Feeder Pigs Sell Above Market In Second Area Sale

The Area Feeder Pig Sale at
Booneville last Thursday was a suc-
cess for both the buyer and the
seller, Percie B. Strickland, Tishom-
ingo County Agent reports. "The
pigs did not sell as high as they
did in the July Sale, but still sold
well above the market price," Mr.
Strickland said.

In all, 784 pigs were sold. The
average weight was 55½ pounds
per pig. The average price for the
sale was \$21.00 per cwt. The pigs
at this sale were better quality
than those in the July sale.

The next Feeder Pig Sale will
be held January 19. Breeders
should start planning their breed-
ing program now to fit the quar-
terly sale if they are interested in
growing and selling feeder pigs.

The Extension Service in eight
Northeast Mississippi counties is
sponsoring these quarterly feeder
pig sales to help provide an or-
ganized market for the farmers of
the area and at the same time pro-
vide a market for buyers that are
looking for good quality pigs to
put in feed lots.

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STUDY THEM WELL

Amendments To The State Constitution

When the Mississippi voter goes to the polls November 8, he will be faced with one of the widest and longest ballots he has ever seen. The voting booth will be no place to become acquainted with all the names and proposals on the foot-wide by 17 inches long ballot. The voter will do well to study and think about who and what he is doing to vote for before he takes pencil in hand and marks his ballot.

This is especially true of the proposed amendments to the state Constitution. When we name someone who does not pan out as we had hoped and believed he would, we can easily enough turn him out of office at the next election. But when we amend the state Constitution, the amendment becomes part of the Constitution and removing an unwise or unworkable amendment is not as simple as replacing an unfit office-holder.

Of the five proposed constitutional amendments being submitted to the voters of the state, three may be endorsed, in our opinion, without question. They are House Concurrent Resolutions, Nos. 23, 47 and 73.

But Senate Concurrent Resolutions No. 143 and No. 147, take little more mulling over and thinking about. More thinking, one would say, than apparently went into the resolutions in the first place. These two amendments have to do with providing for schools and for setting the qualifications of voters — as touchy a pair of subjects one can find anywhere on the political scene.

Resolution No. 143 would amend the Constitution so as to give the Legislature power to "in its discretion, provide for the maintenance and establishment of free public schools for all children between the ages of six and twenty-one years, BY TAXATION OR OTHERWISE (emphasis ours) and with such grades as the Legislature may prescribe." The amendment would also give the Legislature power, "in its discretion" to provide for the maintenance and establishment "of a free public school or schools in each county in the state, with such term or terms as the Legislature may prescribe."

Now we are all for "free public schools" established and maintained by the state, but this amendment seems to go a bit far in relinquishing that establishment and maintenance to the "discretion" of the Legislature. While we have reasonable faith in the intention of the Legislature to act in the best interest of the state, it would be well for voters to keep in mind that a people may just as easily give up control of their local affairs in the state by giving such rigid control to the central governing body at the state capital, as the states have given up control of state affairs to the central federal government — with what unhappy consequences we are all aware.

We would also like to have some "spelling out" on the phrase, "by taxation or otherwise" on the establishment and maintenance of the public schools. Taxation we understand, but the "or otherwise" leaves the game wide open with the Legislature making the rules at its "discretion." We would like to know what the "or otherwise" might involve.

Resolution No. 147 has to do with setting voter qualifications. In addition to all the existing qualifications (which seem ample enough) for voter registration, this amendment would require the qualified elector to be "of good moral character." This brings up the question of what criteria will be used to decide the "good moral character" requisite? As we understand the proposal, the voter applicant's "moral character" would be passed upon by the circuit clerk in the respective counties. What would seem moral to one clerk might be considered immoral by another. Any "disqualified applicant" could appeal the circuit clerk's decision, and that would mean time-consuming court action, to say nothing of the reflection that might unjustly be cast upon the applicant.

Convicted murderers, extortionists, kidnappers, and other criminals serving time behind bars automatically have their civil rights, such as the right to vote, suspended. But the ordinary citizen, from every day walks of life, with no criminal conviction upon him, should not be required to prove his "morality" as a prerequisite to becoming a qualified voter. By what standards he would be judged we do not know, but we do know and have heard it propounded often in reference to federal laws, that you "can't legislate morality."

When we amend our state Constitution, let's amend for the progress of Mississippi, with sound laws, with justice and common sense prevailing and not burden our constitutional processes with such questionable propositions as Senate Concurrent Resolutions No. 143 and 147.

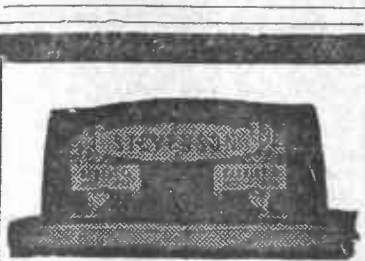

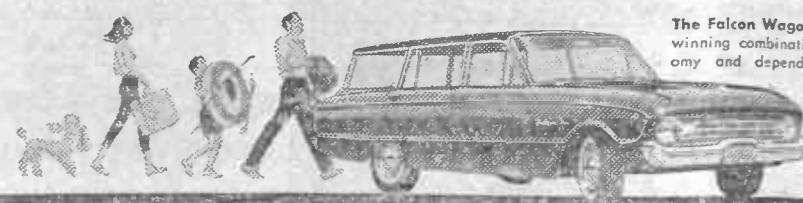

Responding to God

Lesson for October 30, 1960

GOD is to be believed in, trusted, adored. This is true, but not the whole truth. If the faith and trust and adoration stop right there, if they never lead to anything else, then they are no longer what they ought to be. A certain man used to go on a binge periodically, and at the height of one (or the bottom of it!) used to send his wife a large box of roses with an accompanying note. He may have meant it, but he was a drunkard. His "adoration" of his wife made no real difference with his life. He was the same booze-hound after his marriage as before, just the same irresponsible play-boy as always. On the bank of a southern river there was a kind of concrete wall, several yards long but not connected with any kind of building. That wall was originally intended to support an arch of a bridge; but the bridge was never built, so the concrete abutment stands there, in the way of the farmer who plows that river-bank field. So "faith" in God, if it leads to nothing, is like that bridge—merely a nuisance. As James put it, faith without works is dead.

The life of the Christian is not, as to speak, something which the Christian himself starts and keeps going by himself. It is the teaching of the Bible from beginning to end, that the right life is a life of response. God takes the initiative; we follow his lead. God invites, we accept. God speaks, we answer. As James has said that the single most lack of a Christian's life is faith. Some people get that backwards. Their picture of the Christian life is: first man does something fine that God notices; second, God is grateful to the man for the fine thing he has done; third, God showers blessings on the man by way of thanks to him. No, this is actually the other way around. First, God does so much for a man (especially through Christ's sacrificial life and death) that the man owes this; second, the man is grateful to God for his inexpressible gifts; third, the man offers God his life in service, not at all by way of rewarding God, not in the least laying a claim on God, but out of love and a thankful heart.

The first way this response of man will show, is in his sense of responsibility. He recognizes God as the director and guide of his life. He thinks first of all not "What will people think of me?" but "What will God think of me?" This does not come suddenly, it is a habit of mind that has to be learned. Martin Niemöller, a German minister who had been a naval officer, explained how it was that he could have "hugged" the powerful Hitler and so risked death. "It was simple," Niemöller said afterwards. "I had a higher loyalty than Hitler." That is responsibility, Christian responsibility, taking orders from God first, and then from others.

As a sense of responsibility grows, character grows with it. A man does not acquire character by talking about it. The best way to acquire character is not to talk about it, but to do certain things each day for practice, as you might practice baseball or chess.

Responsibility and Service

In Old Testament times, people were sometimes by destroying the things they sacrificed, or at least by burning them from ordinary use, and set out (in Romans 12) the new Christian idea. We understand now that to sacrifice something to God means to put it to use for him. What Paul spoke of as a "living sacrifice," that sort of sacrifice of the Christians at that time may have wondered if he meant human sacrifices. He did not. But of course he did not. A man who will take time to read Romans 12 can see how down-to-earth all this is. Paul does not overstate the reader's mind on great crises, extraordinary one-time opportunities for heroism and martyrdom. He speaks of ordinary everyday wear and tear of living with other people. Do you love and adore God? Then you mean it by the Christian life you live with other people.

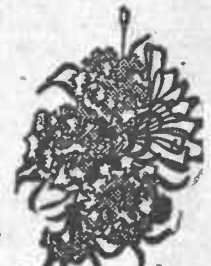

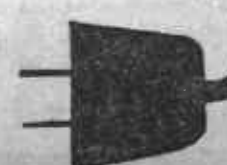

Establish Vegetated Waterways Now

USDA-SCS
Work Unit Conservationist

A vegetated waterway is an important part of a good water disposal system.

They need to be well established to a thick heavy sod before terrace and row is emptied into them.

Land to be terraced next Spring should have vegetated waterways established on it this fall.

The purpose of vegetated waterways is to drain water slowly, emptying into them from rows and terraces off the land. This prevents the ends of row and terraces from washing out and forming gullies.

Too, vegetated waterways slow down run-off of water and prevents flooding of fertile lowland. They also prevent the filling up of drainage ditches with said and silt.

If you plan to terrace any of your land next Spring, come by your local Soil Conservation Service in Iuka and let us help you get the vegetated waterways you need established this Fall. After these waterways are established then terrace your land.

The Federal Government, through your local ASC Office, will pay 50% of the cost for sowing these winter crops on your farm just as soon as you get your crops harvested come to the ASC Office and sign for some of these materials. There is still time left for you to get this material.

I was visiting on Garvin A. Hall's farm, R-1, Glen, Miss., last week and he had one of the finest stands of oats on 6 acres. The oats will be ready to graze this week. Mr. Hall says that he cannot afford to turn down the government paying 50% of the cost for seeding these oats. He had also signed up and received 100 lbs. of Hairy Vetch to sow behind his cotton pickers. He further stated he would sow more Hairy Vetch as soon as the crops were gathered.

Arthur Floyd of R-1, Iuka, has sowed 10 acres of oats for grazing using Federal cost sharing. He stated to me that he was grazing 5 acres of those oats now and that it had increased his milk production 10 gallons per day. Arthur is operating Mack Sanders' farm and he and Mack have good permanent pasture along with temporary pasture using all assistance they can get from the ASC Program.

Willie Hamilton of R-1, Tishomingo, has a fine stand of rye grass on 4 acres and Mr. Millard Nagle of Tishomingo has 3 acres of oats that are ready for grazing. They are interested in using the assistance offered by your local

ASC Office in securing this supplemental grazing for their livestock.

J. H. McVay, R-1, Iuka has a fine stand of oats and Hairy Vetch on 3 acres. He applied 200 lbs. of ammonium nitrate to the acres along with his oats and vetch. Mr. McVay states that with the Government assistance he has been able to build up his land where it will produce larger yields of corn and hay.

Robert B. Luttrell of R-1, Iuka was by the office recently and signed for oats and ammonium nitrate to sow 5 acres. Also Mr. Alton Davis of Burnsville signed for 300 lbs. of Hairy vetch. Mr. Davis and Mr. Luttrell both stated that if the weather permitted they planned to sow several more acres of cover crop. Some farmers in the County have thought that the time had run out and that you could not get any assistance for Fall sowing. That is not true, however, there is not much money left but if you act promptly you can still sign up and get assistance for sowing these cover crops.

There are also other practices that your local ASC office can help you with, such as applying Agricultural Limestone on your permanent pasture. Lester Skinner of R-1, Tishomingo has just recently limed 30 acres of his pasture applying 2 tons per acre. This lime will be delivered and spread on the land. Lime can also be applied to your cropland.

Now is a good time for you to build a stock pond in your pasture. The Government will pay 65% of the cost. We have just finished constructing a livestock pond on Floyd E. Daily's farm of R-1, Burnsville, also one on Lester Whitley's farm. W. F. Elliott of R-1, Burnsville, was by the office recently and signed for a livestock pond on his

Constitutional Clarification Urged By Governor Barnett

The state constitution says "Property shall be assessed . . . according to its value." Industrial prospects may misinterpret this to mean that property is taxed at full value. Since property is taxed at much less than full value, House Concurrent Resolution 47, would change this wording to "in proportion to its value." As chairman of the Agricultural and Industrial Board, Gov. Ross Barnett has urged Mississippians to vote for HCR 47, November 8. The State Chamber of Commerce has taken a similar stand.

Statewide Survey Scans Transportation, Minerals

A. D. Little, Cambridge, Mass., is making an analysis of water transportation and its potential in Mississippi as part of the statewide market study authorized by the legislature this year. Little's mineral specialists are also concentrating on new uses for Mississippi clays. Little's agricultural specialist, Maurice Sorenson, visited the state last week, and three other Little representatives - Harry Foden, Ralph Dudley and Jim Zeigler - already have made extensive on-the-scene surveys here. 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County Agent's Notes
By P. B. Stricklen
MSU Extension Service

Cotton Comments
Check your local recommendations for the time of day to start cotton. Do not rush gin. Get your trailers emptied. As harvest is completed, clean cotton stalks. On land that does not disk stalks. Leave top of the ground to prevent erosion. Plant a cover crop on terraces and open up ditches.
Control diseases by fall flat breaking or deep

plowing six inches or more deep, if depth of soil will permit, will cover old diseased stalks.
Deep plowing will also turn under and cover new grass seeds and reduce grass hazards next year. Deep plowing will also permit fall and winter rains to soak into subsoil. Do not do fall plowing on land that is subject to erosion.

Dairy Notes
Make sure that your dairy cows are fully conditioned prior to freshening. This will make for higher milk production. Make sure your hay is of high quality and that the cows get plenty of it.
Remember, the more high quality hay a cow will eat, the less grain she will require. Hay is cheaper than grain. Make your cows pay. For more information, call on your local county agent.

Frosted Grazing
What about danger of prussic acid poisoning on frosted sorghum? What about sorghum being put up for silage after frost?
Let the sorghum dry out following frost and prussic acid disappears.

pears. After drying, it is safe to graze.
Frosted sorghum makes good silage if put up without delay. Even if prussic acid is present in the sorghum, it disappears when put up as silage.
Watch out for second growth or volunteer sorghum. Never turn in a whole herd to graze such fields without testing the field first. For testing, turn in one cow and let it stay several days.
Winterize your Farm Machinery
Don't let your machinery "get hurt" this winter. First make sure that any tractor that you put up for the winter has the water drained out of the radiator. If you are going to use your tractor during the winter, put some anti-freeze in the radiator.
Be sure that water is drained out of tractor before we have a hard freeze. A calcium chloride solution can be used in tires to prevent freezing. Check your Operator's Manual or see your dealer for instructions.

Home Agent Notes

What do women look for when they buy a blouse?
At the time they bought their new blouse, they first looked for comfort. Next in order were "becomingness," ease of care or cleaning, fit, appearance and suitability for many occasions.
These qualities were those named by 380 women who were interviewed just after buying a new blouse.
When they were interviewed again after 10 weeks, they still placed comfort at the top of the list, but fit had risen to second place.
Tailored blouses were twice as popular as dressy or semi-dressy blouses. Over half the blouses bought were woven cotton. Most had short or three-quarter length sleeves, collars of some type and

DID YOU KNOW? Young men and women in the United States today average about 2 inches taller than those of 60 years ago. Men now average 69½ inches tall and women 64½ inches. Before the turn of the century average heights were 67½ inches for men and 62½ inches for women. These figures are from a U. S. Department of Agriculture report.

Sewing Pile Fabrics
Corduroy, velvet and velveteen are all pile fabrics. Be careful in cutting, as well as sewing. The pile has direction, and all pieces of the garment must be cut with the pile running in the same direction.
Stitch as much as possible in the direction of the pile. Match color of thread to pile with respect to direction used.
Avoid a pattern that requires top stitching since the presser foot will mat a pile fabric in stitching. Choose a simple pattern with a minimum of seams, darts and tucks.
To face velveteen or corduroy, select matching medium-weight fabric. This eliminates the bulk of two thicknesses of pile fabric.
Press all seams with the right side of the fabric face down on a heavy Turkish towel. Use a steam iron or regular with a damp press cloth. Steam and press gently on the wrong side.

Baked Red Snapper With Mushrooms
2 pounds red snapper steaks or other fish steaks, fresh or frozen.
½ cup butter or other fat, melted.
1 can (4 oz.) mushroom stems and pieces, drained.
2 tablespoons lemon juice.
1 teaspoon salt.
1 teaspoon grated onion.
Dash pepper.
Paprika.
Thaw frozen steaks. Place in a single layer in a well-greased baking pan, 13x9x2 inches. Combine and pour over fish. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F, for 25 to 30 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Serve with paprika sprinkled over the top. Serves 6.

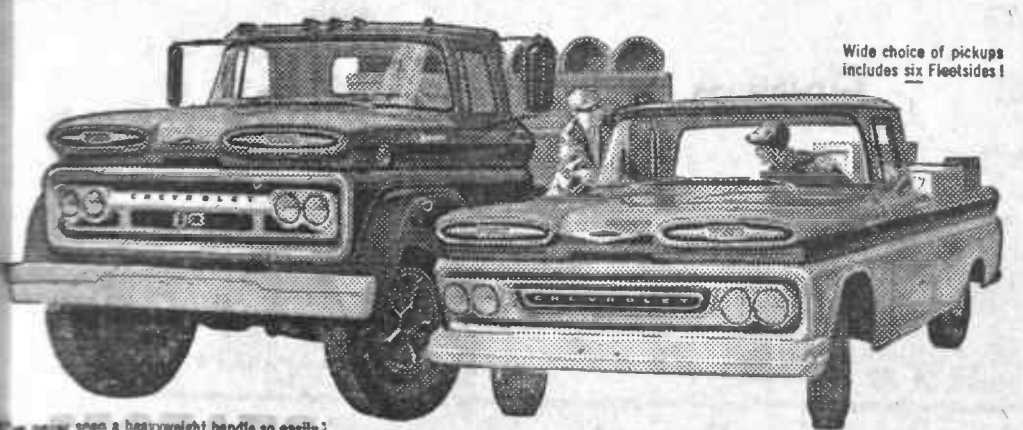

Essay Contest For High School Students

Mississippi's eleventh and twelfth grade high school students are eligible to compete for \$1,000 cash and an all expense paid trip to Washington, D. C., and to help the state's handicapped citizens at the same time.

These rewards are first prizes in the 13th annual national essay contest sponsored by the President's and the governors' committees on Employment of the Physically Handicapped.

Theme for the 1961 contest is "Jobs for the Handicapped — a Community Challenge."

The state contest committee, headed by George N. Sadka, medical social consultant, for the State Vocational Rehabilitation Division, has mailed details of the contest to country superintendents of education, and to superintend-

ents, principals, and high school English teachers of the state.

J. M. Tubb, state superintendent of education, has written to the school leaders, urging that they encourage the junior and senior students to take part in the contest.

Thirty-five chairmen of local National Employ the Physically Handicapped Committees, representing the 82 counties of the state, will help with the contest. Paul Jones, Corinth is chairman of the Alcorn County Committee; Dr. W. H. Anderson, Booneville, is the chairman of the Prentiss County Committee; and Tom Brezale, Corinth is chairman of the Tishomingo and Tippah County Committees.

Deadlines in the contest follow: Best essay for each school sent to local chairman by February 10, 1961; best essay selected by each local committee, sent to state committee by February 28; best five essays named by state committee, and first place essay sent to Washington for national competition by March 15.
