Beloved Iukan Dies

Mrs. W. S. Brown
Suffered Stroke At
Home Sunday

Mrs. W. S. (Miss Blanche) Brown of Iuka, Tishomingo County, died Tuesday afternoon after suffering a stroke at her home. She went into a coma soon after the stroke and remained so for several days.

Mrs. Brown was a life-long resident of Iuka and was widely known and beloved for her kind spirit and charitable works. She was a member of the Iuka Baptist church where she taught a Sunday school class for many years. Her church had an important place in her life and she lived untroubled in its various activities. She was also a member of long standing in the local Iuka and IUDC chapters.

Since 1955 when her husband died, Mrs. Brown had carried on the operation of W. S. Brown & Co., a clothing store established here by the late Mr. Brown in 1904. The business has been in continuous operation since that time.

Mrs. Brown was one of several daughters of the late John A. Hubbard and Martha Millsaps Hubbard. She also had two brothers, one of whom survives. The Hubbards were among the first settlers in Tishomingo County, coming here in the 1830's from the Virginia. Much of the land upon which Iuka stands was once owned by the Hubbard family. The Minnells family land was donated to the town of Iuka by the Hubbards.

Mrs. Brown's home where she died at the time of her death was built in 1886. She moved into the residence as a bride and had lived continuously until her death. Mrs. Brown was the mother of five children, J. A. Brown and T. W. Brown, who are deceased; W. S. Brown, Jr., of New York City, and Emily Blanche Ray of Tusculum, who survive her. She is survived by four grandchildren, Mrs. E. L. McElroy of Tusculum, Mrs. Matilda Brown Hall of Atlanta, and Arthur Ray, Jr., a student at University of Mississippi. Her brother, George Hubbard, died in 1958. She is also survived by Mrs. Carrie Lambert of Iuka, Miss.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at the Iuka Baptist church with the pastor, Rev. R. J. Cooper officiating. Burial followed in Oak Grove cemetery with Perkins funeral directors in charge.

Interment was in Reuben Grisham, Harmon McGill, Cecil Sumner, Sam Traylor, Sam Kimberly, N. Allen, T. M. Jourdan and L. Brown, Jr.

Schools Will Be Closed Tomorrow

Area Teachers Invited To Attend 5-County Workshop At NEMJC

All white schools in the county, including the Iuka Separate School District, will be closed tomorrow, Dec. 2, giving the pupils an unexpected holiday. However, it will not be a holiday for the teaching staffs of the schools. All teachers from the schools affected are expected to attend the 5-county teachers' workshop at Northeast Junior College in Booneville, arranged especially for elementary and secondary school teachers.

This is the first of such undertaking by the Junior College and is expected to be of great benefit to teachers in the area. Thirty-two outstanding educators and educational consultants will be on hand to meet with the teachers and discuss problems of the profession. The groups will be divided according to grades and subjects and conferences touching on their particular areas in teaching will be held.

The teachers will also have an opportunity to examine the new textbooks selected by the Miss. Textbook Commission which will be used in the public schools throughout the state for a six-year period beginning July 1, 1961.

Transportation to the College at Booneville will be arranged by the principals of each school. Registration will begin at 8:30 a. m. A general assembly will be held from 9 to 10 a. m. Dean A. E. Knight of NEMJC will be in charge of the workshop schedules.

The five counties taking part in the teachers conference are Tishomingo, Alcorn, Prentiss, Tippah and Union.

All classes will resume their regular schedules Monday morning, Dec. 5, following the workshop conference.

\$36,641 Received By Shoe Employees

Tishomingo Shoe Co. employees in Iuka shoe manufacturing plant received \$36,641 this past week from their own Christmas savings program. There were 165 local employees participating in the plan this year.

The 165 people in the Iuka plant were a part of a total group of 5,511 GENESCO employees in the company's southern manufacturing plants, who voluntarily saved \$1,603,374 through this plan of payroll deductions. Every cent was the individual's own investment. The company acted as administrator for the employees.

General feeling among those who invest in this program each year seems to be that it is an easy way of saving money for use at Christmas time, or for depositing in a lump sum to their own savings accounts.

Civic Club Will Sponsor Industry In Town

A group of citizens composing the Golden Civic Club met Tuesday night at the Golden school building for the purpose of organizing an industrial corporation. The group has made application to the state for a charter and will offer common stock for sale as soon as the charter is issued.

The new corporation will be known as the Golden Furniture Manufacturing Co., Inc. They will make furniture frames and do upholstery.

A furniture manufacturer in Booneville with whom the Civic Club has been negotiating will move his plant machinery to Golden. The old school building which is no longer used will be converted to the use of the manufacturing plant. The school has been leased for industrial purposes by the Golden Civic Club.

A spokesman stated that the plant would employ about 30 men to begin with; about 60 men after six months of operation and plans are being made to expand the plant to employ around 100 men after the first year of operation.

Raymond U. Shook is president of the Golden Civic Club which has promoted efforts to bring the industry in. Julian R. Long is the secretary of the club. A board of directors for the new corporation will be named as soon as the charter is confirmed. Shares at \$100 each will then be offered. The money will be used to build an additional building for the plant and also for operating capital.

Cotton Marketing Quota Election Set For Dec. 13

All Producers Of Cotton In 1960 Are Eligible To Vote On Controls

E. N. Allen, office manager of the Tishomingo County ASC office, announces that a Marketing Quota Referendum will be held throughout the county on Tuesday, December 13.

Arrangements for polling places have been completed in all of the county's fifteen cotton growing communities.

All persons who, as landlord, tenant, or share cropper, engaged in the production of cotton in 1960 are eligible to vote in the referendum, Mr. Allen said.

"Unlike the past two years," he said, "there will be only one allotment price support available to growers for their 1961 upland cotton crop. Regular farm allotments will be determined for all farms growing cotton, and price support at one announced rate will be available to all growers who comply with their allotment," Mr. Allen said.

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"Great Expectations"

From time to time as we stroll down Iuka's sidewalks, taking care to avoid smearing tobacco juice patterns which decorate the town's principal foot-paths to the business places, we have pondered upon how the subject of spit on the sidewalks could be treated with delicacy and still comment on its unhygienic and unesthetic aspects.

But an indelicate subject is not one for delicate treatment. The problem of unsightly sidewalks is a concern of every citizen who has pride in his hometown. When the sidewalks become so messy you have to walk carefully to keep from hitting tobacco "slicks" then it's time to say something.

From the standpoint of sanitation and hygiene, spit on the sidewalks is a recognized menace to public health. Diseases may be spread throughout a whole town by such an unhealthy practice. Colds and other virus infections may be spread by uninhibited and unprohibited spitting on sidewalks.

From the standpoint of appearance there is no defense for the practice. We want to look with pride upon Iuka. We want to make the town inviting to visitors, to tourists, to prospective residents. We want industrialists to come see the excellent advantages this area has to offer plant establishments. And when they come we want them to get a favorable impression of Iuka. We want to show a civic pride that fits in with the great expectations we have for the future of this town.

Unsanitary and unsightly sidewalks will not give an impression of progress and civic pride.

We intend no hurt to anyone's feelings when we suggest the townspeople spit too freely in public. We are aware that a chew of tobacco cannot be held indefinitely. But that is a problem of the chewer. Perhaps the town would do well to help meet the problem by placing sand containers at strategic spots along the sidewalks.

Public awareness of the problem and public education on the subject could also be helped by a city ordinance prohibiting spitting on the sidewalks. Most up and coming towns and cities have such ordinances protecting the public health and improving civic appearance.

Why should Iuka be looked upon as a town of great "expectations" by reason of its spit-splattered sidewalks, and have our great expectations of growth and progress so adversely affected?

If we want to get in step and keep in step with the growth and progress of the times, clean and sanitary sidewalks is one vital area in town that needs immediate public attention.



Kosciusko's Biggest Industry Marks Tenth Anniversary
Superior Coach Corporation's Southern Division plant in Kosciusko marked its tenth anniversary with open house, tours, barbecue and speeches. The \$3,000,000 plant held open house for employees and their families in the morning, and the afternoon was set aside for a public open house and barbecue supper. Superior located its plant in Kosciusko in 1950 and produces bus bodies there for world-wide distribution.

Supreme Electronics Holds Open House

Supreme Electronics Corporation of Greenwood held a recent open house and tour of a new 25,000-square-foot addition erected through a BAWI bond issue passed in 1957. An estimated 100 employees will be added. Among the products produced at the Greenwood plant are meters and testing devices used in missile launches and the tracing of satellites, meter work for aircraft companies and various types of electronic tub testing devices.

Construction is now underway on the Durant Sportswear plant, and officials say that it should be completed around March 1, 1961. The plant is expected to employ

nearly 300.

Itawamba County May Become General Shoe Headquarters

In a meeting held recently with the Itawamba county board of supervisors, George Langstaff, president of Charm Step Shoes, Inc., a division of General Shoe Company, told of plans to make their Itawamba plant headquarters of their operations in this area. The key to the plan is the construction of a warehouse where the company's products would be stored and from which they would be shipped. Mr. Langstaff asked the supervisors' co-operation in constructing the warehouse using a BAWI bond issue. If the plan goes through, the plant would become the center of the company's Mid-South operations. The warehouse operation would employ from 25 to 30 men. The supervisors have the proposal under advisement.

McComb Industrial Park Studied

The industrial committee of the McComb Chamber of Commerce is investigating the possibilities of establishing a planned industrial park near McComb. James P. Bittling, city planning and industrial parks specialist with the Mississippi Agricultural & Industrial Board, met with the committee to advise on a proper course of action. The committee agreed that an industrial park in the area should serve not just McComb, but Magnolia, Fernwood and Summitt as well. Several sites were discussed, but Bittling pointed out that the state will not approve any sites until an engineering feasibility study is conducted.

Mathiston Asking For \$100,000 Bond Issue

Mathiston will hold an election December 12 on a proposal to issue \$100,000 in bonds for building and leasing a factory building. A substantial manufacturing concern has been reported interested in a Mathiston location.

New Plant Opens In Greenville

The Greenville Chamber of Com-

merce has announced that a new industry, the Greenville Truck Body Works, will be in operation soon. Initially it will employ six people, but officials expect to raise the employment to 25 by the first of January. The firm will manufacture and repair milk and bread truck bodies and insulated and refrigerated truck bodies.

Junior College System An Asset

Mississippi has shown foresight and initiative in building a sound junior college system over the years; and nationally today, the two-year junior college is being recognized as America's junior colleges now enroll over 900,000 students, or one in every four students attending college this year. The advantages and opportunities offered by junior colleges are significant.

Machinery's Share Of The Farm Budget

Modern farming is a heavily mechanized business, both in Mississippi and the nation as a whole. The cost of owning and operating farm machines is becoming more important. For example, the average life of a farm tractor made from 1910 to 1941 was about 12 years, whereas the average life of a modern tractor is from 17 to 20 years. The number of farm machines and equipment becomes larger as farmers strive to use their labor and resources more effectively.

Familiar Warning Should Be Heeded

Cotton growers are urged to watch for pink bollworms and to burn any infected cotton seed and cotton locks they find. There have been no pink bollworms intercepted this season, but in previous years they have been found. The cotton farmer would be the first to suffer losses if pink bollworms were to become established in Mississippi.

Improved Forest Resources

Although Mississippi's forests have been a prime resource since the time of the first settlers, our timber is now a mainstay of the general economy. The economic contributions from our forest industries will continue to increase as production from the forest lands increase with better production and management practices. In addition to profits from wood products, improved forestry offers assurance that there will be less soil erosion, more useable water, more wildlife and better recreation for the future.



County Agent's Notes

Sod Seeding

Now is an ideal time to use the sod seeder to plant oats, wheat, or ryegrass in grazed down pasture sods. It will make good late winter and early spring grazing.

Put out needed fertilizer at the time of the sod seeding. Clover areas that need grass are especially good places to use the sod seeder. If you use the sod seeder to get some grass mixed in the clover, chances of bloat next spring are lessened.

A crop of oats will give you some late grazing and at the same time help rebuild old worn out pastures. The fertilizer you put out with the oats will help the Dallis, Bermuda and lespedeza that will come in the spring.

Tree Planting
Right now is the best time to plant fruit and pecan trees. You stand a better chance of getting the kind and variety of trees you want from the nursery.

You have time to select the location where you will plant. The soil has time to settle around the roots before growth starts in the spring.

You stand less chance of losing the trees if you plant them now than if you wait until late winter or early spring to plant.

For lists of recommended varieties and nurseries, call on your local county agent.

Social Security
Do you have any questions on how and when you should report your farm income for Social Security purposes?

Farmers who have gross incomes of \$1800 or less may report their actual net or two-thirds of their gross. To receive social security credits, a farmer must report and pay social security tax on at least \$400. For more information, visit the nearest social security office.

Pine Trees
I have had several inquiries lately as to the condition of pine trees. The dead needles on pines at this season is a natural process and is not a disease in the trees. The old needles are shedding off the trees which accounts for the dead needles we are seeing at the present time.

Pines have grown extra well the past two seasons and exceptionally good this season which should encourage us to plant as many as possible this winter.

Timber Stand Improvement
Mr. E. N. Allen, local ASC office manager, states that the limit on payment to farmers for timber stand improvement work has been lifted until December 31. This is a good opportunity to get in some extra TSI work on our farms throughout the county.

Home Agent Notes

The Christmas toys on display are fascinating, aren't they? But don't be carried away by them, and forget to look for the safety features.

Does the electrical toy you've been looking at bear the Underwriters' Laboratories label? It should for safety's sake. Be sure the toys for the smallest one have a non-poisonous paint job, smooth edges and no small parts he can pull out and swallow.

Remember the age of your child you are selecting a toy for. One that is safe and suitable for a 10-year-old may be just the opposite for a 4-year-old.

December Plentifuls
Look for plenty of broilers and cranberries in your grocery stores during December. They are the headlines on the plentiful foods lists for the month.

Other plentifuls include onions, dates, vegetables fats and oils, peanuts and peanut products, dry beans, and sweetpotatoes.

Turkey Cocktail

¾ cup chili sauce
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1½ tablespoons prepared horseradish
5 to 6 drops tabasco
Lettuce
¾ cup diced celery
1½ cups diced cooked turkey
6 lemon wedges
Combine chili sauce, lemon juice, horseradish and tabasco. Chill well. Line individual cocktail cups with lettuce. Place celery on greens and

top with turkey. Pour cocktail sauce over turkey and serve with lemon wedges. Makes 6 servings.

Make Costumes Flameproof
You can treat the Christmas angel's flimsy costume and other gauze-like fabrics with a flame resistant solution. Use nine ounces of borax, four ounces of boric acid in one gallon of water.

Saturate the fabric well with the solution, wring out and hang to dry. You will lose the flame retardant qualities when you wash the fabric.

This treatment is effective on decorations and draperies, but will not do any good on the Christmas tree.

Food Notes

Have you tried cranberry sauce atop vanilla ice cream? Simply spoon the sauce over the ice cream and top with a mixture of cinnamon and brown sugar. To tempt the family even more, try heating the whole cranberry sauce and spooning it over the ice cream.

When using dates in bread, pancakes, waffles, cake, chop finely and sprinkle with part of the flour called for in the recipe. This helps keep them separated and spread evenly throughout the batter.

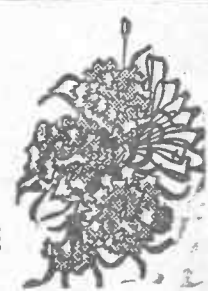

The hostess was assisted in serving refreshments by her little daughter, Elaine.



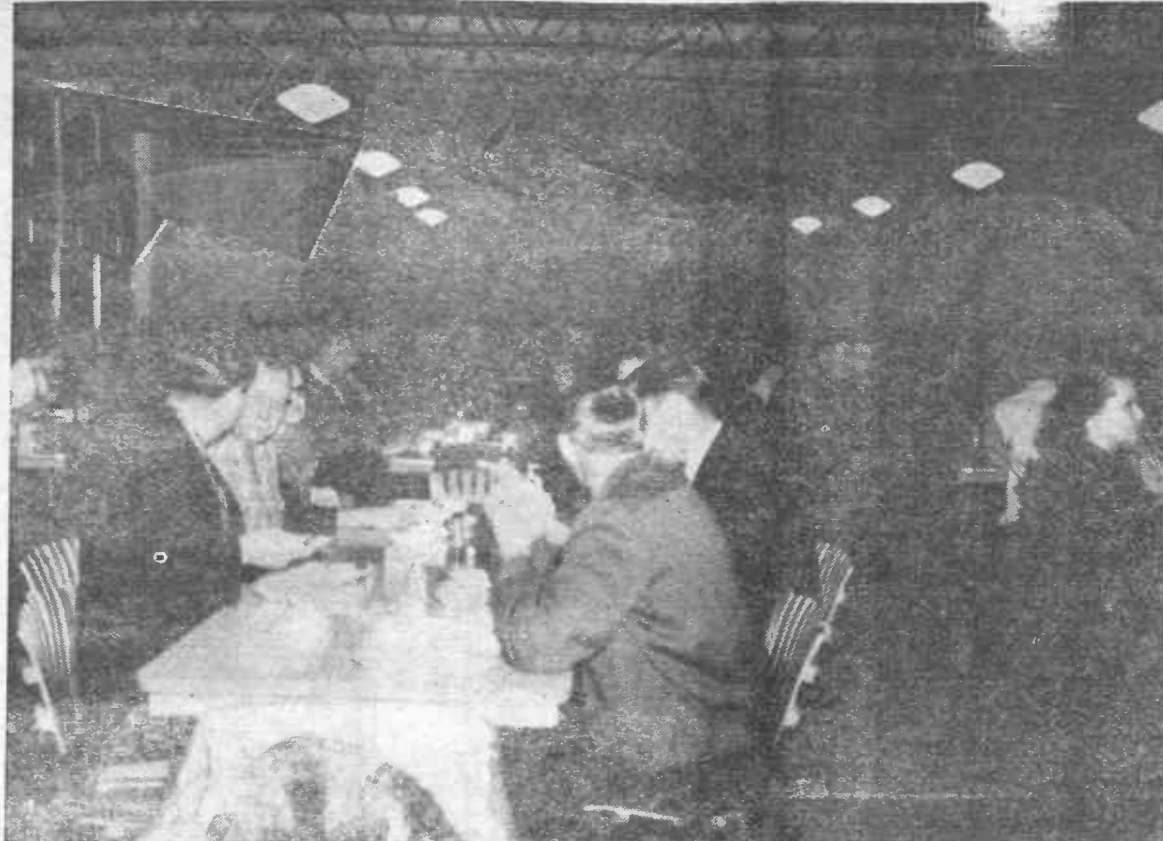

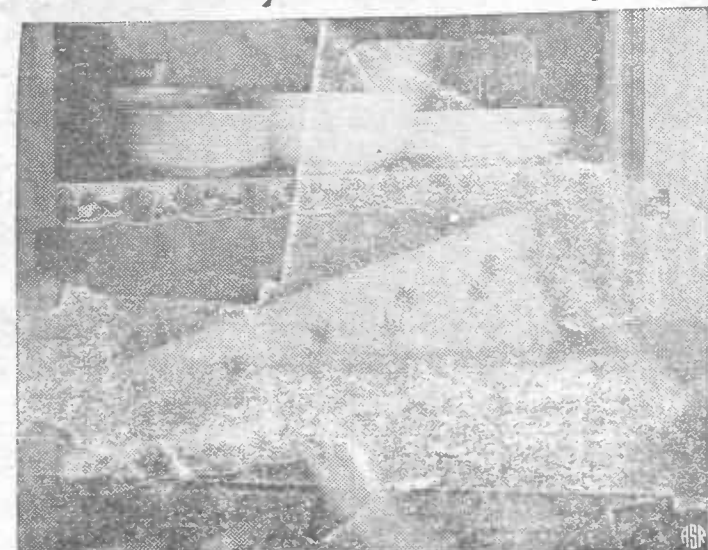

'Giant Eye' Symbolizing Research Hope Is Visited by Small Birth Defects Victim

The lights dim, and in the darkened high-ceilinged room a somber-faced little boy stares at the pilot light of a towering microscope.

This is the electron microscope at Ohio State University Hospital, Columbus, Ohio, a giant, inquiring eye nine feet tall, capable of magnifying the human cell 100,000 times.

The small boy with the rather sad little face is Kevin Sharp, 3 1/2 years, of Grove City, Ohio, who wanted to see a jumbo-sized version of the toy microscope given him on his last birthday by his doctor. Kevin has to see his doctor regularly because he is a victim of spina bifida, or open spine. He is paralyzed from the waist down and cannot play ball—or indeed play much at all.

Such mobility as he has is made possible by his crutches and leg braces.

Kevin's is one of the significant birth defects the cause of which is being pursued today by The National Foundation with New March of Dimes contributions. Congenital malformations afflict 250,000 infants annually in the United States and are responsible for the deaths of 34,000 babies each year who are stillborn or die within four weeks of birth. The health organization's expanded program also includes arthritis and continued work in polio.

In his excitement while reaching for the eyepiece of the vast instrument, Kevin probably didn't know that in the ultra-powerful lens of such electron microscopes, scientists hope some day to pinpoint the cause of the savage embryonic mishap that crippled him before he was born. By comparing normal and abnormal cells under tremendous magnification, researchers hope to discover, for example, why Kevin's spine never fused during his mother's pregnancy, or why some other little boy or girl is born with excess fluid on the brain—another baffling birth defect which The National Foundation is studying.

"At his birth, doctors gave Kevin only a few hours to

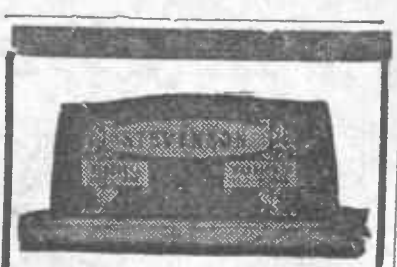
live," says Mrs. Gerald Sharp, his mother. "In addition to his open spine, he had two clubfeet which are now much improved due to surgery and physical therapy. He is a brave and happy little fellow even if he smiles so rarely. My husband and I thank God that today wider research is being done into birth defects."

The lights return and, supported by his crutches and braces, solemn little Kevin struggles back from the microscope. But at that moment, looking up at his mother, there's the suggestion of a smile around the corners of his mouth.

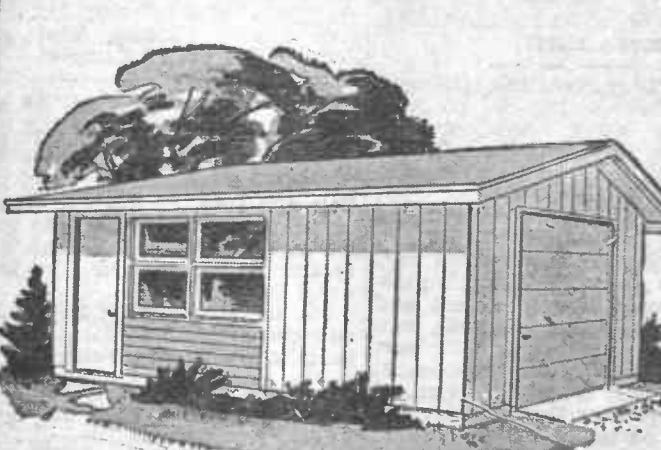

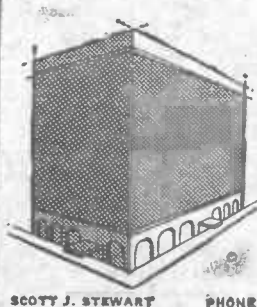
