, followed by a "cost-of-living" increase in all wage scales.

Another measure on the list of "must" legislation for the special session is Federal money for a greatly accelerated program of school construction. There is no question of the urgent need for more and better schools; only that of whether they should be financed from local and state funds or from Federal appropriations.

One of the most critical of domestic problems—that of farm legislation—is not on the agenda. Congress was unable to agree on what should be done at the regu-

lar session and isn't expected to do anything at the extra session.

Nevertheless it is expected that a majority of Congress will rise above political considerations and vote in the national interest. We also hope that voters in November will re-elect those who place national interest above temporary personal gains.

Cotton Insects

Don't let up on the boll weevil now. On most farms it has been kept under good control so far, but there is still a chance of big build up before the cotton is safe.

Migration of weevils is expected to begin around August 15-20. Most of the weevils will be coming from cotton farms, where in many cases inadequate control was carried out.

Remember, to follow all recommendations for safe and effective insect control. Read and follow directions on labels. Keep a close watch for red spiders. They are appearing in most sections of the

county.

Winter Grazing

Winter grazing is more important this year than in many due to the severe shortage of stored roughage.

You can expect your earliest winter grazing from oats and second from wheat.

Start following land now for early September plantings. Dairy farmers especially should fertilize the first planting highly.

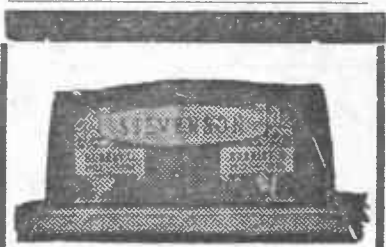
If you are buying out seed make sure that you get treated seed, or treat it yourself with Ceresan for leaf blight.

For good spring grazing consider ryegrass. It makes excellent spring grazing when planted and fertilized lightly in the fall and fertilized heavily in the spring.

Boys Conservation School
The boys attending Boys Conservation School last week reported a good time and a lot of good training during the week. In the write up last week, Earl Walker, sponsored by Southern Timber Management Company wasn't mentioned. We are glad Earl and Southern Timber Management had a part in the Conservation School.

Dog Ticks
Dog ticks are increasing rapidly. When you see ticks on your pet, don't pull the tick off with your hands. If you mash the tick you are running the risk of catching tick fever. Use tweezers or forceps to remove ticks from pets.

Insecticides to dust on dogs are 10% DDT, 10% Chlordane, or 5% Malathion. You may dip dogs in 25% Diazinon Emulsifiable Concentrate at the rate of 5 table-spoons per two gallons of water or 50% DDT wettable powder. Use 1 cupful of 50% DDT to 3 gallons of water. Three table-spoons of lindane wettable powder and 3 gallons of water will provide control
