Farmers Reminded Of June 1 Deadline For Signing Up In Feed-Grain Program

June 1, 1961, is the deadline date for farmers to rent corn acreage. 236 farmers have already signed to rent all or part of their corn base acreage to the government, E. N. Allen, ASC Office Manager in Iuka, stated today.

Cash money in the amount of \$20,593.10 has been paid to the 236 farmers that have already rented. This amount of money represents one half of the payment they will receive. The second half will be paid after the acreage is measured this summer.

"There has been some question in the minds of farmers as to what they will have to do with the land that is designated for land rented to the government," Mr. Allen said. "Farmers may want to sow winter cover crops on this land, others may not want to sow anything. If you do not want to sow anything the natural (native) cover such as weeds, grass, etc., will qualify you this year. Some farmers might want to sow oats on this land this fall so they could begin grazing the land after January 1, 1962."

"Any cropland that has been cultivated since 1958 will qualify as land rented. A farmer might have idle land that was in a crop in 1958, 1959 or 1960 but it is idle now. This land is eligible to rent," Mr. Allen said.

"Another important thing to remember is there is no need to worry about the exact acreage that you rent. If you rent 12.0 acres and designate 2 fields then when it is measured there is 11.5 acres. Your second payment will be reduced to 11.5 acres."

"The Feed Grain program guaranteed a farmer a safe income for his corn crop. Also it eliminates the hazard of dry weather cutting your corn field. If you have not planted corn consider this before the deadline date," the ASC office manager concluded.

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COMMUNISM IS NOT AN IDLE THREAT . . .

These Are Perilous Days

A handful of area residents turned out Friday night to see the filmstrip, "Communism On The Map" presented at Central School by the Memphis American Legion Post No. 1 under auspices of the Iuka Rotary Club. Leland Carter, a Memphis attorney and member of the above Legion Post's "Operation Alert" task force, spoke on the threat of Communism to American freedom, before showing the film which depicted the spread of Communism over vast areas of the world in the last twenty years.

Those who saw the film and heard Mr. Carter's comments could not but feel alarm over the rapid and wide-range spread of Communist influence and the danger it poses to Americans, to Mississippians, to us right here in Tishomingo County. It may seem like a faraway thing, a problem other nations have, but any place in the world where freedom falls to Communism — by that much our own freedom is lessened and our influence constricted.

We have not learned how to fight the "cold war." As strategists in this type of warfare we run a poor second . . . or third . . . to the Soviet Union. The Communist threat may seem faraway and unreal to us who do not knowingly face it in our personal and daily lives. But the day for awakening is late and the danger is great.

How real and how great the danger was recently disclosed to a number of publishers and newspaper editors in a special briefing session in the State Department in Washington. These newsmen were given some bald facts that bear out the message being presented by the "Operation Alert" task force from the Memphis American Legion Post No. 1.

James E. Charlet, president of the Tenn. Press Association, after attending the Washington meeting, wrote:

"The Communists are ruthless fanatics who believe that the end justifies the means and they use every advantage, be it by fair means or foul, to bring the people under their control.

"We cannot fight the battle against the Communists with the dove of peace and an olive branch. This much President Kennedy has learned in the school of hard knocks.

"Speaker after speaker told the Washington conference that Khrushchev has said that there are three kinds of war and three attitudes to be taken by the Soviet Union. The first is the thermo-nuclear war which Russia hopes to avoid at all costs. The second is the brushfire war like the Suez invasions and Russia wants to end this type as soon as possible because it could lead to the thermo-nuclear war.

"The third class of war is the war of liberation such as Castro fought in Cuba and which offers the Communists the opportunity to take over while the nation is in an upheaval. This type of war is made to order for the Communists and Khrushchev says that World Communism fully supports this type of war. We have it in Laos, in Indo China, in Vietnam and it was attempted in the Congo.

"President Kennedy believes that the world and America can lose its freedom without a war being declared, without a shot being fired and without a border being crossed."

The free world is Communism's target. We are part of the free world and these are indeed perilous days.

"Too often we don't locate customers because we don't know who our competitors are . . ." A furniture dealer speaking to fellow merchants at a convention recently expressed this opinion.

"We are not so much in competition with other furniture dealers as we are with other types of firms," he said.

The speaker cited the potential purchases of a young married couple. "There was a time, when the first big purchase would be for good furniture. However, now if a young couple has any savings it may go to any one of a dozen different places," he said.

Some of the competitors of the local furniture store, or any other local store, may be hundreds or thousands of miles away, the dealer pointed out.

"The couple may decide to spend their whole pile on a tour of Europe and spend their first year sitting on apple crates. They may buy a second automobile manufactured abroad. The young wife may order a fur coat from a Manhattan department store," he said.

"All of these businesses are advertising in my hometown and your hometown in magazines, television and regional newspapers. They are getting a large share of the business which we used to take for granted. They are our chief competitors — not the dealer down the street.

"Rather than fighting one another, our best answer to this challenge is more and better advertising of our own which will keep this money in the local market," the speaker said.

In The News

We are off on a new and additional foreign aid program, this time for Latin America. Last year when Castro was throwing his weight around as the potential leader of the Latin World, the Eisenhower Administration suggested and recommended to the Congress that the United States could hold its own and possibly gain friends South of the Border if we gave away some more money. By a thumping majority the Congress agreed and authorized a give-and-loan program of six hundred million dollars. With time fleeing the Congress didn't have quite time enough to vote it all away before Senators and Congressmen headed home for the campaigns. Only a hundred million had been sacked when adjournment came.

The Kennedy Administration came back for the remaining five hundred million and will get it. The House has already approved. Senate approval is certain. This new give-and-loan program is supported with the argument that we have not "done right" by the Latin countries. Sponsors do not tell us wherein we have failed — they just say, "We haven't done 'em right."

We indict ourselves on a charge of "neglect" and then plead guilty to the charge. How stupid can we be? What is it that we have failed to do for the Latins? Certainly, there is no obligation on our part to give anyone anything. If there is, then the record absolves us. The record reveals that Uncle Sam over the past 12 years has given and loaned into the Latin countries, even including Cuba, more than five billion, eight hundred million dollars — an aid program averaging almost five hundred million per year. In the face of this

eye and say, "You know, you haven't treated us right. You have confessed to that." And, we have also provided Khrushchev with the effective propaganda weapon that the United States neglects everyone "even its neighbors, the Latins." Assuming this additional give-and-loan program to be sound and essential, it has been supported with the most stupid argument of all — neglect!

During the recent attempt of counter-revolutionaries in Cuba some Latin heads hurled reviling statements against the United States. They expressed no criticism of Castro's communist regime which threatens even them. Now we attempt to soothe with more dollars and more loans, loans which the State Department frankly admits will never be repaid. And, we do this with an apology

for having "neglected" them.

The record of the United States over the past century reveals a strong friendship for Latin countries. We assisted in liberating many of them from the Spanish crown. We have vigorously espoused their status as independent nations. Their trade balances with us are most favorable. We purchase a major portion of their sugar as attractive prices unobtainable elsewhere. Their coffee abounds our tables every morning and during the popular American coffee-break. Their nitrate, copper, iron ore, tung oil and other products find a ready market in the United States frequently at a sacrifice of our own industry — tung oil, for instance. Their wet-backs swarm over our borders for employment. There is much more; but this is sufficient to counter

the silly argument that we have neglected the Latins.

This is a critical hour in the New World. The spread of Castroism poses a real threat. Regrettably, we made ourselves look ridiculous in sympathizing with the Castro movement to replace Batista. So did many Latins. We misjudged. We made a mistake. Indeed, there is sound reasoning in our taking a firm stand with anti-Castro Latins. It is just as sound that they — all of them — take such a stand with us. However, our stand should never be predicated on a charge — a self-imposed charge at that — of neglect. The indisputable facts are that throughout history the United States of America without exception has taken a vigorous position alongside freedom-loving peoples

of the entire world. Ofttimes we have sealed it in the blood of our own sons.

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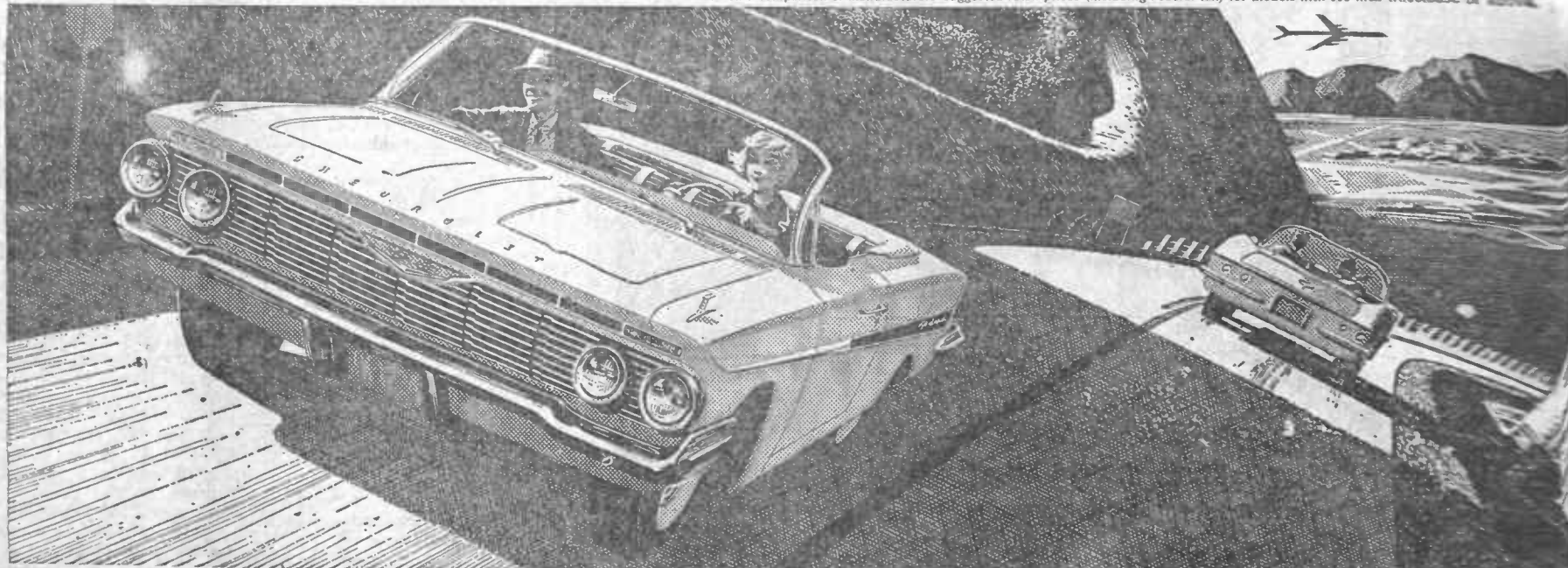

Rowe Study Club Hears Lecture Forest Resources And Products

Forecast of disposable paper products, blouses, baby clothes and other products was the April 27 meeting of the Rowe Study Club. 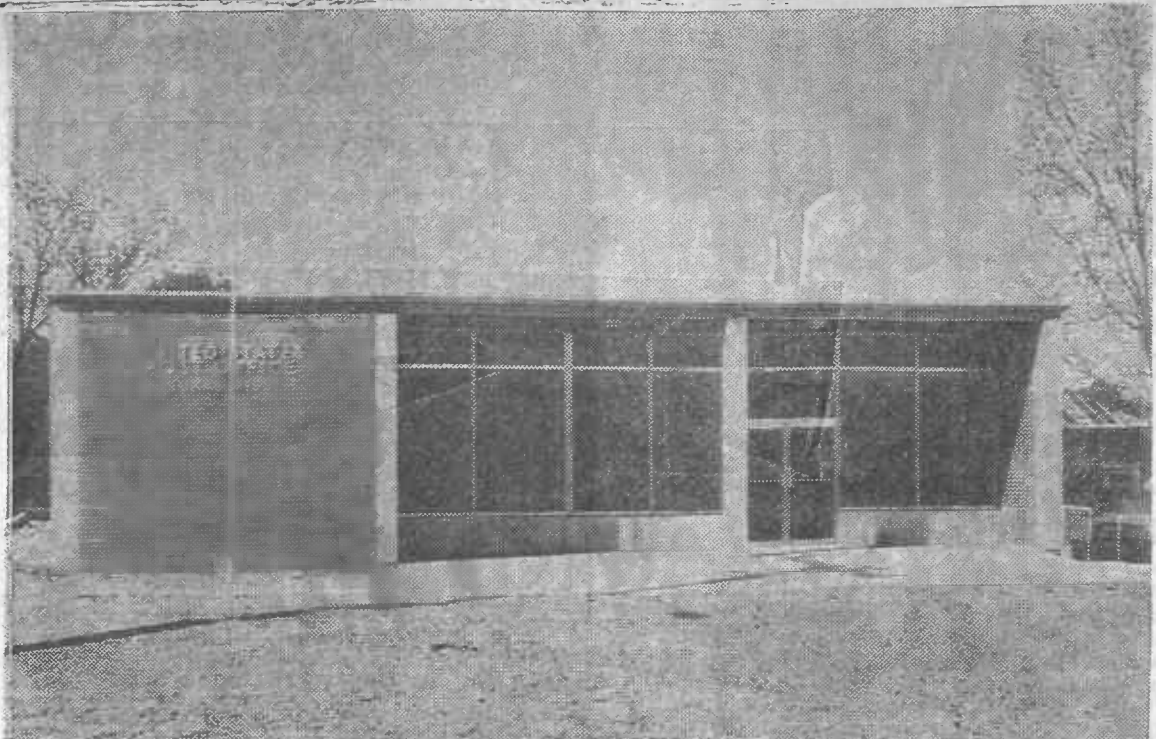
Stressing the fact that the utilization of paper in the United States averaged 438 pounds a year per person at last calculation, Mr. Layson said, "Knowing our trees, knowing all we can learn about intelligent forest management can assure a constant supply of raw material needed to produce the variety of products that are transformed from wood."

He cited the 92 Pilot Forests established in 1959 on farm woodlands throughout the South as one of the methods used by member companies of the Southern Pulpwood Conservation Association to promote better forestry practices in this region. He also pointed out that 1,000 farm youngsters a year have attended forestry training camps held in nine states during the past 10 years to learn modern methods of forest care and development.

"As corporate citizens of the Southern community, the pulp and paper industry employs 83,000 people in its pulp and paper mills, while another 82,000 people are engaged in the independent business of supplying pulpwood to these mills," Mr. Layson said.

"The scope of the industry's economic impact can be measured by the fact that nearly a billion dollars a year go to farmers, workers in pulp and paper plants, workers producing pulpwood, and people transporting these materials," he added.

In conclusion, the Hiwassee Land Company representative said, "Through proper development, many wonders can continue to come from our Southern woodlands that will benefit us here in the South today and will benefit our children tomorrow."

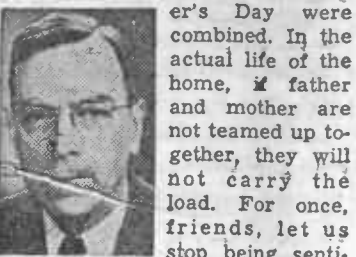

Parent's Duty

Lesson for May 14, 1961

IN AMERICA the second Sunday in May is called Mother's Day, and a few weeks after that, the windows of stores advertise various stuff for "Father's Day" presents. Maybe there would be more enthusiasm if Mother's and Father's Day were combined.



Dr. Foreman Mental about mothers, let us think about fathers and mothers together. Let's think about what parents must do for their children if they have any serious intention of bringing the children up right. And let's not talk as if it were easy and pleasant. Let us talk about something so difficult, so unpleasant, that thousands of parents put it off and neglect it, with results that bring disaster personal and national.

Discipline
This is the duty of discipline. Children will not ask for it, they are disposed to resent it. It has to be done by the parents, both parents. The children must not get the idea that father can be played off against mother. Each must support the other. Any arguments about discipline had better be carried on either before the couple marry, or (after the children come) while the children are asleep. Now there are two things the parents must know, or their "discipline" will not work. 1. They must know what their children are doing. With very little children this means, what they are doing every waking minute. The other thing to be sure about is how you want them to grow up, what sort of ideal you have for their character and life.

Discipline is An Art

Discipline is not the same as punishment, though it involves punishment sometimes. It is not the same as being "possessive," wanting to manage every detail of the children's lives. It is not treating some and daughters like perpetual children, picking out their wives and husbands, their colleges or their future careers. It means bringing them up so that when it comes time for them to make choices they will choose wisely and well.

This means, of course, that discipline is an art, not a science. It changes from family to family, from child to child. But one thing is certain: a child who always does exactly as he pleases, is an undisciplined child, a menace to himself, to his parents, and all too soon, to society. Juvenile delinquents are simply undisciplined children turned loose. It is easy at first for parents to dodge discipline.

The Bible And Discipline
Old Testament and New push the duty of discipline. The very fact that discipline has to be set out as a parent's duty shows that parents were then, as they are now, inclined to skip it. The meaning of the word as we find it in the R.S.V. is interesting. Both in the Hebrew and the Greek, the word is the same as one translated sometimes "correction" or "punishment." We can combine the two ideas and say, Discipline in the home means correction-and-punishment. How much correction? How much punishment? That's where the art comes in. But essentially the thing is always the same in principle. When a child shows signs, in character, actions or habits, of going away from the ideal person he ought to be, that is the time to correct and straighten him out, just as you would correct a rose or a tomato-plant that was dragging in the mud.

And this gives the clue to the meaning of "the discipline of the Lord" of which Paul speaks (Eph. 6:4). For in a Christian home, the ideal for every child will be Christ-likeness, nothing less. Few children (there may be family exceptions, unknown to this writer) will unfold into Christ-likeness without help. As the gardener helps the flowers by not letting them sprout naturally, so the parent helps the child by keeping him out of whatever soils the soul.

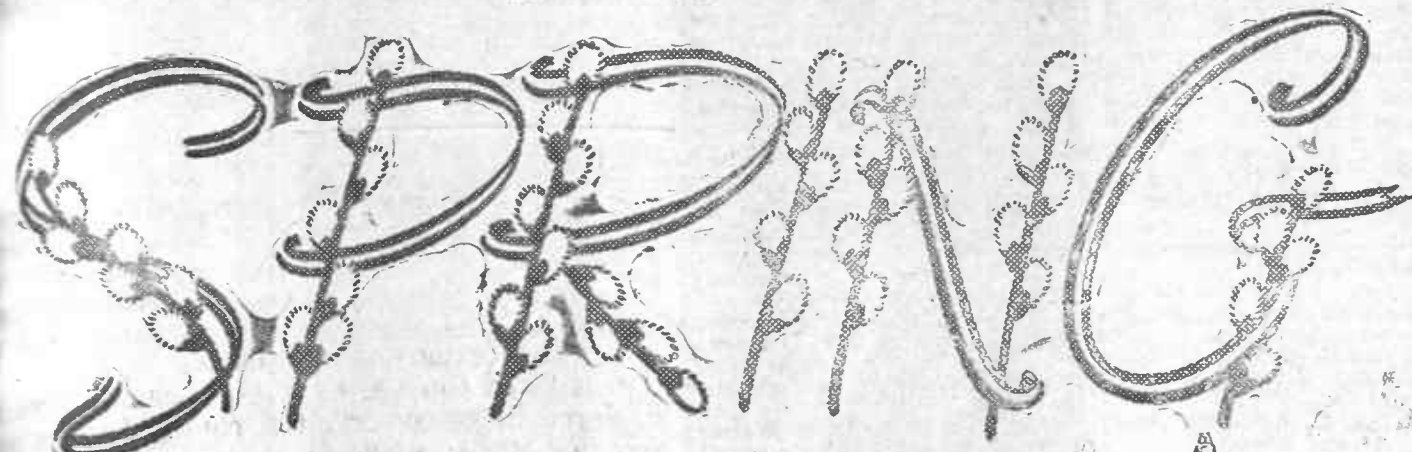

Milk Prices Stabilized

The Mississippi Milk Commission today pledged to stabilizing — not increasing — milk prices after the State Supreme Court unanimously upheld the Milk Commission Act.

The Commission pointed out that under its orders, there is no justification in any area of the State for major increases in retail milk prices. A minimum retail price is fixed and stores which charge more than this price do so as a matter of choice, said W. W. Moffett, Jr., Executive Secretary of the Commission. The minimum price fixed for this area is 50c per half gallon for pasteurized or homogenized milk which contains 3.5% to 4% butterfat. Milk containing 4% butterfat or more is priced one cent per quart higher. Moffett said the Commission has the authority to impose maximum retail price ceilings "but we hope it will not be necessary to do so. Generally speaking, competition

Soil Stewardship Week

We Are Stewards Of The Soil

By Hiram A. Jones

The following is a direct quotation of Dr. Walter Clay Lowdermilk, who at the time he wrote this was connected with U. S. Department of Soil Conservation Service.

"As Eleventh Commandment"

Thou shalt inherit the Holy Earth as a faithful steward, conserving its resources and productivity from generation to generation. Thou shalt safeguard thy fields from soil erosion, thy living water from drying up, thy forest from desolation, and protect thy hills from overgrazing by thy herds that thy descendants may have abundance forever. If any shall fail in this stewardship of the land, thy fields shall become sterile, stony ground and wasting gullies, and thy descendants shall decrease and live poverty or perish from off the face of the earth.

Sudan or Millet

Dairymen, especially, should make an early planting of Sudan or millet right away. Generally grazing is ready within around 30 days after planting.

Plan on one-third acre of millet or Sudan per cow and make several plantings three weeks or so apart.

Many dairymen like millet better than Sudan as it does not rust as badly and will withstand more drought. Many make the first planting Sudan and the following plantings millet.

Do not plant Sudan and millet in the same field nor mix the seed of the two grasses. Cows will eat the Sudan first and leave the millet, if they have a choice.

Do not forget the spraying program for your peaches, plums bunch grapes and apples. Follow directions in the Mississippi Spray Calendar.

Keep the orchard clean cultivated at all times during the growing season. Disk shallow to control grass and weeds. This will con-

serve moisture and plant food. This will help increase size of fruit, total yields and quality of the fruit.

Timber Management

This is a busy season, but farm woodlands need attention as well as row crops. The most timely forestry right now is timber stand improvement. This means getting rid of cull trees and brush, giving more room to desirable species of trees.

Your county agent can give you specific instructions for weeding your woodland.

More Dairy Profits

You can increase the size and productivity of your dairy operation without adding an additional acre or an additional cow. Do it simply by adding silage to your feed program.

An acre of corn is worth 40 percent more as total feed in silage than it is when harvested and put in the crib.

Do a better job of feeding. This will give you more milk from the same number of cows.

Artificial breeding will produce cows that can produce more milk. Keep an accurate set of production records so that you can see which cow is making money and which is a "free loader." Keep the profitable high producers and get rid of those that don't pay their way.

Types of interior design and construction that can be used in low-cost housing were tested in a small housing experiment of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Eight years ago, housing specialists planned and built five different farm houses for dairy workers and their families living at the Agricultural research center, Beltsville, Md. The families helped the specialists evaluate that houses and made these suggestions:

Homemakers having large floor-to-ceiling windows in their houses found there was too little wall space in a small house.

The large windows made it hard to protect the interiors from sunlight. The homemakers complained of furnishings fading and of excessive heat and glare. Adequate draperies on the inside or trees, awnings or a roof overhang would have helped solve these problems.

In the house that featured "open planning" the family found it hard to live in a small house with partial walls or no walls separating activity areas. This arrangement offered little opportunity to shut out noise and not enough privacy for individual family members.

For example, the dining and living areas were combined. The dining table doubled as a desk and work table, and there was a television set in the living area.

The family didn't like the arrangement because of the confusion of so many activities in one small room. All families agreed that the dining and living areas should be separated.

The homemakers liked the kitchens in the homes. They had been planned according to federal and state research for adequate counter space and storage space.

By standards developed since the houses were built, the clothes closets, linen closets, coat closets

TB CONTROL PROGRAM FOR THE YEAR 1960

The Tishomingo County Health Department places special emphasis on the Tuberculosis Control Program in the county.

The Mobile Unit X-ray Bus was in the county in February and August with a total of 2,335 chest x-rays being made. Out of this number 64 persons were given repeat chest x-rays in the county office. Two hundred fifty-three chest x-rays were made in the county office on cases, suspects and routine x-rays. Routine x-rays include x-rays made for barbers and college entrance examinations. Ten new cases were reported in the year 1960. The State Laboratory checked 117 specimens for tuberculosis during the year. Thirty-four cases were on home treatment during the year. Six persons received sanatorium care during 1960.

The Tishomingo County Tuberculosis Society sponsored by the

Lucy Rowe Study Club co-operates with the Health Department in its Control Program.

Chest x-ray clinics are held each Wednesday in the Iuka Health Department and every Friday in the Belmont Branch Health Office.

In 1960 there were 437 nursing visits made for tuberculosis cases, suspects and contacts alone. And 235 visits for tuberculosis home treatment were made. 12 cases were reviewed by the regional tuberculosis consultant.

Area Cities Plan Civil War Pageant And Celebration

The Colbert-Lauderdale Civil War Centennial Commemoration is in the final stages of planning as daily rehearsals under direction of Miss Margaret Minor, Birmingham dramatist, are being held in both Florence and Tusculum.

The pageant, which will be presented on Wednesday and Thursdays, May 17-18, at Desher stadium in Tusculum, will commemorate events that transpired at the beginning of the Civil War. It will pay tribute to the first soldiers of both counties who volunteered for service in the Confederate Army, drilling of the famed LaGrange cadets who later volunteered in a body, an antebellum home scene with Negro spirituals and the crowning of the "Queen of Love and Beauty." The presentation of the flag to the Franklin Blues and the Florence Guards, a Confederate ball at LaGrange Academy, Forrest and his men, and Wheeler's farewell speech to his comrades in arms are among the historical events to be included.

The remaining major event following the pageant will be the Confederate Costume Ball that will be held at the Coliseum in Flor-

ence on Friday night, May 19, from 8 to 12 midnight. Admission will be charged to both events.

Civil Service Job Opportunity

Full information is given in Announcement No. 9-14-2(61). Applications for these positions will be accepted until further notice and must be filed with the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, United States Penitentiary, Leavenworth, Kansas.

Forestry Notes

There are many acres of timberland in Tishomingo County that have an adequate amount of reproduction in serious need of re-leasing from undesirable species. In most cases this is pine reproduction overtopped or crowded out by undesirable hardwoods. I want to urge the landowners in Tishomingo County to give young desirable trees that are under competition from undesirable species a chance to grow by releasing them through timber stand improvement work.

Some people are of the opinion that the only way to put idle timber land to work is by planting trees. This is not always true. In some instances there are already enough desirable seedlings established to make a good stand of timber if they are only released from undesirable competition. Millions of these seedlings die each summer because they are not given a little help. This forestry practice is far less expensive than planting and ACP assistance is available for carrying it out.

Putting idle acres to work through controlling undesirable trees will not only earn additional income for the landowner. Productive forests arrest soil erosion, conserve water supplies and help prevent floods. For example, converting scrubby hardwood stands on upper slopes and ridges to pine stands will provide excellent protection against erosion of
