Mississippi, Alabama Sign Fishing Laws Agreements

**Officials Of Both States Approve
Reciprocal Licenses On Tenn. River**

A reciprocal fishing license agreement which will greatly benefit Mississippi fishermen has been signed by officials of Mississippi and Alabama.

Details of the agreement were worked out at a joint meeting of Alabama and Mississippi Game and Fish Commissioners held at J. P. Coleman Park, north of Iuka, last August.

Under the reciprocal agreement, fishermen using a valid fishing license issued by the State of Mississippi will be honored in lieu of an Alabama sports license while fishing in Alabama waters of the Tennessee as specifically described in the agreement. The same holds true for fishermen using valid sports fishing licenses issued by the State of Alabama while fishing in water on the Mississippi side of the river. The agreement became effective Sept. 20.

Specifically, the agreement states that "sports fishing is defined as the lawful taking of fish by ordinary hook and line, pole, casting with reel and rod, and use of artificial lures, spinning reel and rod, or fly rod."

The area affected is defined as

either the water of from the banks of these parts of the Tennessee River or embayments or impoundments between the junction of the Tennessee-Alabama-Mississippi line and a north-south line projected across the Tennessee River from the eastern end of the Old River-ton Lock, except and exclusive of that part of Big Bear Embayment lying south of the Southern Railway bridge.

The agreement further states that rules, regulations and creel limits "pertaining to sports fishing of the State of Mississippi apply to Alabama licenses when fishing in Mississippi waters," covered in the agreement. Conversely, the rules, regulations and creel limits "pertaining to sports fishing of the State of Alabama apply to Mississippi licenses when fishing in Alabama waters," as defined in the agreement.

Either state which is a party to the agreement may abrogate and cancel the agreement upon ninety days written notice of such cancellation to the other party.

While the reciprocal agreement was only acted upon last August at the joint meeting of the two state Game and Fish commissions here, the legislatures of both Mississippi and Alabama had some years earlier authorized the Commissions to enter into such an agreement.

The Alabama legislature, in its 1957 session, approved entering into the reciprocal agreement with Mississippi.

The Mississippi legislature, in the 1956 Regular Session, had approved the State Game and Fish Commission entering into such a co-operative agreement with Alabama.

In signing the agreement, Gov. Ross Barnett stated, "This is the time in history that such a proposal has been worked out between the states, although fishermen have been requesting it for many years. While the agreement is satisfactory to Alabama, it will benefit Mississippi fishermen the most because more of the Pickwick waters in Alabama."

The conference held here in August whereby the agreement was reached, was attended by Dr. Lewis George of Iuka, commissioner from the North Judicial district, Rep. J. O. (Click) Clark, chairman of the House Game and Fish Committee, Aubrey Seay, Oxford; Cade Shipp, Brookhaven; John Camp, Jackson; Tom Watts, Columbia; Prentiss Walker, Mize, Ray, Canada, Jackson. William T. Lusk, Cleveland, Game and Fish Commissioner and C. E. Marlar, Iuka, game warden.

Also attending the meeting were Charles Kelly, William C. Younger and Bill Parsons of the Alabama Game and Fish Division, and Dr. T. B. Ford from the Louisiana Wildlife Commission.

Phillips Seeks School Board Post

**Is Candidate For
Member-At-Large In
Nov. General Election**

L. G. Phillips, retired teacher, has announced his candidacy for the county-wide or floating member of the County School Board. Election of three Board members will take place in the November General election. Prospective candidates have until Oct. 8, to get their qualifying petitions signed.

In seeking the member-at-large post on the School Board, Mr. Phillips points out that he has made education his profession, having started teaching in 1922. He served as principal of Belmont school for seven years before his retirement.

Mr. Phillips also taught in the Prentiss County schools for 13 years and served as Superintendent of New State Special School district. He has been a professor at State College and did extension teaching for the University of Mississippi. He lives on his farm near Dennison.

Two other Board members are to be elected besides Mr. Phillips. Mr. Phillips is running for the unexpired term of Kermit Rushing who resigned from the First District post. Since the First District is no longer in the county school system, that member becomes a member-at-large. The two other Board members to be elected in November are for the Fifth district, which post becomes open this fall, and the Third District post presently held by appointment by Hubert Jourdan to fill the unexpired term of Clyde Bingham who resigned last spring.

FFA Judging Team Will Compete In National Contest

The Tishomingo FFA dairy judging team will leave for Waterloo, Iowa, Friday September 30, where they will represent the state of Mississippi in the National FFA Dairy Judging Contest.

The team, which is made up of Donnie Green, Jerry Lee Rushing and Jimmy Pounds, won out over 18 other judging teams in the state competition held last May at MSU. Their coach is L. D. Edwards, vocational agriculture teacher at Tishomingo High School.

The team plans to arrive in Waterloo, Saturday afternoon, October 1, although the team does not judge until 10:00 a. m. Monday, Oct. 3. They must be registered by 2:00 p. m. Sunday and have the team picture made. By arriving on Saturday the team will have an opportunity to observe the judging of the show classes which will take place on Sunday morning.

The team, accompanied by their coach, will remain in Waterloo for the remainder of the world's largest dairy cattle show, Tuesday, and the FFA banquet Tuesday evening and leave for home on Wednesday.

County Baptists Will Mark 100th Anniversary Oct. 4-5

**Centennial Meeting Will Open In
Burnsville; Many Notables To Attend**

The 100th annual meeting of the Tishomingo County Baptist Association will be held next Tuesday and Wednesday, October 4th and 5th, beginning at 10:00 a. m. in the Burnsville Baptist Church. The sessions will continue through Tuesday night at Burnsville and will then move to the Iuka Baptist Church for the Wednesday meeting.

In October 1860 churches from Tishomingo, Prentiss and Alcorn counties met in the old Burnsville Baptist meeting house for the purpose of organizing a fellowship of

local churches. This fellowship was to serve as a common front of witness and effort in the work which the churches were trying to do. Eugene Tension, Superintendent of Missions for the present association, points out that the district association has been a unique part of the history of Baptist life, with many Baptist historians pointing back to the Jerusalem council in the first half of the first century A. D. as the precedent for action.

The Centennial program, according to J. D. Joslin, Moderator and Program Chairman, will be a rich one with a number of outstanding speakers and ministers to present messages and reports to the messengers which each church will send to the sessions.

The first Session, Tuesday morning, will feature the annual associational sermon by Rev. C. C. Perry, pastor of the New Liberty Church and a member of the associational for a number of years. In the afternoon Dr. S. S. Sargent from Blue Mountain College will speak in behalf of Blue Mountain College and Christian Education.

Tuesday night, beginning at 7:00, the highlight of the associational meeting will occur when Dr. Chester L. Quarles, Executive Secretary of the Mississippi Baptist Convention Board in Jackson will preach. Dr. Quarles has completed ten years of successful leadership of Mississippi Baptists and is recognized as one of the outstanding figures of the denominational life of Southern Baptists.

On Wednesday, the messengers, and the crowds of visitors expected for this historic meeting will hear reports from various associational leaders concerning their work of the past year and of plans for the coming year. State Senator Flavours Lambert, Jr. will address the association at 11:00 concerning the recent attempt in the legislature of Mississippi to legalize liquor. Afternoon messages will include the annual doctrinal sermon by another pastor who has served in this county's Baptist churches for more than a score of years, W. C. Hamilton. Dr. E. C. Williams from Jackson will also speak in the afternoon session.

A business meeting will close the meeting.

Twenty-two churches representing 3000 Baptists in the county are expected to send messengers. In addition, a large group of visitors from adjoining and sister associations throughout the state are expected.

The committee met at Sands Restaurant, Monday night, for an organizational dinner. Mr. Bonds was named chairman; Mr. Yarber, vice-chairman and Mr. Spinks, secretary-treasurer.

Plans call for the group to meet with representatives of the State A & I Board, either here or in Jackson, from time to time and formulate plans for attracting industry to Tishomingo County and improve the agricultural economy of the county.

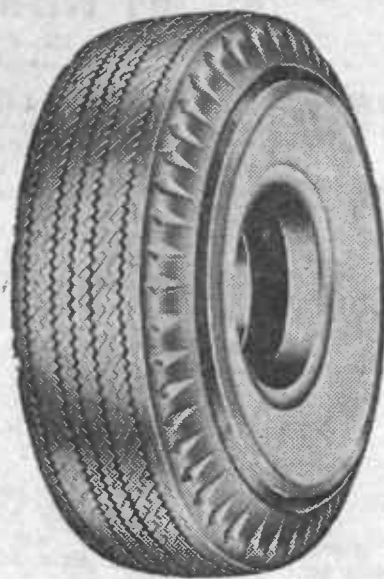

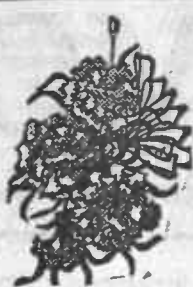

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The Chestnut Tree

Much of our attention these days is directed toward tree growth when we think of the woodlands. Pines are a staple in the growth of the southern pulpwood industry and a source of economic growth in southern communities.

The pine tree, however, has not always been king of southern forest. We pause to consider and pay tribute to the monarch of the past—the chestnut tree. Wilbur Chan, forestry agent for the IC Railroad tells the story of the vanished chestnut in these words.

"Under a spreading chestnut tree, the village smith stands."

These old familiar lines written by Longfellow many years ago bring back fond memories to many of us—memories of the good old days when the village blacksmith was a common sight and so was the American chestnut. Today both have virtually disappeared from the scene.

The once prominent American chestnut is no more than just a legend to the younger generation for all practical purposes it disappeared years ago. The American chestnut to the early settlers was probably the most important single tree in the forest. One time it occupied an area extending from northern New England and southern Ontario nearly to the Gulf of Mexico westward to the Mississippi River. Not only did it provide timber for fences, lumber, industrial uses, and fire wood but it was an important source of food for wildlife. Needless to say, the fruit was considered a delicacy by many folks. Whether the house needed shingles or Grandma wanted a new picket fence around the garden, it was almost always the chestnut that was used. It was the sole source of tannin used in the leather industry and the spent chips from the sawmills were used for pulpwood. At the turn of the century it was the source of one fourth of all the sawmill crops from the southern Appalachians.

In 1904 disaster struck the American Chestnut. It was in this year that chestnut blight was first observed and recognized as a new disease in this country at the New York Zoological Park.

Less than fifty years after blight fungus was discovered in America, it had reached every part of the natural range of the American chestnut. The chestnut is estimated to have been the equivalent of nine million acres of forest stands of pure chestnuts.

The question is often asked why wasn't something done to stop this blight before it destroyed all the chestnut trees. The truth of the matter is that great efforts were made to do just that, but they all failed.

Up until ten years ago there were still thousands of free American chestnuts. Today the blight has virtually exterminated the chestnut population and a tree is likely to be truly resistant if one is ever found blight free.

County Agent's Notes

Crop Outlook

It is too early yet to give an accurate estimate of what the various crop yields for the county will be this year. However, from all indications it looks like the average county cotton yield per acre will be around 3/4 bales report a better crop than last year, others have been cut heavy by the dry weather.

The average corn yield over the county will be quite a bit lower than last year with the estimated yield this year to be around 25 bushels per acre.

Hay crops are very short as compared to the average hay produced in the county each year.

This year is one of those years that diversified farming is paying off better than any other type farming. The farmer who has cattle, hogs, chickens, forestry, and other enterprises along with big row crops is the one who can count out ahead year after year.

Storing Spray Equipment

Spraying equipment costs money, so you had better take good care of it. Before storing it for the winter, clean it up. Clean out the tank, the hoses, and the nozzles. Make sure no oil or grease is left

on any rubber parts.
If you store it properly this winter it will be ready for use early next season when you need it.
Quality Cotton
As the season gets later, producing quality cotton gets harder and harder. Here are a few things you can do to preserve the quality of cotton:
Pick it dry. Wait until the dew or rain dries off before picking. If you hand pick cotton and it is wet, spread it out on a tarpaulin to dry before taking it to the gin.

Never tramp any damp or trashy cotton, better yet, never tramp any seed cotton!
Don't rush the ginner. Give him time to do a good job.
If your land needs lime, apply it just as important as using other needed fertilizer. When you leave off lime and your land needs it, you will have poor pastures and in most cases, no clover.
Lime is also important under row crops. If your land needs lime you don't get the results from the other fertilizers that you should.
