New Ripley Plant Underway
Construction is now underway on the American Biltrite Company's \$3,000,000 plant near Ripley. Expected to employ up to 500 persons when completed, the plant includes a main building some 822 feet long and 222 feet wide plus offices, utility and boiler rooms. A county-wide bond election was passed for \$1,200,000 of the cost, and the company financed the re-

maining cost of the plant.
\$111,000,000 Construction Work Underway in Jackson Area
Some \$111,000,000 in construction activity is currently underway and planned in the Jackson area, including a Veterans Administration Hospital (\$14 million), 10,000 seat coliseum (\$5 million), auditorium (\$2.5 million), new jet airport (\$10 million), University Medical School Research Center (\$3 million), interstate highway construction (\$10 million), expanded convention facilities and new 140-unit downtown motel (\$1.5 million), five office buildings (\$6 million), two apartment buildings (\$2.5 million) and residential construction (approximately \$25 million).

Sardis Chamber of Commerce Acquires Industrial Park Site
An option on 190 acres has been acquired by the Sardis Chamber of Commerce for potential use as industrial park. The site is south of Sardis along the Illinois Central railroad and is accessible to Highways 51 and Interstate 55. A drive has been recently made by the chamber to raise funds for the purchase of the site.
Atkins Saw Election Success At Greenville
The \$2.5 million BAWI bond issue election for Atkins Saw Company at Greenville was overwhelmingly approved by voters in September, 4, 705-to-33. This was the heaviest vote turnout ever recorded in a Third District bond elec-

tion and drew 75 per cent of the total number of qualified electors in the district.

Tupelo Area Forms Industrial Committee
The Tombigbee Electric Power Association, Tupelo, has announced the formation of a committee of 50 to seek industry for the Tupelo area. The committee will be composed of the power association's board of directors, members of the Lee and Itawamba county boards of supervisors, members of the Tupelo and Fulton boards of aldermen, the mayors of the smaller towns in the two counties and area businessmen and industrialists.

State Agriculture Makes Record Program In Decade
Mississippi agriculture made greater progress during the 1950's than in any other decade in its history, according to Dr. Clay Lyle, director of the Agricultural Extension Service at State College, Miss. The state ranked 19th nationally in total cash receipts from farm marketing in 1959, compared with 25th in 1957 and 1958. Mississippi was also one of only seven states that achieved an increase in net income per farm in 1959 over 1958. Particular gains have been noted in beef cattle population, income from soybeans, broiler production, egg production, and cotton yields per acre.

Signed By Governor

Governor Ross Barnett has signed a contract providing for state ownership of the Port of Gulfport. The contract must be approved in a special election by Gulfport voters. The contract will qualify the Port of Gulfport to utilize full faith and credit state bonds for port expansion and improvement, under the 1958 State Ports Act. The Agricultural and Industrial Board will manage the port, through a five-man State Port Authority—three to be named by the governor and one each by City of Gulfport officials and Harrison county supervisors. All S. P. A. members must be Gulfport residents, under the law. Another deep water port—Pascagoula—is already operating under this law, but Pascagoula elected to remain under local ownership and management.

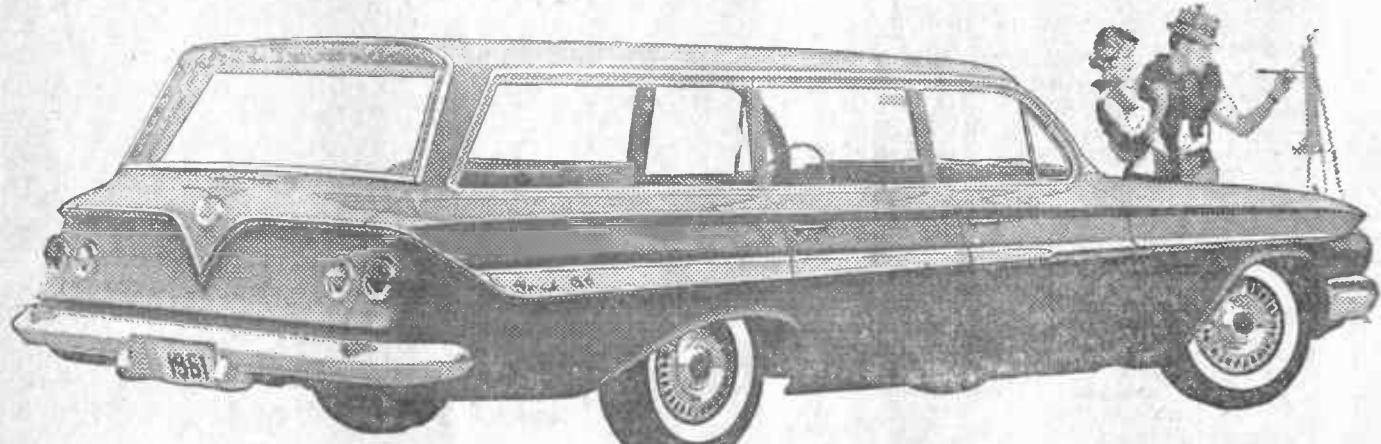

County Agent's Notes

Pastures
The first step toward pasture improvement is fertilizing perma-

legumes or clovers in them should be fertilized now with phosphate and potash so the grazing will be there next spring.
Don't forget lime. If your land needs lime and you do not apply it, chances are you will have poor growth of grass and no clover at all.
In overhauling permanent pastures, you may need some more seed. If so, check with your local County Agent's Office as to the best time to plant the grasses or legumes you want.
Don't forget some winter grazing, either in your old sod or temporary grazing. Wild winter peas and rye grass works well in Bermu-

da sod. Oats, wheat, Barley, and rye grass makes good temporary grazing.
Corn Harvesting
Moisture content of ear corn at harvesting time should be around 16 percent if harvested by hand. With corn picker moisture should be around 18 percent.
Before storing your corn, be sure to clean up and treat cribs and bins for insect control. Lindane mixed on cotton hulls and scattered in the crib as the corn is unloaded in the crib gives good control of corn weevils. Mix one pint of 20% Lindane emulsion with 1 pint of water plus one peck of cotton seed hulls. Scatter hulls in corn as it is unloaded in the crib.
You lose some corn during harvesting. The average loss is around five bushels to the acre. If you will turn in livestock following harvest, you can recover nearly all the loss. At the same time the livestock gets a lot of extra grazing.

Shredding stalks following harvest pays. The stalks and litter will rot faster shredded than they will not shredded. Shredding stalks also destroys hibernating places for insects and makes cultivation easier next year.
Dairy Reminders
This is the breeding season for dairy cows, and the future herd depends on the sire you are now using. Generally the best sire you can afford is obtainable through artificial breeding.
Breed your cows to freshen in the fall, but be sure to allow the cows a 60 day rest between freshening and rebreeding.
Pastures are our cheapest feed for dairy cows. Plan to have some temporary grazing crops next summer.
Cull your herd soon. Prices may be lower in the spring, and cull cows take up food that the good cows need. The best way to find out which cow is producing the most or the least is to start the weigh-a-day program for your herd.

Home Agent Notes

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK is rolling around in a few days—October 9-15.
On farms alone 750 people have lost their lives since the FIRE PREVENTION WEEK last year. Nearly \$175,000,000 worth of property has been destroyed, too.
We can't do the fire prevention job during this one week. It takes being careful and following the fire safety rules year-round—week after week and day after day.
A major failure is that most families are utterly unprepared to act if a fire breaks out. Do you have a fire extinguisher in the home, barn, other places? Do you keep a constant check on fire hazards? Did you ever look over your home and plan escape routes in case of fire? Do the children know these routes?
Why not hold a family fire drill during Fire Prevention Week and then regularly afterwards. Everyone in your home will then react almost automatically to a fire emergency.

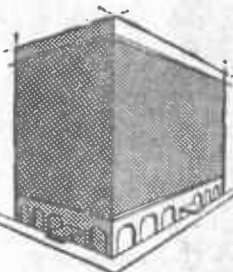

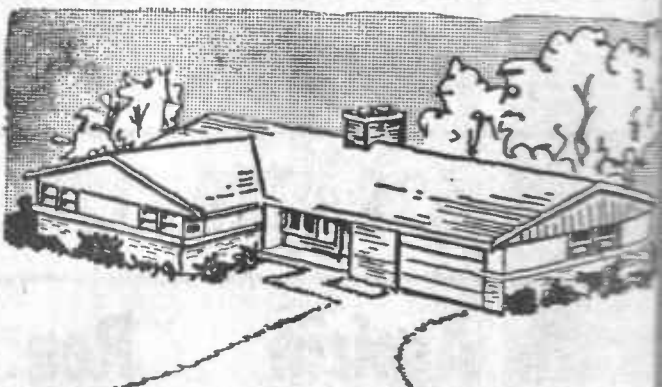

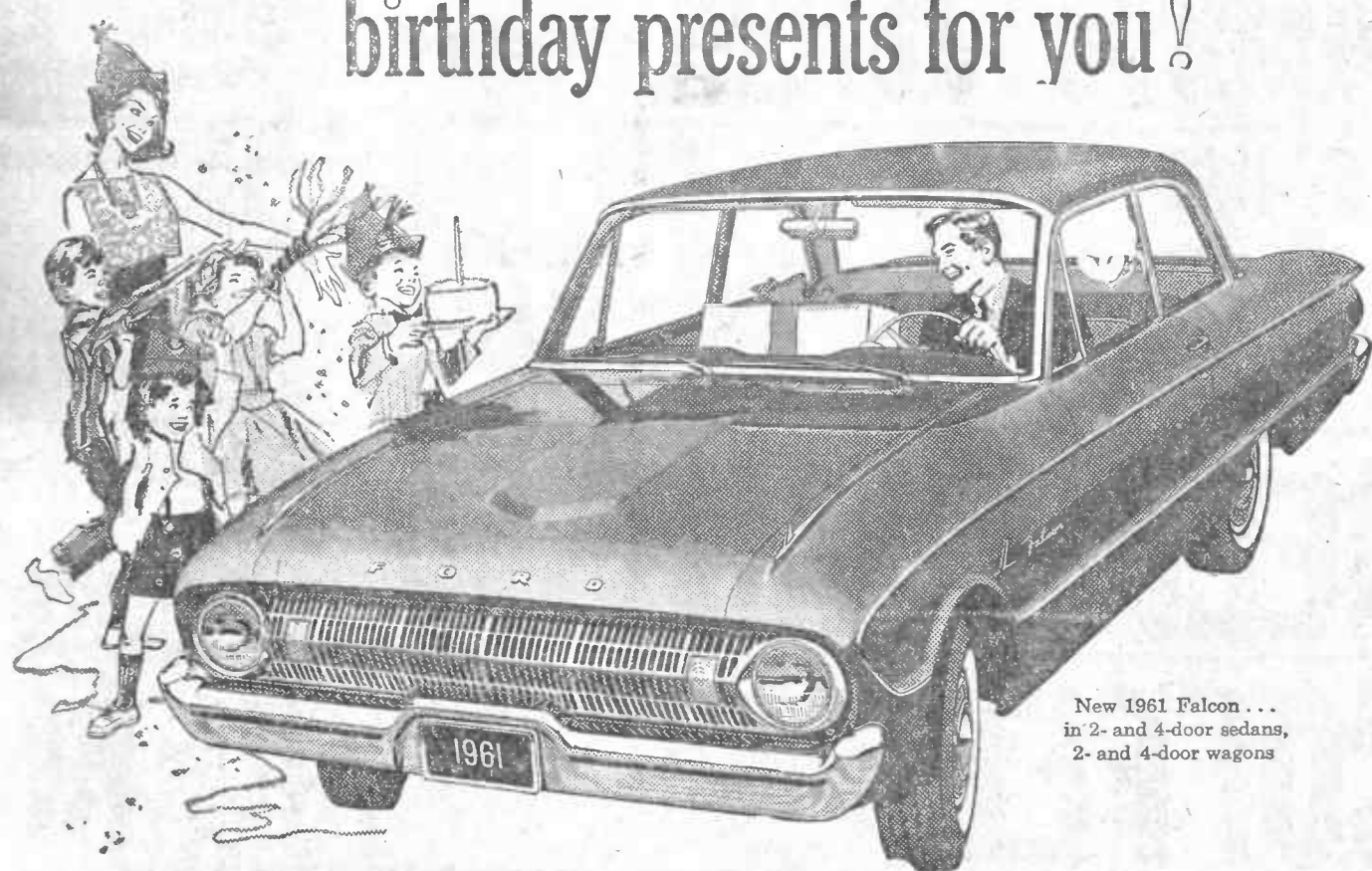

ASC NEWS

Winter Cover Crop

Have you been to the ASC Office and placed an order for your Winter Cover Crop seed? If you haven't I urge you to see about this at once. You know that when the County Allocation of funds have been used, you cannot get any Government Assistance.

Don't let other farmers in the County beat you to the draw. To the farmers in Tishomingo County who have not signed for anything during the 1966 program year have a real bargain in store. Did you know that you could get help from the Government, thru your ASC Office, to sow 4 acres of Hairy Vetch (25 lbs. to the acre) for approximately \$6.30 or \$1.57 per acre.

Also you could sow 4 acres of Oats for Winter grazing on your cropland for approximately \$18.08 or \$4.52 per acre.

There is plenty of time left to sow oats and rye grass for grazing. Mr. Edward Wynn of R-1, Iuka was by the office today and signed for more Oats and Rye Grass. He stated that had 3 acres of Rye Grass and 2 acres of Oats that was ready to graze now. Frank Loveless of R-1, Tishomingo was by the office and reported that his oats and rye grass was about ready for grazing.

I was by Cager Hill farm R-1, Tishomingo, this week and he was getting ready to sow 3 acres of Oats to help out with his feed. He stated that the ASC Program was a big help to farmers in furnishing 50% of the cost of Oats and Nitrogen. He further stated that he wanted to sow all of his cotton land in Hairy Vetch a little later.

We visited the W. J. Brinkley farm near Iuka, this week and looked over the fine crop of Soybeans and Corn. He has about 65 acres of Soybeans which we believe will make 30 to 35 bushels of beans per acre. Also 30 acres of corn. Mr. Brinkley will harvest these crops and store them in Round Metal Bins that the ASC Program Purchased for him under the Farm Storage Facility Loan Program will make available to Mr. Brinkley the Loan Program placing his corn and soybeans in the Government Loan. The Loan price for Soybeans is \$1.82 per bushel and \$1.11 per bushel for corn.

This makes it possible for Mr. Brinkley to hold his corn and soybeans for better prices next spring. Why not check with your ASC Office on these Programs, Farm Storage Facility Loan and Commo-

dity Loan Program. Maybe you need more storage on your farm at a low cost. Let your Local Tishomingo ASC County Committee assist you with this Program.
