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In The Traffic Deaths Book

The Record Shames Us

Mississippi's traffic death toll in 1960 was one of the highest in the state's history. 618 people gave up their lives in traffic accidents last year in Mississippi. Of this number, 9 died in Tishomingo County accidents. Of the fifty states in the Union, only one, North Dakota, had a higher traffic death rate than Mississippi. That gives us little cause for pride.

All sorts of safety campaigns, state and national, are waged year in and year out. Yet, when traffic death tolls are added up, the totals grow greater with each yearly tabulation. Laws, aimed at keeping down traffic accidents, are added to the statute books in legislature after legislature; yet the traffic death toll mounts. The question is: Why?

According to the president of the Mississippi Safety Council, O. R. Smith, most of the traffic deaths in Mississippi last year could have been prevented by the use of a little common sense.

Do Mississippians have less common sense than other Americans (except North Dakotans, perhaps)?

Do Mississippians have less regard for their own and their friends' and neighbors' lives, than have other Americans?

Are Mississippians less capable than other Americans when at the wheel of an automobile?

We would be the last to give an affirmative answer to these questions. Yet the record shows that something is drastically wrong with our driving habits, our driving IQ, or plain ordinary common sense. The record shames us. And we should take measures to take the stigma of the "nation's second most dangerous traffic state" off our record.

The recently-enacted Motor Vehicle Inspection Law which goes into effect April first in one measure being taken. Safety experts say it will eliminate one of the accident factors by ridding the highways of "traps" and by bringing all vehicles to a reasonable standard of safety.

However, ridding the highways of unsafe vehicles will do little to cut the traffic toll if unsafe drivers are left at the wheels — be the vehicles mechanically safe or unsafe.

The Safety Council says studies show existing traffic codes to be completely out of date in Mississippi. The Council will make recommendations to the Legislature for changes which, if enforced will reduce accidents. Here again, the responsibility for the effectiveness of any code depends upon the "safety" built in the driver as well as in the vehicle.

Mr. Smith also had some other pertinent remarks as to the safety picture, not only in Mississippi but in other areas of the country.

"For too long people regarded driving an automobile as one of their basic rights. This is not true. Driving is a privilege and when this privilege is abused it must be revoked," the Council president stated.

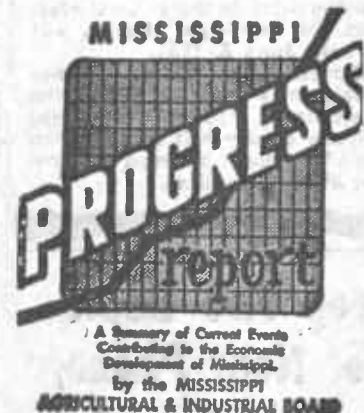
As the Council suggests, stronger requirements for a driver's license and a system of re-examination of drivers to eliminate the dangerous ones, may be needed. Not only in Mississippi but in all the states. While we have a very bad record here, the traffic picture nationwide is also very bad. Being ashamed of our record will not exonerate us. Doing something constructive about it — individually, as drivers — will correct the situation.

an increase. The people are paying more tax dollars into the Federal treasury than ever before, even more than in time of war; and incidentally, the wartime tax rates and excise taxes are still with us. Instead of being reduced, Foreign Aid has been enlarged. The Federal budget is one-third higher than that which was promised. It is much higher than any of the Truman budgets, even during the Korean War. Like Truman and Roosevelt who preceded him, Eisenhower spent more money during his administration than the combined spending of all previous Presidents hard to believe but true. And, it is true even though Congress cut the aggregate of Ike's budgets by several billions of dollars.

The Kennedy Administration is faced with numerous domestic problems, heavy debt, heavy taxes, a quarrel within its own party between liberals and conservatives, an almost uncontrollable and fattening Federal bureaucracy, inflation, a business slump, high unemployment (close to five million), and a dangerously serious situation abroad. Communism has lost no ground. On the contrary, it has experienced prominent gains and moved as near to our shores as Cuba. Many Latin countries of the New World are very cool toward the United States. Good as we have been to them, as well as to others, such as Japan, indignities have been heaped upon our President and Vice-President while they visited abroad. Some sections they could not even visit because of violent anti-American sentiment.

One could hardly envy young Mr. Kennedy his job. It is a tough one and the responsibility is awesome. However, if it be his will and he resolutely sticks to the job, leaving politics to care for itself, his administration can measure up and be one of greatness. Indeed, the opportunity is there. What will he do with it?

Regardless of how one voted, let all wish the Kennedy Administration good luck. Every American has a stake in the future.

Mississippi Features

In National Publications

Mississippi is currently being spotlighted by several national publications in their editorial and advertising pages. The growth of the Jackson area was featured in full-page advertisements in U. S. News and World Report and in banking publications, and United Gas features the new State Historical Museum (Old Capitol) in an advertisement in the three national news magazines.

Dodge News Magazine (Chrysler Corporation) features the Mississippi Gulf Coast, and the Methodist family magazine "Together" features historic cities along the Natchez Trace. Magazines and newspapers throughout the country are carrying news items about the forthcoming Pilgrimage season, approaching Civil War Centennial events and the salvaging of a cannon from the Union gunboat "Cairo" from a river bed near Vicksburg.

Summaries of Mississippi's industrial growth and economic progress were carried in the January 11 issue of the New York Journal of Commerce and in the special January 10 "Economic Forecast of 1961" issue of American Banker (the banking industry's nationally-circulated daily newspaper).

Winston County Plans To Organize Industrial Development Corporation

Plans for an industrial development corporation designed to purchase and develop industrial sites suitable to new and expanding industry will be completed this year, according to an announcement by the Winston County Chamber of Commerce. The organization of the corporation and the immediate raising of a minimum of \$10,000 to carry out its objectives were unanimously approved by the chamber's board of directors. The amount to be raised for the activities of the new corporation will be in addition to any city and county funds that might be made available for industrial development purposes.

Foam Rubber Company To Open At Tupelo

A foam rubber manufacturer will start production in Tupelo soon, according to an announcement by James M. Savery, chairman of the Tombigbee Electric Power Association industrial committee. The firm is the Dryden Rubber Division of Sheller Manufacturing Company of Keokuk, Iowa. Some 25 persons will be initially employed. The foam rubber will be used in the manufacture of furniture.

Mississippi Items In Eisenhower Budget

Flood control, navigation and reclamation projects of the Army Engineers in Mississippi were requested under the budget proposed to Congress by President Eisenhower in January. Mississippi items included: \$55,000 for planning on the Tombigbee River and tributaries; \$380,000 for operation and maintenance of the Pascagoula harbor; \$260,000 for operation and maintenance of the Gulfport harbor and 100 for a survey of the Chunky-Chicasaw-Pascagoula Rivers; \$326,000 to deepen the Biloxi harbor; and \$1,000,000 for the Greenville Harbor Project . . . to carry out the first stage of construction work in the harbor fill which will be developed into an industrial site on Lake Ferguson.

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New Industry In Natchez
Natchez' newest industry, Natchez Culvert and Drainage Corporation, is now in production. The company will manufacture metal culverts, metal boxes, septa tanks and portable houses. Initially, some 35 persons will be employed, but plans call for additional employees in the future. The company is located on a 4.5 acre site within the city limits.

Aberdeen Seeks Survey Of Industrial Park Site

The City of Aberdeen has asked the Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board to assist in making a feasibility study leading toward establishment of an industrial park at the old Gulf Ordnance Plant near Prairie. The proposed 600-acre site is part of 3,000 acres currently being divided for various uses and is approximately six miles from the city limit. Mayor George Howell said the City Council and the Fourth Supervisor's District mailed an official resolution to the A&I Board as the first official step in getting this project underway.

Ceremony To Mark Port Transfer

The physical facilities of the Port of Gulfport will be officially turned over to the Agricultural and Industrial Board February 9, when the board will hold its regular monthly meeting at Gulfport for this purpose. A ceremony has been scheduled, with arrangements being made by the Gulfport Junior Chamber of Commerce. The transfer will take place at the Port itself and will be highlighted by a brief address by Governor Ross Barnett and the raising of the state flag over this property. The port will be operated by the A&I Board through the five-man Gulfport State Port Authority, made up of Gulfport residents. The port will soon launch a \$3,000,000 improvement program, including construction of a large banana terminal.

State's River Ports Set For New Activity

Mississippi's river ports are getting set for new activity in 1961, according to reports received from Natchez, Vicksburg and Greenville. An inspection of the Natchez port was scheduled for January 25, with acceptance of the new port facility expected at the time. The Natchez port was constructed at a cost of a little more than half a million dollars and has a 300-acre industrial district adjacent to it. The U. S. Corps of Engineers will turn over operations of the Vicksburg Harbor Project to the Warren County Port Commission on February 4. Construction of the 245-acre industrial fill and adjacent channel began in 1956 and cost over \$5,000,000 to construct. Bids will be opened early next month on the initial work on the Greenville harbor project, which includes an industrial fill and other improvements to the port.

Beef Cattle Business Big In Mississippi

Beef cattle is big business in Mississippi. Members of the Mississippi Cattlemen's Association, which convened in Jackson earlier this month, learned that the value of all animals sold or slaughtered in the City of Jackson in 1960 amounted to \$59,000,000. Miss. has the largest beef cattle pop. in any Southern state east of the Mississippi river. The state's beef cattle alone total more than 1,700,000 head and are valued at over \$170,000,000.

Oyster Business Booms At Jackson County Reef

An estimated half million dollars may be plucked this year off an oyster reef in the Mississippi Sound off the Jackson coast line. Claude A. Moody, assistant chief inspector for the Marine Conservation Commission, said an estimated 3000 barrels of oysters are being harvested daily from the reef off Middle river east of Gautier. An average of 75 tonging boats are working the reef daily.

Mississippi Power & Light To Spend \$7.25 Million

The Mississippi Power & Light Company will spend more than \$7.25 million on construction during 1961, according to an announcement by Baxter Wilson, president of the utility. The major portion of the 1961 construction, some \$5,103,000 will go for the company's distribution system.

Stone County Voters For Pickle Factory Bond Issue

Stone county electors voted their approval of a \$450,000 BAWI (Balance Agricultural With Industry) bond issue to finance expansion of a Wiggins pickle plant this month by a vote of 1,989 to 22. Proceeds of the bond issue will be used to expand the facilities of the Brown-Miller pickle plant.

Local Business

Several years ago, a major furniture store in Buffalo instituted an advertising policy which deserves the attention of small city retailers anywhere.

The manager of the store, Kobler & Miller, became convinced that the advertising in his metropolitan area utilize small community newspapers.

Milton Stevenson, store manager at that time, explained his policy: Residents look forward to their weekly chronicle for the chatty, personal type news that is usually found only in this type newspaper.

"If a metropolitan store makes a consistent bid for furniture business through ads in suburban weeklies, it can pull customers who might otherwise buy in their communities."

This statement should be especially enlightening to merchants in small cities who often complain about loss of business to metropolitan cities. For here is a metropolitan merchant expressing his admiration for the advertising medium which is available to every local retailer.

It is an admission that the local merchant has an everlasting advantage if he uses it.

The local merchant has a location advantage; he has the advantage of community loyalty. If these advantages are not working for him, it is probably because he has failed to make use of his third advantage — local newspaper advertising.

Washington Report

From U. S. Senator John Stennis

The South led the fight, and the Senate preserved its Rules by a close vote in the first battle of the 1961 Congress.

At a time when observance of the 100th Anniversary of the Civil War was being restaged in many historic points, the Halls of Congress became the battleground

against forces that would wipe out the filibuster, our most dependable weapon against vicious civil rights legislation and other unsound proposals.

Those who favored opening the floodgates on civil rights legislation at this Session of the Congress wanted to rewrite the time-honored Rules by which the United States Senate conducts its business.

Under the present Senate Rules, unlimited debate (commonly called filibuster) has been the practice and it cannot be shut off or shop and it cannot be shut off or stop-tors present and voting on the matter should vote in favor of such a shutdown on debate.

The proposals which a strong group of liberals hurled at us from the opening of the 1961 Session would permit majority of all elected Senators to halt debate and force a vote.

The South rallied against this effort to force a "gag" rule on the Senate. Two days before the Senate was ready to vote on the question, I made a major speech on the Senate floor, opposing the liberal movement to "gag" us.

Among the things I said in that two-hour speech were these:

"A vote to gag the Senate or hinder free debate here in the United States Senate is a violation of the trust of the State and her people who sent us here to represent them and to protect and defend their rights."

"This is no sectional matter. It is not just a contest over civil rights. The Senate as an institution of free debate is at stake. The Senate as an institution of deliberation is at stake. The proposed change would virtually destroy the historic role of the Senate which has filled for almost 200 years."

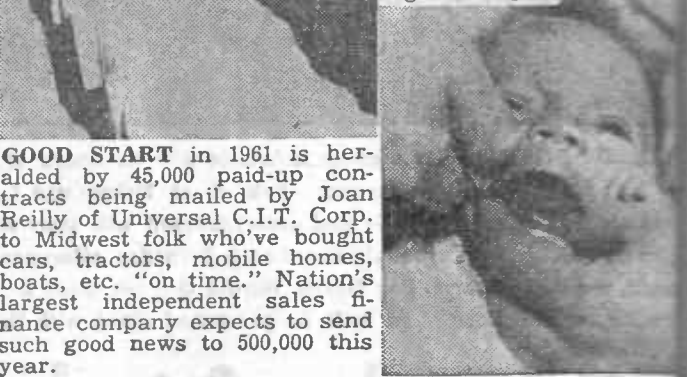

Like it or not, some do and some do not, John Fitzgerald Kennedy is President of the United States, the most influential position in the world. He comes into power in a dangerous and shaky era. His work is cut out for him, as much, if not more, than that of any former President.

Kennedy did not become President under the most favorable circumstances, either within his own political party or within the Government. Democrats got off to a very ugly start on Capitol Hill.

Life's Hunger

Lesson for February 5, 1961

CHRIST could turn stones into bread, if he could somehow start with a boy's lunch and build into a meal for five thousand men with their wives and children, why did he not keep on doing it? No doubt he could have turned stones into bread; but he never tried to do it. Nobody who was out there in the wilderness the day Jesus fed the five thousand had the least doubt that Jesus' powers were unlimited.

We wonder that Dr. Foreman (as John tells us) they tried to make him king by force . . . But Jesus steadily refused to repeat the miracle. Jesus loved people, but he was not one to do everything he was asked to do. He was not even going to do all the kind things he was asked to do. For surely it would have been a kindness to make life easier for the poverty-stricken people of Galilee. Surely there must have been many who were hungry, because we hear of no one crying for cake, or bread with butter (they would have said, "Give us this bread, and we will be satisfied.") Just bread, again, please, again! But there was no more. Was Jesus heartless? Had his power failed him?

Hunger For Bread

Now hunger for bread is one of the elemental things in life. Quite civilized people, once they become really hungry, act like savages, act like wild dogs. One would think Jesus would not have rebuked the people for wanting what human beings, living creatures, cannot help wanting. We were not there, we cannot interview any one and find out for certain just why Jesus spoke as he did; but from various hints, we can guess. For the thing he knew that all the people in Galilee who were sharers in the great "miracle of the loaves and fishes" had managed somehow to keep alive and going, all their lives up to that day. Some of them were lazier than average, of course, but even a lazy man, if hungry enough, will work. So Jesus knew that what they wanted was not to do was not simply to feed them.

The Starved Soul

Jesus, moreover, took this opportunity to impress an idea on the people of Capernaum, an idea which was true but which they were not quite able to swallow. It only are endless free meals to make a man worthless; it is even bought-and-paid-for, well balanced diets, can be a drag on the spirit. Life has other dangers. Physical hungers are loud and crude. But there are other hungers whose voice is quieter, more dormant, in some lives than in others. These are the hungers, they may call them so, these are the hungers of mind and spirit. When we refer to a man or woman as having lived a "full life" we do not mean that steak was served them for dinner every day. There are appetites that can be cultivated, but if they are not, they may die away. The hunger for peace, for peace, the hunger for the soul for God. These can be smothered by an abundance of bread.

Bread of God

the farm. In a few instances the farmer uses all his land for grass and woodland. Some of these are L. E. Skinner, Roe Daniel and Eugene Glover, who devote practically all their land to grass and woodland. There are other landowners in the county who also use their land in this way.

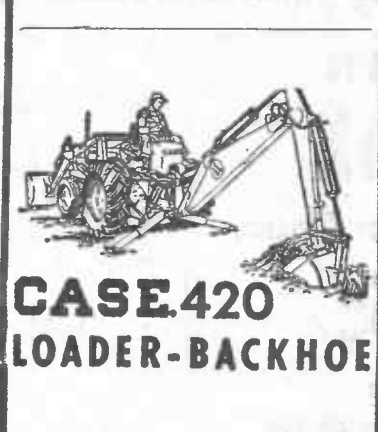
In most instances, however, the farmer begins by converting a few acres here and a few acres there from row crops to pasture or to pines. Usually, these areas are too steep or too eroded for continuous row cropping.

As landowners find employment elsewhere they convert more and more of their steep and eroded cropland to pasture and to pine trees. Because of this a large number of farmers living in Tishomingo County have converted a great number of acres to pasture and to pines.

The chief reasons for making this change in land use are:

1. Reduction of cotton acreage.
2. New markets for woodland products.
3. A greater interest in livestock.
4. Greater job opportunities for people of this county. Landowners are able to secure part-time of full-

time employment off the farm.

5. Introduction of new pasture plants that thrive on the upland in Tishomingo County.

The soil Conservation personnel are pleased with this improved and better use of the land. They work constantly with landowners who desire to make needed land use adjustments.

These technicians and the farmer are confronted with the problems of increasing the crop yield on reduced row crop acreage through drainage, row arrangement and the application of other good practices.

They are also confronted with the problem of fitting the right kind of pasture plants to a particular field. These and other problems are being solved.

As a result of all these factors, the trend in Tishomingo County is that land owners are using more of their land for pine trees and for pasture. This is proving to be good for both the landowner and the land.

Home Agent Notes

Before you buy materials and patterns for your spring sewing, check your body measurements. They may have changed since you last bought a pattern.

You can't judge your pattern size by the size you wear in ready-to-wear garments. If you wear a size 14 dress, then you

may need a size 16 to 18 pattern.

Make a record of your measurements. Then compare them with the chart of measurements you'll find in the front or back of pattern books. This will help you determine the pattern that requires the least alteration.

To take your measurements, use a tape measure that won't stretch. So you will know your natural waistline, tie a string around your waist before taking measurements. Measure over a well-fitting foundation garment and simple dress with set-in sleeves.

Patterns are bought by bust measure, but waist and hip measurements may influence your decision. Measure your bust over the fullest part with a tight tape. Take a snug waist measurement, following your natural waistline. Measure 7 inches below the waist or around the fullest part of your hip line. To get your chest measure, use a snug tape with the tape high at the armpits.

After buying your pattern, check it with the measurements of a dress that fits your body measurements, plus allowance for ease.

Foot Grooming

A little care and cream will pay off for your hose budget. Chapped legs will snag dress-up nylons. Scrub feet and legs briskly during daily bath or shower. Rub a bit of lotion on feet and legs to keep skin smooth.

Another cause of runs in nylons is rough heels. Smooth heels with a pumice stone. You can buy one at any drugstore.

Low Cost Protection

Each working day during the past year Federal meat inspectors of the U. S. Department of Agriculture kept about a million pounds of unfit meat from reaching U. S. consumers.

They inspected and approved more than 107 million animals at 1,396 meat-packing establishments in 572 cities. The protection of our national meat supply is provided for about a penny a month for each person.

Refrigerator Size

A rule of thumb from the U. S. D. A. for determining refrigerator size is: Buy 6 cubic feet for the first two people in the family plus 2 cubic feet for entertaining and 1 cubic foot for each additional family member. For some people this is ample, but may be conservative for others.

Feeder Pig Sale

The third quarterly Area Feeder Pig Sale at Booneville last Thursday was a success for both the seller and buyer. Six hundred and forty pigs were sold for an average of 28 cents per pound or approximately \$14.00 per head. There was enough buyers at the sale to have bought 1500 more pigs had there been that many pigs consigned to the sale.

The future of this Area Feeder Pig Sale looks good. The sale is offering good quality pigs in lots large enough to attract buyers from all over Mississippi and adjoining states.

The next sale will be Thursday, April 20 and another sale will be on July 20. I would like to encourage farmers to keep these quarterly sale dates in mind and breed your sows so they will farrow right for the sales if you are interested in participating in the sales.

The weight limit set up for the sale is pigs weighing between 30 and 90 pounds. The pigs that seem to be the most in demand and bring more to the farmer is the 50 to 60 pound pigs.

A farmer with ten sows could have five litters of pigs for each quarterly sale and should gross around \$1500 per year from Feeder Pigs.

Forestry Notes

All indications show that Tishomingo County and surrounding areas should have a very successful tree planting season this year. This feeling is shared by foresters and landowners alike. This optimistic view is based on two factors; ideal planting conditions and a supply of high quality tree seedlings available to landowners.

Many foresters believe that the remaining portion of the planting season, January to mid-March, offers the best conditions for tree planting. Recent rainfall has built up an ample supply of soil moisture which is vital in tree planting. Pathologists from the Southern Forest Experiment Station have examined the seedlings in all three Mississippi Forestry Commission nurseries, and found them to be of high quality and nearly 100 percent free of disease and insect infestations.

I am sure that many have heard people say "if only I had known how valuable timber was going to be." You cannot get anything accomplished by bemoaning the lost past. But we can use the part as a guide for the future and start planting trees to be available when the demand for timber is expected to be high. We cannot meet these demands unless we start planting and growing more trees now.

The Mississippi Forestry Commission still has loblolly, slash, and shortleaf pine seedlings available for distribution to Mississippi landowners. Each landownership is eligible to receive 1,000 free seed-

Farm Facts

Value of farm real estate per farm—not including dwellings—rose from \$11,278 in 1950 to \$25,308 in 1960, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

While the total value of farm real estate increased sharply during the same period, the percentage was not as marked as the increase "per farm." Total market value of farm real estate in 1960 was estimated at \$129.1 billion. This compares with \$75.3 billion in 1950 and \$33.6 billion in 1940.

A factor in the increase in value of real estate per farm is that real estate values have been climbing while the number of farms has been declining.

Farm buildings accounted for about 22% of the total value of farm real estate. About half of this was accounted for by dwellings of farm operators.

Nationally, the average value of farm real estate amounted to about \$111 per acre.

Farm Facts

Even with modern equipment and techniques, farmers put in a long workday in comparison with that of many of us. The U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service notes that the workday for farmers across the United States averages 10.6 hours during the month of June, and its length isn't changing much.

What's more, the operator puts in a longer day than his hired hand, on the average. The average workday for hired workers on farms in June totals 9.3 hours.

You probably might get an argument on this but the statistics reveal that, in June, farmers work longer hours in the North Central states than anywhere else—11.3 hours.

Wisconsin farm operators top the list, working 12.2 hours. Their counterparts in Florida and Nevada average 9.1 hours. The Florida farm hand knocks off after 8.4 hours, while the North Dakota hired worker puts in an average of 10.6 hours in June—longest day of any.

The North Dakota farm hand works 7.9 hours in December and the Wisconsin operator works 10.6 hours. Florida operators and hired workers put in 7.4 and 7.6 hours, respectively.

Farm Facts

Planting seed is no little item on the list of production expenses showing up on the U. S. farmer's balance sheet. The amount of seed bought annually in the past few years has averaged about \$530,000,000.

Efficient farmers, however, consider the money spent for high-grade planting seed a sound investment. They realize that plant breeders have spent years developing and improving varieties.

Hybrid corn is a good example. Average retail price paid by farmers for hybrid corn has been about \$11 a bushel. In 15 years, however, hybrid seed corn jumped U. S. corn yields by 43%.

All of us are reaping the benefits of plant breeding. Good seed, for example, assures vegetable growers of a high quality, uniform product. These vegetables end up in the produce bin at your supermarket.

Commercial vegetable seed growers, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, usually account for 95% of the total commercial production

The Mississippi Income Tax Law

The Mississippi Income Tax Law first enacted on March 16, 1924, imposed a tax of 1% on the net income of every individual or corporation in excess of \$2,500.00. This law was amended on April 1, 1924, and by a modernized statute modeled after the Federal tax law then in force, and has been changed little since time. Exemptions and rates have been changed by ten sessions of the legislature since 1924. The provisions of the statute are identical with those originally enacted.

Particular reference must be made to the fact that reduction in rate and increase in specific exemptions is effective January 1, and relates only to income realized on or after that date.

The yield has varied greatly during this period. During 1932, our income tax produced a total of \$288,498.40. The high was 1960 when the State collected income taxes in the sum of \$4,634,777.

An annual report of net income required by the Mississippi State Tax Law, from every corporation, trust, estate, partnership, fiduciary, regardless of the amount of gross or net income realized during the taxable period. The law is more liberal in its application to individuals. It requires a return of net income from individuals if (1) the net income exceeds exemption, or (2) if the gross exceeds \$6,000.00. 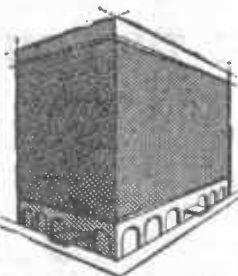

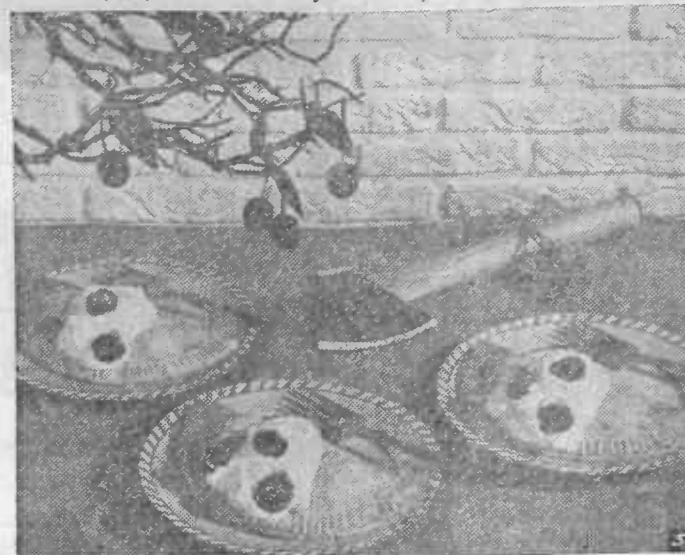

CHERRY TURNOVERS

Makes 6 Turnovers
One 1 lb. 6-oz. can cherry pie filling
2 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
1 cup shortening
Heat oven to hot (425°F.). Spoon 1/2 cup liquid from cherries. (This can be served over vanilla pudding or ice cream.) Reserve 12 to 18 cherries for garnish. Sift together flour and salt. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse crumbs; add rolled oats, mixing lightly. Add water a little at a time, stirring lightly until pastry can be formed into ball.
Divide dough into six parts. Roll each out on lightly floured board or canvas to form a circle. Cut into 7-inch circles. Place 2 tablespoons cherry pie filling on half of each; fold over; seal edges with fork. Cut slits in top.
Bake in preheated oven (425°F.) 15 minutes or until edges are golden brown. Serve warm with whipped cream garnished with cherries.

to overcome their handicap, and in order to help the veteran in choosing a program best suited to him.

Q—A non-veteran friend and I want to go into business. As a Korean veteran, am I entitled to a GI loan on this partnership business?

A—Yes. If otherwise eligible but the amount of the loan on which VA's guaranty is based will be in proportion to your own interest in the loan, and will not cover any portion of the loan constituting the non-veteran's contribution to the business.

Q—As a "peacetime veteran," am I eligible for VA hospitalization?

A—Only under these two conditions: (1) If you were discharged under other than dishonorable conditions for a disability incurred in line of duty, or (2) If you are receiving compensation for a service-connected or service-aggravated disability or disease.

Q—My World War II GI insurance policy, on the endorsement plan, matures soon. May I receive the proceeds of the policy in monthly installments for the rest of my life?

A—No. You may choose one of two payment plans: (1) lump sum, or (2) equal monthly payments ranging from 36 to 240 installments, in multiples of 12.

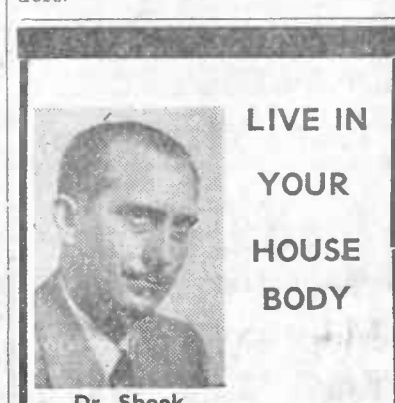

State People Gave More During 1960

Mississippi firms and individuals contributed approximately \$2,400,000 for all philanthropic purposes in 1960 according to an analysis just completed. The total includes annual budgets and capital funds raised for all institutions and organizations in the state dependent upon philanthropic support. The estimated amount of giving by Mississippi and other individual states is based on a three-year average percentage of contributions as related to personal income. Mississippi's philanthropic record compares favorably with that of other states.

Time To File For Homestead Exemption

Local and county tax assessors are now ready to take applications for homestead exemption for 1961. This must be done during the months of January, February, and March. If property was acquired in

1960, the deed must be taken along; and if prior to 1960, only last year's exemption papers must be carried along. Every eligible home owner in Mississippi who takes advantage of this exemption will get a savings in taxes. Last day is April 1.

Tree Crops

Throughout Mississippi and the South, more and more farmers are turning their attention to crops of trees, a relatively new type of cultivation that is becoming increasingly important in the regional economy. Well-managed woodlands yield much fine material for paper manufacture and other forest-based industries, in addition to qualify sawtimber for lumber mills.

1960 Industrial Progress

1960 was a banner year for industrial progress, and there is cause to hope that Mississippi's industrial development can enjoy even greater advances in 1961 than were registered in the year just ended. More diversification of industry appears in store for Mississippi during coming months, and this is a factor that should aid not only the industrial development field, but the entire economy as well.
