Income Tax Forms

Timed To Take The Joy Out Of Life

The postman on his daily rounds has had his pack weighted recently with 1960 Income Tax Forms. Its "that time of the year again" and if the postman bends under the burden of his pack, we assure him his torture is equally matched by the mental anguish of the taxpayers to whom the tax forms are delivered.

Of course we're aware of this "tax business" all during the year when weekly or monthly deductions are made from payrolls etc., but when the January filing of same rolls around we suddenly see it as the greatest injustice of all. Coming so soon after the happy, light-hearted Yule season, it's purely timed to take the joy out of living, we say. Add these tax forms to the mounting stack of January 1st "Christmas bills" and its enough to make a fella wish he'd never been born.

Trouble is, we don't do much objecting to the tax burden, piled on from every conceivable (and taxable) source, until we are faced with forms to fill out. Shelling out hard cash every day in taxes on goods and services does not have the impact on our consciousness that this once-a-year income tax filing thing has. Maybe we just become numb to the daily sameness of it and only register objections when the big bite comes in January. Seeing the year's income taxation in solid black and white figures gives us something to think about.

And thinking about it, we wonder why more of us don't fuss more about Federal spending until we're asked to hand over tax money to help pay the bills.

W. E. Barnes, publisher of the Sleepy-Eye (Minn.) Herald-Dispatch, speaking on the subject of all of us rising up with one loud voice and demanding a cut in Federal spending, tells us why our once-a-year fuss about income taxes is ineffectual.

"Most employees and employers alike, clap their hands every time the Government promises more social security, more unemployment compensation, more sick benefits for the old and those not so old, more public works to boost employment, more public housing, more aid to schools, more subsidies, more of everything for everybody. The more we demand, the more it costs and the more taxes we must pay. Seems like most any ten-year-old could understand the problem. Most of us who have long since observed that tenth birthday, either don't understand, or close our eyes to where we're going."

Publisher Barnes might have suggested that perhaps we just don't care, but we know that taxes are here to stay and our big complaint right now is that the Federal Government ought to pick another time of year for us to pay up.

Coming so soon after Christmas, this 1960 Income Form has really dampened our enthusiasm for living.

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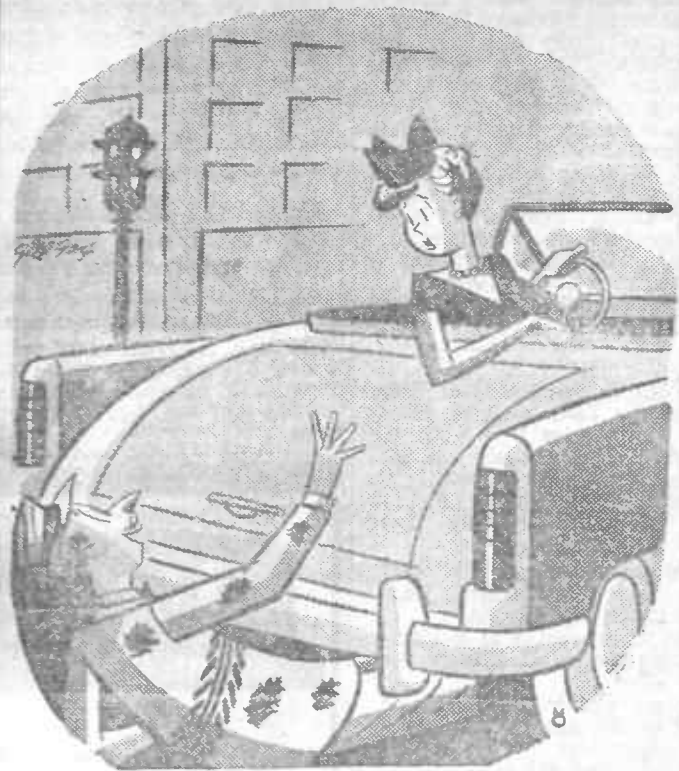

County Agent's Notes

MSU Extension Service

Community Clubs
The County Agent and staff would like to commend the people of the Holcut Community for their newly organized Rural Community Development Club. The first meeting was well attended and showed that the people are interested in an organized Club in their Community.

The Central Rural Community Development Club was reorganized last fall and has been going along nicely during the Winter months. We are sure The Central Club will develop into an outstanding Club. Midway Community has recently organized a Community Club and we are looking forward to working with this community. I am sure many accomplishments will be made through this organization.

We would like to encourage other communities in the county to organize a Rural Community Development Club and we of the County Extension Staff would like to offer our assistance to any community that is interested in having a Community Development Program.

Outlook 1961
Prices and marketings about the same. The outlook for 1961 is that Mississippi farmers can expect the over-all level of prices of farm products and total cash receipts from marketings to remain close to 1960. Cash receipts from marketings for 1960 will be somewhat less than the \$616 million in 1959.

Costs — no change expected.
Costs of items used in farm production are expected to remain close to the 1960 level. The increase in size of farm operations

will result in more capital and higher total production costs per farm in 1961.

Off-farm employment income important. In certain areas of Mississippi the income from off-farm employment will continue to be an important supplementary source of income for small farmers and part-time farmers in 1961.

Agricultural exports look good. The outlook for exports of cotton and soybeans appear good. Cotton exports this year may not quite equal the unusually good year just passed but are expected to be very good. The outlook for soybeans exports is predicted to equal the last marketing year.

Care of Pine Seedlings
Poor care during and before planting is the greatest single cause of poor survival of pine seedlings. Protect them while planting. Expose only a small number at a time. Keep plants in buckets or bags. Keep roots moist and plant them properly.

If you have to hold the seedlings for a while in bundles, keep them from freezing, water regularly and drain excess water. For longer periods of holding, either heel in or bury them or hold in cold storage.

CAPITAL NEWS

Pearl River County

Pearl River county, once largely agricultural with vast tracts of barren, cutover timber land, presents a picture of unbelievable contrast today. Unproductive acres of rolling land have been transformed into valuable acres of tung and timber, but the most outstanding change has been the influx of industrial enterprises which continues today at an ever accelerated pace. The unique feature of the county is tung. Tung acres total nearly 60,000, and in blooming season, March and April, present a floral spectacular unequalled anywhere in the world.

Year-End Industrial Notes About Mississippi

More money was invested in new industry in Mississippi in 1960 than in any previous year, \$49,007,000 according to a recent tally. Adding \$8,275,000 invested in expansions, the total figure comes to \$57,282,000 invested in industry for the year. As for jobs, the 81 new industries announced in 1960 will employ 7,470 when in full production, according to local estimates, and the 44 expansions will add 2,277 more for a total new job figure of 10,747.

Fewer Forest Fires Reported In State

Forest fires have declined to an encouraging degree in Mississippi, due a large measure to the success of a continuing fire prevention campaign. Records show that 257 fires burned an estimated 1,881 acres of land in Mississippi during November, compared to the 679

fires gutting 6,083 acres during November a year ago. This is substantial and gratifying progress in a vital phase of Mississippi's economy.

Commercial Vegetable Summary

Production of the principal commercial vegetable crops harvested in Mississippi during 1960 were valued at \$2,417,000. Crops included are snap beans, cabbage, cucumbers, green peppers, spinach, tomatoes, and watermelons. These crops were harvested from an estimated 22,900 acres in 1960.

Forestry Notes

Mississippi Fire Laws

Our worse fire occurrence is usually during the months of January through June. This is mainly due to the fact that farmers are busy during these months cleaning off fence rows, ditch banks, and burning off their fields. Also, there are still a few misguided people who believe that it is beneficial to mankind to burn off the woods every year. Our soils men have been trying for years to inform and convince farmers that burning off fields is detrimental to our soil as it robs us of precious organic matter which our soil in Tishomingo County needs so badly.

In addition to damaging the soil, if fire is allowed to escape to the woods, it kills the small trees and damages the larger trees; thereby reducing the rate of growth. If leaves and litter are destroyed there is nothing to break rainfall or slow down water run-off. Therefore we have eroded soils, stream beds become filled with silt and eventually we can have flood conditions. In addition to all of this, we also rob wild game of food and cover.

Due to the damage and destruction caused by uncontrolled fires, the Mississippi Legislature found it necessary to pass laws dealing with the control and extinguishing of all fires. Each person that starts a fire on his land is required by law to confine the fire to his own property. If a person allows a fire to escape to the lands of another, he is guilty of a misdemeanor and is subject to prosecution by any member of the Mississippi Forestry Commission or any county law enforcement officer. In addition, he is liable for all damages caused by the same fire on lands other than his own. Also, any person who deliberately sets fire to the lands of another is guilty of a felony and is subject to prosecution for same.

Deliberate Woods Firing A Felony

H. B. No. 563: Laws of 1960
"If any person wilfully, maliciously, and feloniously sets fire on any woods, meadow, marsh, field or prairie, not his own, he shall be guilty of a felony and shall, upon conviction, be sentenced to the state penitentiary for

not more than two (2) years nor less than one (1) year, of fined not less than two hundred dollars (\$200.00) nor more than one thousand dollars (1,000.00), or both, in the discretion of the court."

Allowing Fire To Escape To Lands Of Another Is A Misdemeanor

H. B. No. 563: Laws of 1960

"That if any person recklessly or with gross negligence causes fire to be communicated to any woods, meadow, marsh, field or prairie not his own, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall upon conviction, be fined not less than twenty dollars (\$20.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00), or imprisoned in the county jail not more than three (3) months, or both, in the discretion of the court."

Damage Resulting From Woods Fire May Be Collected By Injured Party

Mississippi Code, 1942, No. 1086

TRESPASS, Civil Liability, By Firing Woods. If any person shall set on fire any lands of another or shall wantonly, negligently, or carelessly allow and fire to get into the lands of another, he shall be liable to the person injured thereby, not only for the injury to or destruction of buildings, fences and the like, but for the burning and injury of trees, timber, and grass, and damages to the range as well; and shall more ver be liable to a penalty of one hundred and fifty dollars in favor of the owner.

Any person, firm or corporation responsible for the starting or existence of fire on forested, cutover, brush lands or grass lands other than his own is responsible for controlling it or extinguishing

it immediately. If such person firm or corporation wilfully neglects or refuses to do so, any organized fire suppression agency recognized by the Mississippi Forestry Commission may summarily abate the nuisance as defined in Miss. Fire Suppression Laws of 1940, Chapter 219. The cost of abating such nuisance, with all costs and reasonable attorney's fees is allowed for such nuisance by civil action in the proper court and the action for collecting the cost may be filed by the agency abating the nuisance.

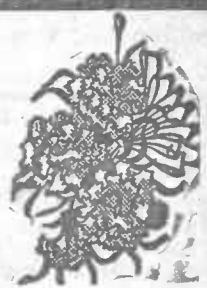

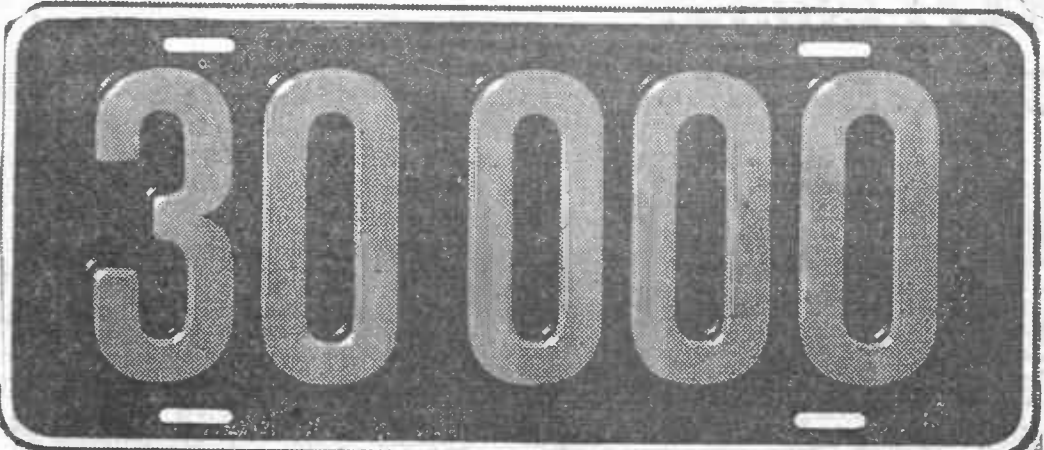

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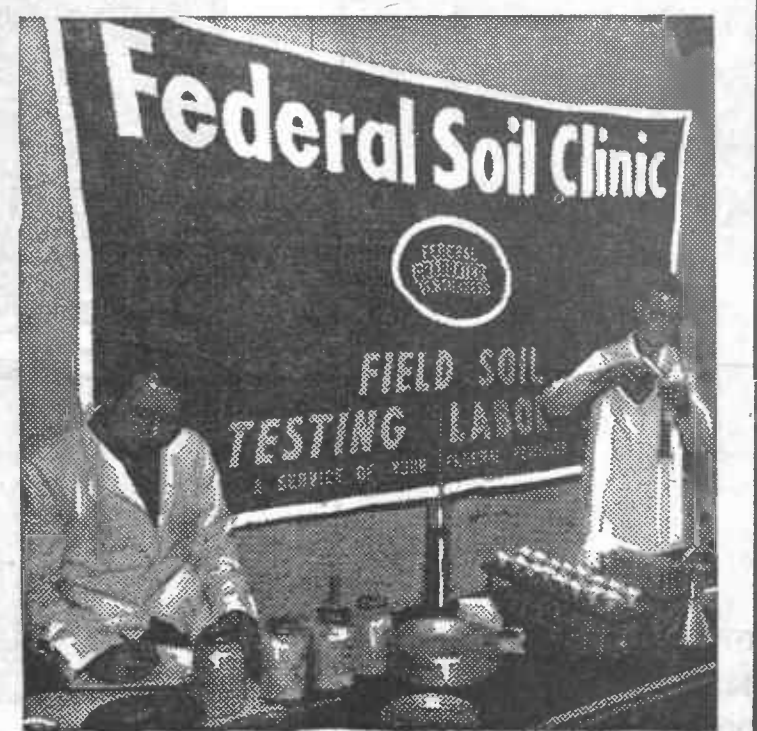

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Here's how to figure your cost:



To figure the monthly cost of using any electric appliance you must know three things:

1. The number of kilowatt-hours that the appliance will use.
2. How much electricity costs.
3. The number of kilowatt-hours that you now use in one month.

From the table above, you found the number of kilowatt-hours that an appliance will use in one month. The chart on the right shows how much you pay for electricity. You can get the number of kilowatt-hours that you now use from an old bill. (This can also be estimated from the chart on the right.)

How to use this information...

Let's say you now use around 150 kwh a month. Your bill runs around \$3.50 a month. And you'd like to know how much it will cost to operate an electric range.

From the figures at the top of the page, you see that an electric range uses about 150 kwh a month. Add this to the number of kwh you now use. The new total is 300 kwh. From the chart on the right, you find that you'd pay \$5.50 for 300 kwh. That

means your bill would go up about \$2.00 a month—less than 7¢ a day—when you add an electric range.

(If you now use more than 150 kwh a month, it would be even less!) Notice that although the amount of electricity used exactly doubled, the size of the bill went up only \$2.00—from \$3.50 to \$5.50.

That's the nice thing about our "stair-step" rates . . . as your use goes up . . . your average cost goes down!

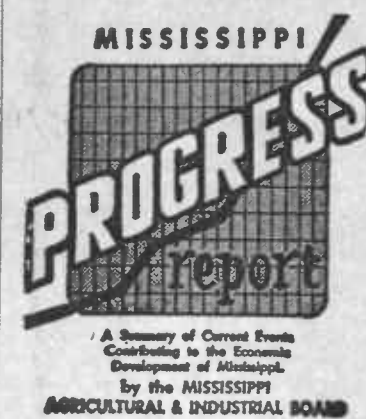

Mississippi Observes Civil War Centennial

At 10 a. m. on January 9, 1861, at Jackson, Mississippi became the second Southern state to secede from the Union. On April 12 of that year, Fort Sumter was fired upon, and the long and bloody War Between the States began. This year begins the commemoration of that war's centennial by Mississippi and many of her sister states. This Centennial is not a commercial venture, but it does furnish an opportunity for Mississippi to offer her hospitality to the thousands of visitors who will come to tour the state's historic shrines and to take part in the many observances planned in commemoration of that event.

Several colorful and historic pageants have been planned. Three cities, Vicksburg, Natchez and Jackson have completed pageant plans. Vicksburg will present "Gunboats Round the Bend," a colorful pageant about the siege of Vicksburg and featuring the famous Balfour Ball every Friday evening from March 31 through June 30. "Heritage of Valor," a music-filled pageant about Jackson at the time of the secession, during the war years and immediately thereafter, will be presented in Jackson during the summer. Natchez will present "The Life of Jefferson Davis" every Thursday from April 27 through May 25.

Many historic Civil War events will be commemorated with special ceremonies and pageants, Confederate balls, parades and tours during the spring and summer. Towns

and cities planning special events or observances include Biloxi, Baldwin, Carrollton, Columbus, Cleveland, Corinth, Fayette, Greenwood, Hollandale, Holly Springs, Jackson, Laurel, Natchez, Newton, Oxford, Pascagoula, Port Gibson, Senatobia, Vicksburg and Yazoo City.

State Historical Museum To Be Opened In Jackson

Mississippi's historic, 120-year old, Old Capitol at Jackson has been completely restored as a state historical museum. Cost of the project was over \$1.5 million. The museum contains a comprehensive picture of Mississippi history, including one of the nation's rarest Civil War collections. Special attractions of the museum include eight exhibit rooms covering each era of history through 1890; three dioramas depicting historic events; the historic House and Senate chambers, the impressive Governor's office and Supreme Court rooms; and an extensive collection of historical papers. Thousands of Mississippians and out-of-state visitors are expected to tour this outstanding museum during commemoration of the Civil War Centennial.

Five Centennial Tours Planned In Mississippi

Five special tours have been designated by the Mississippi Commission on the War Between the States to aid visitors in seeing Mississippi's many historic sites and in observing all of the special events and pageants. Visitors will be directed to the scenic and historic points of interest in the Corinth, Columbus, Holly Springs area; the Mississippi Delta; the Jackson, Yazoo City, Meridian area; the Vicksburg, Port Gibson, Natchez

section; and the Gulf Coast. Civic and commercial organizations in all of these areas anticipate a marked increase in the demand for tourist services and facilities during the Centennial.

Vicksburg Military Park To Feature Special Weeks

Northern and Mid-Western states having historical markers in the Vicksburg National Military Park will be saluted during the 1961 observance of the Centennial by special weeks in their honor. The eight Southern states with monuments will be similarly honored in 1962. Special advertisements in appropriate newspapers will invite Northern and Mid-Western visitors to take part in their state's observance at Vicksburg. States to be honored in 1961 include Illinois, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, Iowa, Wisconsin, New York, Kansas, Rhode Island, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Ohio, Michigan, Missouri and Indiana.

Centennial Commission Co-Ordinates Planning

The Mississippi legislature in its 1960 session created the Mississippi Commission On The War Between The States to promote, encourage, develop and co-ordinate the plans of public and private agencies for commemorating the one hundredth anniversary of the War Between The States. Slayden, member of the House of Representatives, Holly Springs, vice-chairman; Therman V. Bryant, Newton, secretary-treasurer; Byrd P. Mauldin, Pontotoc; Mrs. Florence Sillers Ogden, Rosedale, Miss. Kathleen O'Fallon, member House of Representatives, Lessley, Wilkinson county; and Mayor Laz Quave Biloxi. Ex-officio members are Lt. Gov. Paul B. Johnson, Hattiesburg; Walter Sillers, Speaker of House of Representatives, Rosedale; Miss Charlotte Capers, Department of Archives and History, Jackson; and Sidney T. Roebuck, Newton, executive director.

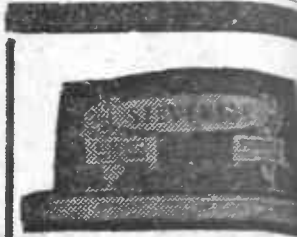

Now is the time to have your soil tested! By having soil tests made on fields you plan to plant in row crops this spring you may easily increase your net profit.

Your local County Agent will furnish you cartons for mailing soil samples to the state soil-testing laboratory. He will also furnish you detailed instructions on how to take these soil samples.

All crop, hay and pasture land

should be fertilized according to recommendations made by the soil testing laboratory; from actual soil samples taken from your crop, hay and pasture land and sent to this laboratory by you.

Fertilizer is expensive, and to buy and apply the wrong kind of amounts of fertilizer can be wasteful, or result in low yields.

The right kind of fertilizer applied in proper amounts will insure higher yields and greater profit under favorable weather conditions.

There is no need to guess when you can know the kind and amount of fertilizer to use!

Your local soil conservation service personnel are interested in the proper fertilization of row crops, hay and pasture because properly fertilized crops grow faster and afford greater protection to the soil.

Less soil erosion occurs on fields where there is a quick growth of established plants.

Good farming and effective soil and water conservation go hand in hand. Have your soil tested. It pays!
