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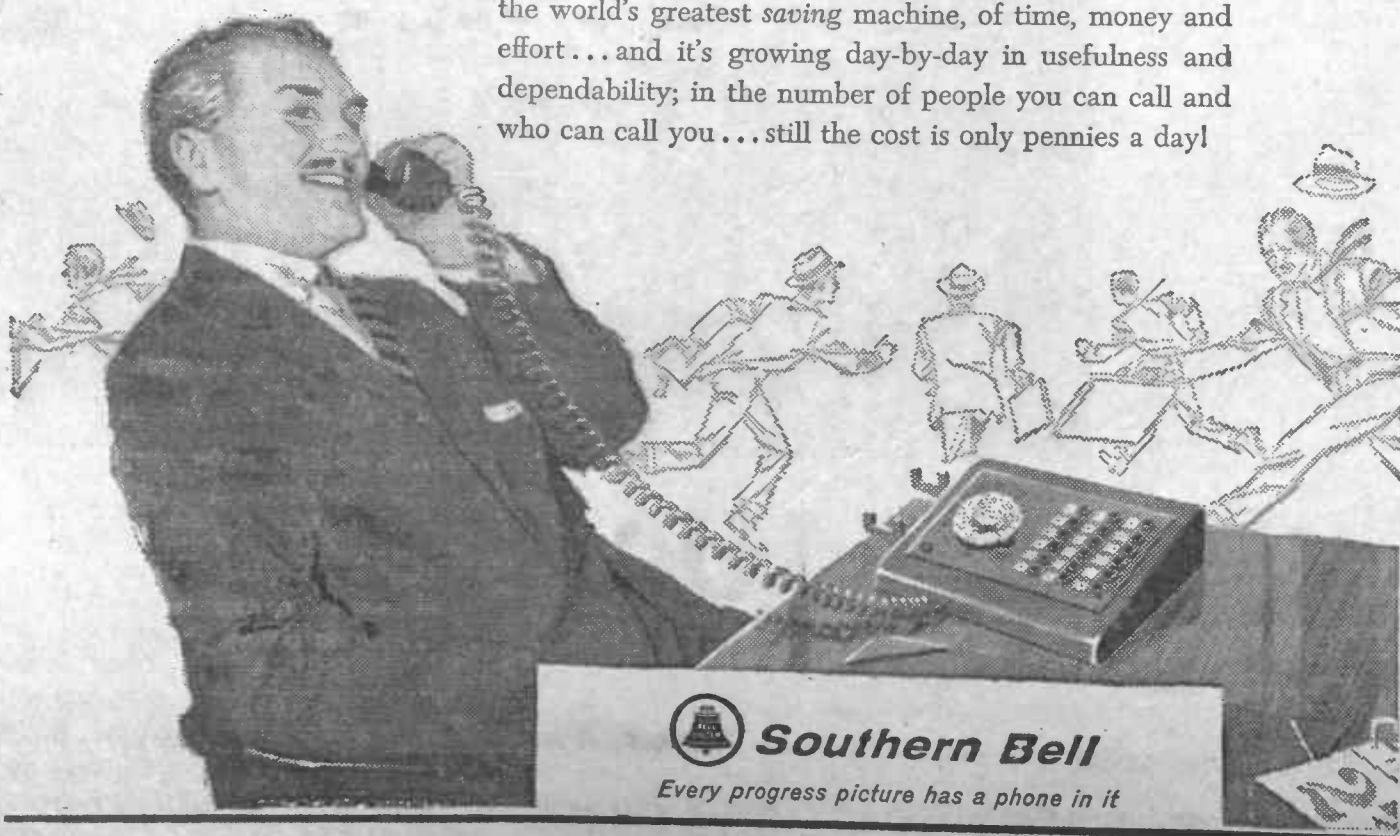

THAT OLD VIRUS STRIKES AGAIN . . .

It's Spring Fever Time

The signs are unmistakable and they point to but one conclusion. That old virus for which no workable vaccine has been discovered has struck again. It happens every year about this time and for lack of a better name, we call it Spring Fever. Everybody is afflicted with it although all do not react to it in the same way.

The young children react by romping about, whooping it up and generally showing a good deal of liveliness and excitement. The older young people, 16 and over, grow dreamy and see beauty and romance in every dancing sunbeam, every rose that blooms and every passing cloud. Passing whims also take on unwanted importance in the spring — especially if they are of the opposite sex. The Junior Miss is likely to see Sir Galahad in a gangling youth in June who looks like nothing but a big lug in September. And conversely the same is true with Johnny. Springtime sheds a magic aura over the Junior misses that makes them all "little Miss Americas."

But for us, Spring fever has a special effect. It puts us in a stupor. We can't get excited about anything. Passing fancies just pass on by. Big, momentous events like a possible meeting between the "K's" — Kennedy and Khrushchev — only gets one of our eyes half open.

We can't even get indignant over the President asking newspaper editors to be careful what they print about the government lest some vital secrets be given away. We're just plain not worried about giving away government secrets cause we don't know any. And there's nothing we could print that the enemy doesn't already have access to through government publications, bureau bulletins, congressmen's newsletters, Senators' weekly reports broadcast over radio and TV stations, the Congressional quarterly, and umpteen other means that we don't have the energy to list right now.

There are things that we might get fired up about . . . If that old Spring fever hadn't gotten us. There's the gasoline tax, for instance. Every time we fill up the tank — or "just put in a dollar's worth" we pay a sales tax of 10-cents on every gallon. Sometime back in the winter we read a piece about the gasoline tax that pointed out consumers pay, on the average nationwide, a sales tax which is equal to 48 per cent of the retail price on gasoline. Jewelry, furs, leather goods, the article said, had excise taxes running up to only 20 per cent of the retail price. And those things are luxuries. Gasoline is an absolute necessity.

We ought to fight such high taxation, especially since the federal 1-cent boost in the gasoline tax imposed about a year ago is due to expire June 30. Uncle Sam proposes to keep that temporary 1-cent boost and add 1-half cent more to it.

Such a proposition as that ought to pull us out of our lethargy and set us to writing letters to Senators Eastland and Stennis and Congressman Abernethy. But it won't. Spring fever's got us. Maybe that's why the government proposes tax increases in the Spring. We're all too lethargic to rise up and protest.

Get Your Child Ready For School

This is one of the greatest adventures in a child's life. He needs to have a birth certificate, medical record, immunizations completed and physical defects corrected. The immunizations needed are Smallpox vaccination or re-vaccination; Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus; or booster; and Polio vaccine. These should all be given before he starts to school. If he has had all of the above he is ready to start. If the child does not have a birth certificate the applications for one can be obtained from the Health Department.

The School Correction Program co-operates with the Lion's Clubs in Belmont and Tishomingo and the Twentieth Century Club in Iuka to help correct physical defects found in school children.

Since too few were present for a room count, the attendance prize money was allocated to the school.



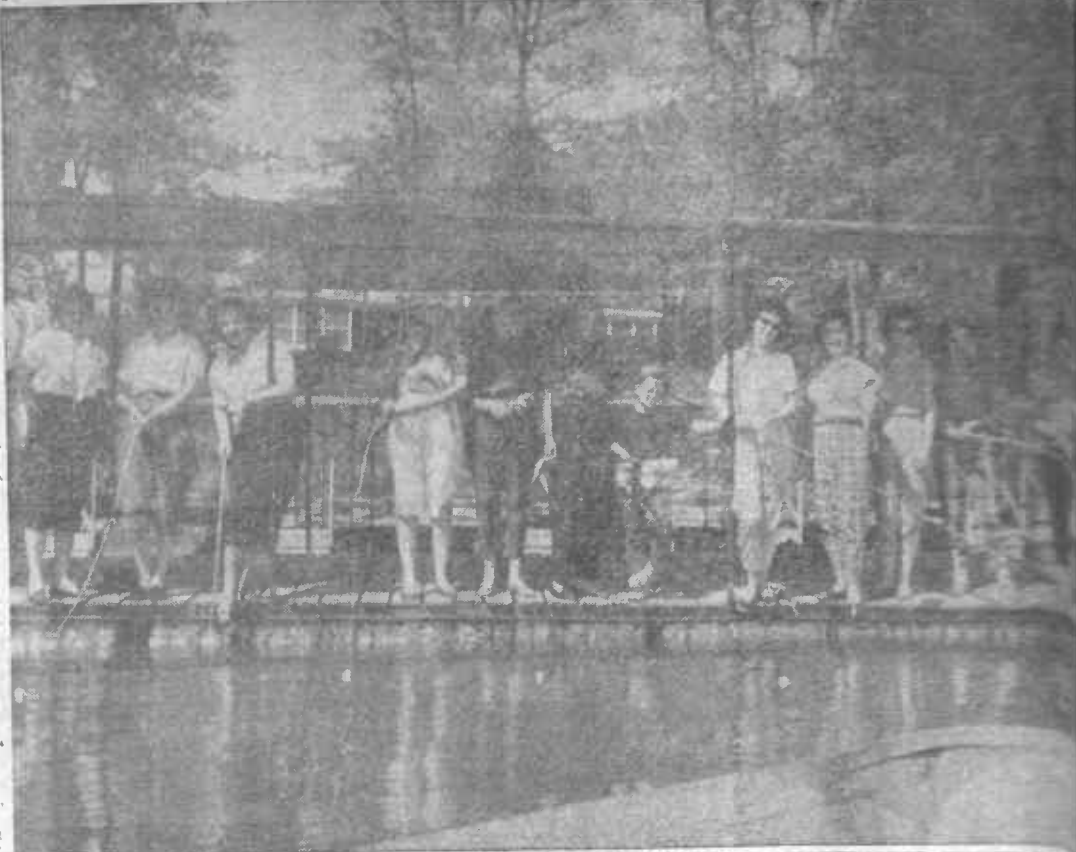
County Agent's Notes

COTTON

The packing rains and cool weather has delayed cotton coming up a stand the past week. A rotary hoe put over the row lightly will aid in getting a stand. The rotary hoe saved many fields from being replanted last year.

If you used pre-emerge on your cotton at planting time, you may still use the rotary hoe without losing the effects of your pre-emerge. Should you have to replant where you used pre-emerge, you may use the rotary hoe to loosen up the soil and run the planter back in the same place on the row as you did the first planting. This will still give full benefit of your first application of pre-emerge. You do not have to use pre-emerge on replanting unless you destroy the bed or rows you planted on the first time. If you do destroy the first application by disking, you should use another full rate of pre-emerge for replanting.

Many acres of cotton were replanted last year that could have been saved with a rotary hoe and

waiting until the weather turned warm. Don't forget to give your cotton a poisoning for thrips as soon as it is up a stand. Experiments have shown that thrip control will hasten maturity by two to three weeks next fall.

Some of the recommended dust for thrips are 3-0-0, 3-5-0; a mixture of 2½% Methyl Parathion and 5% DDT; and Sevin. Liquid insecticides recommended for thrips are BHC; Methyl Parathion and DDT; Malathion; and Dieldrin. To insure vigorous seedlings growth, you should poison when two leaves spread, 2 to 3 applications, 5 to 7 days apart.

ROACHES AND WATERBUGS
Would you like to get rid of roaches and waterbugs? You may use Diazinon and Korlan. A mixture of these two materials will give excellent control of roaches.

SNAILS AND SLUGS
We have had several inquiries about controlling slugs and snails around the home. Recommended controls are 15% metaldehyde dust or a bait of metaldehyde calcium arsenate. A product called "bug getter" containing these chemicals is on the market.

Forestry Notes

Now is the time for timber growers to start inspecting their woods for beetle attacked trees. There are several different beetles which attack pine but this article will deal with only the black turpentine beetle.

The black turpentine beetle has caused extensive losses throughout the pine belt in the Southern States. All Southern pines are attacked. Usually only a few trees are attacked but 10 percent of some stands have been attacked on occasion. Freshly cut stumps are usually preferred for breeding, whereas freshly cut logs are rarely attacked. The turpentine beetle shows a preference for weakened trees, such as those damaged by fire, logging operation, worked for naval stores, or attacked by other bark beetles; but it is capable of severely attacking apparently normal, healthy trees.

The beetle confines its attacks to the base of the tree, and initial attacks are almost always located

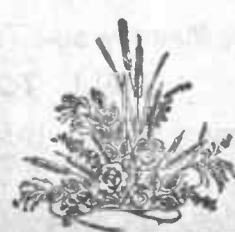

A RESOLUTION
The Board of Supervisors took up for consideration the matter of issuing bonds of Tishomingo County to raise money for the purpose of constructing state-aid roads, therein, as now or hereafter designated by law. After a discussion of the subject, Supervisor H. M. Biggs offered and moved the adoption of the following resolution:
Resolution declaring the intention of the Board of Supervisors of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, to issue bonds of said county in the maximum principal amount of Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$600,000.00) to raise money for the purpose of constructing state-aid roads in said county as now or hereafter designated

by law, as provided and authorized by chapter 196, Laws of Mississippi of 1960, and directing publication of notice of such intent.

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors does now find and determine that it has become and is necessary to raise money for the purpose of constructing state-aid roads in Tishomingo County, Mississippi, as now or hereafter designated by law; and

WHEREAS, this Board has made due investigation and does now find and determine that the estimated cost of constructing the aforesaid state-aid roads is Six Hundred Thousand (\$600,000.00); and

WHEREAS, sufficient funds are not now available in the treasury of said County to provide for the aforesaid expenditure; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors is authorized by the provisions of Chapter 196, Laws of Mississippi of 1960, to issue negotiable bonds of the aforesaid County for the aforesaid purpose, provided that the amount of bonds so issued shall be in an amount which can be retired, principal and interest, in annual installments over a term of not exceeding twenty (20) years from date of issue out of sixty-five per centum (65%) of the funds allocated to said County during the preceding fiscal year under the provisions of Section 10127, Mississippi Code, Annotated; and

WHEREAS, this Board of Supervisors, having made due investigation, now finds and determines:

(a) That the funds allocated to Tishomingo County, Mississippi, during the preceding fiscal year under the provisions of Section 10127, Mississippi Code, Annotated, was Seventy Four Thousand Four Hundred Sixty One Dollars and Eighty Five cents (\$74,461.85);

(b) That sixty-five per centum (65%) of the aforesaid amount is Forty Eight Thousand Four Hundred Dollars and Twenty cents (\$48,400.20);

(c) That the amount required to retire the bonds hereinafter proposed to be issued, principal and interest, in annual installments over a term of 20 yrs. (20) years from date of issue is estimated to be Forty Seven Thousand Dollars (\$47,000.00), and does not exceed sixty-five per centum (65%) of the funds allocated to said County during the preceding fiscal year, as aforesaid; and

WHEREAS, this Board does now further find and determine that it is necessary and in the public interest that bonds of said County be issued as hereinafter set forth:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF TISHOMINGO COUNTY, MISSISSIPPI, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That this Board does hereby declare its intention to issue negotiable bonds of Tishomingo County, Mississippi, in the principal amount of Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$600,000.00) to raise money for the purpose of constructing state-aid roads in said County, as now or hereafter designated by law.

SECTION 2. That this Board proposes to direct the issuance of the

aforesaid bonds in the aforesaid amount for the aforesaid purpose at a meeting of said Board to be held at 10:00 o'clock A. M., on Thursday, the 8th day of June, 1961, if twenty per centum (20%) of the qualified electors of said County shall file a written protest against the issuance of said bonds on or before the date herein specified, then an election on the question of the issuance of said bonds shall be called and held as provided by law. If no such protest be filed, then such bonds may be issued without an election on the question of the issuance thereof at any time within a period of two (2) years after the date specified herein.

SECTION 3. That this resolution shall be published once a week for at least three (3) consecutive weeks in The Vidette, a newspaper published in said County and which is a qualified newspaper under the provisions of Chapter 427, Laws of Mississippi of 1948. The first publication of this resolution shall be made not less than twenty-one (21) days prior to the date fixed in section 2 of this resolution for the issuance of said bonds, and the last publication shall be made not more than seven (7) days prior to said date.

SECTION 4. That the Clerk of this Board shall be and he is hereby directed to procure from the publishers of the aforesaid newspaper the customary proof of publication of this resolution, and to have the same before this Board on the date specified in Section 2 of this resolution.

Supervisor J. S. South seconded the motion to adopt the foregoing resolution, and the question being put to a roll call vote, the result was as follows:

Supervisor H. M. Biggs voted aye.

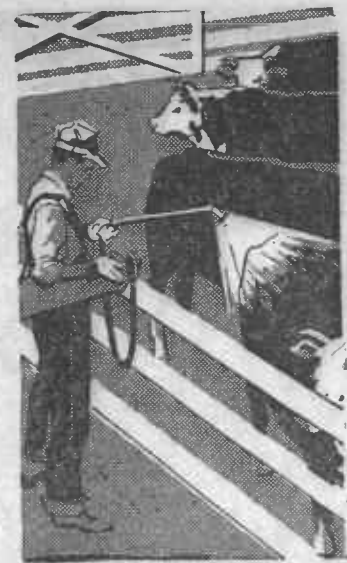
