Red Cross Bloodmobile Visit Due

Will Be In North End
Of County In January;
Donor Response Urged

Mrs. J. O. Clark, executive sec-
retary of the Tishomingo County
Red Cross Chapter, announces
plans for the Red Cross Bloodmo-
bile's next visit to this county are
now being made. The next visit,
which will be in the north end
of the county, is set for January
27, 1961.

All prospective donors are asked
to keep this date in mind and
to plan now to give a pint of
blood to the blood bank. Donors
will become Red Cross blood card
holders and they or any member of
their families, will become eligi-
ble to receive blood in any future
emergency when it may be needed.

Mrs. Clark gives the following
explanation and definition of blood
card holders and use of the card.

If you need blood and are a
card holder, Red Cross will supply
all blood required whether this
be one pint or 15 pints.

If you need blood and are not a
blood donor card holder, Red
Cross will supply one pint for
each pint of blood you use. You
will be asked to have friends sign
pledge cards to replace this blood
at the next visit of the Bloodmo-
bile to this county.

If you are a patient in a hospi-
tal that requires 2 or more pints
replacement for each pint used,
and you are not a Red Cross Blood
Card holder, it will be necessary
for you to secure donors to go to
the hospital and give the extra
blood required by you.

A card holder is someone who
has given or offered to give blood
through the Red Cross during the
current year. A Red Cross blood
donor is given a card which im-
mediately entitles the donor and his im-
mediate family (husband or wife,
minor children, parents, parents-
in-law) to receive blood without
obligation to replace or pay for
blood.

"No one knows when he may
have an emergency need for
blood," Mrs. Clark said, "and an
available supply may be the dif-
ference between life and death
for a patient. The blood donor pro-
gram is vitally important to every
community and we hope this com-
munity will respond wholeheart-
edly when the Bloodmobile visits
here next January," she concluded.

Orders above 1,000 will cost \$4.50
per thousand plus delivery charges.

Who Is Responsible For Teenagers

Joyriding To Destruction?

In a December law enforcement bulletin, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover gives some startling figures on the incidence of juvenile automobile thefts across the nation. His comments cover auto theft crimes of young people 14, 15, 16, 17, and 19 years of age whose car stealing sprees ended in tragedy and death for a number of people, including some of the teenagers themselves. Others were innocent victims of the wild-riding youngsters.

"These are the grisly reports of juvenile criminality—teenagers on the rampage in stolen automobiles from the four corners of our Nation," Mr. Hoover states. "The miracle of modern-day transportation has become a vehicle of tragedy for countless teenagers who have killed and mangled themselves and innocent motorists. This carnage of teenage recklessness in stolen cars shows no signs of abating," the FBI Director declares, and backs his statement up with statistics on the subject.

For instance, he reports that in 1959 an all-time high record of 288,300 cars with a value of \$239-million were stolen. Juveniles under the age of 18 were responsible for 64% of these crimes.

We of the general public who read about these things in the papers but have little personal contact with them are not as aware of the problem nor as cognizant of the grief and loss entailed, both in lives and property, as the law enforcement officers who have to deal with the cases directly.

But it is a very real problem and a sad blot on American communities that needs not "just understanding" but eradication.

"Law enforcement officers," the FBI Bulletin says, "have long known that theft of automobiles by young people is too often only the prelude to a violent crime spree by youthful hoodlums which results in death, severe injury, or extensive property loss."

These tragic consequences of automobile thefts by juveniles was taken note of in recent meeting of the International Association of Chiefs of Police in Washington, D. C. The Police Chiefs rejected the false label of "joyriding" as applied to these young criminals by overly lenient citizens, prosecuting authorities and judges. This is a crime not to be looked upon as a "boyish prank" the veteran officers insist, but must be treated realistically and dealt with vigorously if the crime rate is to be cut and lives and property saved.

The law enforcement officials advocate sure detection, swift apprehension and proper punishment as the time-proven deterrents to crime. In this the officials, doubtless, are correct. But we continue to have the old-fashioned opinion that the best deterrent to criminal actions of youngsters and prevention of crime is in teaching the young child, in the home, to respect the rights and property of others, to be honest and to feel concern for the well-being of his neighbor—whether next door, on the street or in the next county.

As parents and citizens, our concern must be for the future safety of our children and the community they live in. There would surely be less "joyriding to destruction" by teenagers in stolen automobiles if parents took seriously their obligation of properly training and instructing the child before he becomes a teenage terror. Law enforcement officers are charged with deterring criminal acts by confining the criminals.

There will be, of course, youthful criminals in spite of the best kind of raising, still, the fact remains that parents have the greatest and first opportunity to prevent crime and tragedy among the teenagers of the nation. As parents, ours is the first responsibility for the safety and good behavior of our teenagers and we should take our role as seriously and persistently as the law enforcement officers must take theirs.

Changes In Your Social Security

1. Have you ever had your application for social security benefits denied because you, or the breadwinner in your family, hadn't worked long enough under social security?

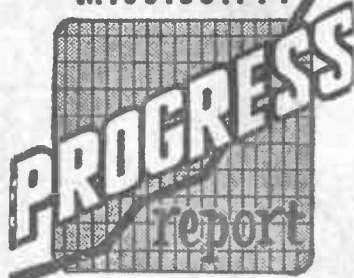
2. Have you delayed filing for disability insurance benefits because you are not yet 50 years old?

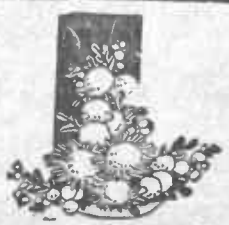

Formal Opening December 14

The formal opening of Indianola's newest industry, Modern Line Co., has been scheduled for Wednesday, Dec. 14. The public has been invited to dedication ceremonies at the plant, and Governor Ross Barnett is scheduled to speak. Modern Line Products Co., Inc. is a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Modern Tool & Die Co., Cleveland, Ohio, one of the nation's leading wheelbarrows, and similar items. The Indianola building contains 160,000 square feet of floor area and is adjacent to a 25-acre parking area and future expansion site.

Groundbreaking Held For Cleveland Plant

Groundbreaking ceremonies were held late in November for Cleveland's new Delta Architectural Products Company. The company's 52,000-square-foot building is scheduled for completion in about 120 working days. Production is expected in April or May. Delta Architectural Products will manufacture aluminum fabrication and other metal products, such as doors and screen frames, under the brand name of "Deltart." Initially the company will hire some 50 people and when in full production hope to increase employment to 150.

New Building For Picayune Company

Construction is underway on a new building at the Picayune plant of St. Regis Rathborne, Hair and Ridgeway wirebound container division. The building, which should be completed in about a month and a half, will be steel frame construction with a concrete floor. The present building housing these machines will be used for warehousing finished goods. The Picayune plant is currently working about 360 men and women in two shifts.

New Hatchery Being Built In Brandon

Ground has been broken in Brandon by DeWitt Hatcheries, Inc., for a modern plant to produce 85,000 "Babcock Bessie" baby chicks per week. Scheduled for completion December 31, the plant expects to be in full production by February.

Aberdeen Plans Utilization Of Surplus Property

Two recent developments affecting the abandoned Gulf Ordnance plant near Aberdeen brighten economic prospects for the area: (1) The U. S. Public Health Service will establish a \$5.5 million medical stores depot at the installation and (2) Area leaders conferred with A & I Board personnel on converting a portion of the 3,000-acre installation into an industrial park. The medical depot is expected to be a permanent installation and will employ between 10 and 20 men. If Aberdeen and the Fourth Supervisors District can be acquired a portion of the installation, plans can proceed towards establishment

of a standard industrial park under provisions of recently-enacted legislation offering state support to such parks.

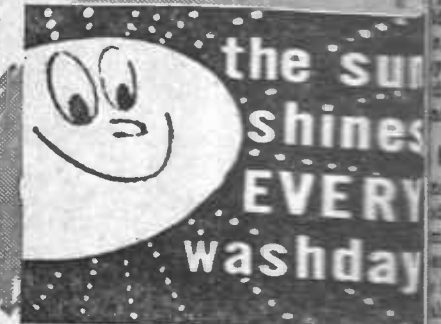

The Great Promise
for December 11, 1960

Nothing that happens is a surprise to God. Human beings are sometimes surprised when they need not be. The birth of Jesus was surely no surprise to God, for it was he that planned it. It need not have astonished anyone, for it had been promised. The trouble was, nobody had believed for just a kind of an answer to their long prayers—long in sense that for centuries the Jewish people had been praying for a Deliverer that is what the Bible). Dr. Foreman

Moreover, this Deliverer had been promised, for many of the prophets had pointed forward to coming of One to whom they gave various names—Son of David, Anointed, God's Servant, and so on. One of the names was not a name, it simply expressed the great hope in a promise: He that is coming (all one in Greek or Hebrew).

the problem at this point may be the mind to thinking about Jesus really means to Christ now and eventually to the end. The problem, to make it clear, is this: Why was it that the very people who had wished the Great Promise, the promise of "One who is to come," the promise in whose sacred books alone the promise was preserved, the people whose prophets had pointed the future to that great Coming—why was it that these very people of the Promise failed to the fulfillment of that Promise when it came to pass?

the reason was that they expected everything to happen all at once. For example: In Isaiah 9, of the famous prophecies of the Coming One, any reader who reads the hope and expectation of justice, righteousness and peace. The coming Savior will set the kingdom of peace and of justice when Jesus came he was in a stable because of an injustice on the part of the government and he died as a criminal, because of probably the unjust death sentence in the eyes of the world. Looking at the world today, peace and justice seem far off. What has happened to the Great Promise?

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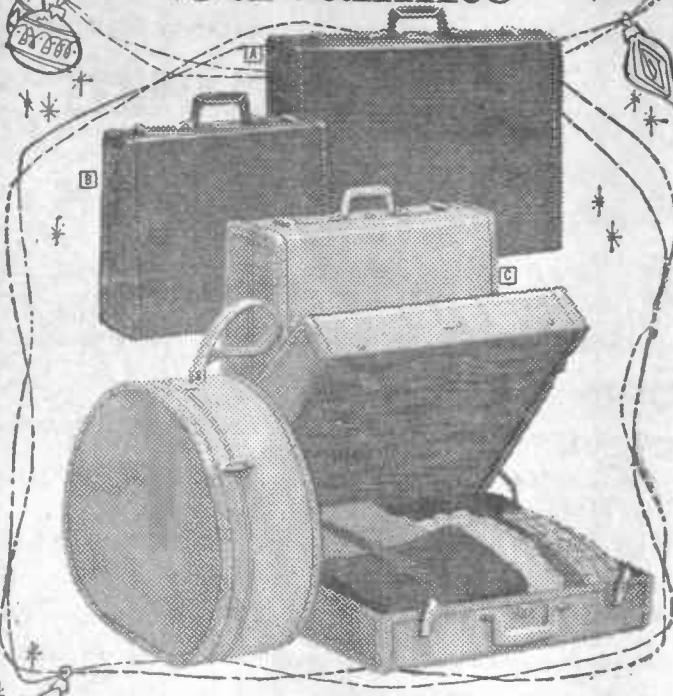

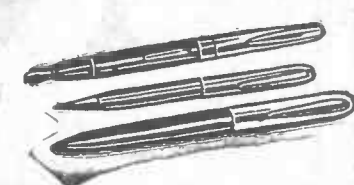

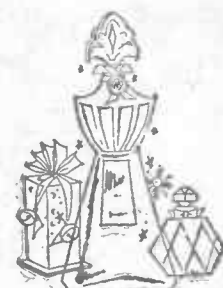

Painting Lawns
Want a green lawn that you won't have to mow during the winter? You can paint it and it will look

almost like growing summer grass. Grasses to paint include Bermuda, Zoysia, and St. Augustine.

The best time to paint the lawn is in December, or after frost or freezes have caused the grass to become dormant.

You can use an ordinary three gallon sprayer to do the job. A wide range of colors are available for lawn painting. They range from very light green to very dark green.

Be sure to read the label on the container of the coloring material you use. Then follow all directions.

One gallon of the coloring material in water will cover from 3,000 to 4,000 square feet of lawn. Properly applied the paint will last three or four months under normal weather conditions.

The material will not stain after it dries. But while putting it out, be careful. It will stain just like paint.

Cattle Lice

You know what lice will do to your cattle. Your fattening animals will slow down in weight gain. Your milking cows will drop off in milk production.

This loss, when infestation is heavy, can be as much as 25 per cent in milk production and up to half pound daily beef gain.

When dusting or spraying for control of lice, be careful. Know what materials you are using. Know the restrictions on their use.

Check with your local county

agent for the latest information on using insecticides for control of lice and other insects.

Soil Testing

How much fertilizer are you going to use under your next year's crops? Are you going to use the same amount on all of your land? The same amount for the different crops?

If you do, you are guessing! And guesswork costs money when it comes to use of fertilizer. You stand a good chance of using too little fertilizer and some chance of using too much. Both are wasteful.

A soils test will take the guesswork out of fertilizer program.

Your county agent has a supply of soil sample boxes and instructions for taking good soils samples.

Last Line

There isn't much of a chance of your dreams coming true unless you stay wide awake.

Market Your Corn Through Hogs

Year in and year out it pays to sell corn through hogs, says W. L. Richmond, swine specialist of the Agricultural Extension Service. A favorable corn-hog ratio makes it profitable now.

"Many farmers are now selling corn for \$1.10 a bushel or less," he said. At present prices they can

sell the corn through hogs for around \$1.72 a bushel."

Farmers who have the corn on hand or who can buy it at the right price and do not have pigs are advised to shop around for feeder pigs.

"A good source of feeder pigs is the Booneville Area Feeder Pig Sale held every three months. The next sale is January 19," the specialist said.

He also pointed out that good sources of feeder pigs exist in other sections of the state.

"To help you locate good feed-

er pigs - ones that are healthy, thrifty and vaccinated against cholera and erysipelas - contact your local county agent," Mr. Richmond advised.

Some figures based on dry lot conditions cited by Mr. Richmond are:

"Suppose you have 1,000 bushels of corn. You could sell it as grain for \$1.10. This corn will feed 100 60-pound pigs to a market weight of 200 pounds each at a total feed cost, including protein supplement of \$1,380. The feeder pigs figured at 20 cents a pound would cost

the pigs and feed \$2,500.

"By selling your corn at \$1.20, making the total \$1,200, making the total \$3,200, leaving a labor saving of \$620."

Farmers who have good corn for hogs or use corn for feeding should consider the fact that Mr. Richmond said that feeding will save 10 to 25 per cent on the protein supplement required.

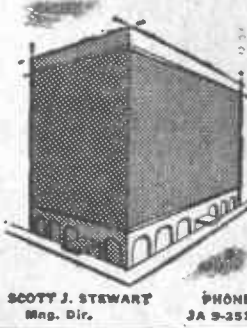

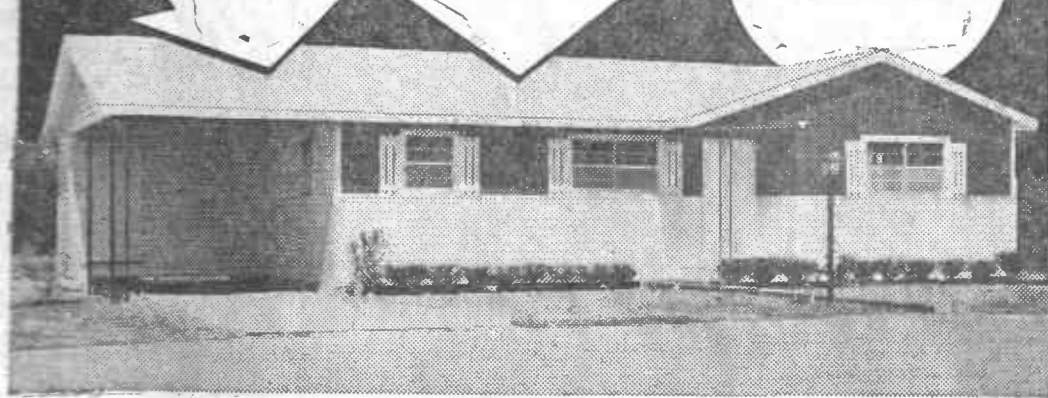

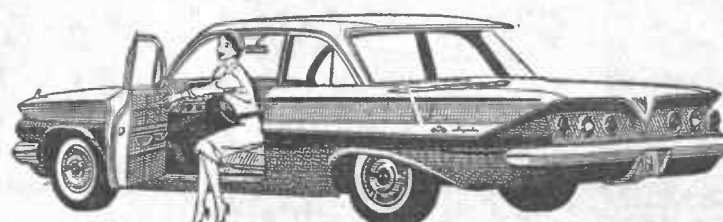

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A Good Practice
To Thin Your Pines

When pines come up naturally they usually appear in clumps of thick stands. You have all heard of pine-sapling thickets. In these thickets the pines grow so close together it is very difficult to walk through them.

In such thick pine stands most

of the young pines die. Even though this occurs the surviving trees are too thick for best growth. Unless such stands of pine are thinned the trees will become stagnated and will stop growing.

It is very good forestry practice to thin out these thick stands of pines. Usually, most of the trees cut can be sold for pulpwood.

Landowners planning to do some woodland thinning should seek the advice and service of a forester.

If the service of a forester cannot be obtained contact Mr. Jones

or Mr. Tice at your local Soil Conservation Service office in Iuka, or see your County Agent. These men will assist you if they can.

If you have some special problem, a forester from the District Soil Conservation office in Tupelo or from the Extension Service at Mississippi State University can be called in to help you.

Trees are becoming more and more valuable and it's wise to get technical help in properly managing your woodland.

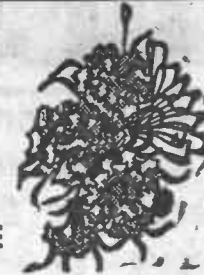
A normal stand of forest, protected from fire, is a crop to prevent soil erosion and to conserve water.
