Highway Construction Bids Sought

**Ten Counties Have
Road Projects Totalling
More Than \$2,000,000**

Highway construction projects totaling more than \$2,000,000 in ten Mississippi counties are being advertised for bids by the State Highway Commission, Tuesday, March 28, the Commission announced today. Among the ten are Tishomingo, Prentiss and Alcorn counties in Northeast Mississippi. In this three-county area, road bids sought are:

Tishomingo County: 0.031 Mile Bridge on Mississippi Highways Nos. 365 and 356 between Cairo and Burnsville.

Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties: 7.069 Miles of Grading, Drainage, Culverts and Box Bridges on Mississippi Highways Nos. 365 and 356.

Alcorn County: 3.543 Miles of Incidental Grading and Drainage, Base and 20' Double Bituminous Surface Treatment on Mississippi Highway No. 356 between Rienzi and Jacinto.

Prentiss County: 0.597 Mile of Grading, Drainage, Culverts, Topping and 3 bridges on Mississippi Highway No. 362 between Franks-town and Wheeler. 6.339 Miles of Incidental Grading, Topping Base and 22' Double Bituminous Surface Treatment on Mississippi Highway No. 365 between Burton and Cairo.

Feed Grain Survey Underway

**Meeting Places Set
Throughout County
For Making Reports**

The Feed Grain Survey has been underway in Tishomingo Co., since Thursday of last week. A number of farmers have already visited our office and completed this job. However, there is still a large number of farmers who have not furnished information on the corn (grain) survey, E. N. Allen, Tishomingo County ASC Office manager, stated today.

Meeting places are scheduled throughout the county for Friday, March 10, 1961, which is the deadline for filling out the survey reports. A representative from the A. S. C. County Office will be at each place to help in filling out the Grain Survey on your farm. The meeting places are listed below:

North Cross Roads at Arnold's Store; Central Community - Central School Building; Iuka Communities at A. S. C. County Office in Iuka; Midway at Nelson-Hill Store; Holcut Community at Lunch Room at Holcut; Burnsville at City Hall in Burnsville;

Tishomingo Co-op at Tishomingo; Crane's Store in Paden; John T. Caveness's Home at Moore's Mill; Will Young's Store in Dennis; Belmont Co-op in Belmont; Hutson's Store in Golden.

"Make every effort possible to visit one of these places on Friday of this week and fill out this survey," Mr. Allen said. "If you fail to fill out this information and later it is found that you could receive benefits in the form of cash payments you will be ineligible because no survey was made on your farm," the ASC office manager warned.

"When you visit one of the above named places Friday to fill out the Grain Survey, bring a record of acres planted to corn on your farm in 1960 and 1959. Also, number of acres of other crops grown on the farm these two years. This will help the County Office Representative to assist you in filling out this form," Mr. Allen concluded.

City Board Acts On Bids

The Iuka Board of Mayor and Aldermen met in regular session Tuesday night at the City Hall. Among other business was the opening of bids on painting and repairing the interior and exterior of the City Hall building. Bids on a new two-ton truck without bed were also opened and read.

On the matter of painting and repairing the City Hall building, the Board postponed action until further discussion. The Board accepted the bid of Jourdan Motor Company for a two-ton truck, F-600 Ford. The accepted bid was for \$2535.33. Counce Chevrolet Company submitted a bid of \$2668.75 equipment to the truck accepted in the low bid.

Several residents were present at the meeting to offer petitions before the Board. Wayne Spinks was spokesman for a group asking the city to consider reactivating the springs in Mineral Springs park. Only one spring is presently flowing.

Mrs. Delbert Williams asked the Board members to take steps to alleviate a bad situation, the overflow of sewage, in front of her property.

A petition was read from a group of residents on French Circle asking the city to build and maintain French Circle as a public street. The signers agreed to give three feet of their property on either side of the road to make it wide enough for use by vehicles.

Hiway Patrol Services Curtailed

**Safety Department
Announces New
Program For 1961**

Commissioner of Public Safety T. B. Birdsong revealed today another portion of the Mississippi Highway Patrol's program for 1961. He announced that certain services will be curtailed or eliminated. The services in question are requests for escort cars and men to attend conventions, parades, etc., requests to transport people and property within the state and to transport prisoners, etc., within and without the state.

Basically, the Patrol's duties are to patrol the highways and help traffic move rapidly, safely and as smoothly as possible. When other conveniences are supplied enforcement manpower is reduced and the cost still must be borne by the Department.

During the past 10 years the Legislature has been very kind to increase the Highway Patrol budget, but through the fault of no one in particular the manpower of the Patrol has not been increased. In the same 10 year period the state's paved highways have increased 25%, the licensed drivers by 75% and the registered vehicles by 62%. The traffic toll last year was the highest ever — 622 deaths, 8739 injuries, and 20,479 accidents. Due to these factors it is imperative that the Commission and the Chief of Patrol restrict Patrol units to the highways. It is only by eliminating the additional services that they can spend more of their time patrolling the roads, Commissioner Birdsong stated.

Stricklen, county agent said.

The tour should be over around noon and the group will be back in the county by middle of the afternoon, Mr. Stricklen stated.

Sunday afternoon, March 12, a group of laymen and ministers interested in temperance are urging all other interested people in this area to meet with them at North East Miss. Junior College auditorium at 2:30 in Booneville.

Purpose of this meeting is to inform the people about the grave possibility of legalization of liquor in the state of Mississippi.

The Rev. C. M. Day of Jackson, director of the Alcohol Education Program for the Miss. State Baptist Convention, and the Rev. Jack Williams of Tupelo, chairman of the committee on temperance of the North Miss Conference (the Methodist Church) Board of Christian Social Concerns will be present to help inform the people concerning this vital issue. Also many members of both houses of the state legislature will be present to discuss this issue with the people.

"We cannot afford to wait too late to start in a program of action to let the people of Mississippi know the seriousness of this problem and how important it is for Mississippi to be not just legally dry but completely dry as far as the liquor traffic is concerned," a Conference spokesman stated.

On Thursday of last week, Mrs. P. L. Oaks and Mrs. Talmadge Finch attended a luncheon meeting at the Holiday Inn in Tupelo, sponsored by the Mississippi Farm Bureau Federation.

Heavy Rains Cause Flash Flood, Other Damage

**Mill Creek Bridge Washed Out,
Lightning Kills Livestock**

The heavy downpour of rain Tuesday night brought a flash flood to Iuka. Mineral Springs park and immediate vicinity were completely covered by waters from overflowing streams. For a time it appeared that families would

have to be evacuated from their homes in the park area.

National Guardsmen were on hand and did take some families from homes that looked endangered in the area around the Iuka cotton gin. No homes were flooded, however, water came up to within a few inches of the floors of several homes in the area.

The Youth and Community Center in the park suffered some damage when water flooded the building to a depth of about one foot. Furnishings in the building were not greatly damaged, first estimates showed.

Several automobiles parked in garages, carports, and on the streets in the flooded area were drowned out when water rose around them. One automobile slid into a ditch and was almost completely under water for nearly two hours before waters of the flash flood receded near midnight. National Guardsmen remained on duty with heavy trucks and other equipment until danger from flooding passed.

A bridge on Mill creek road was washed out and water was over the roads in several places in the county. District roads suffered considerable damage from the floods.

Lightning Kills Horses

A horse and colt belonging to Bliss Har m were struck by lightning and killed Monday night during the thunderstorm that struck in and near Iuka. The animals were pastured in a Jourdan lot when struck.

Electric power service was interrupted very little during the two days of heavy rains and lightning. A TCEPA spokesman stated that only minor service stoppages occurred. Several transformers were out for short periods but no damage to lines was reported.

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Industrial Progress In N. Mississippi

Information released today by the North Mississippi Industrial Development Association shows impressive gains made in new industrial jobs and payrolls in the upper section of the state in the month of February.

The report announces location of three new plants and major expansions of three companies during the past month in North Mississippi. When all are in full production over 400 persons will be employed and over 1-million dollars in new payrolls will be disbursed.

This is the kind of news we like to hear and like to report. It shows verve enterprise and ambition on the part of communities and counties in this area. This is the stuff of which progress is made. Real progress comes when enterprising ideas and ambition are translated into action. Evidently that is what happened in those communities where new industry is locating. Instead of waiting for opportunity to come a-knocking, they went out pounding on the doors of opportunity themselves. And here are some of the doors which opened.

In New Albany, the Precision Carton Company of Aurora, Illinois, has announced plans to build a new plant at New Albany which will employ 80 or more persons.

Voters in Districts Three and Four of Chickasaw County will vote March 21st on issuance of \$400,000 of industrial bonds to expand the Futurian-Stratford Furniture Company plant in Okolona. Possibly 100 new jobs will be promised. The company's annual payroll now amounts to \$1,200,000.

In Fulton, the Charm Step Division of Genesco plans expansion if voters in Districts One, Three, Four and Five of Itawamba County approve issuance of \$250,000 of industrial bonds in a referendum on March 11.

In Booneville, construction has begun on the American Packing Company plant. An industrial bond issue of \$520,000 approved by the voters in financing the construction. About 160 men will be employed here when the plant is in full production.

In Ackerman, the Endicott-Johnson Corporation is beginning production in a new plant just completed. 40 persons are presently employed in the initial operations. When in full production, the plant will employ up to 400 persons. And more thousands of dollars will flow into the local economy as payrolls rise.

In Tupelo, Mid-South Packers announced its second major expansion within a year. A \$250,000 addition to its present facilities will be made. The company now employs 506 persons. Its 1960 payroll was \$1,722,000.

Also in Tupelo, the Phillips-Foscoe Corporation of High Point, N. C. has announced plans for construction of a 60,000 square foot plant. It will produce and fabricate polyurethane foam. The plant will also produce some handsome payrolls for the Tupelo area economy.

These are not all the industrial expansions in the N. Mississippi area, but enough to show how bright the picture is in those counties where the industrial sun is rising.

The only thing wrong with the picture is — Tishomingo County is not in it.

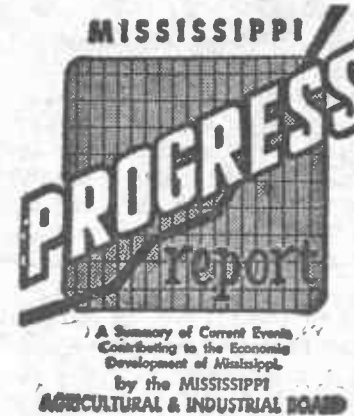

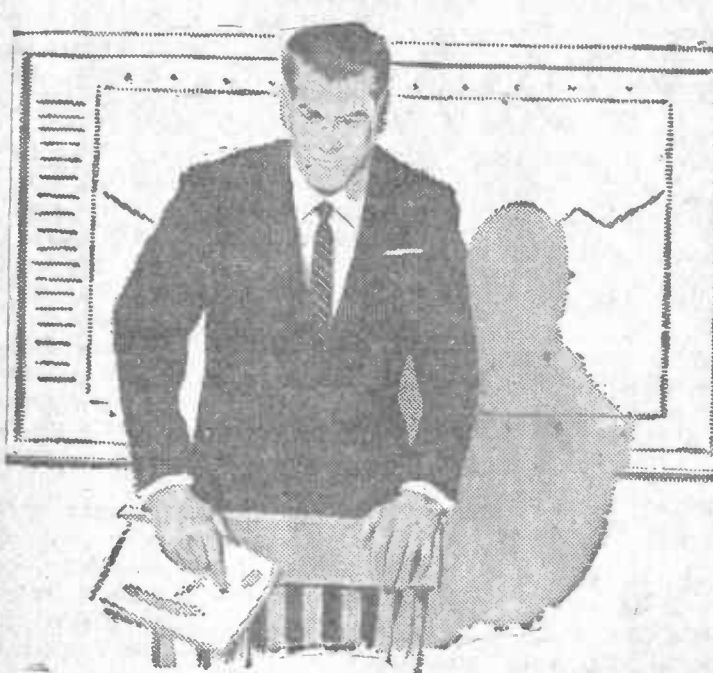

The exposition will serve as a centralized meeting place for some 50 large companies in search of production outlets in the Southeast, small firms seeking to expand their activities, and the federal procurement agents who let government contracts. A&I Board officials expressed the hope that Mississippi manufacturers will take advantage of this opportunity for establishing contracts which might result in additional business for the firms. Both the A&I Board and the Mississippi Manufacturers' Association have sent letters to industrialists throughout the state inviting them to participate in this exposition. Industrial representative Marcus Love will represent the A&I Board.

Construction Underway On New Booneville Packing Plant

Construction work has started at Booneville on a 24,000-square-foot plant for the American Packing Company. It is hoped that the plant will be in production by mid-summer. Basic operations of the plant will be the buying, processing and packing of sliced smoked ham and beef. Ready-to-serve meats will be packaged in polyethylene bags. At first the plant will handle only beef and pork, but it may expand to other products later. Approximately 160 men will be employed.

Industrial Groups Name New Staff Members

Charles S. McElroy, Starkville, has joined the staff of the North Mississippi Industrial Development Association as director of research.

A 1956 graduate of Mississippi State University, McElroy will gather needed information to present to industries interested in North Mississippi locations.

James E. Sorrells, of West Point, has been added to the staff of the Agricultural and Industrial Board as planning assistant in the board's city planning department.

BAWI Bond Elections Set

"Balance Agriculture With Industry" bond elections have been called for Itawamba and Chickasaw counties. The Itawamba election Saturday is for \$250,000 in bonds to finance construction of a warehouse building for the Charm Step Division of GENESCO. Four Itawamba county districts are in-

cluded. The Chickasaw set for March 21 and \$400,000 BAWI bond expansion of Futurian-Stratford Furniture Company facilities in Okolona. Futurian-Stratford announced plans to add 100,000 square feet to provide for manufacturing a new chair.

Moss Point Plant Makes \$500,000 Addition
A \$500,000 addition to the Moss Point Plant will be in full operation according to an announcement by plant manager Lewis Westfall. The plant will add twelve new jobs by the expansion, but the plant addition will be an entirely new line of chemicals and approximately ten acres will increase Thiokol's roll to approximately 100,000 square feet.

Successful negotiations for a major steamship line to establish Vicksburg as a national port by the Vicksburg and Memphis Steamship Company, port director Dean Westfall recently returned from negotiating with the line. Name of the line has not been disclosed. Officials of the Westfall they consider an excellent distributor for the export of goods to Europe.

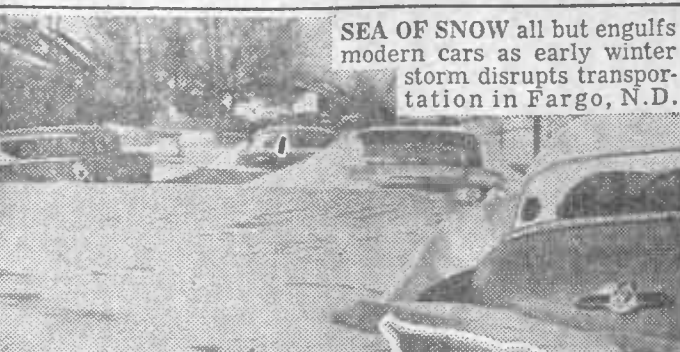

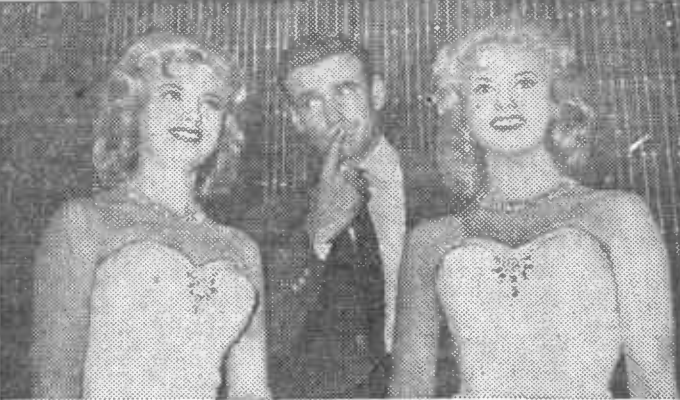

A Historical Sketch - - - Iuka Church Of Christ Founded 1889; Ten Year Expansion Program Planned

Religion and the freedom of worship is certainly one of the greatest privileges the people of this country have today. Statistics show that more people than ever before are attending church services throughout the land. In Tishomingo County many churches have been razed and replaced with new ones. Many have added educational buildings or extra classrooms to take care of the ever growing congregations.

The Iuka Church of Christ, located on Eastport Street, is one of many realizing the need of expansion. In a ten year program recently set up, the church plans to buy a building site of four or five acres on which to erect a new building. The plan also calls for an extensive training program for members of the congregation. Two years ago the present building was remodeled to meet the needs of extra Sunday School classrooms. Two new rooms were added. The remodeling included the installation of a central heating and air conditioning plant for the entire building and interior decorations which included carpets and drapes.

Historic Sketch

The Iuka Church of Christ was established about 1889 by Mansel

Kendrick. From this date until 1960, the church had never had elders and deacons. For the first time in the history of the church, on December 25, 1960, elders and deacons were selected and appointed. Selected as elders were J. W. Howell and Raymond Gross. Deacons are Brandon Edmondson, Waco Parsons, Elmus Curtis, Jr., and Lawrence Parsons.

In the beginning, church services were held in the Court House as a digressive Christian Church. Later the Presbyterian Church building was used until the erection of the Christian Church building in 1890. The site on which the present building now stands was purchased from D. P. Hammerly. The church continued to worship as a digressive congregation until about 1902 when it withdrew from the use of mechanical instruments of music in its worship services.

In 1948 the old building was razed. Much of the framing and heavy doors were salvaged and used in the present building. The doors at the present opening between the foyer and main auditorium are those from the previous structure.

In 1955, the church purchased its first parsonage, this being the

former Willie Vaughn home located on 3rd Street.

Roy Vaughn was the first full-time minister. For years the church had been holding preaching services once a month with Elvis Bortz preaching while he attended Freed-Hardeman College in Henderson, Tennessee. Mr. Vaughn was minister of the Iuka Church of Christ at two different periods of time. When he moved to Missouri, C. M. Tuttleton came to work with the church.

For years, the song service was under the direction of the late Edwin Harwell. Following his death in 1958, H. L. Shook was appointed to this position which he still fulfills.

On January 1, 1959, Hudson Nichols, the present minister, began work with the local church. Mr. Nichols and his family moved to Iuka from Rayville, La., where he had worked with that church for a period of four years.

Also in 1959 the church purchased a new parsonage in Jones subdivision where Mr. Nichols and his family are now residing.

The church budget for 1961 has been set at \$10,000.00. The local church aids in the support of orphan homes. It cooperates with other Churches of Christ in Tishomingo County and Cherokee in the support of a weekly television program over Channel 9 in Tupelo and daily radio program, The Bible Speaks, on WVOM Radio in Iuka. The church spends an average of \$500.00 yearly in benevolent work.

Each year a singing class, a teacher's training course, a men's training for service course, a gospel and mission meeting is conducted in addition to regular services of the church.

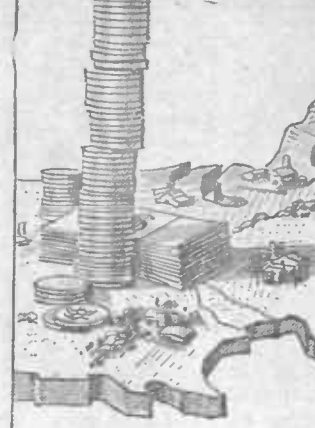
Farm Facts

Agriculture is big business. It is one of the nation's biggest businesses. Farm investment in the U.S. exceeds \$200 billion and it has been climbing steadily over the years.

The Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture points out that total assets of agriculture—value of land and buildings, machinery and motor vehicles, crop and livestock inventories, household equipment, and financial assets—increased from \$53 billion on January 1, 1940, to more than \$208 billion on January 1, 1960. This was almost a fourfold increase.

Approximately 30 per cent of the increase in total farm assets resulted from investment by farmers in the various types of farm capital assets, in excess of depreciation or depletion. The remaining 70 per cent represented capital gains to the owners.

The aggregate increase in value of farm assets from 1940 through 1959, net of farm investment, was \$109.6 billion, or an average of \$5.5 billion each year. Higher val-

ues of farm real estate have been most important, accounting for about 80 per cent of all farm capital gains in the last 20 years. From 1952 to 1960 the value of farm real estate increased from \$96 billion to \$129.1 billion.

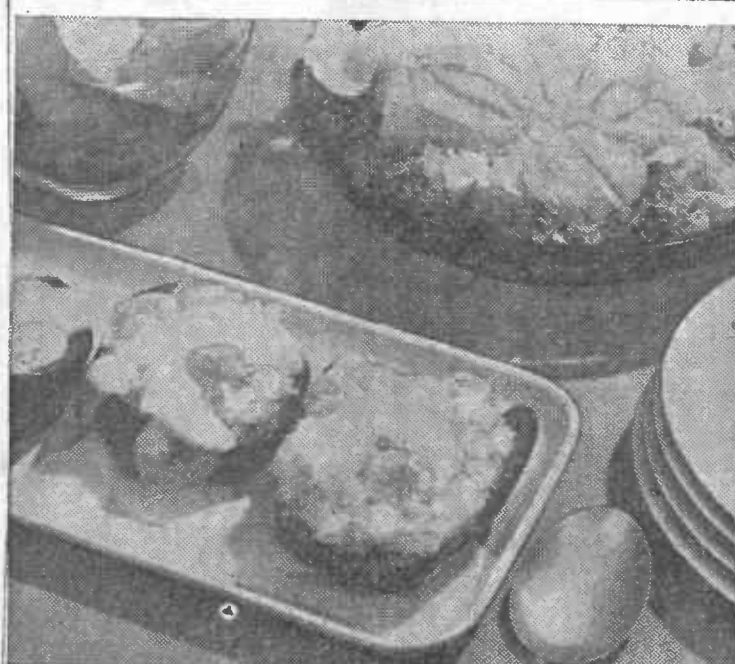

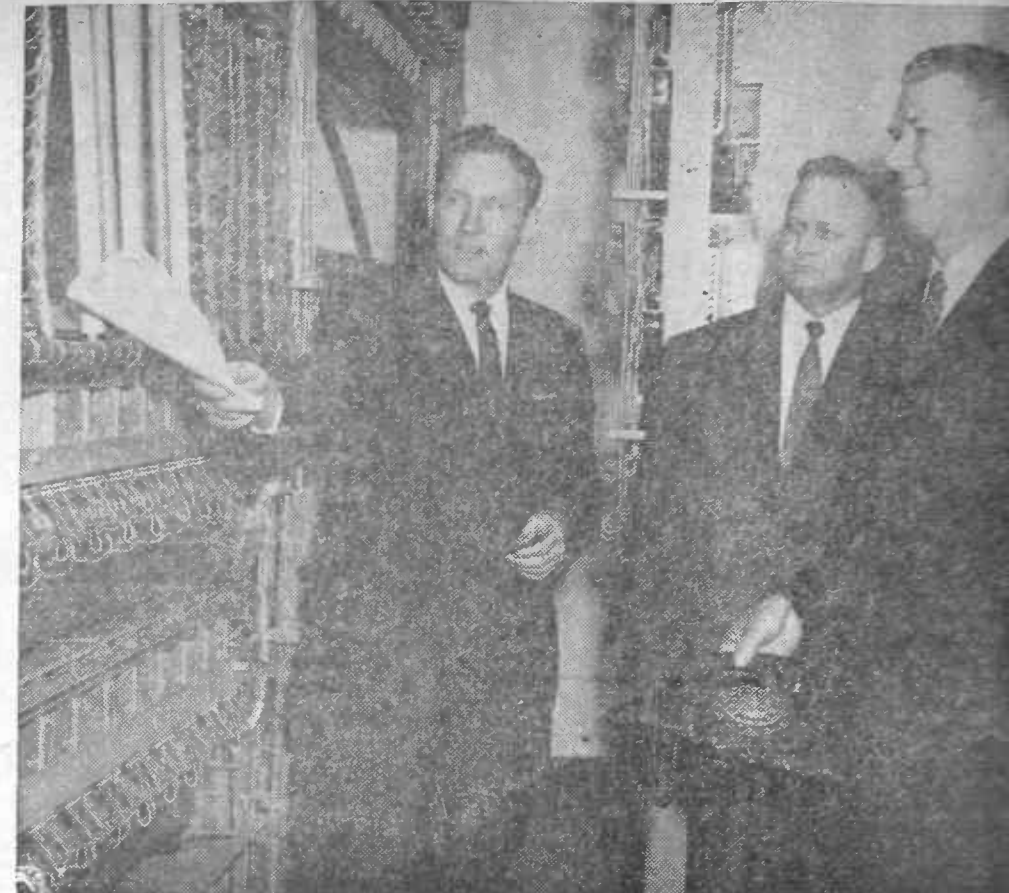

Stuffed Green Peppers

3 large green peppers
1 can (10 ounces) frozen condensed cream of shrimp soup
1 cup milk
1 cup chopped celery
2 cups onion
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 cups cooked rice
Dash salt and pepper
1/4 teaspoon tarragon, crushed
1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Cut peppers in half lengthwise; remove seeds. Cook in boiling water for 5 minutes; drain. Place, hollow side up, in shallow baking dish (13" x 9" x 2"). In saucepan, combine soup and milk. Heat until soup thaws; stir often. In another saucepan, cook celery, and onion in butter until tender; combine with rice; salt, pepper, tarragon and all but 2 tablespoons of cheese. Add 1 1/4 cups sauce; blend. Spoon rice mixture into pepper shells; sprinkle tops with remaining cheese. Pour 1/4-inch hot water into bottom of baking dish. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) about 45 minutes, or until peppers are tender. Heat remaining shrimp sauce. Serve over peppers. Makes 3 to 6 servings.

Belmont Places 4th In State A-AA Tournament; Wigginton And Wilburn Named On All-State Team

Editor's Note: The following article was written by Van Savell, a member of The Vidette staff and presently a sports writer for the Clarion-Ledger, Jackson.)

IUKA, Miss. (Special) — Not since 1948 has a Belmont basketball team won the state championship during that period from 1943-1948. Tishomingo Countians won four titles.

In 1949 and '47 two completely different Belmont boys' clubs carried off the coveted crowns and in 1948 girls' championships were carried back home.

Belmont competed in the State A-AA tournament for the first time this year and, much to the surprise of many experts, finished better than fourth.

The tall, rangy back court stars were Wilburn, Jimmy Wigginton and Timms carrying the load and also doing the scoring, the Belmont team knocked off talented defending state champion Hancock North Central but then fell to Ocean Springs and Big Eighter in quick succession.

Starkville Won It — It was a District One team

which finally captured the state title. Starkville, a team beaten 82-65 by Belmont for the district title, knocked off Wesson 80-65, Clarksdale 52-50 and Ocean Springs 70-66 enroute to their first championship.

In the process of state competition, the Belmonters landed six-five Wilburn, a two-time Alabama all-stater, and six-five Wigginton on the ten-man Class A-AA All-State team.

Undoubtedly the biggest quintet in the tournament this year, the Belmont Team lacked speed which could have easily pushed them over the hump and handed them their fifth state crown on a "golden platter."

Coach Buster Davis' starting crew consisted of Wigginton and Timms (6-4) at forwards Wilburn at center, and Paul James and Jimmy Moody at guards. But there was also the Belmonters' little man, five-six Glen Harrison, who was quite a ball player.

In a Friday afternoon tilt and two Saturday contests, Davis sent this group of six players against formidable opposition and came out with one victory and two defeats.

Only Victory

In the tournament's second opening round contest at the dilapidated old "barn" called City Auditorium, Belmont depended on superior height and their opponent's flatly frigid offense to rout defending state champion Hancock North Central 58-45.

Belmont stacked Wilburn, Wigginton and Timms under both backboards and Hancock couldn't buy a rebound. Too, the fast-breaking Hawks couldn't get their run-and-shoot offense to clicking and fell to their 11th defeat in 52 games.

Meanwhile, Davis' North Mississippi runner-up Belmonters overcame a 5-0 Hancock lead in the first quarter and held on the rest of the way for their 30th win in 41 games.

Wilburn and Wigginton were Belmont's top guns with 18 and 17 points respectively. Wilburn's defensive work on Hancock's All-State Doug Necaise was also highly instrumental. Necaise was held to four field goals and 12 total points.

Semi-Final Loss

Ocean Springs' Greyhounds, running and gunning from start to finish, opened up a huge 45-34

halftime margin that Belmont couldn't quite dissolve and breezed into their seven-point semi-final victory, 77-70.

Like in their quarter-final victory over Greenwood Friday, it was a terrific second-quarter outburst which rocketed the Greyhounds out of reach.

Belmont after being harassed no end by the Hounds' hounding, ball-hawking defense, regained its composure in the second half and set about getting back into the game.

With Wigginton leading the way, Belmont narrowed the gap to 8 points 55-63, going into the final stanza. Timms, Harrison, and Moody hit back-to-back goals and Belmont ad cut it to four points (65-61) with 6:30 left.

But Ocean Springs rose to the occasion. Tommy Jones hit a layup, Bruce Mohler converted a three-point play and Denver Glazier sank two from the line as the Greyhounds opened up a 73-63 lead with 4:20 left. This pulled it out of Belmont's reach and when Ocean Springs slowed it down with a semi-freeze, it was all over.

Jones and Hughes, those ball-hawking Ocean Springs All-State guards, hit 20 and 18 points respectively to pace the Greyhounds. Wigginton's 19 topped Belmont scoring. Wilburn added 16, Timms 14 and Harrison 11 for Belmont.

Overtime Loss

Clarksdale, one of the two clubs brave enough to snub the Big Eight tournament in favor of state championship contention, took third place in the tourney with a 61-57 overtime victory over Belmont in the consolation tilt.

Belmont led at halftime 26-25 on the all-round play of Wigginton and Moody but the Delta Wildcats caught fire in the third period and moved ahead by two (38-36).

With Wigginton, Moody and Wilburn all hitting, the Belmont team caught back up at the game-ending buzzer, sending the game into overtime.

But that was just too much for the Belmonters. Clarksdale All-Stater Tom Morris and Herschel Bloom combined for six of the eight overtime points and Belmont was down.

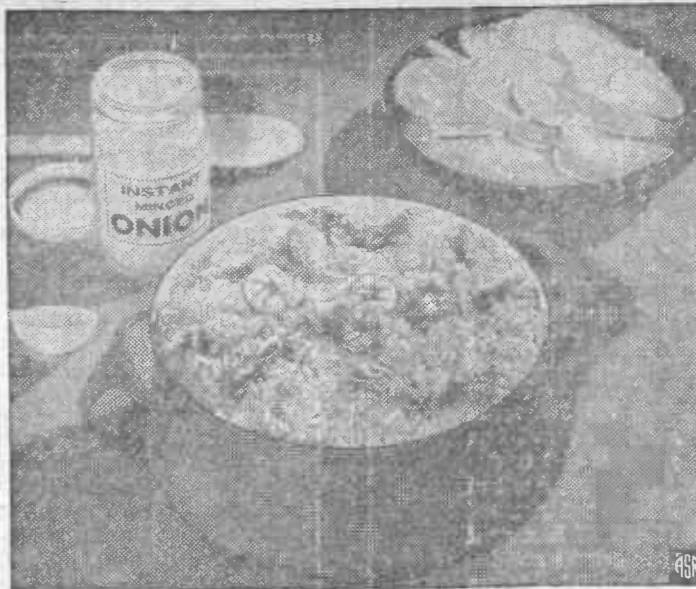
Wigginton hit 22 and Moody 13 for the Belmont team. Morris had 19, Bloom 16 and Jerry McGuire 10 for Clarksdale.

Pantry Shelf Party Fare



"California Paella," easy on the cook and unusual enough for company, is a savory combination of three seafoods, tomatoes, rice and instant minced onion. Make it in minutes with canned shrimp, minced clams, oysters and tomatoes, along with pre-cooked rice and the ready-to-use onion. "Orange-Lime Relish" can also be made at the last minute, but it's better made several hours ahead so the flavors will blend. Complete the menu with hot French bread, coffee and your best dessert.

For "California Paella," combine 1 (5-ounce) package pre-cooked rice (1 1/2 cups), 1/4 cup instant minced onion, 1 (1-pound) can stewed tomatoes (2 cups), 1 (7-ounce) can undrained minced clams, 1 (4-ounce) can undrained, small oysters and 1 (5-ounce) can undrained, wet pack shrimp in a medium-sized saucepan. Stir to blend. Bring to boil; cover, lower heat and simmer 5 minutes. Turn off heat, leaving pan on stove. Let stand, tightly covered, 10 minutes. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

To make "Orange-Lime Relish," pare 2 large oranges over bowl to catch any juice; cut in medium-sized slices. Slice 1 lime very thin. Combine 2 tablespoons wine vinegar, 1 to 2 tablespoons sugar and 1 tablespoon instant minced onion. Pour over fruit. Chill several hours. Makes 4 to 5 servings.

County Agent's Notes

Cotton Notes

Plant your cotton acreage in 1961. Last year 117,000 acres were unplanted. This cost the state's economy at least \$18,000,000 loss.

If you don't want to plant cotton

this year, release your acreage. Then it can be reapportioned to some other farmer who does want it.

If you want more cotton acreage than you have been allotted, call at the local ASC office and request additional acres. But do not ask for more than you plant.

The deadline for requesting additional acres and for releasing unwanted acres is April 1. Do not wait too long.

Here are some jobs you can do now for better cotton in 1961. Repair your machinery. Plan your overall cotton program and give special attention to weed control.

Early Planting of Corn

It nearly always pays to plant corn early. In 10 years of testing a big yield reduction is shown in corn planted after May 1.

Here are some suggested planting dates: North Mississippi Mid-April until early May.

A good rule of thumb is to plant your corn two weeks before you do cotton. This will allow you to work out the corn before cotton needs attention.

Early planted corn usually has less insect and disease trouble. It usually grows under better mois-

ture conditions than later planted corn.

Gardening

March is the time to get busy in the home garden. It is planting time for lots of vegetables.

Here is a partial list of those to plant now: Cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, lettuce, tendergreens, onions, English peas, Irish potatoes, spinach, turnips, beets, parsley, Swiss chard, collards, mustard, New Zealand spinach, radishes, and in the upper three-fourths of the state asparagus crowns.

Get your rows ready for planting of early summer vegetables. Locate bean and tomato stakes. Keep an eye peeled for early insect problems. Get the jump on the bugs first. Don't let them harvest your vegetables.

Safety

Don't get in too big a hurry with that tractor. Speed causes upsets... injuring both drivers and damaging tractors. At this season, especially, you can't afford either.

Home Agent Notes

Being celebrated this week in Mississippi and the 49 other states is a special event of real significance to millions of Americans. It is National 4-H Club Week. During national 4-H Club Week, the 4-H Club members in Tishomingo County will join their fellow club members in Mississippi and 2,302,000 throughout the nation in a variety of activities designed to call public attention to the achievements of the 4-H Clubs and to the advantages of 4-H Club membership for boys and girls not yet enrolled in the organization. We are happy to be able to help out in this cause.

The 4-H Clubs are an organization of young people interested in learning by actual practice how to be better farmers, better homemakers and better citizens. They work in close contact with the Agricultural Extension Service and the Agricultural Experiment Stations. They benefit from the guidance and cooperation of the public education system; civic groups; city, county, state, and federal governmental organizations; and business and industry leaders. They have as volunteer leaders in their activities thousands of farmers, homemakers, and other adults interested in the future of the state's young people.

The 4-H Clubs have pioneered many improvements in farming and homemaking in Tishomingo County. But of less important is the character-building that results from

membership and active participation in 4-H work. Many former 4-H members now hold prominent places in agriculture and other walks of life.

There is a place in 4-H work for many thousands of other young people — and for many other adults who want to make a contribution to the welfare of youth and the progress of the state by lending a hand with 4-H work.

Veterans Corner

Q—I am the widow of a World War II veteran who died early this year, but am ineligible for death pension this year because insurance proceeds puts my annual income this year above \$3,000, the ceiling set by law in determining eligibility for pension for a widow with dependents. Is it true, as I've

been told, that my two small children may be eligible?

A—Yes, they may be. If there is no widow, or if the widow is ineligible, minor children of the veteran are eligible, if the child's annual income does not exceed \$1,800, not counting his own earnings. One child will receive \$35 a month; each additional child adds \$15 a month. An unmarried child is eligible until age 18, or until 21, if in an approved school.

Q—My discharge from wartime military service was under honorable conditions, but later I served another period of active duty and received a dishonorable discharge. Could I be admitted to a VA hospital?

A—The second discharge would not bar you from VA hospitalization. Under the circumstances, you will retain your eligibility for

medical benefits which you gained through war service. But you cannot be buried in a National Cemetery.

Q—I am a peacetime veteran. Am I eligible to enter a VA domiciliary?

A—Yes, but you must be permanently disabled, have been discharged for a disability incurred in line of duty or be receiving compensation for a service-incurred or service-aggravated disability, have no adequate means of sup-

port, be incapacitated from earning a living and meet certain other requirements.

Q—Does anybody know how many veterans of our wars are still alive in the United States today?

A—As of the end of 1960, there were an estimated 22,475,000 veterans in the United States.
