## Red Cross Bloodmobile Visit Due This Month

Unit Will Be In Iuka January 27  
At Youth And Community Center

The 1961 visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile to the north end of county will be January 27. The unit will be at the Youth and Community Center with the same group of blood donors as last year. The unit will be set up at the visit last year. J. O. Clark, executive secretary of the Tishomingo County Cross Chapter has asked that those who received blood donor cards last year be reminded that their cards will expire this month. People should make plans to come to the Bloodmobile on the 27th and donate or offer a card in order to receive new cards. Mrs. Clark also stated that those who assisted in the volunteer blood program last year will be asked to assist in this year's program. "These volunteer workers were of great value to the success of the Bloodmobile last year and we need their assistance again this year," said.

The blood quota for this visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile has been set at 150 pints. Last year a quota of 150 pints was exceeded by about thirty-three and one percent. The response this year is expected to be as wholehearted. Recruitment of blood donors is underway and workers are to have enough volunteers for the 27th to meet the quota.

Those who become blood card holders are eligible to receive free for themselves or members of their families if the need arises.

If you are not a blood card holder and need blood, the Red Cross will supply one pint of blood to blood bank for each pint you donate. However, the user will be asked to have friends and relatives donate blood donor pledge cards to this blood at the next visit of the Bloodmobile.

Some hospitals require two pints of blood replaced in the blood bank for each pint used. If you are a patient in such a hospital and are not a Red Cross blood card holder, it will be necessary for you to secure donors to go to the hospital and give the extra blood you require.

Being a blood donor card holder is a great protection to you and your family," Mrs. Clark emphasized.

## Deer Hunters Have Good Season Here

Several Large Deer  
Taken In County,

The last three-day deer hunting season, which ended Dec. 28th, rewarded area hunters with some fine kills. C. E. Marlar and E. C. Holland, state game wardens for this county, report.

Several 200-pounders were taken, and one 225 pounder. The smallest deer reported weighed 150 pounds. All but one of the kills was made in the Piney Flats and State Line Boat Dock area. The one exception was a 200-pound 11 point buck killed in the Belmont area.

One illegal kill, a 200-pound buck, was turned over to the County Home for residents of that institution.

The successful hunters and their kills were Billy Johnson, 6-point 200 pound buck, James Morris, 8-point 150 pounds, R. R. Streetman, 4-point 175 pounds, Bert Bugg, 6-point 155 pounds, P. M. Rogers, 8-point 150 pounds, Roy Dexter, 8-point 175 pounds, James Morris, Jr., 9-point 175 pounds, E. R. Hamm, 6-point 200 pounds. All of these hunters are from Iuka.

Three Corinth hunters and their kills were Otis Swain, 6-point 200 pounds, Dewey Barnes, 10-point 200 pounds, and W. E. Bullard, 8-point 225 pounds.

John Poole of Belmont got a 200 pound 11-point buck in the south end of the county.

In other hunting news, the squirrel season has closed but the bird and rabbit seasons have been extended to February 10.

## Road Construction In Mississippi Will Be Cut During Next Fiscal Year

Primary and secondary road construction in Mississippi will be cut by more than \$1,000,000 during the next fiscal year, according to federal aid apportionments announced today by the Department of Commerce. The state's allotment for interstate construction will increase during the period, while there will also be a slight increase in urban funds.

According to T. C. Robbins, director of the State Highway Department, the federal apportionment for primary and secondary funds reflects the state's slight drop in population in the 1960 census. The increase in urban funds was due to the shift in population from rural to urban areas, he said. Primary, secondary and urban funds are divided among the states on the basis of area, population and post-road mileage. The interstate apportionment is based upon an estimate of needs to complete the system.

Mississippi apportionments for fiscal year 1962, with 1961 fiscal apportionments in parenthesis are as follows:

Primary, \$6,471,046 (\$6,934,681); Secondary, \$5,427,160 (\$5,860,796); Urban, \$1,358,493 (\$1,274,928); Interstate, \$23,778,563 (\$19,566,360); Total \$37,035,262 (\$33,636,765).

Primary, secondary and urban funds received from federal aid are matched by the states on a 50-50 basis for new construction. Federal aid secondary funds allotted to Mississippi are divided evenly between the State Highway Department and the State Aid Division.

More Than \$54,000  
Adds To County Growth

The largest single construction in Tishomingo County last year was the National Guard Armory building on Highway 72 in Iuka.

Sgt. Waco Parsons, administrative technician in charge of the Armory, reports 1960 salaries paid to the entire unit amounted to \$54,433.21. This is an annual payroll which is a great economic asset to the county. It represents cash which will be spent, for the most part, right in the county. As the National Guard grows, so will the payroll grow.

Most of the money spent on construction of the Armory building, some \$72,000 in state and federal funds, also remained in the county, Sgt. Parsons stated.

## Grand Jury Returns 17 True Bills In January Session

Recommends Raise In Pay And  
Travel Allowance For Grand Jurors

The January term of Circuit Court has been hearing civil cases this week, mostly highway right-of-way suits, in what has been described by one court official as a "dull session".

The grand jury met for a two-day session in which 17 true bills were returned and inspections of county facilities and books were made. The grand jury also recommended that the next session of the legislature raise the pay of grand jurors to \$10.00 a day and give them a travel allowance of ten cents per mile each way for each day in attendance.

Two juries were named to hear cases in the civil division of the court's term for the first week's session. Jury No. 1 is composed of C. K. Linton, Walter Thomas, Roe T. Adams, Elton Davis, C. C. Ross, Bart Marlar, C. B. Rutledge, W. L. Seago, J. C. Trimm, W. R. Young, and Grover L. Ivy.

The Grand Jury's final report is as follows:

"We have been in session two days, have examined 12 witnesses and have returned into open court 17 true bills.

"We have examined by committee the county home, the county jail, all the factories of the county, the movie theatres, the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books.

"We find the county home to be in good condition and its inmates properly provided for and looked after.

"We find the county jail to be in good condition and the prisoners to be properly supervised.

"We find all the factories of the county to be in good and safe condition, equipped with sufficient exit doors opening outwardly as required by law and properly marked.

"We find the movie theatres in the county to be in good and safe condition, properly equipped with exit doors opening outwardly as required by law and properly marked.

"We find that the tax collector's books and the county auditor's books appear to be neat, well-kept and in balance.

"The Grand Jury recommends that the next session of the legislature raise the pay of grand jurors to \$10.00 a day and that travel allowance be provided in the amount of \$0.10 per mile each way for each day in attendance."

Criminal cases growing out of the grand jury indictments and several left from the August term of Circuit Court will be heard next week.

## Christmas Basket Chairman Thanks Community

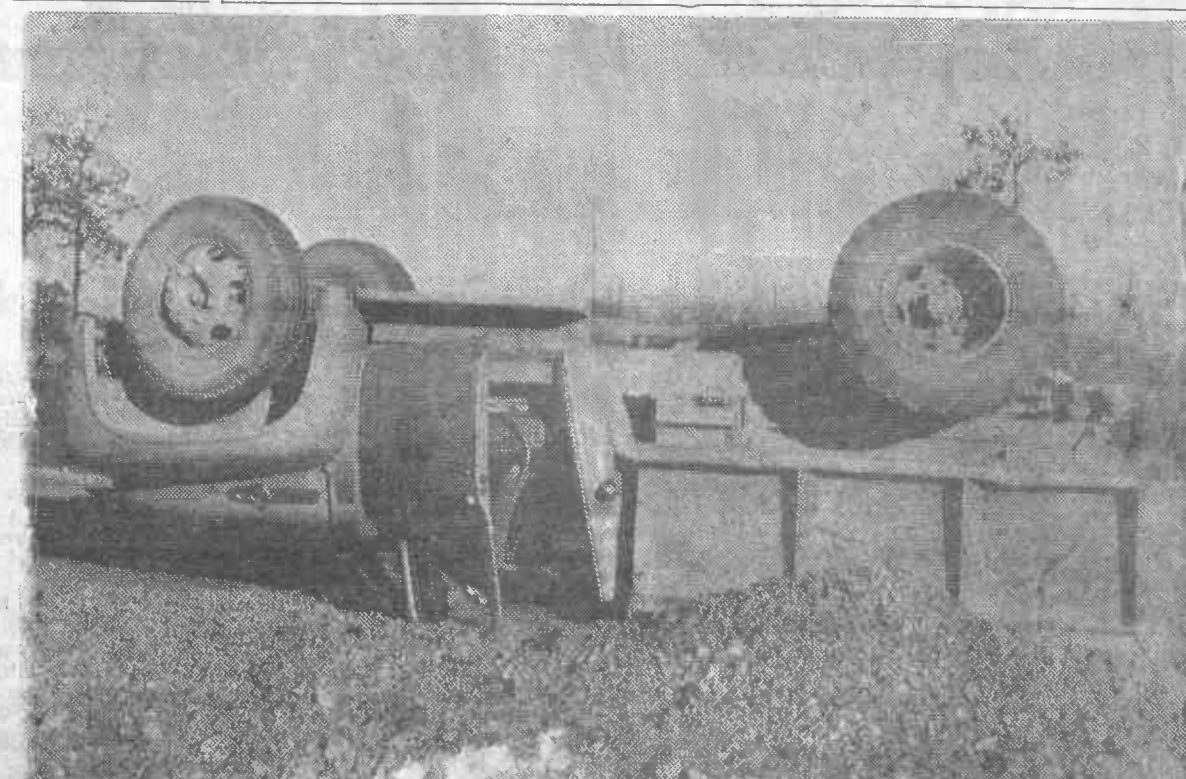

**Pine Seedlings Require Care In Setting**

Setting loblolly pine seedlings on land from crops and pasture is a good land use practice. Pine seedlings properly set and cared for will return a profit to the landowner over a period of years and they will protect the land from erosion.

However, great care should be taken to properly set pine seedlings and attention given to proper spacing to insure best results.

In setting pine seedlings be sure the tap-root is pointed straight down, not bent upward to form a U-root. Young pines with U-roots may survive for awhile but they never grow as they should. Just a little attention at time of planting can prevent this common fault.

Also plant only one seedling in

each hole. Not two or three! Set pine seedlings at least 6x6 feet; on poor upland, 6x7 feet.

When interplanting, set seedlings only where needed and remove or deaden overtopping hardwood within first year after planting.

All these suggestions are simple and can be easily followed. Your county agent or the area forester can give you additional information.

The Soil Conservation Service personnel are interested in your success in establishing young pines on your land. We are interested because pines will conserve the soil and in time return a profit to the landowner.

I hope each of you started the New Year off right by having hog's jowl and black eyed peas for lunch on New Years Day.

**Winter Pasture Care**  
Protection of dormant pastures is important. Protect them from fire with fire lanes. Fire not only destroys the frosted grass, but also kills out young grasses and clovers trying to come up in the sod.

Protect the permanent pastures from hog rooting. This makes water holes that drown the grass and make mowing difficult. Don't allow livestock to bog the permanent pastures.

Take care of your temporary grazing areas. Make sure you don't overgraze them and keep livestock from bogging.

Fertilize spring areas with phosphate and potash while you can still get equipment over the grounds.

Put in some cross fences to make for better pasture management in 1961.

Get your land ready for planting Bermuda, lespedeza, and Dallis. Plant them on a settled seedbed for best results. You can set Coastal Bermuda now, provided you set the stolons around three inches deep and just leave an inch or so above the ground.

**Home Gardening**  
The spring season is just around the corner. Be ready for it when it gets here. Lots of your spring vegetables can be planted late this month.

You can plant English Peas, potatoes, carrots, cabbage, leaf lettuce, onions, radishes, spinach, turnips and mustard in January.

Will your rows be ready when the date arrives? Make sure your answer to this question is "yes."

**Records**  
Start the new year right. Begin a good set of farm records and keep them up to date all during the year. Then you will find it easy to determine which of your farming activities is paying its way and which is not.

For help in setting up a farm record keeping system, call on your local county extension agent. His telephone number is 6380.

Landowners interested in constructing fire lanes in order to give their timberlands more fire protection can now obtain service from the Mississippi Forestry Commission on a contract basis.

No limitation is set on the number of miles of firelanes that can be plowed for any landowner, but it will be the policy to plow firelanes for as many timber owners as possible. In cases where requests for this service exceed the capacity of personnel and equipment, the smaller jobs will receive priority. This will permit the service to continue to be available to the possible number of landowners.

Area Forester and the landowner must be signed before any work is performed. A joint agreement will be made in advance that the fire lane construction work will be done on an actual cost basis or a firm contact price per mile. The landowner will be held responsible for furnishing boundary line information to Commission employees.

The Commission equipment will continue to be available for fire-lane plowing so long as it does not interfere with the primary function of suppressing wild woods fires. Funds received from this activity will be credited to the Forestry Commission budget in Tishomingo County for the purpose of maintaining and advancing the county forestry program.

Tishomingo County landowners interested in this fire protection service should contact the area forester for details. This service for which cost compensation is received is not of the benefits included in the basic fire protection system for which landowners pay two cents per acre tax on all timberland uncultivable land.
