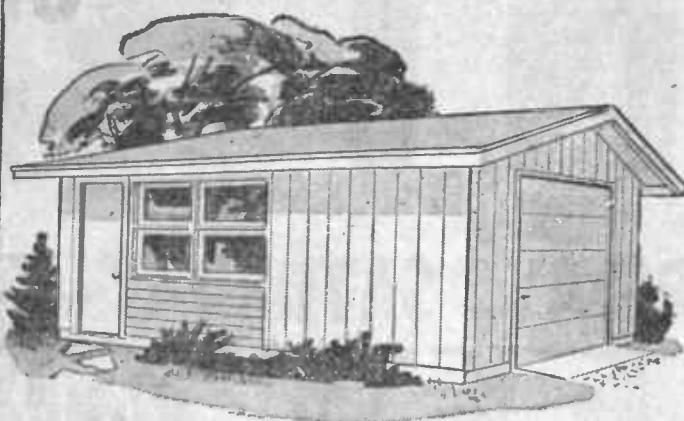

Forest fires are most destructive. An uncontrolled fire can destroy all your young pine seedlings and do great damage to your larger pines.

Why take this risk when you can maintain fire lanes by diskling up woods roads?

A well maintained fire lane can stop a slow burning fire, and it can be used as a place to backfire against a fast moving hot fire.

Fire lanes can be used as roads to enter the woods and haul out pulpwood or saw-logs.

They provide a way for fire fighting crews to reach forest fires quickly.

Don't delay maintaining your fire lanes. They can, and often do, save landowners from serious loss of valuable timber.

several weeks, Mr. Tigrett will explain a different change in the law. All the changes affect a great many people in Tishomingo County.

For the Fourth time in six years Congress has passed amendments to the social security law which liberalize the protection afforded disabled workers and their dependents.

Under the 1960 amendments, approximately 250,000 people—disabled workers under 50 years of age and certain of the dependents—are now eligible for social security benefits. Until now only those disabled workers between 50 and 65 and their dependents were eligible for monthly social security payments.

Younger disabled workers are more likely to have families dependent on them than older workers age 50 and over. Before the change in the social security law, many of them were dependent upon public assistance payments which are financed out of general tax funds. It is estimated that \$28 million will be saved in public assistance payments during the next year now that many of these young disabled workers and their families are eligible for disability insurance benefits based on their past earnings and social security tax contribution under social security.

It is expected that saving will be even greater in the year to come when fewer people who become disabled before age 50 will need help through public assistance.

Severely disabled workers under 50 have worked under social security, but have never applied to have their social security records frozen, should inquire immediately about their rights to payments.

To qualify for disability insurance benefits, a disabled worker must be so severely disabled that he is "unable to engage in any substantial gainful work."

In addition, he must be under social security for at least 5 years out of the 10 years he became disabled.

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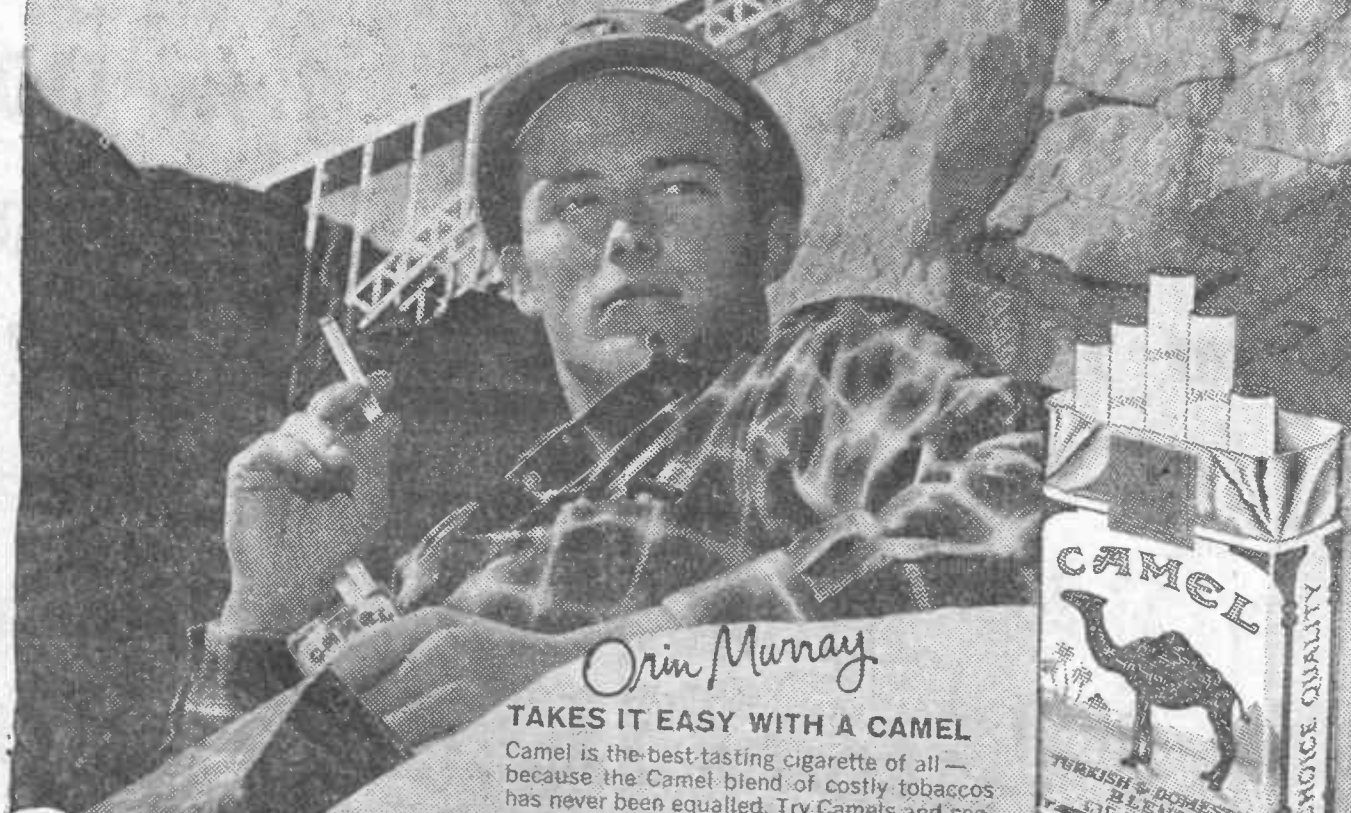

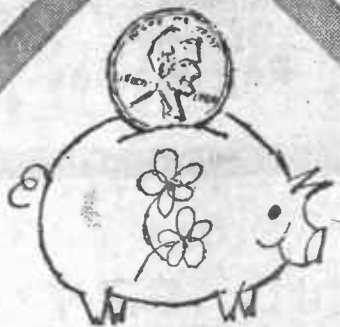

County Agent's Notes

Wintering Cattle
You can do a good job of wintering most classes of beef cattle on roughage and protein supplement. All of you know about how much roughage will be needed. But don't forget the protein.
Main sources of protein are soybeans meal and cotton seed meal. Price usually determines which you will use.
A protein meal and salt mixture usually does a good job of supplying the needed protein.
Different classes of cattle need different mixtures of the meal and salt. The usual mixture for dry cows is two parts meal to one part salt; yearlings will usually need three to one mixtures and young calves, four to one in favor of the meal.
Cows that calve in the fall will also usually need more protein. So you will have to adjust your mixture accordingly.
Make sure that plenty of good water is available close to the feeding area. A good supply of roughage is also necessary.
Cotton seed makes a good feed to go in the ration for either dairy or beef cattle.
Face Fly
The face fly, a new and serious livestock pest, has shown up in Tennessee and is likely to be a problem here next year.
It annoys beef cattle, dairy cows, horses and sheep. It looks like a big house fly. The fly feeds on liquids secreted from an animal's eye or nostrils and on blood from wound or other fly bite.
The face fly does not bite the

same type fire lanes around your barns and any stacked hay.
animals, but is believed to be a carrier of pink eyes.
Keep close watch on your cattle for this pest, and if it shows up, check with your County Agent for detailed control recommendations.
Lost
Someone borrowed the farm level from the County Agent's Office on a Saturday afternoon some time ago. The level has not been returned and several people have been by wanting to borrow it.

Mother serves Junior a glass of milk, but doesn't take one herself. Dad puts some cooked carrots on Mary's plate, but skips himself.
Are Mother and Dad really thinking of how they are influencing the food habits of their children. When parents tell children to eat vegetables and meat and to drink milk, but don't do it themselves, it is to be expected that children pay more attention to what their father and mother do than what they say.
Food habits of family members help determine those of the children. Dad's food habits have a great influence on the children. Because Dad dislikes certain foods, the children are rarely or never served these foods.
A child's dislike for a particular food is often temporary and will disappear if parents do not make an issue of it.
Did You Know?
An anti-flea dog food is in the making? It's being tested now at the Oregon Experiment Station. They are developing a chemical food that causes fleas to drop over dead when they bite the dogs that ate the food. More research is needed before the flea killing food is on the market, but it's only a matter of time.

Thread for Sewing Today's Fabrics
Determine the thread you use by the type of fabric you are using. Nylon and dacron threads have strength and dry quickly. Mercerized thread has less strength and dries more slowly but offers greatest variety in color matching. Silk thread is a good compromise. The synthetic or silk threads have more wearability for use with

100% synthetic fabrics or for blends with a high percentage of synthetic fiber.

When stitching with nylon or dacron thread, use a felt pad on the spool pin of the machine. This prevents the thread from unwinding too fast. Place the spool with the notched side up so the thread doesn't sag. Cut nylon and dacron thread; never try to break it since this may cause puckering.

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PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION OF STATE OF MISSISSIPPI

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 23

A concurrent resolution proposing an amendment to Section 264 of the Constitution of 1890 of the State of Mississippi as to authorize the Legislature to fix the qualifications of grand and petit jurors.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Mississippi, two-thirds (2/3) of the House of Representatives and the Senate concurring therein, that the following amendment to the Constitution of 1890 of the State of Mississippi be submitted to the qualified electors of the State of Mississippi for ratification or rejection in an election to be held on the 8th day of November, A. D. 1960, viz:

Amend section 264 of the Constitution of 1890 of the State of Mississippi to read as follows:
Section 264. The Legislature shall, by law, provide for the qualifications of grand and petit jurors. The Legislature shall provide by law for procuring a list of persons so qualified, and drawing therefrom of grand and petit jurors for each term of the circuit court.
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the secretary of state is hereby directed to give public notice of said election for at least thirty (30) days preceding the same.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 73

A concurrent resolution to amend section 115 of the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 so as to provide a limitation on the amount of bonded indebtedness that the state may incur.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Mississippi, two-thirds (2/3) of the House of Representatives and the Senate agreeing thereto, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Mississippi be submitted to the qualified electors of the State for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, viz:

Amend Section 115 of the Constitution of the State of Mississippi so as to read as follows:
Section 115. The fiscal year of the State of Mississippi shall commence on the first day of July and end on the thirtieth day of June of each year; and the Auditor of Public Accounts and the Treasurer of the State shall compile, and have published, showing the transactions of their respective offices on or before the thirty-first day of December of each year for the preceding fiscal year.
Neither the State nor any of its direct agencies, excluding the political subdivisions and other local districts, shall incur a bonded indebtedness in excess of one and one half (1½) times the sum of all the revenue collected by it for all purposes during any one of the preceding four fiscal years, whichever year might be higher.
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the secretary of state is hereby directed to give public notice of said election for at least thirty (30) days preceding the same.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION NO. 47

A concurrent resolution to amend section 112 of the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 so as to provide that property shall be assessed and taxed by uniform rules, and in proportion to its value.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Mississippi, two-thirds (2/3) of the House of Representatives and the Senate agreeing thereto, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Mississippi be submitted to the qualified electors of the State for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, viz:

Amend Section 112 of the Constitution of the State of Mississippi so as to read as follows:
Section 112. Taxation shall be uniform and equal throughout the state. Property shall be assessed in proportion to its value. The Legislature shall provide by law for the assessment of property under general laws, by uniform rules, and in proportion to its value. But the Legislature may provide for a special mode of valuation and assessment for railroads, and for other corporate property, or for particular classes of property belonging to persons, corporations, or institutions not situated wholly within the county. But all such property shall be assessed in proportion to its value, and no property shall be denied the right to county and special taxes. Such assessment as in cases of property situated in the county, the Legislature may provide a mode of assessment,

and establishment of a free public school or schools in each county in the state, with such term, or terms, as the Legislature may prescribe.
Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Mississippi, two-thirds (2/3) of the Senate and House of Representatives concurring therein, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Mississippi or 1890 be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1960.
Amend Section 201 of the Constitution of the State of Mississippi of 1890 so that it will read as follows:
Section 201. The Legislature may, in its discretion, provide for the maintenance and establishment of free public schools for all children between the ages of six (6) and twenty-one (21) years, by taxation or otherwise, and with such grades, as the Legislature may prescribe.
Amend Section 205 of the Constitution of the State of Mississippi of 1890 so that it shall read as follows:
Section 205. The Legislature may, in its discretion, provide for the maintenance and establishment of a free public school or schools in each county in the state, with such term, or terms, as the Legislature may prescribe.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Mississippi, two-thirds (2/3) of the Senate and House of Representatives concurring therein, That the following amendment to or change in Article 12 of the Mississippi Constitution of 1890 be submitted to the qualified electors of the state for ratification or rejection at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November, 1960.
Amend or change Article 12 of the Constitution of the State of Mississippi of 1890 by adding thereto the following as Section 241-A. thereof:
Section 241-A. In addition to all other qualifications required of a person to be entitled to register for the purpose of becoming a qualified elector, such person shall be of good moral character.
The Legislature shall have the power to enforce the provisions of this section by appropriate legislation.

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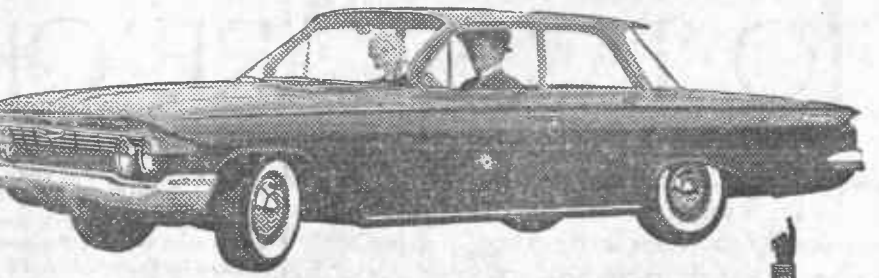

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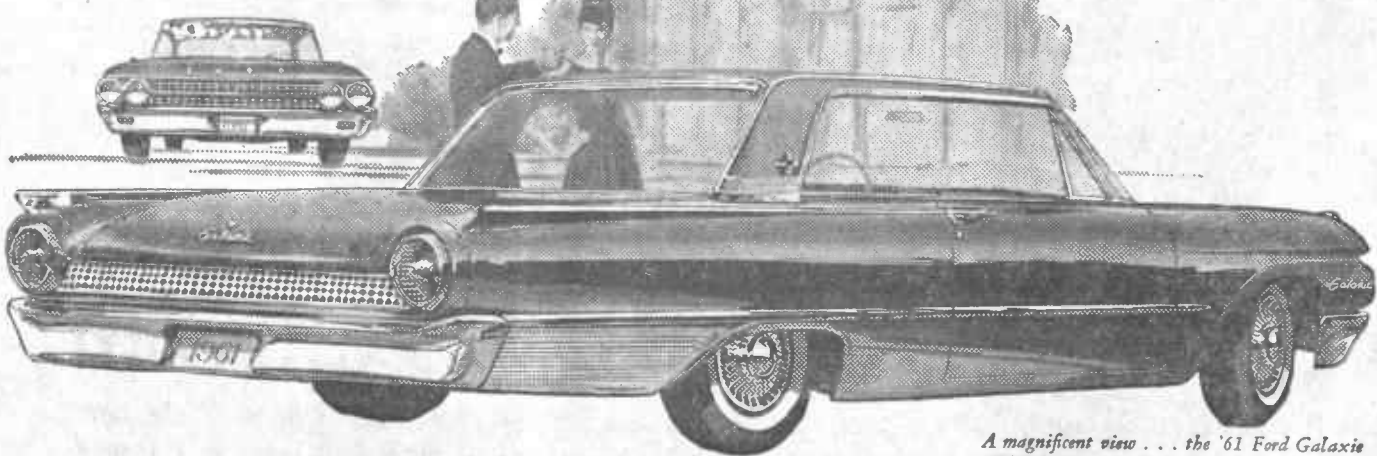

Auto Wheel Firm Moves To Locate In Grenada

G. A. Lyon Jr., president of Lyon, Inc., Detroit, has announced that his firm will move production of auto wheel covers from its Detroit plant to a new facility at Grenada. A 200,000-square-foot building is now under construction in Grenada and is expected to be occupied by March, 1961. Approximately 200 men will initially be employed at the Grenada plant;

and as production accelerates, the number will be increased. Plant capacity is expected to be 85,000 wheel covers and hubcaps per day.

Tupelo Becoming Pulpwood Center

Tupelo has been chosen as the base of operations by the Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company for the purchase of between two and three million dollars worth of pulpwood annually. The paper mill at Counce, Tenn., just north of Corinth, has appointed Berry G. Coler as area procurement forester, with headquarters in Tupelo. Assisting Coler will be four conservation foresters stationed at New Albany, Houston, Louisville and Iuka. Shipment from Tupelo will start in December. Purchases out of the Tupelo office will be made as far south as Meridian and westward almost to the Delta. At this time only pine pulpwood will be bought in the Tupelo area.

Tupelo Plant Increases Productivity, Boosts Jobs, Sales,

Despite U. S. Lag
The Day-Brite Lighting plant in Tupelo has increased productivity this year to a point where both

sales and employment have been better than a year ago. Employment has risen to 440, with a payroll in excess of a million and a half dollars annually. Sales are up approximately 20 per cent over last year. Plant manager Bob Dennis, in commenting on this improvement, said: "The most gratifying results has been the complete co-operation of the employees, who have shown sincere personal interest in the progress of the project. The criticism and recommendations of our employees, have helped to speed up our efforts. Our progress to date is a group accomplishment, not solely an engineering accomplishment or a management accomplishment. Everyone can take credit."

Gulfport Tonnage Handled In September Tops Mark

Gulfport port director, Richard Swenson, has reported 42,994 tons of cargo handled through the port during September, bringing this year's total to 368,424 tons. He also predicted a total tonnage for 1960 of approximately 450,000 tons, making this the best year in ten. Through September, a total of 101

ships had called at the year. Principal imports, cotton baling and Exports consisted of fertilizer.
