Tombigbee Waterway Study Will Be Made

A major water transportation study will be launched this fall by the University of Tennessee to assess the economic impact of the proposed Tombigbee Waterway on the mid-section of America. The study calls for development of a link extending from the Tombigbee River at Demopolis, Ala., to the Pickwick Pool on the Tennessee River near Iuka. The research will be conducted in cooperation with the Tennessee Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority, a tri-state body composed of the governors and business leaders in Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee.

With the Mississippi River the navigable outlet to the Gulf of Mexico the proposed waterway would open an alternate "Gulf" route from the markets and resources of the mid-continent.

Previous surveys have shown such an alternate route would save by 279 miles the shipping distance from Cairo, Ill., to Mobile, Ala.; 441 miles from New Orleans; 394 miles from Louisville and neighboring cities to Mobile, and 821 miles from Knoxville to Mobile. The proposed undertaking has implications of great benefit to this least section of Mississippi the Tri-States area.

L. C. Rast Bags 9-Point Buck In Colbert County

L. C. Rast, Iuka Rt. 1, bagged his first deer, a 3½ year old 9-point buck, early last Friday morning in the Game Preserve near Camp Steward in Colbert County, Ala. The Preserve is southeast of the Tishomingo County line. This is the first season it has been open to hunting in several years.

Mr. Rast, who is 62 years old, was very happy with the fine specimen he got on his first try, the first he had ever killed. The deer weighed 200 pounds undressed. After being drawn it weighed 155 pounds, the largest bagged so far this year on the Game Preserve and the second oldest according to the game warden at the weighing station. One six-year old has been killed on the Preserve this season.

Mr. Rast was hunting without dogs. He was on a stand about 100 yards away when he brought down the big buck. He got him with two shots, using a 20-gauge shotgun with one No. 3 buckshot shell and a slug shell.

Golden Couple Killed In Car-Truck Collision Tuesday

Mr. And Mrs. Otha Sparks Die Instantly On H-way 25 Near Belmont

A tragic accident took the lives of a man and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. Otha Sparks, early Tuesday morning in a truck-car collision on Highway 25 south of Belmont. The couple was residents of Golden, near Belmont.

The collision is reported to have occurred when the Sparks car pulled onto the highway from a side road. It was struck by a truck belonging to the Malone and Hyde Produce Company and driven by Herman Little of Baldwin.

Mrs. Sparks, an employee of Blue Bell, Inc., was being driven to work by her husband, a farmer, when the accident happened. Scene of the tragedy was near the Charles Bostick Grocery on highway 25. According to the Mississippi highway patrol, the couple was thrown from the car and died almost instantly. Patrolman Zeke Clark was the investigating officer.

Mr. Sparks, 33, and Mrs. Sparks, 24, were parents of a 5 year old daughter, Renda Gail, and a six months old son, Gregory Hugh.

Mr. Little, about 35, driver of the truck, was uninjured except for minor cuts and bruises. He was treated at Caldwell Memorial hospital in Baldwin.

Both Mr. Sparks and his wife, Evelyn, were members of well-known and prominent families in the Belmont-Golden area. They were members of the Bethel Baptist church.

Funeral services were conducted in the auditorium of the Belmont high school Wednesday afternoon, the sanctuary of the church where they were members being too small to accommodate the large number attending the popular couple's rites. The services were conducted by Rev. C. L. Ivy, Rev. Hattis Sparks and Rev. Jeff Cook. Burial was in the Bethel Baptist church cemetery. Deaton funeral directors of Belmont were in charge.

In addition to his two children, Mr. Sparks is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Sparks; two brothers, Jesse and Howard Sparks; 4 sisters, Mrs. Edith Dickerson, Mrs. Helen Long, Mrs. Myrtle Johnson, Mrs. Betty Moody and Mrs. Bobby Newell, all of the Golden community. Also surviving are a number of aunts, uncles and other relatives.

In addition to her children, Mrs. Sparks is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Payne; two brothers, Bobby and Billy Joe Payne; six sisters, Mrs. Lorene Credille, Mrs. Jewel Pardue, Mrs. Janette Barrett, Mrs. Gladys Sparks, Mrs. Lenette McDonald, and Miss Eloise Payne, all of Belmont. A host of other close relatives also survive.

Wanted: Places To Live

Opportunity began knocking on Iuka's doors many months ago when construction of the Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Mill at Counce, Tenn. was just in the beginning stages. It was a nice sound for our collective ears to hear . . . this gentle tapping that meant the time was coming when we'd begin to benefit from the economic advantage of such a big plant on our doorstep. In fact, it was such a soothing sound, figuratively speaking, that we just almost let it put us to sleep. Instead of getting out and doing something about the certain needs for housing that the arrival of working personnel at the Mill would bring, we were content to "dream" of the great day when jobs would open and trade increase.

That gentle tapping however has changed to insistent knocking. One hundred and thirty-two new families will be moving into the area within the next three months. They will need apartments and houses. Most will want to rent. Some will want to buy. All will want a place to live. This positive need for housing should be a challenge to the real estate and property owners, of Iuka and immediate area, making homes available to these newcomers, inviting them into the community to live, to aid and share in our growth, is opportunity knocking at our doors and its knock must be answered quickly.

Indeed there has been a recent upsurge in remodeling, in home building, in doing-over apartments in anticipation of the influx of new citizens into the area. There are perhaps a dozen such projects underway right now in Iuka. But that is not enough. More, many more, places to live need to be made available.

This much is certain. Those 132 families the Paper Mill is frantically trying to find housing for, will not live in tents around the plant. If they do not find housing in Iuka and environs, they will find it in towns over in Alcorn county and other areas.

Iuka has much to offer (except housing) which is desired by newcomers. We have a nice, friendly community. Our churches welcome visitors and new members. We have a fine new school which boasts the best in equipment and teaching staff.

Highway 25-N makes accessibility to Counce easy and direct. Recreational opportunities within easy reach make living and working in this area enjoyable. It is a splendid place to raise one's children . . . if one has a house to live in. But without that one important thing, a place to live, all other advantages we have to offer will be passed up by prospective newcomers.

The appeal has gone out. Wanted: Places to Live. The need is urgent. The renters and home-buyers are on their way here. What will we have to offer them?

Several thousand Tishomingo Counties will soon receive an important envelope in the mail. In one corner is the familiar cross of the National Tuberculosis Association and inside are Christmas Seals.

The battle against TB is a continuing one. We can take active part by making our contributions more generous in 1964 than in past years to the appeal of this quietly efficient association. This group has played a very important part in reducing the threat of TB, once the most dreaded killer in the Nation.

Tishomingo Counties have been blessed in many ways this year and their gifts to this work, as to other such programs, should be measured by the gifts they have received.

Despite the inroads that have been made against tuberculosis, there are seventeen known cases in this county. This means that there are probably several more cases where the presence of the disease is not even suspected by the individuals themselves.

Our local Health Department tells us that during the past year eight new cases have been discovered in the county. Since TB is spread by personal contact, its continued prevalence makes it more important than ever that we step up our control program through better education and improved and expanded diagnosis.

The work of our Tishomingo County tuberculosis association is financed entirely by our purchases of Christmas Seals. Of each dollar that we contribute 94 cents stays in Mississippi and this county, with only 6 cents going to support the National Association.

It is an important work. It is important to the health and well-being of us all; important enough for us all to respond generously by buying and using Christmas Seals.

Many hours of voluntary work by the Lucy Rowe Study Club, sponsor of the Seal Sale campaign, goes into preparing and mailing Christmas Seal letters. Buying and using the TB Seals is a fine way to express the Christmas spirit by saying "I care, and I will help."

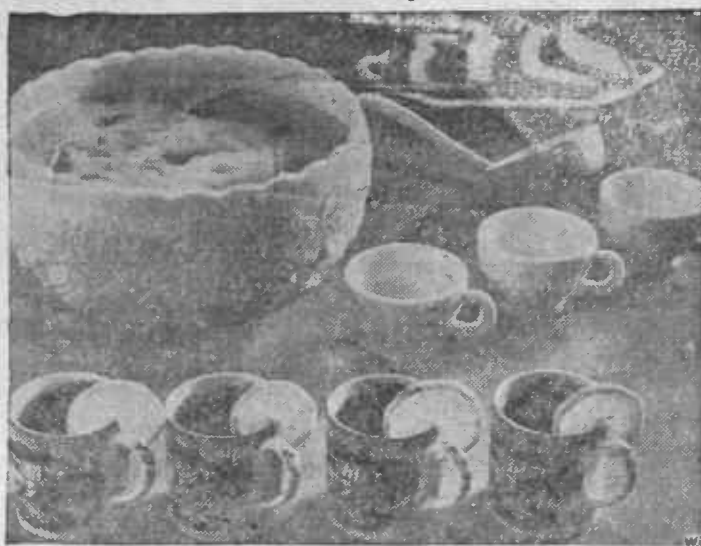

Beat egg whites until stiff; gradually add sugar, beating constantly. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored; fold into egg whites. Gradually add apple juice, mixing constantly. Serve in punch cups. Sprinkle each with nutmeg. Makes 10 servings. Double the quantities for 20 servings.

Hot Aromatic Punch

4 cups brewed tea

4 cups apple juice

2 tablespoons sugar

12 whole cloves

Lemon slices

Heat together tea, apple juice, sugar and whole cloves. Strain. Serve hot with lemon slices. Makes 8 servings. Multiply quantities by two for 16 servings, by four for 32 servings. Serve with pound cake.

Industrial Boom

Sparks City Growth

Booneville's economy is feeling the impetus of the area's industrial boom. Some \$3,500,000 in construction activity is going on in the city as a result of new industrial, religious and school buildings now underway. Industrial growth during the early part of 1960 includes American Packing Company, which will employ 175; expansion of Brown Shoe Company, which now employs 600; completion of Jupiter Sportsweat Co., with a payroll going to 325; Lancer Industries, manufacturers of fiberglass swimming pools, with employment to reach 150; American Seating Co., manufacturers of church equipment where employment is expected to reach 400; completion of Booneville Furniture Co., which employs 100, and opening of Quality Egg Co., to employ 75. Industrial payrolls now exceed \$50,000 weekly, and when the new plants are completed they are expected to reach \$100,000 weekly.

Aberdeen Chemical Company

Increased Production 50%

American Potash and Chemical Corporation, Aberdeen, increased production of sodium chlorate this month by 50 per cent. This new production, combined with the company's sodium chlorate operation at Henderson, Nevada, makes the company the world's largest producer of this material. Sodium chlorate is used as a weed killer, cotton defoliant and oxidizing agent in the manufacture of paper. The AP&CC's Aberdeen plant, located on a 1,700-acre site at Hamilton began production early in 1959. Now, less than two years since the \$4.5 million original plant went into production, one expansion has been completed at a cost of \$1.5 million; and a second, costing \$5 million, is scheduled to start early in 1961.

Gulfport Piping

Shipping Overseas

Contracts for overseas shipment of pipe totalling 1,000,000 have been announced by Gulfport Piping Co., a subsidiary of the First Mississippi Corporation. The contracts involve some 350 tons of alloy piping to be used in construction of oil refineries and chemical plants. The biggest of the recent export orders is a 206-ton shipment of pipe for construction of an oil refinery in Turkey. Gulfport Piping was opened in October, 1957, and taken over by First Mississippi in January, 1960.

Tool Engineering Seminar

Displays Mississippi Products
"Made in Mississippi" products were featured exhibit of the Tool Engineering Seminar held at Mississippi State University November 3-4. Twelve Mississippi firms exhibited their products and processes at the seminar, sponsored by Mississippi Chapter 141 of the Tool and Manufacturing Engineers, in co-operation with the Mississippi State University Engineering Extension Service.

Investment Analysts Tour State

Farm Facts

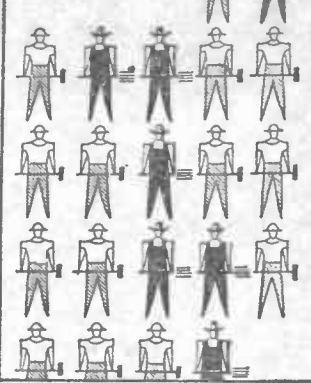
Because fewer than one out of eight people in the United States now live on a farm, some people are inclined to discount the importance of agriculture.

Farmers, however, are a part of our biggest single industry, sometimes called "agribusiness." More than 22 million workers are involved in it. This constitutes about a third of the total labor force. About 7.5 million of these are on farms, another 6 million are in farm supply businesses, and 9 million are employed in processing and distributing agricultural products.

This huge industry, at the same time, is contributing to the record levels of employment now being enjoyed in this country. The expenditure of farmers for labor, farm machinery, fuel, feed, fertilizer, insecticides, and other production items increased from \$6.4 billion a year during 1937-41 to \$25.1 billion in 1958.

The farmer's capital, estimated at \$200 billion, is put to work to generate billions more in new wealth each

year. He produces food and fiber valued at an estimated \$33 billion. This goes to primary processors for storage, processing, and merchandising—services amounting to \$47 billion. Consumers pay more than \$80 billion for the finished products.

Last year the Farm Bureau membership for Tishomingo County reached over 1,000 members. Only 5 counties in the state reached a membership of 1,000 members or more.

We are in lead of a strong farmers organization now more than ever before in our history of agriculture. Only 12% of the people in the United States are farmers. The other 88% of our population is often misled by newspapers and magazines as to the profits received by the farmers. The Farm Bureau is the only farmers organization we have in the south and it is very instrumental in legislation in our state and in Congress.

Winter Pasture Management
Plow fire lanes around your pastures to protect the good frost-

ed grass, young clovers and farm buildings from fire. It is also a good idea to plow additional fire lanes around stacked hay and barns and other vacant buildings.

Is your acreage of winter grazing limited? If so, maybe you had better do some managing. Just give the animals a few hours grazing a day; then take them off to prevent damage from trampling.

For late winter and early spring

grazing, now is the time to plant winter peas and wheat with a sod seeder.

Get land ready for planting Coastal Bermuda. The Coastal can be planted any time from now until spring. Prepare land also for spring planting of Dallis, Bahia, common Bermuda and lespedeza. If you haven't already done so, fertilize spring clover areas with phosphate and potash. Apply needed lime now while trucks can still get over the fields.

Feeding Corn To Livestock
Want to get more out of that surplus corn. Try feeding it to livestock.

Feeding it to lightweight calves during the winter can be profitable. Then sell the calves in early spring. If you don't have any silage or winter grazing you can do a good job of making calves gain a pound and a half a day by feeding 10 to 12 pounds of grss hay, two or three pounds of corn and two pounds of protein meal daily. If you have legume hay available you can cut the protein meal to a pound per day. Amount of hay can also be reduced.

The corn can also be used profitably to creep feed fall dropped calves.

If you plan to full feed cattle this winter, make sure they are in good flesh before putting them in the feed lot.

Don't leave out hogs. Possibly your best bet for finding a profitable use for the corn is by feeding it to hogs.

If you don't raise your own pigs, consider buying feeder pigs and using your home grown corn to feed them out to top market weight.

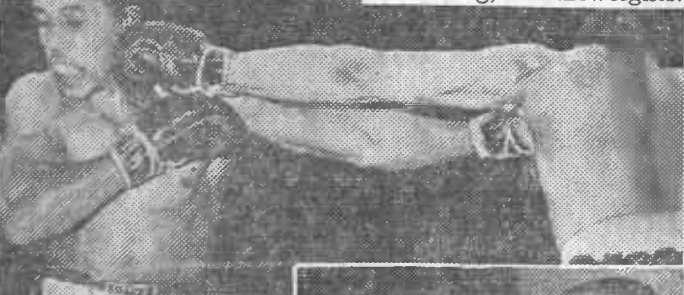
Workshop Planned At NEMJC For N. Miss. Teachers

ARMS AND THE MEN stand-off symbolizes result of encounter, 10-round draw, between Ernie Buford (left) and Ace Armstrong, middleweights.



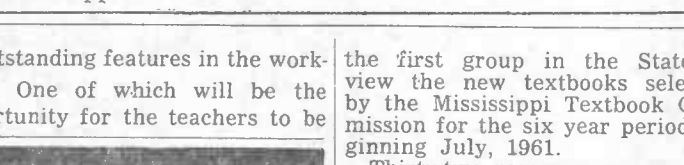

Farm Facts

Production per man-hour on the farm has increased almost four times as fast as that of industry during the past 11 years. In agriculture, man-hours have been reduced by 40 per cent since the early '30's.

Since the end of World War II, for example, cotton farmers have reduced the amount of labor per bale from 170 hours to a record low of 61 hours.

This saving is equal to more than 750,000 people, each working a full year, 40 hours per week.

Between 1939-41 and 1957-59, output per acre for wheat was up 52 per cent, corn 69 per cent, and cotton 82 per cent. Output per animal during the same period was up 30 per cent for beef and milk—eggs per bird up 46 per cent.

To the average non-farm person, who is much more concerned with his own problems, these facts may be of little significance. He knows he is eating well, is well clothed, and is living in a comfortable home. He gives little thought to why.

Production per man hour on the farm has increased almost four times as fast as in industry during the past eleven years.



Farm productivity, however, has contributed tremendously to his high standard of living. Because of it we are assured of a stable source of food and fiber. It is a great source of national strength.

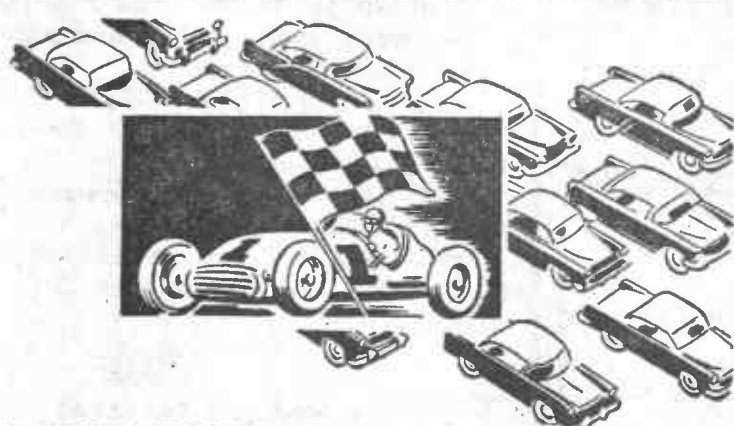

These teams were State Championship winners for the above named years. They and their families were on hand to cheer the present Belmont boys' team to their 60-43 win over Hernando.

Many prominent educational figures in Tishomingo County and surrounding counties were also on hand for the dedicatory event Friday night. Julian R. Long, Tishomingo County superintendent of education, introduced the principal speaker, Clyde Harris, principal of Belmont, welcomed the guests and fans. Glenn Williams, Burnsville principal, was on hand and a number of county school board members. L. G. Phillips, new county-wide school board member who was elected in the Nov. 8 balloting, was among those present. Also the De Soto County school superintendent, R. E. Rutherford accompanied the Hernando team to the game. Theron Long, coach at Hernando, is a brother of Julian R. Long, both of whom are graduates of Belmont.

The Belmont gymnasium was built at a cost of some \$60,000, the community helping to raise funds to build the facility larger than the original plans called for. The seating capacity was increased greatly by placing seats in a balcony over the dressing rooms at one end of the gym. The sturdy hardwood floor was highly varnished and shone like glass for last Friday's games. Belmont's "B" team played Fairview Junior High's team before the main event of the evening, in a sort of warm-up preliminary.

Following are the company's wood specifications which be followed in preparing your wood so as to get the return:

PINE

QUALITY: Sticks of pulpwood should be green, and fairly straight. All knots and defects must be trimmed parallel to and flush with the stick. Sticks must have square cut ends.

STICK LENGTHS: 5' 3" to 5' 6"

STICK DIAMETER: Minimum - 4" inside the small end of stick. Maximum - 20" on the bark at the large end of stick. Any deformed stick which will not pass in a 20" cylinder is considered to be in excess of 20" and is unacceptable.

CULL WOOD: Sticks of wood in the following desirable classes will be treated as cull:

1. Small wood
2. Sap rot
3. Heart rot
4. Hollow sticks
5. Charred wood
6. Stumps
7. Splintered
8. Forked
9. Metal (wire, nails, etc.)

HARDWOOD

SPECIES: When hardwood is ordered, species be designated. It is contemplated that only white oaks and red oaks will be used. does NOT include black jack oak.

SPECIFICATIONS: Same as for Pine, except the minimum diameter will be 5" inside the bark on the small end of the stick.

MIXED WOODS

Trucks containing Pine and Hardwood mixed not be accepted.

GENERAL

Payment will be based on standard cord of 128 feet.

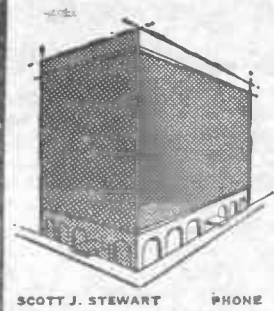

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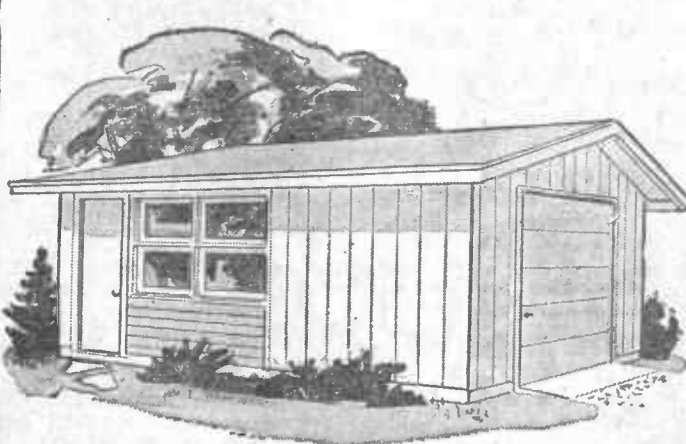

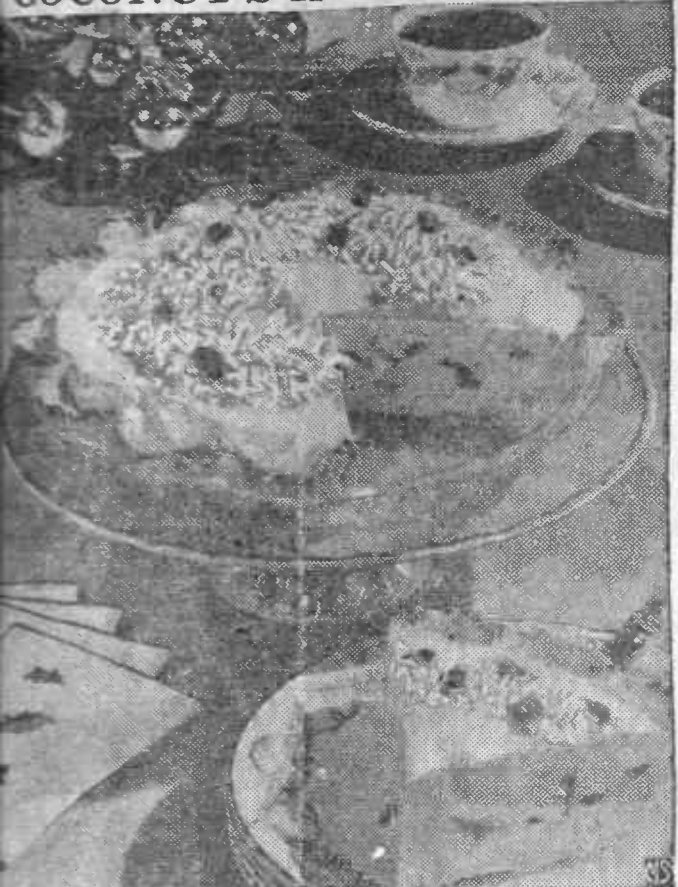

Christmas Angel Pie

1 envelope (1 tablespoon) gelatin
1 cup cold water
2 tablespoons granulated sugar
3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup mixed chopped candied fruits
1 baked 9-inch coconut pastry shell
Chopped candied fruits, Baker's Angel Flake Coconut

Confectioners' powdered sugar
2 egg whites
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1/2 cup whipping cream

Sprinkle gelatin on cold water to soften. Combine in saucepan tablespoons sugar, the flour, and salt. Gradually stir in milk. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Boil 1 minute; remove from heat. Stir in softened gelatin; mix until partially set. Beat with egg beater until smooth. Blend vanilla and almond extracts.

Beat fruit thoroughly with confectioners' sugar. Beat egg whites with cream of tartar until foamy; gradually add 1/2 cup sugar, beating to stiff peaks. Whip cream until thick and fold into mixture. Fold in beaten egg whites and fruit. Pour into pie shell and chill about 2 hours. Before serving, garnish with additional chopped candied fruits and flaked coconut.

New Brunswick Housewives Strong
For Apple Use in Their Desserts

No fruit is grown that has more popularity in the Canadian Province of New Brunswick than apples.

And Harry Collins of Moncton, is no exception to this age-old New Brunswick liking.

Mrs. Collins, who knows this dessert "weakness" of her husband, who is freight traffic manager for the Canadian National Railways in the Atlantic Provinces, has whipped up an apple dessert specialty which is Harry's favorite although named:

Adam's Choice

6 medium apples 1/4 cup butter
1/2 cup granulated sugar 1/2 cup flour
cinnamon 1/2 cup brown sugar

Peel the apples and slice into a buttered dish. Sprinkle with the granulated sugar and cinnamon. Combine the butter, flour and brown sugar and spread mixture on top of the apples. Bake about 30 minutes in a moderate oven (350°F.) until apples are soft and top is a golden brown. Serves 6.

Still using apples—but peaches or pears may be substituted—is another of Mrs. Collins' favorite desserts. This is:

Orchard Dreams

1 recipe biscuit dough 3/4-1 cup brown sugar
6-8 apples 1 1/2-2 tsp. cinnamon or nutmeg
2-3 tsp. butter

Roll biscuit dough to 3/4-1 inch thickness. Cut in five 6-inch squares. In the center of each square place pared and cored apples, peaches or pears. Fill the center with the sugar and spice mixed



together. Top with a dot of butter. Draw pastry up around fruit and press 4 corners together. Seal edges and place in a greased baking dish. Prick well with a fork and bake in a hot oven (400°F.) for 10 minutes and then reduce temperature to moderate (350°F.) and bake for 30 minutes longer. Serve hot with Fruit Juice Sauce.

Biscuit Dough Recipe

2 cups sifted flour 2-4 tablespoons shortening or butter
4 tsp. baking powder 1/2 cup milk
1/2 tsp. salt

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in shortening with pastry blender until the mixture resembles fine corn meal. Add milk and make a soft dough (do not cover mix). Turn dough on to a lightly floured board and knead lightly.

Dr. Charles Hogarth, president of Mississippi State College for Women at Columbus, was the principal speaker. He addressed the group after the morning business session and lunch hour.

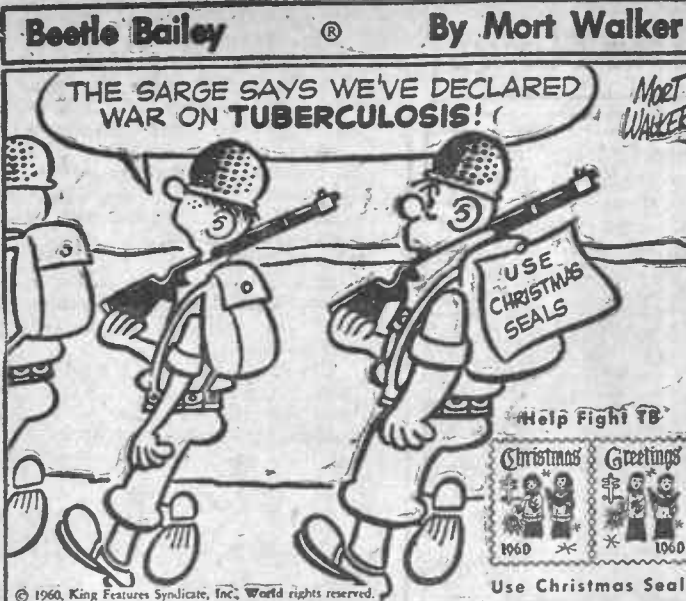

Winter Cover Crop: November 30, 1960 will be the deadline date for sowing Hairy Vetch or AW Peas. If you have your crop gathered and the land is dry enough why not sow a few acres of Hairy Vetch on your cotton ground. Since you have 10 or 12 more days left hurry to the ASC Office and pick up some seed and sow them.

Place Orders For Pine Tree Seedlings: Every farm in Tishomingo County has at least one to ten acres of waste land that you could plant pine tree seedlings on. Why not take advantage of your ASC program and plant a few pine seedlings and get paid for planting them. If you want to do this, place your order for these seedlings with the county agent or Larry Brewer, our forestry, at once.

If you place an order be sure to request that the seedlings be delivered in December 1960 so that you can get them planted in December and then you will be paid for them. If seedlings are planted in January 1961 no payment can be made until July 1961.

Mississippi Forest Service tells us that each farmer can receive 1000 seedlings of 35¢ (cost of handling) then each 1000 above that will cost \$4.85 per thousand.

Be sure to come and order that 1000 seedlings. You could plant them Christmas week. Through your ASC program the government will pay \$6.00 for planting this 1000 seedlings.

Lamb Sale Record: We want to remind wool growers who market lambs this fall of the importance of keeping records of their sales. These records will be needed next spring for use in applying for payment under the wool program.
