Highway Work Ordered In Tishomingo County

Work orders for construction on Miss. Highways 356 and 365 in Tishomingo County have been issued by the State Highway Department, Highway Commissioner Roy C. Adams said today.

Adams said that Worsham Bros. Construction Co., Corinth, has been notified that contract time on the projects will begin on April 17.

Contract I, in Prentiss and Tishomingo counties, calls for grading, drainage, and box bridges on Highways 356 and 365. On 356, the work runs from its intersection with No. 365 to a point approximately one mile south of Burnsville. The work on 365 runs from Cairo to its intersection with No. 356. Bid price was \$405,590.64.

Contract II is for the construction of a .031 mile bridge over the Illinois Central Railroad at Holts on Miss. No. 365. Bid price was \$44,630.11.

W. L. Bennett, project engineer at the Department's Booneville office, will be in charge of the work.

Preliminary work on this program has been completed in the ASC county office and farmers will be notified early next week.

of the beginning of the sign-up. Farm productivity index and base acreages have been established for each farm that a grain survey is completed on, E. N. Allen, Sr., county ASC office manager, said today.

"We had 1,214 farmers in Tishomingo County fill out the Grain Survey and the total base acreage for these farms is 15,060 acres," Mr. Allen stated. Under this program co-operators will divert at least 20 per cent of their 1959-1960 base acreage of corn. They may also divert additional acreage under certain limits.

Each county will have two average rates of payment per acre established for corn. One of these rates will be based on 50 per cent of the County Normal Yield per acre times the County Support Price. The other rate will be based on 60 per cent of the County Normal Yield times the County Support price. These rates will be mailed each farmer who filed an acreage report with the County ASC office.

The diverted acres that farmers rent to the government will be planned to a conservation use such as:

Permanent type rotation cover of grasses and legumes; temporary cover of grasses, legumes or small grain; trees; cropland in volunteer natural cover if the county committee determines that it will qualify.

The 1961 price support is one benefit the cooperating farmer receives from this program. For corn in Mississippi this tentatively is set at \$1.25 per bushel, compared to \$1.11 for 1960.

Farmers with less than 20 acres base acreage may place the entire amount in the program.

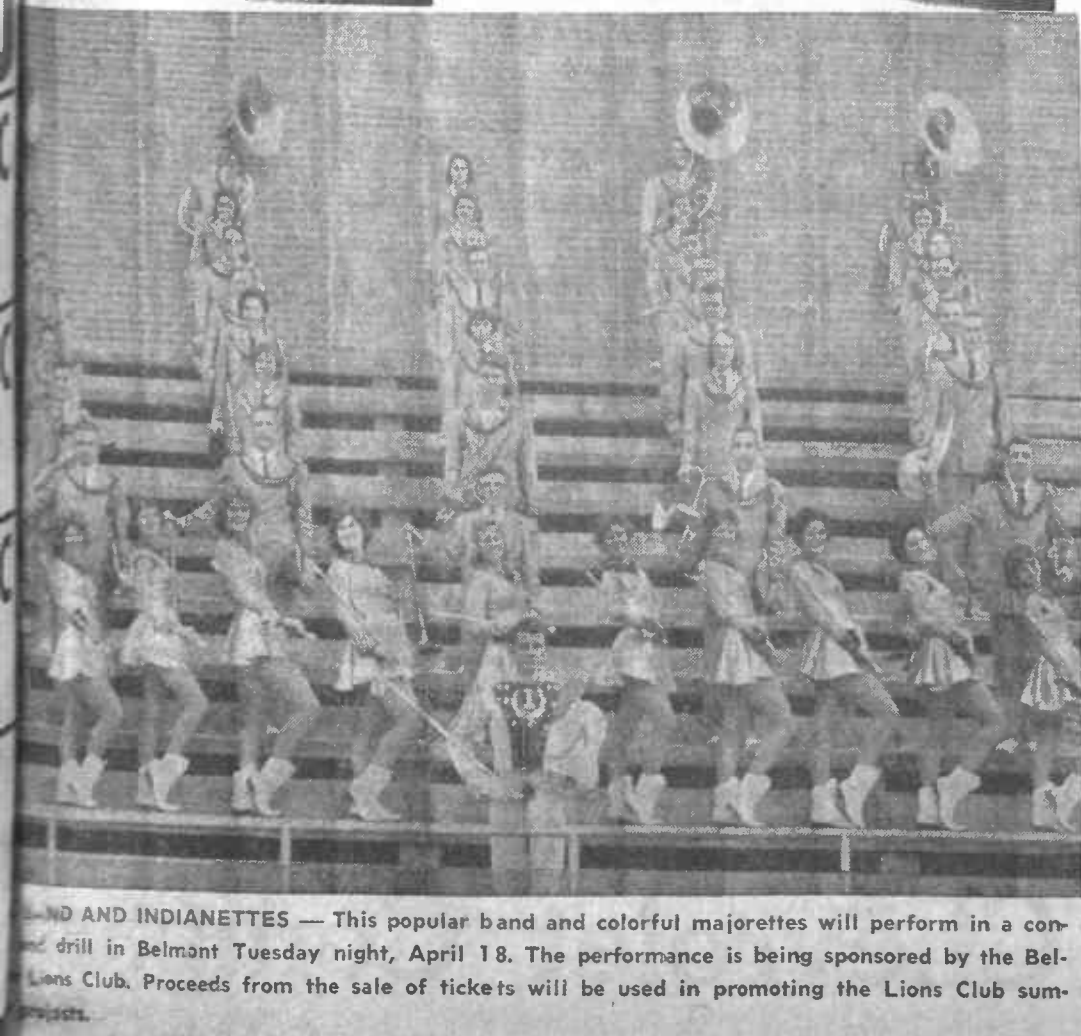
As additional incentive, a second 20 per cent of the base acreage may be diverted and receive a payment equal to 60 per cent instead of 50 per cent of the county yield.

The grain sorghum payments are determined in the same manner as corn payments.

If a farmer decides to rent some of his corn base he will receive one-half of the payment at the time he signs and the other half of the payment after the land is measured this summer. This means that the ASC office will pay cash money for half the acreage you rent when you sign up.

"In order to obtain a price support on corn or grain sorghum in 1961, a farmer must participate in the new program," Mr. Allen said.

For further information on the program, Mr. Allen asks all farmers who wish to participate to come into the Tishomingo County ASC office in Iuka.

GUEST EDITORIAL . . .

As Long As There Are Books

(Editor's Note: Miss Welty, native Mississippian and noted short-story writer and internationally known author has contributed the following article especially for the Mississippi observance of National Library Week, April 16-22.)

In none of our hospitals or institutions, we in Mississippi are being told by the librarians whom it has long grieved, can you find a book. The shelves are empty. There simply aren't any books in Whitfield, in Ellisville, in Parchman.

Can't we do something?

To our friends who are ill or unfortunate in one way or another we don't, because we are so well or lucky, stop speaking. Indeed our natural wish is to rush to communicate. And neither do books stop speaking to the unfortunate. Would they understand the books if they had them to read? It's condescending to ask: they may not understand all or even very much, and the same goes for us. Communication is a two-way process; but in reading, even if one intends to close oneself off, still — as long as there are books — communication, even at the frailest, does go on. Only if both ends stop, and only then, is communication hopeless. If the line's open, something more and more comes through.

To the perpetual child and the limited in mind, to the sick and infirm, and to the morally wavering, reading permits pleasure still, and this may be a pleasure greater than they've so far known: hope. Books may say things to those mentally worse off than we happen to be that we wouldn't recognize and might not believe, but this is valid and not a bit against the law. The written word is the language of the imagination. In the hands of an artist it always means more than it says, not less. It can mean what we think it says, plus what they think it says, plus what the author thought it meant when he put it on paper, and then some.

Does the Bible not speak to little children and to all those who stay children — to whom it must be read aloud — as we can remember for ourselves? Would we deprive a child of the twenty-third Psalm because he can't add 2 and 2 and has been set to peeling potatoes at Ellisville? And to the scholars, our own understanding must seem proportionately childlike. We, however, can read any book we like — or our libraries will be glad to get it for us.

Indeed, who says that we ourselves in general understand, really, any vast per cent of what we can read if we want to? Yet nobody punishes us for this.

Who are we, the supposed well ones and the up-standing custodians of the books, to say what poetry "means" to those to whom, for all we know, nothing else has power to speak? After all, the imagination is aware, even alert, when perhaps the rest of the mind is but half awake, or partly darkened or disturbed, or pulled towards acts we can see fit not to condone.

And as for bookless Parchman — is there any real reason why, if you have robbed a bank, you are thereby judged unfit to enjoy Robinson Crusoe? Or to ponder Pilgrim's Progress — or at least the fact that is was written in jail. And so many great books, let us not forget. For any mind anywhere can become alight with the wish, the joy of the wish, to get in touch; communicate with the world.

Enrichment of the mind follows reading not as inevitably as the thirst is quenched by a glass of water going down, yet an open mind stays thirstier forever than a parched throat ever gets. Enrichment of the mind is gradual, increasing with time and practice, and remains as something we have absorbed due to the persuasion and the suggestion and the enchantment of the word, working on our whole lives, by way of our own individual pasts, our own peculiar powers, our private imaginations. But reading is its own end.

To deprive the already deprived — of treasure! — by not giving them books seems a callous waste of a chance — the best we've got, perhaps — to give what is, after all, not exactly ours to give but what lies, by its nature and intent, already in the public domain.

Don't let us punish anyone, anywhere, ever, by keeping any book at all away from him. Rather let us see that those hopeless, empty shelves fill up. From our end, we can still get in touch.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS, we live in a world which demands a re-dedication to the enduring intellectual and spiritual values essential to the progress of a free people in a free society;

WHEREAS, our libraries make accessible the accumulated experience of all mankind, from which present and future generations may derive the wisdom and understanding vital to our national survival;

WHEREAS, the development of life-time reading habits are necessary for individual fulfillment and for achieving the highest qualities of citizen-capability;

WHEREAS, the freedom to read is the responsibility and privilege of all people in a democracy;

NOW THEREFORE, I, Mrs. John H. Allen, Mayor of the city of Iuka, Mississippi do hereby proclaim the week of April 16 to 22, 1961 as Library Week and urge all citizens to unite in this national effort to achieve a better-read, better-informed America, to stimulate interest in libraries of all kinds — to the end that we realize the full potential of our national purpose.

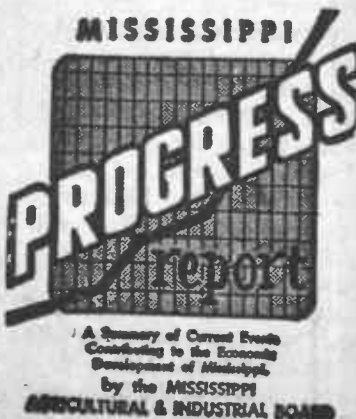

Mississippi Firm Supplying Fixtures for Puerto Rican Church Lighting fixtures manufactured in DeSoto county will soon illuminate the interior of the largest church on the island of Puerto Rico. Light and Power Utilities Corporation at Olive Branch will supply all of the interior lighting fixtures for Santuario Maria Auxiliadora, a Roman Catholic Church now under construction in San Juan, Puerto Rico. The church, 256 feet in length and 128 feet wide, will seat 2,140 when completed. Construction began last June, and the building is scheduled for completion in December.

Trawler Launched By Gulf Coast Company The "Sherry Lynn," a 65-foot fishing trawler, has been launched at the A. W. Covacevich Shipyard, Biloxi, according to company officials. Construction for the Cook Fish Company of Panama City, Fla., the trawler has a 19-foot beam and will be powered by a 170-horsepower diesel engine. Other boats being constructed by the company include a 65-foot party boat for N. L. Clark Lines, Corpus Christi, Texas; and a 55-foot steel tug for Kennedy Marine, of Biloxi.

State's Tourist Attractions Are Promoted and Publicized Mississippi's tourist attractions are being boosted by the Agricultural and Industrial Board. The state's "Miss Hospitality," Miss June Wood, of Hattiesburg, handed out thousands of pieces of literature on the state at travel shows in New York City, Chicago and Milwaukee in recent weeks, where the state's exhibit — with an ante-bellum motif — won high praise for its attractive appearance. "Holiday Ahead," the Holiday Inn magazine, featured the Natchez Pilgrimage in its March issue. The April issue of "Woman's Day" magazine carried an article titled "Biloxi, Miss., Where You'll Find Sunshine, Good Food and a Strong Sense of the Past." The article includes 13 color photographs of scenes in and

around Biloxi. And "Travel" magazine, which covers tourist attractions throughout the world, ran a feature story on the Natchez Trace in its March issue. Newspapers throughout the country continue to publish features on Mississippi's various Civil War Centennial events, and the Illinois Central railroad is publicizing a series of tours to Jackson, Vicksburg and Natchez out of the Chicago and St. Louis areas, to coincide with Centennial pageants in Mississippi.

MSU Scholarship Offered 4-H And FFA Boys By Federal Land Bank

Mississippi farm boys finishing high school this year, who are members of either the FFA or 4-H club, may be eligible for a four-year, \$1200, Federal Land Bank scholarship according to Max E. Benoist, manager of the Corinth Federal Land Bank Association.

Benoist says that the purpose of the scholarship is to assist boys to further their agricultural education at Mississippi State University.

To be eligible for this scholarship, according to Benoist, the applicant must have grades in the top 30 per cent of the senior class and be a member of the 4-H club, and have demonstrated leadership ability.

In setting up this program last year with Mississippi State University, John L. Ryan, president of the Federal Land Bank of New Orleans, said that it was the desire of the bank to stimulate and encourage farm-trained youths who might not otherwise be able to attend college to obtain degrees in agriculture. One scholarship award of \$300 will be given each year to an entering freshman, renewable to the recipient in his sophomore, junior, and senior years provided he meets the necessary qualifications.

Applications for the scholarship have been sent out by the college to the high schools and to the county agents. Others are available at the local Federal land bank association office.

Applications are to be mailed direct to Mississippi State University, State College, Mississippi.

No Insurance

Lesson for April 16, 1961

IF MORE questions are raised than are answered, in the Bible study for this week, that is because for three weeks the center of attention is on the book of Job, part of the Bible's "Wisdom Literature." The book of Job itself raises a question which it does not finally answer. The important thing this week is to get hold of the problem. Next week and the week after that we shall be concerned more with the answers.

Job Is Every Man

There is no need to inquire whether this book of Job refers to some historical individual named Job, or whether this is a drama, a book of profound thought cast in the form of a story. For Job lives on every street, your middle name is Job. Job is the man who has everything. He is the man that Americans all want to be. He "has it made." He has a big family that is a credit to him, he has wealth more than he needs. He has solved the problem of security. He does not need help from the government nor from any man. He is, you might say, insured against trouble. Wealthy, respected, successful—put Job into modern tailored-made clothes, exchange his tent for a big house at a desirable address, and he looks so much like a 20th-century American of the "high salary bracket" kind, that a play can actually be written today, with the scene laid in our time and nation, using the very plot of the book of Job, and that play can be a smash hit on Broadway and around the country.

Most other books of the Old Testament are distinctly Jewish. This book of Job is not. The man Job is not a Jew; he is called (purposely) vaguely a man from Uz, one of the "children of the East," the societies reaching 25 out of 31 objectives listed on the worksheet will receive special recognition at the district meeting. no son or Israel. Here is universal man. His questions are all men's questions, his problem is our own.

When Life Crashes In

The reader of Job should not inch along a few verses at a time. Take your next day off and read the book straight through, or if you can't do that, then take at least a chapter at a time. The book is mostly a debate, but the debate begins with a story about another debate, one between God and Satan. God asks Satan if he has taken a good look at Job: there is a good man for you! Satan does not agree. Job is not good, he is only smart, Satan says. He is good because God has blessed him with success and happiness. Let God (as it were) stop Job's pay and he will see the last of Job. So God gives Satan leave to do his worst, only he must not touch Job himself.

Then comes a smashing series of disasters. Job's wealth and his family are all swept away, and Job is left poor and lonely with only a bitter wife for companion. But Job does not turn away from God. The next time Satan comes to visit God, God asks him: Did you see my servant Job? He is better than you thought. You moved me against him, to destroy him without cause; but he still is a good man. Oh, Satan says, he still has his health. He can start life again. Let me drag him down in sickness and pain, and you will rear him curse you to your face. Then God, who believes in the man Job, gives Satan permission to wreck this man's body, and it is done. Now the problem is a terrible one. It is this: Why does God permit disasters?

No Insurance

Some of the answers brought out in the book of Job will be mentioned in the next two weeks' columns. For the present, the point is that there is no insurance in this world, against trouble. To be sure, you can buy insurance which will put a check in your hand if your husband dies. But you cannot buy insurance which will guarantee he will live as long as you do. There is absolutely no insurance that life, your life, will not crash. No amount of goodness, no heroism, no amount of service one to others, will insure you that you will go down to your grave without a care of a grief in the world. The only insurance you can buy (and it is good so far as it goes) will pay you money, when the crash comes.

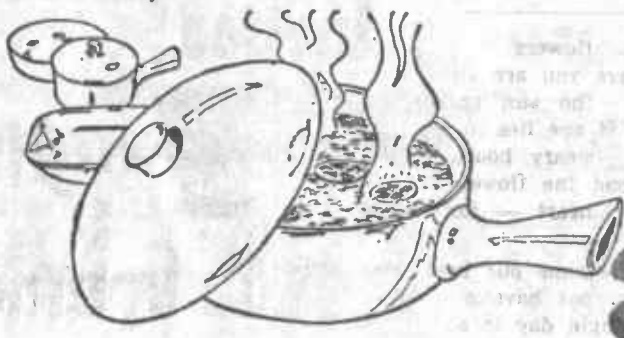

Now Is The Time To Fertilize Your Fish Ponds

By Hiram A. Jones
Work Unit Conservationist,
USDA-SCS

You can produce more fish in your fish pond if you fertilize it. Of course your pond should be properly stocked with blue gill and bass, or one thousand (1000) bluegill with fish, ten (10) bluegill to each bass, or one thousand (1000) bluegill and one hundred (100) bass per acre, fertilizing will do little or no good. Fertilize only properly stocked ponds.

If your pond is properly stocked this is what you should do: Apply at least 100 pounds, but not over 200 pounds of 8-8-4 fertilizer per acre of surface water you have in your pond now. Then in two weeks make another application of the same kind and amount of fertilizer. Apply 3 or 4 applications of fertilizer at from ten days or two weeks intervals. Just walk around the

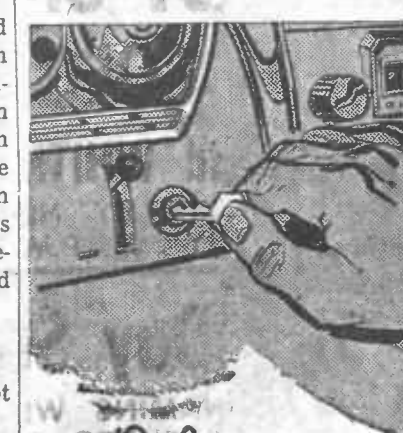

Forestry Notes

By Larry Brewer

Area Forester Mississippi Forestry Commission

Sooner or later/ all timber growers are faced with the problem of thinning out their timber stands. The purpose of thinning is to produce the stand density (number of trees) and thus provide for faster growth of the remaining trees.

Reducing the number of trees allows the remaining trees to retain larger live crowns and thereby manufacture more plant food which results in increased growth. Dense natural stands of reproduction represent a more critical situation with regard to thinning than plant stands because intense com-

petition between trees in natural stands frequently occurs before the trees are sufficiently large enough to be utilized. In plantations the spacing is ordinarily wide enough to allow the trees to attain marketable size before competition is severe. In view of the fact that a thinning may be an expensive operation in a young unmerchantable stand, a decision must be made on whether to defer thinning until marketable trees can be cut and

thus possibly sacrifice some growth or to make a thinning involving some cost before the trees are marketable.

Two methods of thinning are recognized, the choice depending on the end product sought. If larger volume is wanted, then the larger dominant trees will be retained, the smaller trees underneath cut for salvage and to permit the crowns of the larger trees to develop properly. If high-quality

saw logs or piling is sought, cutting will remove the dominants, leaving the straight clean trees that have fair crown development. Obviously diseased and defective trees and trees of poor form should be removed in any thinning operation.

The important consideration in thinning for pines is that they be moderately heavy. Crowns should be watched in thinning. Every tree should be given space to grow and develop into a larger tree. This can be accomplished by providing some room for crown spread at each cut. It should also have as an objective the maintenance of tree crowns which have a length equal to about 40 percent of the tree height.

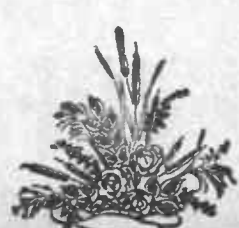

Counce, Tenn., Plant Workers To Decide On Labor Representation

The National Labor Relations Board will conduct a representation election among the production and maintenance employees of the Tennessee River Pulp and Paper Company at Counce, Tenn., on April 19, it is announced today. The production and maintenance employees will indicate their choice in the election as to whether they wish to be represented by any labor organization.

The International Brotherhood of Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers, AFL-CIO, and the United Paper-Makers and Paper Workers, AFL-CIO, have filed petitions with the National Labor Relations Board seeking to represent all production and maintenance employees. The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, AFL-CIO, has filed petitions seeking to represent the electrical and instrument employees in the Counce

plant. A majority of the employees voting in the election must vote for a labor organization before it will be certified as the bargaining agent of the employees.

William Magruder, Field Examiner for the National Labor Relations Board in Memphis, will conduct the election. The election will be conducted by secret ballot and neither the unions seeking representation nor the company will know how any employee votes.

Feed Grain Program

If you grew any corn in 1959 and 1960, you may want to consider signing up for the 1961 feed grain program. The idea is to help our government reduce the national surplus of feed grains. This threatens the livestock-grain producing part of our agriculture.

You may qualify for a payment by taking 20 per cent, or 40 per

cent, or possibly all—depending upon your base acreage—of your corn acreage out of production and putting it to a conservation use.

The payment per acre may be higher than you can net per acre from growing corn. If you use on your farm the corn or grain sorghum that you grow, the payment should be enough for you to buy at market prices more than half as much as you could norm-

ally grow on the diverted acres—and there's no weather or other risk. You can get half of this payment when you sign up.

Farmers taking part in this program will be eligible for the 1961 support prices on corn and grain sorghum. These support levels are higher than for 1960, and are expected to stay somewhat above market prices.
