Surplus Commodity Applications

May Be Made Until Further Notice; Welfare Agent Gives Rules

Needy people living in Tishomingo county other than those not already receiving commodities may make application for surplus commodities upstairs at the courthouse.

The office will open at eight o'clock each morning, Monday through Friday, until further notice. J. J. Robinson, county welfare agent, said.

The head of the household (the man) will have to come to make application.

To be eligible, a family must own a home assessed at more than \$133.00.

In addition to the home the family must not own other property worth more than \$600. If there is only one person in the household, he can have no more than \$300 worth of property in addition to his home.

Personal property may consist of cash on hand; bank account or savings; stocks, bonds and investments; timber; oil, gas

or other furnishings; livestock; automobiles, passenger truck; machinery; promissory notes or mortgages; life insurance and similar possessions.

In addition to the above qualifications the monthly income for the individual or family must be less than shown in the paragraph below.

Total monthly income for household: one person, \$55.00; two persons, \$85.00; three persons, \$110.00; four persons, \$135.00; five persons and over, \$155.00.

"Same Household Group" means people eating at the same table, sharing the same housekeeping quarters and dependent on the same income.

It will be necessary to bring tax receipts and homestead exemption papers.

Applications will not be accepted on Saturdays.

COUNTY AND STATE COTTON GINNINGS

According to a preliminary report on cotton ginnings in the state, Tishomingo county had ginned 5,557 bales prior to November 1 from the 1960 crop. On the same date last year, the number of bales ginned totaled 6,144 — a difference of 587 bales.

Total ginned in the state this year prior to November 1 was 1,137,300 bales. Last year the total at this date was 1,227,490 bales.

The noon closing was decided upon because of the county-wide teachers meeting which will be held at the Burnsville school, Wednesday at 2 p.m. This will give all teachers an opportunity to attend the full session.

Cotton Allotments Being Set

Referendum Will Be Held Dec. 13 On Marketing Quotas

Cotton allotments for 1961 now are being determined for all "Old Cotton Farms" in Tishomingo county, according to Ellett N. Allen, office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. Notices of individual farm allotments will be mailed to farm operators well in advance of the December 13 voters' referendum on 1961 cotton marketing quotas.

Mr. Allen reminds farmers that the upland cotton program this year provides only one farm allotment and one price support for the 1961 crop, as in the program in effect for cotton before 1959.

For 1959 and 1960 upland cotton crops only, special legislation provided that cotton farm operators could elect a choice between (1) the "regular" farm allotment and the price support rate, and (2) a 40-percent-larger farm allotment and a price support which was 15 per cent of parity lower.

Mr. Allen said that the 1961 county allotment is about the same as in 1960, and therefore, 1961 allotments for most farms in the county will be at about the same level as in 1960.

Farmers are also reminded that at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum must approve the quotas if they are to become effective. Under quotas, marketing penalties would apply on "excess" cotton, and price support would be available on the 1961 upland crop at not less than 70 percent of parity. Without quotas, there would be no marketing penalties, and support to growers who complied with their allotments would be at 50 per cent of parity.

Questions about the cotton program or referendum should be referred to the ASC county office.

Cecil Brown Receives Citation

County Dimes March Fund Director Honored By Nat'l Foundation

Cecil H. Brown, Tishomingo County 1961 March of Dimes director, has received a certificate of appreciation from the National Foundation in recognition of his service as 1960 fund director.

Presentation of the certificate was made last Thursday by V. T. Anthony of Jackson, representative of the National Foundation. Mr. Anthony highly praised Mr. Brown for his work in the successful drive for March of Dimes funds in this county last January. Mr. Brown was the 1960 Fund director in Tishomingo county.

Recommendation for the citation was made to the National Foundation by Miss Bernice Bostick, Tishomingo County chapter chairman. The 1961 March of Dimes fund drive will be conducted locally and nationwide from January 2-31, 1961. The 1961 drive will seek to raise \$45-million for the fight against major crippling diseases of birth defects, arthritis and polio. The local goal in the fund drive has not been announced. Theme of the drive will be "Prevent Crippling Diseases."

Overall, New March of Dimes grants totaling \$2,200,000 have gone to scientists in many states for clinical research and for investigations into the causes and possible prevention of these conditions, which disable hundreds of thousands of Americans each year. Available statistics show that 250,000 babies are born with a significant birth defect each year and that some 11,000,000 people are afflicted with some form of arthritis.

Despite these major efforts in the new disease areas, the bulk of New March of Dimes funds still goes for the treatment of victims of paralytic polio. Nearly 50,000 persons, most of whom contracted the disease before the advent of the Salk vaccine, still look to the New March of Dimes for needed care and rehabilitation. Last year alone, this amounted to \$13,900,000.

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Thanksgiving 1960

Of all the holidays we celebrate in the United States, Thanksgiving Day is unique in that it is the oldest strictly American holiday we observe. Thanksgiving 1960 will mark the 339th celebration of the day of praise and thanksgiving inaugurated by the Pilgrims in 1621.

If we stop to count our blessings and compare them with those the Pilgrims gave thanks for we can readily see what 300 years have brought this country in material advancements.

At first glance we would say we have much more to be thankful for than the Pilgrim fathers, or perhaps even our own grandfathers, had. By today's standards the Pilgrims would appear a miserable lot. In constant danger of attack by heathen Indians, living in crude log houses, fighting cold, disease and hunger through bitter winter months, the Pilgrims found they had much to rejoice and be thankful for when their first summer gave them good crops and harvest. They had nursed their sick and ailing back to reasonable health. They had laid up a store of goods for the winter and they had come to some peaceful terms with the Redskins. And for these things they were thankful.

Today, while our material goods are many, we still are in danger of attack by heathens — heathens with atomic missiles instead of tomahawks and arrows — but right there any similarity to conditions suffered by the Pilgrims ceases.

When our folks get sick, even a little bit sick, we send them to a hospital for quick treatment, or pick up a phone and call our doctor. Our houses are insulated against cold and rain. We flip a switch or turn a valve or bring in a bucket of coal and have a warm abode in no time. We have our choice of foods from nearby grocery stores. We have food freezers with summer vegetables and meats year 'round. We have rapid transportation to take us any place, any time. If we have any "wants" we cannot supply ourselves, there is someone or some agency ready to come to our aid. Surely, we are the most blessed of people — if material goods and physical comforts are our measuring stick.

But looking back again to the days of the Pilgrims and thinking again on the paltry sum of goods they gave thanks for, we suspect that even so, they were indeed more blessed than we who have so much. Do we give thanks out of the fullness of our hearts and in an humble spirit of appreciation, or do we observe Thanksgiving because it is a 339-year old tradition that gives us a day off from work and a chance to stuff ourselves a little more than we do on ordinary days?

Indeed, we remember the poor and give holiday cheer to those about us who are in need. But is it just a gesture that has become traditional? Do we give, not out of a heart full of appreciation for the bounty our Maker has given us, but because it is the thing to do. Do we give thanks, truly, to God for the good, deep spiritual stamina that makes a life really worth living, the spirit that God gives us, the spirit of love and appreciation like the Pilgrims had?

Thanksgiving 1960 is a good time for us to take stock, not of our material goods, but of our spiritual accounts.

Garward assembles the complete cases for these photographs, except for the electronic components, which are installed by the Fidelity Electronic Corporation in New Jersey. The Picayune plant has been in production since February, 1959.

Vicksburg Rubber Company Starts Production This Month

Vicksburg's new \$1,250,000 rubber reclaiming plant is scheduled to enter production this month. Preliminary operations will take about a week, and then the firm will enter into actual production, according to Thomas Galvin, plant manager for U. S. Rubber Reclaiming Company, owners of the plant. The new plant is situated on a 35-acre tract and is equipped to produce 34,000 to 40,000 pounds of reclaimed rubber per day. Initial employment will be approximately 30, and future expansion is anticipated.

Forest To Hold Bond Election

The Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board has issued a certificate of convenience and necessity providing for a \$60,000 BAWI bond election in Forest to finance an expansion program at Cudahy Packing Company. An election date will be set by city officials in the near future. Under a new contract with the City, Cudahy guarantees full repayment of the new and old bonds.

Mississippi Firm Expands Production

The W. G. Avery Body Company, with two plants in Jackson and one at Magee, is now manufacturing complete platforms for truck bodies for Chevrolet Division of General Motors. Located in Jackson in 1938, the firm has made wooden component parts for truck bodies for years. In August the company added a metal assembly section to its operations. The metal stampings for the truck platforms are shipped into Jackson from Indianapolis. Wooden parts are added, and the parts are painted and shipped to ten different Chevrolet assembly plants. The Avery company employs approximately 325 Mississippians in its three plants.

Groundbreaking Held For Vicksburg Potash Plant

Groundbreaking ceremonies for the \$7 million Southwest Potash Corporation plant were held in Vicksburg November 16. The ceremonies were open to the public, and prominent civic leaders and company officials participated.

During the past few weeks I have explained the major changes made by the 1960 Amendments to the Social Security Act. This week, I would like to briefly review these changes that affect so many people in Tishomingo County.

A disabled worker can now qualify for disability insurance benefits regardless of his age. Until the

new changes, the worker had to be 50 years old to receive benefits. Now any disabled worker under age 65 can qualify for payments and when he qualifies his family may also receive payments.

Beginning in 1961 most social security beneficiaries who work will lose fewer benefits. Next year the beneficiary who earns more than \$1200.00 will have \$1.00 of his benefits withheld for each \$2.00 that he earns between \$1200.00 and \$1500.00. When his earnings go above \$1500.00 he will lose \$1.00 in benefits for each \$1.00 of his earnings. This change means that many people who have not applied for benefits because they are still working should now apply for payments.

The amount of work required for benefits to be payable to a worker or his surviving family has been reduced. Approximately one-third less credit for work under social security is now needed. Under the old law, for example, a person reaching retirement age in 1960 would have needed 19 work credits. Because of the Amendments, only 12 credits will now be needed.

Survivors of a worker who died between March 31, 1938 and January 1, 1940 may now get benefits provided the worker had at least a year and a half of work credits.

Beginning in January 1961, the work that a parent does for a son or daughter in their trade or business will be covered by social security. However, the work a parent does in the household of a son or daughter is still not covered.

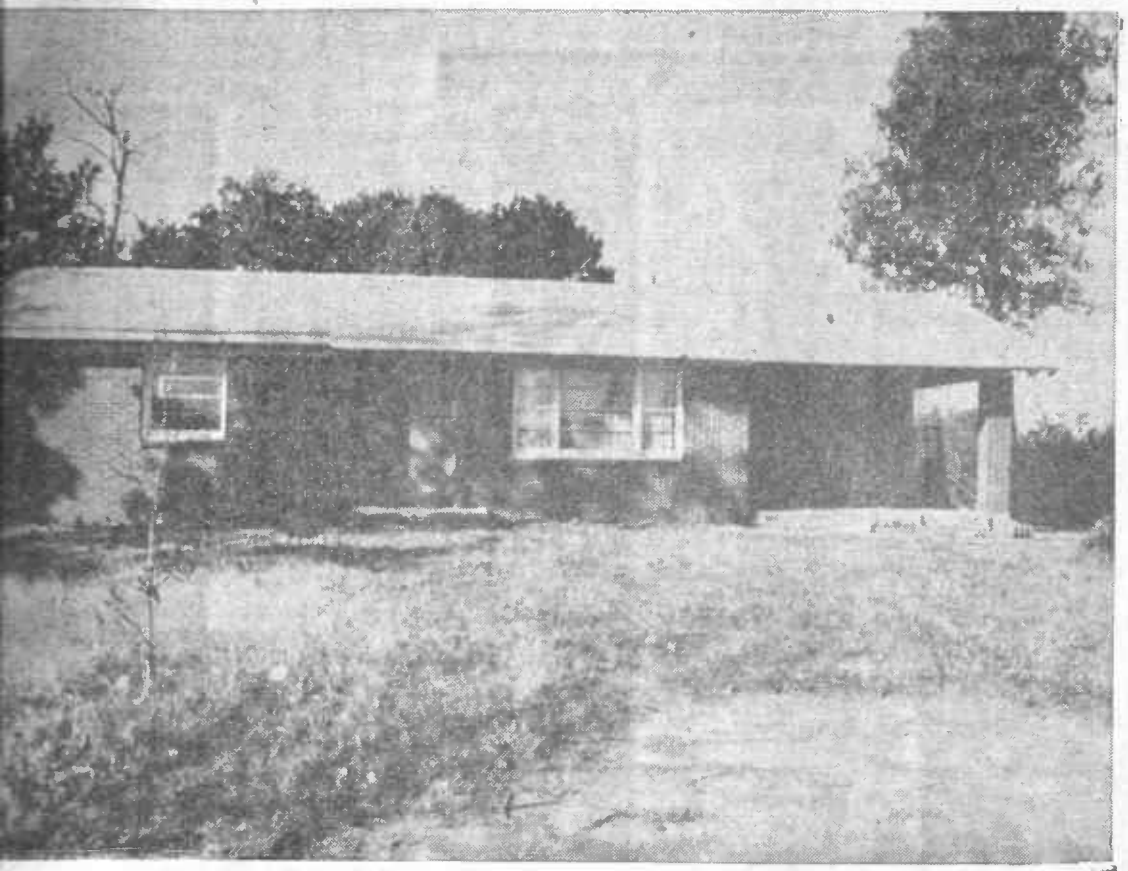

Holiday Safety Urged By Miss. Highway Patrol

What makes a holiday week end more hazardous for driving than any other week end?

"Traffic congestion and misplaced or misguided holiday spirit," says Highway Patrol Chief Dave Gayden.

Chief Gayden feels that this contributes to carelessness, and even a slight mistake in heavy, fast traffic can be deadly.

To prevent traffic accidents, the Mississippi Highway Patrol recommends that Thanksgiving motorists remember: (1) the occasion, Thanksgiving should be an occasion for humility, "thanksgiving," and courtesy; and (2) hazards multiply as traffic flow increases.

Football Fans Urged To Leave Early For Game

Public Safety Commissioner Thomas Shelton urges football fans planning to attend the annual Ole Miss - Miss. State game at Oxford Saturday, November 26, to "leave home early."

As every fan who has attended an Ole Miss - Mississippi State University game at Oxford well knows, parking is a major problem.

Traffic congestion on the campus near Hemingway Stadium and on highways leading into Oxford bogs traffic flow to a snail's pace just before game time. Often fans who allowed themselves ample time to travel from home to Oxford under normal travel conditions never see the kickoff, or even the first quarter of play.

The big problem is parking space. Every campus parking facility or space where vehicles can be parked is utilized, but it takes time to get automobiles into these make-shift parking areas. This backs traffic up.

"So pack a lunch or eat after you get parked at Oxford, but leave home early" advises Commissioner Shelton. "Park as directed, and as soon as you arrive on campus. If you plan to do some

Mississippi Salt Domes May Become Sites For Nuclear Research Testing

The Atomic Energy Commission, with the assistance of other U. S. organizations, is investigating salt domes in Mississippi which might be suitable for scientific projects.

Important to the seismic research program announced by President Eisenhower on May 7, 1960.

The expanded seismic research program is part of the United States' efforts which seek to improve systems for detecting and notifying seismic events in an attempt to achieve an adequately informed agreement for the suspension of nuclear weapons test.

Nuclear and chemical detonations in various geologic formations, including salt domes, have been recommended by scientists for program.

A Mississippi site is found to be fully acceptable, a limited number of nuclear detonations, if ap-

proved by the President, would be made there in deep underground placements. However, these experiments, of small to about nominal yield, would be authorized only if there was assurance that there would be no hazard to the public. (Nominal yield is equivalent to 20,000 tons of chemical explosives).

Initial construction could begin in early 1961. Under such a schedule, the site probably would not be ready for use until late 1961 at the earliest.

Preliminary surveys have been made of salt domes in several states. More detailed surveys have been made of various locations in Mississippi including the Tatum Dome, about 30 miles southwest of Hattiesburg, and the Bruinsburg Dome, about 40 miles south of Vicksburg. Surface surveying is now being conducted at both these

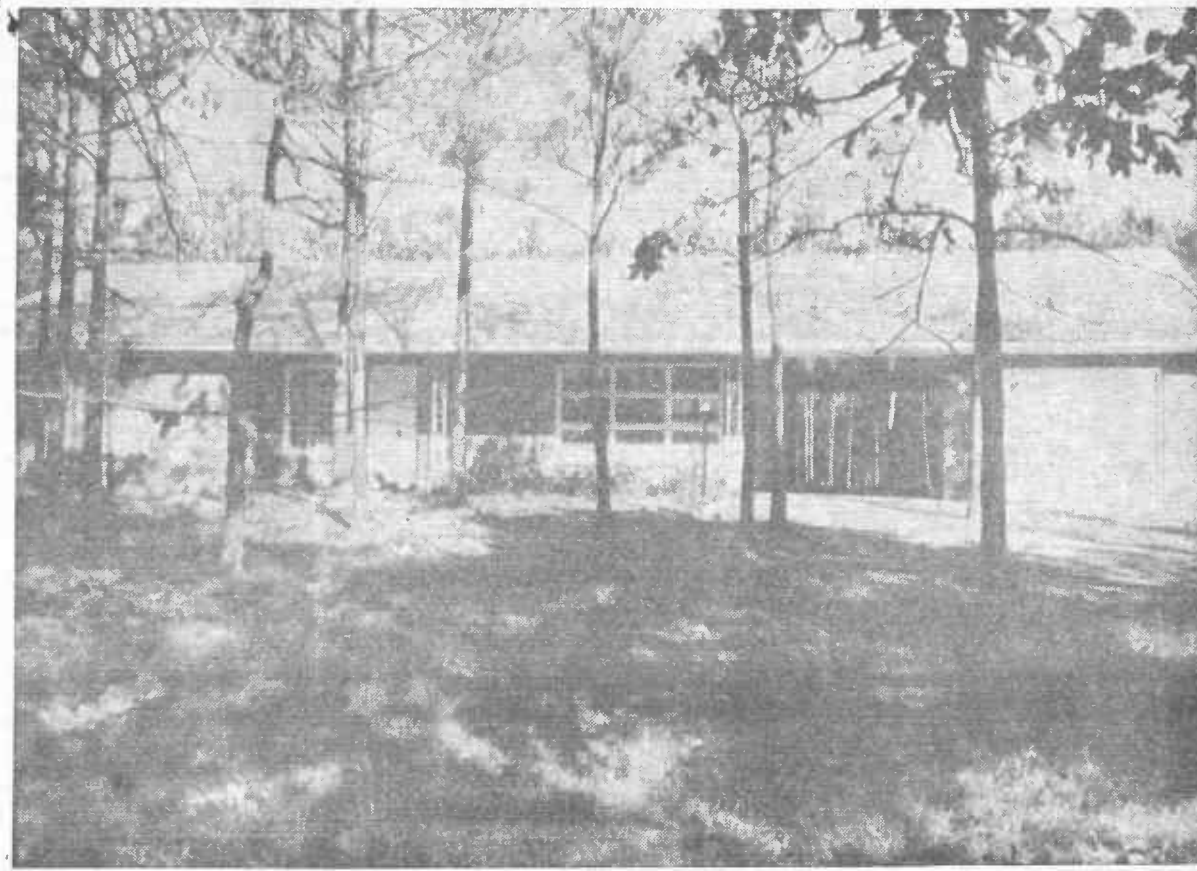

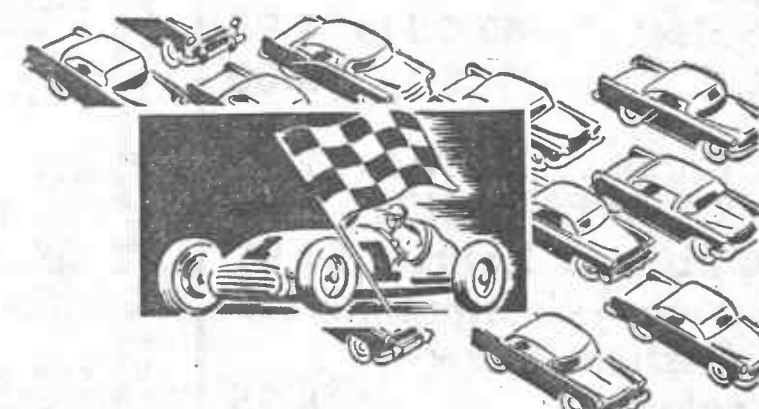

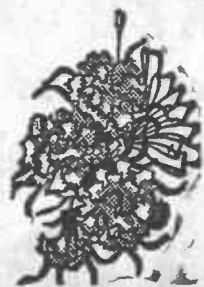

Home Agent Notes

By Roberta L. Warren,

"If winter comes, can spring be far behind..."

That's the way the quotation from school days goes, isn't it? And to paraphrase it at Thanksgiving, we can say, can't we: "If Thanksgiving comes, leftover turkey can't be far behind..."

Freeze Leftover Turkey
With the modern-day home freezer, we don't have to eat the turkey day after day down to the hash and soup stages, if we don't want to.

Individual meal-size packages of sliced turkey can go into the freezer for later use.

Or you can freeze turkey sandwiches for later use. You will find the sandwiches delicious when you thaw and heat them in foil in a moderate oven for about 20 minutes.

If you use the turkey down to the bone, cook the meat loose from the bones and freeze it for later use in creamed dishes. Even the broth can be frozen for making soup later.

Frozen turkey sandwiches can go directly from the freezer to the lunch box. They will be ready to eat by lunch time. At normal room temperature sandwiches thaw in 3 to 4 hours. But use them promptly after they're thawed.

Turkey Salad Loaf

Mix 1/4 cup vinegar, 1/3 cup salad oil, 1/4 teaspoon salt, a touch of pepper and paprika. Pour this over 3 cups chopped cooked turkey. Let stand in the refrigerator 1 to 2 hours, stirring occasionally.

Sprinkle 2 tablespoons unflavored gelatin on 1/2 cup cold water, let soak a few minutes and then dissolve it in 2 1/2 cups of hot turkey broth. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt. Then cool until slightly thickened.

Combine drained turkey meat, 1/2 cup canned peas, 6 sliced stuffed olives, 1 teaspoon onion juice, and 1/2 cup finely chopped celery, with gelatin mixture. Pour into loaf pan and chill until firm.

Unmold and serve on lettuce or other salad greens.

Cranberries for Later Use

You can freeze cranberries for later use. Right in the unopened cellophane bag or box you buy them in. No thawing is necessary before cooking.

Since you put them in the freezer dry, you can separate them easily later. This way you can break off the amount you need and return the rest to the freezer.

These sandwich fillings DON'T FREEZE WELL: Hard-cooked egg white becomes tough. Raw vegetables lose their crispness. Mayonnaise or salad dressing separates and soaks into the bread.

Forestry Group Hears Talmadge

Pine Trees Will Star In Southern Economy, Ga. Senator Declares

The pine tree is the "star to which the South should hitch its economic future," United States Senator Herman E. Talmadge of Georgia told the Mississippi Forestry Association at its annual meeting in Jackson, November 18. "Of all the great natural advantages which the South enjoys, perhaps the most valuable is its ability to grow pine trees faster and cheaper than any other region," the former Georgia governor declared at a luncheon at the King Edward Hotel.

That fact, coupled with the growing importance of the pulp and paper industries, holds the promise of future wealth and prosperity for our section limited only by our ability to produce more trees and the imagination of scientists in discovering new uses for them. It is a promise which should prompt southerners to put every idle and unproductive acre of land to work growing pines. I believe it well founded to

assume that the fabulous developments that have and are taking place in the production of wealth from our Southern pines are to continue in the years ahead," he concluded.

Talmadge, who was introduced by Mississippi Senator John Stennis, noted that, since World War II, pulp-mill plant capacity in the South has tripled and that, as of 1958, the region was producing 60 per cent of the nation's wood-pulp and more than 40 per cent of its paper and paperboard. More than 400 persons attended the 22nd annual session of the Association which represents some 2000 persons and companies interested in forestry.

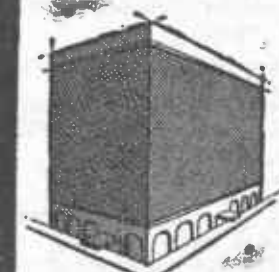

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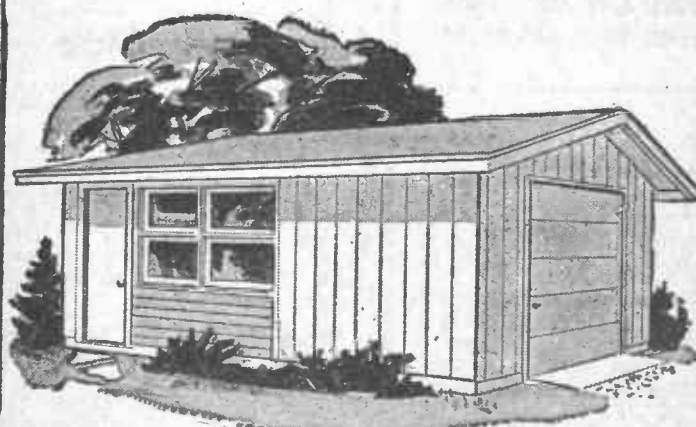

Following are the company's wood specifications which must be followed in preparing your wood so as to get the greatest return:

PINE

QUALITY: Sticks of pulpwood should be sound, green, and fairly straight. All knots and branches must be trimmed parallel to and flush with the stick. Sticks must have square cut ends.

STICK LENGTHS: 5' 3" to 5' 6"

STICK DIAMETER: Minimum - 4" inside the bark on small end of stick. Maximum - 20" inside the bark at the large end of stick. Any crooked or deformed stick which will not pass through a 20" cylinder is considered to be in excess of 20" and is unacceptable.

CULL WOOD: Sticks of wood in the following undesirable classes will be treated as cull wood:

1. Small wood
2. Sap rot
3. Heart rot
4. Hollow sticks
5. Charred wood
6. Stumps
7. Splintered
8. Forked
9. Metal (wire, nails, etc.)

HARDWOOD

SPECIES: When hardwood is ordered, species will be designated. It is contemplated that initially only white oaks and red oaks will be used. This does NOT include black jack oak.

SPECIFICATIONS: Same as for Pine, except that the minimum diameter will be 5" inside the bark on the small end of the stick.

MIXED WOODS

Trucks containing Pine and Hardwood mixed will not be accepted.

GENERAL

Payment will be based on standard cord of 128 cubic feet.

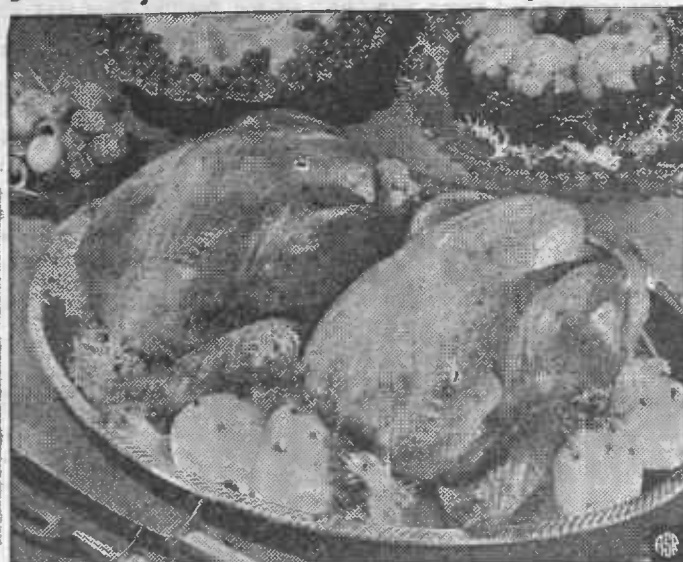
1961 Workshop

Chop cranberries coarsely and blend in the sugar. Blend butter or margarine and bread cubes. Combine the two mixtures with the remaining ingredients. Mix lightly until well blended. Makes enough stuffing for a 14-pound bird.

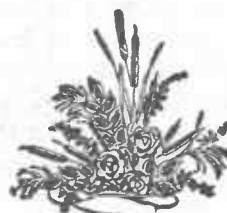

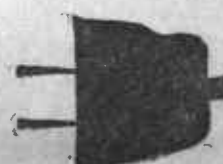
