Paper Mill Will Begin Operations

Huge Plant At Counce To Turn Out Finished Product Next Week

The recently completed \$30,000, 000 Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Mill at Counce, Tenn., expects to be in operation by the 7th or 8th of March, E. M. Leavitt, manager, stated Tuesday. The first lot of a paper product, Kraft liner board is expected to be finished and ready for shipment by March 10. This first shipment will be made to one of the three companies of the paper mill, Mr. Leavitt said.

As the huge industrial plant goes into operation it will employ between 350 and 400 persons and have a yearly payroll of around \$2,000,000. In full operation, the plant expects to spend between 5 and 6 million dollars yearly for pulpwood and wages for those working in the woods. Future expansion at the plant will increase the number of plant employees, "and we expect the plant to expand," the manager stated.

Plans are being made for holding open house at the plant sometime in the early part of June. The public will be given an opportunity to inspect the tremendous facility, the largest industrial plant to go into operation in this area. It will have a very great impact on the economy of the region and add much to the progress of the tri-state area.

Wins Boat And Trailer

Mrs. Bertha Newcomb, secretary-treasurer of the Tishomingo Farm Co-operative, has been notified that she won a 14-ft. fiber glass boat and trailer in a contest sponsored by Spencer Chemical Co., and Farm and Ranch Magazine. The boat and trailer was the first prize in the contest.

Miss. Receives Additional Money For Farm Loans

Advice has been received from FHA State Director, T. B. Fatherree, that Mississippi has been allocated an additional \$1,000,000 to be used in making operating loans to farmers who are unable to secure adequate credit from conventional sources. This allocation was made from a contingency fund authorized by Congress for the 1961 fiscal year and supplements the state previously. The additional funds will make it possible to serve all those who are eligible and need this type of assistance.

Applications for operating loans may be made at the Prentiss County office of the Farmers Home Administration. These loans may be used to pay for equipment, livestock, feed, seed, fertilizer, tractor fuel, and other farm and home operating needs, and to refinance chattel debts. The loans are scheduled for repayment in accordance with the borrower's ability to repay over a period not exceeding seven years. The interest rate is 5 per cent.

TCEPA Drops Commercial Surcharges

Board Predicts Savings Of \$10,500 Yearly For Consumers

Commercial and industrial consumers of Tishomingo County Electric Power Association will save some \$10,500 on electric bills during the next 12 months, according to an announcement made today by the Association's Board of Directors.

The savings will result from the Board's decision to drop the 10 percent developmental surcharge from the bills of these consumers.

Surcharge removal will be effective with all meter readings on and after February 27. The first bills to reflect surcharge removal, according to the Board's announcement, will be mailed between March 12 and 15.

"We are glad that Tishomingo County EPA is in good enough financial condition to remove surcharges," William J. Pyle, President of the Board said. "It means a savings for the consumers affected; and it means that some of them will use more electricity for business and industrial expansion." Mr. Pyle explained that surcharges were necessary during the building stages of the electrical distribution system.

"These extra charges, ten percent of the monthly bill, were necessary to help us pay for our investment in materials needed to serve commercial and industrial loads," Mr. Pyle stated. "But now, thanks to increased use of electricity by these consumers, the financial condition of the system is such that those extra charges are no longer necessary."

Tishomingo County EPA began operations in 1935. It is guided by a 13 member Board of Trustees. Other Board officers, in addition to Mr. Pyle, are J. H. Allen, vice-president; and S. S. Strickland, secretary. Manager of the Association is W. J. Brinkley.

Feed Grain Survey Set For County

Local A. S. C. Office Will Aid In Soil Retirement Program

A survey of all farms in Tishomingo County that produce feed grains is now under way according to Mack Sanders, Chairman of the Tishomingo County A. S. C. Committee.

President Kennedy has sent a message to the Congress requesting prompt enactment of Feed Grain Legislation for 1961. This program will affect farmers who normally grow corn, grain sorghum, barley, or oats for harvest, and would offer such farmers an opportunity to divert a part of their normal acreage of these crops to a soil conserving use. In return the farmer would receive a special conservation payment, a payment for the land retired from production of feed grains.

To put such a program into operation for 1961 Crops in a manner which would be fair to all growers, accurate data must be obtained immediately for the possible establishment of Feed Grain Base Acreage. Such information will include the Acreage History of corn, grain sorghum, barley and oats for harvest, as well as the acreage devoted to other crops and land uses, for all farms in Tishomingo County where one or more of these feed grains were produced within the past two years.

Tishomingo County farmers can benefit from this proposed Legislation only if the file a Feed Grain Report of their farms immediately.

Mr. Sanders explained that it is the intention, as far as possible, to get a survey on all farms in the county. Since this may mean cash in the pocket, farmers should see to it that a survey of their farms is turned in at the ASC Office at once.

A tentative closing date for farmers to visit the A. S. C. Office to turn in surveys is March 13, that will be Monday week. Farmers are advised to have in mind the acreage of all crops grown for the years 1959 and 1960, when they visit the A. S. C. Office.

Mr. Sanders urges the farmers in Tishomingo County to act quickly and be eligible to receive whatever benefits may come from the President's Legislation.

Mr. McVey and Mr. Waller will discuss chemicals to use and how to get the best results from spraying equipment.

The meeting will be informal with plenty of time for questions and answers, Mr. Stricklen stated. Dealers are invited to have spray equipment on display at each of the meetings.

Tenn-Tombigbee Waterway Report Shows Project Sound

Rep. Abernethy Says Canal Plan Justifiable In Light Of New Survey

The long sought and anxiously awaited feasibility report on the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway shows the project to be economically justifiable. It points out that the benefits to the public would amount to \$1.10 for each \$1.00 spent for construction and operation.

This statement was issued by Congressman Thomas G. Abernethy of Mississippi, Frank W. Boykin and Armistead Selden of Alabama after a conference with Col. S. Smith, assistant director, Chief of Engineers Office in Washington.

Col. Gilbert M. Dorland of Nashville, Tennessee, and chairman of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority, hailed this announcement as being the most important one to be made since the Authority was established two years ago. The approval of the vital steps necessary to take prior to receiving funds for the construction of the project.

Glover Wilkins, assistant administrator of the Authority, told a West Point, Mississippi, civic club that he had been reliably informed that the Corps of Engineers is planning to make the full report on their findings public in March or early April. He further stated that open hearings—giving proponents and opponents a chance to be heard—would be held in the summer, and that at that time a final decision on the economic justification of the project would be made by the Corps of Engineers.

"This," Wilkins stated, "will enable supporters of the project to solicit favorable recommendation from the Bureau of the Budget, prior to asking for planning and construction funds from Congress in January 1962 to commence building the great waterway."

W. H. Drinkard (Bill), secretary-administrator of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway Development Authority, left for Washington Tuesday night to confer with officials of the Corps of Engineers and members of Congress. He stated that "1961 is the year of decision in building this vital connecting link in America's vast waterway system. The people of the areas that will benefit from this waterway should express their interest now to their representatives in Congress."

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What Cooks At The White House Is

Classified Information

A few days ago, newswriters and commentators had a great deal to say about the lid being clamped on the White House domestic staff.

"Mum" was the word to all the chefs, butlers, upstairs maids, downstairs maids and any who serve the First Family in domestic employment.

If any of these had ambitions of one day writing their memoirs and including White House days with the Kennedys in the writing, that ambition was quick-frozen while still a tender sprout. The only writing they could ever do on the subject was write their names on a waiver, promising to keep their pens dry when they leave White House employ.

Doubtless, we will see more burning issues during the Kennedy tenure than what Jacqueline has simmering on the back burner, but for the moment, sweeping everything else aside, what cooks at the White House consumes our attention.

There are two sides to every issue. We would be less than objective if we did not try to see both sides. And the best way to see both sides is to place oneself in the same situation as the person whose side one is trying to see.

Take the President and his family. One can readily sympathize with the First Family's desire for privacy — although it's a little hard to understand why anyone who wanted privacy would want the presidency. It is about the most un-private job in the world.

However, domestic privacy is something every family has a right to. So if we were in the President's shoes, we would want it too.

We wouldn't want the hired help going out and turning the public eye on our domestic life. Imagine the cook writing a serial and making hay out of the fact we had turnip greens and cornbread once or twice a week for dinner. Or the butler letting it out that we sat before the fire with our shoes off.

Taking a vow of silence, signing a pledge not to write about backstairs life in the White House might be the solution. But we doubt it.

The best solution would be to hire people who can't write. We would screen the potential authors among the prospective domestics. If they could read the pledge that would be the tip-off; if they signed by writing their names — not making an X-mark — they would really be disqualified.

It's a cinch, anyone who can read and write his own name can become an author these days. And what is to hinder breaking a pledge if the pay-off is several thousand dollars in royalties? Not scruples, surely. Could one count on scruples holding them back when unscrupulous profiteering has become almost a national pastime?

Looking At The Domestic's Side Of The Issue

Suppose we apply for the job of chief cook and bottle washer (baby bottle, that is), at the White House. We are asked to waive any future literary disclosures on life behind the White House curtain. Up to that time we may not have had any literary ambitions. But to say we "must not" have any would give us pause. That would be a "new frontier" we might want to take a whack at. And what better field for a subject than the kitchen side of the White House?

Furthermore, we would feel our right to free speech and self-expression had been infringed upon. Naturally, if the terms didn't suit us, we wouldn't have to take the job. But no such binding restraint has ever been placed on the White House staff before. Wouldn't that be discriminating against the present household staff?

Others have written about life inside the White House. And profited both themselves and the general public. If ex-Presidents can write their memoirs, disclosing facts and opinions about personalities the presidency's privileged position had afforded them — why shouldn't ex-White House staff members write their memoirs from their privileged positions? Could not a cook's observations contribute valuable footnotes to history as well as Presidents, Generals and Secretaries of State?

It is quite a problem, and, thank goodness, one we will never have to solve. Let President Kennedy and his staff work on it. We're going out and watch the skies for the latest Russian satellite as it goes by — although there's nothing we can do about it either.

We hear frequent reference to "modern advertising" when problems of trade are discussed.

Yet, advertising is anything but modern. Advertising is as old as commerce — as old as civilization. Some of the recovered records of the ancient Phoenician, the first great merchants of the world, are advertisements.

In ancient Roman cities, the central bulletin board, the newspaper of two thousand years ago, was used largely for advertising. The advertisements posted on Roman bulletin boards did not differ greatly from those which appear in newspapers of today.

The colonial newspaper in America came into existence primarily to provide information on goods

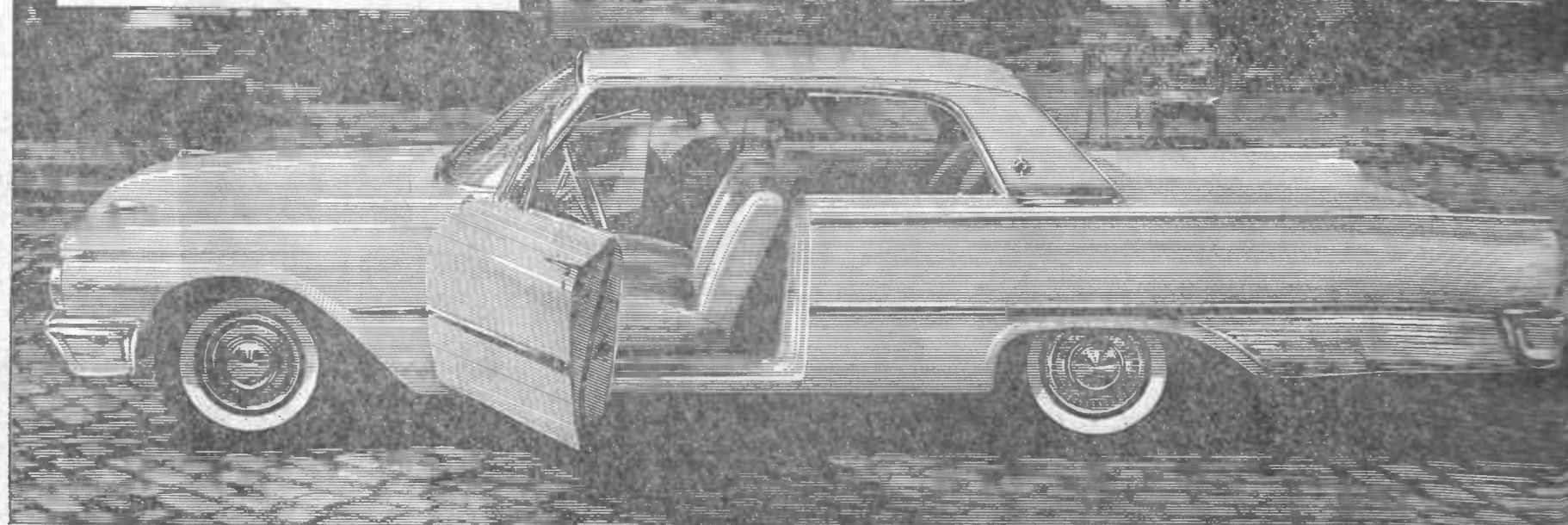

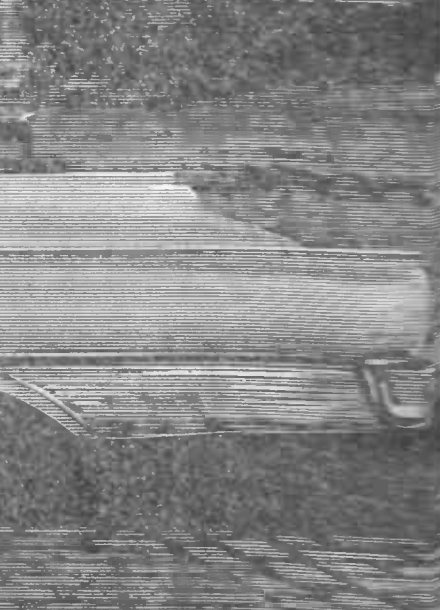

The United Nations has its own troops for maintaining peace and order in member nations where needed. The organization also issues its own postage stamps, it was noted. Among the other interesting things accomplished by the organization has occurred in the Status of Women Division. Through this division, 75 per cent of the women in member nations where they were not allowed to vote, now have that right.

Howell Attending Wildlife Meeting In Washington

Vehicle owners pay \$1.25 inspection fee, \$1.00 of which is allocated to the inspection station for its service and 25-cents to the State Department of Public Safety for administering the program.

All motor vehicle owners are required to have the inspections made. These vehicles are defined as cars, trucks, motor bikes, motorcycles or motor scooters which are used on the highways.

After the law goes into operation April 1, motorists will have 90 days, or until July 1, to have their vehicles inspected. Failure to comply with the law may bring a penalty of \$50 and 6-months in jail or both. The five main items of inspection are brakes, lights, tires, steering and windshield wipers.

The vehicle owner may have required repairs made at any shop of his choosing, whether that shop is an approved inspection station or not. However, the vehicle must then pass the inspection at an approved shop before the required safety sticker may be issued for it. If a vehicle has been awarded a safety sticker and then is damaged in an accident, another inspection

Now that some pulp mills are buying certain kinds of hardwood (not blackjacks) it might pay the landowner as he releases young over topped pines to girdle only the blackjack and try to sell as pulpwood the other hardwood that needs to be removed.

We, the local personnel of the USDA Soil Conservation Service, are proud of the fine woodland job so many of our soil conservation district co-operators are doing.

All we can add is, pick up your ax and go to work on those blackjacks. Release your pine seedlings so they can grow and make money for you.

It's the time of year when lawns begin to take on a green and growing springtime look.

For your lawn to be a year-round beauty spot of your home, you need to do three things: plant the right kind of grass, fertilize it right and manage it right.

For help with your lawn questions and problems, ask at your home agent's office for a copy of the booklet: Lawns — 49 Questions and Answers. It answers questions about how much and when to plant, watering weed control, clipping and many others.

Wash white nylons only with white articles. Nylon loves to pick up color and will do it from articles that are seemingly colorfast.

Cleaning Hint. If you let dust collect on lamp bulbs, diffusing bowls and shades, you can lose as much as 40 percent of the light. Be careful about dusting lamps and fixtures as you are about dusting furniture.

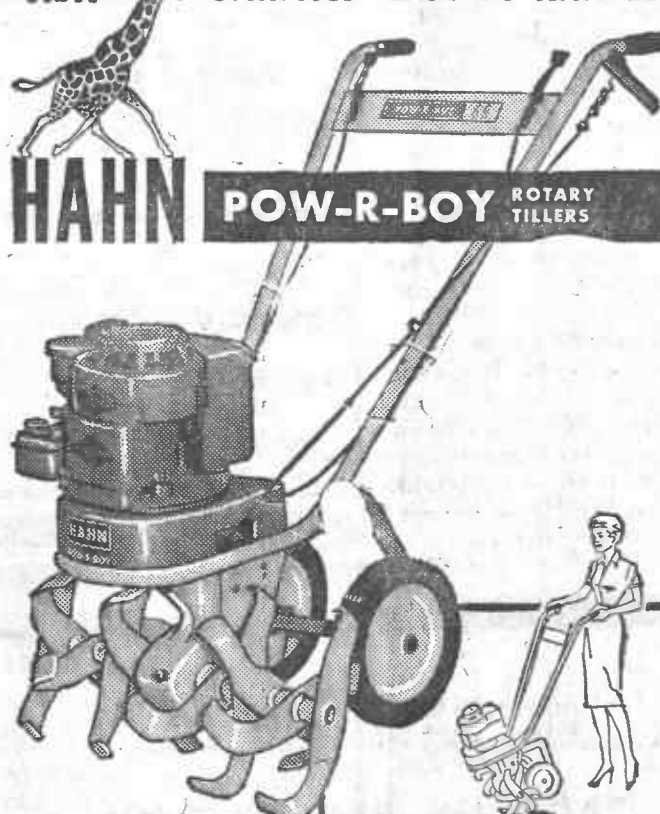

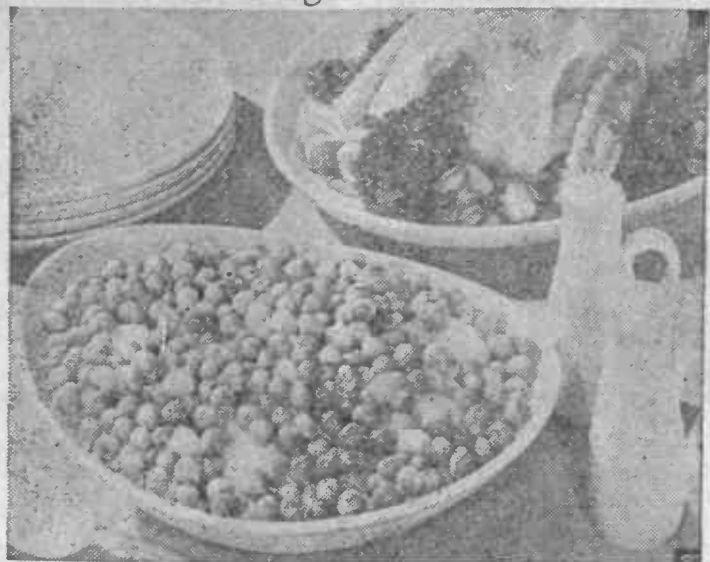

Let stand over low heat until all vegetables are hot. 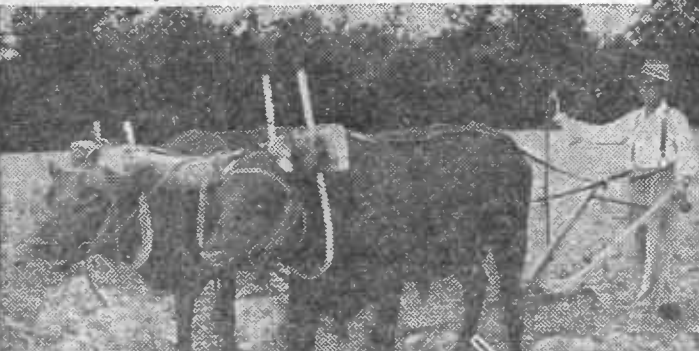

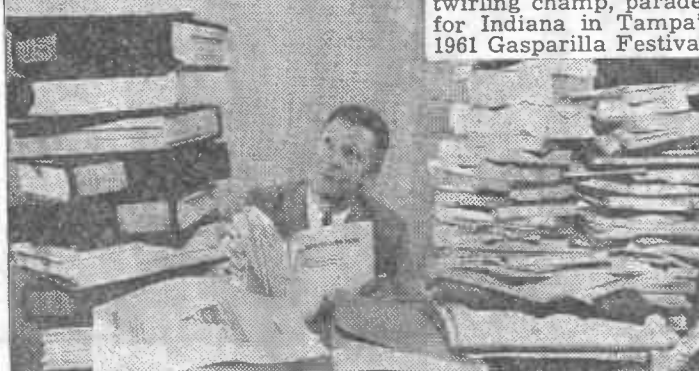

Program Planning Meetings

Farmers Meeting

Soil Testing

The time for testing soil before

planting time is getting short, but you still have time to get this service if you hurry.

This service is free; all it will cost the farmer is the time it takes to collect the samples, which is very little.

The only exact way to know how to fertilize is to have your soil analyzed. You may be using the wrong analysis, or in some cases you may be using too much fertilizer.

We have plenty of containers in the County Agent's Office for taking soil samples and will be happy to explain the details to you.

New Commandment

Second for March 5, 1961.

MANY MEN manage to think themselves much better than they are, because they have only the Ten Commandments for a standard. And they understand that famed code only in a strict literal fashion—which as Jesus showed us, is no way to take the Ten Commandments. How long is it since you made a graven image? Which of the women reading this column ever coveted a neighbor's wife? Robinson Crusoe and Dan'l Boone, in their respective wilderness, had no trouble about coveting what was their neighbor's—they had no neighbors.

The Eleventh Commandment

Jesus added another Commandment, you know, which in an important way is not like the rest of those laws. It is not just another law, additional to the Ten Commandments. It is not a P.S. tacked on. You might better say that the Eleventh Commandment had been in God's mind always. The eleventh interprets the others, it summarizes the others. Jesus himself said of love of God and man, that on these two commandments "hang all the law and the Prophets."

Measuring ourselves against this law, we do not stack up so well. This is particularly true when we hear Jesus saying to the group in the Upper Room: "—that you love one another—even as I have loved you." For we know what that "as I have loved you" means. Jesus died for those men, and for us. Love, sacrifice, even to the gate of death—that is the measure of his love; how often of ours?

What Does Love Mean?

Mark Twain said, and is often quoted, that the parts of the Bible he didn't understand never bothered him. It was the parts he did understand that disturbed him. Most of us, and this includes people who are not Christians at all, would like very much to live in a world dominated by love. We understand the meaning of love, at a distance. That is to say, we all want to be loved. We want somebody who will care about us. We want some one to look out for our interests, we want a "fan," somebody that believes in us, somebody who will go out of his way to help us. When it comes to the pinch, right down in the bottom of our selfish hearts each of us hopes that if there are only four life preservers for five shipwrecked people, the other four will all insist that whoever drowns, it must not be me. If we are driving along a road and suddenly a collision looms, don't we hope the other man will obligingly drive into the ditch or wrap himself around a tree, rather than run into us?

Yes, "we know what love means," we want other persons to have it—for us. It is only when it is demanded of us that we grow hazy, and hesitant. Love, we say to ourselves... well, you know what a vague sort of word that is, hard to pin down... After all, doesn't it mean wishing people well?

Is It Possible?

No, my friend, it won't do. You show you understand the meaning of love when it is something you want showered on you. It is only when you are asked to sprinkle a little bit of it on others that you pretend you don't understand, and offer all these feeble substitutes.

You show something else, too, how difficult it is to have genuine love. (Some observers of human nature would say at this point: "Difficult? — Impossible!" You complain a good deal because the kind of love you would like to have, is so scarce. It is scarce because there are too many people like yourself—and indeed all of us are more or less alike in this. In fact, it is so difficult that many thinkers throw up their hands, so to speak, they give up the problem. If what is needed is love, and if the required quality of love is so hard to find (for remember all the time it is love at Christ's level and on his standard that is in question), shouldn't we just not aim so high? That would be like saying to an airplane: Because you cannot reach the moon, you shall not leave the ground! Even the "impossible" ideal draws us closer to God.
