Accident Mars Holiday for Three Area Men

Iuka Man Among Victims Injured In Auto Collision Near Cherokee

William (Billy) A. Kinard, 34, of Mr. and Mrs. Luther Kinard, and a fellow servant, "Doc" Gullett of Booneville, were injured in an automobile collision just west of Cherokee on highway 72, late Tuesday night.

Woods of Cherokee, occupant of one of the cars, was critically injured. He was taken to Tishomingo hospital but died soon afterward.

Accident occurred about 4:45 p.m. Kinard and Gullett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Gullett of Booneville, were enroute home for Christmas holidays from Fort Ky, where they are both employed, when the accident happened. Gullett is reported to have been driving. The car belonged to Gullett. The other car involved

presumably was driven by Woods although another occupant is reported to have been in the Woods car.

According to reports from members of the servicemen's families, the Woods car suddenly swerved in front of Gullett's car as the two approached each other. The Woods car was completely demolished when hit broadside by the Gullett vehicle. There apparently were no witnesses to the accident other than those involved.

A passing motorist found the wrecked cars and took the injured to a clinic in Cherokee where they received emergency treatment. Later, Kinard was brought to Tishomingo County hospital and Gullett was taken to a Booneville hospital in a Cutshall ambulance.

Kinard received severe cuts and bruises but no broken bones. He is reported in satisfactory condition.

Gullett suffered a collapsed lung, broken ribs and jaw and a deep gash on the back of the head. Full extent of his internal injuries was not immediately known.

Unconfirmed reports say that another occupant of the Woods car was taken to a hospital in the Tri-Cities but the name of the person or the extent of injuries, if any, were not learned.

Current Retail Trade Conditions In Mississippi

According to a recent issue of "Mississippi Business" published by the Bureau of Commerce and University of Mississippi, some lines of business in Mississippi are up while others are down.

Sales and use tax collections for retail activity through August 1960 were up two per cent from last year. Life insurance sales have seen-sawed from negative to positive for the most of this year but are up 3 per cent for the year to date.

Bank deposits were nearly a record amount in August and are up nearly 5 per cent for the year.

Manufacturing employment showed the first decline in many months in August when compared with the same month a year ago.

Department store sales and timber severance tax have both been weak for the most of this year. Oil severance tax continues a reversal of last year's sustained pattern.

Cash farm income through July of this year is about the same as for the same period last year, the magazine reports.

I am on VA's pension roll under the new system effective July 1, 1960, and I understand I will receive an income statement. I will ask you to explain it for me, please.
A—Net worth for VA pension purposes is the market value of all the property you own except your home and the belongings necessary for your day-to-day living, such as your automobile, clothing, household furniture, jewelry, and the like, anything necessary for your day-to-day living.
Q—Does the VA have any sort

of a Christmas gift certificate arrangement whereby I could give a patient friend the certificate and let him choose a gift himself, up to the value of the certificate?

A—Yes, only the certificate are coupons, sold in books. The Coupon Books are sold for as little as fifty cents, as much as five dollars, for each Book. The patient spends the coupons at his hospital canteen, picking out whatever pleases him. Just write a letter to the Manager of the VA hospital your friend is in. Tell him what you want.

Q—Are there any restrictions on GI insurance that would make the policy invalid if the veteran is engaged in a hazardous occupation?
A—There is no such restriction on GI insurance. The veteran may engage in any occupation, no matter how hazardous, without altering the terms of his policy or the amount of his premium.

Q—I understand that by a new law a World War II veteran now has until July 25, 1962, in which to file an application for a GI loan. Just what steps toward getting a loan have to be taken by that date?
A—By that date, a lender must at least have agreed to make the loan and must have requested VA's approval. The new law places no limitation on the time needed to complete the deal, once your lender has agreed and asked for VA's approval.

Farmer's Outlook For '61 Discussed

Farmers' prices and incomes for 1961 should remain about the same as during the past two years. That is the word from Dr. Rupert Johnston, economist of the Agricultural Extension Service. He represented Mississippi at the recent national agricultural outlook conference in Washington, D. C.

"Prospects for larger marketings, and not much change in the prices received or in prices paid, indicate little change in the realized net income of farm operators in 1961," he explains. This would continue the general stability of the past five years.

Farmer's cash income continues to pay about the same for industrial goods and for food. But, depending higher may be interest charges

per acre, taxes on farm real estate and farm wage rates.

For things they sell, farmers can expect little change in prices. Here's the way it looks:

1. Cattle prices probably will be somewhat lower.
2. Hog prices are expected to stay above a year earlier until the last half of 1961, then fall below.
3. Into the spring, prices for eggs and dairy products are likely to stay above a year earlier.
4. Broiler and turkey prices will probably hold fairly strong until spring.
5. For cotton and other crops under government controls, the present law puts minimum price supports for 1961 near the 1960 levels.

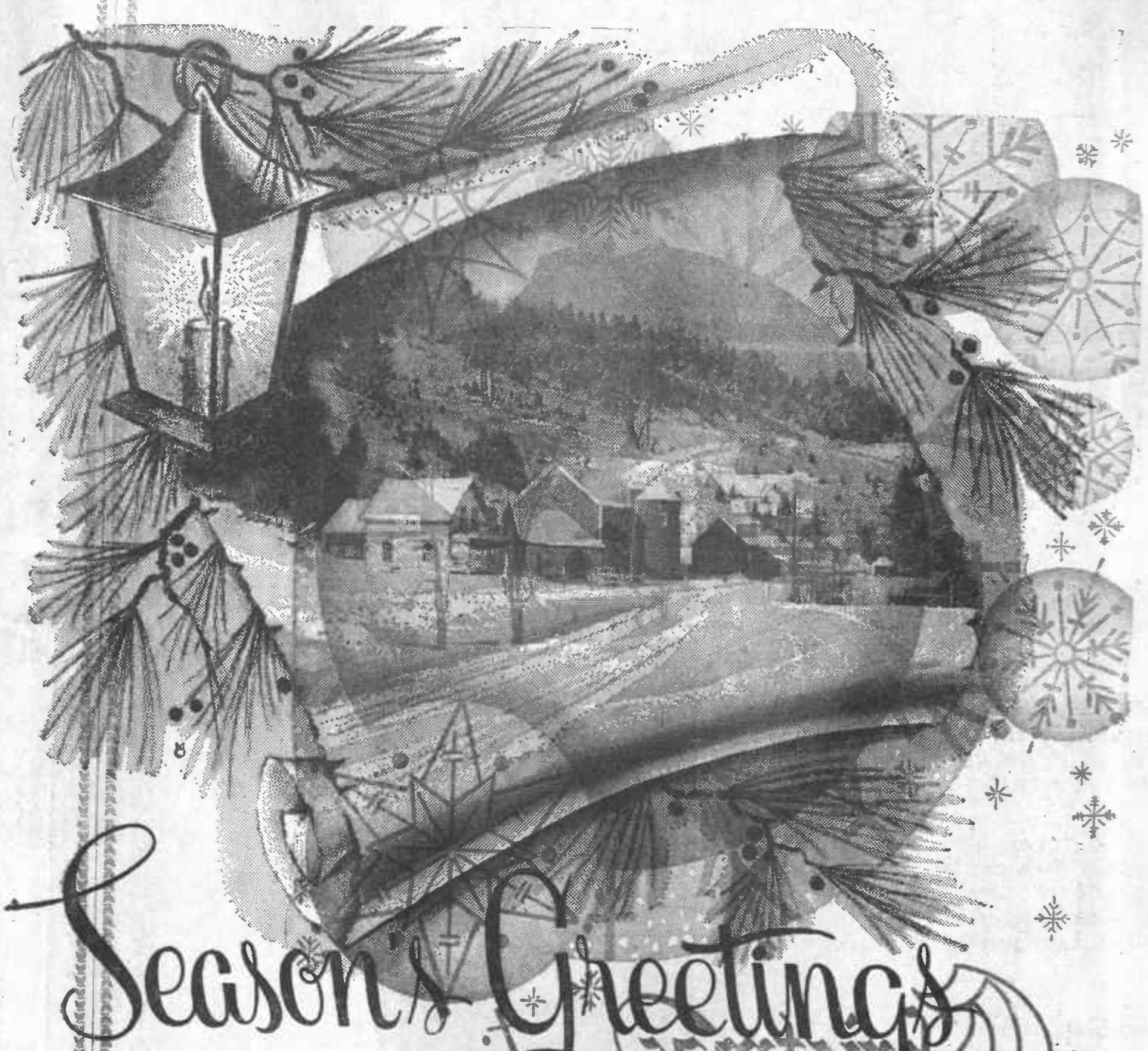

sissippi this week
of all the town of Mathi-

ston, on the Webster-Chocoma
county line (population 584)
voted 143 in favor of a \$100.00
bond issue for the W. W. Sly
Company plant where industrial

close to being a 100 per cent
turnout for the town's 157
registered voters. The plant
will employ 40.
And in Madison county, four
small towns are going into a
joint city planning program with
the county as the fifth "partner."
Each town will receive individual
studies which will be especially
tailored to their own specific
needs. But the entire program
will be co-ordinated. For exam-
ple, all the major street systems
in the towns will feed right into
the county road system. This is
just one example. Similar cor-
related plans will take effect in
zoning of property, in sub-
division regulation and in public

works programs. **Mississippi Municipalities
Going Strong For Planning**
Fourteen municipalities and one
county have applied this week for
\$47,825 in federal money for city
planning programs. This would re-
present the federal government's
half of a 50-50 arrangement for
\$4,650 worth of city planning vis-
ualized by the applicants. All ap-
plications have been approved by
the Agricultural and Industrial
Board, and federal approval is now
awaited.
The largest application was filed
by Natchez, for \$12,500. Next in
size is a \$8,350 application filed
jointly by Madison county and the
municipalities of Canton, Madison,
Ridgeland and Flora, who will co-
ordinate their planning with each
other. Other applications include
Yazoo City (\$7,500), Clarksdale
(\$4,275), Pascagoula (\$3,745), Ox-

ford (2,838), Bay St. Louis (\$2,000),
Gloster (\$1,712), Water Valley
(\$400) and Baldwin (\$350). The
Madison county application breaks
down into \$6,141 for the county
government, plus \$2,693 for Can-
ton, \$418 for Flora and \$349 each
for Madison and Ridgeland.
Yazoo City, Clarksdale and Ox-
ford are applying for funds for
completion of programs now under-
way; and Natchez is applying for
funds for a revision of a 1954 plan-
ning program.
**Pike County Acts

Pike County's board of super-
visors, declaring "We can't work too
hard to get industry," has elected to
come under the provisions of
House Bill 112, Laws of 1960, which
exempts manufactured goods still
in the hands of the manufacturer
or in warehouses from ad valorem

This is one of the bills in the "In-
dustrial Bill of Rights" package.

Contract Battery Manufacturing

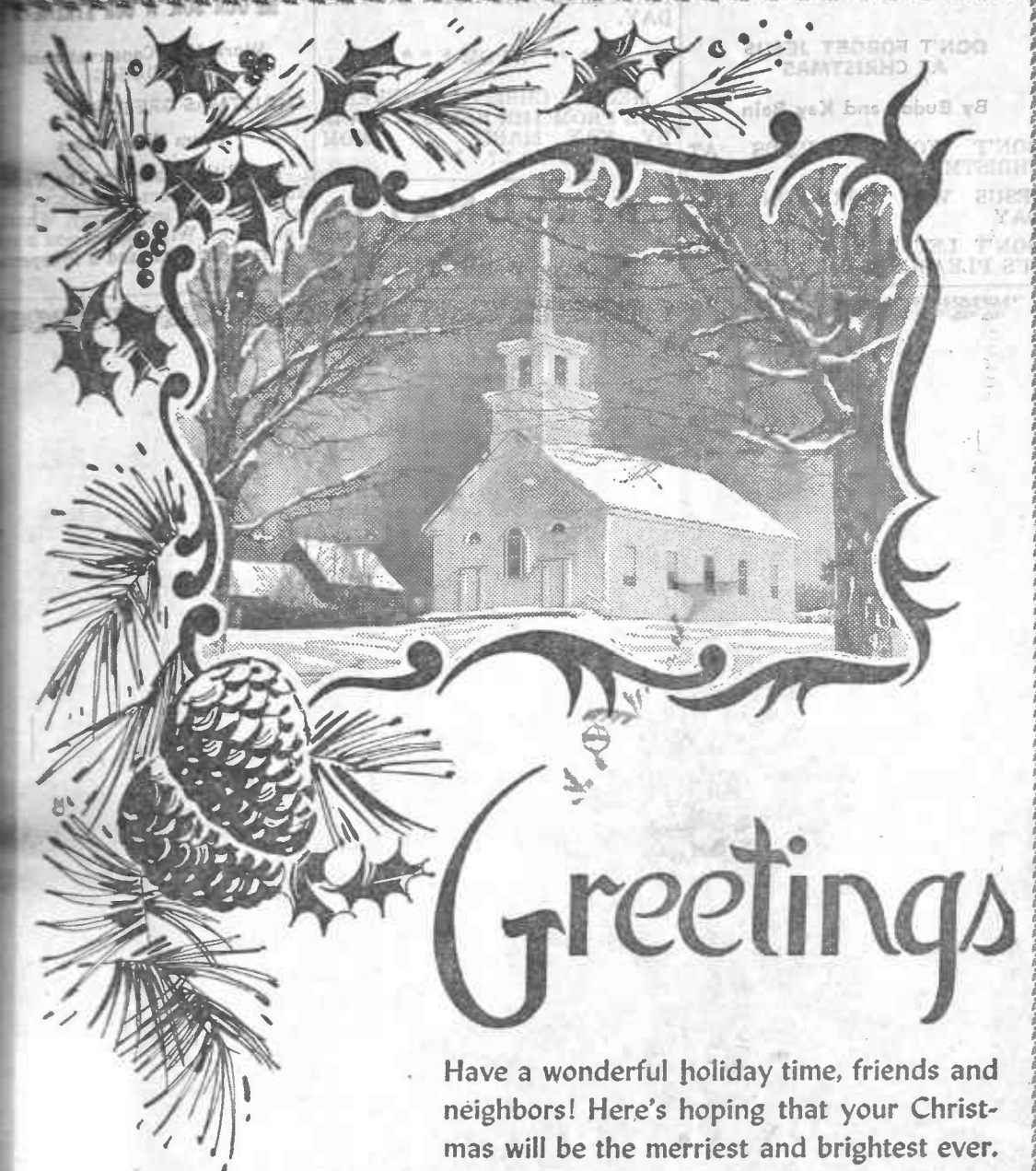

God's Gift

Lesson for December 25, 1960

ON THE last Sunday of the Old Year, it is fitting that our thoughts should go back along memory's lane through the shadows and sunshine of these past 12 months. But since the last Sunday is also Christmas, our minds go far, far back on the road of time, to a story we all heard as children. It is a story that ordinary prose can scarcely tell. The story of the first Christmas is told in poetry. The light of beauty shone on the child at Bethlehem. Not only in the gospel of Luke, but all through the New Testament, whenever a writer speaks of Christ's coming to earth, joy and wonder break all bounds. A baby was born on that first Christmas, a baby who was a statistic in the Emperors census. Some people live and die, no more than numbers in a census-book. But with Jesus it was altogether different.

"A Great Joy Which Will Come"

Looking only at Luke, we select three expressions out of the first words about Jesus after he was born. The reader can do no better, if a little open time comes on this Christmas afternoon or evening—no better than to sit down with this second chapter of Luke and mull over the other things that were said about the baby and the child Jesus. The three thoughts where we center attention all come from the angel who spoke to the shepherds.

The first thing he said was "Be not afraid." It would have been a good thing if all the creeds, and all the thinking about Jesus that learned and unlearned men have done for the 20 centuries now nearly gone, had started at this point. A scholarly theologian had just finished preaching a sermon about Jesus, one morning, and after the service an older Christian in the congregation, a former missionary, remarked: "If that is what Jesus was like, the mystery is how he managed to have any friends." The theologian had preached a book-Christ, there was no joy about him, a Christ who was correct but not contagious. Another professor writes about Jesus and calls him "God's attack on man." If that had been the case, the angel should have said with a scowl, "Crawl in the dust, you worms! God has invaded you, he is about to attack, you have no room to hide." Not at all. This was good news of a great joy which will come to all the people. Christianity which is not a great joy, which does not begin with joy, is no more than a sad imitation.

"A Savior Who is Christ the Lord"

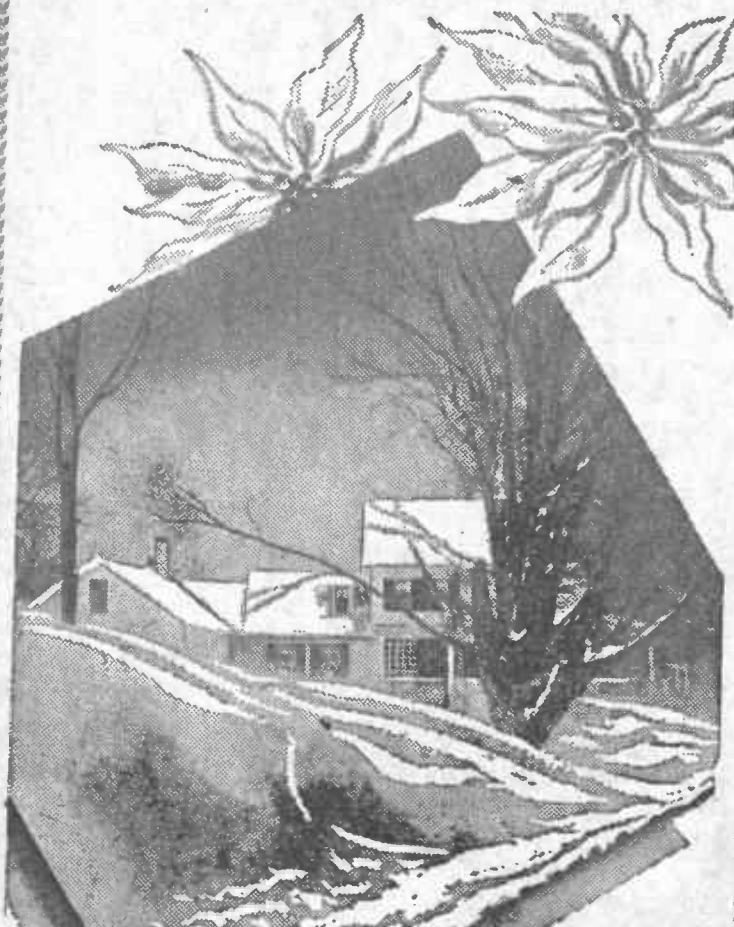
Christ is given many names in the New Testament. Three of the most important are here in the angel's words to the shepherds: Savior, Christ, Lord. What Christ had, and has, to do with the forgiveness of sins, was left in God's providence for other men to learn. God did not send his angel to instruct the Shepherds in a Theory of the Atonement, they were not told a word about a Virgin Birth. They were shepherds, not theologians. They would not have understood such matters. But they could understand "Savior." It was an Old Testament word, sometimes it meant God and sometimes it meant a man. "Deliverer" expresses the meaning the Old Testament puts into the word. A Savior was always one who did for others what they most desperately needed and did for them what they could never do for themselves.

The shepherds understood the other words too, Christ and Lord. Christ the Messiah, God's chosen King, we have seen how this promise was clung to through long centuries. If this baby was the Christ, it meant that the long waiting and hoping was over, God's Kingdom was now at hand. And Lord—the word was not new. It was on imperial documents, it was on the imperial statutes, men had died cruelly, and would die again, because they would not call the Caesar "Lord." But here was a Lord, THE Lord of mankind, even of Caesar.

County Agent's Notes

Although all farmers "Plant to Prosper," I think this contest has helped many farm families to stop and take a look at their farm operations and set their sights on higher goals, and then reach those goals.

We in the County Extension Office, as well as all other Agricultural workers in the county, would like to encourage as many families as possible to enter the Plant to Prosper contest in 1961.

Quality Dairy Roughage
The quality of your stored roughage is just as important as the quantity. Cows are likely to eat only half as much poor quality roughage as they will good quality. You will have to make up the difference with high priced grain. There is no percentage in grinding poor quality hay and mixing it with molasses to make the cows

eat it. It does them no good and just costs money. You will be much better off by putting that extra cost into some extra grain. If you have good quality hay, feed it free choice. It will usually supply all the energy required for maintenance and leave some over for milk production. Poor quality hay will not even meet maintenance requirements.

Winter Management of Chickens
Chickens must have water and plenty of it. Do not let it freeze! You can bury your water lines, allow the water to drip enough to prevent freezing and wrap risers with heating cable. In you laying houses, put heating cables in the water troughs and in emergencies, use heat lamps.

Forestry Notes

Several landowners in Tishomingo county received seedlings in the shipment delivered by the Mississippi Forestry Commission on December 21. There were 234,000 seedlings distributed to 74 land owners. Before a land owner plants his seedlings, he should go by the local ASC office and apply for ACP cost-sharing assistance. You may contact Mr. Allen, ASC office manager for more information on ACP payments.

There are several things to keep in mind when planting your seedlings. The roots of the seedlings must be kept dry at all times or it will be wasted effort and expense to plant the seedlings. The seedlings should be planted as deep as they grew in the nursery or deeper in sandy soils. When a

mechanical tree planter is used, the planting should be done on a contour or the seedlings may be washed out of the soil.

Care must be taken to see that the tap root of the seedling is planted straight into the ground so that U-rooting will not occur. Grazing should be eliminated for the first 3 or 4 years in pine stands and after that prevented or controlled. In hardwood stands, grazing should be eliminated completely.

Preparations should be made in advance so planting can begin as soon as seedlings arrive. If the seedlings cannot be planted within a day or two after delivery date, they should be stored in the bundle away from the wind and sun. Allow air space between bundles and add water every day or two until they can be planted. If the seedlings freeze, allow them to thaw out without the use of heat or warm water before handling or planting.

The Mississippi Forestry Commission is still accepting orders for loblolly, slash, and shortleaf pine tree seedlings but you should

place your order immediately to make sure that you will get your seedlings. place your order with your Area Forester or at the county agents office.
