Time To Renew Driver Licenses

Many Had Dec. 1960 And Mar. 1961 Renewal Dates, Dept. Warns

Do you have a current driver's license? It might be a good idea to look at it now. About 150,000 Mississippi drivers had their licenses expire on March 31. There are an additional 24,000 whose licenses expired December 1960, the Dept. of Public Safety warned today.

It is necessary to have a valid, current license in your possession when you operate a motor vehicle in the state. Failure to have the license can result in arrest. If you're arrested the court costs alone can be more than the renewal fee for the license.

Licenses may be renewed by mail to the driver's license division of the Department of Public Safety, Jackson, Miss., or at any county sheriff's office or city clerk's office. The renewal fee is \$2.00 for one year or \$4.00 for two years. You may renew for either period you choose.

Renewal notices will be mailed April 1 to those drivers whose licenses expired Dec. 1960 and July 1 for those who failed to renew on March 31. Check your license now. Be Sure.

Rural Carrier Position Open For Golden

An examination for Rural Carrier for the Post office at Golden, Miss., will be open for acceptance of applications until April 25, 1961, the U. S. Civil Service Commission announced today.

Applicants must take a written test for this position. They must have resided within the delivery of the office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of applications. There is no maximum age limit. However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary renewable appointments of one year.

Complete information about the examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the post office for which this examination is being announced. Application forms must be filed with the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, 25, D. C. and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.

1000 Will Attend 4-H Club Rally In Iuka On Friday

Talent Show, Parade Led By Iuka Band Will Be Featured Events

The annual Tishomingo County 4-H Clubs Rally will be held in Iuka this coming Friday, April 7. The event is expected to bring about 1000 4-H club members and adult leaders to the Iuka school gymnasium where the program will be held.

The clubs will assemble at 9 a. m. for the call to order by the president, Billy Joe Moss. The roll call will come at 9:15, made by the Council secretary, Annette Wade.

This will be followed by a 15-minute devotional delivered by James T. McCafferty, Jr., pastor of the Iuka Methodist Church.

Gerald Taylor, assistant state dairyman, will address the gathering at 9:30 to 10 a. m.

From 10 until 11:30 the various clubs will participate in the talent show. Several classes and divisions will be entered in this event which always attracts a great deal of interest.

Following the talent show, the clubs will be led in a parade by the Iuka High School Band, 11:30 to 12 noon. Lunch time will be held from 12 until 1 o'clock, with each person being responsible for his own lunch.

At 1 o'clock, the members will assemble back at the gymnasium for the field meets. This portion of the program will be the final event of the day and will feature a Potato Race, Sack Race and Free Throw. The rally will adjourn at 2 p. m.

Adult leaders are asked to come with the following information ready for the Rally leaders: Number enrolled in each leader's club, the number present, number in uniform and the number of adult leaders for each club.

Ribbons will be presented the clubs judged by these scores: Percentage present of number enrolled, a possible 100 points; Percentage of number present in uniform, possible 100 points; adult leaders, 10 points each; talent, points according to judges, possible 100 points; over-all conduct, including parade, possible 100 points.

Girls should wear 4-H dresses to be counted "in uniform."

Boys will be counted "in uniform" in any of the three following outfits, provided each boy in any particular club has on the same kind of trousers: White shirt and forest green trousers; white shirt and khaki trousers, or white shirt and jeans.

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"Confidence In A Growing America"

Nationwide, the indications are that the mild recession of the past eight months has ended. Some economists are already predicting record growth during 1961 and unprecedented prosperity in 1962.

A study of business trends by The Advertising Council indicates that the prophets of gloom and doom are running out of ammunition. And here are some of the reasons:

The eight-month decline in industrial production came to a virtual halt in February, the Federal Reserve Board has reported. There are encouraging signs in the automobile industry. Auto sales in general were up 19 percent from early February.

Manufacturers recently slowed the liquidation of factory stocks indicating many manufacturers may be nearing the point where orders will give production a lift rather than being filled out of warehouses.

The first drop in five months in the number of workers receiving jobless pay was reported by the Labor Department in its report on February.

Building contract awards point to a somewhat better than seasonal recovery in construction with the coming of suitable weather.

Department store sales rose smartly in February from the levels of both January, 1961 and February, 1960.

These developments have prompted a number of predictions of what the next two years hold in store for the nation.

Lewis L. Schellbach of Standard & Poor's estimates that the 1961 gross national product will turn out to be two percent higher than that of 1960 and that the final quarter will show a year-to-year gain of almost five percent.

He predicts that this upturn will continue into 1962. William F. Butler, vice president and economist for the Chase Manhattan Bank, has declared that the recession is "bottoming out." Mr. Butler is convinced that improvements in the second half of 1961 will result in "great prosperity in 1962." The economist said consumer purchasing could rise from \$10 billion to \$12 billion in the year ahead.

Around the country weekly and daily newspapers are using full-page ads to indicate their confidence in America's future growth.

Confidence in the growth of the American economy on a nationwide level is the result of confidence in local and small economies. The effect is cumulative. The nation as a whole reflects the confidence and optimistic action of towns and cities, businesses, merchants, manufacturers, across the country. The effect is cumulative. Local and small economies with faith in the future prosperity of their areas take action to expand and promote their own little economies and it all adds up to a national picture of growth and expansion.

What happens in Tishomingo County, Alcorn County, Prentiss, Itawamba, or any other county in Mississippi, to improve the local economies, improves, in a measure, the economy of the entire nation.

The Advertising Council of America has begun a national anti-recession campaign. The theme is "Confidence in a Growing America." A look about us here in this region will show the confidence well-founded. Mississippi and the South is growing in industrial importance. Southern economy is growing at a faster and faster pace each day.

The next time someone says, "How're things going?" answer with "Business is good" then work to make it so. Confidence is catching!

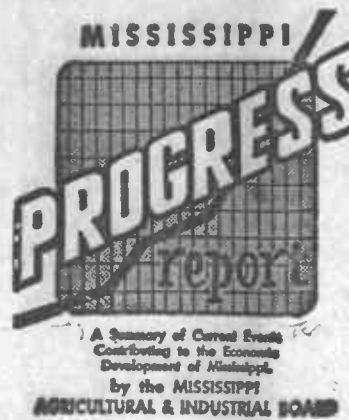

New Industry For Rankin County

A new industry is locating in Rankin County. Magnolia Bleacher Manufacturing Company, a division of Central Supply Company, is installing equipment in two buildings in the Pearl community. The new plant will make semi-portable and permanent type bleachers for football stadiums, parks, recreational areas and schools. About 40 people will be employed when the company gets into full operation in May.

\$56,000,000 Pecan Crop In 1960

Pecan trees produced 181 million pounds of pecans with a value of over 56 million dollars in 1960, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The 1960 Mississippi crop, estimated at 13,000,000 pounds, was valued at nearly four million dollars.

Ingalls To Build Largest Aluminum Hull Structure

The largest hull ever to be constructed of aluminum — a 100 by 50 by 11 foot chemical barge — will be built by the Ingalls Shipbuilding Corporation at Pascagoula for Reynolds Metal Company of Richmond, Va. Designed to carry sensitive liquid chemicals, the aluminum barge will be used by National Marine Service under contract with Reynolds. Delivery is expected sometime in July.

Mississippi-Alabama Sports Fishing Agreement Outlined By Game Comm.

E. C. Holland, Tishomingo County game warden, called attention today to the reciprocal agreement signed last year between Mississippi and Alabama, concerning fishing laws on parts of the Tennessee River. As the fishing season goes into full swing, the law is cited here for the benefit of fishermen who may not be familiar with the recent agreement between the two states.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is agreed by and between the State of Alabama, acting by and through the Director of its Department of Conservation, and the State of Mississippi, acting by and through the Chairman of its Game and Fish Commission that for the purposes of this agreement "sports fishing" as herein used shall be defined as the lawful taking of fish by ordinary hook and line, pole, casting with reel and rod, and use of artificial lures, spinning reel and rod, or fly rod.

And it is further agreed that the area affected by this agreement shall be defined as either the water or from the banks of said war of the following described part of the Tennessee River or embayments or impoundments, to-wit:

All that part of the Tennessee River and its embayments and impoundments between the junction of the Tennessee-Alabama-Mississippi line and a north-south line projected across the Tennessee River from the eastern end of the Old Riverton Lock, except and exclusive of that part of the Big Bear Embayment lying south of the Southern Railway bridge.

It is further agreed that any sports license or permit holder of the State of Alabama or any sports fish as herein defined in any of the waters of the areas above described if he has obtained and has in his possession while so fishing the licenses or permits required by either the State of Alabama or the State of Mississippi for fishing in said waters.

It is further agreed that the rules and regulations and creel limits pertaining to sports of the State of Mississippi apply to Alabama licenses when fishing in Mississippi waters as defined herein and the rules and regulations and creel limits pertaining to sports fishing

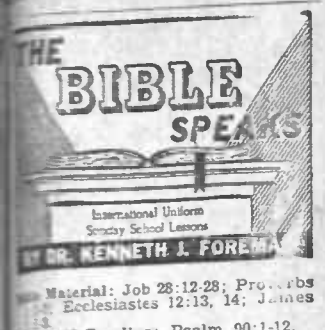

God's Answer

Lesson for April 9, 1961

Life is made of innumerable small decisions. Even in the most trivial and second childhood, we have to decide every day. We sometimes say that the Bible has the answers, or the Christ is THE Answer. This is true for the great life-changing decisions. But there are life-shaping as well as life-changing choices to be made. Wisdom is needed for the everyday decisions, the everyday small problems that truly are for the great once-in-a-lifetime crises. Can the Bible help us here?

Dead End Roads

The highway department has signs of signs. One is the kind that says "Louisville 50 miles" or "Through Traffic Keep Right." These signs tell you exactly what to expect. The other kind of sign is the one that reads "Dead End Road." It doesn't tell you about the road, or how far it is to anywhere. It only tells you that if you try that road you will get nowhere. Now the Bible has signs of both kinds. It takes the question of wisdom, for example. There are certain signs in the Old Testament called "Wisdom Literature," because they are crammed with directions on how to be wise. But a great part of the wisdom literature (Job, the Psalms, Ecclesiastes, some of the Proverbs) is not so much concerned with how to be wise, as it is with how not to be a fool. To put it another way, the Wisdom Literature puts up some Dead-End-Road signs for those who wish to be wise.

Life in Rebellion

In every generation the same notion comes to life again, the same notion that (in the Genealogy) occurred to the first people in the world: that if we want to be wise we must kick over the law, get out of the harness so we can speak, break the rules, stop listening to God's yes-men, throw the Commandments into the bonfire and live by some "higher" law. The roads of history are strewn with the bones of such rebels. People who do this (and we all try to do this some time or other) really look at themselves as the sufficient wisdom. They may not admit this, but it's true.

The Fear Of The Lord

Fearing God, as the Bible uses the expression, does not mean being afraid of him. There is, small as it is, a reverence for him. The fear of the Lord is said many times to be the beginning of wisdom, that is the beginning of wisdom, that is the beginning of wisdom. This does not mean that a God-fearing man, just because he worships God, and honors him, will thereby acquire all wisdom. Fearing God does not mean a man how to ride a horse or mend a tractor nor cure cancer nor to select a school for his children. But the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, all the wisdom. This means first of all that God's will is always best and that as far as it is made known to us, it is utterly foolish to pay God no attention. The fear of the Lord means, further, something that keeps us from fearing men. We are to fear something, or some one, we are that most foolish of all, the self-idolizer. We are to be public opinion, or to what the world thinks, or what we think is required of us to be respectable. We know to the idol called "Everybody Does It," as if a Gallup poll could find out what Right is in any situation. The fear of the Lord means that we keep remembering, in our days, that the last judgment is the only judgment that finally counts, is God's, not man's.

Enjoy Your Diet Breakfast!



Dieting? How does this sound for breakfast? Chilled orange juice; a bowl of ready-to-eat high protein cereal with sugar and nonfat milk; hot, buttered toast; black coffee. Sounds good to you, doesn't it? But, you're skeptical, aren't you? How can you eat such a tasty breakfast and still lose weight? This 400-calorie breakfast has been planned to meet the requirements of an adequate weight-reduction breakfast, established by scientists at the State University of Iowa as a breakfast which provides one-fourth of the daily caloric requirements and protein allowance with not less than 15 grams of protein. By eating this tasty morning meal, you will consume but one-fourth of an adequate weight-reduction diet. On such a diet, weight loss will be more gradual than on crash diets, but the loss will tend to be of a permanent nature, because you are establishing a pattern of eating which should help with permanent weight control. At the State University of Iowa, subjects on a weight-reduction program felt better and performed better, especially in the late morning hours when they had had an adequate breakfast. Try eating breakfast and see if you don't make out better when you are dieting.

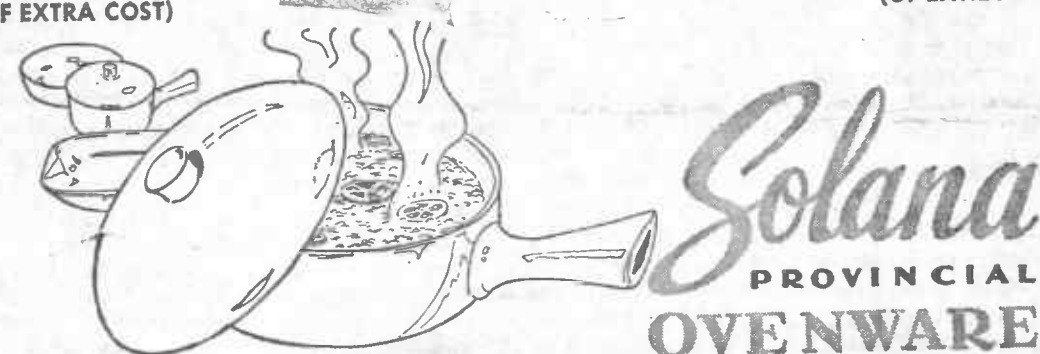

Cotton Notes

How do you place your fertilizer for cotton? It may be that you will want to change your method. When all fertilizer is broadcast, it often results in excess-high rates being used.

Try broadcasting around one half of the fertilizer and applying the rest in a band in the seedbed.

Place the mixed fertilizer to the side of the cottonseed drill in the seed bed. The placement should be four inches to the side and six to eight inches deep.

Farmers who place fertilizer in the middle buster furrow, should plow an extra deep furrow and put the mixed fertilizer in this furrow. Then bed out with your middle buster. This will place the fertilizer four to six inches below the cottonseed drill.

Sometimes farmers cut their yields by placing the fertilizer too close to the seed. This results in some damage to the roots.

What about seed treatment? Do you think it is worthwhile? With low germinating cottonseed this year, treatment is likely to be

It only costs about 10 cents a bushel to treat seed and could save you as much as \$30 an acre in costs of replanting or poor stands.

Herbicide Oil

Planning to use herbicide oil in cotton and soybean weed control this year?

If so, you will want to get a permit from the State Motor Vehicle Comptroller that lets you buy the herbicide oil without paying the state tax.

Write to the Motor Vehicle Comptroller's Office, Post Office Box 1140, Jackson, Mississippi, for your permit. See your county agent for more details on this.

Pasture Management

Keep those clovers grazed down.

Don't turn a lot of cows in on one large area of clover and expect them to graze it evenly. They will spot graze and allow some of the clover to seed out.

Divide the pasture into several smaller plots. Try a stocking rate of three head per acre. When they graze down the clover, move the cows to another area and let the grazed area make a comeback.

Keeping the clover grazed down helps make it last longer and also helps make for better summer pastures by keeping the fast growing clover from choking out the young grasses.

In community service, the club distributed commodities to old people in the county who had applied for them. W. W. Emerson delivered clothing, shoes, household articles which the club had collected for

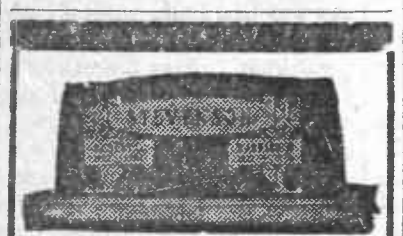
needy people.

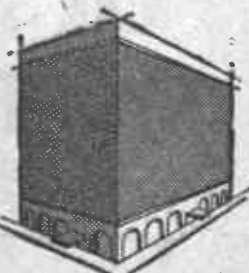

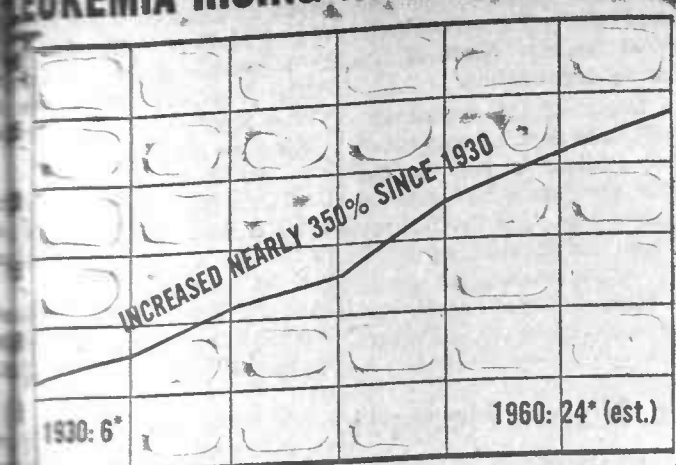

Heavy Fertilization Increases Yield, Saves Soil

By Hiram A. Jones

It is the raindrops that cause the greatest damage to soils. They strike the ground and churn up the soil surface, breaking it up in particles that float away. Raindrops also seal openings in the soil, stopping in sauk and increasing runoff.

Anything that breaks the force of the raindrops will help prevent soil erosion. This may be a heavy pasture sod or pine woodland or cotton. It may even be corn. The thicker the plant cover the fewer will be the raindrops that directly strike the ground and less erosion will occur.

Heavily fertilized pasture or row crops will grow faster. And because they grow faster they cover the ground quicker. This larger growth and better ground cover protects the soil from pounding raindrops.

Heavy fertilization of pasture and row-crops will increase the yields of these crops.

A study of Soil Conservation Co-operators show that, usually, the cooperators who fertilize their crops heavily produce the highest yields and are doing the best job of soil and water conservation.

Why not increase your crop and save more of your soil by fertilizing your crops according to soil tests.

The raw cotton, textile and garment industries in the United States are confronted with ever growing imports from Japan, Hong Kong, Pakistan and other low wage countries. This situation is posing a serious problem for cotton farmers and the garment industry of Mississippi. It is presenting a problem for our own Congressional District because we continue to produce large quantities of cotton and have many garment plants which provide work for thousands of our people. Many of these plants are struggling to exist. Some have closed and others are operating on a part time basis. Competition from imports is taking its toll. Textile mills of New England and the South are also feeling the impact of these low wage imports.

United States law prohibits the importation of more than 30,000 bales of raw cotton annually. The law is circumvented by the importation of cotton goods, textiles and garments. Almost 600,000 bales of cotton are now coming into the United States annually in the form of cotton goods. Seven of every eight bales of this cotton — 87½ percent — is grown in foreign lands. Much of it comes from Communist cotton producing countries. These imports are gnawing and eating away at the markets of our home plants — the largest and most dependable outlet for American grown cotton.

So, these imports, pouring into our country in ever larger quantities, are posing a threat to Mississippi cotton farmers, Mississippi garment plants, and Mississippi garment workers. With our high standard of living our farmers, our workers and our plants just cannot compete with the low wage mills and cotton farmers of these low wage countries. Allowed to continue, they will soon have us out of business and out of jobs.

Last year a concerted effort was made by the textile mills, garment plants and the National Cotton Council of the United States for relief through the U. S. Tariff Commission. President Eisenhower and the Commission turned us down. This year another effort is being made. It looks hopeful. President Kennedy has been petitioned to intervene and to apply import quotas on the ground that these home industries are important to

Highway Contracts Awarded In Tishomingo County

The Mississippi Highway Commission awarded contracts on Mar. 28 for two Tishomingo County road projects, Highway Commissioner Roy C. Adams said this week. Both the projects, calling for work on Miss. Highways 356 and 365 went to Worsham Bros. Construction Co., Corinth.

Contract I, in Prentiss and Tishomingo Counties, was awarded for a bid price of \$405,590.64, and calls for grading, drainage, culverts and box bridges on Miss. Highways No. 356 and 365. The work on 356 runs from its intersection with No. 365 to a point approximately one mile south of Burnsville. The work on 365 runs from Cairo to its intersection with Miss. No. 356.

Contract II, in Tishomingo County, calls for the construction of a .031 mile bridge over the Illinois Central Railroad at Holts on Miss. No. 365 and was awarded for a bid price of \$44,630.11.

Adams said that work orders should be issued on these projects in the near future.
