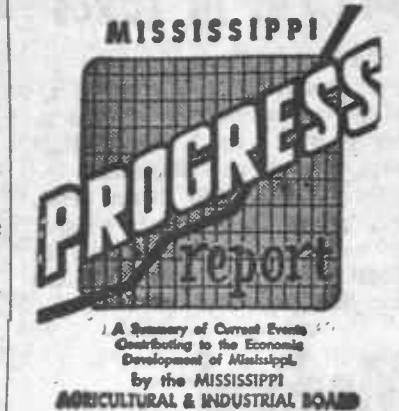
School Patrol Has Key Role In Safety

Effects of the Vicksburg development will be far reaching. Once a leading port on the Mississippi, the city has made its bid again to share in the commercial traffic.



Missile Parts Made In State

H. C. Yaeger, manager of the Vickers, Inc. plant at Jackson, announced early this month that the plant is producing parts for the compact packaged Auxiliary Power Unit for the Minuteman Missile. The long-range Minuteman is the land-based complement to the Polaris missile, which can be fired from submarines under water. The Jackson plant also produces components for the Polaris. In making the announcement, Yaeger said: "Jackson has certainly become a focal point in a very critical industry. We have been entrusted with this job over all other areas in the country. This can be attributed to the ability to train these people to perform critical operations and their inherent pride in workmanship." Earlier this month the Air Force successfully test fired a Minuteman missile from Cape Canaveral to a target 4,200 miles down the Atlantic range. One of the features of the land-based missile is its mobility. Plans are to have many of the Minuteman missiles mounted on railroad launching cars so that they can be dispatched to key positions on the North American continent.

State Officially Takes Over Port

The State of Mississippi is now operating the Port of Gulfport, following official transfer ceremonies at the port on February 9. The Agricultural and Industrial Board is operating the port through its ports and harbors department and through a five-man Gulfport State Port Authority. Governor Barnett, speaking at the transfer ceremony, emphasized the importance of the role the port is expected to play in boosting Mississippi's foreign trade.

Vicksburg Harbor Project Dedicated

Formal transfer of the \$5 million Vicksburg harbor project and industrial site from the U. S. Corps of Engineers to the Warren County Board of Supervisors was held February 4. The project will be under the administration of the Warren County Port Commission headed by E. W. Haining, with D. P. Westfall serving as port director. The harbor-industrial site, just north of the Vicksburg city limits, consists of a 250-acre industrial fill with an adjoining harbor channel running about three miles from the Yazoo River diversion canal to the Mississippi river. Formal transfer of the project was made by Major General Keith R. Barney, deputy for construction of the U. S. Corps of Engineers. It was accepted by president Albert E. Tucker of the Warren County Board of Supervisors. Others participating in the dedication ceremonies were Gov. Ross Barnett, Senator John C. Stennis, and Representatives Frank Smith and John Bell Williams.

Big Industrialization Of State Is Forecast

Widespread industrialization in Mississippi was forecast earlier this month by Secretary of State Heber

Ladner on the basis of increased collections for corporations qualifying for business during the past six months. "This is one of the best indices of the economic growth of a state," he said. "It shows stepped-up industrialization in Mississippi."

New Belzoni Plant To Manufacture Case Goods

C. I. Salisbury, of Peru, Indiana, new plant manager for Byco of Mississippi Inc., has arrived in Belzoni to begin operations of the plant. He said the plant should be in operation by the first of March. The new industry will manufacture case goods or promotional furniture, consisting of chests of drawers, dressers, utility cabinets, desks and bunk beds.

Concrete Firm To Open Plant In Columbia

The Polk Concrete Products Co., of Jackson will open a plant in Columbia which is expected to go into operation around March 15, according to local officials. The company manufactures culvert pipe, sewer pipe, drain tile, stepping stones, house piers and precast septic tanks. No bond issue will be required for the plant, although the new firm plans to construct a dry kiln 50 by 100 feet and an office building.

Changes In Your Social Security

"If you are farming and sold \$600 or more in produce from your farm, you can get social security credits even though you lost money in 1960," Hugh Tigrett, Manager of the Tupelo Social Security Office said today. This means Tishomingo County farmers can build up social security protection for themselves and their families. Keeping accurate and complete records of all income and expenses of your farming operation is good business all the time, but it is particularly important when it is time to file your tax returns. Keeping good records now and filing your tax returns on time means faster social security payments when you reach retirement age or in the event of your death, when your family applies for social security payments. The amount of the payments depend on the earnings you report. The tax on 1960 earnings is 4 1/2% of your net earnings up to \$4800.

If you are going to apply for social security benefits this year, Mr. Tigrett suggests you have an extra copy of 1961 income tax return and Schedule F made for social security. Bring this extra copy with you when you apply, so you can get credit for all of your earnings under social security. Farmers are traditionally the most conservative group of American citizens.

They certainly are people who could be expected to spend money carefully. For this reason their attention toward advertising deserves attention.

Every newspaper man and retail operator in a small city knows that farmers believe in advertising. They are continuously reminded of the fact because farm families so often come into town with the local newspaper in hand, looking for specific items which have been advertised.

For years farmers have been among the most consistent users of want ads in local newspapers, advertising everything from eggs to used tractors.

More recently, groups of farmers have become some of the largest advertisers in the nation. Examples are the fruit growers of Florida and California, cotton farmers and dairy farmers. Such advertising makes use of both local and national media.

A recent statement by the American Dairy Association reveals the attitude of the modern farmer toward advertising:

"Estimates suggest dairy farmers now spend in excess of 10 million dollars annually on promotion progress . . .

"That this money comes from the dairy farmers should be proof enough that this revolution in thinking about marketing farm products has come about . . .

"Dairy farmers have learned that people buy milk products when consumers find reasons that are pleasing for them to do so . . ."

Interesting Facts About the Food We Eat

Of every 20c spent on groceries, \$1.50 to \$2 goes for packaging, to keep the food in good condition and to draw the customer's attention to the product.

Food's still a good buy. Since 1947-49, the cost of food has risen only 19.5 percent compared to transportation costs, 46.1 percent; rent 41.4 percent; fuel, 36.3 percent.

Bread has one of the highest marketing margins. The farmer gets less than 3 cents for a 20-cent loaf.

Three "ready-to-serve" meals cost a family of four \$6.70 prepared at home, these meals would cost only \$4.50, but require 4 hours more work by the housewife.

Sometimes the package may cost as much as the food itself.

As many as 5,000 different items fill the shelves of a modern supermarket.

If a Heart Attack Strikes

Call your doctor at once. Help the patient take the position in which he finds it easiest to breathe. This is usually half way between lying down and sitting up.

Don't attempt to carry or lift the patient except under the doctor's supervision. Loosen tight clothing such as belts and shirt collars. See that the patient doesn't get chilled, but don't pile on so many blankets that he starts to sweat. Don't give him anything to drink before the doctor arrives.

Chicken Pancake Wedges

Prepare 1 1/2 cups of medium thick white sauce and season with salt and pepper. Add a cup of cubed chicken and 1/2 cup of sliced mushrooms. Heat to serving temperature while cooking pancake.

Make pancake according to directions on mix box or by your favorite recipe. Add a dash of nutmeg and a suggestion of grated parsley. Make enough batter to serve four.

Pour the batter in a greased, hot skillet to make one large pancake. As soon as it is brown on one side, turn and continue cooking

until pancake is golden brown on other side.

Immediately place pancake on warmed platter, and pour half of the chicken sauce over the pancake. Then fold the cake in half and top with remaining sauce. Sprinkle with grated parsley and serve.

For more than four servings, double the sauce recipe and make two large pancakes. Keep the first pancake warm in the oven while the second one cooks. Pour sauce

over the first pancake, add second one and then the sauce. Cut into six pieces and use a spatula to

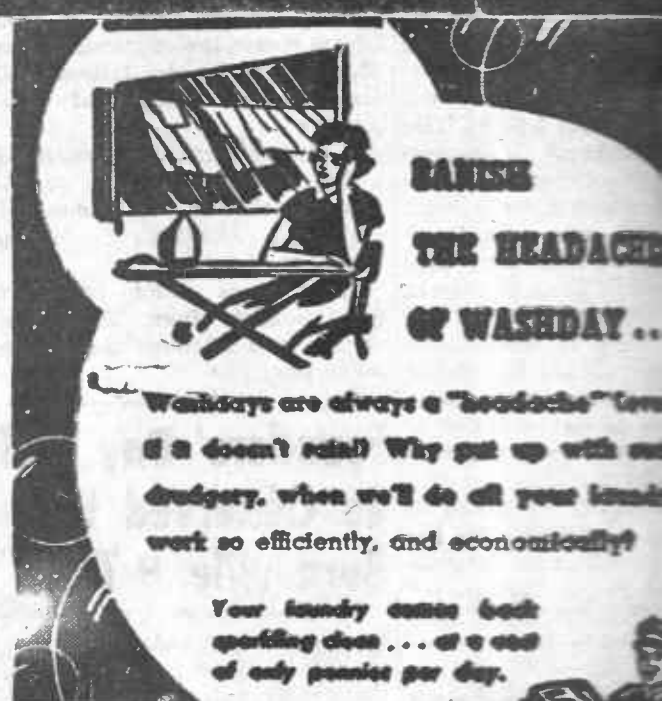

Mrs. F. R. Bruce Addresses Thursday Club

Mrs. F. R. Bruce of Eastport Beach addressed the Thursday Club, Feb. 9, at the meeting held in the home of Mrs. Plume Williams on Highway 25-S.

"In the Greek Temple," Mrs. Bruce said, "the western hemisphere contributed an architectural form of perfect dimensions." The "column" in Greek architecture became a favored style and lent itself to wide use in many architectural designs. The old Southern plantation home with its colonnaded porches got its inspiration from the Greek Temple. Many public buildings in the United States are patterned after the Greek style. The style was prevalent in Europe, too, and its influence continued long after the Greek pagan religion, which inspired the architecture had disappeared.

The architecture of the Gothic cathedral with its spires a dominant feature, reveals something of the religious inspiration, "the spires reaching up as though to touch God," Mrs. Bruce stated. "The style of the Gothic architect was seen in the gabled homes of the early colonists in New England in the 1600's," she said.

"The three-dimensional painter, the great masters such as Michaelangelo, da Vinci and others of the same school have never been excelled nor in the opinion of many, even equalled. The three-dimensional painter portrays width, height and depth, and the most classic examples of this style are the religious paintings of the old Italian masters."

"Three - dimensional paintings grew out of the emotion of religion and there are more great paintings on religious subjects than any other," Mrs. Bruce stated.

The 28 counties of North Mississippi have secured 139 new plants employing 25 or more, and 118 industries have announced or completed major expansions since September 1951, when the North Mississippi Industrial Development began operations.

Employment in these plants, when all are in full production,

will be approximately 30,500, accounting for a net gain of 25,300 new industrial jobs, as some declines were experienced in certain types of industry over the years. Since 1950 this area has secured almost one-half of Mississippi's net gain in industrial jobs and added \$80,600,000 in increased payrolls.

at Golden added to the industrial outlook for this area.

Golden Manufacturing Company Inc., has been issued a charter of incorporation by the State of Mississippi, and stock certificates for the new business are now being sold. A vacant school building has been made available for the establishment of the new firm. Gus Ballard and Jack Carpenter, associated with furniture plants in Booneville, Fulton and Cedar Hill, are two of the principals in the new company.
