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GUEST EDITORIAL

Conservation Planning For The Future

National Wildlife Week, sponsored annually by the National Wildlife Federation and its affiliates, including the Mississippi Wildlife Federation, is being observed all over the nation during the period March 19-25 this year. Theme for the observance is: Multiple Use — Balanced Conservation Planning for the Future.

Man, in Genesis 1:28, was charged: "Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth, and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth." During National Wildlife Week, is an appropriate time to consider this stewardship in the light of the past, present and future.

Man, despite many shortcomings, has been fruitful. He has multiplied and replenished the earth. Man has gone far enough toward subduing the earth that he now also is about to enter the heavens. Dominion largely is established over every living thing. The privilege of stewardship, however, means more than mere domination — it entails considerate management as well.

Lakes and streams can provide water supplies, power, navigational routes and recreation. Multiple use, through, cannot be achieved if one use is permitted to ruin a resource for another purpose. For example, forest lands too heavily logged or grazed will not provide ample watershed protection or recreation. Pollution endangers public water supplies and the use of the resource for recreation. In view of increasing demands, "multiple use" probably will involve "re-use" of resources, with quality adding to quantity.

There is still another aspect to stewardship. All natural resources do not have the same features or capabilities. It is not possible to utilize all resources for all purposes; thus "optimum use" enters the picture. Some areas may be best suited for timber production, others for grazing or for waterfowl refuges or for wilderness appreciation. The "optimum use," or highest possible public benefit, of some streams may be for fishing or other recreational activities and should be so protected.

Obviously, man can carry out his responsibility of stewardship best through balanced conservation planning for the future.

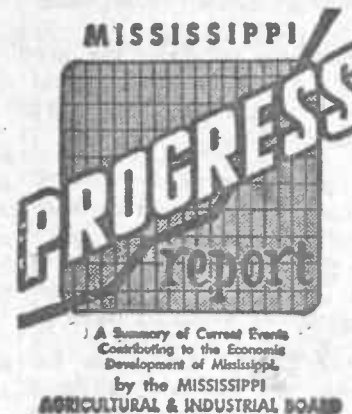

Dizzy Dean Starting
Mississippi Business

Jay Hanna "Dizzy" Dean, former baseball star turned television announcer, has announced the beginning of a new Mississippi industry, "Dizzy Dean Enterprises" to be located at Wiggins. Dean, a former member of the famous St. Louis Cardinal "Gashouse Gang" said that he will make his home in Bond (Mrs. Dean's former home) at least six months during the year. The Wiggins plant is about three miles from the Dean's home in Bond. Products to be made at the plant include hickory chips, aprons, hats and mitts and related barbecue items. They will be marketed under the "Ol' Diz" brand; production is expected to start within 60 days.

New Hatchery
For Mendenhall

Construction is underway on a new hatchery in Mendenhall. Utilizing a 40 x 50 foot building, the hatchery will have a capacity of 200,000 eggs. Chicks from the hatchery will be grown into layers to be used in egg production, primarily in the Simpson County area.

Groundbreaking Set
For Greenville Port

Groundbreaking ceremonies on March 13th marked the beginning of construction of a greatly improved harbor and modern port area for Greenville. The project will consist of dredging about eight

miles of channel at least 12 feet deep and 250 feet wide in Lake Ferguson from just below the Greenville Yacht Club to the junction with the Mississippi River. Some of material resulting from this dredging will be used to construct the port area. Plans call for 115 acres above flood levels with dimensions of 1,000 feet by 5,000 feet. The total project is estimated to cost \$2,750,000, of which Washington County, through the Greenville Port Commission will pay about one half.

Jackson To Be Transfer
Point For Automobiles

A new distribution activity for Jackson employing 25 new jobs has been announced by Jackson Chamber of Commerce President Robert Hearin. The capital city will become a transfer point for automobiles shipped from factories via railroad, using trailers on flat-cars, bi-level and tri-level rail cars. Tractor and trailer units will pick up the cars in Jackson and carry them to dealers in Mississippi and surrounding states. Appropriate distribution facilities in Jackson will be established by both the Illinois Central and Gulf, Mobile and Ohio railroads.

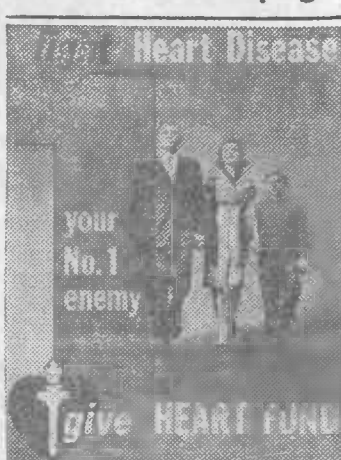
Mississippi Fifth In Nation
In 1960 Broiler Production

The Southeast again led all other areas of the nation in broiler production in 1960, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Georgia led all states in the number of broilers produced, just as it has for the previous eight years. Georgia farmers raised nearly 320.3 million broilers in 1960. Georgia was followed by Arkansas, Alabama, North Carolina and Mississippi, in that order, Mississippi produced 116.3

million broilers, 8 per cent more than the previous year.

Industrial Tract Planned
For New Albany Area

Officials of the St. Louis — San Francisco Railway Company have announced plans to develop a 110-acre industrial tract adjacent to its main line immediately north of New Albany. The land is to be developed with utilities, streets and industrial lead trackage to create a number of individual industrial sites. The land will be developed in co-operation with the Union County Development Association, a New Albany group formed to attract industry to the community.

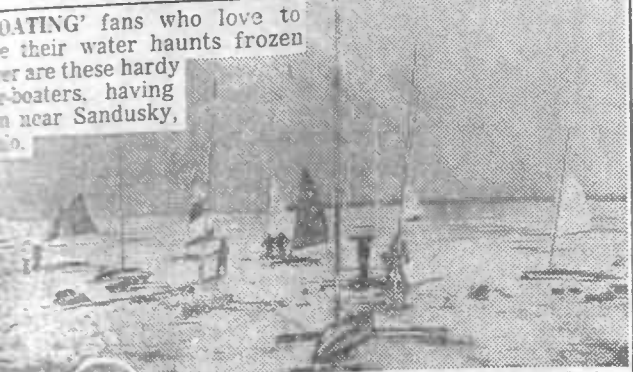

Farm Facts

Usually when we think of the farmer it is as a supplier of food and fiber. This, however, is only one aspect of his importance in the economic scheme of things. While he is a consumer and a purchaser of nearly all the goods and services his urban neighbors buy, he provides a major market, furthermore, for many additional items.

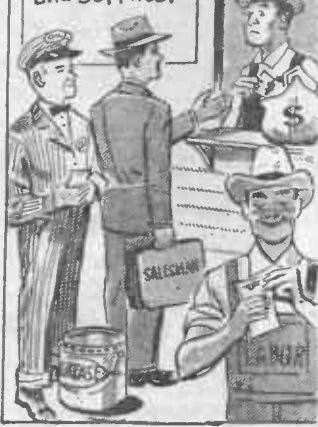
It is estimated that farmers spend more than \$25 billion annually for labor and supplies, providing employment for millions of people on and off the farm.

Expenditures for feed, livestock, seed, fertilizer and lime, repairs and operation of capital items, and for miscellaneous necessities amount to more than \$16 billion a year.

Farmers pay out nearly \$3 billion a year in wages. Repair and maintenance bills on buildings, vehicles, and machinery amount to nearly \$4 billion. This includes expenditures for gasoline, petroleum fuel and oil—about \$1.5 billion.

major improvements of farm buildings, the outlay amounts to more than \$1.7 billion. Purchases of tractors, trucks, and automobiles exceed \$1.6 billion; and farmers spend another \$1.4 billion for other machinery and equipment.

County Agent's Notes

Crop Recommendations

Now is the time to make plans for our field crops we are going to plant. Here are some recommendations from the Experiment Station you should consider in planning your crop operation.

Cotton: Recommended varieties for this area are: Stoneville 7, Dixie King, Auburn 56, Coker 100A, and DLP15. If you are bothered with wilt on your land, Auburn 56 is the leading wilt resistant recommended according to experimental data.

Planting dates recommended are April 20 - May 10. If you use pre-emerge May 1-10 is more ideal.

Rate of seed to plant is 16-22 pounds per acre, hill dropped, of delinted seed. If you drill your cotton, you should use 20-30 pounds of delinted seed per acre.

Seed should be treated and germination tests run prior to planting.

Fertilizer recommendations for this area are: 72 units of nitrogen, 48 units of phosphate, and 48 units of potash per acre. Soil should be limed to a PH of 6.5. This usually requires 1 1/2-2 tons of ground limestone per acre on most fields.

Corn: Recommended varieties are: White Corn, Dixie 29, Dixie 55, Funk's G-779W, Phister PAG-653W, Yellow Corn, Dixie 22, Pioneer 309B, and Funk's G-710AA. There may be other varieties that have yielded good on your farm. If there is, I would recommend planting them. Planting dates recommended for this area are April 1 to April 30 if possible. Plant before cotton time if possible.

Seeding rates, plant 12 pounds of seed per acre. Space 13-15 inches apart on 38-42 inch rows, on thinner land, space 15-18 inches in drill.

Fertilizer recommendations are 36 units of nitrogen, 40 units of

phosphate, 40 units of potash, and side dress early with 60-90 units of nitrogen.

Soybeans: Recommended varieties are Hill, Hood, Lee, and Jackson. Plant May 1 to June 1. Plant 45 pounds seed per acre. Fertilize with 40 units of phosphate, 60 units of potash, and lime soil.

I hope each of you will read the article on releasing unplanted cotton acreage in another section of this weeks paper. Let's all make a special effort to plant each acre of cotton allotted to Tishomingo County.

March Is National Egg Month
In celebration of National Egg Month, why not try a different way to serve the traditional breakfast bacon and egg.

Egg Nests
Separate the white of room-temperature eggs. Allow one egg for each "nest." Beat the whites until stiff and season with salt and pepper. Fashion the nests on a greased baking sheet by dropping the white from a teaspoon into separate little piles. Indent the center of each nest.

Slip an egg yolk into each nest and generously cover with crispy bacon crumbles. Bake in a moderately heated oven until yolks are set. Serve immediately on buttered toast.

Easier Ironing
There is a lot you can do before you start ironing to make the job easier.

If you have a wringer or spinner-washer, take time to avoid unnecessary wrinkles and creases. Straighten clothes before they go thru the wringer to avoid bunching. Don't overload the spinner.

If you have an automatic washer, follow directions for its use. Use special cycles adapted to different

fabrics, or shorten cycles (especially spin) for wash-and-wear fabrics.

If you have a dryer, learn to use it to cut down on ironing. Read the direction book and follow it. And remember — over-drying puts in deep wrinkles. So does overloading the dryer. And so does leaving the clothes in the dryer after they are "done."

To have smooth sheets without ironing, take them from your clothes dryer before they're completely dry. Fold them and place them on top of the dryer to finish drying. A little experience will help you know when to remove them from the dryer. They shouldn't be damp, but neither should they be bone dry. Pull a corner out of the dryer to test, because fabrics feel damper inside the dryer than at room temperature.

Pasture Planting and Fertilization

By Hiram A. Jones

Iuka County farmers are getting a great deal of in-

formation in fertilizing old pastures.

Federal ACP assistance can be received for pasture planting or for improving ten (10) acres of established pasture, provided no assistance has been received on this land during the past three (3)

years. Farmers who want to plant new pastures can receive ACP assistance on all the acres they plant provided they have not received any help on this land during the past three years. They can receive ACP assistance on only ten acres of old pasture they improve by overseeding and fertilization.

Many Tennessee River Soil Conservation District cooperators are taking advantage of this program and are converting row-crop land to pasture. This change in land use from row crop land to pasture will prevent soil erosion and still return a profit to the landowners who make good use of their pasture plants.

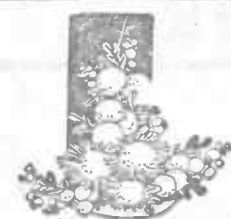

Farmers Must File Income Tax Returns

Social Security Credits May Be Lost If Returns Not Made

April 17 is the deadline for filing income tax returns this year and an important date for farmers. Some farmers in Tishomingo County are losing social security protection for themselves and their families by not making tax returns, according to Hugh D. Tigrett, manager of the Tupelo Social Security Office.

A farmer, like any other person self-employed, must file income tax returns and pay social security taxes if he clears \$400 or more during the year. The farmer who clears as much as \$400 must pay the social security tax even though he does not owe any income tax because of his exemptions. The returns are not only used for reporting income for income tax purposes but are also used to report income for social security credit.

Since many Tishomingo County farmers did not owe any income tax, they neglected to file returns and have no social security credit. Although tax returns can be filed

at any time, there is a limit for receiving social security credit. For example, you cannot receive social security credit for years before 1958 if you file the returns after April 17, 1961, Mr. Tigrett stated.

Red Cross Fund Drive Continues

Chairman Paul Weekley Cites Aid To Flood Victims In State

Paul Weekley, 1961 Red Cross drive chairman for Tishomingo County, said today the fact that the enormous Red Cross disaster relief program for flood and tornado victims in the South will cost about \$1,000,000 makes it all the more imperative that the local Red Cross fund appeal reach its goal.

The recent floods and storms destroyed 6 homes, caused major damage to more than 3,300, as well as damage to hundreds of business, farm and other buildings in Mississippi, Red Cross surveys reveal.

"The generosity of the American public has always enabled the Red Cross to provide food, shelter and clothing, and to make financial grants to disaster victims for home repairs, rebuilding and home furnishings. Money received by chapters throughout the nation immediately becomes available for disaster-stricken areas," Chairman Weekley added in urging a successful local campaign.

"Hundreds of chapter volunteers, working with more than 150 trained and disaster-experienced members of the national staff, are helping some 7,000 resume normal living conditions following floods and tornadoes in Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi and Louisiana," Mr. Weekley said.

The expenditure of Red Cross funds of victims of recent and tornadoes in the state is expected to exceed that of the total goal for funds being sought for all Red Cross services in Mississippi during 1961, which amounts to more than \$250,000.
