Forestry Bank To Aid Landowners

Mississippi Agency Accepting Applications For Financial Help

Mississippi's new Forestry Bank is accepting applications from landowners who desire financial help in planting seedlings or in their timber.

E. H. Hobbins, executive director of the Forestry Bank, announced this week that applications for information books can be obtained now from Forestry Bank personnel, county agents, other agricultural agencies throughout the state, in addition to obtaining them from the Forestry Bank.

Landowners are most grateful for the assistance extended by these agencies in helping the Forestry Bank program get underway. "Applications and information materials are now being sent to landowners from the district and area agents, county agents and others, and we would like to urge interested landowners to contact them at the earliest possible date."

The Forestry Bank was created by the 1960 Legislature to provide financial assistance to landowners who are interested in the Forestry Bank. The Forestry Bank will do for forestry what the BAWI act has done for forestry in Mississippi," Hobbins said.

The Forestry Bank provides a landowner may receive \$500 in timber development assistance if he uses the Forestry Bank to supplement funds he receives from the ASC timber development program. If a landowner is not to use ASC funds, he is authorized as much as \$1,000 in timber development assistance through the Forestry Bank. Mississippi has nearly 6,000,000 acres and the potential for timber and the income we receive from timber and timber products."

Hobbins said, "The Forestry Bank is established to help landowners in this idle land into active production as rapidly as possible, and it is not necessary for landowners actually leave their land to be improved. The condition of participation in the Forestry Bank, a landowner must have an interest in the land for at least 10 years during which time the Forestry Bank will manage the land."

It is a service which will be the good management of the land. Hobbins said, "I hope landowners will check into this and the benefits they can receive from participation in the Forestry Bank."

Conservation Checks Going To County Farmers

Tishomingo County farmers who have participated in the soil and water conservation practices and received approval of their completed projects under the 1960 Agricultural Conservation program, have begun to receive checks to cover the Government's portion of the program, E. N. Allen, office manager of ASC in Luka, said today.

The payments being received now are for approved practices which were completed before June 30, and payment applications made the first part of July.

Mr. Allen explained that some farmers who carried out conservation practices will not receive checks because the Government's share of that cost of the practice was advanced on the purchase order for the farmer to obtain needed lime and fertilizers or to pay for timber stand improvement and earth moving work.

Under the Agricultural Conservation Program, which is administered locally by the county office in Luka, Tishomingo County farmers pay approximately 50% of the cost and furnish the necessary machinery and labor to complete the practice, with the Government paying the remainder.

County farmers who are interested in carrying out the approved conservation practices under either the 1960 or 1961 Agricultural Conservation Program should contact the local county office in Luka sometime between the dates of August 29 and September 9, 1960.

Former Miss. Governor Leaving Retirement To Boost Industry

Hugh L. White, twice Governor of Mississippi, father of the State's great BAWI program who conceived and organized the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, and long-time industrialist, is coming out of his self-imposed retirement to become Chairman of the Board of Directors of Mississippi Industries, Inc.

"Mississippi Industries, Inc., is a newly chartered corporation which has for its objectives the development of the state's manufacturing enterprises employing Mississippi money, know-how and people," Mr. White said, when announcement of his chairmanship was made.

"In the main, we hope to fortify our small towns and cities with locally operated industries. Some of these might be established local plants that need capital funds for expansion. The corporation will afford local citizens the opportunity to invest in their local industries thus keeping both money and profits at home."

Plans are already under study in several communities for certain enterprises, it was said.

Grand Jury Returns 42 True Bills, A Record Number For This County

The August term of Tishomingo County Circuit Court convened Monday at the courthouse in Luka. J. Hollis Brown, attorney of Itawamba County, is acting as presiding judge by appointment of Gov. Ross Barnett, taking the place of Judge Raymond T. Jarvis, Circuit Court Judge of the 1st Circuit Court district of which Tishomingo County is a part. Judge Jarvis could not preside at this session because of illness.

Other officers of this term of court are N. S. Sweat, Dist. Atty. for the First Circuit Court district; C. L. Pace, sheriff of Tishomingo County; Ivey McKnight, court reporter; J. Barry Finch, county Atty., and L. E. Robinson, Circuit Court Clerk.

Thirty-six cases were on the civil docket when court opened Monday morning, but most of the Monday session was taken up in selecting a Grand Jury and petit jury from the list of some 115 veniremen named last week.

Grand Jury Report
After being in session two days, the Grand Jury reported hearing 23 witness and returned into open court 42 true bills. This is considered a record number of indictments for the County, "one of the highest numbers ever returned," Sheriff Clarence Pace commented.

Other findings of the Grand Jury as submitted in the report follows:

"We have examined by committee the county home, county jail, all of the factories of the county, the movie theatres, the tax collector's books, and the county auditor's books.

We find the county home to be in good condition, except that the lock on the door at the north end of the building needs to be repaired or replaced. We find that the appearance of the county jail is good, but we find that some of the plumbing needs repairs, four window panes are broken, the lock on the north door is broken, and we find that there is need for a drainage ditch from the jail to the main road.

We find all the factories of the county to be in good condition and properly equipped with a sufficient number of exit doors properly marked and opening outwardly as required by law.

We find the movie theatres of the county to be in good condition and properly equipped with a sufficient number of exit doors properly marked and opening outwardly as required by law.

We find that the county auditor's books and the tax collector's books appear to be neat, well-kept and in balance.

We wish to commend and thank the Sheriff of Tishomingo County, Clarence Pace, for the very excellent manner in which he investigated and prepared the cases he presented to this grand jury."

WHAT MANNER OF TAIL IS THIS?

The example of a tail wagging a dog used to bring smiles, but today's application of this principle at both national party conventions by a tail consisting of small, demanding, liberal and controversial factions has left a lot of solid Americans agast at what can happen and is happening in our so-called democratic nation.

One trouble seems to be that brains don't occur in the tail end, and without intelligent guidance even a well-intending tail could wag a dog to death. Now we're no dog but in case you feel a vibration and share in some of these pains you may be interested in some results of the political conventions.

Just as Mississippians generally are frustrated over their lack of apparent influence these days in national politics, genuine American farmers too are steamed up over farm platform proposals that ignore commonsense recommendations.

A look at the strongly socialistic democratic farm platform, for example, is frightening. It is a return of the ghost of the old Brannon plan that was cut down in Congress after being fought on all quarters by the American Farm Bureau Federation, the largest general farm organization in existence, and, admittedly conservative.

The platform committees were told by AFBF president Charles B. Shuman, an Illinois farmer himself, that it is morally wrong to delude farmers into thinking their best long-time interests lie in policies that promise bigger government farm program benefits.

Shuman urged platforms which would offer freedom instead of control, prosperity instead of payments, and expanded markets instead of government storage.

Despite these recommendations, the Democratic platform advocates full parity income for farmers brought about by production and marketing quotas, high 90 percent of parity commodity loans, production payments, commodity purchases, marketing orders and agreements with the whole program "sympathetically" administered.

Farmers in Mississippi and the nation mostly take an opposite view—asking government to let farmers alone in order that sound business principles might prevail. They're frankly outdone over somebody letting the liberals do most all the wagging.

National Geographic To Feature Mississippi
The November issue of National Geographic magazine will feature the lower Mississippi River region. The article will spotlight Vicksburg, Greenville and Natchez. Photographs and information on the work of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Vicksburg National Military Park and other points of interest will also be highlighted. International Paper Observes

10th Anniversary At Natchez
International Paper Company this month observed the tenth anniversary of the founding of its Natchez pulp mill. Representing a \$50 million investment, the mill employs approximately 1500, and its annual payroll is about \$8 million. In addition, the plant purchases approximately \$13 million worth of pulpwood each year. During its ten years in Natchez, the plant has expanded sufficiently to double its capacity.

Community Development Program Is Readied
Mississippi towns and cities are gearing themselves for participation in a three-year statewide Merit Community Program for improvement in ten fields—beautification, education, fire protection, health and sanitation, housing and construction, longrange planning, municipal finance, police and traffic, recreation, and streets.

The program, sponsored through the Mississippi State Chamber of Commerce in co-operation with other agencies, including the Agricultural and Industrial Board, succeeds a three-year "Hometown Development Program" and incorporates lessons learned through the conduct of that project.

Meetings to interpret the program to community leaders throughout the state will be held September 13 at Jackson, September 14 at Laurel, September 15 at McComb, September 16 at Gulfport, September 20 at Cleveland, September 27 at Oxford and September 28 at Starkville.

A fulltime director, Lyle Carroll, has been added to the State Chamber of Commerce staff to handle the program.

Kimco Auto Plant Selects Winona
Kimco Auto Products, Inc., of Memphis, plans to move its brake shoe rebuilding operations to Winona, subject to approval of a Montgomery county \$200,000 BAWI bond election called for August 30, according to Lloyd Moore, industrial committee chairman of the Winona chamber of commerce. The plant to employ between 50 and 100 and will occupy a 35,000-square-foot building.

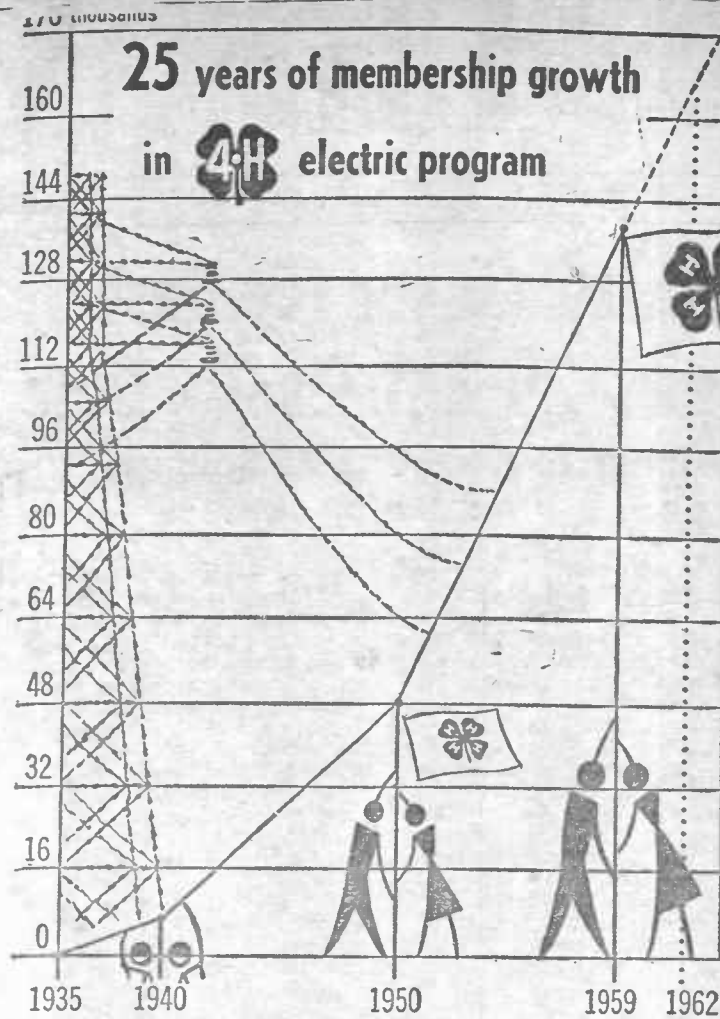
Industrial Growth Cited For Western Mississippi
Industrial development in western Mississippi for the first half of 1960 proceeded at a faster rate than any time during the past decade, according to Mississippi Power and Light Company officials. The record for January through June 1960 showed 39 new and expanded industries in the M&L service area representing 3510 new jobs and annual payroll totalling \$10,600,000.

BAWI Certificates Have Been Used

Certificates of convenience and necessity have been issued since July 1 by the A and I Board for four new industries for bond issues totaling \$2,395,000 and for two issues totaling \$570,000 in bond issues. The new industries include Southern Seating Company at Booneville, American Packing Co. at Booneville, B&S Parts at Winona and Hankins Container Corporation at Magnolia. Expansion include Haspel, Inc., at Tylertown, and Grenada Industries at Grenada.

This month marks the 25th anniversary of the 4-H Electric program sponsored by Westinghouse and the Cooperative Extension Service.

From a beginning of sporadic leadership and limited information in less than half the states, the program has developed into a highly successful activity in 50 states involving trained leaders and special educational materials.

During the last 10 years, enrollment has steadily risen from 48,000 boys and girls to the all-time high of 138,000 in 1959.

Teenagers' interest in electronics and engineering has undoubtedly spurred participation in the electric program, according to Extension surveys.

Next fall the top winner from each state will attend the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago as a guest of the Westinghouse Educational Foundation.

Cocktail Diplomacy

It is time we in America face some hard, unpleasant facts, and that we make up our minds what we are going to do about them.

Communism and the communist totalitarian form of government have been accepted by, or imposed upon, almost half of the people of the world. Our Free World is growing smaller almost day by day.

Democracy is in trouble, serious trouble, in many parts of the world. In no time in recorded history has there been so much world-wide unrest, turmoil and conflict during a time of "peace."

Christianity faces a challenge such as it has not known since persecution by the Romans almost twenty centuries ago. Communists deny and ridicule the teachings of Christ as vehemently as did the Romans.

If democracy is crushed, then Christianity will surely die. There is no freedom of religion under a communist dictator; nor does communism recognize any of the other basic freedoms of a democracy.

Spread of Marxism
Half a century ago Karl Marx, author of the communist "bible," developed a program for world conquest from which his successors have never deviated. It was, and is, a diabolical plan of deceit, dissension and subjugation to discredit, then destroy democracy and individual freedom.

Communist dictators don't want a military war for the simple reason they believe they can conquer the world without firing a shot. But, neither do they want peace, as we understand it, in the world. There is no sincerity in their talk of "peaceful co-existence."

Russia and Red China will start a shooting war only if and when they become convinced that communism cannot conquer the world by other means. Let us hope, then, that we are not got into a "hot" war out of despair of winning the "cold" war.

For the Minds of Men
World War III is a struggle between communism and democracy for the minds of men. It is an ideological battle waged with words in a propaganda war in which we have, so far, been almost entirely on the defensive. Events of the past few months

have brought into frightfully clear focus the deterioration of United States and Free World prestige in many areas of the world. We need to re-examine very closely many of the programs which make up the bulk of our basic foreign policy.

We have largely followed a program of cocktail and dollar diplomacy to win the support of governments. We have, in short, attempted to buy friends with military assistance and generous economic aid.

The communists on the other hand, have been disturbingly successful in over-throwing many of those governments by infiltration into student and labor groups. They live with and work with people while many of our diplomats

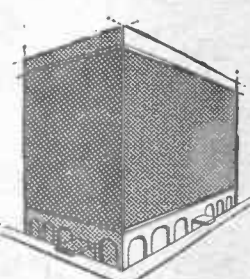

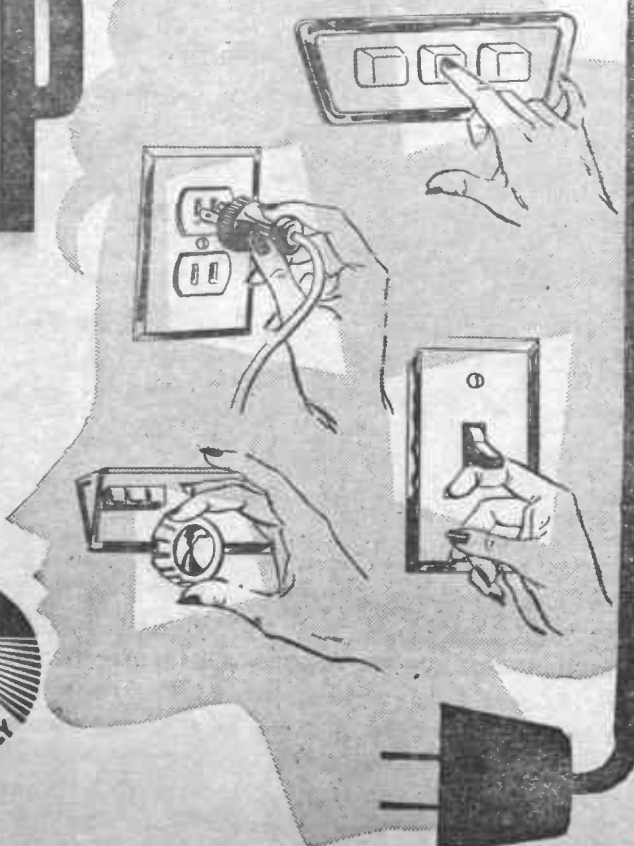

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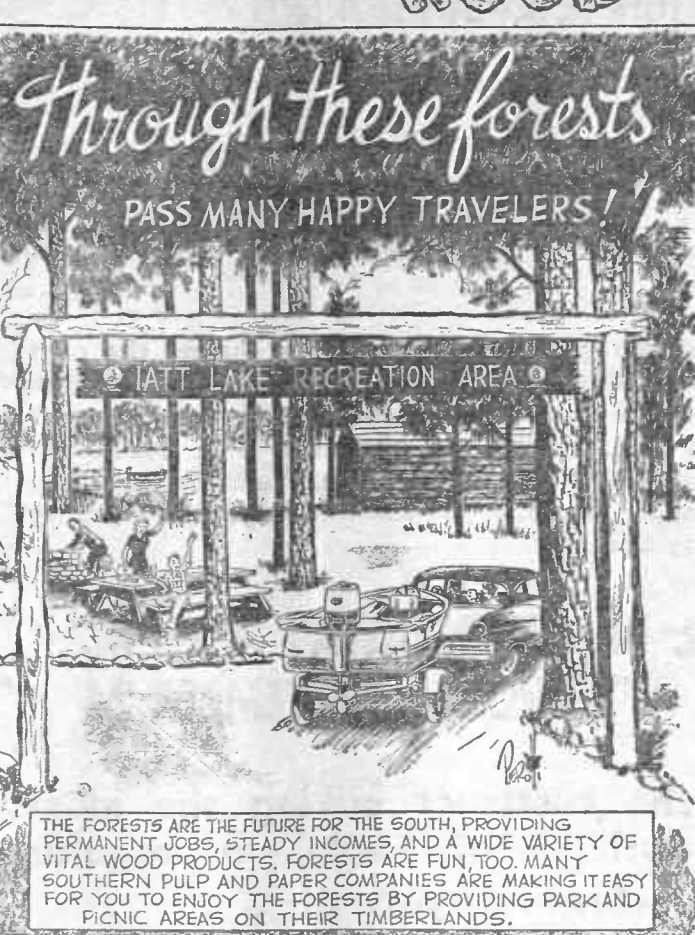

Saving Bond Sales Up in County

Tishomingo County is one of the "top 20" counties in the state averaging better than 75% of their goals set for 1960 in Savings Bonds sales, according to R. A. McKee, Jr., county chairman.

The 1960 goal has been set at \$119,000. July sales amounted to \$10,482 with the total sales to date coming to \$106,409. This represents 89.41% of the goal achieved.

The 1960 goal for the state of Mississippi has been put at \$21,600,000. Total state sales to date amount to \$13,206,414 or 61.14% of the goal.

ASC NEWS

The Commodity Credit Corporation Storage Facility Loan is available again this year to farmers who need additional storage capacity on their farms, according to Mr. Mack Sanders, Chairman of the Tishomingo Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

The loans are available to provide new farm storage facilities for most storable crops. County ASC Committees are authorized to approve applications for loans up to 80 percent of the cost of storage structures. The loans are payable in four annual installments beginning one year after the loan is made. The rate of interest is 4 percent. Applications may be filed at the County A. S. C. Office.

Since the inauguration of the Storage Facility Loan in 1949 more than 126,000 loans had been made to farmers as of April 30, 1960. The loans helped finance storage structures with an aggregate capacity of about 498,5 million bushels. Minimum Corn Support in County is \$1.11.

The price of 1960-Crop Corn in Mississippi will be supported at a minimum of \$1.11 per bushel, Mr. Sanders, Chairman of the A. S. C. County Committee, announces today.

The local rate is based on a minimum national average support rate of \$1.06 which has been determined under the requirements contained in the Agricultural Act of 1958.

The minimum is determined well in advance of harvest on the basis of preliminary information, so that the Price Support Program can get under way promptly at harvest-time. The minimum rate may be increased if the final 1960-Crop Corn support price as determined in October is higher. It will not be reduced.

As in the past, Mr. Sanders said, the Price Support Program for corn will be carried out through loans on farm—or warehouse stored corn and through Purchase Agreements. These will be available from harvest time through February 28, 1961 and will mature July 31, 1961.

To be eligible for support, corn MUST BE GRADE NO. 3 OR BETTER except that corn grading No. 4 because of test weight only will also be eligible. Corn must meet certain moisture requirements and must also be in adequate storage. Detailed information is available at the A. S. C. County Office located in City Hall Building, Iuka.

County Fair Exhibition Rules, Regulations Given

1960 Catalog Listing Classes, Prizes, Being Distributed Now

Rules for exhibitors and general regulations concerning exhibits in the 8th Annual Tishomingo County Fair, Sept. 12-17, are contained in the Fair catalog being distributed this week.

Classes and divisions of farm, home and community exhibits are listed as well as the number and classes of awards which will be made.

The general rules by which exhibitors must be guided are as follows:

1. All exhibits must be in place by 12:00 noon Tuesday, Sept. 13, except flowers, vegetables and food which must be in place by 10:00 a. m., Sept. 15.

2. Premium money will not be paid to any exhibitor outside Tishomingo County.

3. Where there is no competition, premiums will be paid according to the judges' rating.

4. The Fair management will not in any way be responsible for any damage, loss or injury.

5. All dairy and beef entries should be broken to lead in show.

6. The decision of judges or awarding committees will be final.

7. All exhibits must remain in place until noon, Saturday, Sept. 17.

Livestock Requirements

All livestock and poultry entered in the Fair must meet State health requirements and must have official health certificates issued by an accredited veterinarian. Vernon D. Chadwick, state veterinarian, gives these infectious or contagious diseases from which livestock, poultry and swine must be free before being entered.

All breeding cattle six months old and over must be accompanied by an official health certificate showing that they have passed one agglutination test for brucellosis not more than thirty days prior to the date of exhibit.

Cattle from certified herds accompanied with a valid brucellosis-free certificate issued by the Livestock Sanitary Board will not be required to have a negative test for brucellosis through 36 months of age.

Cattle vaccinated when calves under state-federal supervision with Brucella Abortus Vaccine between four and eight months of age may be admitted when accompanied by the official calfhood vaccination without a negative test for brucellosis through 36 months of age.

Nurse cattle must be accompanied with an official certificate

showing a negative test to brucellosis within 30 days prior to entry on show grounds. All nurse cows must be maintained separate from all other livestock exhibited on Fair premises.

Swine must be accompanied by official health certificate showing them to be vaccinated with hog cholera vaccine or hog cholera serum modified live virus hog cholera vaccine, or MLV hog cholera vaccine alone three weeks before entering Fair, or serum alone within 15 days of entering Fair.

In the poultry division, birds that show symptoms of disease must not be allowed to enter. Any bird that develops symptoms of disease while on exhibits in any show must be immediately removed from the show room.

All livestock and poultry developing symptoms of disease while exhibited in any show must be immediately removed.

Home Agent Notes

By Roberta L. Warren, Tishomingo County Home Demonstration Agent, Mississippi Agriculture Extension Service

If someone asked you to answer True or False to each of the three statements following this sentence, I hope you would immediately say, "False." For all three are false.

Chemical farming leads to disease. White flour, because it is enriched, is no good. Everyone needs to take vitamin pills.

They are examples of food and nutrition gossip or misinformation. Many chemicals are beneficial to food. Some of them would be harmful in large amounts but are beneficial and even necessary to health in proper amounts. The use of insecticides, antibiotics and other chemicals used in agriculture are as indispensable for high production as the modern tractor.

Your part and the farmer's part in this problem is to follow directions on the labels and to use only approved amounts.

Food Enrichment Laws
We have two food enrichment laws in Mississippi. They require that thiamine, niacin, riboflavin and iron be added to degerminated cornmeal and hominy grits and to white bread, white flour and self rising flour.

Enrichment does not affect the taste and costs very little. It causes many diets to be adequate that otherwise would be inadequate. It helps where most needed—in the diets of low-income families.

Vitamin Supplements
In 1957 Americans spent \$338,000,000 for vitamin concentrates, only about a third of which were prescribed. Doctors are highly concerned about the over-dosage of vitamins A and D, which can make you very sick.

The number of children suffering from vitamin poisoning is steadily increasing according to the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Consult your doctor; don't prescribe vitamins for yourself or your family. An adequate diet provides

What is Food Misinformation?

When we said the three statements at the beginning of this column were false, we called them examples of food and nutrition misinformation. Just what do we mean by those words—food misinformation?

It means "that which is not in line with scientific evidence to date."

Misinformation may be outright untruths, fancies or exaggerated half-truths. It may come in the form of folklore: "This is what my grandmother used to do." Or: "Mary said this diet just did wonders for her."

Learn to recognize sound information when you read or hear it. Sound information is based on up-to-date scientific research done by reliable organizations. Some of the reliable organizations are our colleges and universities and government research laboratories.

An example of scientific facts established by research laboratories of the U. S. Department of Agriculture is the Basic 4 Food Groups. If you read or hear of a reducing diet, compare the information to the Basic 4 Food Groups. If all four groups are not included in suggested amounts of food, the diet may not be a good one to follow.

BE IT REMEMBERED that the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi met in regular session on Tuesday, August 2, 1960 at 7:30 o'clock p. m., in the Courthouse in the Village of Paden, Mississippi, this being the time and place for

such meeting.

The meeting was called to order by the Mayor and opened by proclamation of the Marshal. Present were: Dexter L. Loveless, Mayor; H. O. Timbes, C. C. Defoor, R. C. Barrett, Dayton Dean and W. C. Sanders, Aldermen.

Among other business:

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen took up for consideration the matter of providing for the assessment and collection of Municipal Ad Valorem Taxes on Motor Vehicles by the County Tax Collector, and, after discussion of the subject Alderman H. O. Timbes offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION OF MUNICIPAL AD VALOREM TAXES ON MOTOR VEHICLES BY THE COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Mississippi by the adoption of House Bill No. 3 at its Regular 1958 and at its Regular 1960 Session by Senate Bill No. 1874 made certain changes in and provisions for the assessment and collection of ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles by which law municipalities of the State, among other things, may make use of an assessment schedule of motor vehicles to be annually prepared and provided to the taxing authorities by the State Tax Commission, as provided by Section 10 of said House Bill No. 3, or may prepare and make up their own assessment schedule for such motor vehicles; and providing further that municipalities may elect to have the county tax collectors in the respective counties collect the ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles accruing to such municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the said House Bill No. 3 of the Regular 1958 Session of the Legislature and Senate Bill No. 1874 of the Regular 1960 Session of the Legislature have been considered by the Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, and it appearing to be to the best interest of said Village that the Mayor and Board of Aldermen proceed to take advantage of the provisions of said Bill per-

mitting the County Tax Collector to make collection of the ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles for said municipality so as to permit said County Tax Collector to make the collection within said Village, and the Mayor and Board of Aldermen being fully advised:

IT IS, THEREFORE, HEREBY RESOLVED AND ORDERED, As follows, to-wit:

SECTION 1. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, elects to make use of the assessment schedule for motor vehicles to be prepared and provided by the State Tax Commission of the State of Mississippi, as provided by Section 10 of House Bill No. 3 of the Regular 1958 Session of the Mississippi Legislature, and as amended by the basis for the assessment and collection of ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles located within its jurisdiction.

SECTION 2. Said assessment schedule for the year 1960 has not yet been prepared, adopted and disseminated by the State Tax Commission and acting under Section 24 of the aforesaid House Bill No. 3, the State Tax Commission has passed an order postponing the preparation of said schedule to a date fixed therein and extending the time fixed by Section 11 of said Act wherein the municipalities shall examine and consider said schedule and take action directed by said Section of said Act. All action relative to said Act, is, therefore, hereby deferred until said schedule shall have been prepared and provided to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi.

SECTION 3. All proceedings heretofore taken by the officials, officers and agents of the Village of Paden, Mississippi to assess or in the assessment of motor vehicles for ad valorem taxes for the year 1960 are hereby rescinded and cancelled.

SECTION 4. It is the desire of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, to have the County Tax Collector of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, collect the motor vehicle ad valorem taxes of the Village of Paden, Mississippi at the same

SECTION 5. Certified copies of this Resolution shall be prepared by the Clerk of this Board and furnished to the Tax Collector of Tishomingo County, Mississippi; to the State Tax Commission and to the Motor Vehicle Comptroller of the State of Mississippi.

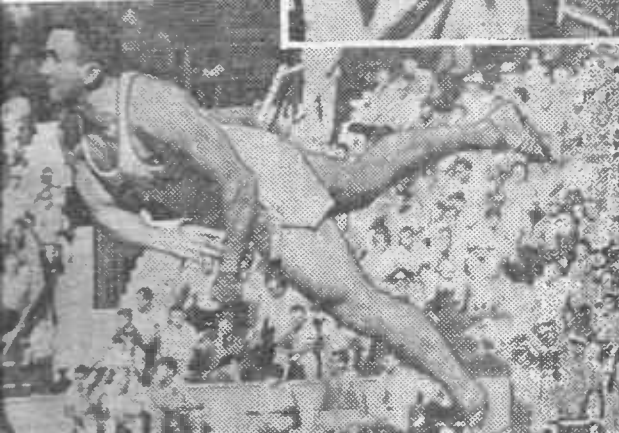

Q—I see that World War II veterans have just been given another two years in which to get a GI loan, and that at the same time VA was given new authority to make direct loans. What is the direct loan program?
A—It is a much smaller program than VA's loan guaranty program. Direct loans are made only to veterans who live in certain rural and small town areas where GI loans are not obtainable from local lenders. Eligible veterans apply directly to VA.

Q—Does the VA in Washington, D. C., have a list of all courses approved for veterans under the Korean GI Bill?
A—No. Each regional office maintains a list of State approved courses for veterans under the Korean GI Bill. To get the information, contact your VA regional office, and not VA headquarters in Washington, D. C.

Q—I am a Korea veteran, discharged in 1956, and have a disability which VA has just rated service-connected. What is my deadline for finishing vocational rehabilitation training under Public Law 894?
A—Your deadline is January 31, 1964, or nine years after separation, whichever comes first. There are exceptions to this deadline for certain veterans, but apparently they do not apply to you.

Q—I understand that special restorative training is available under the War Orphans Education program to handicapped young men and women in need of it. Does this restorative training include medical care?
A—No. Special restorative training does not include medical care. It does include special courses—such as braille reading, language retraining and the like—designed to help a person overcome his handicap so that eventually he can take regular training at school.

Q—No. Each regional office maintains a list of State approved courses for veterans under the Korean GI Bill. To get the information, contact your VA regional office, and not VA headquarters in Washington, D. C.

Driving Blunders Cited By Hiway Patrol Chief

"No driving blunder is more dangerous than improper passing." This is the opinion of Dave Gayden, chief of the Mississippi Highway Patrol's enforcement division. Traffic accidents records show improper passing to be one of the four major causes of recent Mississippi highway collisions. The other three leading causes are following too closely, failure to yield right-of-way, and improper turning.

According to Chief Gayden, an attempt to pass another vehicle where there is inadequate clearance or time is flirting with death. This violation not only results in head-on collisions, but those often unexplained "ran off the highway" accidents as well. Drivers caught in a squeeze leave the roadway to avoid a collision; and the other vehicle, which is not involved in any physical impact, does not report what has happened.

"Be extra careful passing, especially if there is a string of traffic ahead," Chief Gayden cautions. Patrolmen have been instructed to crackdown on violations which occur in their presence.

County Agent's Notes

Securing Hay
Many have asked about securing hay to meet their needs for this winter and also to supplement the short grazing we now have due to the extreme dry weather we have experienced this summer.

I have been informed that many of the Delta Farmers are planning to cut their soybean crop for hay if the demand for hay is great enough. The procedure they plan to use is to cut the hay and sell it direct from the field. The price for this hay will be from \$22.50 to about \$30.00 per ton depending on the quality of the hay. If enough farmers are interested in looking into the possibility of securing hay, we would be for a group of us to get together and go over and see what we could get before making any commitment.

The USDA reports a good hay crop in northern Arkansas and Southeastern Missouri. A lot of this hay is pure alfalfa and a mixture of Timothy grass and Alfalfa. The price on this hay FOB field will run approximately \$15.00 to \$25.00 depending on quality. There is a possibility that a deal could be made with commission companies who are trucking feeder cattle into the Midwestern States to have a load of hay on their return trip. We should make our plans now to secure hay for our cattle. Hay will be hard to find this winter and if we should have another winter like last winter, certainly hay is a must for cattle.

Soil Testing
Now is the time to get samples from your fields and send them to the State Soils Testing Laboratory at Mississippi State University for detailed fertilizer need analysis.

You can't afford to guess as to how much fertilizer and lime your lands needs. A soils test takes the guess work out of this matter. If you use too much fertilizer or too little, you lose both times.

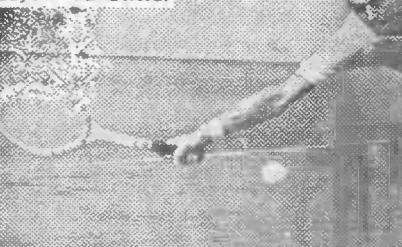

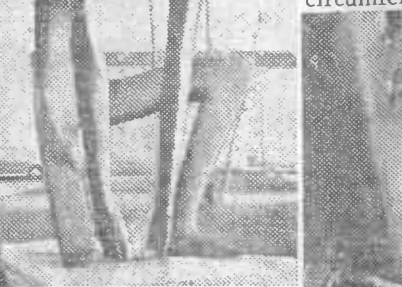

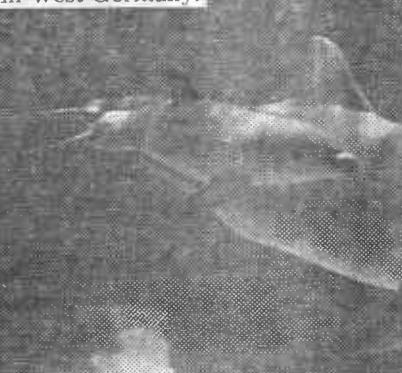

The Citation was made during the National Convention of GFWC in Washington D. C., this past June.

MFA Director Reports Rapid Progress In Mississippi Forestry Program

"With forests in Mississippi occupying 17,200,000 acres of 57% of the total area, Mississippians are vitally affected by the programs of the Mississippi Forestry Commission," said Ralph S. Taggart, president of the Mississippi Forestry Association.

In light of the charges made against State Forester C. B. Marlin, Taggart asked several members of the MFA Board of Directors to look into the progress made in the several phases of the commissions program and pledged full cooperation of the 2,000 member association in Governor Barnett's investigation into the charges.

"The forest management work of the Commission has moved forward rapidly as has the nursery program," reports MFA Director A. K. Dexter, speaking for the N. E. district of the Mississippi Forestry Commission. Included in this district are the following counties: Tishomingo, Alcorn, Benton, Tippah, Marshall, Union, Prentiss, Itawamba, Lee, Pontotoc, Monroe, and Clay. Director Dexter, is, according to Taggart, an expert in his field, and through long observation of the commission's work, data on record in MFA headquarters and other sources is in a position to make an evaluation. Mr. Dexter is Woodlands Manager, Tennessee River Plup and Paper Company, Corinth.

The Mississippi Forestry Commission management activities included management assistance to private woodland owners, giving in-the-woods advice and assistance on a forest management to nearly 10,000 owners. This includes mar-

keting assistance and selective marking of 10,942,000 board feet of saw timber and 19,502 cords of Pulpwood during the past two years, the MFA director added.

To date, Board of Supervisors in 34 counties have entered into agreements with the commission for it to act as the technical agent for sixteen section school lands. Timber sales, tree planting and timber stand improvement is being accomplished on these lands, according to the report.
