It has begun to be noticeable, the increasing number of out-of-state and out-of-region automobiles traveling on the highways in Tishomingo County. That's a sure sign that spring has come and Mr. and Mrs. U. S. Tourist has taken to the road. It is time to roll out the welcome mat and give these tourists an opportunity to become acquainted with the vacation attractions of this area.

Tourist business promotion is one of the most lucrative enterprises a community can undertake. And when a community or area such as ours has so much to offer as a vacation resort, every means should be taken to promote it to the fullest. Tourist business has become one of the fastest growing developments in the entire country. Every region has its own peculiar attractions to sell and requires, as a rule, very little investment in construction and other materials to make it go. Growth, in fact, follows on the heels of tourist business.

The U. S. Chamber of Commerce notes there are basically three ways to bring new money and new business into an area. These are agricultural development, industrial development and tourist development. Of these tourist promotion is probably the quickest and least difficult of the three.

In this state, tourist business has become one of the most important sources of income. It should also be one of the most important sources of income in this county.

What must we do to get that income?

The first step in attracting visitors is to advise. The region must be advertised in order to let potential vacationers know what it has to offer. Then, having attracted visitors, we must provide his needs as to food, lodging, entertainment and other services vacationists expect.

Tishomingo County has abundant attractions to offer tourists — scenic beauty, historical interests, recreation, sunshine, modern resorts and many others. These are the things tourists want and expect. It is estimated that three-fourths of all tourists are most interested in sightseeing. This is followed by water sports such as swimming, skiing, boating, fishing, and visiting historical sites. And here in Tishomingo County we can offer every single one of these items most attractive to tourists.

Another important thing to remember in connection with tourism is pointed out by the state A & I Board. The Board says there is no such thing as an 'industrialist' and a 'tourist' — they are both one and the same. The tourist trade is vitally important to our industrial development efforts for it is true that industry follows travel.

Today's tourist may be tomorrow's industrial prospect. Let's make this area appeal to either role the visitor may play.

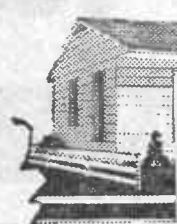
Teacher Work Set For Blue College In June

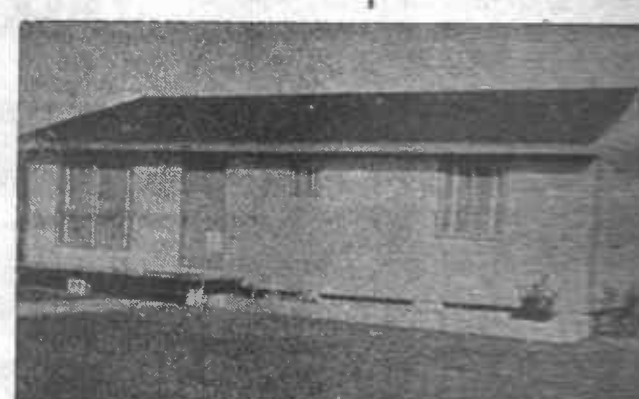

Horn Flies
Get an early start on hornfly control this year. Help prevent big build ups of these pests. Be starting your control program now.
Your county agent has detailed information on controlling these flies with sprays, dusts or back-rubbers.

Be sure that you follow the directions correctly when using insecticides for this purpose.

What About Sorghums
Sorghum looks particularly promising on drouthy soils and for silage crops.

New varieties of intermediate type grain sorghum show much promise for a high quality, high

yield silage crop.
Recommended varieties of the intermediate types include DeKalb SF-1a, NK 300 and Hegari.
Seeding rate is four to five pounds per acre, which will give four to five plants per foot on 38 to 42 inch rows.
Plant the intermediate type grain sorghum April 15 to July 1. In delta areas use nitrogen only at 90 to 120 pounds per acre. In hills and delta foot hills use 90 to 100 pounds of nitrogen, 50 pounds of P2O5 and 80 pounds of K2O.
Plant sorghum about one inch deep and pack well. Uniform planting depth is important.

Sorghum does best planted on deep, moderately well drained soils. It will withstand more dry weather than corn and can be planted later in the summer.

The seedbed should be prepared just as for corn — broken deeply, pulverized, and allowed to settle before planting. Seedbed should be as uniform as possible.

Planting Lespedeza
If you are going to plant Lespedeza and have not already done so try to get it planted as soon as

possible. You can plant it out on thin sod or in oats that will be cut for hay.

It is not recommended for lespezo to be planted now in heavily fertilized oats for grain harvest.

Timber Stand Improvement
More than half of the forest land in the state needs weeding. The best time to weed the woods (do timber stand improvement work) is anytime you can spare the time and the ax is sharp. Check with your county agent for the latest

information on getting rid of weed trees and chemical to use in doing this important job.
