132 Families Want Homes In Area

**Will Be Employed At
Tennessee River Pulp
And Paper Company**

James Forester, an official of the
Tennessee River Pulp and Paper
Co., stated Tuesday night that 132
families will be moving into the
area within the next three months.

Mr. Forester said this many
people will be employed at the
mill from distant places and will
have to move to the vicinity of
the Counce mill. Twelve of these
families will move in November,
40 in December, 52 in January
from the first to the fifteenth, and
28 from the 16 to the 31 of January.
"These people will have to have
places to live and we are appeal-
ing to the surrounding communi-
ties to furnish these houses," Mr.
Forester said.

"At this date," he said, "I doubt
if there are as many as 30 avail-
able houses in the entire area from
which the mill will draw other
employees." Mr. Forester spoke be-
fore the Iuka Chamber of Com-
merce at a called meeting Tuesday
night in the Power office.

Purpose of the meeting was to
determine what effort was being
made in Iuka for supplying houses
for employees of the paper mill
at Counce. Several members stated
that they now have houses under
construction, being remodeled, and
others in the planning stage. Mr.
Forester said that workers who
will move in will want to rent at
first with the possible intention of
buying a home after they have liv-
ed in the community for a while.
He further said that all employees
of the mill will be thoroughly
screened and only men and fam-
ilies of high caliber will be moved
into the area.

Anyone having good rental prop-
erty or houses for sale are asked
to list them with Miss Willie
Hiett in the Mayor's office who in
turn will send the listings to the
personnel office at the paper mill.
Herman Gann, president of the
Iuka Chamber, stated that it was
very important "for all to cooper-
ate in this effort to properly lo-
cate these new citizens of the area
and do all that is possible to get
them in Tishomingo county."

Mr. Grisham is a cotton buyer,

The first "clothes-line" Art Ex-

Contests For Educational Jobs**

Three more Tishomingo County men announced
their candidacies this week for posts on the County
School Board. Prof. W. R. Nettles of Tishomingo and
Sherman Lambert of Burnsville are seeking the post
of county member-at-large and Travis Cain of Belmont
is seeking the 5th District post.

Two others have previously an-
nounced their candidacies for one
of the three vacancies on the
Board. L. G. Phillips of Dennis
wants the member-at-large job and
H. E. Hester of the South Cross
Roads community has announced
for the 3rd District job. The three
district posts will be filled in the
November 8th election.

5th District Candidate
Travis Cain, farmer and poultry-
man of Belmont, filed his qualifi-
cation petition with the County Cir-
cuit Clerk last week and an-
nounces his candidacy for the post
of County School Board member
from the 5th District.

Mr. Cain is a native of Tishom-
ingo County, having been born in
the Valley community near Bel-
mont, where he has lived most of
his life. He served three and a
half years in the U. S. Army, enter-
ing the service in 1942. After his
discharge, he took two years of
college work and taught for one
year in the Dennis School.

In seeking the School Board job,
Mr. Cain stated he is vitally inter-
ested in the education of Tishom-
ingo County children and the quality
of schooling in the county. "I
would like to see Tishomingo Coun-
ty have the best schools possible,"
Mr. Cain said, "and if elected to
the School Board, I will serve to
the best of my ability to help the
schools achieve that goal."

Mrs. Cain is a native of Chick-
asaw County. She taught in the
Houston, Miss., schools and other
Chickasaw County schools before
coming to Tishomingo County to
live. The Cains have three child-
ren in the Belmont school.

The 5th District School Board
post becomes open this fall with
the expiration of the term of
George Harris, present member,
Dec. 31. The term runs for six
years.

Election of the Fifth District
School Board member and two
other Board members, one for the
Third District and a county mem-
ber-at-large, will take place No-
vember 8, when the General Elec-
tion is held.

Third District Constable To Be Elected In Nov.

A Constable for the Third Dis-
trict will be selected in a special
election, November 8. The elec-
tion was called for by the Tishom-
ingo County Board of Supervisors
at the regular meeting of the
Board, Oct. 3. Separate ballots will
be prepared for names of those
who will seek the post. The special
election will be held at the same
time and place the General Elec-
tion is held in the district.

A petition asking for the election
of a Third District Constable was
brought before the Board in the
summer, but rather than call a
special election during the sum-
mer the matter was deferred until
November when the General Elec-
tion is held. Only Third District
voters will cast ballots in the Special
Election for Constable.

A Second District constable was
appointed by the Board of Super-
visors at the Oct. 3rd meeting. The
appointment, however, is subject to
approval by the Secretary of State
and the Governor and will not be-
come official until such approval
is given.

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"ACCIDENTS LOOKING FOR A PLACE TO HAPPEN"

Figures recently released in Jackson show the number of automobiles in Mississippi this year increased about 26.5 thousand over last year. The number of trucks advanced some 4.7 thousand. The purpose of the news release was to point up that fact that the state's percentage increase is 4.5 as compared with the national increase of 3.3.

It also points up the fact that the state's compulsory inspection of motor vehicles law, enacted by the 1960 legislature, will not go into effect one day too soon, with all that number of motor vehicles traveling the state's highways.

Most of that increased number of autos and trucks, of course, represents new or late model vehicles which one may assume are fairly safe—mechanically. However, according to Owen Cooper, president of the Mississippi Safety Council, there are "thousands of automobiles on the highways of the state which should have been in a junk yard years ago." Elimination or correction of mechanically unsafe vehicles is the primary purpose of the Compulsory Inspection Law which goes into effect, January 1, 1961.

Many of us who are driving "old" automobiles may take slight umbrage at having our vehicles referred to as "piles of junk," but we shouldn't—if we have kept them mechanically safe. It is the unsafe vehicle for which the inspection law was designed and all mechanically unsafe automobiles are not necessarily "old." They just haven't been kept in safe operating order.

"These vehicles with no lights or brakes; with worn tires and loose steering apparatus are nothing more than accidents looking for a place to happen, and this same type vehicle is involved in thousands of accidents each year," the Safety Council president stated.

Last year, 549 people were killed in traffic accidents in Mississippi. Surely we will all agree that something needs to be done to cut such a tragic toll. The Inspection Law will be an important factor in cutting down on traffic accidents if it is properly administered and enforced. It is estimated the number of accidents will be reduced by about 20% over a period of four or five years after the law becomes effective.

It should be understood that this is not a law to penalize anyone. It is designed to protect the state's citizens and those who travel our highways, by making all motor vehicles meet a minimum standard of safety. Inspections will be made at privately-owned stations, bonded and licensed by the state. Enforcement will be under the Highway Safety Patrol.

The law provides for a period of five days in which a motor vehicle declared unsafe may have defects corrected. A second inspection and the inspector is certain it cannot be made to meet the minimum standards for safety, then the registration of that particular vehicle will be revoked and it will not be allowed to operate on the roads and highways of the state.

As usual, when a law of this sort is passed, it will meet with opposition from some quarters. There will be the cry of "politics" and "favoritism" in the licensing of inspection stations, but over and above all this, the primary purpose of the inspection law must not be forgotten. It is aimed at saving lives. We should give it every chance of succeeding.

New Vicksburg Plant Nearing Production

In less than a month's time, the U. S. Rubber Reclaiming Company will begin initial production in its new \$1,250,000 plant south of Vicksburg, according to company officials. Plant manager Tom Galvin said that he would soon put together a work force of approximately 40 people to operate the equipment which will convert old automobile, truck and bus tires into 70,000 pounds of reclaimed rubber each day. The plant located in Vicksburg as the direct result of negotiations between the company and the Chamber of Commerce and Industrial Foundation. It is the only branch of the company which maintains home office in Buffalo, N. Y.

Jackson Plant Sold, Expansion Forecast

Jackson's largest industry, the 1600 - employee Mississippi Products, Inc., has been sold under an arrangement that calls for an early expansion of the plant's present operations and likely later expansion. The wood products manufacturing plant, located in Jackson 14 years ago, was sold by Sears, Roebuck and Company to the Storkline Corporation of Chicago, a manufacturer of infant and juvenile furniture. Company executives announced that Storkline's headquarters would be moved to Jackson as well as present operations in Chicago and Lawrence, Mass. Hattiesburg Firm Processes Millionth Broiler

Forrest Farm Poultry Plant, Hattiesburg, recently processed its millionth broiler. The firm started operations June 27, and its building was financed by a BAWI bond issue. Passage of the millionth bird in three months denotes progress of the plant, which now turns out 3,000 broilers per hour and expects soon to reach a capacity of 4,500 an hour.

Jackson To Get New Plant

The Jackson Chamber of Commerce Industrial Committee announced this month that the Langston Bag Company of Mississippi had acquired the plant of the Mississippi Bag and Burlap Company and will immediately begin production of a variety of textile bags for distribution throughout the South. The company will employ approximately 30 employees. The production of the plant will consist of cotton and burlap bags for seed, feed, fertilizer, oil mill and related uses.

Tylertown, Renzi Voters Approve B. A. W. I. Issues

Tylertown voters approved a \$120,000 BAWI bond issue for expansion of Haspel, Inc., manufacturer of men's summer suits, and voters in Alcorn county's third district overwhelmingly approved a \$225,000 bond issue for construction of a plant for Lifetime Pools Equipment Corporation at Renzi. The vote in Alcorn county was 601 to 22.

Winston, Madison Counties Eye Industrial Development

An Industrial Development Corporation designed to purchase and develop industrial sites suitable for new and expanding industry has been organized by the Winston County Chamber of Commerce. And some 40 businessmen have offered financial support to a new drive for industry in Canton by purchasing stock in a Madison County Industrial Development Corporation.

I am no longer connected with Blue Mountain College. After serving on its faculty for fifty years, I retired to private life on June 1, 1960.

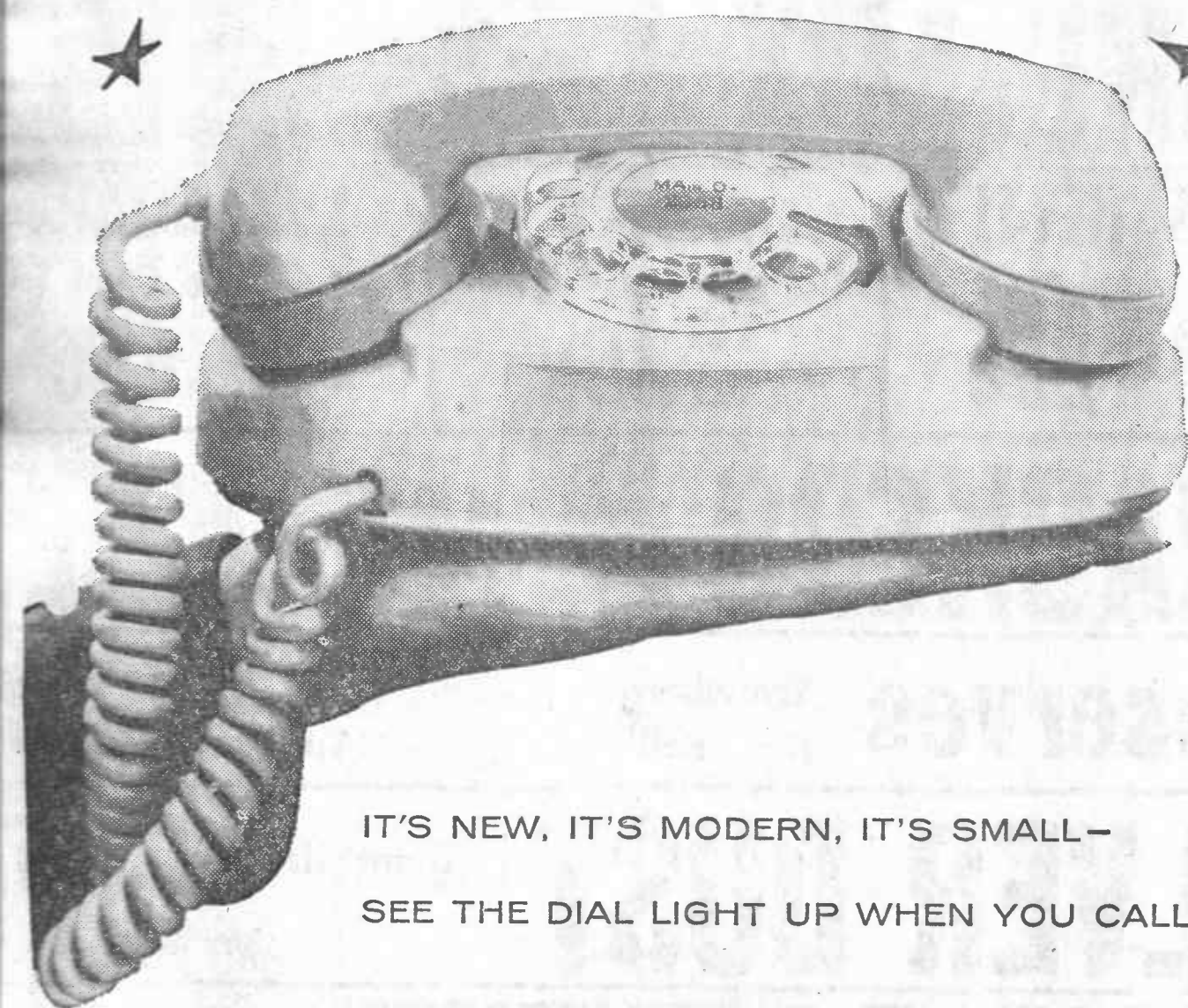
