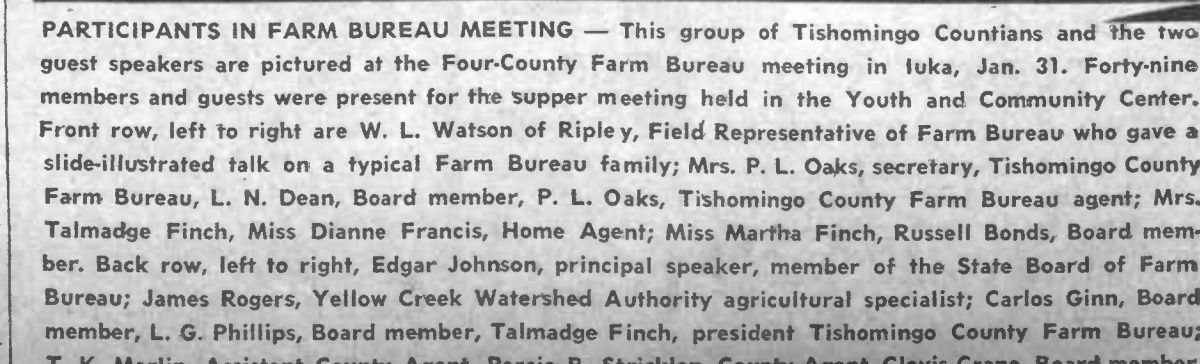
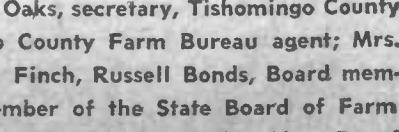

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Untidiness Hurts The City

At the top of this page we carry the proud slogan, "Home of Beautiful Mineral Springs Park and Gateway to Pickwick Lake, A Fisherman's Paradise."

And we will defend that slogan against all comers because we are proud of Iuka, the position it has in relation to the great recreational area of Pickwick Lake, as well as our own beautiful park with its stately trees, pavilion-covered natural springs of health giving mineral waters, playground, tennis courts and handsome brick Youth and Community Center building. We believe this feeling of pride is shared by the majority of the residents here.

But visitors to Iuka, vacationers on their way to the lakes, tourists coming through town, are not impressed by our "feelings." They are impressed by what they see.

When they see the sidewalks tobacco splattered, littered with chewing gum wrappers (and chewed gum without wrappers) and other litter, they will have the same impression we would have upon entering a town that presented an untidy appearance, namely, "the people don't care what the place looks like, do they?"

When visitors see our bragged-about Mineral Springs Park with a rag-tag assortment of cold drink cans and bottles, milk-shake cups, sandwich wrappers, paper bags, cardboard lunch boxes, etc., lining its edges, they will not see its "beauty" as we see it. We may be proud as heck of our park, and invite tourists and others to tarry awhile with us and enjoy the hospitality of the city, but tourists — and the tourist season will soon be in full swing — will not even stop for a second look at the place in its present bedraggled state.

There are trash cans placed near the picnic area in the park. A little consideration on the part of those who drive down there to eat their lunches or snacks, in taking the trouble to throw the litter in the cans, would greatly improve the situation. Especially so during the winter months when a regular caretaker is not on duty in the park.

Almost no town looks its best in the winter, we know. But that is all the more reason why care should be taken to keep it from looking its worst!

Iuka is the Gateway to Pickwick Lake from the south, east and west. We are in a strategic position to catch the tourist trade as vacation time brings visitors to the river and lake just north of us. We want the tourist trade. Tourists will bring as many dollars into the local economy as a good sized industry. And an attractive city will do much to attract tourists and make them want to stop here.

But even if we were not in such a good tourist area and had no special reason to appeal to visitors, we would still have our self-respect and pride in our city and want it to look its best — for us. Untidiness hurts the city — anytime.

More about the Rules Committee (although you probably have had enough) —

Slaughtering the Rules Committee was akin to hanging a man because somebody thought he might commit murder next spring. The Committee had not murdered any of Kennedy's program. Someone just surmised it might. Hence, the hurried hanging, and burial, without benefit of trial, or clergy. By the way, Kennedy never asked for this scrap. He never actually ur-

ged the "packing." He clearly stated the issue was one for Congress, not for the President. The Rules "packers" tried to make it Kennedy's fight; but it wasn't and he never said it was. Regrettably, however, he made no effort to stop it. So, as we said before, he is left in a bad day on the Hill, which is most regrettable. We hope things work out, as Kennedy has the opportunity and the ability to make a good President and we certainly hope he will.

The fight to "pack" was won with assists of false propaganda bordering on the ridiculous. For instance, one Southerner who joined the radicals to "pack" told the press (his statement was published in one of our home papers) that "special interests" were bringing pressure against "packing" so they could keep farmers from getting 90-percent of parity, the elderly from getting medical care, the little school children from getting schools, the working people from getting minimum wage, and some people from getting housing. How ridiculous! Every 8th grade child knows these programs have time and time again come to the House floor through the Rules Committee. They will all be there if the legislature committees act favorably. The Rules Committee gave assurance that Kennedy's program would get to the floor. But this Member, with a great display of courage,

just up and told the folks — yes, he did — that some old bad goblins and "special interests" (whoever they are) were not going to scare and "club" him into turning against "his people and district." No, sir! He left the inference that we who opposed committee "packing" were turning against our districts and yielding to some nefarious element — all of which is a lot of hogwash. By the way, after the fight was over the "packers" had won, this Member was put on the Rules Committee.

There are slow-downs in the House. There should be! There are also stop-and-go lights on our streets. To legislate at unchecked speed is dangerous. Sure, the Rules Committee has thrown up "GO SLOW" signals. So has the Speaker. So has the Majority Leader. So have the legislative committees — everyone at some time or another. We have seen times when the Majority leader carried a bill around for weeks in his hip pocket, refusing to put it on the House program even though approved by both the appropriate legislative committee and the Rules Committee.

Legislative committees lock up from 12,000 to 15,000 bills in each Congress. Their pigeon-holes make those of the Rules Committee look like hummingbird nests.

The Senate has a more effective "GO SLOW" rule than the House. The discreet refer to it as the "privilege of extended discussion;" most folks just call it what it is, "filibuster." The House has its "GO SLOW" rules, too, but none as effective as the one big one — filibuster — in the Senate. Without these rules of caution an unruly Congress would run wild, just as traffic would without stop-and-go lights. Why destroy the carefully made rules of Congress — rules that have lasted for decades and under which the Congress has led our country to greatness? By the way, they have a Congress in Cuba, too, yes they do, a packed Congress that is. Its rules and procedure are not exactly ideal. But, if one wants speed, then they have it.

Well, the fight is over. The Committee stands "packed." The "GO SLOW" signals are down. The governor has been taken off and the legislative mill is free to run wild. Maybe some restraint will show up from somewhere. Let us hope. One thing for sure, this writer will never have any more faith in a "packed" Rules Committee than he has in a "packed" jury or a "packed" court.

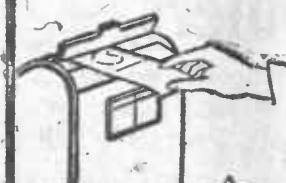

Pecan Demand Exceeds Supply

Grocery shoppers with a sharp eye and appetite for quality convenience foods soon will demand 100% more pecans than the present crop now supplies, says the National Pecan Shellers and Processors Association. Unique in an era of surpluses, the average yearly pecan crop of 150 million pounds only half meets the estimated demand of 300 million pounds per year. Said to be a conservative estimate, this forecast is based on the population boom and the steadily increasing popularity of convenience foods.

Tomorrow's homemaker, say industry spokesmen, will have so sophisticated tastes, more money to spend and a better knowledge of nutrition. Processors of such items as bakery goods, frozen salads, desserts and heat-and-eat main dishes are making plans now to meet these new demands. It is anticipated that pecans will have greatly increased usage as an appetite-appeal ingredient in many of these products.

Pecan prices to the grower have held steadily high for the last five years. In many areas, pecans rank among the top money crops. The comparatively low costs of growing, cultivating and harvesting, plus the ready market, has focused attention on the need for up-grading and increasing production. Presently, research is being done by the U.S.D.A. and by extension horticulturists to help the individual grower reap the cash rewards the greater demand for pecan crop will bring. Special attention is being given to the individual requirements of growers in various areas. This new information on planting, fertilization, disease and insect control is available to growers from county agents throughout the producing area.

This includes 58 deer (bucks and does) killed by archers and 163 does killed on three areas in Bolivar County which were overpopulated. As has been the case for several years, Bolivar was far in front with a kill of well over a thousand deer. Issaquena was next with 692 and Warren with 568. The 1958-59 deer kill in Mississippi totaled 5,234, and in 1959-60 reached 7,713.

Veterans Corner

I am receiving railroad retirement payments and also veteran's pension. In filling out the questionnaire received from VA, do I report my railroad retirement payments as "annual" or "anticipatory for 1961, or exempted?"

If you are receiving pension under the old pension law, count your railroad retirement income. If you came on pension rolls after June 30, or changed from the old to new law after that date, you report as income all railroad retirement you contributed to the retirement fund?

Death Compensation is paid to survivors of servicemen whose death, due to an injury or disease incurred before January 1, 1958, is dependent on the service of the deceased. Indemnity is paid to survivors of servicemen and veterans who were killed in action or from a service-connected disability after that date. Compensation rates are set and vary only according to the number of dependents. Dependents are included in the Indemnity Compensation. It is based partially on the rank of the veteran at the time of death.

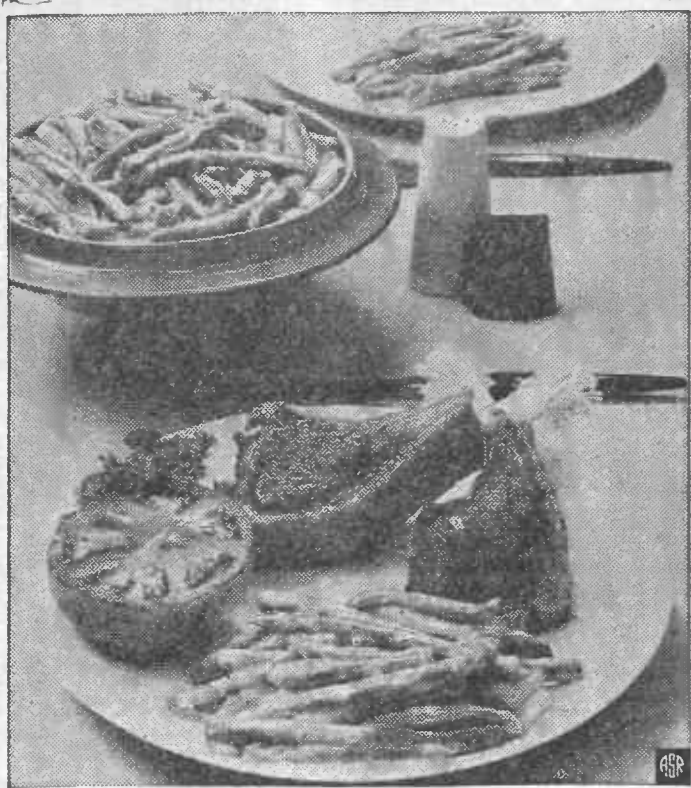
Where can I apply for VA benefits?

Application for domiciliary care may be made by the veteran or his guardian or representative at any VA office.

Do VA offices and hospitals exist in the new states, Alaska and Hawaii?

There are VA offices in both Alaska and Hawaii. However, there are no hospitals in either one of the new states. Veterans are cared for through contract beds in military hospitals.

Savory Sauce For Green Beans



Bright broiled tomato halves, richly browned lamb chops and "Green Beans with Mustard Sauce" make a colorful, flavorful main course for dinner.

Round out the meal with a green salad, crisp bread sticks and a warm fruit dessert.

Thoroughly drain 1 (1 lb.) can blue lake green beans. Melt 2 tablespoons butter in saucepan. "If the ancient Roman 'Feast of Lupercalia' hadn't undergone a radical change through the years, we'd now be readying a February 14th celebration that the young men of this nation might welcome"—according to Bert Bacharach, columnist, author and authority on abstract information.

"On Lupercalia," according to Bacharach, a student of Roman civilization, "every unmarried woman put her name in a box and, at the height of the celebration, the young Roman bucks drew the girls' names. The one selected by each man became his sweetheart for the next year and gifts and tender messages were exchanged."

"The messages—our Valentine cards—are all that's left of Lupercalia for the man," sadly noted Bacharach. Home Agent Notes

Many cotton fabrics are given a resin finish to make them crease resistant. This makes the fabric hard to press, to press in hemlines, to press darts and seams and to remove wrinkles. The crease that forms on the fold in a bolt of fabric is hard to remove.

Heat, pressure and moisture alone will not remove the creases. Research at Auburn University has found that through use of fomic acid or white vinegar you can move the yarns in the finish enough to remove wrinkles or even put in creases.

Since on some fabric acid damage the fabric as well as remove the resin, use carefully. It might be well to use on a scrap first, testing effect on color.

To remove wrinkles, make a 10 percent solution of fomic acid or vinegar solution. You will need a medicine dropper, iron and ironing board.

1. Iron wrinkled fabric area with steam iron first, making the surface area hot.

2. Apply the solution over the wrinkled area with a medicine dropper.

3. Let stand for a minute or two until the solution is absorbed.

4. Then run the iron over the area until it is dry. Repeat the process if the wrinkle doesn't come out.

To put in crease, try this process. Use it when sewing on resin finish cotton to get sharp creases and edges on hems, seams, facings and collars, and for permanent pleats.

1. Press in pleat as you want it to look when finished.

2. Along the edges of the pleat, apply the acid solution with medicine dropper. Press until dry.

3. Press the under edge of pleat in the same way, from the wrong side.

4. Press entire garment or pleat then let hang undisturbed for 4 or 5 hours.

Corn Production

Good hybrid seed will usually produce around 25 percent more than the best non-hybrid corn seed. The better the management, the more hybrid corn pays.

Yet only 65 percent of the corn acreage in Mississippi was planted to hybrid corn in 1960. Why? Second year hybrid from the crib loses around 23 percent. It is no better than the best non-hybrid.

Let's make more corn per acre. Here are a few tips:

Use a recommended hybrid. Spacing is important. Spacing and fertilizer go hand in hand. Around 12,000 plants per acre give the best use of land, moisture, fertilizer and sunlight. That is one stalk every 12 to 14 inches apart on 38 to 42 inch rows.

Fertilizer also pays. It will return \$4 for every \$1 invested in fertilizer. Corn needs 90 to 120 pounds of nitrogen, 48 pounds of potash and 48 pounds of phosphate.

Flat break the land deeply. Plant early — by June 30.

Crispy Chicken Cumberland



During the cool weather, when outdoor exercise slows down, you're likely to put on unwelcome pounds. Low-calorie chicken is a pleasant way to combat the calorie count.

Take Crispy Chicken Cumberland, for instance. It looks like fried chicken and tastes like fried chicken, but it has added virtues. It bakes in the oven, needs no watching or turning, and requires no extra fat in the cooking. Crispy Chicken Cumberland can be prepared in advance for company, popped into the oven when guests arrive, and forgotten until serving time.

With the chicken goes an elegant sweet-and-tart fruit sauce, which may be omitted if you're watching your weight.

Chicken With Cumberland Sauce

1 broiler-fryer chicken, cut in 1/2 serving pieces
1 cup packaged corn flake crumbs
1 teaspoon Ac'cent
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
Heavy duty aluminum foil
1/2 cup evaporated milk

Combine corn flake crumbs with Ac'cent, salt and pepper in pie plate or shallow dish. Line shallow baking pan with aluminum foil. Dip chicken pieces in evaporated milk then roll immediately in seasoned corn flake crumbs. Place chicken pieces, skin side up, in foil-lined pan; do not crowd. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) about one hour, or until tender. No need to cover or turn chicken while cooking. Yield: 4 servings.

Cumberland Sauce

1 cup currant jelly
1 can (6 ounces) frozen concentrated orange juice, undiluted
1 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon ginger

Combine all ingredients in saucepan; stir and heat until mixture is smooth. Yield: 1 1/2 cups.

Exports continue high and are estimated at about 6.5 million bales for the 1960-61 season. As a result carry-over August 1, 1961, is expected to be about 7.0 million bales and the smallest since 1953. This is less than half the record high of 14.5 million bales in 1956.

Mississippi's share of the 1961 cotton allotment of 18,458,424 acres is 1,761,717 acres. This represents an increase of 225,463 acres or about 15 percent over 1960. Mississippi cotton farmers planted about 93 percent of the 1,536,254 acres allotted to the state in 1960. Growers who do not expect to plant their 1961 allotments are urged to release them to their county committee to preserve acreage history and prevent loss to economy.

Cotton must be planted on the farm at least one out of three years if the allotment is to be preserved.

For the 1961 crop there will be no choice A or B support level. Legislation specifies one support level between 70 and 90 percent of parity. Also, the quality to which the support level applies is changed from middling 7/8 inches to the average quality of the crop. After 1961 the lower limit will be 65 percent of parity.

The price of cotton is expected to be supported between 70-75 percent of parity. An announcement will be made by the Secretary of Agricultural sometime during February.

Last year Tishomingo County was allotted 10,232 acres of cotton. The 1961 allotment for the county is 10,521 acres.

Let's all do our best to plant the

10,521 acres. If you do not turn in your unplanted acres on your farm, you effect the entire economy of the county.

Last Line: A Chinese proverb says: "If you plan for a year, plant grain; if you plan for 10 years, plant a tree; if you plan for a hundred years, plant men." Why not plan for all three, and grow grain, and trees, and men?



Woodland Weeding

Woodland weeding is a high sounding term. It simply means removing weed trees from the woodland. Weed trees are trees of little value that are crowding out better trees. Just like crab grass crowds out cotton. Remove more sunlight and they will grow crab grass and the cotton will grow faster. Remove the weed trees and give the young pines under them a faster.

A closely related woodland practice is called salvage cutting. The difference in woodland cutting is that in salvage cutting desirable trees that have something wrong with them are cut.

A severe ice storm may break the tops out of the best pines, or a wind storm may uproot good trees. Where this has happened the owner may cut these trees and get what he can by selling them for pulp wood or saw logs. He is salvaging what he can from total loss.

Tennessee River Soil Conserva-

tion District cooperators and all other landowners in this area are fortunate in having a good market for pulp wood. However, some landowners might be tempted to clear cut their woodland, and to sell all their trees large enough to produce pulpwood. This practice is not recommended. It would be better to sell for pulp wood all trees harvested in woodland weeding and salvage cutting that can be sold.

By doing this a harvest cut can be made every few years from the same woodland area. Such management will result in greater soil and water conservation and more profit to the landowner.

Forestry Notes

Why should a farmer grow timber? Why should any other landowner grow timber? Why should we grow timber in Tishomingo County or any other place? These are some of the questions that I would like to help you answer to your own satisfaction.

Do you have a dollar bill in your pocket? If you do, take it out and look at it. This dollar bill and many others like it are some very good reasons for growing timber — tree farming as we call it.

Have you seen well managed stands of timber growing on lands of various wood using industries? Have you noticed how they are careful to mark the right trees to cut, leaving a full stand of the best trees to grow? Have you noticed how they kill or remove the trees which will not produce any salable product? Have you noticed how they protect their trees from insects, disease, and wild fires? These are some of the practices of tree farming.

You will not have to stretch your imagination very far to believe that trees will grow just as well on the small landowner's land as they will on the land of any big company. All that is necessary is for the small landowner to carry out the practices that will pay off in dollars and cents.

In Mississippi more than 25 percent of our income comes from the production and processing of timber and timber products. Take away more than one-fourth of our total income and our state would really be a poor place to live. Landowners, woods workers, factory workers, bankers, business men, churches, and schools would suffer.

If you are a farmer, just think of the importance of our timber crop. In some counties it exceeds the value of all other crops combined.

If you are a land owner who wants to plan ahead to greater income and more of the necessities and luxuries, you need to know more about the growing of timber as a crop. Your Mississippi Forestry Commission employs me as area forester to help you learn how to grow timber as a valuable crop for the greatest profit. Feel free to call on me with your woodland problems.

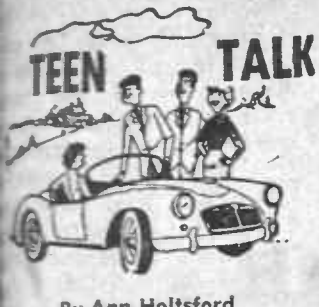

Food Sense — Not Nonsense

If you fall flat in mid-morning like a sour note from a short-winded player, you, like he, are suffering from power loss.

Your power loss can come from too little breakfast or too much. The conclusion of two scientists at the State University of Iowa who studied the reactions of junior high school boys, oldsters, and college men and women. Too much breakfast and their subjects all felt sluggish. Too little, and they could not work up to ability. The ideal breakfast, they found, supplied about one-fourth of the calories needed each day. This research denies a widely held belief: that breakfast should furnish as much as one-third of the day's calories.

You accomplish most—and feel like doing it—if you have your first meal within minutes after you roll out of bed, whether you are dedicated to a three- or six-meal plan for the day. Bating breakfast is good insurance for:

- plenty of life in the late morning.
- a solid step toward controlling your weight.
- No food is specially sacred to breakfast. You may want to start your day with a sandwich—toast if you like—and fruit. To save your power and not run down before noon, make your selections for breakfast from essential food groups recommended for each day's eating: Enriched whole grain bread and cereal, milk or cheese, egg or an alternate, fruits and vegetables.

Combine bran cereal and orange juice; let stand until most of moisture is taken up. Add egg, shortening and orange rind; beat well. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt and sugar. Add to first mixture together with prunes, stirring only until combined. Fill greased 8½-inch ring mold about ¾ full. Bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) about 25 minutes. Remove from ring mold; let cool.
