The subject becomes even more urgent with only three days left in which to release, or apply, for cotton. Saturday, April 1, is the deadline for releasing cotton acreage. If all the county allotment is not used in the program, the county will lose its cotton history for all that is not planted or released. This poses a grave economic threat to the county and its economy as the cotton history lost cannot be made up under the present program. Farmers who do not plant or release their cotton allotment to others, lose out under the cotton support program and in Tishomingo County that could amount to many thousands of dollars in the 1961 crop year.

In urging the immediate release of unused cotton acreage, the county ASC manager has the following message for farmers:

If you are unable to come to the ASC office in Iuka, write a card or letter requesting that a Release Form be mailed to you.

If you have a neighbor who is working out of the county and his cotton acreage is not rented, help the county office contact him, today if possible, so that he may release his acreage.

The county ASC office in Tukwila will be open on Saturday, April 1, for any farmer who might be working away from home and could not get to the office during the week.

Also, Lafford Link at the Belmont Co-Op and Lewis Ferrell at the Tishomingo Co-Op have released forms. Farmers near those points can get the forms from them and release their cotton without coming to Iuka.

"Just remember this, if you can't work your cotton and cannot rent the acreage, be a good neighbor and release this acreage so other people can borrow and plant it," Mr. Allen concluded.

### Our Living Lord

Lesson for April 2, 1961

JESUS CHRIST is not a historical character in the same way that most such characters are. For historical characters are by definition figures out of the past. Whether the revived character, or the "image" of him that is now cherished, resembles the original man or not, still the historical character is always a dead-and-gone character. But Jesus Christ is radically different. He is not dead-and-gone. He did die, to be sure; but he rose again from the dead, as millions of Christians will be saying and singing this Easter morning. Yet this is not the last word about him. His rising-again in Joseph's garden was far away and long ago. The strange and most significant truth about Jesus Christ's resurrection is that he has risen over and over again—in the hearts of those who love him.

**From Sorrow to Joy**

Jesus Christ is a living person, our contemporary, one with whom we can speak in prayer and high moments of meditation. People outside the Christian religion do not always realize this, that Christ is as well as was,—that what he is and what he wants and what he approves are questions to which we can find answers. He is a person of the present and future, not only of the past. And not present as a mere ghost, a haunting spirit out of an ancient tomb, but a vivid, vital, present person. Have you ever known people whose very entrance into a room seemed to change the climate? Jesus was and is that kind of person.

What kept happening during the forty days after the first Easter has kept happening since. The disciples after Calvary were in the depths of a grief close kin to despair. A darkness deeper than Good Friday's "darkness at noon" had settled over them. But after the first shock of the Easter discovery that their Friend still lived, all the shock and sorrow were turned to joy. So it is wherever Christ comes into a life. The darkness fades, the sun comes in. Tears are bitter no longer.

**From Doubt to Faith**

If the story of Mary Magdalene illustrates the change from grief to joy in the living Presence of the Lord, the story of Thomas illustrates a passage from doubt to faith. Now there is something we need to remember about Jesus' appearances after the Resurrection that may help us with the story of Thomas. It is often supposed that various people saw Jesus after the resurrection, and because they saw, they believed. As a matter of fact, a study of the four gospels is likely to convince the reader that it was the other way around: Jesus did not appear to people to make them believe in him; on the contrary, there is no record that he ever appeared to unbelievers such as Caiaphas and Pilate and the Roman soldiers. Was Thomas an exception? On the face of it, Thomas was an unbeliever, yet Jesus appeared to him. Wait a moment—let us straighten this out. Thomas was (he said) an unbeliever in the resurrection, but he was a believer in Christ. He believed enough to be there with the disciples the Sunday after Easter. He was ready to believe, readier than he thought, as the story shows. He had doubts, yet he was still in heart a disciple. So the living Lord to this day turns doubts into faith—it happens somewhere every day of the world.

**From Discouragement to Devotion**

With Simon Peter it was still another kind of story. He was a disciple and a believer in the resurrection besides. But it did not at first seem to make much difference with him. He went on back to Galilee, to the old familiar fishing-grounds, to the old familiar job. For Peter, as for some today, Christ had to knock twice to be heard. No true disciple can face the risen Christ in personal faith and say, "So what?" The living Lord says still today to all part-way believers: "Do you love me? Feed my sheep."

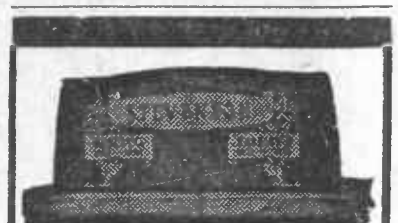

Check your calibration every morning so that you will know you are applying the correct amount of chemical to the acre.

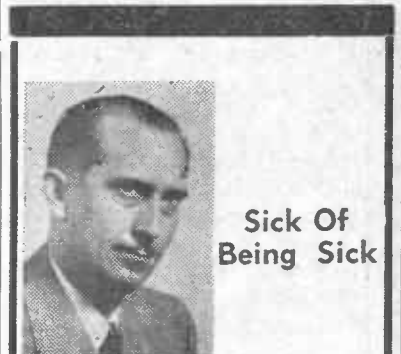

## When Cotton Is Not Planted

Perhaps all of us do not realize it, but the economy of Tishomingo County is tied very closely to agricultural productivity. No agricultural product is more important to the economy than cotton. For this reason, the ASC Committee has been urging farmers who intend to plant all their cotton acreage allotment to do so. Those who have cotton acreage allotment but do not plant all of it will be withholding the county economy thousands of dollars which otherwise would flow into its commercial channels. Furthermore, the county will lose history on all those not planted or released. Those farmers who have cotton allotments which are not going to use and who do not release it, will be fulfilling their mission for which the cotton land was allotted them. They may be said to be in the position of the farmer who had a vision one night in which he "P.C." in large letters floating before his eyes. He interpreted the vision as a divine call to "Preach Christ." He left his land idle and set out to preach. He was not successful and after several failures in the pulpit returned to his land and put his hand again on the "P.C.," he decided, really meant "plant cotton." He went to work to make up the time and goods he lost while off on the wrong mission. When the cotton farmers lose their cotton allotment, the economy of the county loses with them. The merchants lose, the equipment and other dealers lose, the banks lose and those dealing in other services lose. In short, everybody loses when cotton is not planted and acreage allotments are lost. Only three days remain for farmers in Tishomingo County to decide to put "their hands to the plow" on their cotton acreage, or release it to those who WILL. After April 1st it will be too late.

## Local Business

In several months, reports on economic situation in the nation varied from very bleak

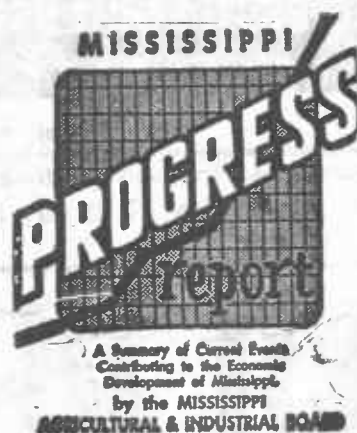
to bright. Some of the reports have been nothing more than guesswork. Some have been designed to serve political purposes. In the face of conflicting reports, there is any way for the retail merchant to get a true picture of his potential sales for 1961? Yes. A few reports are based on facts. Perhaps the most reliable

are the figures of the Federal Reserve Board. This disinterested agency indicates that 1961 is going to be an exceptionally good year for the retailer. The volume of spring shopping, according to the Federal Reserve Board, is running well above last year's volume. During the first week in March department stores did 26 per cent more business than they did in 1960. Dun and Bradstreet, another reliable source of information on market conditions, supports the optimism reflected in the Federal Reserve Board estimates. The firm reports retail trade "smartly" above a year ago.

Another sign worth noting: The nation's largest retail store has just announced that it will spend more on newspaper advertising in 1961 than it has during the previous year.

Of course some retail stores have lost business because of localized unemployment. In general, however, the retail merchant should be doing better than he did in 1960 or 1959.

Apparently some retailers are assuming that things are going to get worse before they get better. This attitude can certainly make the assumption true. It leads to a reduction in advertising and promotion which drives business to other stores. There is good evidence that the consumer has money to spend, and that he is spending it where he is being sold by strong local advertising.



**Southbridge Plastic Plant To Be Built At Corinth**

Southbridge Plastic Products, Inc., of Southbridge, Mass., will build a multi-million-dollar plant at Corinth for the manufacture of vinyl plastic, according to Julius H. Golding, president of the company. The plant will be the first "complete operation" plastics unit in the South, said Golding. He said this "will enable us to maintain our rigid quality-control standards" in manufacture of the finished product.

Golding said the company's present vinyl plant at Southbridge will continue in operation to serve eastern customers, while the Corinth plant will serve furniture and automotive manufacturing centers in the Mid-West.

He said the Corinth location will enable the company to open new markets for wall covering, floor covering, swimming pools, inflatable toys, marine upholstery and new products for home and industry.

Southbridge maintains branch offices and warehouses at New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, San

Francisco, Dallas and High Point, N. C.

**Booneville Shoe Plant Add 100 Employees**

Kimble Bolen, superintendent of Brown Shoe Company's Booneville plant, has announced that more than 100 operators have been added to the plant in the last week, bringing the total number of employees to over 500. Production at the plant has increased from 4,000 pairs of shoes daily to 6,000. The company opened its Booneville plant in 1955.

**Merger Forms Food-Producing Firm**

Mississippi's newest and most complete food producing business has been formed through the merger of Sanderson Brothers Farms, Inc., of Laurel, and Miss Goldy, Inc., of Hazlehurst. A completely Mississippi owned and developed business, the new enterprise will employ 350 persons immediately and will provide a market for frying chickens from the farms of some 150 independent farmers. The new business will market frying and other food products nationally.

Chickasaw voters approved, by 1142-36 vote, a \$400,000 BAWI bond issue for expansion of Futurian-Stratford Furniture Company at Okolona, where company officials plan to up employment from 350 to 475 and add 80,000 square feet to provide facilities for manufacturing a new type of chair. The election on a \$250,000 BAWI bond issue for construction of a warehouse for Charm Step Shoes at Itawamba, originally scheduled in March, has been re-set for April 1.

Choctaw, Inc., will build a plant at Utica for the manufacture of pre-stressed and pre-cast concrete slabs.

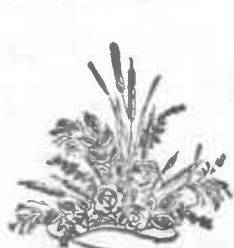
