Farm Home Loans Gain In County

**\$50-Million Available
To FHA In New
Building Program**

The farm housing loan program
of the Farmers Home Administra-
tion is picking up new momentum,
not only throughout the Nation,
but here in Tishomingo County, M.
Hays Woods, County Supervisor in
charge of the agency's lending pro-
gram here, said today. Mr. Woods
said this renewed farm housing
loan activity follows the early
February announcement that an
additional \$50-million is now avail-
able to the Farmers Home Admini-
stration for its 4 percent loans to
farm owners to build or repair
farm houses and essential farm
buildings. Such a loan may extend
from 5 to 33 years.

In this area Mr. Woods said he
looks for the main demand to con-
tinue to be for loans for new con-
struction, although farm owners
may need the credit to repair or
remodel dwellings. Such remodel-
ing includes putting in modern
kitchens, installing pressure water
supply systems, bathrooms, and
other conveniences.

Mr. Woods pointed out that by-
products of this loan program in-
clude employment of carpenters
and other skilled and unskilled
labor, and increased business for
concerns that handle building ma-
terials and equipment items.

Eligible to borrow are owners
of farms that annually will produce
at least \$400 worth of commodities
for sale or home use based on 1944
prices, but who cannot be ade-
quately financed through other
sources.

\$12,000 In Stolen Goods Recovered By Sheriff

**Report For 1960 Also
Showed 840 Arrests Made**

In a year end report made by
Sheriff Clarence Pace on crimes
committed in Tishomingo County,
it is revealed that over \$12,000 in
stolen property was recovered by
the sheriff's office in 1960 and re-
turned to the rightful owners.
Some of the stolen goods was ta-

ken in burglaries of business pla-
ces and some from homes and from
lakeside cabins. A number of ar-
rests were made in connection
with recovering the stolen goods.
Several cases of burglary were solved
by investigations but the sus-
pects have not been apprehended.

A total of 870 arrests were made
in 1960 by the Sheriff and deputies.
More than half of this number
were arrested on the charge of pub-
lic drunkenness, this misdemeanor
accounting for 491 arrests.

The next highest number, 73,
were arrested on charges of operat-
ing a motor vehicle while under the
influence of intoxicants. The third
highest number of arrests were
related to the same problem,
liquor, with 64 being arrested for
possession of whiskey.

Other charges resulting in ar-
rests and their number, were, fam-
ily disturbance, 21; trespassing, 3;
possession of beer, 12; reckless
driving, 7; automobile theft, 6;
rape, 2; attempted criminal assault,
1; manslaughter, 1; assault with
intent to kill, 6;

Assault and battery, 7; carrying
a concealed weapon, 6; burglary,
31; house burglary, 9; grand lar-
ceny, 26; petit larceny, 33; conceal-
ing and disposing of stolen prop-
erty, 1; forgery, 9; worthless checks,
14; child desertion, 8; adultery, 2;
theft to defraud Insurance Co., 2;
possession of burglary tools, 2;
indecent exposure, 1; U. S. mili-
tary service desertion, 1; escape
from mental hospital, 1; arson, 2;
violating game laws, contempt of
court, 1; apprehended for other
law enforcement agencies, 16.

The total fines paid in 1960
amounted to \$8,768.00.
The sheriff's office also reported
a total of 14 accidental deaths in
the county in 1960. Of these, 9 were
traffic victims, 3 were drowned,
one suffocated and one died in a
fall from a railway trestle.

New Plants Springing Up

Spring is traditionally a season of optimism. Even when you feel there's nothing in the world to be happy about, a warm spring day will revive your hope, your enthusiasm, your energies and your ambitions. The sight of fresh new buds on the trees, green shoots pushing up from the fecund earth, and the most pessimistic among us is apt to smile and admit things loog better "in the spring."

This 30-million dollar plant will be pouring as much as 5-million dollars a year into the area's economy through wages and pulpwood purchase when completely finished and full-scale work is underway.

To the east of us, in Cherokee, Ala., the new Armour Agricultural Chemical Company will begin ground breaking in April for its multi-million dollar plant. When completed it will be the largest fertilizer manufacturing plant in the South. Initial employment will number about 300, but as many as 1800 will be employed, it is stated, when full construction begins.

To the west of us in Corinth, announcement was made this week by Southbridge (Massachusetts) Plastics, Inc., that it will build a multi-million dollar plant in our neighboring county. It will manufacture vinyl plastic products which include wall coverings, floor coverings, swimming pools, marine upholstery, and other items for the home and industry. Construction of the important facility is scheduled to begin in about 60 days.

And right in the center of all this new industrial plant growth, is Tishomingo County with its wonderful recreational resources, parks, lakes, and wooded hills.

This is a time for optimism for growth and renewed vigor in making the most of the opportunities Spring is bringing to us and to this area.

PROCLAMATION

RECREATION FOR EVERYONE IN TISHOMINGO COUNTY'S STATE PARKS

Among the outstanding attractions of Tishomingo County as a vacation and recreational area are its two state parks, J. P. Coleman State Park bordering Pickwick Lake and the Tennessee River in the northernmost section of the county, and Tishomingo State Park in the mid-section of the county.

Coleman Park is the newer of the two. Named in honor of former governor J. P. Coleman, who was in office at the time the state acquired the park area from TVA, it is situated in a bend of the Tennessee River and affords a 12-mile view of the river-six miles upstream, six miles downstream.

Although new, Coleman Park is fast becoming one of the most outstanding in the state parks development. It offers the finest and most beautiful natural scenery to be found in Mississippi. Unexcelled facilities for vacationists, whether they come for a week end, week, month or longer, include furnished modern duplex brick cabins, picnic area tables and barbecue pits.

A trailer park accommodates those who prefer that type of vacation living. A tent camping area is also provided. Pure, crystal clear water is furnished by a deep well. A concrete boat launching ramp has been completed and there is no charge for its use. Covered boat docks, fishing pier and rental boats are among the park's features which make it so desirable for vacationists and sportsmen. A modern concession stand is located near the boat docks. Playgrounds and play equipment for children is also provided. The park is open year round.

Last year when the recreational facilities were just being installed the park had approximately 25,000 visitors. With the completed facilities, it is expected this year's attendance will reach nearly 60,000.

Tishomingo State Park

Tishomingo State Park, located about 2 miles off Highway 25-S between Iuka and Belmont has been established a good many years. It too offers recreational facilities to the vacationer and week end visitor. Vacation cabins are available and the park boasts one of the largest and most convenient lodges in the state parks system.

The lodge, built out of native stone during the Roosevelt administration by CCC Camp boys, has a commodious dining room which looks out over the swimming pool

Game and Fish officials estimate that the state deer herds are increasing from 20 to 25 percent each year. Also increasing rapidly is the number of hunters who go after the deer each year.

Hunting, Fishing Enjoyed By Area Sporting Clubs

It is not surprising that Iuka should be the home center of several sporting clubs. Iuka is ideally situated near Pickwick Lake, with its many boats docks and fabulous fishing grounds. The forested area around Iuka afford deer hunters excellent sports. Last season was one of the most successful deer seasons ever opened here. Other game, rabbits, squirrels, as well as quails, abound in great numbers. And fox and coon hunting annually

engage the energies and interest of many Iukans and others in the county.

The Tishomingo County Fox Hunters Association holds its annual meet at Tishomingo State Park every July. Last year there were 132 dogs entered in the hunt.

The Coon Hunters Association is another active sporting Club, and the Indian Creek Beagle Club held its first licensed field trials just south of Iuka last November.

Iuka Gun Club members regularly attend area and regional skeet shoots and have many trophies and honors to their credit.

Among the most active sporting clubs is the Iuka Sportsmen's Club. This group has been untiring in its efforts to develop the area's recreational facilities and preserve its game and fishing potential.

The club provided active leadership in helping secure the Coleman State Park facility, which it is estimated, already brings in about \$100,000 yearly to the Iuka area in tourist and other trade. As the area grows, so will the park become an even greater economic asset.

The Sportsmen's Club is composed of avid fishermen. It awards three prizes every year, usually \$25.00 Savings Bonds, to members who catch the largest Bass, Crappie and striped Bass.

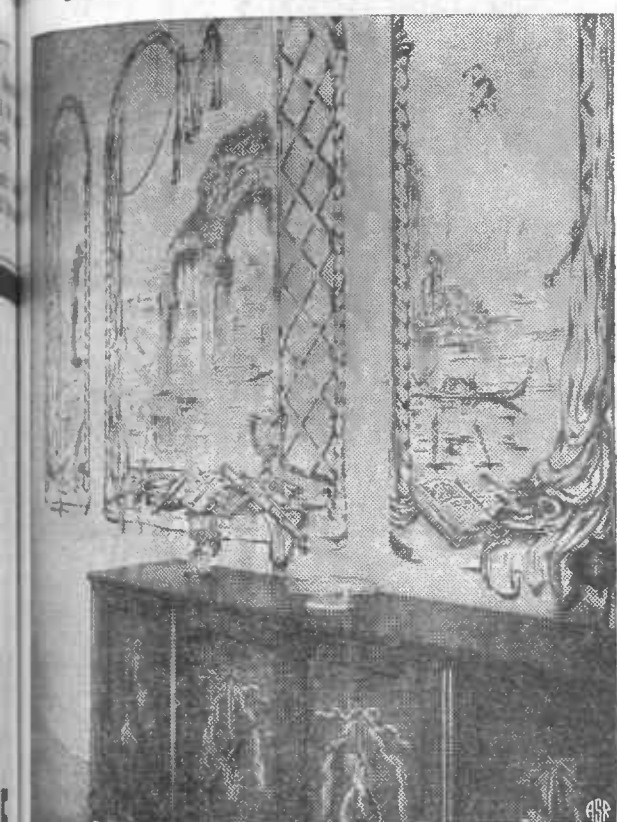

The other is a modern American technology that translates all of this grandeur into washable plastic materials. Vinyl plastic wall coverings and floor coverings are now winning awards as well as merit badges for scrubbing. At the recent International Home Furnishings show in Chicago, vinyl wall coverings that looked like silk brocades, and vinyl floor covering that mimicked the texture of old cobblestones were cited for honors by the American Institute of Decorators. It is actually a polyester fiber, much more practical than velvet, on white vinyl that looks like silk brocade but can take a scrubbing. It looks fragile but it is made to be hardy. Murals, formerly available only in expensive and perishable papers or fabrics, are now screen printed right onto vinyl. You may have seen a few in luxury hotels. You'll see more in the dining rooms of your friends who will be looking at Venice or the gardens of Versailles from their own dinner tables. One considerable wall covering manufacturer has laminated vinyl murals and all over prints to a wall paper backing. These are easier to hang.



Maintain Your Terraces

By Hiram A. Jones

Farmers who have gone to the trouble and expense of constructing terraces on their land should maintain them.

Fill in low places in terraces, and pay particular attention to terrace outlets. See to it that terrace outlets are open and drain into vegetated waterways at the proper elevation. It is easy to give too much fall at the end of a terrace and cause it to wash out.

Plow old terraces up to proper height and width, at least 12 feet wide and 17 inches high. This will give about a height of 14 inches after the terrace is settled.

Soil Conservation District Co-operators have done a good job of terrace maintenance in the past and know how important it is to keep terraces maintained.

The local Soil Conservation Service personnel are proud of the fine job these landowners are doing in caring for their soil.

County Agent's Notes

Cotton Notes

The deadline for releasing or requesting additional cotton acres is getting close. The last date to do either of these important duties is April 1.

As of March 10 only 68,246 acres had been released in the state. At the same date last year 73,760 had been released. Additional acres requested as of that date this year totaled 374,278 in the state. Last year it was 274,087. 3,000 acres have been requested in the county at the present time and only 628 acres have been released.

If you do not intend to plant or rent your cotton acres this year, release them to the local ASC office so they can be redistributed to other farmers within the state who desire additional acres.

If the total Mississippi allotment is planted this year, it could mean a lot of additional money in circulation throughout the state. Your county will benefit by planting each acre allotted to the county. You may sign forms to release your cotton acreage at the Co-op in Belmont and in Tishomingo.

For more information on this check with the local ASC office or your county agent.

Fertilization

It is time to make the final plans for fertilizing your 1961 crops.

For highest yields and the most profit to the acre it is important that you use the right amount of the right kinds of fertilizer and if needed, lime.

Soil testing will give you the information you need to make the highest profitable yields.

Gardening

The big gardening season is at hand. You can still set the hardy vegetables like beets, leaf lettuce, mustard, turnips, radish, and carrots.

In early April it will be time to set tender crops like tomatoes, pep-

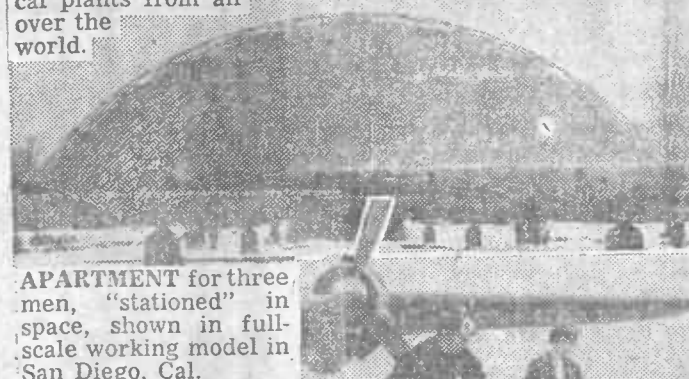

Construction Will Begin Next Month On Armour Chemical Plant In Cherokee

Officials of Armour Agricultural Chemical Company, announced this week that ground-breaking will begin in mid-April on the new multi-million dollar chemical plant in Cherokee, Ala. When completed,

sometime in the Spring of 1962, this will be the largest fertilizer manufacturing plant in the South. The plant, largest by far ever to be underwritten by any United States city, is to be paid for by bonds issued by the town of Cherokee. R. E. Pale, the town's mayor, has stated that Cherokee's bond house reports excellent advance commitments for purchase of the \$25-million in municipal bonds which will finance the plant and much of its equipment.

The bonds are backed by a 20-year rental contract with Armour and Company, a leading U. S. meat packing company, of which Armour Chemical is a division.

Preliminary construction has already begun near the 1200-acre plant site by Southern Railway which is building a spur track in to the plant grounds. A new access highway will also be built and work is scheduled to start on this in the near future.

W. M. Kellogg Co., of New York is the prime contractor for the plant. Other contractors are Chemical Construction Co., of New York and Chemical Construction Corporation of Cincinnati. Kellogg is presently completing construction of Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Mill at Counce, Tenn., and will move its construction equipment to Cherokee shortly.

Officials stated that 1800 workers would be needed on construction. The initial employment at the plant will be approximately 300.

Workers will be drawn from local areas around Cherokee as well as from the town itself.

The plant will have an ammonium manufacturing capacity of 360 tons daily, a urea production of 50 tons daily and 250 tons of nitrate prills and 250 tons daily of nitrogen solutions.

The plant acquisition has been accompanied with considerable activity in the town of Cherokee. Plans are underway for various expansions which include extending the city limits and sewer system. Also planning are a new post-office and fifty or more houses. A new bank building is already under construction.

Collateral to the building of the chemical plant is other expansion in the area. Colbert Steam Plant has a major expansion underway and the government has started work on the Natchez Trace bridge in the vicinity of the plant site.

Farmers Reminded Of Cotton Release Importance

Mississippi farmers are reminded that April 1 is the deadline for releasing un-needed cotton acreage allotments to local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committees for re-apportionment to other farmers in the state.

The reminder comes from Fred M. Bush, Jr., Director of Mississippi Agricultural and Industrial Board, who points out that farmers failing to plant or release any of their 1961 allotment will lose 50 per

cent of their 1962 allotment and face possible loss of their entire cotton allotment.

"State farmers failed to utilize their full allotment potentials last year," said Bush. "Underplantings amounted to 7.1 per cent of the available 117,205-acre allotment. If effectively utilized, this acreage would have resulted in an additional \$15,000,000 for these farmers."

"Last year, 31 counties failed to plant 80 per cent of their allotments, and 22 counties fell below the 70-per-cent level. This is a big money loss to all Mississippians—farmers, bankers, fertilizer dealers, merchants. Let's put a stop to it. Use your acreage, or release it—or lose it."

Former students visiting in other areas are invited to join with other Southerners wherever they may be on this date. Each person who attends a scheduled meeting will receive a souvenir of the occasion as well as current information from

Southern.

All local Alumni of Mississippi Southern College are urged to make plans now to attend the local March 30th meeting at Tishomingo School.

How He Died

Lesson for March 28, 1961

IF YOU WILL take time to count the pages of the four Gospels, and then count the pages of the chapters telling of the trial, death and resurrection of Jesus, you can see for yourself that the events of those last days and hours are given space far beyond what is given to any other part of Jesus' life. It can even be said, as a paradox, that nothing stands out in the life of Christ as it was first written, as does his death. Not only in the Gospels but in the thinking of the church, the death of Christ looms large. Look at the pictures or statues of Christ in Protestant or Roman Catholic homes; how often he appears as a dead man!

"Thirst!"

At first this seems strange. Do not all men die? All men do, to be sure, but not always in the way, nor ever with the purpose, which the church has always seen in the death of Jesus. If on Good Friday in many a church three full hours will be set apart for meditation on the memory and the meaning of the Cross, all we can do here is barely to suggest some of the thoughts which that tragic and glorious story suggest to a sympathetic reader. One is that Jesus died by violence, died under torture, died in disgrace, for the penalty of crucifixion was inflicted only on slaves and savages. Jesus himself, looking forward to this event, had used the pain words "die," "be killed." He did not use any of the pretty words that have been thought of, like a blanket of flowers over a corpse, to conceal the face of death. It was real death that afternoon, death in the midst of youth, death with much to say that could not be said, death without friends. Like a red under-scoring of the mental distress and spiritual agonies, was the physical agony of being crucified. Bleeding slowly for hours beneath the hot sun, the sufferer's whole body cried out for water. The one cry of personal physical distress that was wrung from Jesus during those six terrible hours, however, was just that desperate "I thirst."

So we have to say of Jesus that he died in torture. But the last word from the cross which John records is not a word of pain but of power: "It is finished!" This does not mean "All is over!" as an admission of defeat. It is the shout of the victorious fighter after the battle, it is the cry sent up by the mountain climber who after many perils sets his foot on the topmost pinnacle never before scaled, it is the outburst of the engineer who after months of planning and years of working sees the span over the great river complete at last. He had said something very like this the night before (John 17:4), so that we must not think of the Cross as the one and only achievement of Jesus. The cross was the crowning accomplishment. Jesus' life and death were all of one piece, his death was "in character" with his life. Every man leaves his life unfinished in some respects. We leave behind us friends, children, a new generation, plans unfulfilled, words unspoken, work undone. Even Jesus knew what it was to wish to say things that could not be said. And even his perfect life has not had its full effect without other lives welded together into his living purpose. Nevertheless there was a once-for-all quality about Jesus. He had finished what no one else could have done.

For Us

This is true, because, as the Christian church soon came to see, Jesus' death was much more than everyman's death. Alone and uniquely it was on behalf of all men. This in turn would not have been so if Jesus had lived a selfish life; and it could not have been so, even if our Lord had wished, unless his life was more that of one man in history. For the church makes two great affirmations of faith about Jesus Christ the Lord: first, he is not only a particular man, but he is Man, he sums up in himself all the human race, he is the Man. The other affirmation: He is the Divine Son of God.

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
