Feed-Grain Sign-up Begins In County;

E. N. Allen, office manager of the county ASC office, announced today that applications for participation in the 1961 Feed-Grain program began Wednesday, April 19. The closing date for the sign-ups will be June 1, 1961.

Farmers will receive notice of the 1961 Feed-Grain acreage and payment rates through the mail this week, Mr. Allen stated. If any are interested in diverting a part or all of their corn base acreage, up to 25 acres, they should contact the Tishomingo County ASC office soon for further details.

"Tishomingo County will have 2 average rates of payment for co-operators in the program. The first payment will be 50 per cent of the county normal yield times the county support price," Mr. Allen said. "The second payment will be 90 per cent of the normal yield times the county support price," he concluded.

Accident Fatal To Charlie Davis

Tuscumbia Man
Injured In Wreck
On Highway 25-N

A car-tractor collision on Highway 25-N last Thursday evening about 7 o'clock resulted in the death of Charlie Davis, age 58, of Iuka Route 4.

Mr. Davis, on his farm tractor with a small trailer attached, was traveling south on the highway when a car, also traveling south, rammed into the trailer from the rear. Driver of the automobile was George M. Garber of Tuscumbia.

Mr. Davis received multiple fractures of the legs and back and also a head injury. He was first taken to Tishomingo County Hospital for emergency treatment and later transferred to Campbell Clinic in Memphis. He died shortly after arriving at the Memphis hospital.

Mr. Garber received a slight head injury but was not hospitalized. After striking the trailer, Mr. Garber's car flipped over and skidded for several yards on its top along the highway. The accident was investigated by Mississippi Highway patrolman, Zeke Clark and Tishomingo County deputy, Audie Patterson.

Funeral services for Mr. Davis were conducted Saturday afternoon at New Salem Baptist Church. Rev. C. L. Ivy of Belmont and Rev. R. E. Pate of Cherokee, officiated. Burial was in the church cemetery with Cuthall of Iuka in charge.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Leslie Davis; two sons, Charles W. Davis of Memphis, William Davis of Iuka; three brothers, Carroll Davis of Iuka, Arthur Davis of Greencastle, Ind., Sidney Davis of South Mississippi; five sisters, Mrs. Bessie Provins of Gary, Ind., Mrs. Bertha Fite of Houston, Texas, Mrs. Alma White of Chicago, Ill., Mrs. Cleo Kennedy of Lambert, Miss., and Mrs. Mary Franks of South Mississippi.

Sheriff Pace And Deputies Aid In Bank Robber Capture

Feb. 4 Robbery Of Counce, Tenn.,
Bank Solved By Arrest Of Area Man

Sheriff Clarence Pace disclosed that his department, working with Mississippi Highway Patrol officers, the Iuka City Marshal and FBI agents from Tupelo and Jackson, solved the February 4 robbery of

the Citizens Bank of Savannah at Counce, Tenn.

Solution of the two-months old crime came with the arrest of Ezra Joslin, last Saturday night April 15, at his home near Burnsville. E. Z. Clark and Audie Marlar, Miss. Highway Patrol officers and H. F. Chambers, Iuka City Marshal, and deputy sheriff Aubrey Patterson were among the arresting officers with Sheriff Pace and FBI agents when Joslin was apprehended.

Mr. Pace stated that arrest of the 36-year-old Joslin was the result of an extensive investigation and that the unemployed farm laborer had been under surveillance continuously since the Feb. 4 robbery and especially since he moved to Tishomingo County about a month ago.

Joslin led officers to a wooded area near his home where he had hidden part of the loot. The amount recovered was small. It was still in the money bag which had been stolen from the bank. Joslin gave as his reason for committing the burglary, the fact that he was in financial difficulties. He has a large family — ten children — and indicated that most of the money had been used to pay off debts.

Joslin was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner J. Louis Adams at Selmer, Tenn., the night of his arrest. He waived preliminary hearing and his bond was set at \$10,000. In default of bond, he was committed to the McNairy County, Tenn., jail.

Our Pulpwood Industry

"Money doesn't grow on trees" the old saying goes, but in recent years we here in Tishomingo County and in the South generally have seen trees "grow into money."

In the 1930's and '40's, when planting pine seedlings as a conservation measure was something of an innovation, a novelty, it could hardly be foreseen what a tremendous boost pulpwood would give to the prosperity of the southern region.

Many people were skeptical of the idea of tree-farming — raising trees for a future "cash crop" — as having any real practicality. But time and growth of the southern pulp and paper industry have proven what skepticism would not let us believe: that tree-farming and the pulp and paper processors make fine partners in the growth of southern prosperity.

Paper, in its myriad forms and uses, is essential to our everyday lives, to the carrying on of business, to the running of our households, to the education of our children, to the operation of government on all levels — from the smallest town to the federal government and to publication of the newspaper to keep you informed.

The southern pulpwood industry, from the tree-farmer to the pulp processor are factors of great economic importance to this region. In fact, it is the South which supplies nearly two-thirds of the pulpwood harvested in the U. S. for production of the nation's pulp and paper products.

This, and other pertinent facts are pointed out by the Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association in observance of Pulp and Paper Week, April 23-29 throughout the South.

Twenty to twenty-five years ago, few people could have visualized what a strapping giant the infant pulpwood and paper industry in the South would grow into. Today, woodlands in the 12 states extending from Virginia to eastern Texas and southeast Oklahoma, produce more pulpwood than any other area of its size in the world.

And here is what this means in terms of direct benefit to southern economy: jobs for more than 83,000 persons in the region's pulp and paper mills; employment for another 82,000 who are engaged in the independent business of supplying pulpwood to these mills.

Income totaling nearly a billion dollars annually is received by tree-farmers, employees of pulp and paper plants, pulpwood producers and workers transporting these materials in the South.

Since 74 per cent of the region's forest land are held by individual landowners, these thousands of owners receive the major portion of the income derived from supplying pulpwood.

All that we have said so far is not the brightest part of the picture. The Southern pulpwood industry is still young. It has tremendous possibilities for growth. We can look forward to the coming years bringing even greater payrolls to workers, greater income to growers, increased profits to processors and resultant expansion of plants to take care of increased demands for paper products. Proper management and development of our woodland resources, hard work and foresight, planning for the future, will turn the trick that turns our trees into money — and a greater prosperity than our grandfathers ever dreamed of.

Vicksburgers Invent

Gyratory Testing Machine

A "back-room shop" in Vicksburg is a bee-hive of activity today as associates of the Engineering Development Company, Inc., complete and pretest another Gyratory Testing Machine for shipment. The machine, an invention of two Vicksburgers, John L. McRae and Joseph P. Wislocki, was given a patent on February 21. It is used to test bituminous mixes and soils. Machines have already been delivered to the Louisiana State Highway Department, to a pavement contractor in Indiana and to a major oil company for use overseas. The machine now being completed will be delivered to Purdue University for use in research and instruction in soils engineering. The machine is a precision engineering instrument, and each is carefully pretested by the inventors before shipment.

Osyka BAWI Vote

Set For May 2

The Agricultural & Industrial Board has granted authority to Osyka and the fifth district of Pike County for a \$300,000 BAWI (Balance Agriculture With Industry) election May 2 to finance construction of an industrial plant for Croft Aluminum Company of McComb. The plant will make aluminum doors and initially will employ about 125 persons.

"Best Month" For

Port Of Gulfport

Gulfport port director Richard Swenson says the state port experienced its best month of 1961 in March when 16 ships handled cargoes totaling 30,984 tons. For the first time in recent months, according to Swenson, the tonnage was fairly evenly divided between export and import consignments. Principal exports were fertilizer and cornmeal, while bananas, raw jute and cotton bagging formed the bulk of the import activity.

BAWI Bond Election

Set For Wiggins

A BAWI bond election has been set for Wiggins April 22 on \$250,000 in bonds to build a plant for Southern Paper Company, Inc. The proposed plant will employ 85 in the manufacture of paper products and will produce approximately four tons of toilet tissue and 15 tons of paper towels daily.

New Plant Announced For

Kosciusko Coach Plant

D. A. Shields, vice president of Superior Coach Corporation, announced that the company's Kosciusko plant will start manufacturing a new series of funeral cars and ambulances, that two new government contracts will add \$1.5 million of new production and 300,000 additional working hours at the plant, and that the company's International Division, operating out of the Kosciusko plant, will start serving plants in Indonesia, Afghanistan and the Philippines as well as the four plants presently served in South America. Superior manufactures, school buses, transit coaches and funeral cars at the Kosciusko plant, which employees 375 persons. The plant was opened in 1950 and was financed by a BAWI

bond issue.

Stone County Factory

Construction To Start

Construction of the new Brown-Miller pickle factory at Wiggins will get underway in early May, according to an announcement by the Stone County Industrial Board. The new expanded facilities of the plant will be financed by a \$450,000 BAWI bond election approved last January by a vote of 1981 to 22.

Third Division Marines serve a two-month tour with the Third Provisional Battalion Landing Team aboard ships of the Seventh Fleet in the Western Pacific.

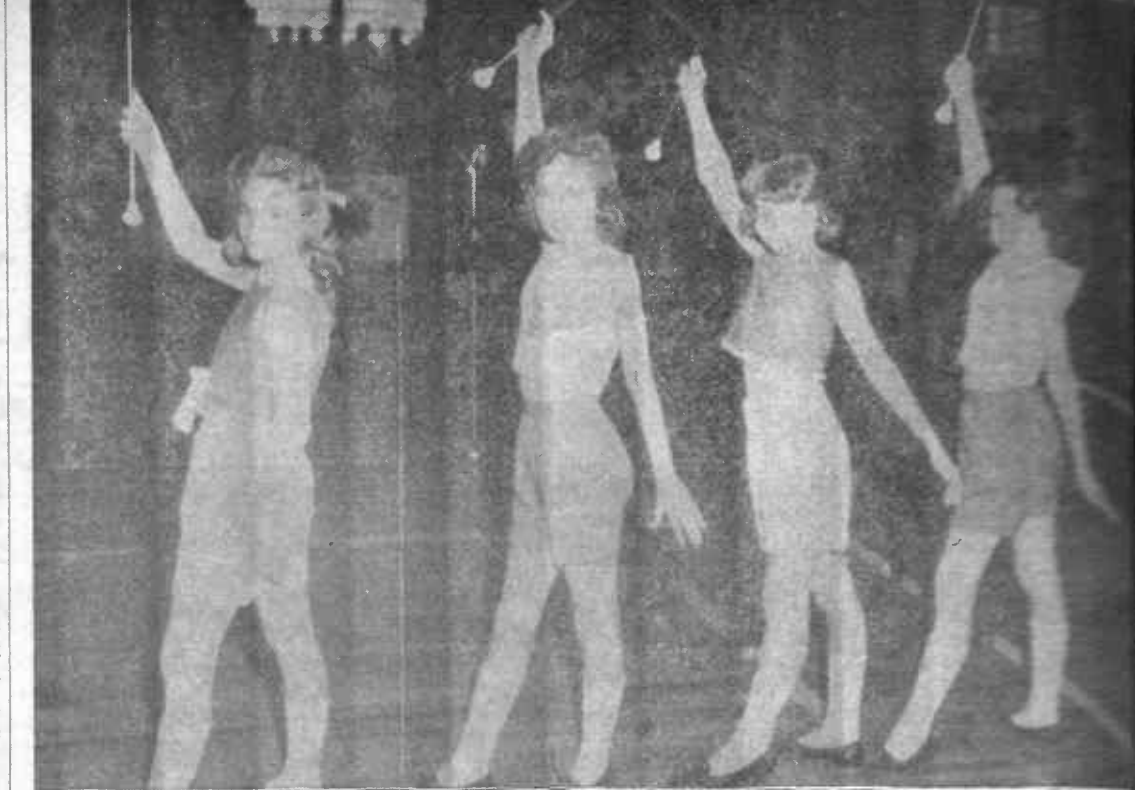
Gerald A. White

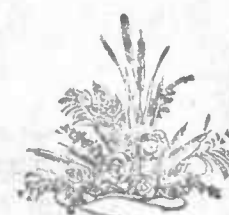

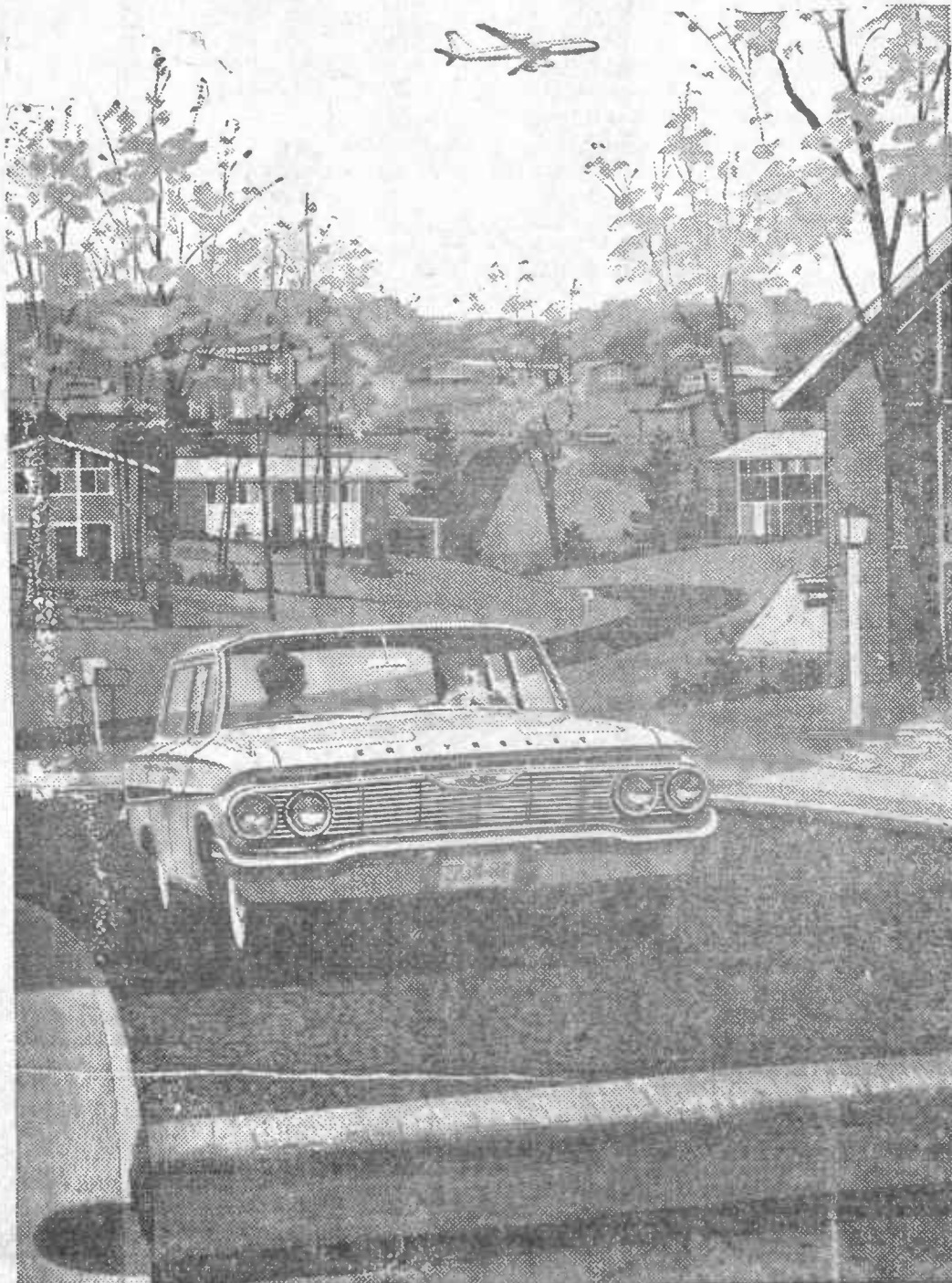

Forest Fires Costly To Mississippi

Area Forester Urges Precautions Be Taken When Burning Brush

"Forest fires are costing Mississippians a fortune," states Area Forester Larry Brewer of Tishomingo County. Approximately five dollars per acre is lost in a fire in an average timber stand. This is a very conservative estimate that does not include loss in future growth and value. Seven times that figure or thirty-five dollars per acre is lost to the state economy. Every individual is affected.

"The next few years will probably bring about the most dangerous period of the fire season," Brewer declared. This severe danger period is brought about by careless brush and debris burning. The Mississippi Forestry Commission realizes that brush and debris burning in some cases is necessary and urges all land owners who feel that they must burn to please take careful precautions before striking the match and notify Dispatcher T. O. Whitfield at Woodall Tower before burning.

"At no time," Brewer emphasized, "should burning be done on days with high winds." Contact your area forester for advice before burning if you have any doubt about it being a safe day.

Mississippians cannot be proud of the present forest fire occurrence record which ranks at or near the top nationwide in the number of forest fires. At the same time the state ranks on or near the bottom in per capita income. Area Forester Brewer said that the prevention of the useless destruction of forest fires will be a good start toward raising the income to a comparable basis with that of other states.

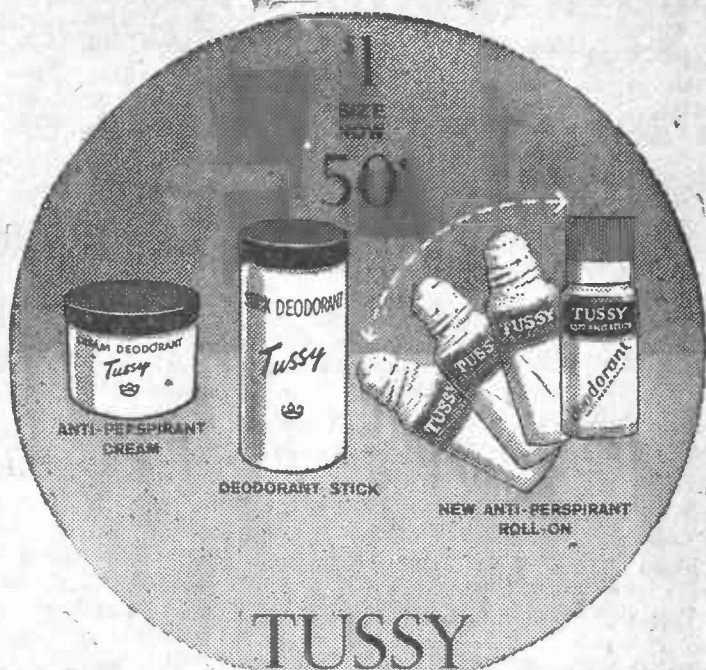

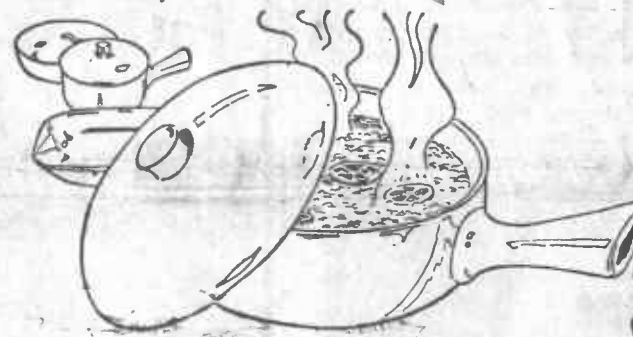

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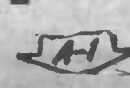
