Receives National Science Foundation Research Grant

W. H. Osborn, chemistry and science instructor at Iuka high school, has been awarded a research grant in chemistry at the Summer Research Institute at the University of Mississippi. The Institute is sponsored by the National Science Foundation of Washington, D.C. The grant has a value of \$1120 and will provide all tuition and fees to the ten-week summer course at Ole Miss.

The Foundation's grants were open only to high school and junior high school teachers with MS degrees. The work they do at the summer institute will be credited toward a Ph.D. in Science. Mr. Osborn was one of three to be chosen from a large number of applicants from schools in several states.

The research work to be undertaken by Mr. Osborn is new in its field. He will work on the tin complex organic solvents. This is the first time such research has been done. The tin complex in inorganic solvents has been checked out, but not in organic solvents, Mr. Osborn stated.

Before coming to Iuka high two years ago, Mr. Osborn taught science classes for five years at Tishomingo. He attended four summer sessions at Ole Miss and earned his Master of Science degree there last summer. His BS degree was received at Mississippi State University.

Mr. Osborn is married to the former Myra Sue Orick of Dennis. They have one child, a daughter, Mitzi, age 20 months. The Osborns recently purchased a home on Meadowbrook Circle in Iuka.

Shelby Counce, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Counce was elected a member of the Student Council of the University of Denver (Colo.). He was also elected vice-president of S.A.E. fraternity. He was named to the teaching staff of Iuka high school, taking up his duties here after graduation from Denver.

Ceremonies honoring deceased American war veterans on Memorial Day, May 30, were being planned throughout the state. The Tishomingo County Post No. 12, under the leadership of Post Commander E. D. Davis, and Adjutant C. A. Curtis, formulated plans for a most impressive ceremony here to mark the first Memorial Day observance after cessation of World War II hostilities.

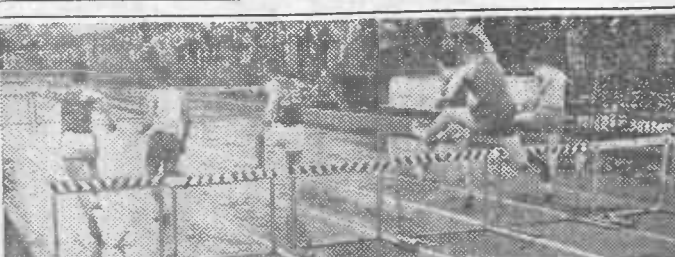
HD Clubs' Cotton Style Show Winners Named

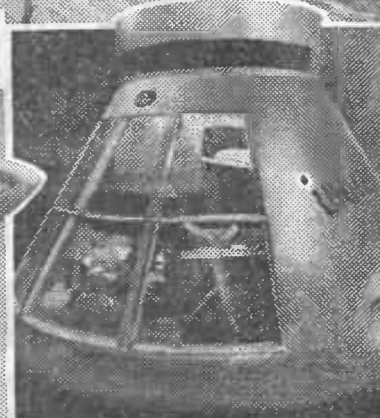

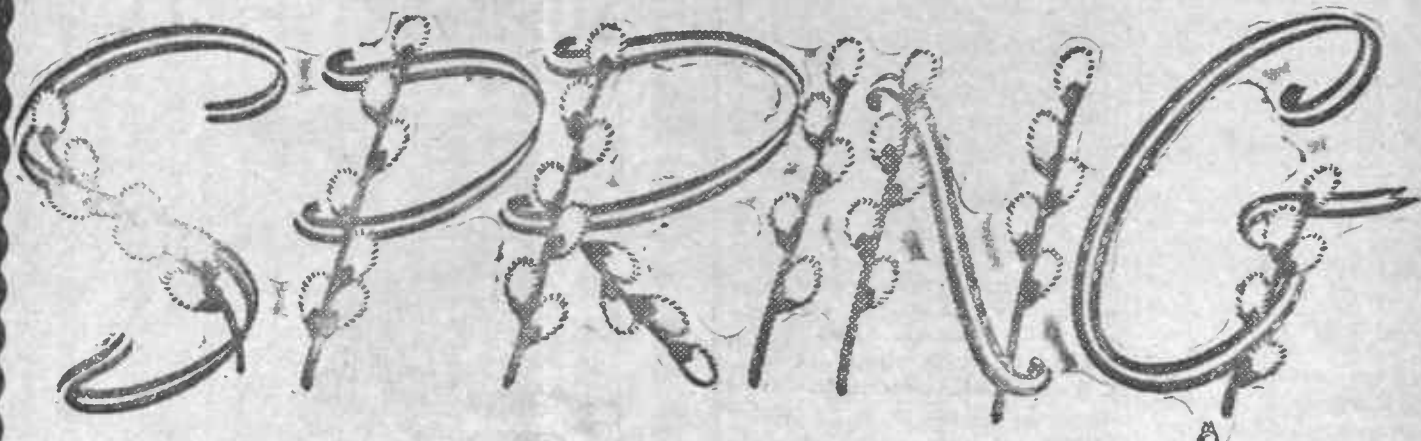

First, study your market: Determine the volume and grade of the products that you have for sale. Call on your area forester for assistance. Ask for market information. Try to sell at the right time. Sell to specialty markets where possible. Plan to cut selectively at short intervals to insure a continuous supply.

Second, Find your Best Market: Discuss wood markets with neighbors who have made a timber sale and most important, a forester. Contact local mills and distant markets before making a deal. Get several bids before selling. If you have a large amount of timber to sell, advertise in local and neighboring newspapers.

Make sure that the purchaser is reliable and able to pay. This assures quick returns and prevents losses. Be sure to get a forester's advice on marking, grading, and scaling, and on what and when to cut. Don't rush to sell—timber is as good as a bank account and pays interest in growth.

Third, Market Carefully: Cut products of highest value from each tree. It is best to have a written timber sale agreement. Get advice on terms of contract from a forester. Be sure to keep close check on cutting and see that the terms of the contract are not being violated.

Fourth, Log it Yourself — Increase Returns: Harvest your farm woods products yourself in slack seasons. Use idle farm labor and machinery and haul products to the mill or woodyard. You can make more, and save more through growing, harvesting, and marketing farm woods products the right way.

Self-Discipline

Lesson for May 28, 1961

"SPARE the rod and spoil the child," an old proverb says. We can all "sound off" about the younger generation, how it's going to pot, and about the juvenile delinquents and what ought to be done about them. We have big ideas about educating parents to feel responsible for the kind of boys and girls their children are. This is all good, so far as it goes.

But do you know the most common reason why parents don't discipline their children? They don't discipline themselves. One rod that must not be spared is the rod reserved by myself, for myself. If I make a bad job of self-discipline, I shan't be likely to be good at disciplining others.

If You Want It! It can be said in simple words what discipline is. It means training a person to take, or do, what he doesn't like, or to keep from doing or taking what he does like. Self-discipline means learning this for yourself, and practicing it without anyone standing over you to make you do it.

There is one single requirement that must be met first of all. You must want, very strongly, what self-discipline will do for you. The writer of Prov. 2 puts it into a nutshell: insight and understanding. Do you want these qualities in your character? They don't glide into your room on a moonbeam. No one ever was born with perfect insight and understanding. Nobody (except Jesus) ever achieved perfect insight and understanding. Nobody ever achieved enough of it to be worth while, without working at it, without wanting it. It comes hard enough at best, it never comes at all to fools who don't care.

properly treated with a recommended fungicide — Panogen or Ceresan.

Leave the top of the seedbed smooth for use of post-herbicide oiling attachments.

If weather is dry when you plant and the cotton comes up before a rain, grass may also come up before a rain. Pre-emergence chemicals require showers to activate the chemical to kill the grass.

Use herbicidal oils to kill this grass in the drill. If the seedbed is not smooth, you will have to cut out large bunches of grass with a hoe.

Do not cover the treated band with too much dirt. More than one half inch of loose dirt will bury the chemical too deeply.

Make sure that you plant every acre of your cotton allotment. Urge your neighbor to plant all of their acreage too!

The Bible is a very frank and outspoken book. There are parts of the Proverbs that plainly say the object of wisdom is to "preserve you from the loose woman." This might mean a professional prostitute, or it might not. Then, as now, the "young man without sense" (Prov. 7:7) is easily taken in by the wrong kind of woman. No amount of warning, no amount of law-making, no good example,—nothing will keep a young man from being fatally foolish here unless he is self-disciplined from within.

And yet, while some people think that the "loose woman" is the one real danger to youth, the book of Proverbs would make us aware that there are other dangers. There is anger, for example. How many murders are committed out of anger, only God knows. But you may be pretty sure that the fit of anger which brought forth the murder was not the first to which the killer had given way. Some criminals will even put up as excuse the fact that they were emotionally disturbed. Such an excuse should deceive no one. A fit of anger may be irresistible when you are in the middle of it; but it is possible to work on yourself so that you know the signs of anger coming up, and you can nip it in the bud before it starts. Diplomats and politicians can do this, and they don't claim supernatural help; how much more should a Christian, by the help of the Holy Spirit, be able to discipline himself away from acting like a barbarian or a spoiled child! Again we say, laws and good advice can perhaps prevent murder, but they can't prevent anger, the seed-bed of murder. Only self-discipline can do that.

Red-Eyed Woe One other trouble which is common in mankind is liquor. The writer of the 23rd chapter of the Proverbs gave as good a description of a hangover as you can read anywhere. It's nothing less than red-eyed woe. Now all the troubles of the drinker, whether he gets to the stage of being an alcoholic or not—all his troubles are actually artificial troubles. They are real, to be sure, but they are not natural. Sex and the acquisitive instinct and anger are all natural, however we may control them; but the taste of liquor is not born in any one. The way not to have the drinker's problems is simply not to drink.

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Cotton Spraying

No insecticide can do the job for you, unless you use it properly. Put the poison on the cotton right; at the right time; in the right amounts and in the right places.

Make sure that you use the correct nozzle tips. Never let the tips drag in the cotton. Keep the tips high enough to let the droplets blow down into the cotton. Operate your sprayer at a constant speed once it is calibrated. If you change nozzle tips, recalibrate the machine.

Always use clean water when mixing insecticide sprays. Keep your machine clean.

Livestock Price Outlook

HOGS. Indications are that hog prices will remain stable during the coming weeks before a seasonal upturn this summer.

CATTLE. Cattle prices are expected to remain at about the same level as last year.

BROILERS. Prices are now below a year ago and will probably remain somewhat below last year.

EGGS. Prices are expected to remain somewhat below last year. Nationally prices are below last year at the present time. But this is not true in Mississippi.

MILK. Production is up, but higher supports will likely result in prices at least as high as last year.

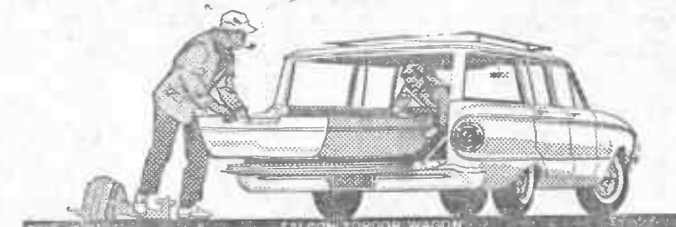

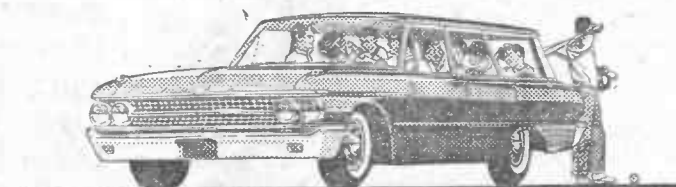

Fertilize Your Fish Ponds

You can produce more fish in your fish pond if you fertilize it. Of course, your fish pond should be properly stocked with bluegill and bass. Unless it is properly

stocked with fish, ten bluegill to one bass, fertilizing will do little or no good. Fertilize only properly stocked ponds.

If your pond is properly stocked this is what you should do: Apply at least 100 pounds, but not over 200 pounds of 8-8-4 fertilizer per acre of surface water you have in your pond now. Then in two weeks make another application of the same kind and amount of fertilizer. Apply 3 to 4 applications of fertilizer at from ten days or two weeks intervals. Just walk around the edge of your pond and throw the fertilizer into the water. Wave ac-

tion will distribute the fertilizer over the pond.

Farm ponds that furnish water for livestock also help prevent soil erosion and flooding of lowland by holding back water that ordinarily would enter main drainage channel as run-off and flood water.

These ponds can be stocked with fish. Actually most of the Tennessee River Soil Conservation District cooperators have stocked their farm ponds with fish.

Fertilizing these ponds will give the farmer and his family more fish of good size for their table.

Note: Use 8-8-4 fertilizer if 8-8-4 cannot be purchased.

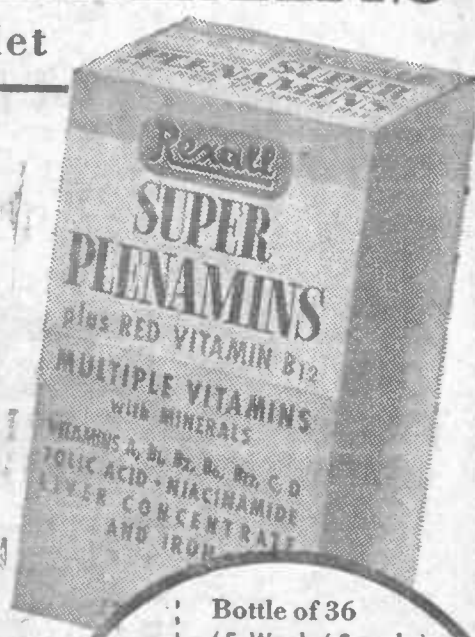
