State Motor Vehicle Inspection Law Will Go Into Operation April 1st

The Motor Vehicle Inspection Law passed by the last session of the Legislature is in the process of being set up and garages and repair shops are being checked and investigated as to their qualifications to become inspection stations.

The first actual inspection of vehicles will begin April 1st and the inspection period will be April, May and June. Approximately 700,000 vehicles will have to stand this inspection so as to be permitted to use the highways of this State. Col. T. B. Birdsong, Commissioner of Public Safety and Boyd Goding, Director of Finance and Staff Operations, along with the Director of Motor Vehicle Inspection, R. L. Morgan, state that twelve field inspectors have completed a week of training at Highway Patrol Headquarters in Jackson and will be in the field the 15th of this month, to begin the investigations of prospective stations.

There will be no limit as to the number of stations approved in a city, municipality, or county and all garages and repair shops that meet the qualifications will be approved. Only bonafide repair shops and garages will be eligible to qualify as inspection stations. A business that is principally a service station will not be approved unless, in addition to the service

station, there is an extra stall or building attached that is used only for the repair of automobiles and other vehicles. A wash rack or grease rack stall will not suffice.

All motorists are urged to see that their vehicles are in good condition so far as brakes, lights, steering, tires and windshield wipers are concerned since these are the items to be checked under the new law.

All licensed and franchised new car and truck dealers in the state must have each vehicle, old or new, inspected before it is sold and affix the official inspection sticker on the vehicle. This sticker will be valid until the next inspection period except in cases where a vehicle will have to be reinspected before resale.

Also, a vehicle must be reinspected after being involved in an accident. A \$1.25 fee will be charged for each inspection with \$1.00 going to the inspection station and \$.25 cents to the State. All repairs to rejected vehicles may be made by the owners themselves, or at any garage or repair they desire to patronize.

The mission of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service is to discover any maladjustment in the vehicle that might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident, and, by removing the link, prevent the accident.

Coming Municipal Election Begins To Draw Interest

Alver Belue Announces For Mayor,
All City Elective Posts Become Open

Interest in the 1961 Municipal elections draws its first public attention today with the announcement by Alver Belue that he will seek the office of Mayor of the Town of Iuka.

In announcing his candidacy, Mr. Belue stated that he would make a sincere race for the office and asks the support of the townspeople in his race. He is the first

candidate to announce for any of the city elective offices to be filled in the spring elections.

Besides the office of mayor, the five posts on the Board of Aldermen will be filled and a town marshal named in the municipal general election in June. The marshal also serves as tax collector.

According to the State of Mississippi municipal election laws, a primary election would be held the second Tuesday in May to select nominees for the city offices. That date this year will be May 9. In event two or more nominees are named in a close race and a run-off becomes necessary, a second primary would be held the Third Tuesday in May. That date this year will be May 16.

Some question, however, has arisen as to whether a primary election will be held. Heretofore, the custom has been for a candidate for city office to get his name placed on the June General election ballot by petition. In that case, no May primary is held.

Mr. Belue has announced his candidacy subject to the municipal primary election on May 9—if the primary is held. Otherwise he will make the race in the general election that will be held in June.

Mr. Belue has long been identified in public life of the county. He served two terms as Circuit Clerk, 1952-56 and 1956-60. He was superintendent of the Holcut schools before election to his first term as circuit clerk. He taught for nineteen and a half years in the county schools. At present he operates the Belue Sporting Goods and Fabric Center in Iuka.

The present Iuka Board of Mayor and Aldermen is composed of Mayor J. H. Allen, and Aldermen R. K. Thorne, W. H. Jones, Elmus Curtis, L. S. Traylor and John Hubbard. The Town Marshal and Tax Collector is H. F. (Chunky) Chambers.

The towns of Belmont, Tishomingo, Paden and Burnsville will also elect mayors and boards of aldermen this year.

U. S. SAVINGS BONDS SALES IN COUNTY

As Others See Us

We did not make a bunch of New Year Resolutions this year. Rather than make a one-two-three set of resolutions we just decided to take a candid look at ourselves as editor and publisher and see how we "stacked-up." As a starter and sort of "trial balloon" we put the question to some of the office force, "Do you think we stack-up pretty good as an editor?" We anticipated some very favorable replies, but one bright brain in the office suggested that maybe everybody didn't see us as we see ourselves.

This led us to some thoughts on the subject. After several years of seasoning in the newspaper business, we had accumulated some ideas on how an editor looks to some of his subscribers.

The editor is the fellow who "slants the news" to suit his own ideas, and the opposition doesn't "ever get the truth told."

The editor is a person who is alternately a "highly intelligent man" and a "complete idiot," according to whom he has praised, or whose toes he has stepped on.

He is the fellow who is responsible for every misspelled name or misplaced comma in the newspaper, even if he didn't see more than ten inches of the copy after it was set. He's supposed to read every line of his own newspaper, isn't he?

The editor is that griping individual who sends out broad hints to the correspondents to get their news in early if they want it printed, then leaves the whole batch out in favor of an advertiser who comes in with a page ad at the last minute. Editors are inconsiderate. The only way to get even with a guy like that is just not send any news the next week.

The editor is supposed to be a super-sleuth. He is supposed to know everything that's going on. So when he is asked about something he doesn't know, his questioner gives him a look that plainly says he's slipping. If he goes and prints a piece of news that's of public interest but some folks wanted kept quiet, then he's a "busy body and a blabber mouth."

The editor is a knuckle-head who always supports the wrong candidate and causes the defeat of the "best qualified man" according to the "best qualified man" himself.

The editor is to blame for every mistake in the paper, even when he prints the facts just like they were given him. After all, he's supposed to know what's what, isn't he?

That was enough to stop any enumeration of virtues we thought we might have. And probably it served us right for thinking we had any noble attributes in the first place. The best we can do is just hope to do better. And that, if it can be so called, is our resolution. But it can't be called a "new" one. We make it every year.

Harvesting Can Improve Woodland

Farm woodland can be improved by properly harvesting pulpwood! This is accomplished by careful examination of the woodland, and by harvesting only those trees needing to be cut. By doing this the trees left will have more space in which to grow.

What trees to cut is, usually, easily determined. Take out double trees, broken topped trees, crooked trees, suppressed trees, having very little top that are overgrown by taller larger trees, and diseased trees. When this is done, only the better are left.

When there is a market for hardwood, some hardwood might be cut to release stands of young pines. Where there are no pine, or upland sites, set pines first then remove hardwood and sell for pulp.

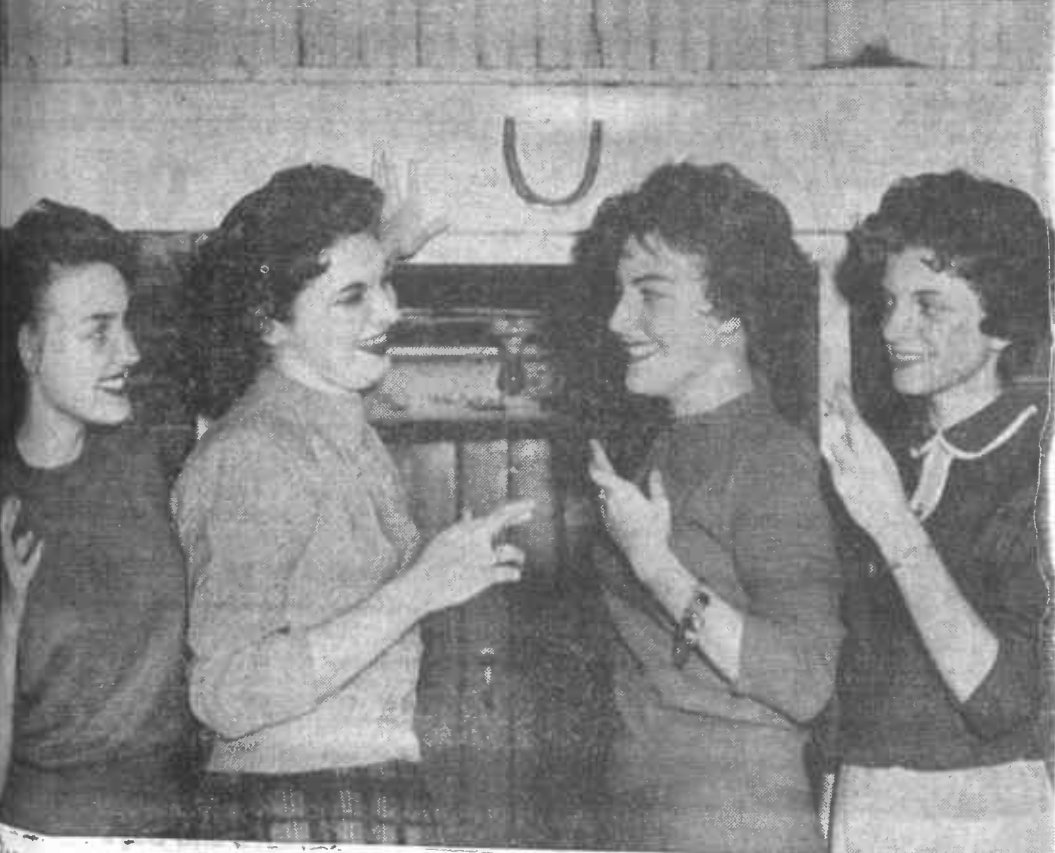

Armour & Co. Contracts Signed

Chemical Plant Near Cherokee Will Be Constructed Soon

Construction of the Armour Agricultural Chemical Co., nitrogen plant in Colbert County near Cherokee, Ala., is nearer reality. Contracts for construction and services to implement the building program were signed in Chicago recently at Armour's main offices.

Mayor R. E. Pate of Cherokee was present at the contract signing to represent the Town of Cherokee.

The contracts call for completion of the plant in 1962. Several chemical plant units will make up the completed plant. There will be an ammonium plant with a capacity of 360 tons daily, a urea plant of 50 tons daily capacity, a nitric acid plant, nitrogen solutions plant, ammonium nitrate and ammonium phosphates plants. The plant will have a daily capacity of 250 tons of nitrogen solutions and 250 tons of ammonium nitrate pills.

The plant will consume 15-million cubic feet of gas daily. Gas will be supplied by the Alabama-Tennessee Natural Gas Co., and the Petersville Gas Co.

Power service will be furnished by the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Ultra-liberals are unhappy unless they have their way, every day, all of the time, throughout the year. They are constantly searching for scapegoats, exercising their lungs, flinging their arms, going through awkward contortions and yapping for "change," "change," "change" — change in everything, from the principles upon which this country was founded to the rules under which the Senate and House of Representatives have successfully operated for almost two centuries.

Even before taking the oath as Congressman they had carefully laid plans to destroy the most sacred and soundest rule of the House the rule of seniority. Conceding there is no such thing as perfection, that every system, rule, or law is not without some fault, the rule of seniority is the safest and best means of establishing position in the House of Representatives. It is no more outmoded today than it was at the turn of the century, or during the nineteenth century, or during the 18th century when this nation was founded and the National Congress first established. Its long existence without change is proof of its soundness.

This year the scapegoat was again the House Rules Committee. The only reason House liberals elected to attack it was because Southern just happened to be sitting there whose voting record had not conformed to their own. It really made little difference that the said Southerner, a Mississippi Democrat, had not voted for the Democratic nominee. That was only the excuse — not the reason. The reason was that they just do not want to play according to the rules — rules which have prevailed for a century or more. So, they planned to get at the rules by "getting" Mississippi's Colmer on the ground that he had failed to vote for the nominee of his party.

Well now, some say they are not being consistent. Of course, not. One of the prerequisites of being a genuine liberal is to be inconsistent. In the fight against Colmer lack of consistency protruded like a sore thumb. In 1956 negro Congressman Adam Powell, Democrat from dark Harlem, jumped party lines and voted for the Republican,

NOTICE TO THE INSURANCE BUYING PUBLIC BY WALTER DELL DAVIS, COMMISSIONER

The Department of Insurance has been deluged recently by calls and letters from persons who cancelled their existing automobile liability insurance policy in order to obtain a policy with another company at a lesser rate. These people find themselves in the unfortunate position of having had their new insurance cancelled or rejected because of the insured's driving record, insecure financial status, under-age drivers, etc. The person so involved then finds himself in the position of having no insurance, and with a cancellation or rejection on his record finds it impossible to again be written voluntarily by the company with which he formerly did business, or with any other company. His only recourse is to go into the "Assigned Risk Plan," which means that his liability insurance coverage will be placed in a company pool with some company being selected through the rotation method to write his particular policy. The Assigned Risk Plan rates are as high as the manual rate, and sometimes higher, based upon the insured's experience of accidents.

As Commissioner of Insurance, I would urge all persons contemplating changing their insurance from one company to another to analyze the situation before making such a change. Be sure that you are eligible for the type of insurance written by a company that offers a dividend at the end of the year, or which discounts the premium when the policy is written. Such insurance is available only to careful drivers, people who drive only a little, and people with clean driving records. Even though unfavorable information is withheld by the insured, an investigation through the various retail credit report channels will reveal any unfavorable driving experience, the presence of under-age drivers, or chronic alcoholism on the part of any driver, and such information will inevitably result in cancellation of the policy. Following a cancellation, for any reason, it becomes extremely difficult for the insured to procure insurance from any company. The public must understand that a contract of automobile liability insurance is simply a contract between the insured and the company, and the provisions of the policy itself specifically provide for cancellation by either party upon proper notice; neither the Insurance Department nor the courts can prevent a company from effecting cancellation under the terms of the policy itself.

I must re-emphasize the importance of knowing positively that you can procure and retain automobile liability insurance with another company before cancelling or failing to renew the insurance already in force.

The Insurance Commission, which has jurisdiction over automobile liability rates in this state, has recently announced approval of a "safe driver" or "merit" rating plan, whereby the insured can procure credit for safe driving experience. Should your record be such that you feel entitled to a reduced rate, approach your present agent in regard to renewing your policy under such plan. In the event you are ineligible under the safe drive plan with your present agent, you have little chance of being accepted by a company writing at a below-manual rate.

Automobile liability insurance for the average person is not considered desirable business by many companies because of extreme losses in recent years. Do not jeopardize your present insurance by shopping around for lower rates unless you are sure of your eligibility as a careful driver.

School Lunch And Milk Program

J. R. Long
County Superintendent of Education

The School Lunch and Special Milk Program, sponsored by the Office of County Superintendent of Education, is technically a non-profit operation. Prices charged for lunches by the various schools of this County range from 15c to 20c, which would be impossible were it not for Federal assistance, furnished through the State School Lunch Program.

Each school receives from six to nine cents reimbursement for each Class A lunch served and four cents for each extra milk sold. In addition, each school receives such commodities as canned cherries, green peas, green beans, peaches, peanut butter, corn, tomatoes, tomato paste, purple plums, sliced apples, applesauce, pork and gravy, grapefruit sections, frozen ground pork, frozen turkey, frozen ground beef, process cheese, corn meal,

rice, nonfat dry milk solids, print butter, and dried whole milk solids. Tishomingo County received some of each of these items last school year.

Total food assistance received by County Schools and Iuka Municipal Separate School for 1959-60 was \$20,491.72. Total cash assistance paid to County Schools for the School Lunch Program was \$16,965.52; to Iuka School \$4,631.00. Total cash assistance paid to County Schools for Special Milk Program was \$8,222.68; to Iuka School \$1,541.11. Grand total cash assistance paid to both Districts was \$51,852.03.

Free lunches are served to deserving children when finances will permit. The milk served with each Class A lunch alone costs almost as much, if purchased at a public place, as our schools are new charging for the entire lunch. Special milk, or extra milk, sells from two to four cents per half pint to each child; Federal assistance covering the difference in wholesale cost.

Changes In Your
Social Security

Many people in Tishomingo County may now become entitled to social security benefits by work they do for a son or daughter, according to Hugh Tigrett, manager of the Tupelo Social Security Office. Recent changes brought under the social security law parents who work for their son or daughter in a trade or business. The change, however, did not include work done in the home of a son or daughter. This type of work, generally known as domestic, is still not covered.

Many of these parents have never worked for any one other than the son or daughter and, therefore, could not qualify for social security. The law now makes it possible for them to earn credits toward retirement, survivor and disability benefits. Some of these parents can qualify for retirement benefits with one and one-half years of credit.

Parents working for their grown children in a trade or business who do not already have social security cards will need to apply for social security account numbers. The first report of their wages is due by April 30, 1961, and their social security number must be entered on that report.

If you would like more information on this or would like to apply for a social security card, you should talk with the social security representative who is at the City Hall in Iuka each Monday afternoon.

CAPITAL NEWS

Mississippi's School Construction

Mississippi's school construction netted the largest proportionate increase of classrooms in the United States during 1959. The state added 2,241 instruction rooms during the year, bringing the total instruction rooms available to 16,534. In addition, the state was to complete 1,849 more classrooms for use by the 1960-61 season. The state has built some 4,061 classrooms since 1956, and 1,138 were under construction in 1960.

Complete figures for 1960 are not yet available, but Mississippi agriculture made greater advances during the period from 1950 through 1959 than in any other decade in history as state farmers applied a wide range of new technology to more efficiently produce and market commodities of higher quality. When 1960 statistics are compiled in detail, it will probably be shown that continued gains were racked up in the past decade in an increasing trend toward diversification and scientific techniques for greater production and profit.

Banner Tourist Year For Mississippi
There is evidence that 1961 will be a banner tourist year for Mississippi and the rest of the South.

Interest in the Civil War Centennial will attract an unusually heavy volume of tourists to areas of battle re-enactments and pageants. Many hours of work have gone into plans for the Mississippi observance and massive parades by the Mississippi Greys. Sprucing up monuments, museums and other tourist attractions at points of interest in the state will not leave the visitors disappointed.

The Boll Weevil In Trouble

The need for delving deeper in the realm of basic agricultural research is being recognized. This development is illustrated by the establishment of a new boll weevil laboratory at Mississippi State University. The new institution will concentrate its efforts on basic studies that may lead to more effective control of boll weevils at lower cost and possibly to the ultimate eradication of the pest.

Forestry Notes

By Larry Brewer

Area Forester

Tishomingo County has approximately 226,000 acres under organized fire protection by the Mississippi Forestry Commission. Landowners in Tishomingo County assist in the support of a forestry program by paying a fire protection tax in the amount of two cents per acre on timbered uncultivable land.

This contribution by the landowners represents about 19% of the total amount expended for organized fire protection. This is fairly comparable to the number of fires caused by landowners largely through burning ditch banks, fields, and leaves. The remaining 81 per cent of fire control costs is paid by the general public through state and federal funds. This is also comparable to the percentage of fires caused by the general public.

Therefore landowners in Tishomingo county receive the full benefit of the Mississippi Forestry Commission's fire protection program by paying less than one-fifth of

the total operating cost of the program.

Everyone benefits from fire forests. Actually, the owner receives only a small part of the total value in the land through the stumpage to him from the sale of the forest. The general public is the beneficiary of our forested woodlands as they are playing a major role in the state's rapid economic growth by furnishing jobs, purchases which are basic in improving our living. Soil and water conservation, wildlife habitat, and recreation facilities also benefit.

High costs are involved in a fire protection program. This includes the purchase of tractors, plows, trucks, steel towers, two-way radios, and items of fire control equipment.

I want to point out that control is only a part of the Commission's forestry program. Other services available are management advice and tree seedlings, and information and educational
