Announcement of key personnel
WVOM, Northeast Mississippi's
west and most powerful radio
station, is made today by E. C.
Huntley, owner of the station.

West Miss.

will be uncertain, much depending
on the outcome of an inspection
by a representative of the Federal
Communications Commission. The
inspection was held Wednesday of
last week.

Contract Let for Belmont Health Clinic

Construction Will Begin
Soon On Federal-State
Project For County

The contract for construction of
the Belmont branch of the Tish-
omingo County Health Department
has been awarded to Lambert Con-
struction Company of Belmont, O.
Wade, chairman of the Board
of Supervisors announced the con-
tract award this week. Lambert
submitted the low bid of \$13,850
for the construction.

The estimated cost of the new
health center will be \$17,000.00.
The center will be completed in
the fall. Of this amount, the
county will pay one-third and
the Federal Government two-
thirds. A work order is expected
to be issued soon.

The new center will be of con-
crete block and brick construction,
33 feet in size. It will contain
examining waiting room, two treat-
ment rooms, an x-ray room, one
dental room, two wash rooms,
a utility and service room. It
will be completely air-conditioned.
The Belmont Health Department
will serve the south end of
the county and will be operated
by the present County Department.
Additional personnel is expected
to be employed.

Iuka Bows To Shannon 33-0 In Season's 1st Game

Iuka Chieftains bowed to Shan-
non in the first 1960 game last Fri-
day night at Shannon, limping
home with a 33-0 loss as the sea-
son started.

While the Iuka team took a
drubbing at the hands of a team
with superior strength on the line
and more experienced players, the
Chieftains played, according to
Coach Thorne, "one of the cleanest
games I ever saw. We were tagged
with only one penalty, and that
for just being off-side, a 5-yard
penalty."

Shannon was slapped with nearly
60 yards in penalties before the
final whistle.

Iuka suffered unfortunate casual-
ties among the more experienced
players who were called upon to
bear the brunt of the first game's
try for scores. Allen McBee was
knocked out of the game with an
injury (bruised ribs) that proved
not serious but will keep him out
of play for probably the next one
or two games.

Other casualties were Eddie By-
ron and Lucian King, shoulder in-
jury, Genie Foote, slight foot in-
jury, and Donnie Williams, back
injury. These will all probably be
in the line-up Friday night when
the Chieftains take on Kossuth.

The first half of last Friday's
game went all the way for Shan-
non. They made three touch-downs
in the first half, but were held to
only one touch-down in the second
half. In the second half, Shannon
completed 3 out of 6 attempts to
pass and Iuka completed 4 out of
8 attempts. Iuka's Byrom hit Ram-
sey 3 out of 5 passes.

Shannon had 11 first downs and
the Chieftains had 8.

This coming Friday will see the
Chieftains putting their strength
and skill against Kossuth. They
will have the additional booster of
the Iuka Band to play at half-time
and keep the fans in good spirits.
Support is what the team needs
and deserves, so all home-town
fans should get off down there to
Kossuth tomorrow night and back
the team.

Registration Begins Friday At Iuka District Schools

New Buildings Open To Classes After
Earlier Delays; Schedule Given

After a delay of one week in
opening, the Iuka First District
schools will register students Fri-
day (tomorrow) for the 1960-61
term.

"The first day of registration is
the most important of all the pre-
liminary school opening days,"
Supt. H. L. Shook stated. He strong-
ly urges all pupils to be at the
general assembly, Friday morning
at 8 o'clock, in order to be properly
registered. "Any special registra-
tion problems a student may have
can be caught and more easily taken
care of at this first registration
than at a later date," he said.

General assembly will be held
in the gymnasium Friday morning.
All grades will meet there for a
short devotional period and for
announcements and instructions to
be followed the first few days.
Introduction of the faculty to the
student body will also be made at
this morning session.

Following this general session,
all High School students will be
sent to special rooms for registra-
tion. "The entire morning will be
taken up in registration and giving
instructions," Mr. Shook said.
"No other work will be undertaken
that day, and it is expected pupils
will be dismissed around noon." Bus
drivers, who will have covered
the regular routes in bringing pupils
to the Friday morning session
are asked to remain on the campus
or return before noon in order to
load the children promptly after
the early dismissal.

Thursday afternoon (today) at 2
o'clock, a full faculty meeting will
be held at the school. On Monday,
Sept. 12, the issuance of textbooks
and possibly lesson assignments
will be made for grades 10 through
12. The Monday period will begin
at 7:30 a. m. and last until noon.
Grades 7, 8, and 9 will report
at 8 a. m. on Tuesday, September
13. They will be dismissed at 12
noon.

School will open for the first full
schedule on Wednesday, September
14, 7:55 a. m. to 3 p. m. The
cafeteria will be open for serv-
ing lunch.

Hundreds Visit Iuka School

Open House, Sunday;
Officials Pleased
With Response

Hundreds of Iukans and Tish-
omingo Counts and a number
of visitors from other counties and
from out-of-state were shown
through the new Iuka school at a
public reception last Sunday af-
ternoon.

Supt. H. L. Shook, School Board
members, Harmon Byrom, presi-
dent of the Board, Earl Bonds,
Cecil Brown, Herman Gann, and
High School principal, J. E. Brown,
greeted the visitors at the en-
trance.

Faculty members in their respec-
tive classrooms showed the visitors
the modern equipment and some
of the teaching materials provid-
ed for incoming students. Some
of the girls of the 1960 graduating
class and others of the 1961 Senior
Class acted as guides and ushers
and answered questions of visitors.

One of the most popular spots
on the "tour" of the buildings
was Mrs. Myriam Gaines Home Ec-
onomics department where the
members of her class were acting
as hostesses, serving punch and
cookies to the guests. The huge
crystal punch bowl was refilled
many times during the afternoon as
the steam of visitors continued to
come in.

As visitors made their way from
one classroom to another, expres-
sions of admiration were heard on
every side. Many said they had ex-
pected to find a nice, modern
school, but nothing like the beau-
tiful building they saw. The interior
walls are painted a soft green;
the classroom furniture is of metal
and plastic construction, sized to
fit-the-pupils, and all finished in
tones of soft green and coral. It
gives a most pleasing effect as
well as being very functional. The
plastic tile floors are sound-dead-
ening.

Among the outstanding features
of the new building are the window
walls which make up one side of
each classroom, affording good
light and ventilation. The lower
grade classrooms open directly on-
to the playgrounds so each class
may leave the building and enter
without going into the hallways.
The First Grade classrooms are equip-
ped with separate wash-room facil-
ities and drinking fountains. Many
other advanced features are to be
found throughout the school.

The guest register placed at
the main entrance was signed by
607 visitors. Many, many others
entered by the side doors and so
did not sign. Mrs. Gaines estimated
more than 850 were served refresh-
ments "not counting the youngsters
who came back for refills."

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The Situation Is Becoming Acute

Iuka's Housing Shortage

A situation is developing in Iuka which calls for the wide-awake attention of all property owners. That situation is a growing shortage of suitable housing—particularly rental housing—and the shortage will grow more acute as the weeks and months go on.

Already, employees of the new paper mill in Counce, Tenn., have begun to look around Iuka for places to live. The mill is due to go into full operations around the first of January, and the demand for housing will gain in tempo.

However, all the demand is not coming nor is it all going to come, from the workers at the paper mill. Other new businesses are opening up which will create new jobs and new demands for housing in Iuka.

Perhaps we are in as good a position as any to gauge the acuteness of the housing needs in Iuka. Every day or so, someone comes in to the newspaper office, looking for listings of apartments or houses for rent. These people are looking for a place immediately available. Too often they look in vain.

Property owners who have houses suitable for conversion to apartments will be missing a good opportunity to add to their financial well-being as well as to the well-being of the community if they leave these conversions unmade. Houses which could be repaired and made into duplex rental units are an investment property owners could profitably give serious consideration.

But let it be borne in mind—jack-leg converting of rooms into apartments will not meet the needs of worthwhile tenants. People want privacy and convenience in an apartment. This, owners would do well to remember if they intend to keep tenants for any length of time. Most of the apartment seekers are young couples who are not ready to invest in home-buying. And most of them are "modern-minded" and expect to find rental units which will let them enjoy modern living. Few couples want rooms where the kitchen or bath is shared with the landlord. Building-in these facilities separately will add much to the value of your property and make your apartments much more desirable. They will also stay rented for longer periods with less turn-over in tenants.

The prospects for the future of this town and county are beginning to look a little brighter. Being ready with the housing when the upsurge of new businesses and employment bring new residents to the area is something the whole town should give attention to. The advantage is ours to take. If we wait until newcomers are clamoring at our doors, so to speak, before we do anything about providing housing here, they will go elsewhere to find living quarters. And the growth of the community will suffer.

To paraphrase the old poetic line, "For the want of a nail, a kingdom was lost" we may say, "For the want of a house a resident was lost" and with him went buying power and revenue that the town could well use.

If Iukans are alert to the needs of the changing times and the demands those changes are bringing, we will be ready with houses and apartments when prospective tenants come seeking them.

State's Per Capita Income Gain Faster in The Entire Nation

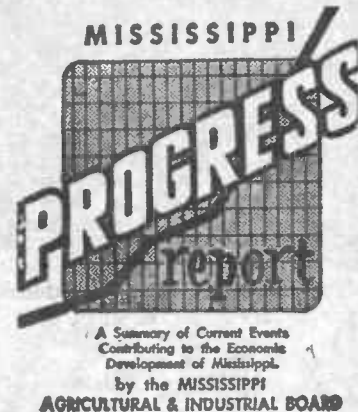
It is encouraging that the average income of Mississippians increased faster than the national average during 1959. Mississippi's per capita personal income increased ten per cent compared with seven per cent for Kentucky, five per cent for Alabama, and nine per cent for Arkansas. Mississippi has achieved progress in raising the per capita income during recent years.

Sales Volume For State Increases

Hinds County, largely from the City of Jackson, accounted for better than one-fifth of the total sales made in Mississippi in 1959. While Hinds County sales jumped fourteen per cent, the sales volume statewide was up eight per cent; and the sales volume statewide, excluding Hinds County, was up seven per cent.

Polaris Missile Parts Produced In Jackson

Vickers, Inc., Jackson plant is now the major supplier of auxiliary power units for the Polaris missile—the first missile to be successfully launched from a submarine and one of the most versatile and powerful weapons possessed by the United States. The units made in Jackson are shipped to the missile division of Lockheed Aircraft Corporation in California and assembled and tested there. The Jackson plant is preparing to build facilities which will include an area for assembly and testing of the entire power package.

Nuclear Sub Contract Awarded To Ingalls

Ingalls Shipbuilding Corporation, Pascagoula, has been awarded the contract for construction of a nuclear-powered attack submarine of the USS Thresher SS (N) 593 class. Keel work on the new vessel is expected to begin in November. Ingalls is presently building two submarines of the Thresher class attack group and is also constructing two other nuclear submarines of the Skipjack class. Minimum contract price of the new submarine is \$23,405,750.

Clinton Dedicates Industrial Units

Combined dedication of the Clinton Industrial Park and the First Carton Corporation plant was held at the plant, the first manufacturing facility to be built in Hinds county's first industrial park. The Industrial Park Corporation owns some 325 acres north-west of Clinton, and approximately 25 acres were conveyed to First Mississippi Corporation, parent company of First Carton. The firm manufactures paper cartons in a 30,000-square-foot building on a ten-acre site.

Prentiss Bonds Get Overwhelming Approval

Voters of Batesville and Prentiss county assured themselves of two factories recently when they approved BAWI bond issues totaling over \$1.5 million. The two bond issues provided for plants for American Seating Company (approved 1566-3) and American Packing Company (approved 2675-34).

Pines And Pastures Prove Profitable

The program on Messrs. Roe Daniels' and Eugene Glover's farm is pine trees on the steep land and grass on the bottom land and more gently sloping hill land.

Both of these landowners are doing a fine job of soil and water conservation and both of them are making a profit doing it.

Land too poor and too steep to produce good pasture has been, or is being, set to loblolly pine. The other land has been, or is being, established to good pasture.

Both Mr. Daniels and Mr. Glover have improved their old established woodland by releasing the understory of young pines. Both of them are protecting their woodland from fire and excessive grazing.

There is one difference in their operations. Mr. Glover has Angus cattle whereas Mr. Daniels grows Hereford or white-faced cattle.

There are a number of SCD co-operators who are progressing toward a farm program of pine trees and grass. Messrs. Orville McNutt and Lester Skinner are dairymen who have a grass and woodland program. These men also found this a profitable way to use their land.

These Soil Conservation District co-operators and many, many other landowners are doing an excellent job of conserving their land with trees and grass. Best of all, this type of farming has proved profitable for them.

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ASC NEWS

Signing For Fall Cover Crop

Now is the time for Tishomingo County farmers to start planning their fall sowing. The Tishomingo ASC County Committee has the following seed and minerals available for you now. Oats, wheat, rye grass, crimson clover, hairy vetch, A.W. peas. Minerals to be applied will be 60% potash, 20% phosphate and ammonium nitrate. If your feed crop has been cut short due to dry weather plan to sow a few acres of oats, wheat or rye grass for winter grazing. This winter grazing must be sowed on cropland, none of it to be cut for hay or seed. If you know how many acres of vetch you will sow come and sign for your seed now.

Do you need to sow new pasture? We have a combination of Ky fescue and white clover that can be sowed in the fall. Also, we have agricultural limestone that can be applied to all hayland and pasture. This lime will be delivered and spread on your farm.

Now is the time to dig a stock pond on your farm. Maybe you need some drainage on your farm, or maybe you need V-ditches or W-ditches. The government will pay 65% of the total cost of these practices.

Pine Tree Planting

If you are planning to set pine tree seedling on your farm this fall, now is the time for you to place your order.

Since we do not have a county forester at this time you can place your order with the county agent. See about this at once.

1961 Sign-Up

The 1961 sign-up for your 1961 ACP practices will be held beginning August 29, 1960 through September 9th 1960. If you know what you will need government cost-sharing on during the 1961 program be sure to visit that ASC office between the above dates and sign for this practice.

Farm Storage Facility Loans

The fall harvest is just around the corner and you may need more storage space to store your corn and soybeans.

The government will assist you in buying these round metal bins

to store this grain. The following are tentative prices for these bins. 3300 bu. capacity, \$1,012.20; 2200 bu. capacity, \$648.89; 1000 bu. capacity, \$387.64. If you are interested in this come by the office and get further information.

Beginning next Tuesday, September 12 a representative of the ASC county office will be at Belmont in the morning and at Tishomingo in the afternoon to take your request for any ACP practices you desire.

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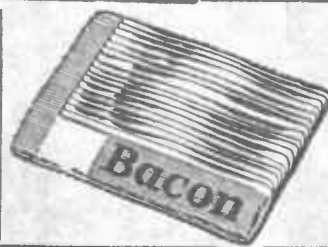

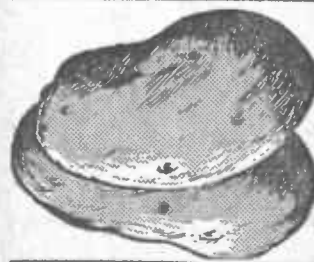

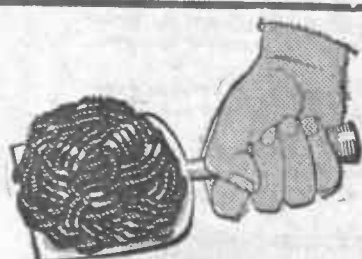
