Mississippi homeowners, gardeners, and landscape artists who are fond of roses soon will know what variety is best for this state as work is being done in an experimental plot at Mississippi State University. The experimental garden includes some 250 plants of

72 varieties. The purpose of the garden is to determine which varieties are best adapted and recommended in Mississippi.

Larger Calf Crop Expected This Year

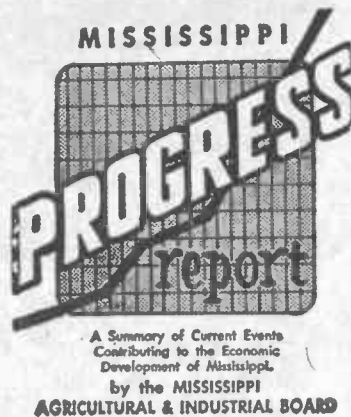

Seventh Expansion Of Grenada Plant Approved

Grenada Industries, hosiery manufacturer which has expanded facilities and production six times in its 23-year history, now will add another 50,000 sq. ft. building to its plant for the manufacture of seamless hosiery. As of August 1, the Grenada firm employed 926 people and the weekly payroll amounted to \$57,724. The expansion, assured by a successful August 13 BAWI bond issue vote, will create approximately 300 additional jobs and raise the total annual payroll to about \$3,750,000.

Grenada citizens voted to authorize the \$450,000 bond issue by a margin of 940 to 28. This example of Mississippi "attitude in action" will be brought to the attention of a national audience exceeding 2.6 million readers through the state's industrial advertising in U. S. News and World Report and Newsweek magazines.

Warren Bids For Big Industrial Gains

The harbor project at Vicksburg, now in the final stages of its basic development, will be handed over by the federal government to the Warren County Port Commission "possibly before" the January 1, 1961, target date.

An integral part of the over-all development is a fully-serviced, 245-acre waterfront industrial district. The U. S. Corps of Engineers in August completed the industrial fill segment of the project.

Planned sites advantageous to industrial operations oriented to water or water transportation greatly strengthen Vicksburg's appeal as a location for new industry.

Ingalls Delivers Two More Vessels

Ingalls Shipbuilding Corp., of Pascagoula, made August delivery of a cargo boat designed to service offshore drilling operations and the 495-foot cargo liner "SS John Lykes."

Ingalls' June delivery of the submarine "Blueback" and the "SS Joseph Lykes," and the firm's contracts for four nuclear submarines, were featured in the state's national magazine advertising columns.

The "SS John Lykes" will transport dry cargo on Lykes Lines' Gulf-to-Europe trade route. It is the fourth of five identical vessels being built for Lykes by Ingalls under a 1958 contract.

This five-ship contract was the first in the U. S. Maritime Administration's long-range program for the replacement and modernization of the American merchant marine. It also inaugurated Lykes' 53-ship replacement program.

Teen-Agers May Seek Part-Time Jobs While Attending School

Teen-agers returning to school this fall will find that state and Federal laws permit a wide choice of part-time jobs, Regional Director Sterling B. Williams of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division pointed out today.

"Sometimes the opportunity to work part-time determines whether or not a boy or girl is able to continue school," Williams said. "So long as the job meets the Federal child-labor requirements protecting the minor's health, welfare and safety, part-time employment is permissible."

"As far as this Federal law is concerned, students who have passed their 16th birthday can work in any job in any industry excepting 13 hazardous occupations where an age limit of 18 years has

been established," Williams stated. Jobs which have been banned include work on trucks, elevators and operation of certain power-driven machinery.

The child-labor law prohibits the employment of any boy or girl under 14 years of age, but even here there are exceptions such as newspaper carriers, caddies, baby sitters, some jobs in retail stores and service establishments, and school hours.

"There is, of course," Williams continued, "a much wider selection of jobs open to 14-and-15 year olds. They may work in offices, do sales work and accept many jobs in fruit and vegetable packing sheds." However, working time must be limited to three hours on any school day and eight hours on a non-school day.

Boys and girls in the 14-and-15 year bracket may work a maximum of 18 hours during any week when school is in session or 40 hours when there is no school. All work must be performed between 7 a. m. and 7 p. m.

Williams also referred to frequent calls from employers wanting to assist neighborhood boys and girls with part-time jobs, but asking how to protect themselves from unintentionally violating the child-labor act.

"First, the employer should assure himself that he knows the legal minimum age for the job, asking us in cases of doubt. Next, we advise all employers to obtain and to keep on file an age certificate showing that the minor is old enough to qualify for the job. In Mississippi age certificates are issued by Louis F. Provine of the Wage and Hour Division, located at 145 East Amite Street, Jackson," he said.

Additional information concerning the application of the child-labor provisions of the Federal law may be obtained at the above office or from the Wage and Hour Division's regional office at 1401 South 20th Street, Birmingham, Alabama.

Veterans Corner

Q—Is there any special procedure for notifying my VA district office of my change of address? I have a GI insurance policy.

A—The VA encloses a special Change of Address card with the premium notices it mails to GI policy holders. Simply fill out this

card, sign and return to VA, which will change your records accordingly.

Q—Is there a deadline for starting school under the War Orphans Education program?

A—There is no deadline. You may begin school at any time, so long as you are between 18 and 23 years of age, and otherwise eligible. Under certain circumstances it's possible to begin before 18 and continue after 23.

Q—I am a World War I veteran with one dependent and may be eligible for pension under the New pension program. Just about all the money I get is from a private annuity plan. Is this considered income for VA pension purpose?

A—Payment from an annuity plan such as yours are not considered income until after you have received an amount equal to what you yourself contributed to the plan. Annuity payments are then classified as income and should be reported.

Q—I hear a lot about vocational counseling from friends who went to school under the Korea GI Bill. I have no intention of taking GI training, but maybe VA vocational counseling could help me decide whether I'm in the right line of work. Would I as a Korea veteran be eligible for just the counseling?

A—No. Vocational counseling is available only to veterans planning to train under VA programs. It is not available by itself, apart from training.

BE IT REMEMBERED that the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi met in regular session on Tuesday, August 2, 1960 at 7:30 o'clock p. m., in the Courthouse in the Village of Paden, Mississippi, this being the time and place for such meeting.

The meeting was called to order

by the Mayor and opened by proclamation of the Marshal. Present were: Dexter L. Loveless, Mayor, H. O. Timbes, C. C. Defoor, R. C. Barrett, Dayton Dean and W. C. Sanders, Aldermen.

Among other business:

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen took up for consideration the matter of providing for the assessment and collection of Municipal Ad Valorem Taxes on Motor Vehicles by the County Tax Collector, and, after discussion of the subject Alderman H. O. Timbes offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION OF MUNICIPAL AD VALOREM TAXES ON MOTOR VEHICLES BY THE COUNTY TAX COLLECTOR

WHEREAS, the Legislature of the State of Mississippi by the adoption of House Bill No. 3 at its Regular 1958 and at its Regular 1960 Session by Senate Bill No. 1874 made certain changes in and provisions for the assessment and collection of ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles by which law municipalities of the State, among other things, may make use of an assessment schedule of motor vehicles to be annually prepared and provided to the taxing authorities by the State Tax Commission, as provided by Section 10 of said House Bill No. 3, or may prepare and make up their own assessment schedule for such motor vehicles; and providing further that municipalities may elect to have the county tax collectors in the respective counties collect the ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles accruing to such municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the said House Bill No. 3 of the Regular 1958 Session of the Legislature and Senate Bill No. 1874 of the Regular 1960 Session of the Legislature have been considered by the Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, and it appearing to be to the best interest of said Village that the Mayor and Board of Aldermen proceed to take advantage of the provisions of said Bill permitting the County Tax Collector to make collection of the ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles for said municipality so as to permit the County Tax Collector to make collection within said Village, and the Mayor and Board of Aldermen being fully advised:

IT IS, THEREFORE, HEREBY RESOLVED AND ORDERED, As follows, to-wit:

SECTION 1. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, elects to make use of the assessment schedule for motor vehicles to be prepared and provided by the State Tax Commission of the State of Mississippi, as provided by Section 10 of House Bill No. 3 of the Regular 1958 Session of the Mississippi Legislature, and as amended as the basis for the assessment and collection of ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles located within its jurisdiction.

SECTION 2. Said assessment schedule for the year 1960 has not yet been prepared, adopted and disseminated by the State Tax Commission and acting under Section 24 of the aforesaid House Bill No. 3, the State Tax Commission has passed an order postpon-

ing the preparation of said schedule to a date fixed therein and extending the time fixed by Section 11 of said Act wherein the municipalities shall examine and consider said schedule and take action directed by said Section of said Act. All action relative to said schedule shall have been prepared and provided to the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi.

SECTION 3. All proceedings heretofore taken by the officials, officers and agents of the Village of Paden, Mississippi to assess or in the assessment of motor vehicles for ad valorem taxes for the year 1960 are hereby rescinded and cancelled.

SECTION 4. It is the desire of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Village of Paden, Mississippi, to have the County Tax Collector of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, collect the motor vehicle ad valorem taxes of the Village of Paden, Mississippi at the same time and in the same manner that said County Tax Collector collects the county and state ad valorem taxes on such motor vehicles, as provided in Section 15 of said House Bill No. 3, of the Regular Session of the Legislature of 1958 as may be amended by Senate Bill No. 1874 Miss. Legislature 1960 and that he receive fees for his services in making such collection as set out in the aforesaid Section.

SECTION 5. Certified copies of this Resolution shall be prepared by the Clerk of this Board and furnished to the Tax Collector of Tishomingo County, Mississippi; to the State Tax Commission and to the Motor Vehicle Comptroller of the State of Mississippi.

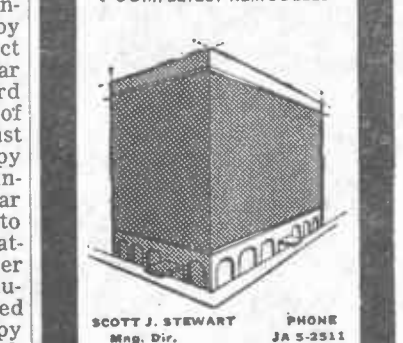

Rains Did Come

By Hiram A. Jones
Farmers like sunshine but they need rain. It is the rain that comes that causes corn and dry up, pastures to and cotton to cease grow-

ing rain to produce a crop. Rain yields are reduced when they fail. However, there are some things farmers can do to off-set the effects of dry weather. First, he can get the best information available, plant corn on land, cotton on cotton land, pasture or hay on grassland. The crop to the land is essential for success. Second, he can get a county agent and plant a variety of corn or cotton, depending on the land it is to be used on.

Over Tishomingo, farmers may see fair to good crops planted on the hills. Whereas, on another farm, planted on similar land, complete failure. In some cases, the kind of corn planted makes the difference. Encouraging to spend money on seeds, fertilizer and for preparation and planning to produce a low, unprofitable crop. local Soil Conservation Service personnel urge you to seek the advice of your County Agent concerning variety of crops to plant. Every acre on the farm should return a profit to the landowner annually. During years of excessive rain or extended droughts, this may not be possible, but it is possible for every acre to produce a

profit for the landowner most years. Crop yields are low this year because the rain did not come. However, crop yields are higher than we might expect because farmers of this county are using their land better and they are planting better varieties of crops and fertilizing them higher.

Leaf Blotch is the disease that has caused the heaviest loss in young oats. No variety of oats is resistant to leaf blotch. Good control of leaf blotch has been achieved by properly treating the seed with Cereson M, 1/2 ounce per bushel. It is suggested that growers purchase their seed already treated,

The Farm Vote

Which way will most farmers vote in the presidential election next November?

The answer to that question, veteran political strategists here agree, could determine whether Richard Nixon or John Kennedy is to be the next President of the United States.

Will they, as Kennedy strategists contend, vote their disapproval of lower price supports advocated by Republican Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson?

Or will they, as Nixon advisors think, vote their resentment against the Democratic majority in Congress that has failed to pass legislation that would stop the decline in farm prices and income?

Those are the farm issues, minus the oratorical dressing, which the two Presidential candidates and their running mates, will debate during the next couple of months. Which will convince the most farmers?

Changes Are Promised

Both candidates, as well as the farm planks in the party platforms, promise that, if elected, they will do all they can to persuade the next Congress to adopt a new farm program.

What kind of a new program? A careful study of the farm planks, as well as campaign statements by the candidates, provides a fairly reliable clue as to the kind of a program that will be proposed.

The two parties are in substantial agreement on two major farm points. Both favor some sort of an expanded land retirement program aimed at shifting more land from surplus crops to soil conservation. Likewise, both propose greater use of surpluses to feed the hungry, both at home and

The Democratic platform advocates production and marketing quotas in terms of units of production rather than acres, while Republicans propose measures to ease production controls. The best way to do that, Mr. Nixon contends, is to increase markets faster than farmers can expand production.

Whatever the merits of the two approaches, farmers should give them careful study and indicate by their vote in November which they prefer. Too many people pretend to "speak for farmers" who now have the opportunity under our democratic system of government to speak for themselves in a way that there can be no mistaking their preference.

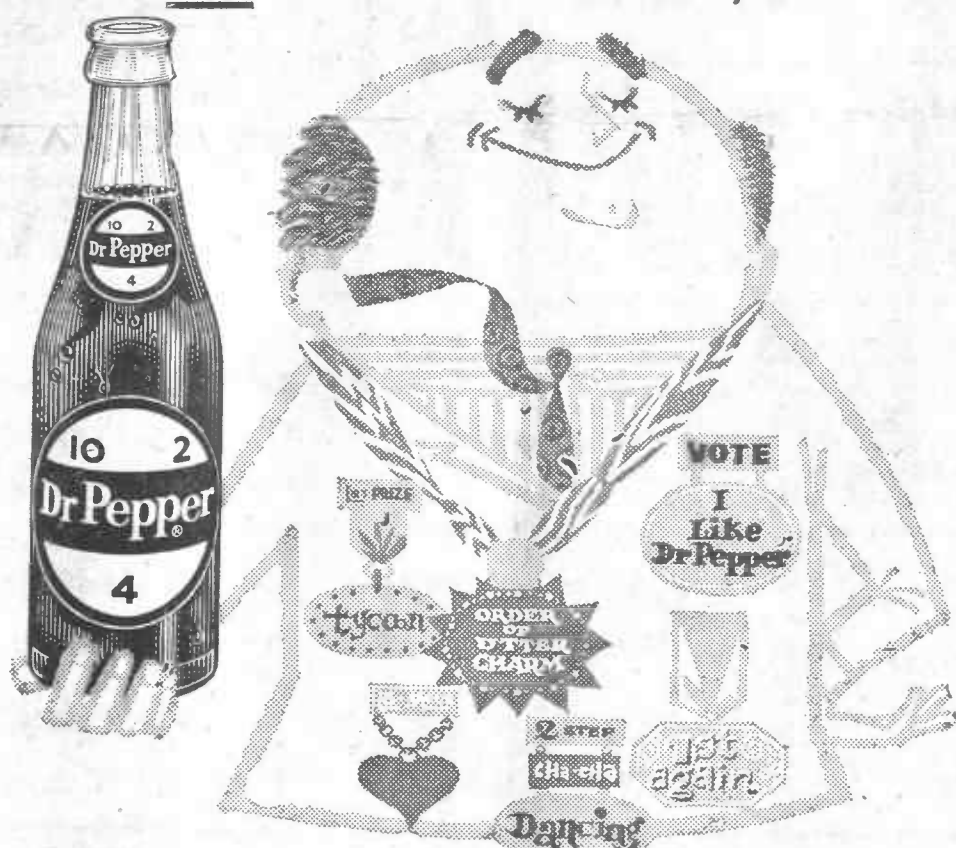
