School Board Members To Be Elected

Three Will Be Named In
Nov. General Election

Time is running out for prospective candidates to qualify for nomination for election to the County School Board. Three Board members will be elected in the November General Election. Candidates have until October 8 to get qualifying petitions of nomination signed. The petitions must be signed by 50 qualified electors of the Districts before the prospective candidate may have his name placed on the ballot for election, or re-election, as the case may be.

Two of the three members to be elected will fill out unexpired terms. One, elected to fill out the term vacated by Kermit Rushing in the First District, will serve as a county-wide member since the First District is no longer in the county school system. This term will expire in 1962. The petition for the county-wide member may be signed in any or all of the five districts.

One member will be elected from the Third District to fill out the term of Clyde Bingham who resigned earlier this year. Hubert Jourdan has been filling the post by appointment until an election could be held.

George Harris is the Fifth District member whose term expires this fall. Ordinarily this would be the only post to be filled this fall. However, the two resignations, those of the First and Third Districts, require election of two new members to the Board.

THE VIDETTE
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The Tishomingo County Fair

Tishomingo County can take great pride in the County Fair which ended last Saturday night. Except for the rain and wind which struck here Friday, somewhat dampening ground and discouraging fairgoers, the entire week of the event was a big success.

Particularly noteworthy was the livestock, swine and poultry shows which drew exhibitors from all over the county. The livestock entries were more than double the number entered last year, or in any previous year, indicating a greater interest in improving beef and dairy herds in the county. H. B. Hedgepeth, extension specialist from Mississippi State, judge of the livestock, spoke highly of the quality of entries. He also praised the work of the 4-H clubs and the progress the boys and girls have made under the direction and with the aid of the County Agent's office and staff of assistants.

The high number of blue ribbon winners in all categories bear out Mr. Hedgepeth's assertions of the high quality of the animals and poultry in the show. Also taking honors—and ribbons—at the Fair were members of the Home Demonstration clubs and the 4-H girls' home projects. The entries were well made, expertly exhibited, and worthy in every sense of the high interest they drew and the awards they received. For many it was the first time they had exhibited in any Fair and the experience was very exciting and rewarding. They were a credit to the help and guidance they have received from the Home Agent and her staff.

Much credit for the success of the Fair goes to the members of the Fair Association, the various county chairmen and the tireless workers from each community. Their efforts were well rewarded in the number of prizes given and the number of fairgoers who visited the exhibits.

All the entries were not from the rural areas. Some of the "town folks" were exhibitors too, although the number was not as great as it could have been. We have the feeling that much talent and enterprise was left unaccounted for at the Fair by the non-farm people in the county. That is something to work toward in planning future Fairs. Nothing we do is so perfect it can't be improved upon.

As the county grows so should the Fairs grow. More commercial exhibits would add much to the interest and quality of the Fair. Industrial exhibits from the garment mills, shoe factory, other manufacturers, would do much to dramatize and bring before the public the varied interests and enterprise in the county.

Farm implement dealers should have a display of farm machinery; sporting goods stores, boat dealers, would profit from exhibits calling attention to the recreational side of life in Tishomingo County. In short, no business or enterprise should be without an exhibit at the County Fair. There were a few commercial exhibits there last week but not enough to give a true picture of the commercial enterprises in the county.

Having a wider representation of the entire county, rural and urban, farm and home, business and industry, will make the next Tishomingo County Fair an even greater and more worthy even than the 1960 Fair held here last week.

Letters to the Editor

I hope you can find room in your news columns this week for this little report. I will try to be brief.

On August 28th about 2:15 a. m. my family and I, which includes Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Monroe, Albert, Austin, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Crum and son, and of course we were happy to have Miss Libby Murrah go with us; left to visit our son and his family in Washington, D. C.

Our first stop was in Chattanooga, Tenn., where we ate breakfast. From there we went to Knoxville, Tenn., where we ate some sandwiches they had prepared before leaving home. From there we drove through Johnson City into Bristol, Virginia. By then the sun was very low and we had run into some road construction where the traffic was heavy.

About five or six cars were in front of me. Some fellow decided to make a left turn. Mrs. Monroe had gone to sleep in the back seat, and we had a thermos jug of water on the floor board. Having to apply the brakes suddenly, my wife was rolled off on the rug and it must have been a total loss.

Our next stop was at Roanoke, Va., about 10:00 p. m. Sunday, where I called Noel to meet us at the city limits in D. C. He said, "Dad, I wouldn't try to make it tonight. You are still about 280 miles from Washington." So we found a very nice motel where we stayed the rest of the night.

Early next morning we hit Highway 460 to Lynchburg where we stopped to gas up and relax a bit. Before leaving I went in the men's room and when I closed the door a window fell from above, hitting me on top of my head. When the glass quit falling I could feel blood running down my forehead. I called for help. We were at Madison Heights about two miles from Lynchburg hospital. One of the attendants suggested they take me back to the hospital and get the glass out of my head. So after the nurse had cut my hair and the doctor sewed my head up, we were on our way again.

Arriving at Lincoln Memorial about 7:00 p. m. Monday where the son and his wife and baby met us and carried us through town to his home where we are ready to rest.

Next morning being Tuesday we started to see part of the town. Stopping first at Washington Monument, from there to the Capitol but they were redecorating and we didn't get to tour the Capitol.

From there to the Smithsonian Institute where we saw just a very small part, but there is quite a difference in a 1901 automobile and a 1960. From there we drove over to the Unknown Soldier's grave where we saw the Navy do a beautiful drill backed up by the Marine Band. From there to the National Airport where we saw those big airplanes land and take off with

those heavy loads. The sun being almost down we drove back to Noel's to eat a snack and chat awhile.

Tuesday night about 11:30 we got the boy to escort us out of town. Since it was raining it was pretty rough sailing for awhile. Didn't have any trouble at all on our way back except we got lost in Chattanooga about 5 p. m. Wednesday.

Part of the bunch going down to see Ruby Falls and all going up on top of the mountain to look out across the beautifully lighted town finished our visits and exploring.

That's all boys, and if I were you, if you haven't already, I would renew my subscription to this paper because if the Good Lord lets me live, next year about this time I will be going some place else and you can never tell what might happen to me. The only way I will have to get you word is through this newspaper. And I declare, Mr. Holtsford didn't ask me to say that.

1960 SS Amendments Increase Benefits And Those Eligible

Social Security Amendments signed by the President on September 13 will bring benefits to an estimated 125,000 additional disabled workers and to the members of their families throughout the country, Hugh D. Tigrett, Manager of the Tupelo Social Security Office, announced today.

Mr. Tigrett explained that a person can now qualify for disability benefits without regard to his age. If he has worked long enough under social security and if his disability is severe enough to meet the definition in the social security law, he and eligible members of his family may draw the benefits even if he has not reached 50—the age requirement in the prior law.

Another change made by the new amendments affects people entitled to benefits and who are working. Unchanged is the rule that a person can get social security benefits for every month of the year if his earnings for the year do not go over \$1200. For amounts over \$1200—the following formula applies beginning in 1961: One dollar in benefits is withheld for each \$2 of earnings between \$1200 and \$1500. If a person earns more than \$1500, he forfeits a dollar in benefits for each dollar that his earnings go over the \$1500 amount. However, in spite of this rule, no

one will forfeit benefits for any month that he earns \$100 or less in wages. If he is self-employed, he does not forfeit a benefit for any month that he does not engage actively in the affairs of his business.

Mr. Tigrett estimated that 25,000 people—many of them aged widows—will benefit by changes in the law which permit payment of monthly checks to eligible survivors of working people who died between March 31, 1938, and December 31, 1939, with at least a year and a half of work under social security. Before this change, survivors could not receive benefits on the social security account of anyone who died before 1940.

The amendments also reduce the amount of work time needed to qualify for benefits. Instead of needing two calendar quarters of work for every four quarters after 1950, the number of work quarters required is now one for three. Unchanged, however, is the provision that no one may get benefits without at least six quarters of work. "Anyone who has failed to qualify for benefits in the past because he did not have enough work under social security should contact the Social Security Representative at the Court House in Iuka any Monday afternoon to find out if this new provision now makes him eligible," Mr. Tigrett explained.

Other changes made by the amendments extend social security to parents working in a trade or business owned by a son or daughter, permit nonprofit organizations to provide social security coverage for present employees who want coverage, and for employees hired in the future even if less than two-thirds of the employees desire this coverage, and give clergymen, whose social security participation is optional, an extension to April 15, 1962, to choose to be included under the social security plan. A further change allows benefits to be paid to wives, stepchildren, and adopted children of retired and disabled workers, if the relationship has been in effect for at least one year.

"For further information about how these amendments affect you, contact the Social Security Representative at the Court House in Iuka any Monday afternoon," Mr. Tigrett explained. "You should make sure to contact the representative if you may be newly entitled to benefits. Monthly checks cannot be started until an application for them is made."

What Is Good?

Lesson for September 25, 1960
DIFFERENT kinds of Christians
argue about doctrine, but they
do not argue so much about what
is good and right to do. One of the
most famous passages in the en-
tire Bible is up for study this week.

Some of its great words have been
described in
Roman Catholic
cathedrals, in
Unitarian
churches, in Prot-
estant sanctuaries.
We have to
agree with one
another here, be-
cause the Bible
speaks on the
point so plainly
we cannot dodge it.

What Do We Mean By "Good?"

Everybody uses the word "good"
but not everybody stops to think
what it exactly means. It certainly
means more than "I like it." We
know what we call good, but why
do we call it that? And is there
good which deserves the name
whether we recognize it or not?

What we really want to know,
when we are serious about all this,
is what God calls good. Now this
is not a new question. Many cen-
turies ago the prophet Micah faced
"good" people who felt that some-
how they had failed to please God.
They asked, in effect, What does
God really want us to do? If we
could figure that out, then of
course that would be the good, for
God is not going to be satisfied
with anything less. They were re-
ligious enough to see that much,
though Micah had to help them
over the bridge to a fuller under-
standing.

The People vs. God

Micah does this dramatically. He
imagines a court room as big as all
outdoors. Judges are the moun-
tains, the "enduring foundations of
the earth," symbols of eternal Jus-
tice. God first asks what his people
have against him. He reviews their
history, reminds them of how his
providence has led and protected
them so long. Then the people
speak—is it a little desperately?
What does the Lord desire? They
ask. We offer sacrifices, isn't that
enough? Is God insatiable, does he
demand always more and bigger
sacrifices? Instead of a few gal-
lons of olive oil a year, shall we
pour rivers of oil on God's altar?
Instead of one ram sacrificed at
one time, will he be better pleased
with a thousand?

He Has Showed You What Is Good

Then comes the voice (some
think it is the prophet's, others
think it is the verdict of the "ever-
lasting hills") bringing the deci-
sion of truth. Some one has pointed
out that Micah does not offer a
decision of his own. He points
without using their names) to the
other great prophets of his
day, Amos, Hosea, and Isaiah.
The key-thought was Justice;
Isaiah's was Mercy (or "steadfast
love"); and Isaiah's was Humility.
Micah has showed you (Israel) by
the three prophets what "GOOD"
means. You do not need another prophet
to tell you. Just these three things:
Justice, kindness, a humble spirit
before God. If ever any one tries to
tell you that religion is so compli-
cated that only professors can un-
derstand it, show them this sen-
tence from Micah. If any one claims
that religion is a lot of stupid Do's
and Don'ts, make them read these
few words.

Simple?

Some Bible readers feel a little
down at this point. "If 'good'"
is hard for men to define, how
can it be more mysterious it must be
if God sees it! Surely there must
be something more, something big-
ger than this! Well, but what is
greater than justice, what is greater
than steadfast love, what is better
than humility in the presence of
God? These are not little items
from a long list of little items.
These are very big indeed.
You can live a long life working
for the meaning of justice and
humility. Besides, you
notice that Micah does not
say that is all there is to religion.
He does claim is these are
the three things. Without these three,
nothing else goes sour. On this
foundation much can be built. This
is the ground-floor of Good. But
on this foundation, no house
can be called good, for it
will not stand.

Reserve. There have been a number
of inquiries from farmers of Tish-
omingo County regarding this pro-
gram. The sign-up under the 1960
program was held last fall, so that
farmers would know in advance
of the cropping season whether
their land would be accepted into
the Conservation Reserve. Since
the authorization to enter into new
contracts has not been extended
beyond 1960, there will not be a
sign-up period this fall.

Farmers should understand,
however, that existing contracts for
1960 and previous years will re-
main in effect and payments will
continue to be made under them
for the period of the contract.
There are 35 Conservation Reserve
Contracts in effect in Tishomingo
County involving a total of 662
acres ranging from 5 to 10 years.
The annual rental payments for
1960 amounts to approximately
\$8,114.01.

In the state of Mississippi there
were 5826 Conservation Reserve
Contracts involving approximately
335,000 acres. The annual payments
for 1960 amounts to 4.5 million
dollars.

Loan Rate For Soybeans

The Basic Loan Rate for Tish-
omingo County for the 1960-Crop
of Soybeans grading No. 2 and
containing between 13.8—14.0 per-
cent moisture is \$1.82 per bushel.
This basic rate is for the classes
green soybeans and yellow soy-
beans. Farmers in Tishomingo
County who have soybeans plant-
ed should begin thinking about
storing these beans and placing
them in the Loan. The outlook for
soybean prices next spring will be
high. Your A. S. C. County Office
can furnish you this Loan Service.
If you do not have storage space
on the farm see us about a round
metal bin to store your beans.
The A. S. C. Office can assist you
in buying a metal bin for this pur-
pose.

Conservation Reserve Payments

The Annual Conservation Re-
serve Payment due Tishomingo
County farmers who have Conser-
vation Reserve Contracts will be
made beginning October 3, 1960.
The growing season is generally
over by October 1, 1960 and com-
pliance with the Conservation Re-
serve Contracts have been checked.
Annual Payments cannot be paid
until after that date.

Lamb Incentive Payments

We have several producers in
Tishomingo County. It is very im-
portant that a complete record of
Unborn Lambs sold be kept.

Lamb payments are made only
on lambs that have never been
shorn to encourage the customary
prices of selling lambs with the
wool on. You may file these re-
cords with your A. S. C. Office
for safe-keeping. While the Final
Date for making application under
the Lamb Program for the 1960
Marketing Year is not until APRIL

30, 1961, applications may be sub-
mitted any time between now and
this date.

Agricultural Limestone Applied To Farm-Land

Now is the time for farmers of
Tishomingo County to be thinking
about liming their pastures and
farmland. The Federal Government
will assist the farmer in paying
the cost of this material. Increas-
ed grazing has been noted from
the use of Agricultural Limestone
on pastures. Mr. John Watson, of
R-1, Iuka, has just finished sow-
ing 7.0 acres of Fescue and White
Clover. He applied 2 tons of lime
per acre. Mr. Watson states that
he has used several tons of lime
and gets more grass from the use
of lime than anything he uses. He,
also, plans to apply Agricultural
limestone to several acres of old
pasture a little later. For most
farmers in the county, the out-of-
pocket cost for applying lime to
pasture will be \$2.10 per ton (de-
livered and spread on the land).

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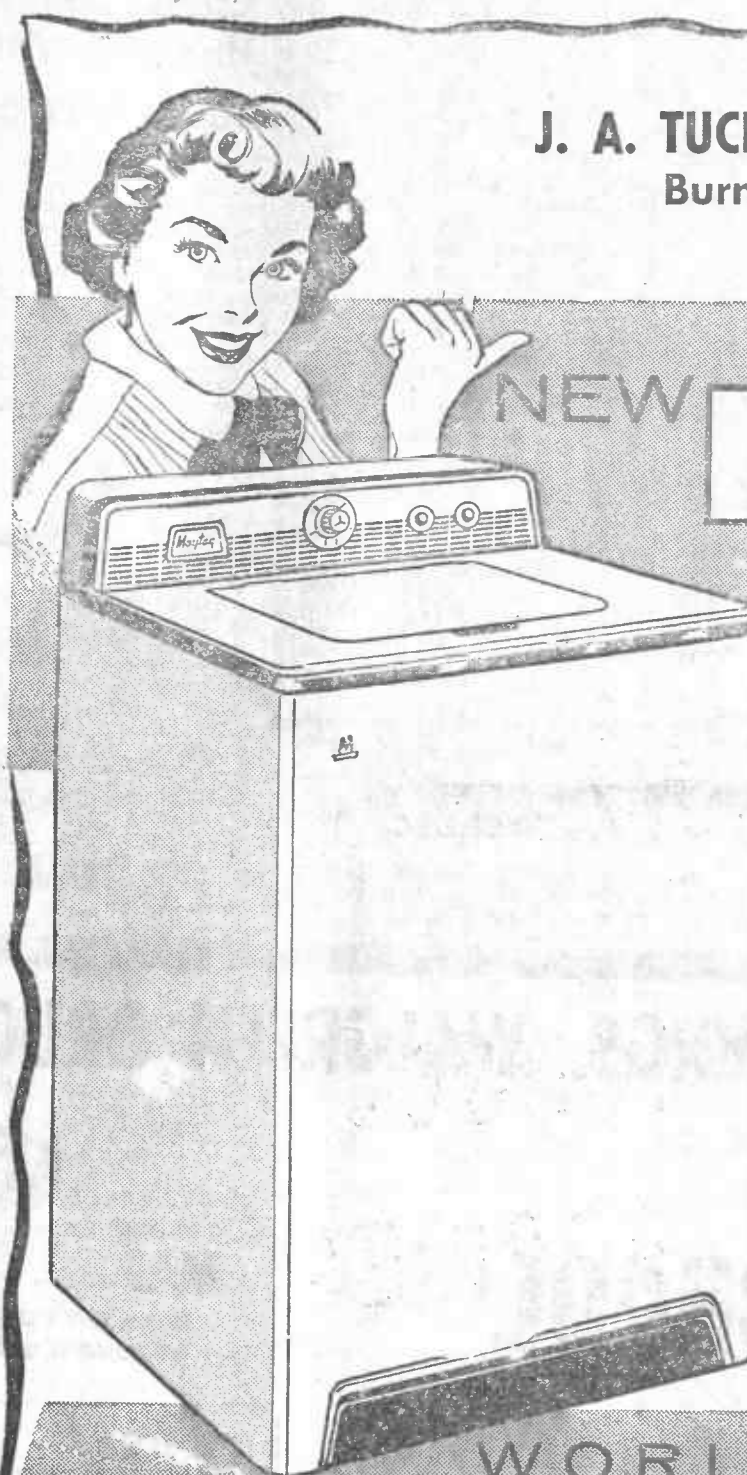
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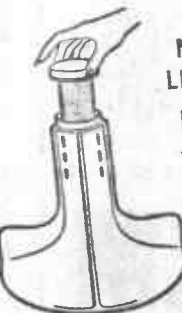

Dig Ditches While Land Is Dry

This is the time and the season to dig drainage ditches. The land is dry now and ditches can be easily dug. Next Spring when the land is wet it will be difficult for dragline operators to operate their machines without bogging down.

Draglines have replaced the hand shovel for digging drainage ditches in Tishomingo County.

Mr. E. N. Allen is head of your County Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization office. Talk to him about financial assistance in establishing the ditches you need.

Your local Soil Conservation Service personnel will, if you can be approved, survey it without cost to you. Good bottom land properly drained will produce greater yields of row crops. After the land is properly drained the landowner can use greater amounts of fertilizer with less risk of losing the crop from flooding. Higher and higher yields can be expected as the fertility of the soil is built up.

As the yields of bottom soils are increased, low producing upland can be retired from row crops and

established to grass or timber. This will result as better land-use and greater saving of soil and water on the farm.

Soil Conservation District co-operators are carrying out this idea on their farms to a greater or less extent. However, it should be understood that it takes years of patient work to make all the needed land-use adjustments landowners of Tishomingo County would like to make. But they are on their way to making these needed adjustments that will give them a profit now yet save the soil for future generations.

All of us who work with the farmers of Tishomingo County commend them for the fine job they are doing. There is much that still needs to be done on the land, but we are now moving in the right direction and in time it will be done too.

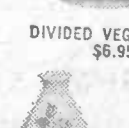

Did you eat a good breakfast this morning? One that lasted until noontime? Or did you get so hungry about 11 o'clock, you felt you just couldn't wait until lunch time?

September is Eat a Good Breakfast Month. It's the month, as schools begin, to focus our attention on this important, but often neglected meal of the day.

Breakfast is the meal that should provide a fourth to a third of the day's calories and protein. The basic breakfast foods include fruit, cereal or eggs, bread, butter and milk. But put the emphasis on variety to add interest; not sameness which makes for monotony and breakfast skipping.

Breakfast skippers are the ones who are tired at mid-morning, nervous and inefficient. A good breakfast is part of a parent's aid to good report cards for Junior and Susie.

Egg Shopping

You're probably finding more medium size eggs at the grocery store as you shop these days. Remember, when the price difference between medium and large eggs is 6 or 7 cents, medium size eggs are the better buy.

Stuffed Baked Fresh Pears

3 large fresh ripe pears, 6 heaping teaspoons mincemeat, 1/3 cup sugar, 1/2 cup water, 1/16 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice.

Heat oven to 375 degrees F (moderate). Peel pears. Cut in half and remove core. Place in baking dish. Fill center of each with one heaping teaspoon mincemeat. Combine sugar, water, salt and lemon juice, bring to boiling point and pour over pears. Cover baking dish with metal foil.

Bake 1 hour, or until tender (time depends on ripeness of the pears). Baste three times with the sirup. Remove foil. Baste and bake 15 to 20 minutes. Serve one half pear.

Flowers for Spring!
Some annuals will produce better flowers if you plant the seed outdoors in the fall. For blooms next spring, plant seed now of calendula, dianthus, scabiosa, per-

winkle, annual phlox, gaillardia, California poppy, larkspur and snapdragon.

September and October are the months, too, to plant bulbs for spring flowers. This includes lily, daffodil, hyacinth, narcissus, and iris. Choose ground that grows good vegetables. Prepare soil well. For safety, keep the windshield of your car clean. A dirty windshield increases glare, adds to eye strain and cuts visibility.
