WVOM Broadcasting Will Begin Sept. 19 On 1270 Kc

Area's Most Powerful Radio Outlet Will Serve Miss., Ala., And Tenn.

Program Will Feature News, Music And Other Entertainment

Station WVOM will go on the air Saturday, September 17, the first day of regularly scheduled broadcast programs. E. H. Huntley, owner, announces the station will officially begin operations with the first broadcast at 5:30 Saturday morning. WVOM will be found at 1270 on the radio dial.

Saturday's broadcast from the radio station will mark a milestone in Tishomingo County's progress. Being the first radio broadcast in the county, WVOM is the most powerful radio station in Northeast Mississippi. Its 50-watt radiated power will extend its service area to most of North Mississippi, significant portions of Northwest Alabama and nine counties in West Central Tennessee. The coverage area represents a population density of more than 1-million people.

The station's programs will feature refined country music, news from the wires of United Press International, and public services. Entertainment will be presented as the program format is developed after the station goes into operation.

The most popular disk jockey in North Mississippi, Buddy Bain, is associated with the station and with his own personality show. Buddy has recently been associated with a radio station in Corinth and with television stations.

The Charles Kay show will be the regular program feature. It is a native Iuka and well-known here.

E. H. "Curley" Huntley, well-known in southern radio circles, is the station's general manager and chief engineer. "Curley" will serve as announcer and present the Curley Huntley show.

Five minutes before each hour and on the half-hour, local news will also be in the program. Religious broadcasts, public service programs and other news will be heard at regularly scheduled times.

'The Bible Speaks' Will Be Heard On Station WVOM

The public is cordially invited to listen to "The Bible Speaks," a daily radio program on WVOM, 1270 on the dial. This program can be heard each day at 8:00 a. m., beginning Saturday, Sept. 17th. Hudson Nichols will be the speaker each day, Monday through Saturday, and E. R. Bruce will be the speaker each Sunday.

This program will be presented in the interest of New Testament Christianity, by Churches of Christ in Tishomingo County.

Road Work Continues In County

Work Order Issued To Contractor For Part Of State Highway 356

Construction is scheduled to begin in the near future on a section of Miss. Highway No. 356 in Tishomingo County, according to Highway Commissioner Roy C. Adams.

Mr. Adams said the contractor has been notified that he may begin work on the 6.9 mile section from Burnsville to Crossroads.

The contract, calling for grade, drain, and bridge work, was issued to Worsham Bros. of Corinth on August 23, 1960. Contract amount is \$419,113, with 200 working days allotted for completion of the work.

W. L. Bennett of Booneville, Highway Department project engineer, is in charge of the work.

Paving work on a section of Miss. Highway No. 364 in Tishomingo and Alcorn counties was complete last week.

The 7.4 mile section located between Cairo and Midway was paved with a double bituminous asphalt surface. Worsham Bros. of Corinth was the contractor and the cost of the paving work was \$118,046.

Commissioner Adams said that, following last week's final inspection by the Department and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, maintenance of the section will now be resumed by the Highway Department.

W. L. Bennett, Department project engineer, was also in charge of the work on this section.

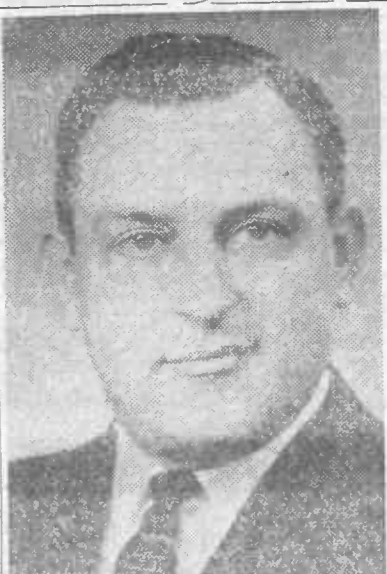
Rev. and Mrs. Hunt are guests in the Frank Shoffner home during their stay here.

Record Enrollment At Iuka Municipal Separate School

New Pupils Attending From Closed Central And Snowdown Schools Send Student Rolls To New High

The first week of school in the newly finished Iuka Municipal Separate School building saw a record number of pupils. The first official figure was placed at 958 for the combined Elementary and High school grades. However, school Superintendent H. L. Shook pointed out that the figures would change and probably be nearer the 1000 mark after late registrants are accounted for.

The five new school busses which were purchased this past summer were in operation for the first day of school opening. The recent delay in school opening was due in part to the late delivery of the busses. The final delivery was made on them just the past week. Two were delivered the first week in September, the remaining three busses were delivered only a day or two before school opened Friday, Sept. 9.

The increased enrollment results in part from the attendance of pupils from Central and Snowdown schools in the district which abandoned this year upon completion of the new school building in Iuka. There has also been a slight increase in population figures in Iuka which accounts for some of the higher enrollment.

Kossuth Clips Iuka 27-6 In Second Game Of Season

The Iuka Chieftains rolled down to Kossuth last Friday night and came home with 27-6 loss. Kossuth grabbed the lead with two touchdowns before half-time for a score of 13.

The last quarter of the game turned out to be an exciting one. Four men were thrown out of the game; two for Iuka and two for Kossuth. It was the last away-from-home game the Chieftains will play until October 14 when they take on Cherokee at Cherokee.

Second Area Feeder Pig Sale, Oct. 20

The second Area Feeder Pig Sale will be held at Booneville on Thursday, October 20. Anyone wishing to consign pigs to the October Sale must contact the County Agent's Office thirty (30) days prior to the sale which would mean that you will need to sign up in the County Agent's Office not later than September 20.

All pigs consigned to the sale will be vaccinated for Cholera fifteen (15) days prior to the sale. Pigs will also be inspected before they are accepted for the sale. All pigs consigned to the sale must be raised by farmers and consigned by the farmer.

The pigs will be graded according to weight and quality and sold by groups of the same grade. No pigs will be passed out at the sale.

Remember the date for contacting the County Agent's Office is not later than September 20 if you plan to sell pigs in the Area Feeder Pig Sale at Booneville on October 20.

Officers Make Haul At Eastport

Boats, Guns, Gear, 600 Pounds Fish Taken In Dawn Arrests Monday

Mississippi Game and Fish wardens from Tishomingo and two adjoining counties landed a big catch of their own here last Monday morning.

In the early dawn, around four o'clock, a five-man team composed of Connie Davis, supervisor of wardens in district 12, Earl Womack, Prentiss County warden; Burt Rencher, Alcorn County warden; E. C. Holland and C. E. Marlar, Tishomingo County wardens, arrested three men at Eastport Landing. They were charged with operating fishing boats and equipment without a license for gill nets.

Other charges were also placed against them which may involve Federal, Alabama and Mississippi law violations.

The officers confiscated 2,500 yards of gill nets, 600 pounds of non-game gross fish and some game fish, two shotguns loaded with slugs and buckshots, two motors and boats.

The boats come under the jurisdiction of Tishomingo County Sheriff Clarence Pace and his deputy, "Pat" Patterson. They were called to the scene to take charge of the boats, guns and motors.

The fish were given to county charitable organizations at the suggestion of County Attorney Barry Finch.

Names of the arrested fishermen are withheld pending their arraignment and hearing.

Auto Collision Injures One

A collision involving an auto driven by Mrs. Forest Morris of Iuka and another driven by Bernard Berry of Columbia, Miss., on Highway 25-N last Saturday resulted in injuries to Berry. He was treated at a local clinic and released.

The accident occurred when the '54 Buick driven by Mrs. Morris made a left-hand turn in front of Berry's car, a '57 Chevrolet, in front of Smith's Store. Both cars were badly damaged. Riding with Berry was Miss Betty Ann Brown, but she was unhurt other than being shaken up.

Young Berry had come up to Iuka to take Miss Brown to Starkville where she will enter Mississippi State. No charges were filed pending investigation of the accident.

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Watch Those Kids

And Watch Your Speed!

Now that school has reopened, children are crossing streets and walking along the roads to school or waiting by the roadside for school busses. They're not always cautious; they run and play and jostle each other, heedless of cars and trucks and the dangers that streets and highways hold for them.

It is up to the motoring public to take heed of the children. It is as much our duty to protect the children as they go to and from school as it is to provide them with a safe school to go to.

School busses are again making their appearance on the highways. Motorist should keep in mind that the law requires drivers to stop their vehicle when the school bus stops and not go forward again until the bus starts to move. That applies to motorists either following or approaching a school bus.

Many of us become careless and don't watch for the busses. The morning hours and the afternoon hours are the times we should be particularly mindful that a school bus may loom up before us suddenly as we drive along. They move slowly and stop often. During those hours we must be particularly mindful of our speed. We may have to stop for a school bus just over the next rise in the road.

We MUST watch those kids—and watch our speed. Stop when the school bus stops. If children are disembarking from the bus, wait until they are safely across the road or off the road before proceeding.

School officials and school bus drivers take every precaution for the safety of the children. The public has a responsibility for their safety too. It is a responsibility we must take seriously, now that school is open again.

State Reaches New High In Industrial Development

Governor Ross Barnett has announced that industrial development in Mississippi reached a new height during the first eight months of 1959. So far this year 57 new industries and 30 plant expansions have been effected, adding—when in full production—7,687 new employees with increased payrolls in excess of \$24,000,000. More BAWI bonds have been floated in this period than for any other full year in the state's history, he said.

Construction Work Underway On Kellogg Plant At Corinth

Construction work on Kellogg Manufacturing Company's new plant at Corinth is now underway. Presently occupying a main building and three warehouses in that city, the company plans to move its entire operations into the one building when it is completed sometime next March. The 82,600-square-foot building will allow the company to handle many new phases of telephone production and increase employment from 260 to approximately 450.

Production work now consists mainly of assembling parts shipped to Corinth from other locations. Plans are now underway for the Corinth plant to fabricate about 170 different parts at the new plant, including the Cinderella home 'phone and the plastic Kellogg pay 'phone.

Montgomery County Voters Approve Kimco In BAWI Election

A BAWI bond issue vote on the location of Kimco Auto Products, Inc., in Winona was overwhelmingly approved in a countywide election August 30. The vote was 2324 for to 48 against. The company expects to begin production early

Greenville Mills Open House Attracts Some 4,000 Visitors

Greenville Mills, first industry to be constructed in Greenville under BAWI bond issue, held its eighth annual open house for employees, their families and invited guests August 27. Approximately 4,000 people attended. The Co. has an annual gross payroll of some \$3,600,000 and averages 850 employees on a monthly basis. It is a division of Mohasco Industries, Inc., and produces 20 per cent of all Axminster carpet made in the United States.

Industrial Clinics Held In Vicksburg, Brookhaven

The Mississippi Power & Light Company sponsored industrial clinics in Vicksburg August 31 and in Brookhaven September 1. Part of a series of such clinics to be held in western Mississippi, the meetings were attended by area business, civic and governmental leaders. Representatives of the A & I Board, the company's industrial development department and other area development authorities participated.

State Among Top Timber Producers

State Forester C. B. Marlin reported that Mississippi continues to rank among the nation's top timber producers and during fiscal 1959 held fourth place in the cumulative total of timber acres planted since 1927. Mississippi ranks fifth nationally in number of tree seedlings planted last year, he said. A growing number of Mississippians are profitably utilizing otherwise idle land through tree farming, according to Marlin.

Industrially-Related Education Stressed in New Program

To improve youth opportunities in Mississippi, the legislature this year created a department of youth affairs as a part of the Agricultural and Industrial Board. Dr. J. W. Lee, formerly director of teacher training at Mississippi College, has taken over the direction of this new department and is now conferring with leaders in the field of industrial education throughout the state.

gin could mean a loss or a gain of up to \$60 or more per acre for Mississippi cotton farmers. Preventing a grassy sample, proper defoliation, good mechanical picking, and careful moisture control are major practices that farmers can still do something about. Complete defoliation insures a full top crop. Complete defoliation improves quality one full grade. Octon leaders have been stressing the importance of putting more quality into the bale. The mills operate at higher speeds and require cotton lint that is stronger and of generally higher quality.

State Ranks High Among Nation's Top Timber Producers

Mississippi continues to rank among the nation's top timber producers; and during fiscal 1959, held fourth place in the cumulative total of timber acres planted since 1927, and fifth nationally in number of the tree seedlings planted. A total of 759,440 acres have been planted to trees in Mississippi since 1927.

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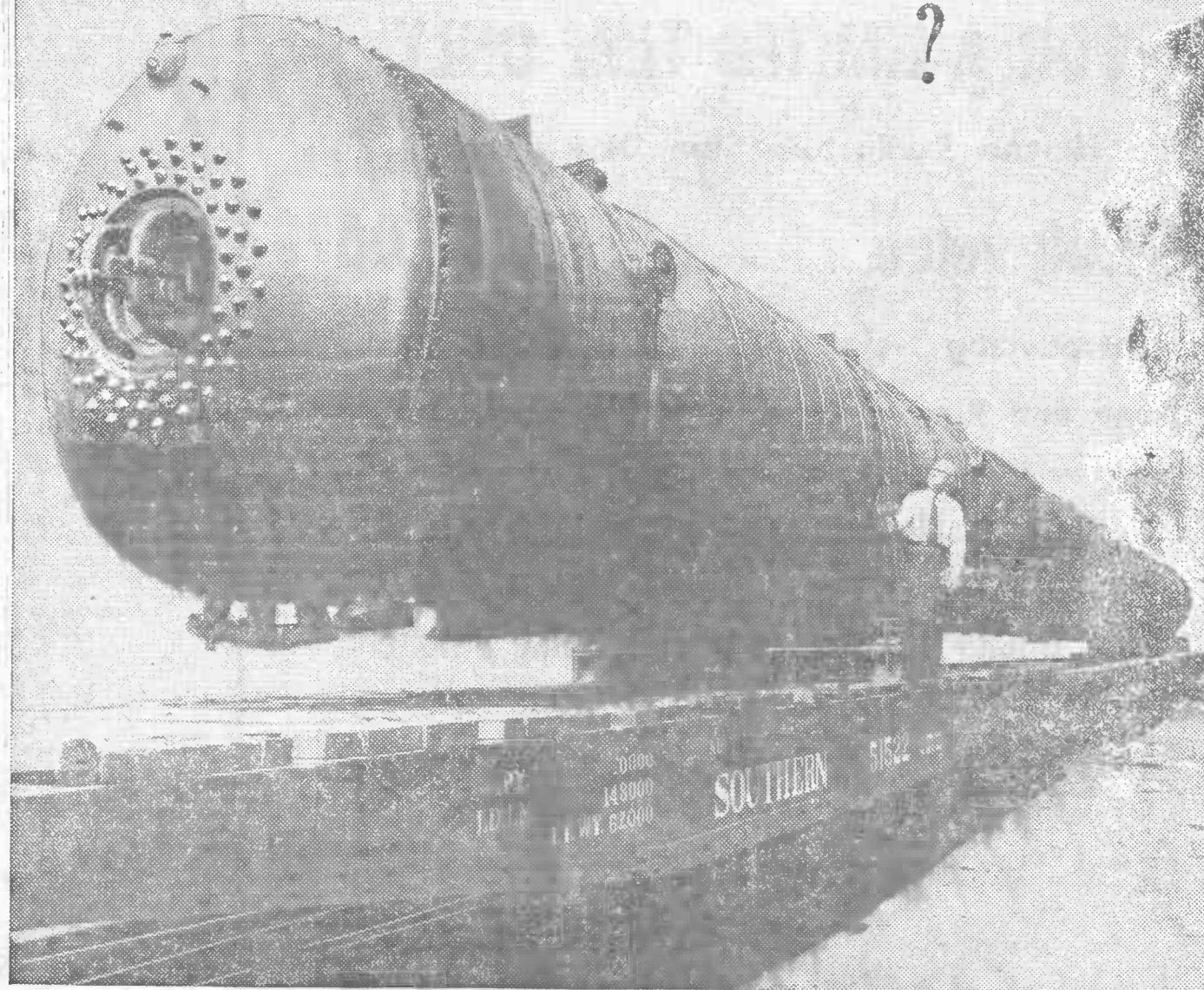

According to Patrol Chief Dave Gayden, traffic mishaps involving farm vehicles always increase with the cotton-picking and harvest season.

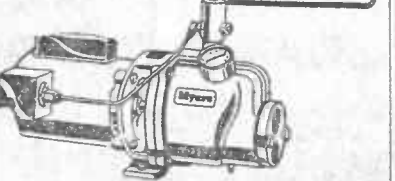
Mississippi law requires that all vehicles not requiring special lighting equipment (this would include

Hurricane Donna which hit Florida, the Tavernier-Marathon section of the Florida Keys, North Carolina and long the North Atlantic seaboard left a mass of destruction in its course of travel. It has required one of the biggest emergency relief operations in the history of the Red Cross.

Temporary refuge and maintenance will be necessary for weeks for many homeless until suitable living quarters may be obtained. Heavy commercial destruction is also evident along Donna's relentless march up the Atlantic coastline.

County Agent Notes

If you noticed shriveled
the lower parts of your
cucumbers? They are a sign
they have run out of plant

food.
Give them a diet boost of a heap-
ing tablespoon of complete ferti-
lizer dissolved in a gallon of water.
Give them plenty of water, too,
during budding and blooming.
A little sulphur, dusted on the
leaves will ward off insects and
diseases.

Housekeeping Hints
Line your kitchen cabinet draw-
ers with colorful oilcloth. It looks

attractive and is easier to keep
clean.

If you cover the nozzle of your
vacuum cleaner with cheesecloth
held in place with a rubber band,
you can clean button boxes, dress-
er trays, spool boxes and such
without disturbing the contents.
An old card table, with the top
replaced by a plastic screen, makes
an excellent drying rack for sweat-
ers, socks and doilies.

Stuffed Cabbage Leaves

10 or 12 large cabbage leaves, 2
cups (1 pound) ground beef, 2 cups
(1/2-inch) soft bread cubes, 1 1/2
teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon pep-
per, 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt, 1/2
cup chopped onion, 2 eggs, 1 can
condensed tomato soup.

Porbail cabbage leaves for five
minutes. Combine beef, soft bread
cubes, salt, pepper garlic salt, on-
ion and eggs. Form meat mixture
into 10 or 12 oblong patties. Place
a meat patty in each of the sage-
bag leaves.

Wrap in cabbage leaf and fasten
with toothpicks. Place stuffed
cabbage leaves in cold skillet. Pour
undiluted tomato soup over them.
Cover and cook at low heat (260
degrees F) for 45 minutes. Serve
two cabbage rolls to each person.

Removing Spots From Furniture

White spots on a wood surface
are usually caused by hot dishes
or water. You can usually remove
them by wiping the surface with
a piece of cloth wrung from water
to which a little ammonia has
been added. Or rub with your finger
or a piece of flannel dampened
with spirits of camphor or essence
of peppermint. Sometimes you can
remove the spot by laying a piece
of blotting paper over the spot and
pressing it with a warm iron.

If spots are old, rubbing with
boiled linseed oil or with rotten-
stone and linseed oil may renew
the finish.

Fall Army Worms

Watch closely for fall army
worms in our early planted oats.
If the worms get a good head start
on you, they are likely to strip
the field before you can do any-
thing about it.

For control, you can use metho-
xychlor or toxaphene. Only metho-
xychlor is recommended for use on
any grazing crop to be used by
dairy cows. Cows must be held off
the area for seven days following
application of insecticide.

Beef cattlemen may use toxa-
phene, provided it is used for one
application only; the cows are held
off the treated area for 7 to 10
days following treatment; and
that animals to be sold for slaugh-
ter are taken off the grazing six
weeks before selling.

The toxaphene is long lasting in
the field. Avoid getting it in fish
ponds as it kills fish.

Ethyl parathion can also be used
for both dairy and beef cattle
grazing. If this is used, stock
should be held off for 15 days after
treatment. This material is
dangerous to handle! It also offers
only short residue for armyworm
control.

Rye Grass Planting

Lots of folks are planning to
plant rye grass this fall. Here are
some suggestions: Plant it in oats
or wheat only where no grain is
wanted; in crimson clover; in white
or red clover; out on white clover
and grass sods; in Bermuda (both
common and Coastal); in grazed
down Bahia grass.

Where rye grass is planted in
any of these combinations, it gives
grazing until the following May.
You can plant rye grass out on
sod, but it does better and gives
a better stand if put in the sod
with a sod seeder so that it is

Small Grain Saves Soil, Makes Feed

Mr. John B. Burns of Maud, Ala-
bama, has planned land-use and
is working his plan on a tract of
land he owns in the Carters Branch
Community of Tishomingo county.

Ten acres of Coastal Bermuda
furnishes hay and provides supple-
mental grazing for his cattle.

For winter grazing, Mr. Burns
plants an adjoining field in the
early fall. These oats are highly
fertilized for quick growth and
early grazing. If additional fertiliz-
er is needed, these oats are top-
dressed with ammonium nitrate in
March and the cattle removed to
another pasture to permit the grain
to mature.

Many Tishomingo County farm-
ers plant oats or other small grain
for grazing, and some of them per-

covered.

Cattle Lice

Before cold weather gets here,
you had better do something about
cattle lice. You know they tend to
build up during cold weather. If
you treat your livestock now, you
can help prevent a big build up and
the resulting loss.

Feed is likely to be short this
year, so why share it with the cat-
tle lice. Don't feed them. Get rid
of 'em! Check with your local coun-
ty agents for the latest control
recommendations.

mit the grain to ripen, as does Mr.
Burns. They then feed this grain
to their livestock.

Covering upland with a heavy
sod of small grain will protect it
from the winter rains and prevent
excessive erosion.

When weather conditions are
favorable, good grazing can be ex-
pected in late fall or early winter
from early planted oats.

During mild winters, a great deal
of grazing can be produced from
oats.

Your County Agent recommends
that farmers plant only treated
oat seed. Unless treated seed are
planted leaf disease may take a
very heavy toll, resulting in thin
stands and poor grazing. Ask your
County Agent about this.

Your Soil Conservation Service
personnel and SCD Commissioners,
comment Mr. Burns and other SCD
cooperators who make a profit by
establishing good soil conservation
practices on their land.

Small grain properly planted and
fertilized save the soil and provides
grazing and feed for livestock.

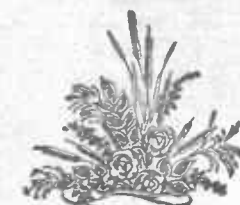
