Highway Crash Takes Lives Of Two Iuka Men

Jerry Cox And James McNeil Killed Instantly When Auto Hits Bank

Two men died in the wreck of their automobile when the car rolled over and crashed into a drainage ditch along Highway 20, Wednesday night, Dec. 23. The victims were Jerry Cox, 30, and James Walbert McNeil, 35.

The automobile was traveling south on Highway 20, about a mile from Iuka, when the crash occurred. The car left the highway and rolled over on its side, landing in a drainage ditch. The car was completely destroyed, and the two men were killed instantly.

The accident occurred on a dark, rainy night. The car was traveling at a high rate of speed when it lost control. The driver, Jerry Cox, was not wearing his seat belt at the time of the crash.

The car was a 1958 Chevrolet. It was traveling south on Highway 20, about a mile from Iuka, when the crash occurred. The car was completely destroyed, and the two men were killed instantly.

Reports of two or three other kills have come into the newspaper office this week but details on them were not available.

Three Former Belmonters Asphyxiated

Bodies Found In Car In Illinois Roadside Ditch Christmas Day

Three members of a former Belmont family, bound from their home in Illinois for a Christmas visit to Mississippi, were found dead in their car in a roadside ditch, Christmas day, near Galesburg, Ill. They had apparently died from exhaust fumes from the car which was stuck in the snow and high grass which filled the ditch.

The three were Archie McDuffy Mink, 51, his wife, Gertrude, 49, and their 15-year-old daughter, Linda Ann.

The stalled car with the motor still running, was found by two motorists. The three victims were all in the front seat. The car was loaded with Christmas gifts for the folks back home in Mississippi. Illinois authorities stated that it is believed Mink tried to turn his car around when he thought he had taken the wrong road, and slid into the ditch. The three probably just decided to stay in the car until help could be obtained from passing motorists. The snow and grass clogged the exhaust pipe and fumes leaked into the car. The windows were rolled down slightly but not enough to permit the deadly fumes to escape.

The bodies were shipped to Belmont for burial. Mr. Mink had been working at Lake Bluff, Illinois and the family was living with another daughter, Mrs. Geneva Huff at Lake Bluff.

Sam Traylor, Heart Fund Chairman

Will Serve Again This Year In County Drive For State Fund Share

Sam Traylor of Iuka who last year was Tishomingo County's Heart Fund chairman, will again head this county's one-month drive to raise funds for Mississippi's year-round fight against heart disease.

Mr. Traylor, named Heart Fund chairman this week, will mobilize the community's resources in a concentrated 28-day campaign which opens February 1. The drive will be climaxed on Heart Sunday, Feb. 28th. A special canvass will be conducted on that day to put the drive over the top.

The appointment of Mr. Traylor to head this important drive was made by Dr. Manning Hudson of Jackson, Mississippi Heart Association president.

In accepting the Heart Fund chairmanship, Sam Traylor points out that heart disease isn't selective in its victims. It hits young and old alike and causes more than half of all deaths in the state.

"Only more and better research such as Heart Fund dollars pay for right at our own University Medical Center, can put a stop to this tragic death toll," Mr. Traylor stated.

"In Tishomingo County, heart and blood vessel diseases took 42 lives last year. That is why we feel sure that people in this county will more than meet their fair share of the state's 1961 Heart Fund goal of \$185,000," the chairman concluded.

Mr. Traylor is a member of the Town of Iuka Board of Aldermen, Adjutant of American Legion Post No. 15 and is active in other civic endeavors.

Dimes March Will Begin Next Week

Cecil Brown of Iuka Will Lead Volunteer Workers In County

The 23rd annual March of Dimes campaign will begin next week in the state and throughout the nation. Dr. A. L. Gray, State Health officer, asks all citizens to be generous in their support of the program.

The health officer, serving his third year as state chairman for the traditional January fund appeal, today announced the completion of the campaign organization for each county in the state.

Leading a large group of volunteer workers in Tishomingo county will be Cecil Brown of Iuka serving as campaign director. The drive will continue through the month of January.

The New March of Dimes seeks to raise funds it needs to continue the attack against three major crippling, arthritis, birth defects and polio.

"These stubborn cripples affect one in every four U. S. families," the health officer said. "One out of every 16 babies is born with a significant birth defect, and over 11,000,000 persons are afflicted with crippling arthritis or a similar rheumatic disease," he stated.

"The National Foundation has proved its worthiness and its capacity to effectively combat these crippling. March of Dimes funds are used in a board program of research, professional education and patient aid," Dr. Gray said.

Miss Bernice Bostick, chairman of the Tishomingo county chapter of The National Foundation, today called on all citizens of the county to give full support to the New March of Dimes drive.

Circuit Court Will Open January Term Next Monday

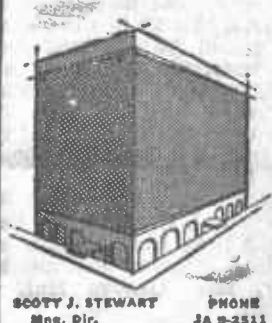
