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We Locked The Barn Doors

AFTER THE HORSE WAS STOLEN

In the past few weeks the attention of the American people, along with the rest of the world, has been drawn toward central Africa, where Patrice Lumumba, the "black Castro of the Congo" has had things in a considerable uproar. During this time the little bearded Cuban, Fidel Castro, who has become the classic Western revolutionary of the decade, has been—for him—relatively quiet. It is the sort of silence that portends some skulduggery abrewing and we would do well to take our eyes off Africa and keep them focused on the dim doings of that little puppet of Moscow in Havana. The red menace on our back-door stoop poses a greater threat to our national security than the antics in the Congo could likely ever be.

It is well to recall that just before the Congo crisis erupted, Fidel Castro, in Cuba, was suddenly reported confined to his bed with "a lung ailment." His "illness" came upon him at a most opportune time. It took him out of the public eye and allowed a little quiet to settle over Cuba while the revolutionary, Patrice Lumumba, in the Congo, started the Communist ferment to work there.

Meanwhile, back in Cuba, Russian ships were unloading mysterious cargoes on the little island that has become a Communist stronghold under Fidel Castro. What the materials were that were being unloaded is still a matter of great secrecy. No Cubans were allowed to help unload the boxes and crates. Only Russian seamen handled the cargo. The materials were reported taken into the interior. What they were and what they were for is left to conjecture.

Our conjecture is that no good will come from the quiet goings-on in Cuba. We need to be alert to the threat that continues to come from Moscow's outpost a bare 100 miles from our southernmost shores. As Moscow cannot be trusted, neither can Cuba. Past experience has made that certain. What the silence in Cuba is covering up should be of more concern to us than all the noise that is coming from the Congo. Secret Russian bases in Cuba would be a deadly threat to our security. Do we know such a threat is not building in Cuba right now?

The United States dilly-dallied on the Cuban question while American properties were expropriated, American nationals were bullied, ill-treated, imprisoned, insulted. We used forbearance, Cuba answered with seizure. Finally, in exasperation, and in response to public demands for action, the United States cut the Cuban sugar quota to this country. But the damage had been done, the sugar plantations and mills belonging to Americans had been seized. American funds had been seized, American cattle ranches had been taken over. Deals already had been made with Russia to take the sugar crops, so our quota cuts, to the moment at least, have had little more effect than to aggravate Castro and give him one more thing to rant over.

We locked the barn after the horse was stolen, so to speak. Now, if we don't play the cues correctly, the secret goings-on in Cuba can well mean we'll lose the BARN when Castro goes into action again.

Veterans Corner

Q—Was the GI loan rate changed by the recent law which gave World War Two veterans another two years in which to get a loan?

A—No. The interest rate was not changed. The maximum allowable interest rate is still 5 1/2 percent.

Q—I am a Korea veteran, holding a term life insurance policy with the letters "RS" before the policy number. I understand I can exchange this policy for new type term insurance at lower cost. How do I go about it?

A—You may exchange your pre-

sent term policy for one costing about a third as much, yet with the same protection. The new term insurance must be converted to permanent plan insurance before age 50, however, if you wish protection. Write the VA office where you pay your premiums, telling them you wish to make the exchange. Be sure to give your present policy number.

Q—I am a World War Two veteran applying for pension for the first time. Do I have to include my wife's income in reporting my own income for pension purposes?

A—The first \$1200 of your wife's income need not be included but all over that available

to you should be. In case where that would work extreme hardship, exceptions may be made under the law.

Q—The new pension law has caused a lot of talk about just what pension is and what is compensation. Will you define each kind of payment, as it applies to living veterans?

A—Compensation is payable to eligible veterans whose disabilities are DUE to service. Pension is payable only to eligible veterans whose total and permanent disabilities are NOT DUE to service.



A Summary of Current Events Contributing to the Economic Development of Mississippi by the MISSISSIPPI AGRICULTURAL & INDUSTRIAL BOARD

Foreign Trade Importance Stressed

Strong impetus to interest in the possibilities of foreign trade was given this week to industrial, agricultural, business and financial leaders attending the Mississippi Conference on Foreign Trade, in Jackson.

The emphasis, both in the speeches and in the panel discussions, was on sale possibilities in foreign trade for the small manufacturer not able to conduct investigations in this field through his own limited staff.

A representative of the U. S. Department of Commerce answered questions relating to federal regulations governing foreign trade and on governmental assistance available in this regard.

The meeting was sponsored by the State Chamber of Commerce, the Agricultural and Industrial Board, the Mississippi Manufacturers Association, the River and Harbors Association and the Jackson Chamber of Commerce.

Hosts for the luncheon were the First National Bank, Deposit Guaranty Bank and Trust Company, and the Jackson Hinds Bank. Speakers and panelists from the International Trade Mart in New Orleans, the Dumas Miller Export Corporation, and the Merchants National Bank of Mobile took part in the program and discussion.

1960 Record Year For B. A. W. I. Bonds

A new record has already been set for 1960 in the amount of money involved in B. A. W. I. bond issues approved at the polls. Previously, 1959 had been the record year at \$11,480,000. Already this year, the bonds approved total

\$15,786,000, with four months still to go. So far this year, 34 B. A. W. I. bond elections have been held, indicating that the record of 40 such elections set in 1959 also will be broken.

Mississippi Federated Co-Operatives Proposes \$400,000 Feed Mill

Mississippi Federated Co-Operatives has announced plans to build a \$400,000 feed mill adjacent to its fertilizer plant, warehouse and grading plant at New Albany. Construction is contingent upon sale of \$125,000 MFC preferred stock. Some \$140,000 already is available for the feed mill. This amount, previously voted in a B. A. W. I. election for construction of other MFC facilities, was not needed and has been held in reserve.

MFC spokesmen said the feed mill will manufacture all types of feeds for poultry, cattle and hogs. Batesville Voters Approve Hosiery Mill Expansion

Only three votes out of a total of 462 were cast against a \$40,000 B. A. W. I. bond issue for expansion of the Batesville Company hosiery mill. Heavy demand for the company's products made expansion necessary, company officials said. Approximately 40 new employees were hired recently, and 20 more are soon to be added, according to company officials.

New Union County Plant Opens Soon

Laher Spring and Tire Company, New Albany, is scheduled to begin operations September 15, manufacturing automobile springs, batteries for auto and industrial use, automobile brake linings and electric carts. The new plant, with 120,000 square feet in four new buildings, will employ 400 at peak production. Construction was financed with an \$800,000 B. A. W. I. bond issue approved in 1958.

Applicants must be college graduates and eligible for admission to an approved graduate school of social work.

Among other business:

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen took up for consideration the matter of providing for the assessment and collection of Municipal Ad Valorem Taxes on Motor Vehicles by the County Tax Collector, and, after discussion of the subject Alderman H. O. Timbes offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION OF MUNICIPAL AD VALOREM TAXES ON MOTOR VEHICLES BY THE COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Mississippi by the adoption of House Bill No. 3 at its Regular 1958 and at its Regular 1960 Session by Senate Bill No. 1874 made certain changes in and provisions for the assessment and collection of ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles by which law municipalities of the State, among other things, may make use of an assessment schedule of motor vehicles to be annually prepared and provided to the taxing authorities by the State Tax Commission, as provided by Section 10 of said House Bill No. 3, or may prepare and make up their own assessment schedule for such motor vehicles; and providing further that municipalities may elect to have the county tax collector in the respective counties collect the ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles accruing to such municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the said House Bill No. 3 of the Regular 1958 Session of the Legislature and Senate Bill No. 1874 of the Regular 1960 Session of the Legislature have been considered by the Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, and it appearing to be to the best interest of said Village that the Mayor and Board of Aldermen proceed to take advantage of the provisions of said Bill permitting the County Tax Collector

to make collection of the ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles for said municipality so as to permit the County Tax Collector to make collection within said Village, and the Mayor and Board of Aldermen being fully advised:

IT IS, THEREFORE, HEREBY RESOLVED AND ORDERED, As follows, to-wit:

SECTION 1. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, elect to make use of the assessment schedule for motor vehicles to be prepared and provided by the State Tax Commission of the State of Mississippi, as provided by Section 10 of House Bill No. 3 of the Regular 1958 Session of the Mississippi Legislature, and as amended as the basis of ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles located within its jurisdiction.

SECTION 2. Said assessment schedule for the year 1960 has not yet been prepared, adopted and disseminated by the State Tax Commission and acting under Section 24 of the aforesaid House Bill No. 3, the State Tax Commission has passed an order postponing the preparation of said schedule to a date fixed therein and extending the time fixed by Section 11 of said Act wherein the municipalities shall examine and consider said schedule and take action directed by said Section of said Act. All action relative to Act, is, therefore, hereby deferred until said schedule shall have been prepared and provided to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi.

SECTION 3. All proceedings heretofore taken by the officials, officers and agents of the Village of Paden, Mississippi to assess or in the assessment of motor vehicles for ad valorem taxes for the year 1960 are hereby rescinded and cancelled.

SECTION 4. It is the desire of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, to have the County Tax Collector of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, collect the motor vehicle ad valorem taxes of the Village of Paden, Mississippi at the same

time and in the same manner that said County Tax Collector collects the county and state ad valorem taxes on such motor vehicles, as provided in Section 15 of said House Bill No. 3, of the Regular Session of the Legislature of 1958 as may be amended by Senate Bill No. 1874 Miss. Legislature 1960 and that he receive fees for his services in making such collection as set out in the aforesaid Section.

SECTION 5. Certified copies of this Resolution shall be prepared by the Clerk of this Board and furnished to the Tax Collector of Tishomingo County, Mississippi; to the State Tax Commission and to the Motor Vehicle Comptroller of the State of Mississippi.

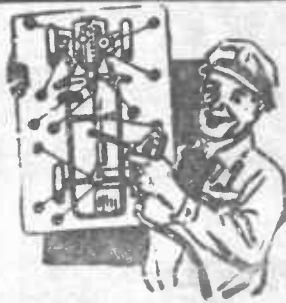

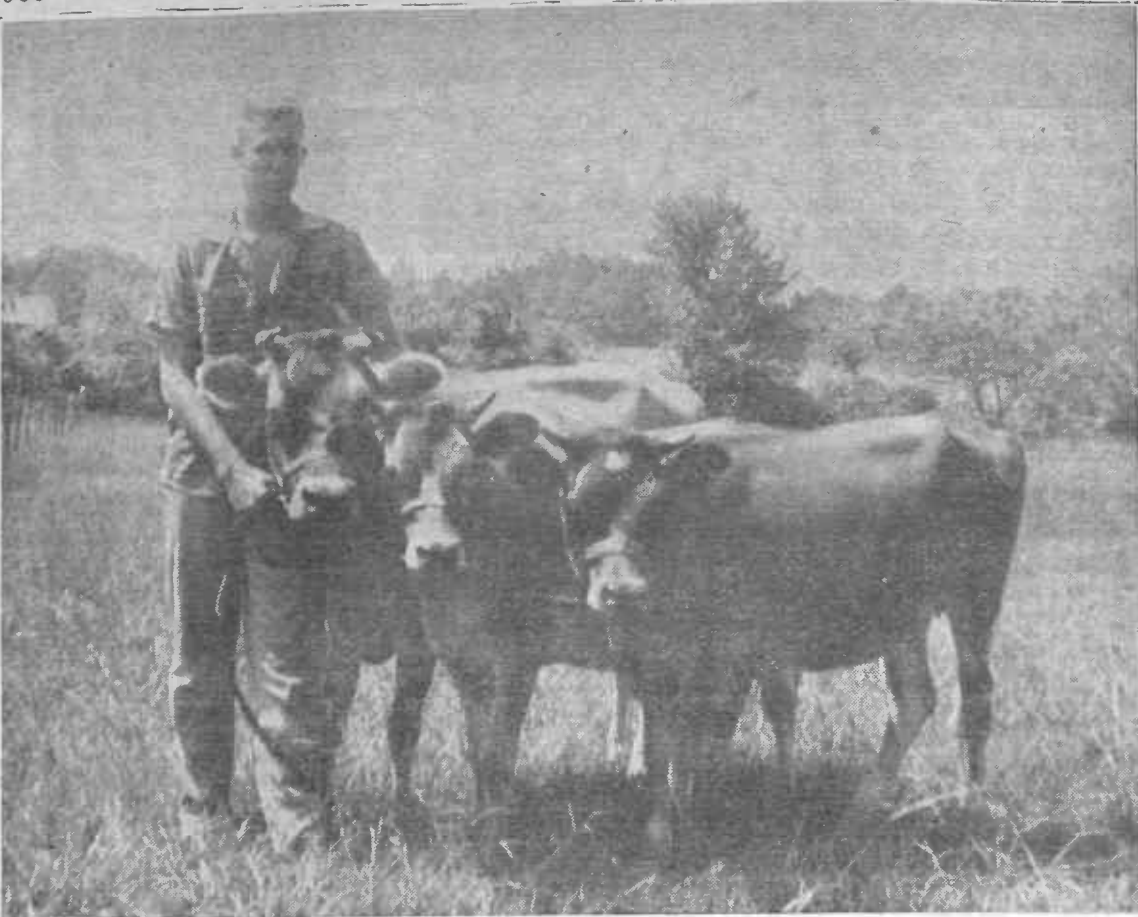

Pin-the-Tail-on-the-Donkey
Children love the game pin-the-

Buying groceries without read-
ing labels is just like a game of

tension Service consumer market-

There's a product for every pur-
pose, family and budget, she said.
And the printing on a package of
food becomes more vital as more

grade, second quality food, such as
meat, often should be used in-
stead of higher grade.

Clothing and Fabrics, Too
The labels on clothing and fab-
rics are important, too, the Cloth-

ing specialist said. Reading the
label is the only way we can have
an idea of what we are buying.
Take a look at clothing and fab-
rics available now. You can't tell
what they are made of by look or
by feel. You have to read the label.
As you read labels look for per-
formance and care information as
well as the fiber content. Do this
for fabrics as well as for ready-
made garments.

Are You Pleased?
Have you been well pleased with

coming on the market.

for it.

Winter Grazing
Are you faced with a feed prob-
lem next winter? Now is the time
you can start planning and prepar-
ing to relieve part of your feed-
ing problems by sowing winter
and spring grazing. Oats will give
us the earliest grazing of any crops
we can plant. Wheat will stand

more severe cold weather than
oats will. Rye grass will make real
good early spring grazing.

If you have corn that has been
damaged severely from dry weath-
er, you might profit by shocking your
corn and start fallowing the
land to plant early oats and other
winter grazing crops.

E. N. Allen, ASC Office Manag-
er, states that his office is now
ready to start taking requests for
winter grazing practices. They will
help with the purchase of both
seed and fertilizer to sow winter
grazing. With this aid in purchas-
ing seed and fertilizer you can
sow winter grazing without very
much cash cost on your part.

Come by the County Agent's Of-
fice or one of the other Agriculture
Workers' Office and discuss your
plans for winter grazing crops.
The last week in August and the
first week in September is a
good time to sow early grazing.

Quality Cotton
Want to sell your cotton this
fall for a good price? Sure you
do. But to do this you have got to
produce what the mills want. Here
are some things you can do now
to help insure quality cotton:

Protect the top bolls from in-
sects — worms, boll weevils and
spider mites.

Cultivate around ends of rows
or disk lightly or grade smooth.
Destroy weeds and grass.

Use fenders on ground machines
to protect bolls on lower limbs.
Do not use tar bottom pick sacks.

If you do, then you and the whole
cotton industry loses.

If you plan to hand pick your
cotton, locate hand pickers well
in advance of the picking season.
Send your mechanical picker
operator to a training school be-
fore harvest begins.

Have enough trailers on hand
to handle one day's picking. If
machine picked cotton stays in the
trailer more than 24 hours you
lose money.

Do not tramp seed cotton into
trailer. Ask the ginner to wrap
the ends of the bales.

Have your cotton classed before
you sell. Know the value of your
bale of cotton.

Farm Ponds Serve Many Purposes

By Hiram A. Jones

Farm ponds serve many purpos-
es. They supply needed water for
livestock; when properly stocked
with fish, they furnish recreation
and fish for the farm family; they
catch and hold run-off water, pre-
venting it from eroding the up-
land and flooding productive bot-
tom land; and in some few instan-
ces they can be used to irrigate
truck patches or supply water to
fire burning a farm home.

The chief purpose for a farm
home pond is to supply water for
livestock where it is needed most.

Properly located farm ponds can
insure more uniform grazing of
pasture land. Farm ponds are need-
ed in pastures not having running
water in them. Usually cattle graze
areas near a source of water more
than they do areas distant from
it. This often causes overgrazing
and erosion on part of the pasture
and not enough grazing on other
areas of the same pasture. Where
this is the case a farm pond is
needed to insure more uniform
grazing of all the pasture and the
prevention of soil erosion.

Changes Made In FHA Loans

M. Hays Woods Explains New Regulations That Benefit The Farmers

Under a recent change in the eligibility requirements for Farm Housing loans, a farmer who owns a farm that will annually produce for sale or home use at least \$400 worth of commodities may, if he meets other eligibility requirements, be able to obtain a Farm Housing loan.

Previously, according to M. Hays Woods, Farmers Home Administration County Supervisor for Tishomingo County an applicant had to own a farm that would produce a substantial amount of the operator's income.

Farm Housing loans are made by Farmers Home Administration and are used to construct and repair needed farm houses and farm service buildings. Within the past 10 years, \$148,000 has been advanced in Tishomingo County for

this purpose. Other eligibility requirements for Farm Housing loans remain unchanged.

Applicants for this type of credit may contact Mr. Woods at the County Office of the Farmers Administration located in the Tishomingo County Farm Improvement Building in Iuka.
