Paul Weekley, district forester for the Hiwassee Land Company, an active civic worker, has been named chairman of the 1961 Red Cross Fund Drive. Mr. O. Clark, local Red Cross secretary announced to

Weekley is a native of Baldwin County, Ala. He received his education in the Baldwin county school and the University of Georgia. He is also a graduate of Eastern Star Chapter in New York, where he was awarded a master's degree in forestry. Mr. Weekley and his family came to Iuka in 1956, where they are connected with the Hiwassee Land Company operations in Iuka.

Furniture Factory For Golden

Charter Issued For New Area Business; Stock Now On Sale

Golden Manufacturing Co., Inc., has been issued a charter of incorporation by the State of Mississippi and stock certificates for the new business are now being sold.

Sponsors of the new area factory are members of the Golden Civic Club which has leased the vacated Golden School building and made it available for establishment of the new firm. Plans and negotiations for obtaining the factory for the community have been underway for several weeks.

Gus Bullard and Jack Carpenter, connected with furniture plants in Booneville, Fulton and Cedar Hill, met with the Golden Civic Club a few days ago, to discuss setting up the Golden Furniture Manufacturing Company for operation.

The group was told that the Chicago market has a January 6 deadline for samples, and if the firm goes into operation very soon, samples can be ready for the Chicago dealers before the deadline.

Raymond U. Shook, president of the civic club, stated today that the furniture factory is a \$35,000 corporation with common stock selling at \$100 per share. "Approximately half of the stock issue has been sold," he said. "This company will be owned by all the stockholders, a group of people pooling their resources to obtain a manufacturing business for the community to provide jobs for the citizens."

All stock must be sold before the plant can go into operation. A meeting is being called for Monday night, December 19, at 6:30 to acquaint prospective stockholders with the advantages of having the firm in the community. Also further plans for getting the business into operation. The meeting is open to the public and a cordial invitation to attend is extended by the Golden Civic Club.

M. C. Price Of Iuka Slashed By Angered Trailways Bus Patron

M. C. Price of Iuka, driver for Trailways, Inc., is recovering from serious wounds inflicted by a disgruntled would-be passenger, Friday in Hackleburg, Alabama.

His assailant is reported to have been refused passage on one of the buses several days earlier when he tried to ride without a ticket. Mr. Price was on the bus but was not the driver at the time the man was refused passage. The man recognized him Friday in the bus station at Hackleburg and attacked Mr. Price without warning. Price was slashed in the abdomen. He was rushed to a hospital in Hamilton in critical condition.

Mr. Price was driving the bus when he was attacked Friday. He was due in Iuka about 2:40 p. m. The attack occurred about 1 p. m. A spokesman for the family said today that Mr. Price was improving and would be brought to Iuka, either to his home or to Tishomingo County Hospital, in a few days.

Mr. Price is the father of Sue and Pat Price, Sue is a student at Northeast Junior College and Pat is a pupil in the Iuka School. The Prices live on N. Main Street.

Iuka Hounds Place In U. S. Open Field Trials

Two foxhounds entered by Mayor J. H. Allen of Iuka were among those in the finals at the U. S. Open Foxhounds Field Trials held in Durant, Miss., last week. Pay Poll Tax With Other Taxes, Citizens Told

T. O. Lindsey, chairman of the Tishomingo County Election Commission, reminds taxpayers that poll taxes should be paid at the time property and other taxes are paid.

Mr. Lindsey urges all taxpayers to give their correct precinct when paying the poll tax. Voters who are not listed in the correct precinct are unable to vote even though they have paid their poll tax. The voter's name must be on the voting list for the precinct in which he lives and votes in order for him to be eligible to vote. He cannot vote in a precinct where he is not listed, nor in a precinct where he does not live. Therefore, it is very important that the taxpayer give the correct precinct when he pays his poll tax, Mr. Lindsey said.

1960 taxes will be due and payable the first of January, 1961. Paying the poll tax at this time will assure citizens who are otherwise qualified of their eligibility to vote in coming elections. The poll tax must be paid before a citizen can vote.

Farmers Vote To Retain Cotton Marketing Quotas

County Follows Other Areas In Upholding Parity On Staple Crop

Results of the Cotton Marketing Quota Referendum held in Tishomingo County last Tuesday, Dec. 13, show that 97 per cent of the farmers voting favor retaining marketing quotas on the 1961 cotton crop. E. N. Allen, office manager for the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office, reports.

The referendum was held in 15 of the county's communities. Actual vote was 333 for marketing

quotas and 9 against. Mr. Allen expressed the opinion that more farmers would have turned out for the referendum if the weather had been more favorable. "Cold weather kept many away from the polls," he said.

All persons who as landlords, tenants, or sharecroppers, engaged in the production of cotton in 1960, were eligible to vote in the referendum.

The Tishomingo county vote followed closely the pattern of voting in other sections of the South where the referendum was held. In all cases, the farmers voted overwhelmingly in favor of the cotton marketing quotas which means approval of holding parity prices at the 70 to 90 per cent levels prevailing in the 1960 crop year.

Senator John Stennis has urged that the new Secretary of Agriculture in the Kennedy Administration set the minimum price support at 75 per cent of parity on the 1961 cotton crop.

This same level was offered farmers in 1960, but a 1958 law permits the Secretary of Agriculture to set the minimum price support at 70 per cent for 1961 but gives the Secretary discretionary powers to raise it.

In raising the 75 per cent level, Sen. Stennis cites improvement in demand and supply as fully justifying such a level.

Area Feeder Pig Sale To Be Held

Will Be Held In Booneville, Jan. 19

The third quarterly Area Feeder Pig Sale will be held at Booneville on January 19. The other two sales have been very successful for both the seller and the buyer. The July Sale had approximately 450 pigs consigned to sale and the October had approximately 800 pigs consigned.

This Area Feeder Pig Sale is sponsored by the Extension Service in 8 Northeast Mississippi Counties. Some of the rules set up by the board of Directors are as follows:

1. All pigs must be consigned to the sale 30 days prior to sale date.
 2. All pigs must be raised on the farm.
 3. Pigs must be vaccinated for Cholera 15 days prior to sale date.
 4. All pigs consigned to the sale will be sold.
 5. Pigs may weigh 30 to 90 lbs.
 6. Pigs will be sold by pens according to weight and grade.
- If you have pigs you would like to consign to the January 19th Sale, contact the County Agent's office or one of the directors: Meeks Bailey or Sid Bugg by December 20. Plenty of buyers will be on hand and the January Sale should be a good sale.

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For A Safer Christmas

The happy spirit of Christmas has already begun to quicken our steps and brighten our eyes as preparations are made for the coming holiday. We all look forward to Christmas with happy anticipation of seeing friends and members of the family who get together only at this time of the year.

These days, Christmas time is travel time for many. And while thoughts of death and tragedy and loss should be far from our minds at Christmas, the hazards of holiday travel call for words of caution we all should heed. The highways will take a tragic toll in lives this year if good sense and caution are left behind when holiday travel begins.

December is traditionally a month of increased traffic fatalities and injuries. Several reasons exist for this: bad weather conditions in many parts of the country, more than usual numbers of parties celebrating the season with more than usual alcoholic beverages being served, and a general feeling of light-heartedness which goes with the season, pervading over all. These things also contribute to traffic accidents when caution is ignored.

The Mississippi Safety Council reports that traffic deaths in the state have already exceeded the total number killed in 1959. If the December record this year even approaches the one set in 1959 the 600 mark in traffic deaths will be reached before the month is out. The toll in 1959 was 549 traffic fatalities. Already, up to the latest figures for this month, the 1960 fatalities have reached 574.

These are sobering statistics for us to consider as we make preparations for Christmas travel and visiting. The Safety Council points out that carelessness, (and several factors enter into this state of the driver) failure to yield the right-of-way and lack of respect for the rights of others, are among the many causes of fatal accidents.

Caution, courtesy and careful observance of all driving laws will make this a safer Christmas for all who are on the roads during the holidays. Safety is one gift we can all give this Christmas. Let our fellowmen enjoy a happy and safe holiday as we also enjoy it.

Title To Gulfport Transferred To State

For the first time in state history, Mississippi has a state-owned port. Title to the Port of Gulfport has been turned over to the Gov. Ross Barnett by Gulfport city officials and members of the Gulfport Port Commission. The Agricultural and Industrial Board will operate the port, acting through a five-man Gulfport State Port Authority. Under the State Ports Act of 1958, the port is eligible for up to \$10,000,000 in full faith and credit state bonds for improvement and expansion. The A&I Board already has approved issuance of \$3,000,000 in bonds for construction of a banana terminal, renovation of the east pier, and retirement of \$588,000 in existing bonds.

McCay Tool & Engineering Co. To Open New Plant In Baldwin

Announcement has been made by the Baldwin Development Company that the McCay Tool and Engineering Company will open a plant in the building formerly occupied by the Baldwin Colored School. The building has been purchased by the Baldwin Development Co., and work has already been started for a complete modernization of the building. Stanley McCay, formerly of Baldwin and head of the McCay Tool and Engineering Co., has announced plans to employ skilled male employees in the manufacture of tools and dies for other manufacturing interests in the area. Target date for opening the new plant has been set for January 1.

Hickory Mill Sited For Port Gibson

A mill to cut hickory blocks for ax handle manufacture is expected to be in operation in Port Gibson by the middle of December, according to Louis Ellis, president of the Port Gibson Chamber of Commerce. The mill will be owned and operated by A. Action, who has

another mill at Lorman. Moeller Manufacturing Moves Into New Greenville Plant

Moeller Manufacturing Company moved into its new 20,000-square-foot plant in the Greenville Industrial Park earlier this month. At about the time of the move, the company began to receive both new machinery for the plant and the first truck load of inventory. A training program for some 25-30 employees is expected to begin immediately. The new plant will manufacture many lines of stoppers for home, commercial and industrial use.

Mississippi Clay Buys Yazoo County Land

Mississippi Clay Products, Inc., Yazoo City, recently exercised an option and purchased 51 acres of land south of the city for \$25,450. Fred Mellen, president of the company, said the site contains "some of the most ideal brickmaking clays in the state."

Hinds-Gulf Channel Is Studied

A plan which could give Jackson access to the Gulf of Mexico via the Pearl river was discussed recently at a meeting of the Rivers and Harbors Association of Mississippi. The association's chief aim at the present is persuading the Public Works Commission to authorize a feasibility study of the project. The plan discussed by the group anticipates a lock and dam system

It seems evident that many Mississippians are anxious to get ahead and make better workers, judging from the hundreds now enrolled in evening study programs in the state. The exact number is not readily available, but it is doubtless at an all-time high and destined to keep increasing.

Mississippi Holds Record Of Bushel-Per-Acre Corn Yield

An experimental acre in the hills of North Mississippi in Prentiss County produces more corn than any other acre in the world with 295 bushels of corn taken from this acre this year. In 1955, a 4-H Club member at Baldwin produced 304.37 bushels of corn on one acre to establish a world record that still stands. An interesting sidelight on Mississippi corn production is that according to an old Choctaw Indian legend, the world's first corn was grown in this state near Nanh Waiya in what is now Winston County.

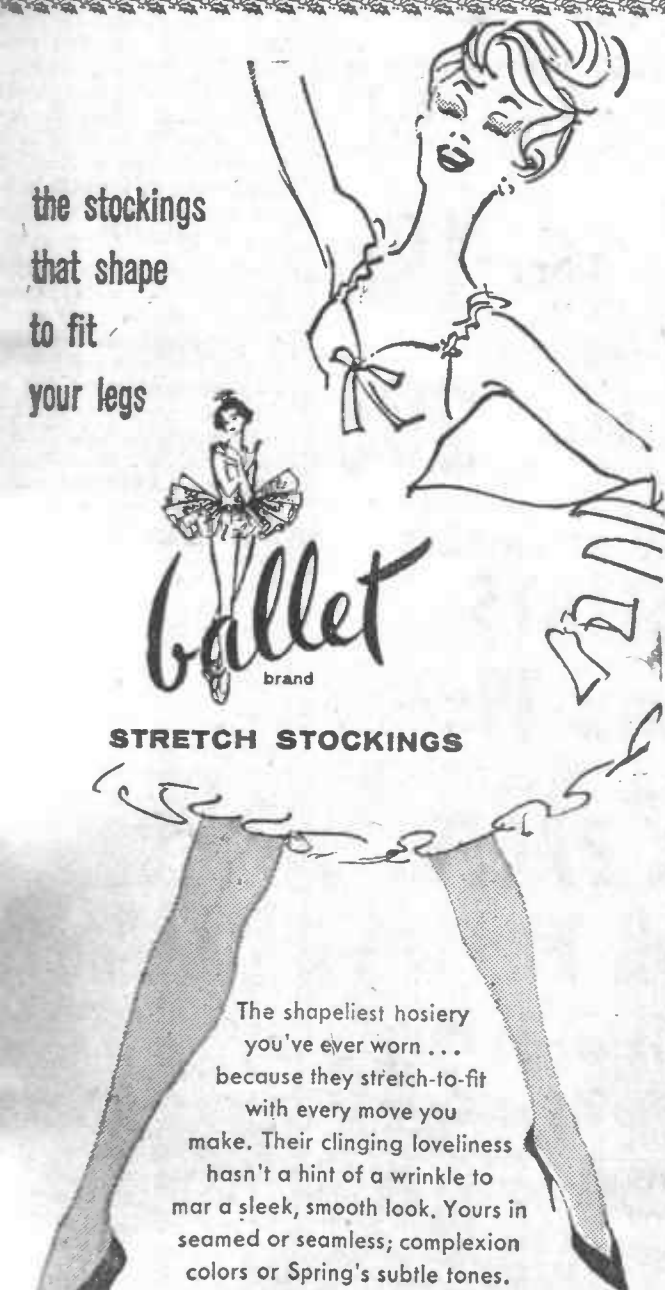
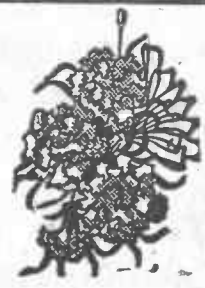

Stennis Urges 75% Parity Price Support On Cotton

Senator John Stennis today called for federal support of at least 75 percent of parity on the 1961 cotton crop.

This is the same level offered farmers in 1960, Stennis said, but a 1958 law permits the Secretary

of Agriculture to set the minimum price support at 70 percent for 1961, with discretionary powers to raise it.

Stennis urged the new secretary to use his discretion in holding to the 75 percent level.

"Improvement in supply and demand fully justifies a level of 75 percent," Stennis said.

He said improved domestic consumption and increased exports are expected to reduce the surplus carry-over to 6½ million bales from a 14-million-bale surplus several years ago.

"This carry-over," Stennis explained, "has been a major factor responsible for price reduction."

Stennis explained further that the recent increase of two million acres in cotton acreage allotments for 1961 "was justified by improved domestic and foreign consumption of American cotton."

"In all fairness to our farmers," Stennis said, "the new secretary of Agriculture should keep faith and prevent any further reduction in price support."

The secretary is required to announce the 1961 price support before planting time, if practicable.

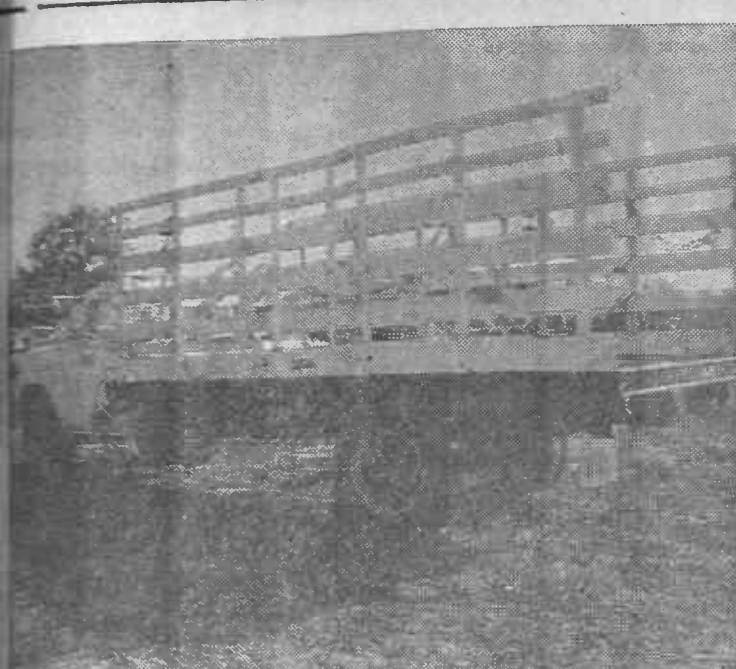

Forestry Bank Will Aid In Making Mississippi's Idle Acres Productive

Practically every county has some of the State's idle acres. These are not the acres of farm land, any have not been used for row crops for many, many years. Converting these washes, gullies and brush thickets hillsides, to tree growing crops is one of the primary goals of Mississippi's new Forestry Bank, according to Russell Hobgood, executive director.

This acreage contains scrub oak and gum, which requires thinning, deadening, poisoning, as called for through good forestry management and practices. Also, a considerable amount of this applicant's land is over-run with sage grass and berry vines. Hobgood pointed out that this land is a typical part of the 6,000,000 idle acres which are found throughout Mississippi.

"When we talk about Missis-

sippi's idle acres, this is the type of land we refer to, and many of these acres are not adaptable for producing crops which will benefit the land owner. But we do know, and it is evident, that these acres will grow trees, and we also know there is not an acre of ground in this state which cannot be made to produce trees and a timber income for the land owner," said Hobgood. He also stated that the Forestry Bank, as of this date, is processing applications in five of the six forestry districts in the state, and expressed optimism that the Bank's new development program will register a definite impact upon the State's timber economy as a result of operations in the first year.

"I should emphasize also that the land owner is beginning to realize that the idle and unproductive land is carrying a tax statement the same as his other lands," Hobgood said, "and with a good management program through the services of the Forestry Bank, each of his acres will increase its value, add to the income of the land owner and the economy of the State."

Mr. Berry, and other members of the Forestry Bank Board, have indicated a growing interest among the land owners to enter the program on a "do it yourself" basis. Under the Forestry Bank program, the land owner can do this work himself, including timber stand improvement, planting, and the other work as outlined under the timber management plan, provided that such work is supervised by the personnel of the Forestry Commission. It was pointed out that in these instances, the land owner would be paid directly for this work on approval of the Forestry Commission.

Mr. Hobgood spoke highly of the work of the county agents, co-ordinating councils, ACP committees, and area foresters through-out the State, and expressed his appreciation for their definite interest and cooperation in the Forestry Bank's program. And since planting season for pie seedlings is now underway, land owners are urged to request application blanks through these sources, or the Forestry Bank office, located Room 209, Southern Farm Life Insurance Building, Jackson, Mississippi.

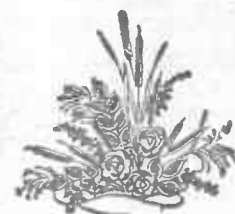

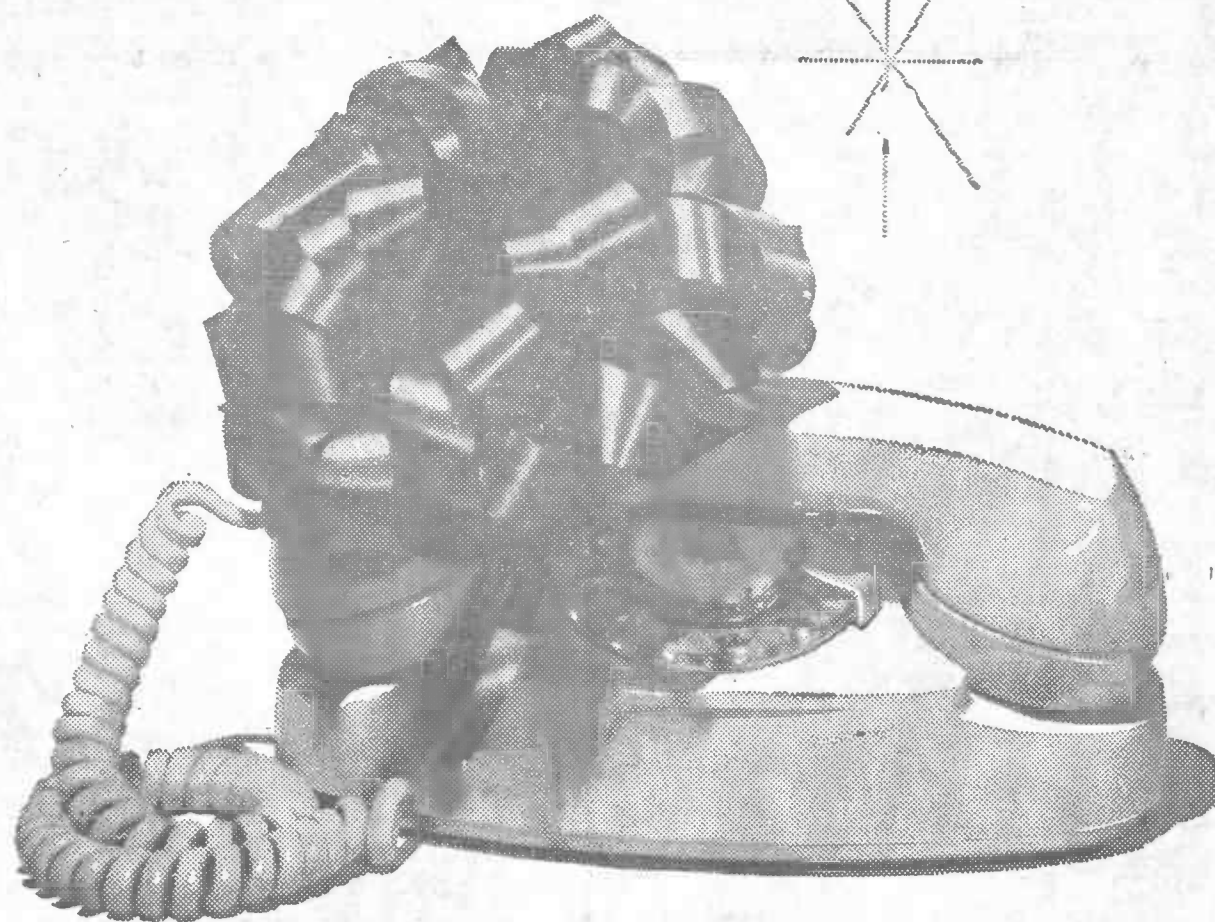
