

Belmont Sewer Plant Completed

Lagoon-Type Disposal Plants Will Serve Needs Of Growing Town

Installation of sewer lines and lagoon-type disposal system in town of Belmont has been completed and officially approved. A. Scott of Corinth, consulting engineer for the project, received approval came last week. John S. Hagan of the U. S. Environmental Health Department in Atlanta, Ga., inspected the installation and approved it for the government. Payment of some \$18,000, federal share of the \$131,000, for the new sanitary system will be service for both business and residential areas of Belmont. The town of Belmont has been divided into two areas, one, an acre and a half in area situated north of the town and the other, six acres in area located southwest of the town proper, are designed to care of future population growth so that expansion within the town will not put strain on the facility. About 200 residents are expected to attach to the new system. The town of Belmont recently purchased a ditching machine which will expedite the work in collecting property to the sewer line. The sanitary system was begun in the early summer by the Highland Construction Company of Tupelo. The lagoon-type waste disposal operates on the photosynthetic principle; the algae which grows in the ponds gives off carbon dioxide in turn abates odors and removes any pollution which result from the ponds. Several plants are in operation in Mississippi, including plants in Houston and Westfield.

Courthouse Gets New Coat Of Paint

Painting of the Tishomingo County Courthouse exterior was completed last week. This is a continuation of the renovation and improvement program at the courthouse inaugurated in the past summer by Sheriff Clarence Pace. The old red bricks are being replaced with a pale blue-green color and a water-resistant plastic base.

The improvement program will include sodding of the court grounds and landscaping shrubbery and other plants. Mr. Pace said, "Instead of weeds, we will have a really beautiful building and grounds which the whole county can be proud of."

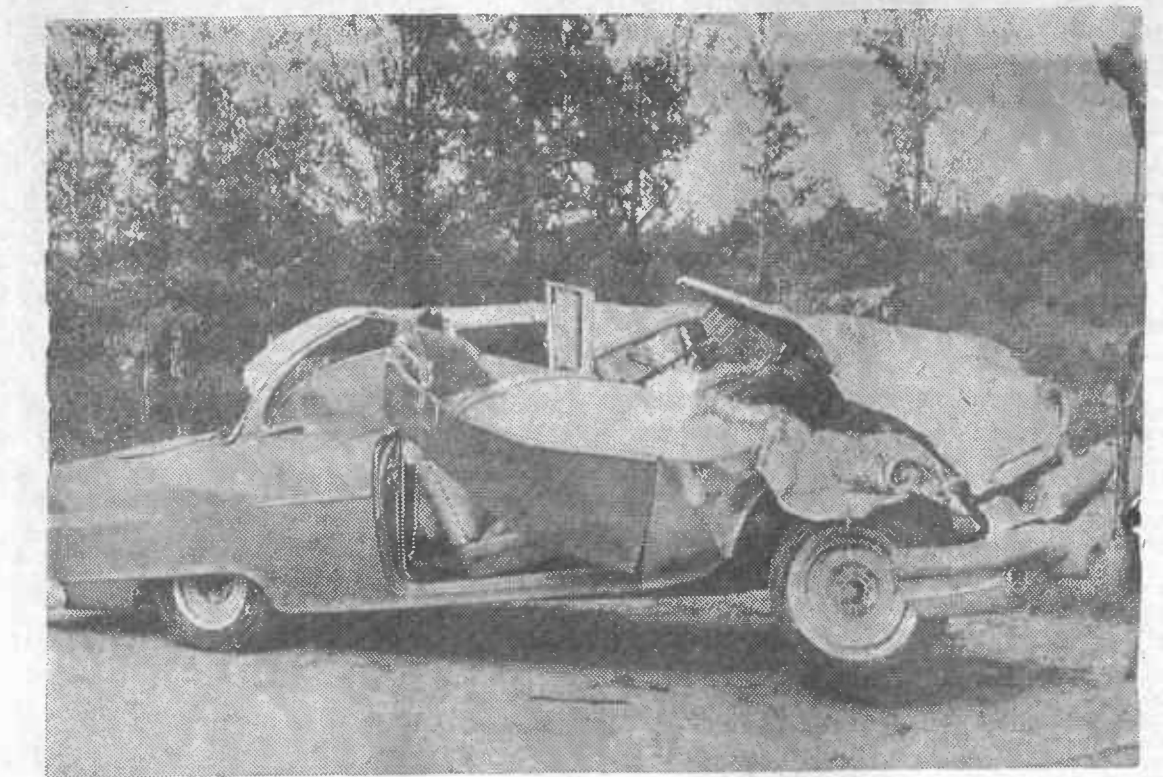

FHA Agency Broadens Program

Loan Requirements Revised Under Recent Changes In Law

Farmers who have regular off-farm employment, if otherwise eligible, may obtain farm operating and development loans from the Farmers Home Administration, under the recently revised regulations of the agency.

M. Hays Woods, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor for Tishomingo County, said the new regulation will go into effect immediately. Previously, except in rural development counties, a farmer had to spend most of his time farming in order to qualify for a loan.

Experience gained in rural development counties has shown that many farmers who are regularly employed off the farm can profitably use the Farmers Home Administration's credit facilities to increase the farm portions of their total incomes. The regulation, which had limited credit assistance to farmers who spend most of their time farming, prevented some from obtaining the maximum income from their farms and from taking advantage of opportunities for industrial and other off-farm employment.

Other eligibility requirements remain unchanged. Applicants must have sufficient farm experience to carry on sound farm operations; and as in the past, credit will be extended only to operators of farms that are family-type size or smaller. No loan will be made unless a plan for the coming year's farming operations shows that income from the farm and other sources will be large enough to enable the farm family to have a reasonable standard of living, pay debts, and have an adequate reserve for emergencies.

Loan funds may be used to pay farm operating costs, purchase equipment and livestock, pay farm development costs, and refinance certain debts. The interest rate is five percent. Repayment schedules depend upon the purposes for which funds are advanced and upon the estimated incomes from the farms. Usually, loans made for real estate purposes will be from funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency.

Technical farm and money management assistance is supplied to each borrower to the extent necessary.

William C. Randle Dies In Crash Near Burnsville

A week end trip to visit his mother in Iuka ended in death for William Charles (Bill) Randle, 24-year-old Memphis electrician when his car crashed into an abutment of the bridge over Yellow Creek on Highway 72, one mile east of Burnsville, about 1:45 a. m. last Saturday. He was the son of Mrs. Elizabeth Randle of Iuka and Eldon Randle of Memphis.

Randle, who was killed instantly in the crash, was driving alone and no other vehicle was involved in the accident. His body was thrown from the car and crushed beneath the right front wheel when the car smashed into the creek bank after striking the bridge. He was enroute from Memphis to Iuka when the accident occurred.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Iuka Baptist Church with Rev. R. E. Pate of Cherokee, Ala., and Rev. R. J. Cooper, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Pleasant Hill Cemetery; Cuthall's of Iuka in charge.

Besides his parents, Randle is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Lloyd Tucker of Memphis, Mrs. Juanita Tice of Anniston, Ala., and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Daugherty, Sr., of Iuka.

Continuous examinations are given by the Merit System, but applications for this particular examination must be received by December 1, 1960.

Regular salary advancements for meritorious service are provided for employees of the Health Department, as well as vacation, sick leave and retirement benefits.

Elections Await County Voters On November 8

General Voting On National Leaders; Some County And State District Officers Will Be Elected Tuesday

When Tishomingo County voters go to the polls next Tuesday, four of the county's five districts will decide two elections; the general election for state and national candidates and a special county election to choose two school board members, one, a member-at-large, and the other a member from the Third district. Also a constable from the Third District will be named in the special election.

First district voters will take part only in the special election.

Candidates seeking the Third District school post are Howard Bridges and H. E. Hester. Candidates seeking the county member-at-large are R. W. Nettles, Sherman Lambert and L. G. Phillips.

A school board member for the Fifth District will be elected in Tuesday's balloting, this post being filled by voters on the general election ballot. Names of candidates seeking this job are Travis Cain and Raymond Yarber.

In the state and national general election, a lengthy ballot which deserves beforehand study faces all Mississippi voters. Not only are they to vote for presidential electors but for one United States Senator, all six United States Representatives, four supreme court judges and five amendments to the state Constitution.

Voters are being advised to save themselves time at the polls and the possibility of error by taking time before election day to study the candidates and the proposals which will appear on the ballot.

Regardless of how voters stand in the presidential balloting, they are to vote for a slate of eight electors representing either the Democratic party, the unpledged electors of the Democratic party, or the Republican party.

In the Senatorial election a choice must be made between Senator James O. Eastland or Republican candidate Joe A. Moore.

In the election of U. S. Representatives incumbent Thomas G. Abernethy is opposed by Republican Edward W. Scott in the First Congressional District.

State supreme court judges slated for election are Henry L. Rodgers to succeed incumbent James G. Holmes, first district; R. Olney Arrington to succeed himself, second district; W. N. Ethridge, Jr., to succeed himself, third district, and also in the third district, John W. Kyle to succeed himself.

The five proposed amendments to the state constitution up for voter ratification by a simple majority are:

Carl Smith came before the board to ask for sewer line extension to his property on Hiway 25-N. He was told the matter would be examined and acted upon if possible.

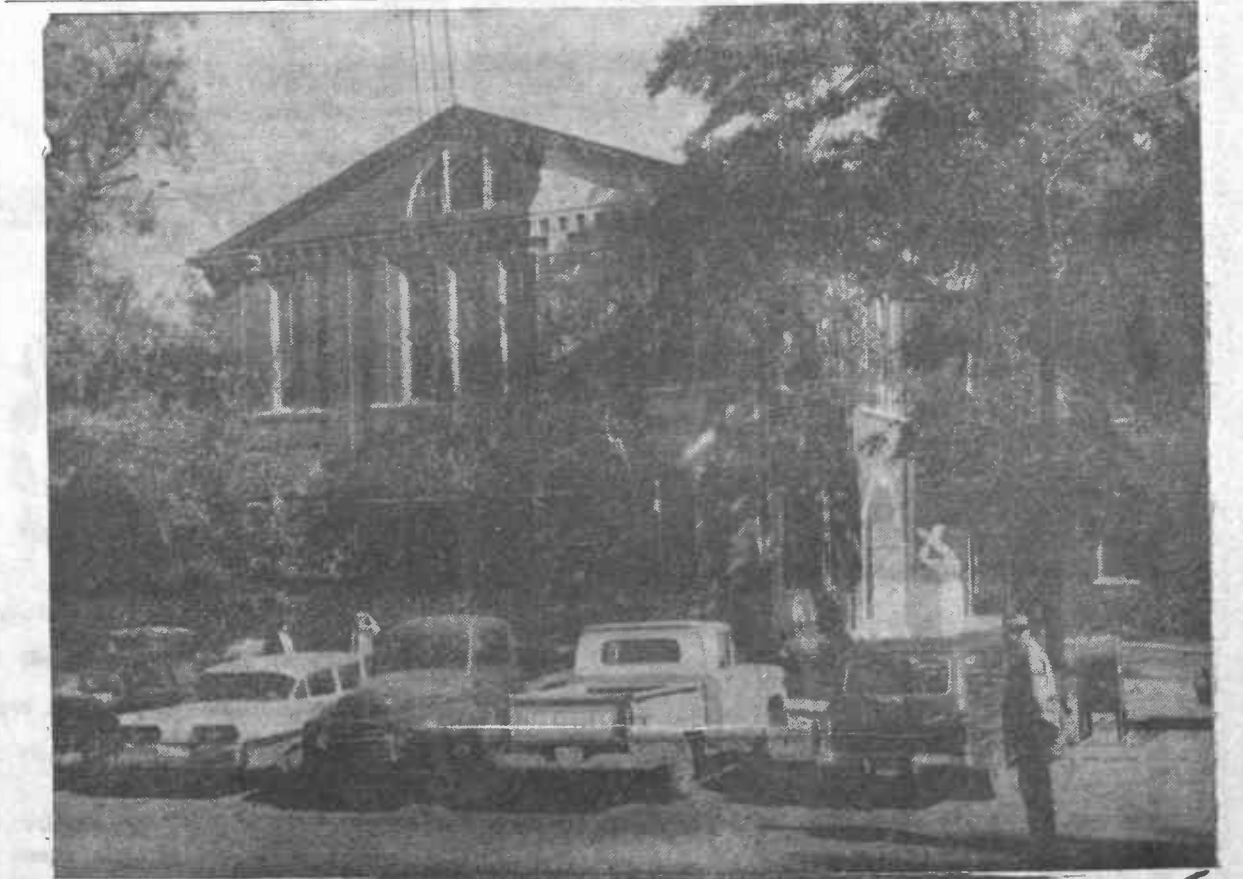
W. W. O'Neil asked for a gas line to his property and his request was granted.

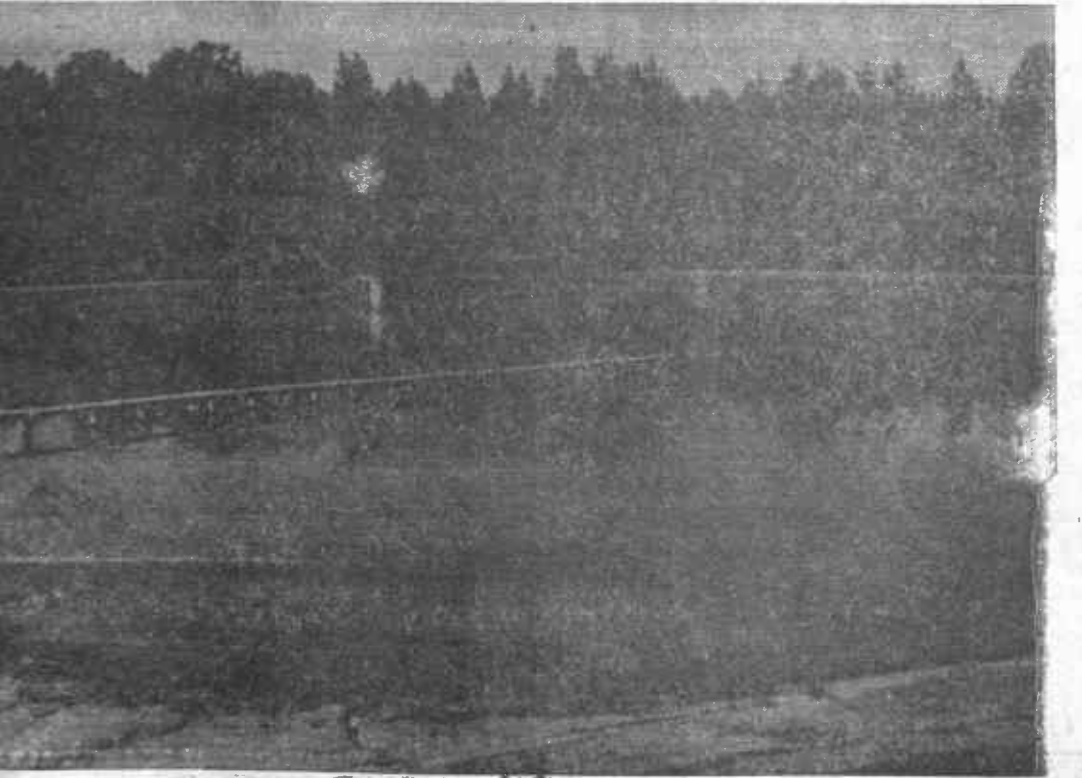

HOW TO BE SAFE THOUGH DRIVING

The tragic automobile accident near Burnsville last Saturday which took the life of a young Memphian whose mother and other relatives are residents of this county, brings close to home the ever-present need for continuing reminders of safe driving.

Driving an automobile is so nearly a second nature thing with most of us that we take the wheel without consciously thinking that our lives and the lives of others DO depend upon our judgment and skill while operating that automobile.

Drowsiness is one of the factors to consider in safe driving. Often, a sleepy driver does not react quickly enough to changes in driving conditions to avert an accident. It is reported that the young man killed near here last Saturday morning is thought to have gone to sleep while driving.

Most of us know the rules of proper and safe driving but often those rules are not in the forefront of our minds... we have other thoughts, other problems on our minds, that take our attention from the "little points" of safe driving that can add up to a big accident.

One of these "little points" is proper ventilation of our cars during wintertime driving to dispel drowsiness. A warmly heated but tightly closed car can become a death-trap for the most careful driver. How this is so is pointed out by the Mississippi Safety Council in a warning to motorists on carbon monoxide poisoning.

Carbon monoxide is a far more common and dangerous gas than is generally believed and it travels with you wherever you drive, the Council declares.

It is a gas you cannot see, taste or smell. It won't tickle your throat or make your eyes smart or in any other way make its presence known. You may not recognize the symptoms of CO poisoning in time to avert an accident. The best way to forestall such a happening is to have your car window rolled down a little way during winter driving.

Also, the Council warns: Do not get too warm and comfortable... it may cause drowsiness which will dull your alertness and impair your judgment when you need it most. Fresh air is the remedy one needs to drive away a drowsy feeling.

In inclement weather when a window cannot be rolled down to let in fresh air, the air-intake vent on the front of the car should be opened slightly.

Wintertime is almost here. Now is the time to have our cars put in safe wintertime driving condition, with special attention given to the exhaust system. Carbon monoxide is with us from the moment we start the auto engine. It can easily seep into the auto, even when we think the exhaust is carrying it all away.

And when we get our cars in good condition, let us remember the "little points" that make safe driving of safe cars a sure thing. Knowing the rules will be of little help to us if we do not put them into practice.

Oxford Bond Election Set For November 8

Voters in Lafayette county will vote November 8 on a \$250,000 bond issue to finance the expansion of a plant at Oxford for Chambers Manufacturing Company, which makes gas and electric ranges. If the issue is approved, some 45,000 square feet will be added to the present plant. Additional employment of 80 persons and an annual payroll in excess of \$200,000 is also forecast. Company officials have announced plans to move the manufacture of built-in ovens from its Wisconsin plant to Oxford if the issue passes.

Columbus Chemical Plant Plans Output Increase

Hooker Chemical Corporation will expand its capacity for making sodium chlorate at its plant in Columbus, the fourth expansion since the original 12,000-ton-per-year plant began production in late 1954. Officials of the company said the expansion will utilize space provided earlier in existing buildings and is due to an increase demand for its products.

Good Hope Acquires Furniture Industry

The Leake county school board has signed a contract paving the way for a new woodworking industry at Good Hope. The contract provides George Evans, owner of the Marke Tree concern, with use of the Good Hope school building for the production of Early American furniture reproductions. Training of employees will begin at once, and approximately 100 will be employed. Products will be marketed nationwide.

Mississippi-Made Ship Calls At Mississippi Port

The SS John Lykes, a 495-foot cargo vessel owned by the Lykes Brothers Steamship Co., of New Orleans, docked at the Port of Gulfport to load a consignment of fertilizer for Europe. This was the maiden voyage for the freighter, which was constructed by Ingalls Shipbuilding Corp. at Pascagoula.

and delivered to the owners last August. The ship was the fourth of a five ship contract between Ingalls and Lykes Brothers.

Construction Contracts Signed For Booneville Plant

Construction contracts have been signed and ground broken for the American Seating Company's new Booneville plant. The contracts, totalling over \$810,000, were the largest ever awarded in Booneville and climaxed some two years of planning and negotiations. Home plant of the company is located in Grand Rapids, Michigan. The Booneville plant will manufacture church furniture and will occupy a 150,000-square-foot building. The company expects to employ between 200 and 300 when in operation.

Training Set For Ackerman Plant

Plans have been announced for the training of workers for the Endicott Johnson shoe plant in Ackerman, now under construction. The new national guard armory will be used for the program, which is expected to get underway immediately. Applications are being taken for employment with the company through the Mississippi Employment Agency's Louisville office and, on Fridays, in Ackerman by a representative of the agency. Some 25 to 30 employees will be needed immediately. Early in 1961, when production starts, additional employees will be hired. When full production is reached, approximately one year after the opening of the plant, between 250 and 300 people are expected to be employed.

Detroit Firm Builds In Grenada

Lyon, Inc., of Detroit, is building a plant in Grenada for the production of automobile wheel covers and hubcaps. The plant is expected to be completed in March and will employ about 300. Some thirty families are moving to Grenada from Detroit in the immediate future to start operations at the plant.

Changes In Your Social Security

This week I want to tell you about a part of the 1960 social security amendments which does not affect a large number of people, but is most important to those whom it does affect.

About 25,000 people — widows, aged dependent parents, and disabled children age 18 and over — the survivors of workers who died before 1940, will now be able to collect monthly social security benefits.

Originally, the social security law provided benefits only for retired workers. The law was changed in 1939 to make benefits payable to the survivors and dependents of workers, but until the 1960 amendments, no monthly benefits of work-provided for the survivors of workers who died before 1940.

Under the new law, payment can be made to the widows of workers who died after March 31, 1938, and before January 1, 1940; to their aged dependent parents; and to their disabled sons and daughters.

To qualify for benefits a widow or dependent mother of a worker who died before 1940 must be 62 years of age or over. A dependent

would be unwise to cut and leave the stalks on the land because overflow water would carry away stalks and other litter and drift them against fences and other objects.

However, on upland it is an excellent practice to cut the stalks of farm crops and leave them on top of the land during the winter months.

Each stalk lying on the surface will form a small dam and retard the flow of run-off water.

The slower run-off water moves off the land, the less it will erode the soil and the more water there will be to soak into the ground. This means less soil erosion and more water conservation.

Too, stalks lying on the surface of the land will soak up water and become soft and begin decaying. In the spring when they are turned under they will rot quickly and hinder cultivation of the new crop very little. Mechanical corn harvesters leave the stalks and husks of corn scattered over the surface of the field.

This is a good soil and water conservation practice that is being done by more and more soil conservation District Cooperators in Tishomingo County.

Home Agent Notes

A diet without milk is low in calcium.

To get the same amount of calcium that you get from a quart of milk, you would need to eat one of these amounts of food:

6 ounces of cheddar cheese
5 cups cottage cheese
15 carrots
25 cups string beans
146 bananas
219 lettuce leaves
277 slices of bread (4 loaves)
37 eggs
5 pounds celery
24 medium oranges

Be sure that every member of your family has the milk he needs each day. Children need 3 to 4 glasses, teen-agers 4 or more glasses and adults 2 or more glasses. Of course, they can get some of it from cheese, ice cream and other milk-made foods.

Did you know? We eat more coconut per person annually than any one of the other popular tree nuts, including pecans and walnuts.

Is Bluing Clothing Necessary?

Bluing was a necessary laundry aid in old-fashioned laundry work. Water was hard, there were few softeners and homemakers knew

little about their use. Bluing was also necessary when homemade soap was the only known laundry soap.

White cloth appears "white" only if a slight blue is added to the final finish. In the light, the cloth seems whiter. Bluing operates on the same principle.

Today, if your clothes are well washed in softened with good detergents (either soap or synthetic), no bluing is necessary. The gray of deposited soap curd is only covered by bluing—neve removed by it.

November Plentiful
Turkey and cranberries, traditional Thanksgiving foods, are headlines on the plentiful foods list for November.

Other foods on the list are pork, beef, cabbage, vegetable fats and oils, onions, dates and potatoes.

Add tiny cubes of canned jellied cranberry sauce to a favorite chicken salad, for appealing color and tempting flavor.

Add chopped fresh cranberries to your meat loaf or meat balls.

Glaze your next meat loaf with a mixture of crushed whole cranberry sauce and brown sugar. To make the loaf add 1½ cups cooked rice to a favorite meat loaf recipe. Bake loaf several times during baking with cranberry sauce-sugar mixture.

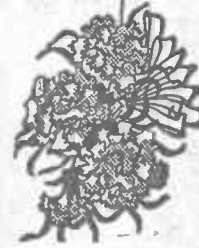

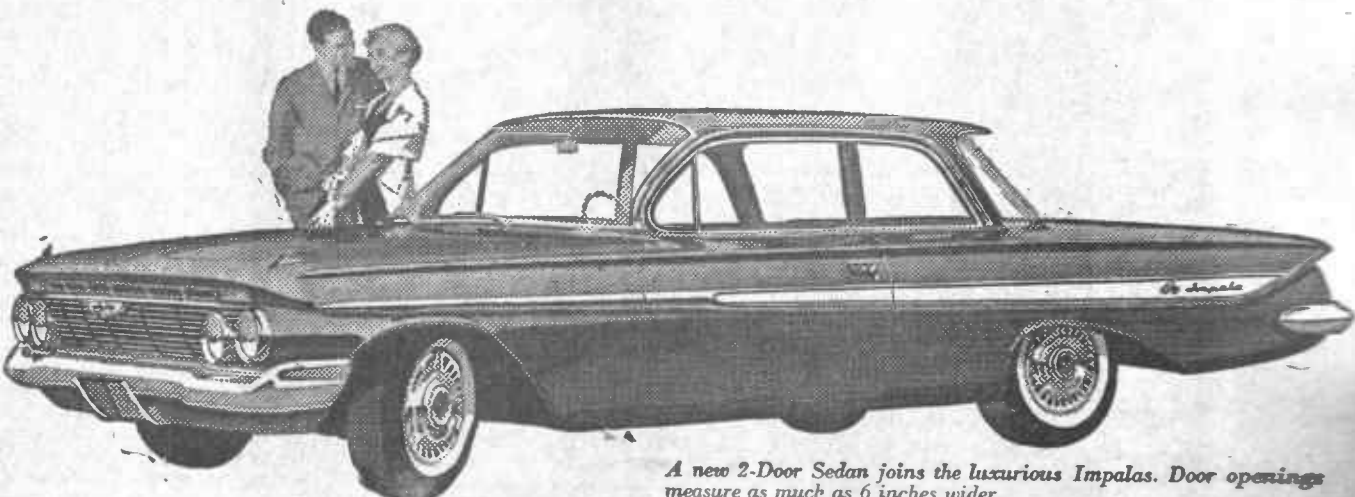

Tishomingo County's four gins have been kept busy the past two weeks as cotton growers, taking advantage of several days of sunshine, gather what is left of the cold and rain-plagued 1960 crop.

Ginners report that much of the cotton coming in these days is pulled, however some picked cotton is brought in also. Dayon Pruitt of the Iuka Gin company, says they are getting more picked than pulled, while the Tishomingo gin, according to H. M. Parsons, is getting lots of pulled cotton from down in that area.

A wet cold spring delayed cotton planting and consequently delayed gathering until late in the fall season. Heavier than usual rainfall has caused bolls to rot and pulling is the quickest and simplest method to use in gathering the crop. The important thing is to get the cotton out of the fields and in to the gins as quickly as possible after the weather clears.

Tishomingo County's 1960 crop will not equal last year's but probably will not fall far behind 1959 after all, estimates show. The quality of the cotton has been affected more severely by the bad weather and later planting than has the quantity.

A spot check with county ginners gives these figures for 1959 and the 1960 ginnings to date. Tishomingo Gin reported 1049 bales ginned as of last Friday, and while the 1959 comparative figures were not available, they were thought to have been about the same. The gin had been running about four bales an hour and working into the forepart of the night to take care of all cotton trailers on the lot. Much of the cotton is brought in during the afternoon, the forenoon being taken up in picking. Growers have been getting around half a bale to the acre in the Tishomingo area according to one estimate. It has been grading low in the past two or three weeks, with much of it low middling or middling. Growers are getting about \$20.00 a bale less than last year at this time.

The Belmont Gin totaled about 2,118 bales through last Friday, with no let-up in sight. However, all the cotton coming to the Belmont gin could not be counted in

Tishomingo County totals because some of it is brought from over in Red Bay and other Alabama areas. Around Belmont, growers were getting about one-half to three-quarters of a bale to the acre, with some of it grading strict middling, although a lot of gray cotton was reported. Belmont Gin reported price average at 28 to 29 cents a pound with the bales bringing around \$20.00 less than last year. Up to this time last year Belmont had ginned some 2380 bales.

The Burnsville Gin has been running late into the nights as have the other county ginners in an effort to take care of all growers. The number of bales turned out so far by the Burnsville Gin and comparative figures from last year were not obtainable.

The Iuka Gin Co. sent through 955 bales as of last Monday, with more on the way. The comparative figure for last year was 1214 bales. They expect to be running well past the middle of November at a pretty steady pace as the late crop is brought in.

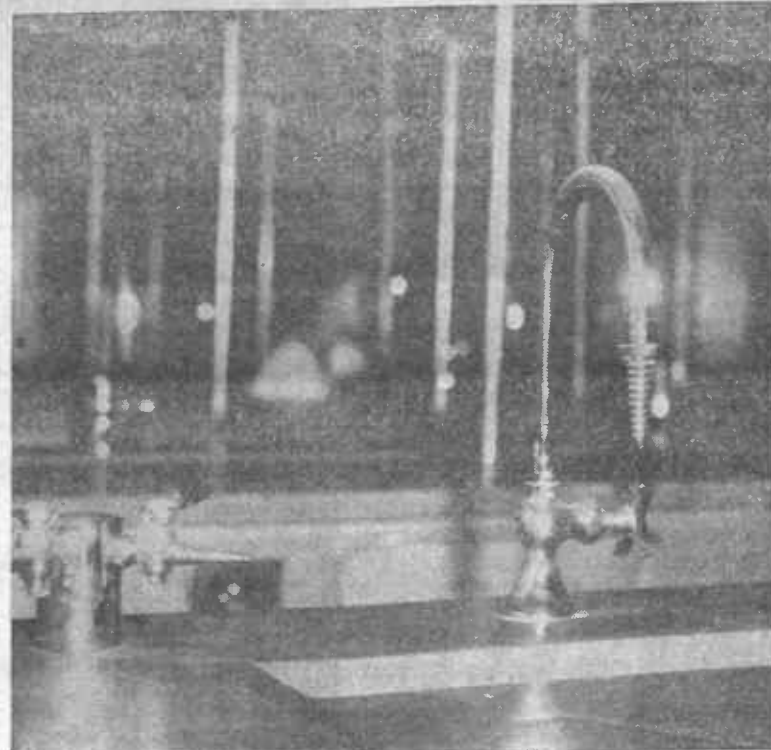

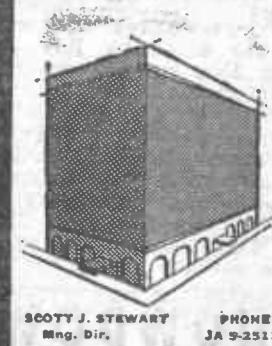

School Cornerstone Holds Treasures Of Iuka History

Box Sealed in Stone Held Photos, Newspapers, Letters, Other Items

Cornerstone of the old Iuka school building on Quitman Street was opened today to reveal a treasure trove of Iuka history. Supt. H. L. Shook was on hand to remove the box. There was little rust on the small tin box which had been sealed for fifty years in the cornerstone, however, the contents had not, for the most part, fared so well. Moisture had seeped in and some of the contents of the box had turned to dust. Among the contents were photographs of leading Iukans of fifty years ago. Distinctly visible were pictures of Prof. H. A. Dean and his wife, Sarah E. Dean, both members of the faculty of the old Iuka Normal Institute; Prof. John Neuhardt and his wife Effie Merrill Neuhardt (Mrs. Neuhardt was a sister of Mrs. T. M. McDonald); C. W. McKnight, one of the earliest citizens of Iuka, coming here from Eastport, a trustee of the public schools at the time the cornerstone was laid. The school was built on the site of the Iuka Normal Institute which had replaced the old Iuka Female Institute.

Among other items was a letter from G. W. Stamps, founder of the Iuka Female Institute. The letter containing recollections of the early years of the institute was addressed to Miss Rebecca Comans who was at one time a teacher in the institute. Much of the letter had crumbled but the names of the trustees of the institute were legible. They were Maj. J. M. Comans, G. W. Hamnerly, J. H. Dean, A. J. Mathews, W. J. Hart.

The institute which had opened in September 1859 was rather hastily closed in 1861 when the Civil War broke out. Word came that the Yankee soldiers were coming and orders were given to close the school immediately and get the young girl students to a place of safety.

Mr. Stamps joined with the Confederacy as a spy. On one occasion he disguised himself as an old woman, and on the pretext of selling gingerbread to the Yankee soldiers penetrated the camp of Gen. Grant at Eastport. He mapped the deployment of Grant's forces there and gathered other valuable information. Coming back to Iuka he spent the night in the house presently owned by Mrs. McDonald and which stands near the site of the old Iuka Female Institute. There he pulled up one corner of the rug in the parlor and hid his maps and information under it. The rug, incidentally, is still there, one hundred years after the war began.

The box also contained a letter written by Mrs. Lucy W. Rowe giving the history of the Thursday Club. The letter was written on stationery of the Executive Committee of the Confederate Veterans Reunion and dated 1909. The charter members of the club, the oldest in Iuka, were listed as Mrs. Rowe, Mrs. Annie Tatum McKinney, Mrs. Lizzie Wormsley McKing, Mrs. Lyla Merrill McDonald, Mrs. Bertha Garrard Paden, Mrs. Maggie Dinwiddie Thorne, Mrs. J. C. Gracey, Mrs. Mary Allen Johnson, Mrs. Connie Mae Bolding, Mrs. Annie Stone Mackie, Mrs. Mary Lou Williams, Mrs. Carrie Bishop Smith and a Miss Alexander.

Some seeds, wrapped in a piece of paper had been placed in the box with the notation, "plant these seed and see if they will come up." The paper bore the names of B. F. McKrae, Dr. W. A. Hodges, J. T. Goyer and B. M. Nelson. But the seeds had decayed and crumbled into moldy dust. What kind of seeds they were is unknown.

A copy of the Iuka Vidette and a copy of the Pantagraph, a short-lived weekly, were in the box. Both papers were very well preserved in contrast to other contents of the box.

The Pantagraph had three quotations across the top of the front page under the dateline of July 22, 1909. They were "Our Motto—The Economic Interests of Tishomingo County" "Everyone is equal before the civil law—or should be" and "As a man thinketh, so is he."

The editor was Prof. J. P. Mathews. The Iuka Vidette, also dated July 22, 1909, had some advertisements that are of interest. T. L. Brown & Co., were advertising "solid leather shoes . . . closing out at a price that will pay you to see." Also advertised were "pretty lawns, 7 1/2, 8c and 10c grade for 5c a yard. See our 5c checks, 5c domestics, 5 lbs. rolls, 40 yards scrap calico for one dollar."

And the Iuka Hardware was putting on a big stock reducing sale of wagons, surreys, mowing machines, etc. In the Want Ad section L. R. Davis of Dennis wanted to exchange a good mare and colt for a good mule weighing not less than 900 lbs.

A small Testament, the names illegible which had been inscribed on the fly leaf, was also in the cornerstone box; a button from a military uniform, a 1-cent piece dated 1851 and several clippings from the Commercial Appeal concerning the funeral of Gov. Stone of Mississippi.

And, for a final note, this item appeared on the back page of the Vidette found in the cornerstone box: "Mr. and Mrs. H. R. Smith of Houston, Miss., are guests of the editor of the Vidette (G. W. Dudley) this week. Mr. Smith is an experienced newspaperman and assisted in getting out this edition of the paper while the editor was absent in South Tishomingo, seeing his friends along the I. C. Railroad."

November Garden Jobs
Now is a good time to clean up the home garden. Check the fence. If it needs repairing, do it. Gather up your garden tools, clean them, oil them and store those that you won't be using any more during the winter.

Clean off rows where vegetables are dead. Gather up your stakes and wire, clean them up and store them in dry places.

Label and store all left over seed. Apply barnyard manure to garden and check the drainage. . . fill in low places.

Orchard Notes
Fruit tree planting time is here

All agencies dealing with forestry cooperate in the contest.

This month and next are the best times to plant peach, pear, apple, and pecan trees.

Early planting gives you a chance to get the best choice of varieties and sizes of trees from the nurseries.

Trees set in early winter will have the soil settled around the roots before growth starts in the spring. This will make for a better chance of survival.

Check with your local county agent for a list of recommended varieties, reliable nurseries, and prices on nursery stock.

Your local county agent will be glad to take your order for fruit trees if you wish to order trees this way. We will take individual orders and pool them until we have a large order to send off. We will order the trees on open account and the farmer can pay for the trees when they arrive at our office.

If you are planning on ordering Pecan Trees, I suggest you put your order in early as the supply soon ran out last year.

Cotton Reminders
Right now is a good time to start getting ready for next year's cotton crop. Take soil samples from areas that made poor yields this year. This will help you find out what was wrong this year and what you can do to improve the situation next year.

When you receive your soil analysis, call on your local county agent and discuss your 1961 fertilizer needs with him. If you had a mineral deficiency problem or a cotton disease this year, call your local county agent for help before you destroy the stalks.

When you have finished picking this year, destroy your old stalks immediately. Experiments have been run on poisoning the fields after harvesting with Methel Parathion before the weevils go in hibernation, also hedge rows around the fields were poisoned. The experiments showed a lot less weevils came through the winter to come out in the spring. This practice may prove beneficial in the future.

Keep Residues Out Of Milk
Here are some rules to follow to help keep residues out of drugs and pesticides out of milk.

Do not ship milk from infected animals. If you treat an animal do not sell her milk for a given period of time. Follow label directions exactly in use of all drugs and pesticides. If a drug is administered by a veterinarian, follow his advice to the letter.

Use only chemicals that are specifically recommended for the problem. On pastures, hay and forage crops use only pesticides that are specifically recommended on the label and follow directions exactly.

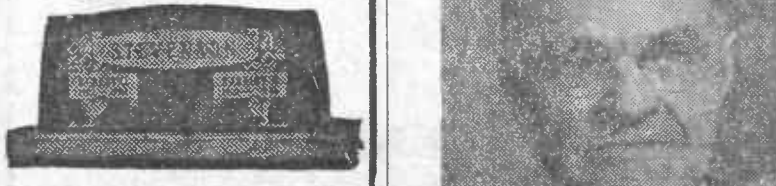
Do not turn the milking herd in to cotton or other fields that have been treated. Do not store chemicals or pesticides in the milking barn or feed room.

Facing My Sin

Lesson for November 6, 1960

IT IS NOT necessary to be "afraid" before being in touch with God. God is always in touch with all he has made. The trouble is, being in touch with God may not be a happy experience at all.

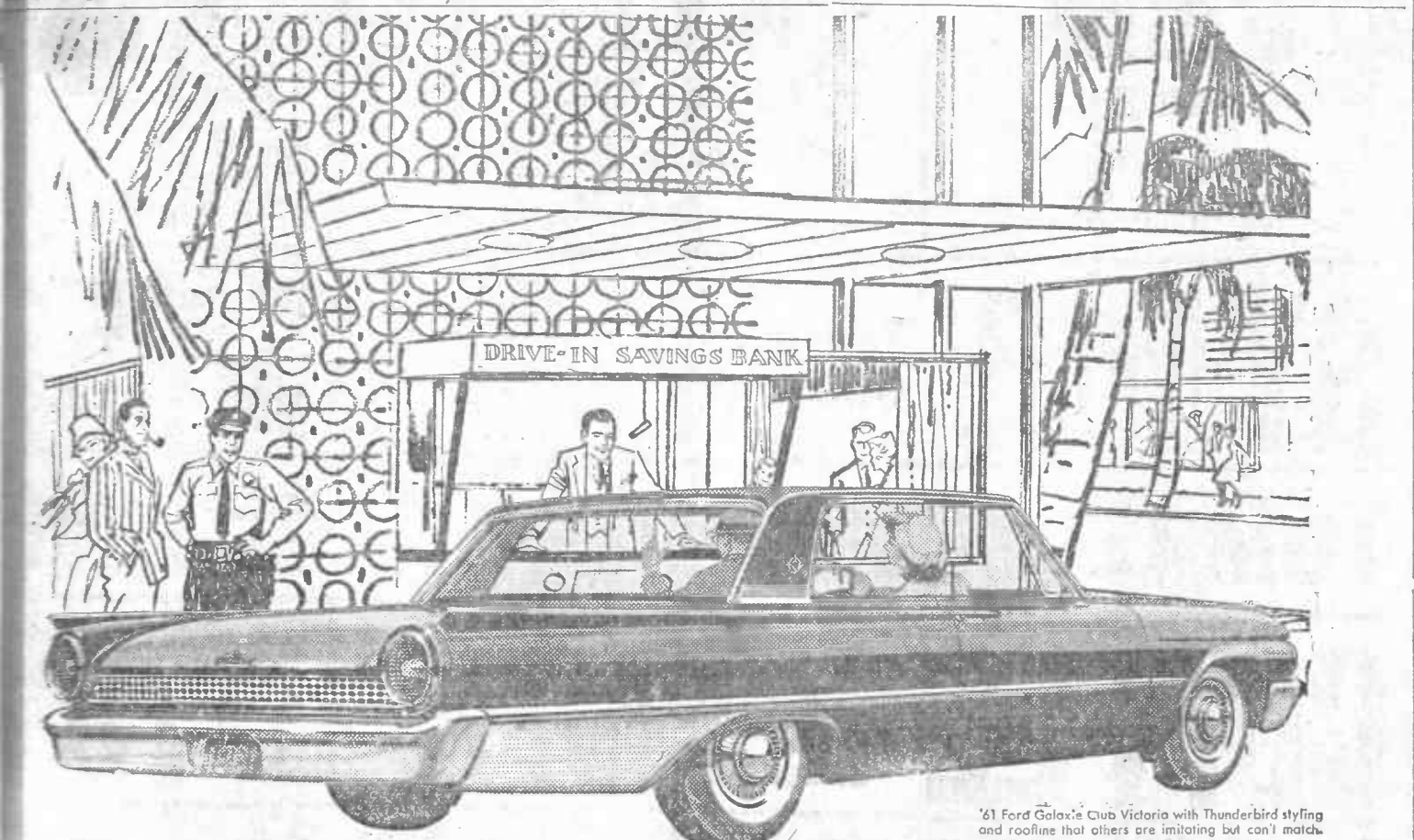
Consider the case of the poet who wrote the 32nd Psalm. He begins his poem by rejoicing in the happiness of a man who has had his sins forgiven. The forgiving touch of God does indeed bring joy to the heart. But the sense of God's presence had not always been a delight. (We can assume that this poet is talking about his own experience, not some other person's.)

God Has a Heavy Hand
He writes: "Day and night thy (God's) hand was heavy upon me." He suffered not only spiritual depression, but he had been physically worn-down too. Doctors today will tell you about "psychosomatic" ailments; that is, troubles which begin in the mind but which affect muscles and nerves and bones. Every hospital has patients who would not need to be there if they could come to terms with themselves and their problems. Ministers and hospital chaplains and psychiatrists know that often the only cure for an illness is not miracle-pills or an operation, but (so to speak) an operation on the soul. This is a modern re-discovery of what the Psalmist knew long ago, that a guilty conscience can actually bring on a fever and make a man lose weight and strength. God is in touch with sinners; but his touch is not to them a tender one.

Turning-point
The turning-point in that poet's experience came at the point where he "declared his sin"—when he broke down and confessed. There is no mention here of any "Confessor" who stood in the place of God. The sinner faced his God directly. He made his confession at first hand.

Much is said about a forgiving God. He is even thought of as a kind of gigantic forgiving-machine, with pardons rolling out like newspapers from a printing-press. Not at all. God's forgiveness is never in the Bible said to be automatic. There are conditions. The main condition is certainly not to get a great deal better, or even a little better, before God will consent to do anything for you. That's hardly possible. The condition is that you face your self, your actual sinful selfish mean self, get a good look and be ashamed. The condition is that you realize you cannot forgive yourself, you don't need to and it will do you no good. What you need is forgiveness from a higher source, nothing short of God.

On God's Way
After God has forgiven, then what? Do I sit down happily and contemplate his grace? Do I take up my time with hallelujahs? Do I spend the rest of my life writing songs about God's forgiving love? Not so. It is true, the experience of relief, release and rejoicing, that overwhelms one who has repented and confessed, has inspired many another forgiven sinner, and not only the author of Psalm 32, to write poetry describing his great experience. But most of life is not poem-writing. Life for the forgiven man is like a road, it stretches out into the future, and it is not always clear daylight on that highway. Confusing shadows lie across it, a man needs guidance. That is the point of verses 8 and 9 of Psalm 32. The forgiven man is in touch with God in a new way: the Lord is his guide. He had been like a fractious mule, pulling away from God all the time, and feeling sore from the bit pulled tight. Now God tells him to be a man, not a mule any longer, a man, not a beast, a man who can follow directions, a man who has his ear and mind open to the wise counsel of God. There is something more than wisdom on the way of God; there is love. A less than loving God is not going to be a forgiving God. And so the forgiven man looks back and realizes that God's once heavy hand lay on him not to destroy him but to draw him into God's true way.
